

The inspired writer of the Hebrew letter, in the third chapter and first verse, in addressing holy brethren and partakers of the heavenly calling says, "Consider the Apostle and High Priest of our profession.

A program was being rendered. He took a seat near the door. Soon cries of horror arose. The decorated tree in the front of the room was ablaze. The children near were in danger. Each adult seemed to rush forward for a child. The ex-pr soner noticed a little girl run frantically to a far corner of the room. Her clothing was burning. He ran toward her pull ng off his over-coat as he went. He reached the child, wrapped his over-coat about her, bore her safely to the door, then collapsed.

He gained consciousness on a hospital cot. His hopes of now having a friend in person of the child's father, were bright. The expectation of having him sit beside the bed and gently clasp his badly burned hand, gave him much joy. But instead an envelope was brought to his bed-side containing a check of \$1,000 and a note. The sum substance of the note was as follows: "I trust you will understand that, because of our stations in life, real friendship can not spring up between us. I however heartily appreciate the fact that you have saved my child's life and am enclosing a reward."



2. What proof have we of his instability of character? "Unstable as water." He only mildly protested when his brothers intended to kill Joseph; that was not an isolated act, but the symptom of an undisciplined character. Frothy, effervescent like some of Syria's streams leaping up strongly at the source but soon drying up and failing.

3. Righteousness must be regal and supreme in the life. Reuben, a weak fickle nature. A feeble stand for the right is no stand at all. Many modern Reubens. God needs men who are moral Protestants of the Luther and Wesley type; men of conscience who will nail their principles to the church door in the face of a gain-saying world, declaring, "I can do no other, so

help me God."

4. The sequel in the history of Reuben's tribe is instructive. The land of their choice was one that closely hugged the Dead Sea. They were nominal Israeites, not true. Their lands far from Shiloh where God's tabernacle was set. They knew well that the land of God's purpose and promise was territory between the Jordan and the Mediterrain, but they wanted to settle east of the Jordan for they liked Moab's rolling plains for their cattle. God hates half heartedness.

THE BRAZEN SERPENT.

The Brazen Serpent was placed in the midst of Israel after they had been bitten by the fiery serpents sent among them on account of their sin. That sin was one of peculiar heinousness. They had found its occasion in one of their chief and most distinctive blessings—the gift of the manna, that heavenly food. Yet they preferred the flesh-pots of Egypt (for nature loves nature's food) and they murmured saying, "Our soul abhorreth this light bread." It was a sin which none, except those privileged as Israel were, could have committed: a sin therefore so aggravated by its circumstances that it was visited by a pecular judgment. Fiery serpents were sent: their bite was certain death. Human power could interpose no protection, nor provide any remedy.

But God in His mercy pitied them, and proposed to them a remedy. It was provided for them in an object altegether external to themselves. The healing power placed in the Serpent of Brass in no way emanated from—in no way depended on, those to whom it was proposed. The Brazen Serpent had its efficacy in itself. God had placed it there; and it was an efficacy

so potent, so certain in its operation, that all who were reached by it were healed, and that effectually. Death departed and life came.

But who were reached by it? All who were not too proud, or too indifferent, or too mistrustful to look to it. In order that all might look to it. it was raised on high, in the very midst of, and in close proximity to, those who were perishing. It was concealed in no secret sanctuary: it was hidden by no veil. No messenger was needed to seek and bring it from afar. It was not in the height, that they should inquire after it there; nor in the depth that they should seek it there; but it was nigh them, present before the r eyes. And lest there should be any one ignorant of its healing virtue, or any one who should question whether that virtue was designed, individually, for him, Moses was sent as the authorised interpreter of God's will, respecting this. Moses as sent from God, authoritativedy declared that fulness of healing power was there: and he invited—nay commanded all the bitten to look. He did not limit the invitation. He did not restrict it to those who felt acutely the pain of the bite, and deny it to others who felt it dess. He did not prescribe what should be the nearness of the look, of its steadiness or its clearness. He made no such distinctions either as to the character of the look, or as to the degree of apprehended pain; but he commanded all who were Their title to look, therefore, was bitten to look. found in the fact of their misery—in the fact that they were bitten and were perishing. How important to observe this: for this is a point on which many souls are, not infrequently, greatly exercised. "We believe, say they, "that all fulness of salvation is in Christ, and in Him alone. That we doubt not. But our question is, whether we have a title to look. If we found in ourselves any evidence of good—if we felt the burden of our sins more—if we appreciated more deeply our sinfulness and better estimated the preciousness of Christ—if our motives in seeking Christ were pure or less selfish--if, in a word, we could find in ourselves any evidence of our election, then we should feel confidence to look: but, feeling as we do, we cannot. We fear that salvation is not intended for us." Thus although they acknowledge their need of Christ, and own that all salvation is in Christ, they yet stand aloof, looking on themselves as if they were cut off from it. Now, what is the error here? It consists in not seeing that our title to look is found in the fact of our ruin. If our title to look were grounded on the strength or adequacy of our appreciations, we certainly should have no title. The question is not this, but whether the soul knows that its ruin is such that there can be no hope except in God. It was this that the dying Israelites recognized. They knew that the po son was in their veins and there was in themselves no remedy. Therefore when they found that God had visited them and placed before them an object in which healing power was, and had appointed as the means of connection with that healing power, a look; and had sent His servant to bid them all to look, they hesitated not. They did look and they were healed.

I certainly was glad and encouraged to get your good letters and to hear of the news about the good camp meeting and also of how the Lord is so blessing all of you there in the work at the office and also in the meetings and at the jail and also visiting at private houses ministering some blessings to the sick and those May the Lord keep blessing you and in distress. making you a blessing. A letter is almost like having a little season of fellowship and you know that is just like having a good square spiritual meal. I told him if he would truly repent and turn to God and accept salvation through Jesus the one and only Mediator and then teach accordingly that God would bless him. I have seen him once or twice since then, but not to have a conversation with him. A little over a week ago I was out to a village 12 miles away and stayed 3 days and had some little meetings, espenially one in the village under a tree near the bazar and quite a number were there. This same Indian Bro. interpreted for me. The Indians as a rule will listen and say that is all very good but that they will wait and see if we live and do like we teach. Praise the Lord for that. I am so glad that this gospel of Jesus and the salvation derived through its mighty power will bear investigation and it gives no shame for souls to enquire and investigate. but the real worth and value is best demonstrated when we are under test and trial. Oh just to be pliable clay and vessels meet for His use. One priest was reading in a Hindi book and the other was keeping a little fire going and burning ghee (a kind of oil) and sugar and also plates of bananas and cucumbers were cut up to sacrifice and I gathered that it was for the health of this sick woman. I stayed almost an hour thinking that I might have some little opportunity to help them in some way and bring a little light and blessing to them, but as this sacrificing would last quite a long time I had to go on to get to the other village. I would be very glad to be able to speak in their language to impart some light and truth and spiritual blessing. I may take up a more diligent study. God is helping me that I have a few words

Ind by making a few signs and gestures some undertanding is conveyed. Praise the Lord. Bro. Sperber now away at the other large island of this group, Vanua Levu, and perhaps will be gone several months. The Blight Of Sin

Sin does not have an external entity outside of the soul like a grain of sand or a current of electricity, and can be a fact only as a moral condition of some created spirit. We often compare sin to external objects, as roots, seeds, clouds and such like, because of the likeness to these things in its operation, but sin cannot exist outside of the soul. Just as the ocean cannot catch the smallpox or yellow fever, and they exist only in some body of flesh, so sin is a condition of heart and act in some moral agent. We can see from the effects of sin that it is contrary to God's creation, and by the very blight it produces it reveals its curse.

1. The pleasures of sin are very short. The scriptures allow that sin has its pleasures, but stamps them as lasting "only for a season." They may burn bright, but like fire in grass, or a dry wood, it soon burns itself out and leaves only a blackened landscape

On the other hand, holiness has joys or heap of ashes. that continue on, and instead of burning themselves out, they grow stronger with years, and are fresh as the morning in the hour of death, at the very time when every possible pleasure of sin has entirely ceased.

2. The blight of sin is seen in the fact that every pleasure which sin has is only at best fitful and spasmodic. There is nothing continuous in sinful pleasure, and in nature of things all its joys are like flashes of lightning which, in spite of their intensity, blind the senses and vex the desires, and make the darkness still grosser afterward. There is nothing pleasant to look back upon, and it must live on successive flashes of ex-Any true pleasure should not only be pleasing at the time, but remain pleasant in the memory, and this gives it a sort of immortality. The joys that flow from righteousness are not like flashes of lightning followed by painful darkness, but like the steady light of day.

3. Sin blights the affections and mental faculties and burns up the otherwise natural growth of verdure in the soul. All of the natural affections were created for holiness, and they are perverted by sin and turned

into the very opposite vices and passions.

4. Sin reacts upon the soul and makes all the inner fountain peevish and bitter. Sin makes the soul peevish with itself and with everybody else, and out from the heart paints hedious colors over God and the Bible and providence, and creates ugliness where the eye of humble love and holy faith sees nothing but goodness On the other had, holiness just exactly agrees with the inward working of man's moral nature and elevates, strengthens, enlarges and enriches every faculty of heart and mind.

5. The blight of sin manifests itself fearfully in this, that it makes all its eager pursuits to turn into instruments of torment. You connot mention a single thing that sinners pursue after, whether it be fleshly pleasure of wealth or fame or power or rank, in any of their varieties, that does not soon become a scorpion that stings while it draws them on in eager pursuit. The game becomes a torment to the hunter. High rank becomes a fetter, an iron cage, to the proud. becomes a scorching fire to the greedy seeker after it. If you take a wire in your hand with a feeble electric current in it, you will have an agreeable sensation; but if the current is increased to a certain point, it will so take hold of your muscles that you cannot let the wire go, and if the current is increased to a certain degree. it will kill you and even burn up your body. a picture of the pursuits of sin, they soon despotise the soul, and the very object so much sought after becomes a living hell.

Some years ago a certain man managed to pile up over three hundred million dollars, by buying, wrecking, or stealing various railroads, and in middle life he became a wreck in health, and would sit for hours in a splendid hotel, twirling his two thumbs around each other as fast as he could make them fly, as if all the car wheels that he had ever stolen from poor stockholders had been melted and poured into his blood, till he became an insane revolving car wheel. The very pursuits of the sinner first fascinate him, and then seize him, and then enslave him, and then torture him, and then kill him. On the other hand, all the pursuits of holiness give increased freedom, peace, gladness, and scatter their rewards while pursuing them, and retain the best rewards at the end.

6. Sin often brings great misfortune even in this world's welfare and does not have any resource of comfort for those afflictions which are sure to come to all There are enough unavoidable troubles in life in the shape of poverty, toil, sickness, bereavement and ignerance to require all the comfort that grace can give, and we often wonder how people can live without a I ving Christ in their hearts. But sin not only has no comfort for the unavoidable afflictions of life, but it superadds a long list of misfortunes of its own, in hatreds, s. rifes, separations, various bodily ailments and mental maladies, and financial and social and pol ical disruptions and almost invariably sin brings about the loss of love and respect and confidence of others, and the poor sinner goes to his grave unloved and unhonored.

7. Another curse connected with sin in this life is, that it can never be able to carry out all its plans and Sinners build air-castles, and selfish amb tions. make plans to accomplish their desires, either of passion, or pride, or power; but an omnipotent providence overrules in such a way that they can never carry out all their schemes. Every sinner dies a disappointed soul. The devil's promises are counterfeit notes, and when presented for fulfilment they are repudiated. On the other hand, holiness has no schemes except such as are sanctioned by the Judge of the world, and a holy heart wants everything to fail that is not per-

feetly right in the sight of God.

8. The last blight of sin in this life is the awful dread of death which it produces. There is nothing in sin when it comes down to earth but unutterable dark-The papers published it to all the ness and fear. world that Mr. Carnegie had such a horror of death that he could not bear to hear it referred to. This man in some way managed to amass a wealth of over three hundred million dollars in forty years, had not faith in a personal God or a redeeming Savior, and said that Shakespeare was more to him than Jesus Christ, died, and saw nothing beyond death but an awful horror that made him tremble. Oh, s'n, what a fool-maker On the other hand, holiness sees eternal happiness and light beyond death in addition to all the blessings it has conferred on its earthly pilgrimage.
