"Is there word from the Lord for the year '44? Prophet, do tell us, thy help we implore. Events of this year have frightened us much," Says a sin-cursed world held in war's deadly clutch. "What may we expect of the coming new year? Will it bring happy days, or only there fear? Our very best rulers can give us no clue—What hope for the future? May we ask you? Endued by God's Spirit, you oft search His word, Is there a message for us from the Lord?"

"There is," comes the answer—all in one accord—From prophet, apostle, and saints of the Lord:
"The Lord in His mercy sends now unto you,
A valuable word for Gentile and Jew,
'Twill comfort the mourners, relieve the oppressed,
Give rest to the weary, hope to depressed—
Yea; all shall have blessings, prosperity, too,
If you will but heed God's message to you.
Since you have rejected the Saviour He sent,
His Word this New Year to you is: 'Repent.'"

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Recovery of Sight by the Blind

(This article is a sermon in condensed form, vritten by Saint Augustine, who lived 354-430 A. D.). Our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ is the physician of our eternal health. He performs miracles on hese bodies which are not meant to last, to bring us o faith. By means of those temporal things which ire seen He builds up faith in those things which are 10t seen. He disdains not to exhibit lesser cures that It might work greater ones. For as the soul is betian the body, so is the saving health of the soul than the health of the body. The blind body its eyes by a miracle of the Lord, but greater miracle when the blinded heart openeth its yes to the word of the Lord. As the mortal corpse vas raised to life, so the soul doth rise again which ay dead in a living body. As the deaf ears of the ody were opened by His touch, many ears of the

heart which were closed fly open at the penetrating word of God, so that they believe who did not believe, and they live well who did live evilly, and they obey who did not obey; and we say, "such a man is become a believer," and we wonder when we hear of them whom once we had known as hardened. Why, then, dost thou marvel at one who now believes, who is living innocently, and serving God, but because thou dost behold him seeing, whom thou hadst known to be blind; dost behold him living whom thou hast known to be dead; dost behold him hearing whom thou hadst known to be deaf? For consider that there are those who are dead in another than the ordinary sense, of whom the Lord spoke to a certain man who delayed to follow the Lord, because he wished to bury his father; "Let the dead," said He, "bury their dead." Surely these dead buriers are not dead in body; for if this were so, they could not bury dead bodies. Yet doth He call them dead; where but in the soul within? For as we may often see in a household, itself sound and well, the master of the same house lying dead; so in a sound body do many carry a dead soul within; and these the apostle arouses thus, "Awake, thou that sleepest, and arise from the dead, and Christ shall give thee light." It is the same who giveth sight to the blind that awakeneth the dead. For it is with His voice that the cry is made by the apostle to the dead. "Awake thou that sleepest." And the blind will be enlightened with light, when he shall have risen again. And how many deaf men did the Lord see before His eyes, when He said, "He that hath ears to hear let him hear." For who was standing before Him without his bodily ears? What other ears, then, did He seek for, but those of the inner man?

Again, what eyes did He look for when He spake to those who saw indeed, but who saw only with the eyes of the flesh? For when Philip said to Him, "Lord, show us the Father and it sufficeth us": he understood, indeed, that if the Father were shown him, it might well suffice him; when He that was equal to the Father had sufficed not? And why did He not suffice? Because He was not seen. And why was He not seen? Because the eye whereby He might be seen was not yet whole. For this, namely, that the Lord was seen in the flesh with the outward eyes, not only the disciples who honored Him saw, but

also the Jews who crucified Him. He, then, who wished to be seen in another way, sought for other eyes. Lest Philip should think that he was to conceive of God under the same form in which he then saw the Lord Jesus Christ in the body, he asked, "Believest thou not that I am in the Father, and the Father in me?" He had already said, "He who hath seen me hath seen the Father also." With the natural eyes through which he was looking he could not see either the Father or the Son. So Jesus took in hand to cure, and with the medicine and salve of faith to strengthen the eyes of his mind. Let not him, then, who can not yet see what the Lord will one day show him, seek first to see what he is to believe; but let him first believe that the eye by which he is to see may be healed. "Walk by faith," that thou mayest attain to sight. Sight will not gladden him in his home whom faith consoleth not by the way.

Our whole business, then, brethren, in this life is to heal this eye of the heart whereby God may be To this end is preached the Word of God; to this end are the moral exhortations of the Church, those, that is, that relate to the corrections of manners, to the amendment of carnal lusts, to the renouncing of the world, not in word only, but in a change of life: to this end is directed the whole aim of the Divine and Holy Scriptures, that that inner man may be purged of that which hinders us from the sight of God. For as the eye which is formed to see this temporal light, if anything be thrown or falls into it, whereby it is disordered, is shut out from this light; and tho it encompasses the eye with its presence, yet the eye turns itself away from, and is absent from it; and tho its disordered condition is not only rendered absent from the light which is present, but the light to see which it was formed is even painful to it, so the eye of the heart too, when it is disordered and wounded, turns away from the light of righteousness, and dares not and can not contemplate it.

And what is it that disorders the eye of the heart? Evil desire, covetousness, injustice, worldly concupiscence; these disorder, close, blind the eye of the heart. And yet when the eye of the body is out of order, one will do all in his power without delay to get it healed or cleansed. Even if the smallest straw fall into these eyes which see the light of the sun, all haste is made to remove it immediately. God, who made the sun is much brighter than the sun. Would He give thee wherewithal to see the sun which He made, and not give thee wherewithal to see Him who made thee, when He made thee after His own image? The light with which the eye of the mind is concerned is eternal wisdom. He hath given thee this also; both hath He given thee. But much thou dost love these outward eyes, and despisest much that interior eye; it thou dost carry about bruised and wounded. Yea, it would be a punishment to thine eye before it is cured and healed if thy Maker should wish to manifest Himself unto thee. For so Adam in Paradise sinned, and hid himself from the face of God. long as he had the sound heart of a pure conscience,

he rejoiced at the presence of God; when that eye was wounded by sin, he began to dread the divine light and fled back into the darkness, and the thick covert of trees, flying from the truth, and anxious for the shade.

Therefore, my brethren, since we too are born of him, and as the apostle says, "In Adam all die"; if he were loath to obey the physician that he might not be sick, let us obey Him now, that we may be delivered from the sickness. The Physician gave man precepts when he was whole that he might not need a "They that are whole," He saith, "need physician. not a physician, but they that are sick." When whole, we despised these precepts, and by experience have felt how to our own destruction we despised His precepts. Now we are sick, we are in distress, we are on the bed of weakness; yet let us not despair. For because we could not come to the Physician, He hath youchsafed to come Himself to us. The despised by man when he was whole, He did not despise him when he was stricken. To us He would say, "Assuredly thou hast by experience felt that I spoke the truth when I said, Touch not this. Be healed then now, at length, and recover the life thou hast lost. Lo, I am bearing thine infirmity; drink then the bitter cup. For thou hast of thine own self made those my so sweet precepts, which were given to thee when whole, so toilsome. They were despised, and so thy distress began; cured thou canst not be, except thou drink the bitter cup, the cup of temptations, wherein this life abounds, the cup of tribulation, anguish, and suffering. Drink then," He says, "drink, that thou mayest live." And that the sick man may not make answer, "I can not, I can not bear it, I will not drink"; the Physician, all whole tho He be, drinketh first, that the sick man may not hesitate to drink. For what bitterness is there in his cup which He hath not drunk? He was despised, ridiculed, bound, and scourged, and crucified. In suffering these human things the Lord instructs us by his bodily patience that we may believe and be made whole.

Jesus had wrought many miracles. His fame as a body physician had spread abroad, and the two blind men who sat by the wayside begging desired that their eyes should be made whole, so they cried to Jesus for mercy as He passed by and would not be silenced by the crowd who tried to keep them back. Even so, the eyes of the heart are closed. Jesus, the great Physician of the soul passeth by that we might cry out. Who is he that crieth out to Christ, that his inward blindness may be driven away by Christ as He is passing by? Whoso despiseth the world crieth out unto Christ. Beware, lest we cry aloud with our voices, and in our lives be dumb. Whoso despiseth the pleasures of the world, crieth out unto Christ. Whoso saith, not with his tongue but with his life, the world is crucified unto me, and I unto the world, crieth out unto Christ. Let him that hears, and is not deaf to the sound, sell that ye have, and give to the poor: provide yourselves bags which wax not old, a treasure in the heavens that faileth not; let him as he hears the sound as it were of Christ's foot-steps passing by cry out in response to

this in his blindness; that is, let him do these things. Let his voice be in his actions. Let him begin to despise the world, to distribute to the poor his goods, to esteem as nothing worth what other men love, let him disregard injuries, not seek to be avenged, let him give his cheek to the smiter, let him pray for his enemies; if any one who have taken away his goods, let him not ask for them again; if he have taken anything from any man, let him restore fourfold.

When he shall begin to do all this, all his kinsmen, relations, and friends will be in commotion. They who love the world will oppose him. What madness this! You are too extreme! What! Are not other men Christians? This is folly, this is madness. And other such like things do the multitude cry out to prevent the blind from crying out. The multitude rebuked the blind men as they cried out; but did not overcome their cries. Let them who wish to be healed understand what they have to do. Let them cry out, and not faint; let them not be led away as if by the authority of numbers; let them not imitate those who claim to have become Christians before them, who live evil lives themselves, and are jealous of the good deeds of others. Let them not say, "Let us live as these so many live," Why not rather as the Gospel ordains? Why dost thou wish to live according to the remonstrances of the multitude who would hinder thee, and not after the steps of the Lord who passeth by? They will mock, and abuse, and call thee back; do thou cry out till thou reach the ears of Jesus. Those who love the light which Christ is about to restore to them more than they fear the uproar of those who are hindering them; they shall on no account be separated from Him, and Jesus will stand still, and make them whole.

Musical Instruments

There was a house of God that Solomon built (2 Chron. 3:1), then there is the house of God since that one that Jesus built on the Rock (Matt. 16:18). The first was natural: the last is spiritual. Solomon built of natural stones (1 Kings 7.10), but Jesus built His of lively spiritual stones (1 Peter 2:5), the first being a shadow of the one Jesus built. "The glory of this latter house shall be greater than of the former, saith the Lord of hosts" Haggai 2:3-9.

In the first house were literal musical instruments which David set in the house of God (2 Chron. 29:25-28; 1 Chron 23:5). In the house that Jesus built, the Lord sets the members in the body (house) (1 Cor. 12:18), which are instruments of righteousness unto God (Rom. 6:13). The natural instruments were holy instruments (Num. 31:6), and the instruments (members) of the later house are holy. "Follow peace with all men and holiness, without which no man shall see the Lord." Heb. 12:14.

no man shall see the Lord." Heb. 12:14.

The first house had ALL manner (kinds) of instruments—harps, psalteries, timbrels, cornets, and cymbals (2 Sam. 6:5). All of these instruments. though they were different makes, were in such har-

mony and tune that when they began to sing and play them it all went up as ONE sound until the house was filled with the glory of God-because there was no discord. (2 Chron. 5:13, 14). Jesus has placed all different kinds of instruments in his house. In Acts 17:26, we read, "And hath made of one blood ALL nations." For the promise is unto you, and to your children, and to all that are afar off, even as many as the Lord our God shall call." Acts 2:39. And they continued daily with ONE accord (Acts 2:46). As all kinds of instruments in the first house were in such harmony and tune that their sounds went up as one sound, so are all the instruments (members) in the house which Jesus built so in tune that their voices go up as one, their songs as one, and their prayers as one. "Now I beseech you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye all speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you; but that ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind, and in the same judgment." 1 Cor. 1:10. They see eye to eye (Isa. 52:8).

In the later house the Father is not worshiped with literal instruments, but the "hour cometh and now is when the true worshipers shall worship the Father in Spirit and in truth. For the Father seeketh such to worship Him. God is a Spirit and they that worship Him must worship Him in Spirit and in truth." John 4:23, 24. The hour was not come for true worshipers when David was setting literal instruments in God's house, for Jesus said, "The hour The instruments (members) that Jesus cometh." sets in make melody in their hearts to the Lord (Eph. 5:19). "Neither is worshipped with men's hands as though He needed any thing, seeing He giveth to all life and breath and all things" Acts 17:25. Just as the spiritual, lively stones take their places in the later house instead of the natural stones that Solomon placed in, so we become the instruments of the New Testament church instead of the literal instruments.

Concerning musical instruments used in worship, Bradis says, "There is danger in it."

Wesley says, "Good not heard." Clark says, "Not spiritual."

Amos 6:1-5 says, "Woe to them that are at ease in Zion [church of God] that chant to the sound of the vial and invent to themselves instruments of musick like David."

Some say it is the life of worship, but Jesus says, "I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly." John 10:10. He says, "I hate, I despise your feast days and I will not smell in your solemn assemblies [religious places]. Take thou away from me the noise of thy songs, for I will not hear the melody of thy vials." Amos 5:21-23. He wants the melodies that come from the heart. "Soeaking to yourselves in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord." Eph. 5:19. "I will sing with the spirit, and I will sing with understanding also." 1 Cor. 14:15. There is music in my soul.

They Killed The Preacher

In Matthew the fourteenth chapter we read about the death of John the Baptist, a preacher who uncovered sin and did not compromise with man or devils. He stood firmly for the truth. He had no fine church building with fine pipe organ and no fine car or carriage. He had to endure many hardships.

John uncovered the sin of adultery which was being committed by King Herod and his brother Philip's wife. Her carnal anger arose to defend her guilty conscience, so at a drunken party she seized an opportunity to put an end to the preacher who had thus exposed her sin. You Can Choose for Yourself

Let us draw a picture of an active Christian and one of a passive Christian and see which fits us and which we would rather be.

Our passive Christian remembers to hold his tongue that no irreverent or ungodly words pass his lips. This is good. Our active Christian remembers to speak with deliberate forethought and premeditation toward gloritying God. This is better. A passive Christian stands fast and resists evil. This is good. An active Christian allows the love of God to be a real and impelling force in his life toward good. This is better. The passive Christian's thoughts rise at random and his words are often without objective or inspiration. The active Christian's thoughts and words are motivated by his love for God, and inspired by God's love for him. 'The passive Christian says, "It the Lord ever shows me something to do, I'll do it." This is a good attitude, but the active Christian seeks to know the will of God and seeks to till his place in the body. "Wherefore, be ye not unwise but understanding what the will of the Lord is."

Often times the passive Christian spends much of his life laboring for that which satisfieth not. He may be resigned to his way of living and seek not to change it. Too often he has much time for leisure and repose. The genuinely active Christian is animated by an enthusiastic and aggressive ardor for the work of God. He bestirs himself zealously; is instant in season and out. There is no inertia here; no folding of the hands to sleep.

Can you vision the results if all passive, inactive Christians should suddenly become animated ones? "Enlarge the place of thy tent and let them stretch forth the curtains of thine habitations: spare not, lengthen thy cords, and strengthen thy stakes; For thou shalt break forth on the right hand and on the left." Isaiah 54:2, 3.

We often find that passive Christians are subject to personal hurt feelings—are easily wounded by someone's tactlessness. To the active Christian unintentional words or personal slights do not wound. There is a deeper hurt that they are subject to. Any deviation from God's word, any slackness or care-lessness among God's children, any falling below the standard; these things really hurt him. We say falling below the standard because God's standard cannot be lowered. We hear folks talk about the standard being lowered or dragged in the dust. This is an impossibility. One can lower himself or drag himself in the dust, but God's standard remains unchanged. A standard is a measure. "Till we all come in the unity of the faith and the knowledge of the Son of God unto a perfect man. Unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ." Eph. 4:13. The fulness of Christ himself, in us is the only thing that will bring us up to the standard of God.

Which are you and which would you rather be, a passive Christian or an active one? Do you think it very likely that the passive one will be a victorious Christian very long? I fear that for some time past I have been a passive Christian, but by God's

help and grace, I mean to be an active one from this moment on. How about you?

"All things that are reproved are made manifest by the light, for whatsoever doth make manifest is light, wherefore He saith; awake thou that sleepest and arise from the dead, and Christ shall give thee light." "See then that ye walk circumspectly, not as fools, but as wise, redeeming the time because the days are evil." "Wherefore, be ye not unwise, but understanding what the will of the Lord is." Eph. 5:13-17.

One day at the California campmeeting a dear sister asked me if I had yet found my place in the body of Christ; if I knew what my duties were. I replied that I knew what I should like to do. She said, "Ah, but it isn't what we most like to do but the thing that God blesses us most in doing. That is the thing He wants us to do."

There is something for all of us to do, our specialty that God is wanting us to do; a little place to fill that only we can fill. Don't make the mistake of thinking it vain or conceited to say, "God has a work for me to do and I mean to do it by his help and grace." Rather would it show more conceit to consider that we are an exception and have no work to do while others must labor for the Lord. I hope and trust that when I see that sister again, I may be able to say, "Yes, God has shown me my place and I am happy in doing the things He would have me do." And by His grace I mean to find that place and that work. What a great day and what a looking up there will be when every little child of God finds his place and fills it. It is important too, to keep ourselves in a condition for that work of whatever nature it might be and in the place where we can perform it.

There is a story about a young Finnish girl who was coming to America to find work. A married couple, in seeking to employ her asked if she could cook. No, she couldn't cook. Could she sew? No, she replied that she had never tried to sew. Could she care for children? No, she had never learned to take care of children. "What can you do?" asked the couple in exasperation. "Why, I can milk reindeer," cheerfully responded the girl.

Let us not be like the Finnish girl. But rather let us be found in the place where our service can be used.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

We are starting a study of the Perfect One, the ian Jesus Christ, as Mark describes Him to us. Let us o so with hearts to follow in his steps and walk even s He walked, for the Word of God tells us that He ft us an example. The Bible tells us to "Mark the rfect man, and behold the upright." In other words, nsider, observe, give attention to the perfect man. Too

many are looking at others around them and observing their imperfections, measuring themselves by themselves, and this is not wise.

Jesus had no need of Baptism as a figure to testify to the world that he was dead to sin (as we do) but he was baptized to leave us an example. In spite of the many confusing doctrines which are being taught these days concerning modes of baptism, when a person is truly born again that Christ life in his soul will put a desire in Him to be baptized like Jesus was. Do not smother this desire in your soul if you want the assurance from the Father that you are His child and He is well pleased with you.

The first Adam had met Satan and failed in time of temptation, plunging the world into sin; the second Adam (Christ) must meet the same foe and overcome him that many might be made righteous through Him. Christ fought the battle and gained the victory with the very weapons which He gives to His followers (Eph. 6: 11-18). The Christian need not expect to go through life on "flowery beds of ease." Instead, he must press, watch, pray, and fight the enemy. Failure to fight by the grace of God has caused the majority of nominal Christians to yield to the third temptation which came to Christ-an easier way than God's way, one more suitable to the carnal mind, worldliness, gaining the kingdoms of the world for self. The knowledge that angels are waiting to minister to us should help banish fear of foes. Angels are "ministering spirits, sent forth to minister for them who shall be heirs of salvation."

Notice what it was that Jesus preached—the kingdom of God which He had come to set up then, not in the far distant future for a thousand years.

Fishing was an honorable, honest occupation, but Christ had a higher calling for these men-winning souls. Child of God, do you realize that winning souls is a higher calling than the job by means of which you gain your livelihood? At which occupation do you spend the most time, and to which one do you give the most thought?

Christ could speak with authority because he had received it from the Father and was backed up by all heaven. The ministers that He has called and sent into the world to preach the gospel under the anointing of the Holy Spirit have the same backing and can speak with the same authority.

Practical Truth: Some active service for Christ should be a part of the program of every Christian.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

Some people seem to think they are active Christians if they go to services on Sunday and live to please self the remainder of the week. Such lives are not fashioned after the true pattern, as we shall see after studying this lesson.

Sabbath morning found him in the synagogue about his Father's business. Then he went to the home of Peter, where he healed Peter's wife's mother who was sick of a fever. It was a busy day for him but when evening came his work was still not done. News of his power had spread rapidly and the people of the town were anxious for His help. An earthly physician would have felt that his day's work was done when evening came, but the great Physician who had come to take "our infirmities and bare our sicknesses" regarded the needs of the peo-ple above his own need for physical rest.

He did not allow the great work which he did crowd out his prayer life, but the early morning found him at the place of prayer. If Jesus needed to pray, how much more do we weak creatures of the dust need to pray! Some say they do not have time to pray. If you have a busier every-day life than Jesus had, you are entirely too busy. If you would take inventory it is very likely that you will find you waste more time than it would take to pray enough grace into your soul to keep you with a victorious experience of salvation. While Jesus was praying the crowds began to seek him again. Why do you think Peter was able to find him when others could not? I hope you know the secret of where to find Jesus early in the mornings by personal experience.

Why did not Jesus not stay in Capernaum where there was so much to do?

In this record of Jesus healing the leper, let us notice three things: the compassion, the touch, the word. When we remember that His Word tells us that He is the same today, his dealings with this poor miserable outcast should encourage us in times of sickness or distress of any kind.

Notice how readily evil spirits recognized Jesus. Is it not a shame that His human creatures do not recognize him more readily? Why is this? Do you not think it is because the enemy is fearful of losing a subject and does all he can to keep one blinded? Satan who has the souls of men in bondage unto him lies to them and makes them think he is their friend and that any attempt on the part of Jesus or His servants to rid them of him is considered an invasion of their rights. They feel like they are being robbed of some of their veluables. The next time you resent any portion of the truth which has been spoken by one of God's servants, or you try to evade the truth which was spoken by finding fault with the speaker, you should make an investigation to discover what spirit Was it the spirit of the Lord or caused you to resent it. the spirit of the devil?

Practical Truth: We should do right whatever the cost may be.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

In the beginning of this lesson we find the disciples out in the peaceful, open country, happy and free to do the right in the very presence of their precious Lord. They were hungry and, though living under the law, knew they were justified in plucking the grain, removing the chaff and eating as they went along. The law was divinely instituted and nothing of such origin inflicts suffering; so, being hungry, no need to withhold from that which someone had planted, another perhaps watered, but God had given the increase.

We have no record of Jesus being hungry and partaking of this food. Pharisees were near by watching with critical eyes. No doubt, the heart of Jesus was burdened because of their sinful condition and their unwillingness to humbly learn needful lessons. Jesus asked them to remember how David had done that which was contrary to custom and made an effort to have them see all in better light, but they were self-exalted and such a spirit can never rejoice when Christ has His rightful place being exalted, as we read here, "Lord also of the Sabbath."

Next, we find Jesus in the synagogue, still being watched with critical eyes. A poor soul was present which needed help. Jesus, knowing the hardness of the hearts of the Pharisees, appealed to their judgment to decide what was the right thing to do in this particular case. He asked, "Is it lawful to do good on the Sabbath days, or to do evil?" Since they could not answer without making plain the unreasonableness of their position. they would not speak. We find Jesus acting the same as always, doing the good, helpful and right toward those in need, in spite of being hated and abused for it. The poor soul in need had his eyes upon Jesus and obeyed and stretched forth His hand at the Saviour's command and received the blessing of healing. Had he at that particular moment decided he would not offend the Pharisees and refused to obey Christ, he would have missed the blessing.

We must obey Christ's commands to us when right in the presence of those who take offence, or we miss the rich blessings of our Lord, and then fail to be a blessing to others.

Let us guard against a critical, fault-finding spirit such as the Pharisees had. Satan will impose it upon us if he can. It is the spirit which exalts self manifesting, "I excell; you are a failure. I am advanced; you are in the rear." etc., with all the meekness and humbleness of Christ lacking. There is a criticism that is constructive—it discourages no one; it crushes no one; it is uplifting and according to the correction and reproof we get from Christ and is blessed to receive. May the Lord help us all to strive together so that we may hope in the gospel.

Practical Truth: The kingdom of God should grow, both in our heart and in the world at large.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

We think of a parable as a short story true to life, told to teach a spiritual lesson. Jesus gave his reason for speaking in parables in Mark 4:10-13. Those who are honest at heart do have spiritual ears. A parable tests men's honesty. It is like a sweet kernel in a nut shell. Some desire the good enough to break open the shell, but others are too lazy to bother with it and still others sense that they might get hurt while breaking open the shell so cast the whole thing aside.

In Palestine grain fields were unenclosed. Camels and people made beaten paths through them from villiage to villiage. When the farmer sowed his seed it would not sink below the surface on these beaten paths so fowls could easily come and pick it up. It was not natural for the soil to be so hard, but it was made that way by heavy feet which trampled many times over it.

Some people can sit under the sound of the gospel year after year without showing any signs that the word has entered their hearts. Such a condition is not natural but they have allowed the heavy feet of carelessness, procrastination, pride, love of the world, etc. to daily cross the threshold of their hearts until they have become hardened and no gospel seed can sink in and grow.

As growing plants in shallow soil cannot stand the

test of a scorching sun, even so those who have only shallow consecrations cannot stand the trials of life.

Did you ever see corn planted in a new field from which the stumps of trees and briars had not been removed? What was the result? What lesson does this teach concerning the need of sanctification to remove the old stump and roots of sin before one can have a prosperous experience of salvation? Did you ever see a young convert trying to hold to Christ and the world at the same time? What was the result?

We should be very thankful for those in past ages who stood true in times of hard tests, thus enabling us to have the gospel in this present day. Would you rather be numbered with them or with those who became weary in well-doing? With which shall you be numbered if you continue with your present experience? If your spiritual progress is being hindered and you find yourself becoming weaker instead of stronger, something is in your heart besides good soil. Dig it out!

There is a mystery concerning the process of natural growth of plants. But the seed is planted and the combination of proper soil, moisture, temperature, and sunshine causes it to grow. The warring elements do not stop the earth from bringing forth fruit. Thus it is with the gospel seed planted in the heart, and thus it has been with the kingdom of God or Church of God against which the gates of hell has not or cannot prevail. Christ planted the seed. The winds of hell have blown only to scatter the seed. Strong persecution has raged only to strengthen those who are the planting of the Lord. The kingdom has spread to all parts of the earth in spite of Satan's attempts to stop it.

- 42. And straightway the damsel arose, and walked; for she was of the age of twelve years. And they were astonished with a great astonishment.
- 43. And he charged them straitly that no man should know it: and commanded that something should be given her to eat.

Golden Text: "Why are ye so fearful? how is it that ye have no faith?" Mark 4:40.

Practical Truth: The Son of God, who had power to help others of old, has power to help us still.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

In our printed portion is a record of two great miracles which show Jesus' power over the forces of nature and death. Already we have studied lessons which told of His power over demons and disease. Let us keep these things in our minds and hearts that our faith may be increased in times of distress or need. When the Lord challenges, "Behold, I am the Lord, the God of all flesh: is there anything too hard for me?" (Jer. 32:27), may we be able to answer from the depths of our hearts, "Ah, Lord God! behold, thou hast made the heaven and the earth by thy great power and stretched out arm, and there is nothing too hard for thee." (Jer. 32:17).

Should God's children be afraid of storms? Why? Read verse 40 before answering. Are you calm enough when facing danger to prove to your sinner friends that there is a difference between those who serve God and those who do not? Read the account of Paul in a storm on sea in Acts 27. Paul was able to be calmer than the disciples in today's lesson because he had the Lord abiding in Him and the disciples only had Him with them. This should teach us the value of sanctification to enable us to go through the storms of life, when waters of adversity are dashing high, with calmness in our souls and undaunted faith in the Lord to care for us in every time of need. It is good to have Jesus near us when we need Him, but it is better to have the Comforter abiding in our hearts. This is the will of God, even our sanctification.

The disciples expected Jesus to help them in some way or they wouldn't have awakened Him. Perhaps they just wanted comforting words from Him to show that He cared, but He did for them far more than they expected as showed by their great amazement. This verifies the promise that He is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think. The next time you are facing a great storm on the sea of life we hope your faith will be so encouraged that you will not only expect the Lord to speak comforting words to you, but that you will expect Him to clear the storm away. Remember, the

winds and storms, devils, disease and death obey Him
