THE NEW BIRTH

First we want to notice some things that are substituted for the new birth: 1. Confessing Christ, 2. Baptism, 3. Conviction, 4. Good works, 5. Reformation of life, 6. Hitting the sawdust trail, 7. Church

membership. One may do one or all of these and yet not be born again. So many take conviction for salvation, and by so-doing fail to get a real born again experience. Jesus said, "Except a man be born again he cannot see the Kingdom of God." St. John 3:3. When one takes conviction for conversion, he is in a worse condition than before he professed. He then becomes discouraged, and it is harder for him to make another start.

Being born again is a real experience wrought in the heart. It is just as real as when a child is born into one's family. The one is a spiritual birth; the other a literal or natural birth. In either birth, there has to be a begettal. In the spiritual birth one is begotten by the Word of God (James 1:18.) First, the word of God is planted in the heart. The sinner hears the word of God preached; he accepts it as the word of God. It tells him that he must repent of his sins and quit the practice of sin, and be willing to make all wrongs right as far as it is possible for him to do so. Then he must ask the Lord to forgive all the past and by doing this and believing that the Lord does forgive, he is born by the word. (1 Pet. 1:23), which says, "Being born again, not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, by the word of God; which liveth and abideth forever." Then His Spirit bears witness with our spirit that we are a child of God. (Rom. 8:16). By being born of God, we partake of His divine nature (2 Pet. 1:4). Hereby are given unto us exceeding great and precious promises that by these ye might be partakers of the divine nature, having escaped the corruption that is in the world through lust. Then a new life starts. (2 Cor. 5:17). The love for the sinful things of the world is gone (1 John 2:15). The new birth is no human work, but a divine work wrought in the heart by the grace of God, "For by grace ye are saved through faith." Eph. 2:8.

We read in Titus 3:5, "Not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to his mercy he saved us, by the washing of regeneration and renewing of the Holy Ghost. One is born of God (John 1:13), then he is a child of God, born into God's family, heir of God, joint heir with Christ. He then loses his identity with the world (James 4:4: 1 John 2:15-16; John 15:19).

There is no condemnation as long as one walks after the Spirit (Rom. 8:1). One cannot live for Christ and still go on in the old life (Eph. 4:17).

One that has really been born again is risen from the dead state of sin and is now alive in Christ, and his affections are on things above (Col. 3:1, 2).

In the new birth one also has His image (Rom. 8:29), for we are flesh of his flesh and bone of his bone (Eph. 5:30). We would then bear his name (1 John 3:1, 2). Since we are born into the family of God, He, himself, keeps His family record (Psa. 87:5, 6; Eph. 3:14, 15), and puts His Spirit within us (Ezek. 36:26-29). One who is born again has some suffering to go through (2 Tim. 3:12). To be born again, the entire life of the man or woman is changed out of one life into another life (Col. 1: 13, 14).

The one who is born again has access to God, and can let his requests be made known to God (Phil. 4:6, 7). What a blessed privilege to one who has been born again, praise the Lord. Also the one who has been born again has the promise of casting all his cares upon the Lord—"for He careth for you." "Be sober, be vigilant, because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour: Whom resist, stedfast in the faith, knowing that the same afflictions are accomplished in your brethren that are in the world. But the God of all grace, who hath called us unto his eternal glory by Christ Jesus, after that ye have suffered awhile, make you perfect, stablish, strengthen, settle you." 2 Peter 5:7-10. The one who is born again has all the above promises and many more, thanks be unto our God forever and forever.

The one who has been born again has been made alive . Eph. 2:1-3, "And you hath he quickened who were dead in trespasses and sins, wherein in times past ye walked according to the course of this world, according to the prince of the power of the air; the Spirit that now worketh in the children of disobedience; among whom also we all had our conversation in time past: in the lust of the flesh and of the mind and were by nature the children of wrath even as others. But God who is rich in mercy for his great love where with he loved us, even when we were dead in sins, hath quickened us together with Christ. By grace ye are saved." Eph 2:8.

This is what it means to be born again, or to be a child of God.

By the late Commissioner S. L. Brengle "Men ought always to pray and not to faint."
(Luke 18:1)

That little 'ought" is emphatic. It implies obligation high as Heaven and deep as Hell, and is inescapable: Jesus said, "Men ought always to pray," and added, "and not to faint." Men ought to pray. They ought to pray "always," and they ought not to faint or grow faint-hearted and cease praying.

A thousand times that text has encouraged me to pray. I confess I do not always feel like praying. There are times when my feelings are numb, when I do not seem to have access to the Heavenly Father in prayer, when I find it difficult to pray; and, judging by my feelings, there is no one listening to my prayer. And then, these words have stirred me to pray; I ought to pray—I ought always to pray—and I should not grow faint in praying.

Prayer is more than saying words. It's the expression of earnest desire. Sometimes I have felt that my desires were not in earnest, and then I have searched myself and have realized that while emotionally my desires were not earnest, volitionally they were—down in the deeps of my being, deeper probably than my emotions, I desire the things for which I was praying.

I have been helped to pray with this assurance. "Your labor is not in vain in the Lord." Paul tells us in Colossians 4:12, that Epaphras "labored fervently always in prayer for his brethren, that they might stand perfect and complete in all the will of God."

Prayer, then, is a form of work. In my early years I worked, and worked hard, and often went to my work not feeling a bit like working, but I expected results from my work regardless of my feelings. The farmer ploughs his field often when he doesn't feel

like it, but he confidently expects a crop from his labors, and he realizes that he ought to plough his fields. Now, if prayer is a form of work and our labor is not in vain in the Lord, then we ought to pray regardless of our feelings.

If we can pray fervently with warm emotions, all the better; but if we cannot, we should still pray and not grow faint-hearted.

Only recently, when I knelt for morning prayers, I felt a sort of deadness in my soul-no fervor, no access in prayer-and just then the "accuser of the brethren" became very busy; he reminded me of things that had long since been under the Blood and shot fiery darts at me. I could only cry to God for help. Then the blessed Comforter reminded me that the Blood had long since covered my sins and washed me clean from their guilt and pollution, and reminded me that I must not cast away my confidence, that my great High Priest was pleading my case, and that I must come boldly to the throne of Grace. This I did, and the enemy was routed. My emotions were liberated, my spirit was free, and, oh, what a blessed time of communion I had with my Lord and I found prayer easy. If I had fainted instead of fighting the good fight of faith, the battle would have been lost, gloom would have settled upon me like a thick cloud and enshrouded my soul, and I could not have reaped because I had not sown; I could not have received wages because I had not labored fervently in prayer.

William Bramwell, a minister of the Gospel, whose ministry was mightily used in the saving and sanctifying of souls and who was mighty in prayer, said that he never went to secret prayer without reluctance, with feet that dragged, with a spirit that drooped, but as he labored in prayer his spirit revived and he found it oftentimes difficult to cease praying and his feet became like hind's feet. Let us pray!



We are thinking of doing some of this ourselves as the Lord wills for we are anxious to get the gospel of Christ to all we can in hope that some may be saved. We must work while it is day for the night will come when no man can work. What we do must be done while we are in this body and each of us should be, "All out and out for the Lord" and against Satan, the enemy of all righteousness.

Satan would not allow you to do anything much in the way of getting the truth to souls if you did not resist him and show confidence and faith in God. Jesus said that Satan was a murderer from the begining and abode not in the truth because there is no truth in him. When he speaketh a lie, he speaketh of his own for he is a liar and the father of it. This is a sorry recommendation and there could be no statement that is nearer the truth, therefore, who would want to serve the devil? and yet we see nearly all people bearing the fruits of Satan in one form or another. Preachers will even teach that all sin more or less and according to their statement then all are servants of the devil for Jesus says, "Whosoever committeh sin is the servant of sin," and in 1 John 3:8, we read, "He that committeth sin is of the devil." Satan's servants commit sin and the servants of the Lord do not commit sin. God does not tell his servants by what they profess but by what they are. If they are his, he abides in them and preserves them and keeps them from all sin; those that are not his are the servants of Satan and they will sin. Whomsoever the Son makes free is free from all sin. Paul says, "I pray God your whole spirit and soul and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of the Lord Jesus Christ;" and he goes on to say, "Faithful is he that calleth you, who also will do it." 1 Thess. 5:23, 24.

If a man's spirit, soul and body is preserved blameless, how much of him would there be left to sin? God says he is faithful to do this for us.

According to the scripture, preachers and others

who deny that God makes us free from sin and preserves us free from sin are antichrists. In 1 John 4:1 we read that many false prophets are gone out into the world. If many false prophets were in the world at that time and they have been multiplying ever since, just think of the multitude that there is in the world at the present time.

In John 4:3 we read, "And every spirit that confesseth not that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh. (present tense) is not of God. In other words, if the spirit of Christ has not come into your fleshly body and is dwelling there now, you are not of God no matter what you profess and "this is that spirit of antichrist." In 2 John and the seventh verse we read, "For many deceivers are entered into the world who confess not that Jesus is come in the flesh. This is a deceiver and an antichrist." Jesus Christ is just as much come in the fleshly body now as when he walked the shores of Galilee with his disciples. Everyone that is truly saved and retains the spirit of Christ is a member of his body which is the Church and this church or body is housed in fleshly bodies which make up the body, the Church, and that body, to function properly must be together. Paul says, "In whom ye also are builded together for an habitation of God through the Spirit." Eph. 2:22.

God through Christ has reconciled us together and has made in himself of twain, one new man, so making peace. Eph. 2:15. Paul also says in the 30th verse of the fifth chapter of Eph., "For we are members of his body, of his flesh and of his bones." Those who have their body presented to him as a living sacrifice, in whom the Lord is living, ruling and governing have become a part of the fleshly body of Christ which is come (present tense) in the world or in the flesh. In 1 Cor. 12:27, Paul says, "Now ye are the body of Christ, and members in particular." Each member being gifted to function properly in the body, the Church as it has pleased Him. In speaking of our literal bodies, Paul says, "For as the body is one, and hath many members, and all the members of that one body, being many are one body (he adds) so also is Christ. It takes all the members functioning together to make up the natural body so it can perform its work and duties perfectly and it also takes all the members of Christ's Body, which is the Church, united and working together to perform all the works and to manifest the greatness of God as Christ did, for those who possess the spirit of Christ are his body. Paul says, "But now are they many members, yet one body." 1 Cor. 12:20.

Reader, do you really believe that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh? If you really do believe this you will loosen yourself from all earthly things, and yielding yourself fully into the hands of God you will be "Endeavoring to keep the unity of the spirit in the bond of peace." Eph. 4:3. You will become humble enough to fit into your place in the body and there labor to the edifying of the whole body. By so doing you will prove that you do believe that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh; otherwise you will be

classed by the sacred scriptures as antichrist. Read 1 John 4:2,3 and also 2 John, 7th verse.

Many professors believe that Jesus Christ was in the flesh with the disciples and that he was crucified but that belief is only in the past tense and does not prove them to be Christ's at all. Many other will say Christ has come in them, in their fleshly bodies, but that does not make them his for many spirits get into people in these last days and play God to them. When the 120 received the Holy Ghost on the day of Pentecost they were the "Kingdom of God come with power." Mark 9:1 and Matt. 16:28. Practical Truth: Christ expects us to give him our whole-hearted allegiance as Lord and King.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

To acclaim means to demonstrate hearty approval of something by outbursts of joy. Read this prophecy which was written B. C. 487: "Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Jerusalem: behold, thy King cometh unto thee: he is just, and having salvation; lowly, and riding upon an ass, and upon a colt the fcal of an ass." God's Word must be fulfilled, and if man will not yield himse'f to God so He can use him to fulfill the good part then He will use him to fulfill that which he probably would not choose to fulfill. The upper classes and rulers of the Jews as a whole rejected Jesus. Those who did believe on him were afraid to confess him before others for fear they would lose their standing with men. These had long looked for the promised Messiah, and no doubt thought they would be given places of honor in his kingdom. But their hearts were not right with God. They loved the praise of men more than the praise of God, therefore were not subject to the will of God, and God could not use them to fulfill the good part of the prophecies; so He used them to fulfill the prophecies which describe the rejection and slaying of Jesus, while fishermen, tax collecters and such like were chosen to fill places of honor in the kingdom because they were humble and willing to be used as clay in the Potter's hands.

Judging from the threats to destroy Jesus, which came from Jerusalem, anyone (besides Jesus) might have doubted that he could find enough people in Jerusalem to praise him and laud him as King, but Satan can control only that which God permits him to.

It was God's will for these people to wave palm branches before Jesus as he entered the city; but we do not read where Jesus commanded this to become a custom for the church to follow as some seem to think today. Palm branches are symbols of victory. It is a

hypocritical action to carry palm branches to symbolize victory when in reality the King who alone can bring victory into a heart is denied entrance.. Repent, confess, and forsake your sins, let Jesus make a triumphal entry into your heart—triumphing over sin— and every day will be a day of acclaim, and palms of victory will be in your heart, which will truly honor your King.

By rejecting Jesus, the Jews sealed their own doom. It is said that Titus did not intend to destroy Jerusalem, but was driven to it because of the obstinency of the Jews. Whatever the second causes may have been, we know that he did it because Jesus said that their enemies would cast a trench around them, keep them in on every side and "lay thee even with the ground."

The hearts of people today are being hardened against God because he is permitting such a terrible war. This is the wrong attitude to take and they can never receive help from him until they repent of it. God is punishing the nations for rejecting His Son, and the more the people persist in being stubborn and rebellious, the greater the punishment will be. Humble yourselves, therefore, under the mighty hand of God.

Practical Truth: Christ's supreme authority did not end when he left this earth. He now exercises his authority through the church, his spiritual body.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

In spite of the growing opposition and hatred of his enemies, Jesus continued to do the works of Him that sent him. Surely he knew that in driving out the traders and money changers from the temple he would encite the anger of the rulers and chief priests even more, because it would cast reflection on them because they had failed to do their duty in keeping the temple clean and it would seem that he had more authority over the house of God than they. Of course, we know he did have, but they would not recognize his authority and did not want it displayed before the people, by whom they expected to be honored and respected. Yes, he knew what he was doing; but he had not been sent to this world of sin to make friends with it, but to reprove it and call it to repentance of its evil ways. He could not compromise with the devii along any line.

In this, as well as in other things—such as being loving and merciful—he set us an example. We must not tolerate sin in the temple of God (our bodies are now the temples of God) in any degree even though we must love the sinner. Ministers and those whom he has sent to declare his gospel to a lost and dying world, must not compromise with sin, even though when they exercise their authority against it they are signing their death warrant, as it were, or causing ties to be severed between themselves and those they hold most dear here on earth.

Notice how God used the children to accomplish his purpose. It is doubtful if these children even knew the meaning of what they said. If He could use children to praise him, would it not be proper and right for those whom he has redeemed from sin to praise Him? Surely they have something to praise Him for. Yet it is a lamentable fact that multitudes who claim him as their redeemer would be horrified at the sound of praise in their solem assemblies; but these same people can go to a ball game and almost lose control of their senses and shout until they are hoarse. Is that spirit not closely related to the spirit that caused the priests and scribes to be sore displeased in this lesson?

Much could be said about the "hypocrite fig tree," which made a good appearance with its leaves but produced no fruit, but we believe Jesus' main object in cursing it was to show his disciples the power of faith. Man is so prone to let material realities about them stop their progress in the work of the Lord. In exercising his authority over the fig tree, Jesus verified a former statement—"With God all things are possible."

Practical Truth: Christ was opposed, and his followers may expect some opposition too.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

To understand more fully all that took place on this day of conflict, read Matt. 21:23 to 23: 39. The conflict which gave this lesson its title began when the chief priests and elders demanded to know where Jesus received his authority to cleanse the temple (driving out the money changers) and teach the people as he had done the day before. They were greatly angered because of His teachings, because they knew that He had meant them when he told of the wicked husbandmen, and the slighted invitation. Their questions were for the purpose of entraping him, but again they had failed; then Jesus asked them a question which they were unable to answer, because of their lack of conception of a divine Messiah. No ancestor would speak of a human descendant as "lord," for that term applied to one greater than they, which they would not consider a son. But Jesus was divine, and "in spirit" it was right for David to call him lord though he were a son according to the flesh.

We recently had a lesson about "false teachers or prophets," and the latter part of this lesson only adds to it. Discuss some of the things which Jesus condemned in this lesson which would apply today. He mentioned the practice of binding rules on others which they would not keep themselves. How about the preacher who wants his flock to "do as I say and not as I do"? Did you ever see a religious leader—preacher or teacher—who was more concerned about making a good impression on the people—by their choice of words personal appearance, or delivery—than they were about promoting God's cause among men? What did Jesus say that would condemn

this practice? The scribes and pharisees wore garments to attract attention to themselves in order to be esteemed as great and wise. Would Jesus' criticism of the practice condemn robes for preachers, priests, and choirs, and costly or attractive array? What did he say about titles of honor? Does this not include titles that we hear so often today: "Rev.," "D. D.," etc.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

The subject of the last observance of the Passover Supper and the instituting of the Lord's Supper and Feet Washing is a familiar subject to most of us, so we believe it is unnecessary to comment on it here. This same lesson was studied last year, and if you have the 1941 Faith and Victory papers these comments can be found in the March issue. It is important that we know why Jesus instituted the new ordinances, but comments upon the subject are not as valuable as the observance of it in the proper way. So let us observe it in the spirit of Him who instituted it.

The path of humility was the only one traveled by Jesus while here on earth, and those who are going another way are not following in his steps who did no sin neither was guile found in his mouth. Striving for preeminence is a characteristic of the Gentile (unregenerated heart) and not of one who is crucified with Christ; and it will only result in denial of help and blessings from God. There are examples in the Bible of people who could have been great but were humbled and rejected of God because they became great in their own sight. Can you name some?

The second temptation which came to Jesus in the wilderness was Satan's offer of all the kingdoms of the world. Think what would have happened if he had yielded. Many who have once been part of the Church of God have suffered hunger and various kinds of hardships rather than to yield to Satan's offer of food; but, alas! have yielded to the second temptation, the kingdoms of the world—worldly honor.

Christ urged his disciples to seek a life of service and not one of greatness. They had been faithful to follow him during his life of fleshly privations and temptations of various kinds when others rejected him. He expressed his gratitude for their fidelity and promised a reward-partaking of the heavenly feast in the kingdom ("the kingdom of God is not meat and drink, but righteousness, peace, and joy in the Holy Ghost."), sitting on thrones (positions or places of authority), jud-ing the tribes of Israel. It was their privilege to speak and write the Word of God (New Testament) which is a savor of life unto life or of death unto death—preliminary judgment.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

Perhaps Jesus could have selected a new place for prayer that night—one unknown to Judas, and his enemies could not have found him; but he had not come to this world to hide from Satan, but to overcome him. God had power to deliver his Son out of Satan's hands, but it was his plan that his Son should suffer for the sins of the world that whosoever believeth on him should not perish, and now the hour had come for the fulfillment of that for which he had come into the world, so why run from it? He had trained his followers, openly rebuked Satan and destroyed much of his work, fulfilled types and prophecies, and now the only part of his mission to earth that remained was endurance. It was the hour of his enemies and the power of darkness, and Satan's wrath poured out upon him. Neither could he have the consolation in this hour of suffering that others have had-the presence of Jesus in the trial. He had to go through it alone. He was taking the place of sinners, or bearing their punishment for them, and their punishment was separation from God. So it was that during the time when he was being crucified that God could not look upon him, who had been made sin for us. None other can cry as he did, "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" If we can say "MY God," we have the promise that he will never leave us nor forsake us. We shall study Jesus' sufferings in the next lesson but these things are mentioned here to show why his soul was exceedingly sorrowful unto death. God in mercy hides our future sufferings from us, but Jesus knew before they came what his sufferings would be.

We never think of Judas in connection with anything that is good; but always as a thief or a traitor. Truly, it had been better for him had he never been born, and his unhappy ending should serve as a red-light signal to all who would follow in his steps today. Satan and his agents are still offering their price to anyone who will sell or betray Jesus. Sometimes His servants sell Him for less than thirty pieces of silver. They sell Him for a little worldly pleasure, worldly honor, work, money, unwillingness to forgive others, to get revenge on another, etc. Regardless of the price, the offence is the same in the case of present-day Judases as it was in this Judas. Jesus is worth more than any price the devil can pay for him.

The chief accusation brought against Jesus was that he claimed to be a king. He did not deny that he was, but said his kingdom was not of this world. If it had been he would not have been treated as he was. The Jews were waiting for a worldly king to come and break the Roman yoke and would have helped him do it, but because he refused this honor and chose the humility of refusing to be of this world, and reproved their unfruitful works of darkness, the world hated him.

Gen. 12:1. Now the Lord had said unto Abram, Get thee out of thy country, and from thy kindred, and from thy father's house, unto a land that I will shew thee:

- 2. And I will make of thee a great nation, and I will bless thee, and make thy name great; and thou shalt be a blessing:
- 3. And I will bless them that bless thee, and curse him that curseth thee; and in thee shall all families of the earth be blessed.
- 4. So Abram departed, as the Lord had spoken unto him; and Lot went with him: and Abram was seventy and five years old when he departed out of Haran.
- 5. And Abram took Sarai his wife, and Lot his brother's son, and all their substance that they had gathered, and the souls that they had gotten in Haran; and they went forth to go into the land of Canaan; and into the land of Canaan they came.

Golden Text: "Fear not Abram: I am thy shield and thy exceeding great reward." Gen. 15:1.

Practical Truth: True faith in God, such as led Abraham to a strange land, will help to make one's religious experience vital, and will lead to spiritual conquests.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION -

The design of scripture is not to give us a record of the great and noble deeds of the patriarchs and others, and the rise and fall of earthly kingdoms; but it is to show us how God has dealt with the human race to accomplish His purpose.

Our last Sunday's lesson took place just after the flood which had destroyed those who had forgotten God and given free vent to their fleshly lusts. In it God promised not to destroy all flesh again with a flood. But sin was still in the heart of man leading him along the downward road, and they soon forgot God again.

The call of Abram was a spiritual revival. God chose him to be the ancestor of the children of faith, and the founder of the Jewish nation which He used to illustrate His providence and grace.

Obedience to God's call meant that Abram must sever connections with all that he held dear in this world and move out on the promises of God. According to outward appearances, no temporal reward could come from such a course, but Abram believed God, who had promised to make of him a great nation, and confer great blessings upon him. In this short space we cannot explain all that we understand that this promise implied; but briefly, it meant that all the nations of the world would be blessed by the coming Messiah, who would be Abraham's posterity. Even unsaved people can realize some of the blessings which the nations of the world enjoy because of the coming of Christ, but only the saved can realize how much his coming meant in giving "whosoever will" freedom from the bondage of sin. Do you wonder how this could have been a blessing to Abram? The rewards of his faith consisted partly in his receiving the fulfillment of the promises in which he believed, though some of the promises could be fulfilled only after his death. It is written, "It is more blessed to give than receive." To Abram was given the great privilege of conferring this great blessing upon others. A true child cf God receives his greatest comfort and happiness from the knowledge that he is being used of God for the upbuilding of the kingdom of God and the good of precious souls.

His name was changed from Abram, which means a high father, to Abraham, which means the father of a multitude.

The country to which he was called is typical of the spiritual country which God's children possess today. Abram had two calls. In obedience to the first, he with his father and other relatives left Ur, the country of idol worshippers and moved as far as Haran which was a move toward Canaan, but his father died and evidently his relatives were content to settle there, so God called Abram to move on to the land of Canaan. People today must leave sin, the country of idol worshippers, then they are justified; but they must make another move, leave all behind and go to the land of Canaan, then they are sanctified. Obedience to God involves hardship and sacrifice, but rewards received from Him more than compensate for these. As Paul said, "The sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory which shall be revealed in us."

Practical Truth: Prayer in behalf of others is unselfish praying and has an influence upon God.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

The incidents in today's lesson took place about three hundred years after last Sunday's. Many things had happened, but Abraham loved God and according to Rom. 8:28, "All things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose"; so all things had worked together for good to Abraham. In all his trials his generosity, courage and faithfulness to God were revealed.

The Lord temporarily appeared to Abraham in human form to tell him that He was about to destroy the wicked cities, Sodom and Gomorrah. Abraham had lived for God taithfully and now God would not hide from him the thing which he intended to do. "The secret of the Lord is with them that fear him." For the sake of the righteous and the honest-hearted, God bears with the nations until they become so corrupt that He can stand it no longer. History reveals to us the fact that the fall of great nations has been brought about by their own corruptions. The wickedness of Sodom and Gomorrah had grown so great that it had become proverbial. "Because the cry of Sodom and Gomorrah is great, and because their sin is very grievous" they are represented as crying to God for vengeance.

Abraham drew near to God and offered the intercessory prayer recorded in this lesson. Can we not learn a good lesson from this? Even though we live for God and serve Him, there are times when we must draw near to Him. For what purpose could we more profitably draw near to Him than to ask Him to have mercy and spare the righteous in the present crisis when the people of the world are being destroyed because of wickedness? Read again the words of the Golden Text and come more frequently to the throne of grace, for prayer alone can save America. The sins of America are loudly calling to Heaven for punishment, and it will certainly be sorely punished unless there are enough Abrahams to intercede.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

Seven chapters of Genesis are between last Sunday's lesson and today's. Some important events are recorded in these chapters, and probably the most important is the birth of Isaac, the son that God had promised to Abraham

The Bible does not give as much space to record the deeds of Isaac as it does the other Patriarchs, but enough is given to show God's dealings with him, and to show that his promises to Abraham were slowly (as man would count slowness) but surely being fulfilled.

God blessed Isaac and caused him to prosper in a material way. But prosperity had its dark side even as it does today. It made him a mark of envy. The l'hilstines envied him and carried their envy into action by filling the wells that he had inherited from his father with earth, which was contrary to the covenant they had made with Abraham. But Isaac was patient and peaceful in the midst of these persecutions. When persecuted in one place, he would move to another, and the Lord stayed with him.

It takes more courage to practice peace than it does to fight back and try to get even when persecuted. But strife is costly and Isaac took the sensible and godly course. In olden days when a feud would start, oftentimes whole tribes were wiped out by those who tried to get even. But Isaac's method of dealing with his enemies finally won them. They were at last tired of their mischief and asked for a treaty.

Let us as children of God, learn a lesson from this. When one serves the Lord, he will be persecuted by the enemy's servants in many different ways. Jesus warned his disciples over and over again to expect persecutions, so we should not be surprised when they come. But

we do need to live close to the Lord and read his word to find out how to deal with those who persecute us. Jesus told us to be as wise as serpents and harmless as doves, and when we are persecuted in one city to flee to another. He gives us the privilege of fleeing to avoid trouble, but never to fight back. He will tight our battles for us if we hold our peace. When we have been tried sufficiently, our enemies will become weary of persecuting and, like the Philistines, when they see God is with us, they will realize we are stronger than they and desire a treaty with us that we will not harm them.

Read again the story of the three Hebrew children who were thrown into the fiery furnace in Daniel 3rd chapter.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

In our lesson today we find Jacob on his journey where his foreparents lived. Because Jacob had deceived Esau concerning his birthright, fear came upon him and his mother thought he might be put to death by his brother so his mother made arrangements with his father that Jacob should go back to his own people to choose a wife. This seemed to Isaac a good idea so he immediately bade Jacob to depart on his journey.

Jacob took no camel to ride nor servants to accompany him so he must have become weary and lonesome. In this condition we find him in our lesson. Night evertook him and with a stone for a pillow, yet he was in plain view of God's eye. Truly God's eye runs to and fro throughout the whole earth. Also he never sleeps nor slumbers.

The vision—Without vision God's people perish. A vision of Jesus, his love, compassion and tender mercies surely will help and inspire us to press on.

Think of Stephen's vision, also Paul's and many others of the disciples.

While it is good to know of the vision of these men and receive courage from them, yet the real question is: How is our vision? have our spiritual eyes become dim?

John stid, "Behold the Lamb of God." Thank God, with the eye of faith we NOW behold him in all his glory and power. We see a king seated at the right hand of God making intercession for us. Our high priest can be touched by the feeling of our infirmities.

One of these days the cord which holds us here will be loosed and we will soar away to meet our Saviour and

these visions will turn into realities.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

Jacob had in this lesson come to the crisis in his life. He had just escaped from the persecutions of his rather-in-law and now was soon to meet with the one rom whem he had stolen his father's blessing and bought his birthright. To all appearances he would be a fiercer enemy and much harder to deal with than his father-in-law had been, for he sought his life. But he feared God and the angel of the Lord encamped round about him. Human strength amounts to nothing when the Lord sends his forces against it. At the time when he most needed it God allowed him to see the forces that were on his side. "The angels of God met him," to give assurance of God's protection and guidance, for he was soon to need it. Often God sends a special blessing to his chi dren when a great trial is just ahead.

When informed that his brother was coming to meet him with a large force, two forces met within the heart of Jacob: fear of man and trust in God. These two cannot long dwell in the same heart, for one will give way to or overcome the other.

Jacob did all he knew to do in his desperate situation, then, left alone with God sought the needed help from Him. He appealed to him as the covenant God and Father, he pleaded God's gracious promise to himself that he would deal well with him, and confessed his own unworthiness and God's goodness. To remind God of his promises is one of the privileges of prayer. Can you think of other Bible characters who did this?

The wrestling with the angel that night was primarily spiritual, but it also involved a physical struggle. God could have crushed his physical body, but he only touched his thigh and crippled him to give proof of his power and to show that he did not prevail because he would n t as long as Jacob held on to him. It is God's way to allow mankind to prevail with Him until they have gained the victory. Jacob prevailed and secured the decircd blessing. On his death bed he said, "The angel which redeemed me from all evil, bless the lads," so not only did he obtain the premise of help from God to prevail with man (his brother), but old things passed away and all things became new in his life. Jacob the "supplanter" became Israel, "He who striveth with God."

Have you ever prayed until you prayed through?
