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Where? Why? and What?

Ever since sin came into the world through the disobedience of Adam, it has been necessary to question man, primarily to awaken him to his true condition. Since sin is deceptive in its nature, it has a blinding or deadening effect upon the mind and conscience of those who are engaged therein, to the extent that they do not really know their true state and condition. Blindness has come upon them.

The pointed question that God asked Adam after he had transgressed the divine law, was, "Where art thou?" God knew where Adam was, but called him into question as to his whereabouts. That is a vital question, consisting of only three words and could be presented to every sinner living today. And what would the answer be? Many and varied, no doubt; but they are all in darkness and away from God; and many millions do not realize their sad and deplorable

condition. When God asked Adam, "Where art thou?" Adam answered, "I was afraid . . . and I hid myself." Now the question is, from whom did he hide? There is one thing for sure, he did not hide from God.

You know where you went at such a time; you know why you were there; and you know what you did after going there. God knows, too. You cannot hide one thing from Him. 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Divine Healing

The examples and promises of God for the healing of our bodies are numerous in the Holy Bible. In Exodus 15:26 the Lord makes promises to his children, saying, "For I am the Lord that healeth thee." In Psalm 103:3, we read these words: "Who forgiveth all thine iniquities; who healeth all thy diseases." Isaiah, prophesying of the work of Christ, said, "But he was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace was upon him; and with his stripes we are healed." Here the prophet places the healing of the body right along

with our forgiveness of sins and thereby makes it a part of the atonement.

Turning to Matt. 8:17, we read what is written after Jesus had been doing a lot of healing: "That it might be fulfilled which was spoken by Esaias the prophet, saying, Himself took our infirmities and bare our sicknesses." This is a positive statement that in Christ we have healing for the body as well as the soul.

James, writing to the twelve tribes of Israel, God's children, has this to say to what we should do when afflicted or sick: "Is any sick among you? let him call for the elders of the church; and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord: and the prayer of faith shall save the sick, and the Lord shall raise him up; and if he have committed sins, they shall be forgiven him." James 5:14, 15. He also holds the healing of the body right along with the forgiveness of sins, which his atonement has accomplished for us.

James did not tell us to send for the doctor and let him give medicine while the elders prayed. No, God heals without the doctor's medicine. In all of his mighty healings we have no record that he ever called an earthly doctor, neither did the apostles do such a thing, but God got all the glory for the miracles performed in the healing of bodies. We read in Heb. 13:8, "Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, and today, and forever." O, that men would make Jesus Christ real to them today so he could show himself strong in their behalf and get glory to his name! It is certainly a very weak faith, indeed, in any one who would take medicine and then claim that he was trusting God for his healing as though God needed man's aid in healing the body that he has purchased with his own blood!

In our forty years of serving God and rearing a family of six children, we have never taken any medicine nor given any to our children, and we have seen the Lord heal diseases and stop pain and suffering hundreds of times. It is so blessed and precious to receive healing directly from the Lord, and know that man's medicine had no part nor lot in it.

When God sanctified my soul and baptized me with His Spirit, He also healed an affliction which I had had on my body for fourteen years. I took the strap from around my body and burned it up, and have never used it since, neither have I needed it. The Lord has permitted me to have many diseases upon my body, but he has healed me of them all. Our children were often sick in different manners and ways, and when we called on God He would heal them. I can never, in the least, doubt the healing power of God.

In my ministry of forty years and more, we have seen many wonderful healings. One woman was paralyzed on one side and was in that condition for many months and could not dress herself. Her flesh was so dead that one could put a finger on her and the dent would remain. Before we anointed her with oil, I asked her if she would get up when we finished praying and said amen. She said that she would. So we anointed her with oil, and when we said amen she

threw her feet off the bed, I reached my hand to her, and she rose up and went shouting the victory across the room, back and forth. In a few days we visited her again and she met us out on the porch with victory over the disease.

We were called to Colorado one time to pray for a sick woman who was bedfast. When she was anointed and prayed for, she arose at once and with a loud voice gave praise to God while she went from one room to another. She ate supper with the family and rode in a car about eight miles where she stayed all night at her son's house.

God also healed our daughter Anna Marie when it seemed that her back was broken and she could not live. The pain was so great that she just screamed. I was in meeting several blocks away and they sent me word to come at once. We arrived there as soon as the Lord made us able, and she was screaming with pain. We calmly anointed her with oil, obeying the Word, and the Lord instantly took the pain away and healed her body. She was a young girl at home then.

These are just a few of the hundreds of cases of healing which we have witnessed. Several times the Lord has brought life back to bodies after the pulse had ceased. Bones came together that had been crushed and broken. One time we visited a family where the baby was deathly sick and had been given up by the physicians. The child was anointed, and while prayer was being offered, the Lord healed the baby. One could see the color coming back into its face. The husband got saved and five devils were cast out of the wife by the power of God.

Another brother and I went to visit a man in the insane asylum at Norman, Okla. This man was possessed of a devil. We prayed for him and held on to God for his deliverance and God cast the devil out. The man had a big running sore on his leg, and He healed that at the same time. He was poor and thin and weak. After the devil was gone they let him help around the kitchen until they were satisfied that he was all right, then they let him out to go home to his wife and six children. He came to my home and brought his wife and six children. He was well, and had gained forty pounds in weight. He sat in our room and told us with joy what great things the Lord had done for him. Yes, truly, we have found Jesus Christ to be the same today as he was yesterday when he walked the shores of Galilee and healed all manner of diseases. To those who have a living faith, He is a risen Christ and will be alive forever, and is our all and in all, for he forgiveth all our transgressions and healeth all our diseases. Bless His holy name!

Some of His promises are: "If ye abide in me, and my words abide in you, ye shall ask what ye will, and it shall be done unto you" John 15:7. Malachi, the last prophet, in the last chapter of his book, verse four, says: "But unto you that fear my name shall the Sun of Righteousness arise with healing in his wings; and ye shall go forth and grow up as calves of the stall."

In Mark 11:24, we read, "Therefore I say unto you, what things soever ye desire when ye pray, believe that ye receive them, and ye shall have them."

In Mark 9:23 we read again, "Jesus said unto him, If thou canst believe, all things are possible to them that believe." In John 14:12 we read, "Verily, verily I say unto you, He that believeth on me, the works that I do shall he do also; and greater works than these shall he do; because I go unto the Father."

"And whatsoever we ask, we receive of him, because we keep his commandments, and do those things that are pleasing in His sight." 1 John 3:22.

Yes, dear brothers and sisters, divine healing is for our bodies today just the same as it always has been, and we are exhorted to call upon our High Priest, even Jesus Christ who has passed into the heavens and is touched by the feeling of our infirmities. He tells us to come boldly to the throne of grace that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need. Read Heb. 4:14, on to the end of the chapter. Have faith in God. —Fred Pruitt





"Verily, verily [or truly, truly] I say unto you, except a corn of wheat fall into the ground and die, it abideth alone: but if it die, it bringeth forth much fruit." John 12:24.

Every child of God should understand the rich truths that the Lord has brought to us in this one verse of Scripture. He was soon to be crucified and buried in the ground, and through his death, burial, and resurrection he has brought forth much fruit. Every truly saved child of God owes his life eternal to Christ who died for us and arose again. Listen to what Paul has to say about it: "And if Christ be not raised, your faith is vain; ye are yet in your sins" 1 Cor. 15:17. We know then according to this Scripture that unless Christ is risen and we have his resurrection life in us, that we are none of his. When Christ was alive before he was crucified, those that believed on him as a living Christ were born again and the Spirit of truth was with them, and they were given power to preach the kingdom of God, to heal the sick, and to cast out devils. Since Christ has been crucified, buried, and has risen again, we can go on to perfection, be cleansed and filled with the Spirit so that his resurrected life lives in us.

In order to obtain this new life, we also have to die to our former selfish life and give place to the

new resurrected life of Christ in order to bear the fruits of the Spirit in this life and then be gathered into his glory world at the end.

I often think of our life in Christ and of its beginning and ending as a grain of corn. The gospel seed is planted in our hearts, and when we begin to die to our selfish worldly ambitions by repentance and faith in Christ, a new life begins to spring up like the grain of corn when put into the ground. When it comes in contact with the moisture then the big part of the grain dies and the new life springs up from the kernel or real seed that has life. The tiny and tender blade shoots out of the ground, and as the Lord sends the sunshine and rain, it grows and puts forth a blade and then another blade. After awhile a shoot appears from the stalk in front of a blade, then some more blades and pretty soon the tassel appears and also silk comes out of the top of the shoot. The tassel has pollen on it that falls on the silk and forms grains of corn on the cob, which has also formed in the shoot, and after awhile the corn ripens and is gathered into the granary. This is the way of our life in Christ, if we keep dead and let God have his way we will be as an ear of corn, will be ripened up and the Lord will gather us unto himself to live in his granary of love and fellowship with him forever.

Jesus gave us an example of what it means to be dead to self and selfishness. When he was here, he would not receive the praise of man, neither would he receive the dishonor of men, but simply did always those things that pleased the Father. We should be like Him. Any one today that is easily offended will also receive praise of men, as such is the fruit of their own life and not the fruit of the Spirit. It means much more than some folks think to be dead and their life hid with Christ in God. It takes the power and Spirit of God in the soul to have sufficient grace and strength to really keep dead and let the life of Christ be on exhibition that souls will be drawn unto the Lord and not only to you.

Oh, for more of His grace and power to be dead as a grain of corn in the ground that the new life of Christ be seen and heard, and souls be drawn unto Him! Let us pray more and live low at his feet.

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History of Millennium

The word "millennium" is not in the English Bible, nor yet in the Greek New Testament. It is a Latin term, denoting a thousand years.

We have said that signs announced the coming of Christ near. Upon this point all millennium teachers agree with us. We can show that the Scriptures most emphatically teach that his coming will be the hour of the general resurrection, the day of final and universal judgment, and the burning up of this entire earth. Where then does the millennium come in? We answer that it only occupies a place in the creeds of the dark ages of confusion, and the superstitious notions of men. That is the only realm the Bible leaves for it. History gives us the following introduction of the tradition:

"Cerinthus required his followers to retain part of the Mosaic law, but to regulate their lives by the example of Christ; and taught that after the resurrection, Christ would reign upon earth, with his

faithful disciples, a thousand years, which would be spent in the highest sensual indulgences. This mixture of Judaism and oriental philosophy was calculated to make many converts, and this sect became very numerous. They admitted a part of St. Matthew's gospel, but rejected the rest, and held the epistles of Paul in great abhorrence."—Gregory and Rutter's *Church History*, Page 30.

Cerinthus was one of the worst heretics of the first century, and was rejected by God's church.

History agrees very decidedly as to the source of the notion. We gather a few extracts from "Encyclopedia Britannica. 'Nowhere in the discourse of Jesus is there a hint of a limited duration of the Messianic kingdom. The apostles' epistles are equally free from any trace of chiliasm.'

"It was the universal feeling among primitive Christians that they were living in the last period of the world's history."

If they believed the guide book that Christ and the apostles left them, they could not possibly believe any thing else. They did not therefore believe in another thousand-year age to come.

Where did the idea originate? From the "Apocalypse of Baruch," and other ancient fabulous books of the Jews. Quoting the Revelator in Rev. 20 the article in "Enc. Brit." thus remarks: "More than this, John did not say. But other ancient Christian authors were not so cautious. Accepting the Jewish apocalypse as sacred books of venerable antiquity, they read them eagerly, and transferred their contents bodily into Christianity." "The Jewish expectations are adopted, for example by Papias. He actually confounds expressions of Jesus with verses from the Apocalypse of Baruch."

Eusebius, whose history was the first after the inspired Acts of the Apostles, written in the fourth century, thus says of Papias:

"The same historian also gives other accounts, which he says he adds as received by him from unwritten traditions, likewise certain strange parables of our Lord, and of his doctrine, and some other matters rather too fabulous. In these he says there would be a certain millennium after the resurrection, and that there would be a corporeal reign of Christ on this earth; which things he appears to have imagined, as if they were authorized by the apostolic narrations, not understanding correctly those matters which they propounded mystically in their representations. For he was very limited in his comprehension, as is evident from his discourses." Book 3: chapter 39.

"The idea of a millennium reign proceeded from Judaism, for among the Jews the representation was current, that the Messiah would reign a thousand years on earth." "A sensuous rude fancy formed gross images of this reign; and such products of Jewish imaginations passed over to Christianity."—"Neander's History of Christian Dogmas," Vol. 1, page 248.

"Though millennialism had been suppressed by the early church, it was nevertheless from time to time revived by heretical sects. Millennial notions were

propounded in the prophesies of Joachim."—"Hagenbach's History." Vol. 2:119.

Referring to the millennium, Dr. Schaff, History page 299, says, "The Jewish hope of a Messianic kingdom, which rested on carnal misapprehensions of prophetic figures, was transplanted to the soil of Christianity."

We might bring upon the witness stand many more historical proofs that the idea of a literal millennial reign on earth was without foundation in the word of God, except the literal interpretation of Rev. 20. And that it was really gathered from Jewish fabulous "apocalypse," "unwritten traditions," and "superstitious imaginations."

Historians generally tell us how that Papias was the most zealous advocate of this imaginary reign of Christ on earth, and how he coupled on it many ridiculous notions. "The first distinguished opponent of the doctrine was Origen, who attacked it with great earnestness and ingenuity, and seems, in spite of some opposition, to have thrown it into general discredit; and probably, we shall not have occasion to notice the opinion again until we arrive at the tenth century."—"Waddington's History," Page 56.

We might infer from this that the doctrine disappeared until the tenth century. It was indeed rejected by the body of the church, but in A. D. 255, it found another advocate in the person of Nepos of Egypt, whom Eusebius speaks of as author of a schism. Against him Dionysius of Alexandria wrote, and again the Jewish tradition was refuted.

Now we add the following from "Waddington's History, Page 56: "This obscure doctrine was probably known to very few except the fathers of the church, and is very sparingly mentioned by them during the two first centuries. And there is reason to believe that it scarcely attained much notoriety even among learned Christians until it was made a matter of controversy by Origen, and then rejected by the great majority. In fact we find Origen himself asserting that it was confined to those of the simpler sort."

To sum up the uniform testimony of history, millenniumism was a superstitious tradition of the Jews. Cerinthus, an ungodly heretic was the first to attempt its introduction into Christianity. But he and his false doctrines were utterly rejected by the church. Later, Papias brought it in, but even then it was refuted, and never held as a doctrine of the early church.

It was indeed a Jewish fable, and never a doctrine of God's church. It was the chief notion that caused the Jews to reject and crucify Christ. Their traditions, and false interpretation of prophecy, led them to the vain worldly expectation that the Messiah would become their great king, subdue the Gentile nations under his sceptre, and make them a flourishing empire. They even tried to take him by force and make him king. He taught them that his kingdom was not of this world. But they only wanted an earthly kingdom. Hence they rejected, and crucified the Son of God. And just as soon as men lost the

glory of his spiritual kingdom out of their hearts, they then believed in a coming earthly kingdom.

And so it has come to pass that we have at this very time of dead formality, a multitude of men, teaching the same abominable lie and false hope which crucified Christ nearly nineteen hundred years ago; namely, a literal kingdom of Christ.

Dear reader, if you hold to any one of the many theories of a literal thousand-year reign on earth, do not think that we desire to destroy your consolation and hope. We wish you to get in harmony with God's Word, and be saved now from all sin, and reign with Christ now and through all eternity. Let him be your hope, and all in all, and your soul will be satisfied.

However beautiful and pleasing anything may be to the mind, there can be no real benefit derived from holding the same if it be only a creation of fancy, or the result of wrong interpretations of Scripture. Nor is God glorified by us holding an erroneous hope.

How, we ask in the name of reason, can any candid mind believe that Christ will have a literal reign of one thousand years on earth after his second advent, when there is not one text between the lids of the Bible that teaches it? Not one text in the Bible that Christ will come back to earth and extend offers of salvation to sinners. Not one text in the Bible which asserts that this earth shall ever be inhabited by all righteous people. Not one text in the Bible that asserts there will be one thousand years intervening between the resurrection of the righteous and the wicked. These positions are all essential to the millennium theory in its several forms; hence that tradition can only be the result of a faith that lives outside of the Bible on the mists and fogs of ignorance and superstition.

On the other hand, reader, if you believe the testimony of the Word of God, you must believe that we are in the last dispensation of time. That "now is the day of salvation." That at the second advent of Christ, he will not set up a kingdom, but deliver up the kingdom to the Father, and close his personal reign. 1 Cor. 15:23, 24. That at his coming all the dead will be raised, all men judged, the righteous crowned in heaven and the wicked sentenced to "everlasting punishment," and this earth, and all the works that are in it burned up, and pass away, and time and probation end. Are you ready for that great day? If not, "today if ye will hear his voice harden not your hearts." "Behold, now is the day of salvation," "and after this the judgment." —Sel.

A Message On Sectism

I am moved to write you a few lines on the subject of sectism or denominations, which is the present religious world. They are NOT God's children. There were several sects or denominations during the time when Jesus was building His church, and if they had been all right then, God would not have sent His only begotten Son down to earth in the likeness of men to build a church unto God. When Jesus walked on the earth with His disciples (when He was building His

church), all people except Christ's own followers supposed that Jesus was just rearing up another sect, so right away they had a name for IT, calling it "the sect of the Nazarene." For they knew Him not as Christ the Son of the living God.

Since God did send His Son to save the people from their sins, He could not have His Son build His church of the foundation of those sectarian movements of that day, for they were divided as they are today.

Now I will point out from Scripture FIVE (5) different sects: 1st, the Sect of the Pharisees, Acts 15:5; 2nd, the Sect of the Sadducees, Acts 5:17; 3rd, the Epicurians; 4th, the Stoics, Acts 17:18; and 5th, the Nicolaitans, Rev. 2:6, 15. Now I shall give a few from History: Gnostics, Edomites, Acabemics, Periparetics, and the Leviathans—five of them. There are more, but I consider these ten enough to suffice. Yet Jesus did NOT build His church upon any of these foundations [neither did He consider them branches of His church]. Therefore it must be a great sin to remain with these false churches. (Be wise, and consider this. Let God's sheep hear His voice). "Come out of her, my people, that ye be not partaker of her sins, and that ye receive not of her plagues." Rev. 18:4.

Sectism is called a City, and its name is BABYLON. This takes in every one of the denominational churches from the Roman Church throughout the whole world to all the offsprings of the Roman church, which are referred to as harlot daughters, also the literal Jews who are not preaching Christ's gospel (Rev. 17:5; 16:9). Flee out of the midst of Babylon, and deliver every man his soul: be not cut off in her iniquity; for this is the time of the Lord's vengeance; He will render unto her a recompense (Jeremiah 51:6).

In Jeremiah 5:7 God says, "How shall I pardon thee for this? My children have forsaken me, and sworn by them that are no gods: when I had fed them to the full, they then committed adultery, and assembled themselves by troops into the harlots' houses." You see it reads, many harlots and many houses. This speaks of the sectarian churches, which are the harlots' houses; and this word "adultery" is spiritual adultery.

Now I have given reference to two sayings of God, warning people to come out from among them; and I shall give one more. These three should be sufficient to cause you to leave these sectarian churches without delay. This next one is so wonderful, a clear-cut warning, and altogether points to the fact that God has only ONE church, and that one His Son is building. In one sense of the word IT is not finished; yet while speaking on other terms, IT IS FINISHED. Now I desire that YOU, my friend, be born into this church. One does not join IT; one is born into IT. Now for the third warning, which you also know, recorded in 2 Cor. 6:17, 18, "Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord and touch not the unclean thing, and I will receive you, and ye shall be my sons and daughters, saith the Lord Almighty." Won't you! Oh! won't you come away from them? Let not yourselves be seen any more at

all with them, come away from them, for they are poison unto God's children.

I warn you in Christ's stead, draw not nigh unto them, for the day of His coming is nigh at hand. Should He come and find YOU in their presence, WHAT THEN? "Now then we are ambassadors for Christ, as though God did beseech you by us: We pray YOU in Christ's stead, Be reconciled to God." 2 Cor.

After you receive this letter, I plead with you: Do not let yourselves be seen among them again—never, never, no never. Do as I have commanded you in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord, and you will find great joy and gladness, such as you have never yet experienced. Tell your friends, your relatives, and your children.

Remember: No matter how you receive this letter of love, it came into your hand by the guiding hand of an all-wise God who is able to bring His own children together into His sheep fold. Ezekiel 34: 11, 12; St. John 10:27. Do not fail to read from the Scripture. Amen. —H. C. Erdman.

A Few Thoughts on Faith

We are told in Hebrews 11:1 that faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen. And in the sixth verse of the same chapter it is written, "Without faith it is impossible to please God: For he that cometh to God, must believe that he is, and that he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him." Then we read in Rom. 10:17, "So then faith cometh by hearing and hearing by the Word of God"; that is, the faith of the gospel. As Paul said, "The word of faith which we preach, that if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved." Rom. 10:8-9. This is saving faith and is given by God. And this faith, when it is finished, results in the salvation of the soul. 1 Pet. 1:9, "Receiving the end of your faith, even the salvation of your souls."

No doubt, many are deceived today and think they are saved when they only have head belief or a historical belief, and have not really believed with the heart. In other words, God has not given them faith because they have not met conditions for faith, and therefore cannot believe from the heart. They only believe like many of the world believe, that Jesus did come into the world and died for the sins of all

people. But if one believes to the salvation of the soul, he must first repent of his sins, confess, and forsake them; then he is eligible for this faith and can believe to the saving of the soul. And believing, he has joy unspeakable and full of glory. (1 Pet. 1:8).

"Therefore being justified by faith we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. By whom also we have access by faith into this grace wherein we stand, and rejoice in the hope of the glory of God." This standing grace is the grace of sanctification. Justification is not the standing grace, but we are to move on, go on to perfection. See Heb. 6:1.

By grace, through repentance, confession, and faith, we are justified, all of our sins are forgiven. And by grace through consecration, dedication, and faith, we are sanctified. The root of sin is destroyed or burned out by the Holy Spirit fire, and our hearts are purified and filled with perfect love.

Then we can serve Him without fear in holiness and righteousness before him all the days of our life (See Luke 1:74, 75). It is through faith that we are kept. We can no more keep ourselves than we can save ourselves; but when we keep ourselves in his love and fellowship by obeying Him in all things and walking in the light as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another and the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin (1 John 1:7). Our hearts are purified by faith (Acts 15:9). We are kept by the power of God through faith, ready to be revealed in the last time. (1 Pet. 1:5).

Now seeing we are justified by faith, sanctified by faith, and kept by faith, let us consider some of the promises of God to his children through faith for our physical needs. God has made great provisions for his children in this life; but we receive these blessings through faith. So many of us fail to receive the things God would be pleased to give us because of our unbelief or lack of faith.

Jesus said, "If ye abide in me and my words abide in you, ye shall ask what ye will and it shall be done" (John 15:7). "And whatsoever we ask we receive of him because we keep his commandments and do those things that are pleasing in his sight. (1 John 3:22).

"Therefore I say unto you, What things soever ye desire when ye pray, believe that ye receive them and ye shall have them." Mark 11:24. Read the 11th chapter of Hebrews and see many things that have been done through faith. "Be not slothful, but followers of those who through faith and patience inherit the promises." Heb. 6:12.

God's Little Lambs

In Romans 10:9 it is written, "That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth that the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved. For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation."

Now all we that are saved and living to all the light that God sheds upon our pathway, know that this is as true as it is written. It is true for every one of those dear souls out in Babylon and in the world who truly fulfill this Scripture, they are saved then and there.

But to keep saved there is a constant work we must perform in our lives daily and hourly, even as our Lord Christ set the example for us all to follow, in that, "Though He were a Son, yet learned He obedience by the things which He suffered" Heb. 5:8. Neither was any guile found in His mouth, who did NO sin. Verse 9, "And being made perfect, He became the author of eternal salvation unto all them that obey Him."

Therefore, if Christ, being pure and without any sin or guile, must learn to be obedient, how much more must this be true of a poor soul formerly steeped in sin and degradation and suddenly born into this pure spiritual kingdom where everything is done in such a quiet, sweet, orderly way in divine love and sweet fellowship, all of which the newly born soul has never experienced before and may have no knowledge whatsoever of the workings of God in His holy kingdom.

Truly these new born souls need much care and spiritual help and instruction from those qualified of God to do so, and must be upheld by all who pray the prayer of faith, else they may faint by the way and be lost after all. May God help us all to see that this is an individual duty laid of God on every truly saved soul. And without our prayers and personal interest in them they will pine away and die spiritually even as our naturally born babies would die without our personal attention and help.

While these little lambs are being upheld by the interest and prayers of other saints, they are learning obedience to God and His ways, of which they may have been in almost complete ignorance before salvation. There is not a vestige of resistance in their hearts toward God and His holy will; it is only that they do not understand as yet that they must learn to seek (Col. 3:1) those things that are above, and that they must set their affections (Col. 3:2) on things in

heaven and not on things on the earth, and learn how to turn loose of all those things that bound them to the world. They must learn that all foolish talking and jesting must be withstood and done away with (Eph. 5:4), and that they must cleanse themselves from all filthiness of the flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God. 2 Cor. 7:1.

They must learn that it is their reasonable service to God, that they present their bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God; and instead of in any way conforming to this world and its vanities, they must the rather be transformed by the renewing of their mind. (Romans 12:1-2). This means that they must have a new mind, thinking on things spiritual instead of the vain worldly things, even the mind of our Lord Jesus (Phil. 2:5) who is meek and lowly in heart, thereby gaining that humbleness of mind, longsuffering, meekness and forbearance (Col. 3:12) so much needed and so vital in their new spiritual life.

They must learn that through the precious promises of a matchless God, and through His great mercy they have escaped from the corruption of the world, and have taken on a measure of the divine nature of God. And they must learn to give all diligence and effort to add virtue to the faith that brought them into the kingdom, as they had no virtue before receiving salvation. Then as they grow, they add knowledge, and soon find that they have need of temperance and much patience. And, growing in these things, they just naturally add godliness, which brings brotherly kindness and love (2 Pet. 1:3-7), upon which the whole kingdom of God is founded, and without which no soul can be saved or be able to stand.

And, as they progress deeper into the glorious kingdom, they find a depth and sweetness and glory of which they had never dreamed. They find all of God's true trusting children motivated in their every conscious act and deed by that gracious, glorious, holy love "shed abroad in their trusting heart by the Holy Spirit." Romans 5:5.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATIONS

We have two outcasts of society in the lesson of today: the leper who was forbidden by Moses' law to mingle with the others, and the publican who was an outcast according to Jewish self-righteousness. They were hated by the upper class. But Jesus is no respecter of persons. His ministry takes in both kinds if they will only come to him. It seems that man has to get down before he will look up. An illustration of this is in Luke 18th chapter. Two Jews, one a Pharisee and the other a publican prayed. The Pharisee was right in his own sight and prayed with himself; but the publican called upon God and asked for mercy, for he said he was a sinner. The Pharisee would have done well in the eyes of God if he had acknowledged the same thing, but he had a long ways to get down to that, for he was self-righteous. Jesus Christ the same, yesterday, today, and forever (Heb. 13:8). He can heal all manner of sickness and diseases today as he could when he was upon earth, and he is doing it with those who will believe, lepers included.

The call of Levi (Matthew) was among the things did by Jesus which did not meet with the approval of the higher-ups. They murmured because Jesus ate with him. There are those who murmur today, but we are glad Jesus will save anyone who comes to him.

JESUS TEACHES HOW TO LIVE

Printed Portion:..... Luke 6:27-38.

Luke 6:27. But I say unto you which hear, Love your enemies, do good to them which hate you,

28. Bless them that curse you, and pray for them which despitefully use you.

29. And unto him that smiteth thee on the one cheek offer also the other; and him that taketh away thy cloke

forbid not to take thy coat also.

30. Give to every man that asketh of thee; and of him that taketh away thy goods ask them not again.

Practical Truth: We should be generous in all our dealings with others, as God is generous in his dealings with us.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATIONS

The sermon on the mount is a good sermon to live by, but there is one thing needful to live it and that is by the help of Almighty God. The Scripture that often comes in relation to this is 1 Peter 1:5, "Who are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation ready to be revealed at the last time." Yes, that is very true; one is unable to live the Christian life without Christ. "Christ in you, the hope of glory" (Col. 1:27). "That Christ may dwell in your hearts by faith" (Eph. 3:27). With Christ in the heart then, it is possible to so live that the sermon on the mount will be exemplified before our fellowman.

"By their fruits ye shall know them," is what Jesus said. How, then, could one expect to love his enemies as Jesus here said to do, without help from the Saviour who said those words. Again, how could he be kind to the unthankful and to the evil without a higher power within him since the "natural man receiveth not the things of the Spirit of God: for they are foolishness unto him: neither can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned" (1 Cor. 2:14). So then our living the beatitudes is according to our life of prayer, Bible reading, and yielding ourselves to obedience unto righteousness (Rom. 6:16).

Practical Truth: The limitless power of Christ may still be drawn upon by us to meet our legitimate needs.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATIONS

It is quite reasonable that the man that made the automobile is the one who can fix it when it needs fixing. Here we have Jesus who is the Creator of all things (Rev. 4:11), and upholds all things by the word of his power (Heb. 1:3). He is certainly able to heal the sick, make the blind to see, the lame to walk, cleanse the lepers, cause the deaf to hear, and raise the dead to life; also raise the spiritually dead to life in Him (John 5:25). Why should it not be that the one who made our minds, our bodies, our souls, be able to fix any part that needs fixing? When it is God's will, the body can be given life even after it has been dead. The thought is, what a great God we have. Not only is He able to do these things but He is also willing; and if we can by faith claim it, the work is done. Surely He is a God to be praised.

The Lord has great compassion and mercy and is gracious toward all of his trusting believing children. Those who will seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness can have all temporal needs added unto them (Matt. 6:33). Those who read these lines and do not know these things to be true in your life may test out the word of God and do just as He says, and it will stand the test.

SPREAD OF THE GOOD NEWS

Printed Portion:.....Luke 8:1, 4-8; 9:1-6.

Luke 8:1. And it came to pass afterward, that he went throughout every city and village, preaching and and shewing the glad tidings of the kingdom of God: and the twelve were with him.

Luke 8:4. And when much people were gathered together, and were come to him out of every city, he spake by a parable:

Memory Selection: The harvest truly is great, but the labourers are few: pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he would send forth labourers into his harvest. Luke 10:2.

Practical Truth: Every Christian should help in spreading the good news concerning Christ and his power to save.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATIONS

In spreading of the good news, Jesus gives us a picture in a parable of the work of giving out the gospel. "He that soweth the good seed is the Son of man" (Matt. 13:37). "The seed is the word of God" (Luke 8:11) sown in the hearts of the "children of the kingdom" (Matt. 13:38). "The field is the world." Most people are engrossed in the affairs of this life so that when they hear the gospel their hearts are as the wayside, or hard ground.

Then there are those who receive the word for a short time but will not make a determined effort to keep what God gives them and they are likened to the stony ground. To those who received the Word "among thorns" Jesus said, "Ye cannot serve God and mammon" (Lk. 16:13). They try to compromise and hold onto the things of this world and serve God, too. It cannot be done. Of the fourth class Jesus said, "But blessed are your eyes for they see: and your ears, for they hear" (Matt. 13:18). The word "hear" has the thought of doing as well as literally hearing. "They that sow in tears shall reap in joy. He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him" (Ps. 126:5-6).
