Temptation

"Blessed is the man that endureth temptation: for when he is tried, he shall receive the crown of life, which the Lord has promised to them that love him." Jas. 1:12.

According to the foregoing Scripture, we learn that temptation is something to be endured—not so much to be enjoyed, but something to resist, or stand against and oppose. To be tempted is to be allured, or enticed to do wrong. In the prayer that Jesus taught his disciples was a request that we well remember, which said, "And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil." No doubt you have heard the song many times which says, "Yield not to

temptation, for yielding is sin. Each victory will help you, some other to win." It is not a sin for one to be tempted, but it is a trial or test, and sometimes the test is severe, or hard, but the Bible tells us to "endure hardness as a good soldier of Jesus Christ." James tells us in the beginning of his letter, "My brethren, count it all joy when ye fall into divers temptations; knowing this, that the trial of your faith worketh patience, but let patience have her perfect work, that ye may be perfect and entire, wanting nothing." By close observation we find that the joy is not in the temptation, but in the *knowing* what the temptation will work out for those who endure. Paul tells us that "no chastening for the present seemeth to be joyous, but grievous: nevertheless, afterward it yieldeth the peaceable fruit of righteousness unto them which are exercised thereby" Heb. 12:11.

While it is the purpose of the temptation to try one's faith and stability, yet "Let no man say when he is tempted, I am tempted of God: for God cannot be tempted with evil, neither tempteth he any man: but every man is tempted, when he is drawn away of his own lust, and enticed. Then lust, when it hath conceived, bringeth forth sin: and sin, when it is finished bringeth forth death." James 1:13-15. "The soul that sinneth, it shall die." It is not a sin to be tempted, for Christ was tempted of the devil, but overcame him, because he would not yield to any of his suggestions nor stoop to accept any of his offers. Where the sin comes in, is when one yields to the thing. Resist the devil and he will flee. We are also exhorted in the Word of God to "flee also youthful lusts that war against the soul." "Keep thy heart with all diligence, for out of it are the issues of life." I can not conceive the idea that it is God's plan for one to voluntarily expose himself to temptation, or to just saunter carelessly around and be ensnared by the wiles of the devil, but to watch and pray, and gird up the loins of his mind and have the sword of the Spirit ready to fight the enemy. 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Is It So With Me?

Paul writes in Galatians 1:15 as follows: "But when it pleased God, who separated me from my mother's womb, and called me by his grace, to reveal his Son in me, that I might preach him among the heathen; Immediately I conferred not with flesh and blood." I wonder if we get the full meaning of this text? Through the great love and mercy, power and pleasure of God we all have our being in this world. Then all who are saved are called by his grace. "By

grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God." "With his own will begat he us by the word of truth."

Dear saints, all this is given us for a purpose: to reveal his Son in us. Jesus says to his followers, "Ye are the light of the world"; but they can only be so as the life of God's Son is revealed in them. Oh, that all who profess to love and serve him would really show forth His life each day!

Again in 2 Cor. 4:10 Paul said, "Always bearing about in the body the dying of the Lord Jesus, [Why?] that the life also of Jesus might be made manifest in our body." Too many people are not bearing in their bodies the dying of Jesus, therefore his life is not manifest in their bodies or lives.

What was his life? When he was reviled, he reviled not again; he was meek and lowly; when he was persecuted, he threatened not; he made himself of no reputation; he sought no honor from men. There is not space to mention many things, but all can study his life. His followers are instructed to walk in his steps. Now, does our life conform to his holy life? If not, we need to begin to die. Too many people have not been crucified with him, therefore are not reigning with him. Too many have feelings easily hurt, they are easy to become offended, the least little thing hurts them, they feel slighted, etc. In such cases, surely what they need is to die to self and all earthly things. Then, and then only, can the life of Christ be revealed in them.

"For we which live are always delivered unto death for Jesus sake, that the life also of Jesus might be made manifest in our mortal flesh" 2 Cor. 4:11. Again, in Gal. 2:20, we read where Paul says, "I am crucified with Christ: nevertheless I live, yet not I, but Christ liveth in me, And the life which I now live in the flesh I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me."

Our Savior laid down his life a ransom, having suffered all things for us, went all the way to Calvary, and finished our redemption by his death. We have a perfect record of his life of sacrifice and suffering, and unless we are crucified with him, we can never reign with him in this world or the world to come, neither can God manifest his Son in us. If all who profess to be saints of light and a part of the holy remnant will be bearing about his dying in their bodies daily, then his holy, meek, humble life will shine through his body, the church, and people will see Jesus. Also, all friction among congregations will disappear and holy love and unity will be manifested, even as the Father and Son are one. Often some people who profess to be dead with him and living his life in their vessels will say, "Brother or Sister so and so did things that almost caused me to backslide." Perhaps it was some trifling material thing not worth even remembering. It is sad but true. Many need to be crucified with him, and unless they are they shall never be able to reign with him or meet him in peace when the final accounting comes. Editorials

The editors and office force at Faith Pub. House are entering into the labors of the new year with faith and confidence in God that much more good will be done in this year than in any year gone by. Confidence with joy is filling our souls as we look to God for the needed wisdom and grace for the days, weeks, and months which will fill up this new year. We expect to reach more souls with the gospel by the printed page than in any previous year as God supplies grace, wisdom, and means.

The Lord has made us feel clear in selling one of the old Intertype machines, and has directed us in purchasing a new Linotype machine to take its place. This new machine will be shipped to us as soon as the manufacturers can get the orders filled which are ahead of us. We let the old Intertype go while the prices for them are good. We have also put in an order for a “Little Giant” 12 by 18 automatic printing press, for tract printing purposes. This press will turn tracts off at the rate of three thousand sheets per hour. Sometimes we have from four to six tracts to the sheet. This will mean speedy printing of gospel tracts. These machines are quite expensive, but we know that our God whom we serve is able to do all things; and I do not know of anything that the world needs more than the gospel message.

These little “Silent Preachers” go everywhere and find needy souls. They tell the gospel story without fear or favor, and souls are saved as God by His Spirit works with them.

Just recently we had a letter from a young woman in Alabama who said that she found a tract on the street, and as she read it, she was convicted of her sins. She wrote to us wanting more tracts, and asked us to pray that God would save her soul. And she wanted prayer and tracts for her brother in the hospital. He is an ex-soldier, and unsaved. Perhaps one little tract which has been thrown away by some careless, unconcerned person can start a great work for God. Saints should keep very busy sowing the gospel seeds by tracts, papers, and other means. We are printing the gospel tracts for you to use for the Lord. They are free for the asking.

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Sometimes we hear the expression, “sinning Christians.” There is no such thing as a sinning Christian. A Christian is one that is Christ-like, and He did no sin. He says in His Word, “Whosoever is born of God doth not commit sin; for his seed [Word of God] remaineth in him; and he cannot sin because he is born of God.” 1 John 3:9. The next verse tells us that in this (sinning and not sinning) the children of God are manifested and the children of the devil. The children of God do not sin, but the children of the devil do sin. It does not matter how much one professes to belong to Christ, if he is committing sin, he is not His; but according to the Word, he belongs to the devil. In the eighth verse it is written, “He that committeth sin is of the devil. For

this purpose [What purpose? Because men sinned and were of the devil.] the Son of God was manifested, that he might destroy the works of the devil." Jesus Christ, if believed on from the heart, will destroy the works of Satan out of your heart and give you power to keep from committing sin. Then you will be a child of God. You will have been delivered from the kingdom of darkness and translated into the kingdom of his dear Son. (Col. 1:13). "In whom we have redemption through his blood, even the forgiveness of sins."

We also hear professed Christians say, "I am a sinner, saved by grace." That statement is not true, and is misleading; for if one is saved by the grace of God, he is no longer a sinner. If you confess Christ and are still a sinner, you are still of the devil, according to the Word of God. One could truthfully say, "I was a sinner, but now I am saved by the grace of God," if he is really saved; but, "I am a sinner, saved by the grace of God," is a sentence invented by Satan to confuse souls and keep them in bondage to Satan and his infernal hosts. Dear one, if you are saved by the grace of God; you are no longer a sinner. If you are a sinner, you are not saved at all, no matter how much you profess. You are just deceiving your own soul and are a servant of sin.

This is what Paul said (Rom. 6:1, 2), "Shall we continue in sin, that grace may abound? God forbid. [God forbids you to sin.] How shall we that are dead to sin, live any longer therein." If you claim to be Christ's, God forbids you to sin. Verse 12, "Let not sin therefore reign in your mortal body, that ye should obey it in the lusts thereof."

No, dear reader, one that sins is not saved at all, no matter how much that one professes. A professor who commits sin is on the broad way to destruction just the same as one that makes no profession. Such ones will weep, wail, and gnash teeth in that Judgment day, because they had themselves deceived and were thinking they would be passed into the glory world. The sinner that makes no profession is not expecting any heavenly abode, so will take his place with the damned and sinning professors.

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We have been reading a book which was sent to us from San Francisco, Calif., concerning the Seventh Day Advent sect. Those poor people are certainly in great darkness and wrest the Scriptures from their proper meaning to bind their law doctrines upon innocent souls. They make a great hobby of binding the Jewish Sabbath on believers in Christ. If they could just believe the simple truths of the Bible, it would remove all that yoke. Then they would know that Jesus living in the soul fulfills the literal day and gives a continual sabbath of rest in the soul. He has not destroyed the law, but has fulfilled it by bringing a continual keeping of it into the soul. No one keeps the sabbath more perfectly than the man or woman that lives free from sin, having continual soul rest.

The keeping of the literal law was a yoke of bondage, and man had no power to keep it, as Stephen told the law keepers in his day, "Who have received the law by the disposition of angels, and have not

kept it." Acts 7:53. Also in the eleventh chapter of Second Corinthians, we find that Paul had many reproofs and rebukes for the law teachers who were among the flock at Corinth, teaching their soul-destroying doctrines.

In Col. 2:16, Paul says, "Let no man therefore judge you in meat, or in drink, or in respect of a holy day, of the new moon, or of the Sabbath Days." The word "days" is in italics, showing that it was supplied by the translators. In other words, Paul was instructing the Colossians not to allow any man to judge them as being in the wrong because they were not keeping the sabbath as a literal day like the Jews did, which, he says in the next verse, is just a shadow then of things to come. He says the body is of Christ. The Body that made the shadow is Christ, and all the law is the shadow of what it pointed forward to, which is Christ. Again, it is written in Rom. 10:4, "For Christ is the end of the law for righteousness to every one that believeth."

In the fourth chapter of Hebrews is quite an extended sermon in which the writer is telling us that the rest in Christ takes the place of the literal Sabbath. After telling us that God did rest the seventh day from all his works, and that some did not enter in to rest because of unbelief, he continues by saying that if Jesus (This should be Joshua. See margin.) had given them rest, then would he not afterward have spoken of another day. Crossing over Jordan into the Canaan land is typical of our sanctified state in Christ which gives us that perfect soul rest, which in Christ fulfills the literal sabbath day. Then in the tenth verse, he refers us to God's resting on the seventh day, and lets us know that when we get in Christ and cease from our own works, we have soul rest, which is the substance of the sabbath shadow. Unbelief will cause men to live in the shadows of the true, and they will fail to understand the meaning of the Scriptures.

It is written that Moses put a veil over his face so the children of Israel could not steadfastly look to the end of that which is abolished. But their minds were blinded, "for until this day remaineth the same veil untaken away in the reading of the Old Testament; which veil is done away in Christ." 2 Cor. 3:13, 14. As these people were then, so are many people today. They are so fleshly minded and filled up with human wisdom that a thick veil is between them and the truth of the Scriptures, and they grope in darkness and bondage. By their cunning craftiness and human reasoning, they bring others under bondage, making them the servants of sin.

Jesus says in Mark 2:27, "The Sabbath was made for man, and not man for the sabbath." These law teachers would make you believe, if possible, that man was made for the sabbath. But Jesus tells us that this is not true, but the sabbath was made for man. It served with the rest of the law which Christ has fulfilled, as a school master to bring us to Christ. In that way, the sabbath was made for man. When we really get in Christ, it has fulfilled its mission for man, and thus the sabbath was made for man, and not man for the sabbath.

Truly enlightened children in Christ esteem every day alike. They do not keep the first day of the week, which is termed, the "Lord's Day," as the sabbath, nor any other day, for they have knowledge and clearly understand that the Jewish literal sabbath has been fulfilled by Christ, and the substance is in their souls. They rejoice in a continual sabbath of rest in the soul. The galling yoke of the law doctrines has come to its fulfillment in Christ, and his yoke becomes easy and his burden light. Blessed be the Lamb of God that taketh away the sin of the world!

The law also says, "Thou shalt not kill and thou shalt not commit adultery. (Deut. 20:13, 14). Christ has fulfilled these laws as well as the others by destroying the hate out of the heart and adulterous thoughts. Under the law one was judged as a murderer if he killed a man; but in Christ, one is a murderer if he even has hate in his heart (1 John 3:15). No man will murder if the hate in his heart is destroyed, so Christ has fulfilled that. No man will commit adultery if the thoughts of adultery are destroyed in his heart.

Under the law they were stoned to death if they committed adultery, but since Christ has come and fulfilled the law, a man has committed adultery if he looks upon a woman to lust after her, and evil thoughts will bring death to the soul. Christ fulfills the law inasmuch that he destroys that adulterous lust in the heart. If men would believe the simple truths of the Scriptures and seek God until the law is fulfilled in them in Christ, their fleshly minds would cease to trouble them by trying to be in favor with God by keeping the shadows of the substance, which is "Christ in us the hope of glory."





is with me and that encourages me much. We need your prayers. Pray for us that the Lord will keep us encouraged and that He will continue to provide for us.


My mother has been ill four years and confined to the bed three years the first of this month.






We ask you to pray for us here. We believe there are a few honest souls yet to be sought out of darkness and sin. Your sister in the work of the Master,

I was glad to receive the tracts, which I expect to use to help someone to understand the truth. Iva Evans





It would be hard to imagine how you would feel for you have never had to experience such, yet many souls have had to experience this very thing.

Then again we find people all over this fair land who have never heard this gospel of full salvation—the glorious truth of being saved from sin—and who have never had the experience. They know nothing about the oneness of God's people, all teaching, preaching, and practicing the same thing. Now can we be true to God and to our own souls and fail to do anything about it? Deception is all around. False teachers and preachers sit back and never raise their voices to expose and condemn things in which they know their own members are indulging. BIBLE STUDY

JESUS THE GIVER OF LIFE

Sunday, February 2, 1947

Printed PortionJohn 4:46-51; 5:2-9; 11:11-13.

John 4:46. So Jesus came again into Cana of Galilee, where he made the water wine. And there was a certain nobleman, whose son was sick at Capernaum.

47. When he heard that Jesus was come out of Judea into Galilee, he went unto him, and besought him that he would come down, and heal his son; for he was at the point of death.

48. Then said Jesus unto him, Except ye see signs and wonders, ye will not believe.

49. The nobleman saith unto him, Sir, come down ere my child die.

50. Jesus saith unto him, Go thy way; thy son liveth. And the man believed the word that Jesus had spoken unto him, and he went his way.

51. And as he was now going down, his servants met him, and told him, saying, Thy son liveth.

John 5:2. Now there is at Jerusalem by the sheep market a pool, which is called in the Hebrew tongue Bethesda, having five porches.

3. In these lay a great multitude of impotent folk of blind, halt, withered, waiting for the moving of the water.

4. For an angel went down at a certain season into the pool, and troubled the water: whosoever then first after the troubling of the water stepped in was made whole of whatsoever disease he had.

5. And a certain man was there, which had an infirmity thirty and eight years.

6. When Jesus saw him lie, and knew that he had been now a long time in that case, he saith unto him, Wilt thou be made whole?

7. The impotent man answered him, Sir, I have no man, when the water is troubled, to put me into the pool but while I am coming, another steppeth down before me.

8. Jesus saith unto him, Rise, take up thy bed, and walk.

9. And immediately the man was made whole, and took up his bed, and walked: and on the same day was the sabbath.

John 11:11. These things said he: and after that he saith unto them, Our friend Lazarus sleepeth; but I go that I may awake him out of sleep.

12. Then said his disciples, Lord, if he sleep, he shall do well.

13. Howbeit Jesus spake of his death: but they thought that he had spoken of taking rest in sleep.

Golden Text: I am the resurrection, and the life: he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live. John 11:25.

Practical Truth: Jesus has power over life and death.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

This lesson, taken from three different parts of the book of John, contains three accounts of healing. Jesus was able to give renewed physical life to the sick and even to the dead. The seriousness of the malady had no weight with him. The devil has the power of disease and Jesus came to this world to destroy the works of the devil, both in the bodies and souls of those who would believe and trust him,

These accounts were not written and preserved up to the present time for us for the purpose of giving us a historical account of the works of Jesus. As John concluded his book under the anointing of the Holy Spirit, he said, "And many other signs truly did Jesus in the presence of his disciples which are not written in this book: But these are written that ye might BELIEVE that Jesus is the Christ the Son of God: and that believing, ye might have life through his name." Jesus is the same yesterday and today and forever. He has the same power to give physical and spiritual life today as he did in Bible days. Most of us are expecting Jesus to raise us up and give us a glorified body at the resurrection, but if we do not have faith enough in Him to believe He is the Son of God with power to heal our bodies and save our souls now, how can we truly have a living faith in regards to the life beyond?

John 4:46-51. It seems so easy for human beings to drift along in sinful security, and the Lord often has to permit severe troubles or afflictions to come upon them before they will seek him. Jesus had already visited Capernaum where this nobleman lived (2:12), but we have no record that this man was drawn to him. But when trouble came to his home he was awakened from his sleep of indifference to seek help from Him. It was his trouble that led him to Jesus—at first only with the thought of finding help for his sick son, but the quest resulted in faith for salvation for him and others.

Some people become discouraged when the Lord does not come to their rescue and heal the first time they call, and they leave the Lord and turn to seek help from the arm of flesh. But the rebuke which Jesus gave this man caused him to become more humble and learn more about faith and supplication. When one will receive the Lord's rebukes and still continue to seek Him, help will come. Jesus' rebuke helped to draw the nobleman's mind from the expectation of seeing Jesus act to perform the miracle to simple faith in His Word, on which all depends. If you have called upon Jesus for healing, and it seems he answers not, perhaps there is a lesson in faith, humility, or supplication for you to learn.

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FEEDING THE FIVE THOUSAND

Sunday, February 9, 1947

Printed PortionJohn 6:25-35, 56-58.

John 6:25. And when they had found him on the other side of the sea, they said unto him, Rabbi, when comest thou hither?

26. Jesus answered them and said, Verily, verily, I say unto you, Ye seek me not because ye saw the miracles, but because ye did eat of the loaves, and were filled.

27. Labor not for the meat which perisheth, but for that meat which endureth unto everlasting life, which the Son of man shall give unto you: for him hath God the Father sealed.

28. Then said they unto him, What shall we do, that we might work the works of God?

29. Jesus answered and said unto them, This is the work of God, that ye believe on him whom he hath sent.

30. They said therefore unto him, What sign showest thou then, that we may see, and believe thee? what dost thou work?

31. Our fathers did eat manna in the desert; as it is written, He gave them bread from heaven to eat.

32. Then Jesus said unto them, Verily, verily, I say unto you, Moses gave you not that bread from heaven; but my Father giveth you the true bread from heaven.

33 For the bread of God is he which cometh down from heaven, and giveth life unto the world.

34 Then said they unto him, Lord, evermore give us this bread.

35 And Jesus said unto them, I am the bread of life: he that cometh to me shall never hunger; and he that believeth on me shall never thirst.

John 6:56 He that eateth my flesh, and drinketh my blood, dwelleth in me, and I in him.

57 As the living Father hath sent me, and I live by the Father; so he that eateth me, even he shall live by me.

58 This is that bread which came down from heaven: not as your fathers did eat manna, and are dead: he that eateth of this bread shall live forever.

Golden Text: I am the bread of life. John 6:48.

Practical Truth: Christ is able to satisfy the spiritual hunger of men.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

Previous to this lesson is the account of Jesus' feeding the five thousand. Those people had had the privilege of beholding one of the greatest miracles performed by the Lord during his earthly ministry—one recorded in all four gospels—but instead of seeing the miracle and rejoicing that the mighty power of God was revealed to them, they were interested in earthly, material things. The material food satisfied them while they were eating and being filled, but on the following morning the same people were thronging him for the purpose of gaining more temporal benefits.

It is a fact to be lamented that the majority of requests for prayer today are for material or physical benefits. The Lord was grieved with that condition then, and desired to turn their endeavors from seeking the vain, temporal, perishable food to that which endureth.

Man should not spend all of his time and energy seeking material things, which give no eternal satisfaction. His Word teaches us to engage in honest toil; but He never intended that man's first and chief concern in life should be earning a livelihood. If his supreme attention is given to things of the earth he will be "of the earth earthy," and will not take time to seek God, who alone is able to fill the needs of our higher nature.

At the beginning of Jesus' ministry Satan tempted him to satisfy his fleshly appetite at the expense of losing the favor of God, but he overcame the temptation with the words, "Man shall not live by bread alone but by every word of God."

In connection with this lesson, read Matt. 6:24-34.

If we seek first the Lord, the Bread of Life, He will make a way for our daily bread to be supplied. David said, "I have been young, and now am old: yet have I not seen the righteous forsaken, nor his seed begging bread." A multitude of others who have put God first in their lives have the same testimony.

We cannot obtain heavenly food by our own labors, for the Lord gives it without money and without price; yet He gives it only to those who prize it above everything else and diligently seek Him for it and believe on Him. The manna, which kept physical life in the Israelites was a gift from God, yet they were not benefitted by it until they put forth efforts to gather and eat it.

The manna which was given to the children of Israel in the wilderness is a type of Christ. It was given to satisfy physical hunger; He was given to satisfy spiritual hunger. The Israelites had to trust God for a fresh supply daily, for it could not be preserved except over

the sabbath. Those whose spiritual lives are sustained by the Bread of Life must feed upon him anew every day. Each one must gather his own supply of manna; even so each soul must gather his own spiritual manna. We often see lazy Christians who depend upon others to do most of their praying, etc. They are always spiritually lean and will die unless they learn to gather and eat the Bread of Life for themselves. A few greedy, selfish Israelites could not gather all the manna and prevent others from having a sufficiency, for it covered the ground and there was plenty for all. Christ is abundantly able to satisfy every hungry soul and no one can prevent others from partaking of him. We hear some say, "Yes, that is just the way I believe it; you can have Christ in YOUR church and we can have Him in OUR church, for He is everywhere and with all churches, and we can all partake of Him." Dear ones, if you are entertaining such thoughts, you are intoxicated with Babylonish wine, with which the Bread of Life will not mix. Every individual who will may partake of Him, but when one partakes of Him, He makes him one with all others who partake of Him. He has only one church.

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JESUS AT THE FEAST OF TABERNACLES

February 16, 1947

Printed PortionJohn 8:12-16, 31-36; 9:1-5.

John 8:12. Then spake Jesus again unto them, saying, I am the light of the world: he that followeth me shall not walk in darkness, but shall have the light of life.

13. The Pharisees therefore said unto him, Thou bearest record of thyself; thy record is not true.

14. Jesus answered and said unto them, Though I bear record of myself, yet my record is true: for I know whence I came, and whither I go; but ye cannot tell whence I come, and whither I go.

15. Ye judge after the flesh; I judge no man.

16. And yet if I judge, my judgment is true: for I am not alone, but I and the Father that sent me.

31. Then said Jesus to those Jews which believed on him, If ye continue in my word, then are ye my disciples indeed;

32. And ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free.

33. They answered him, We be Abraham's seed, and were never in bondage to any man: how sayest thou, Ye shall be made free?

34. Jesus answered them, Verily, verily, I say unto you, Whosoever committeth sin is the servant of sin.

35. And the servant abideth not in the house forever: but the Son abideth ever.

36. If the Son therefore shall make you free, ye shall be free indeed.

John 9:1. And as Jesus passed by, he saw a man which was blind from his birth.

2. And his disciples asked him, saying, Master, who did sin, this man, or his parents, that he was born blind?

3. Jesus answered, Neither hath this man sinned, nor his parents: but that the works of God should be made manifest in him.

4. I must work the works of him that sent me, while it is day: the night cometh, when no man can work.

5. As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world.

Golden Text: I am the light of the world: he that followeth me shall not walk in darkness, but shall have the light of life. John 8:12.

Practical Truth: Jesus is a sufficient spiritual guide for all men.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

In the lesson for Jan. 5th we discussed spiritual light and darkness. This lesson deals more with that subject.

Chapters 7 and 8 of John pertain to Christ's visit to Jerusalem at the time of the Feast of Tabernacles in the fall of the last year of his ministry.

We are told that at this feast one feature was the lighting and displaying of many lights to represent the pillar of fire which nightly guided the Israelites on their journey from Egypt to Canaan. Whether or not Jesus was beholding this display when he spoke we do not know, but we do know that as the pillar of fire lighted their way through the dark wilderness, Christ, the true and only light, disperses darkness in every soul that will admit him. Regardless of how deep a soul is in the darkness of sin and mist of confusion, Christ is able to illumine the way in which he should go and give him grace to walk therein. Notice He said, "he that FOLLOWETH me SHALL NOT walk in darkness." If you are walking in darkness (sin) not knowing yourself, not understanding the meaning of your existence here, and having no definite assurance of a future life, you are NOT following Christ, though you may belong to some church and endeavor to live the very best you can in your own strength. Even as Christ definitely and positively testified, "I am the light," his followers can definitely and positively testify, "I am walking IN the light. Those with Phariseical spirits do not like such testimonies any more than they liked Christ's testimony.

When Adam and Eve yielded to temptation and sinned against God, they willingly entered the servitude of sin. When parents are slaves, the children also are slaves until their master or one of higher authority frees them. Sin is a hard master and never sets one free from its bondage, so in this case it took one of higher authority to bind it and set the captive souls of man free. God gave the law to give a knowledge of sin, but there was no power in it to deliver from its bondage. So the cry of human souls was, "O wretched man that I am! who shall deliver me from the body of this death?" The answer came at length: "I thank God through Jesus Christ." Jesus Christ ends the servitude for those who will believe and obey him and accept his pardoning grace. Slaves have no inheritance with free children, but Jesus came to set the slaves free and make them joint-heirs with himself.

Printed Portion John 10:7-18.

John 10:7. Then said Jesus unto them again, Verily, verily, I say unto you, I am the door of the sheep.

8. All that ever came before me are thieves and robbers: but the sheep did not hear them.

9. I am the door: by me if any man enter in, he shall be saved, and shall go in and out, and find pasture.

10. The thief cometh not, but for to steal, and to kill, and to destroy: I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly.

11. I am the good shepherd: the good shepherd giveth his life for the sheep.

12. But he that is a hireling, and not the shepherd, whose own the sheep are not, seeth the wolf coming, and leaveth the sheep, and fleeth; and the wolf catcheth them, and scattereth the sheep.

13. The hireling fleeth, because he is a hireling, and careth not for the sheep.

14. I am the good shepherd, and know my sheep, and am known of mine.

15. As the Father knoweth me, even so know I the Father: and I lay down my life for the sheep.

16. And other sheep I have, which are not of this fold: them also I must bring, and they shall hear my voice; and there shall be one fold and one shepherd.

17. Therefore doth my Father love me, because I lay down my life, that I might take it again.

18. No man taketh it from me, but I lay it down of myself. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it again. This commandment have I received of my Father.

Golden Text: I am the good shepherd: the good shepherd giveth his life for the sheep. John 10:11.

Practical Truth: Christ is a shepherd in whose care and leadership we may safely trust.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

We find here in the first few verses of our lesson Christ proclaiming himself as the door. We realize we cannot enter into any building without entering at the door unless we be as thieves and robbers. Neither can we be saved unless we enter in through Christ Jesus who is the door of the sheep fold. He said we shall be saved and go in and out and find pasture. Therefore, when we enter in by him, our souls shall be fed and we shall be filled with his righteousness. He warns us against the thief who only comes to steal, kill, and destroy. Therefore, we should be very careful whom we follow, whether it be the good Shepherd who giveth his life for the sheep or whether it be an hireling who careth not for the sheep, but fleeth when wolves and dangers face him. We can know the good Shepherd because he laid down his life for the sheep. He also knows all his sheep who will trust and obey him and are willing to do whatsoever he commands.

In verse 16 He speaks of other sheep which are not of this fold. He was speaking here to the Jews of the Gentiles who had not yet been brought to the fold. But he says he must bring them and they shall hear his voice, and there shall be one fold and one shepherd. When the Jews denied and rejected him, he turned to the Gentiles that you and I might hear his voice and follow him. We see he still is not making any other arrangements for anyone to get in except by Him, because he said, "There shall be one fold, and one shepherd."

In verse 17 we see that his Father loved him because he willingly laid down his life. He did not have to be forced nor driven to lay down his life, but freely and willingly did so that he might bring the other sheep into his fold. It wouldn't have been nearly so wonderful if he had not freely given his life. The same goes for us. If we freely give our life, soul and body, into his hands, we shall be loved of the Father. We shall go in and out and find pasture. But if we are stubborn and refuse to do what he wants us to do, we are in danger of following the hireling and of being scattered abroad. He said, "I lay down my life, that I might take it again." He freely laid down his life that he might redeem us to God, but through his willing service and obedience, he has taken his life again and conquered all the powers of darkness that we might know whom to follow. He says, "No man taketh it from me, but I lay it down of myself." Neither will he force us to lay our lives down but we must do so of our own free will.
