"Make It So Plain That I Can Get Hold of It"

On the sixteenth day after the battle of Gettysburg, I entered the room where a young wounded Colonel was apparently near to death. As I entered he aroused from his stupor, beckoned me to his bedside, and threw his feeble arms about my neck.

"Oh, my father, how glad I am to see you! I was afraid you would not come till it was too late. I am too feeble to say much, although I had a great many things to say to you; you must do all the talking; tell me all about dear mother and sister."

I soon perceived by the appearance of those in the house that there was no hope of his recovery. But as I could not longer bear the agony of suspense, I at last inquired of the doctor, "Doctor, how long do you think he can live?" "Not more than four days. He may drop away at any hour."

"Have you, or has anyone told him of his real condition?" $\$

"No; we left the painful duty for you to do, as we have been expecting your arrival for several days."

As I entered the room with the dreaded message of death pressing on my heart, the eyes of my son fastened upon me.

"Come, sit by my side, Father. Have you been talking with the doctor about me?"

"Yes."

"What did he tell you? Does he think I shall recover?"

There was a painful hestiation for a moment. "Don't be afraid to tell me just what he said."

"He told me you must die."

"How long does he think I can live?"

"Not to exceed four days, and you may drop away any hour."

With agitation he exclaimed, "Father, is that so? Then I must die! I cannot, I must not die! Oh! I am not prepared to die now. Do tell me how I can get ready! Make it so plain that I can get hold of it. Tell me in a few words, if you can, so that I can see it plainly. I know you can, Father, for I used to hear you explain it to others."

It was no time for tears, but for calmness and light, by which to lead the soul to Christ, and both were given.

"My son, I see you are afraid to die." "Yes, I am." "Well, I suppose you feel guilty." "Yes, that is it. I have been a wicked young man. You know how it is in the army." "You want to be forgiven, don't you?"

"Oh, yes! That is what I want. Can I be, father?" "Certainly."

"Can I know it before I die?" "Certainly."
"Well now, Father, make it so plain that I can
get hold of it."

At once an incident which occurred during the school days of my son came to my mind. I had not thought of it before for several years. Now, it came to me, fresh with interest, and just what was wanted to guide the agitated heart of this young inquirer to Jesus.

"Do you remember while at school in ———, you came home one day, and, I having occasion to rebuke you, you became very angry and abused me with harsh language?"

"Yes, Father, I was just thinking it all over a few days ago, as I thought of your coming to see me, and felt so bad about it that I wanted to see you and once more ask you to forgive me."

"Do you remember how, after the paroxysm of your anger had subsided, you came in and threw your arms about my neck and said, 'My dear father, I am sorry I abused you so. It was not your loving son that did it. I was very angry. Won't you forgive me?" "

"Yes, I remember it very distinctly."

"Do you remember what I said to you as you wept upon my neck?"

"Very well. You said, 'I forgive you with all my heart,' and kissed me. I shall never forget those words."

"Did you believe me?"

"Certainly. I never doubted your word."

"Did you then feel happy again?"

"Yes, perfectly; and since that time I have always loved you better than ever before. I shall never forget how it relieved me when you looked upon me so kindly, and said, 'I forgive you with all my heart.'

"Well, now, this is just the way to come to Jesus. Tell Him, 'I am sorry,' just as you told me, and ten thousand times quicker than a father's love forgave you, will He forgive you. He says He will. Then you must take His Word for it just as you did mine."

"Why, Father, is this the way to become a Christian?"

"I don't know of any other."

"Why, Father, I can get hold of this. I am so glad you have come to tell me how."

He turned his head upon his pillow for rest. I sank into my chair and wept freely, for my heart could no longer suppress its emotions. I had done my work and committed the case to Christ. He, too, I was assured had done His. The broken heart had made its confession, had heard what it longed for, "I forgive you," and believed it. I soon felt the nervous hand on my head and heard the word, "Father" in such a tone of tenderness and joy that I knew the change had come.

"Father, my dear Father, I don't want you to weep any more; you need not; I am perfectly happy now; Jesus has forgiven me. I know He has, for He says so, and I take His Word for it, just as I did yours."

The doctor came in and found him cheerful and happy, looked at him, felt his pulse, which he had been watching with intense anxiety and said, "Why, Colonel, you look better."

"I am better, doctor; I am going to get well. My father has told me how to become a Christian, and I am happy. I believe I shall recover for God has heard my prayer. Doctor, I want you to become a Christian, too. My father can tell you how to get hold of it."

The Colonel did live, and lived for Christ.

I was made a better man and a better evangelist by that scene, where this dear son, struggling with his guilt and fear of death, was led to Jesus and found the pardon of his sins. I there resolved never to forget the charge he made me in his extremity, "Make it so plain that I can get hold of it."—Tract

Just Before Jesus Comes

Paul wrote to the Thessalonians that before the coming of our Lord there would come a falling away first. (II Thess. 2:3) To Timothy he stated that evil men and imposters should wax worse and worse and that there would be perilous times in the last days. (II Tim. 2:1-13). It will be noticed in the scriptures that the apostacy is not concerning education or fine churches or able ministers or large congregations or the progress of intellectual and material prosperity. But it would be a breaking down of faith and a denial of the power of God in Holy Ghost experience. There is at present well nigh a universal landslide toward higher criticism which is lower infidelism. There is also a denial of the supernatural working of God in regeneration, definite answers to prayers, and the revelation of divine things to the soul by the Holy Spirit which make up the religion of the apostles and their successors.

We are then to expect great deceptions and delusions deceiving if it were possible the very elect. We may also expect great advances in forms of godliness in the last days. Faith will not become low through worldliness and the denial of the scriptures only, but also through the remarkable imitative faiths which will work on in their deceptive power. These movements will become an unseen influence in the air around us and the atmosphere will be peopled with evil spirits and heavy with the depression of hell. These evil spirits will do their utmost to injure, mislead, confuse, and depress the children of God. Our bodies will be afflicted. It will press in on our minds and becloud our souls. All kinds of strange feelings and new and peculiar trials will come to us, a surprising lack of desire and energy Godward, a spiritual deadness, a mental heaviness, a lethargy of soul; an alarming desire for forbidden things and a peculiar delight and fascination in any of the world's pleasures we dare to taste.

It will be very difficult to preach the Word in liberty and power. It will be very difficult to give attention to the Word when it is preached. It will be very difficult to get real earnest and continue in prayer. This is the atmosphere in which we must battle as the last days darken around us. Oh, let us be strong in the Lord, for Satan will no doubt bring a mysterious power to bear on our minds and wills which will make it exceedingly difficult to walk closely with God and very easy to live in the flesh.

We will be amazed at the power he can use against us, and it will become very hard to serve God faithfully and to pray earnestly for it will seem as if every thing without us and almost everything within us has conspired to keep us from following Christ all the way, and to influence us to compromise. We will be surrounded by a worldly atmosphere that will draw us away from God, that will render prayer halfhearted and that will deaden our spiritual senses to the reality of heavenly things and the glorious presence of our Lord. It will become very easy to slip out of communion with God, and harder than ever to keep communication open between our souls and heaven. Already we feel the beginning of the influence of the inrush of these things upon us. Worldliness in various forms weaves the ever-expounding power over many congregations. Things are not only allowed but are unblushingly organized, yes, organized now which would not have been possible a generation ago. The craze of the drama and the exciting round of pleasure is catered to in connection with many places of worship to the destroying of deep spirituality and bringing to an end of revivals and also the furtherance of the spirit of compromise with doubtful things and associations. There is a terrible decline of faith and true religion all over the world at this moment. We do not deny that there may be here and there a few exceptions. But looking at Christendom as a whole, it presents a sad picture. Reviewing these matters, do they not constitute a loud call to the servants of Christ to arise and seek during the intervening short period to make the most of this the day of opportunity before their Lord and Master summons them to give an account of their labors at the Judgment seat of Christ?

"Restore Such a One"

"Brethren, if a man be overtaken in a fault, ye which are spiritual, restore such a one in the spirit of meekness; considering thyself, lest thou also be tempted." Gal. 6:1.

Restore means "to bring back to a former state; to re-establish; to return." (Webster)

A person who has once been saved but is "overtaken in a fault" needs a helping hand. The enemy who has taken the advantage has crushed, bruised, and filled them with doubts, despair, and confusion. He will make them feel that every avenue of escape is blocked and it is of no use to try again.

Our text tells the brethren or the spiritual ones to "restore such a one." Our text also warns that one who is burdened to "restore such a one" is to be careful. This is serious business. They cannot go to that one with harshness, but must be filled with

divine love and "are not willing that any should perish but that all come to repentance." (2 Pet. 3:9) They need to be long-suffering, patient, forgiving, fairminded and willing to give out righteous judgment that is based on the Bible with tenderness, concern, and a care for a soul who needs to be restored to God. To "restore such a one," let it be done in the "spirit of meekness." "Yet count him not as an enemy, but admonish him as a brother." 2 Thess. 3:15. The one who goes to "restore such a one" needs to feel his utter dependence on God as he helps bear that one's burden. He also needs to realize that he himself is nothing. If it had not been for the daily implored grace and power of God, he, too, could be just like the one he wants to restore.

After the person has been restored, then all of God's children need to also make that person know that they are glad he has repented and is determined to live for God. That is your part in "restoring such a one."

Those who were overtaken with temptation and fallen have suffered enough. They do not need to be crushed down any more. They are sorry with a godly sorrow that they failed their Lord. They have repented and God has forgiven them. The blood of Jesus has washed away all trace of sin. They can truthfully say, "He restoreth my soul." Psa. 23:3.

How do you feel toward those who have failed and been overtaken, but have repented? Do you forgive them? Remember Jesus has warned us that if we don't forgive others, He will not forgive us.

Do you say, "I would never do such a thing"? Our text tells us to consider thyself, taking heed lest we fall when we think we are something. Do you know it is only the mercy and grace of God between you and sin? If you are not careful, prayerful, and watchful, you, too, would fall. We need to continually feel our helplessness and dependence upon God, continually looking to Him for grace.

Let us each one help those to be restored who have fallen. Give a helping hand by showing love and care.

Peter cursed and swore that he was not one of Jesus' disciples, but he repented. On the day of Pentecost when they were waiting for the Holy Spirit, the 120 were in "one accord." (Acts 2:1.) The others did not point a finger of scorn at Peter and say that they did not want such a fellow there because of the awful sin he committed. Jesus had sent word after his resurrection that he wanted to see Peter and the disciples. They knew he was forgiven and they forgave (Matt. 16:7).

May God help each of us to do our part to restore those who have failed and repented.

By holding on to the promises of God the infection was eradicated and the Lord put me on my feet again. Thank God for the virtue of divine physical healing and the privilege we have to trust Him!

It is with sad hearts for our loss that we acknowledge the departure from this world of our dear Sister Opal Wilson from the mission field in Nigeria, Africa. On Sept. 19 a telegram was received from Bro. Ostis B. Wilson that his wife was very sick. This urgent request for prayer for her healing was phoned to several congregations across the country. About three days later another telegram came to this office from Bro. Wilson that Sister Opal was critically ill. The church here and abroad went into fasting and prayer for her recovery. The Lord heard those petitions and saw those tears. Yet God in His infinite wisdom declined to answer in the way that we desired, and called her to eternal rest from her earthly labors at 10 p. m., Sept. 24 after a number of days with pneumonia fever. She and Bro. Wilson had gotten wet in a heavy rain, from which she took pneumonia.

This is the second missionary to Nigeria to depart this life this year. Bro. David Madden passed on April 28, just a few days after returning to the States. Such occurrences we do not fully understand and we may be inclined to question why, but we must ever remember that God is still God and that we are just His children and He can do as He pleases with His own. Even as Jesus prayed to His Father in the Garden of Gethsemane, "Not my will, but thine be done," so we must humbly submit to His decrees and willingly trust His infinite wisdom.

The statement, "Death does not denote defeat," written recently in this paper by a missionary, still remains true. Death is that doorway through which every child of God must pass in order to obtain that final and complete victory.

As each faithful warrior lays down his armor on the mission field, may the church at large respond to the challenge and fill every vacant place with a score of volunteers. It is no time to retreat or give up the fight, but we must review and renew our consecration and redouble our efforts for the cause of Christ. In past ages the church has waxed valiant amidst adversities, and it must not fail now!

When word was received in this country that Sister Opal Wilson was at rest with the Lord, words of sympathy and offers to help in any way possible to get her body flown back to California for burial began to pour in from saints, relatives and friends. As the financial arrangements were being made, Bro. Wilson was involved in the very slow and trying process, with delay after delay, in order to get the body prepared and flown to Los Angeles. Eventually he arrived about noon, and the body some hours later, at the Los Angeles airport on Friday, Oct. 2. There he was met by a large group of sympathizing saints and relatives.

This writer, as well as a number of other out-ofstate individuals, was constrained by love and mutual concern to make the trip to California to render whatever comfort and aid we could to the bereaved family. The many flowers and the large attendance at the funeral spoke eloquently of the place which Sister Opal held in the hearts of all who knew her.

As we carried her earthly tabernacle to its resting place on the green hillside, we knew that Sister Opal possessed a "building of God, an house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens." (2 Cor. 5:1).

At this writing all the workers are digging in for a renewed attack against Satan on the Mexico front. With renewed consecration to God and His cause, we expect by His grace to see more souls saved in the coming months, if we are granted time and strength. We solicit your much needed prayers for both soul and body as we endeavor to serve the Lord at our several posts of duty.

Work is progressing at Patscuaro, Mexicali, on the living quarters for the workers there. So far nothing has developed in a material way for a chapel in Ensen-ada. Please pray for this need that God will direct in obtaining a place of worship before cold weather begins. (At present services are conducted out of doors in a Also, continue to pray about a place to build a yard.) chapel in Ojos Negros. Also at Asseradero (lumber camp) we need a place for services. God is able for all these needs; just pray and believe.

There are numbers of conditions the Lord will have to work out to His glory in all the congregations. Some

are in double marriage, some one thing, some another. One faithful sister who lives in Delta and attends services in Patzcuaro is carrying a heavy burden for some of her household. Her whole heart was in her work. She dearly loved her work there and loved the people and they loved her. The Lord just kept both of us real satisfied and contented there and there was not a day that dragged on our hands any time. We were real happy in the service of the Master in that place. Opal has always been anxious to get back home any time we went away for a while but this time she never said one word about coming home from the time we left and was earnestly hoping we could get an extension on our visa to stay longer.

Therefore we feel God's approval was upon the venture and can truly say that there is a big, big work to be done in that country. There are some precious souls there who are eagerly reaching out in their hearts for the light and truth of the gospel. We found some honest, open hearts who were willing to accept truth on any line of truth we saw fit to bring. Let us all pray much for them as they are much grieved and shaken up at Opal's passing.

Ekpo who could translate them and they would continue to come together at appointed times to hear the lessons. I promised them I would just take that on as a part of my regular work. So let us pray for them that their hearts may be much enlightened and blessed as they continue to come together from time to time to study these lessons on Bible doctrines.

I asked Opal repeatedly during the days of her illness if she was glad she came and she always affirmed that she was. I asked her one time after she had been ill several days if she was glad she was there and she

I would like to tell of God's goodness in healing me since I have been here. First He healed a large hernia in 1962 which I had had for fifteen years. Many of you knew about it. It completely disappeared between the Monark Springs and Myrtle, Mo. campmeetings. I failed to realize that God wanted me to take care of my body more carefully. Lifting heavy weights and doing heavy work that I hadn't been able to do for some time caused another small one to come near the old one last March. "EIS"

This three-letter Greek word "eis" (pronounced "ees" by the modern Greek, and "ice" by our college Greek) is used about 35 times in the New Testament in connection with the word "believe." It is used especially in John's gospel, 32 times, I counted. Its meaning according to Strong's Greek Dictionary. found in Strong's Exhaustive Concordance, is given thus: a primitive preposition, translated; "to" or "into." Liddell and Scott's Greek English Lexicon Preposition with accusative only. Radical says: sense: direction towards, motion to, in or into. This preposition is used in the New Testament about 1800 times and is translated "into" or "in" usually. But in the New Testament it is not translated "into" when used with "believe," that is, in the King James Translation. Invariably it is translated "believed on" rather than "believed INTO."

While reading in the Ben Wilson translation found in the Emphatic Diaglott, (which contains the Greek text with the English word directly underneath) I was enlightened when I read John 3:15, 16, 18, "that everyone believing INTO him may have afonian [eternal, everlasting, age-lasting] life. For God so loved the world, that he gave his Son, the only begotten, that every one believing INTO him may not

perish, but obtain afonian life . . . He believing INTO him is not judged; but he not believing has been judged already, because he has not believed INTO the name of the only-begotten Son of God." As I began searching the Greek text I was delighted to find this much stronger idea is the correct thought of the New Testament. ("Believing INTO Christ" is, to me, a much stronger doctrine than "believing ON Christ"). The Greek word "epi" is usually translated "on" or "upon" and John uses it several times, but never John 1:33, "Upon [epil with the word "believe." whom thou shalt see the Spirit descending, and remaining ON [epi] him." John 21:20, "... leaned on [epi] his breast at supper." John knew he never leaned INTO (eis) Jesus' breast, but that he leaned ON (epi) His breast. Therefore when John says, "He that believeth ON the Son hath everlasting life:" (John 3:36, King James Translation), he was teaching, "He that believeth INTO [eis] the Son hath everlasting life."

A dear relative of mine, nearing the end of his earthly life, told me he had eternal life because the Bible said, "He that believeth ON the Son hath [at the present time] everlasting life." "Since I believe on Him, I HAVE everlasting life." When I explained that "believeth on" really meant "believing INTO," he sadly said, "I am afraid I have believed the wrong way." He knew he was not living as Christ did—free from sin—and I believe he saw his mistake. I am glad I had the opportunity of praying with and for him after that.

Believing INTO Christ is genuine New Testament doctrine, taught directly. Directly? John 15:2, "Every branch [individuals] IN ME." 15:4, "Abide IN me, and I IN you . . . except YE abide IN me." Verse 5, "He that abideth [lives on and on] IN ME, and I IN him." Verse 7, "If YE abide IN me." John 17:20, 21, "Neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on [eis: INTO] me through their word; That they all may be one; as thou, Father, art in me, and I in thee, that they also may BE one IN US:" We believe INTO, and are baptized INTO Christ: "Know ye not, that so many of US as were [are: margin] baptized INTO [eis] Jesus Christ were baptized INTO [eis] his death?" Rom. 6:3, "For we are members of his body, of his flesh, and of his bones." Eph. 5:30. Why? How? We were baptized INTO Him because we had "believed INTO him.

Since He did not sin we will not sin when we are IN Him. We cannot be a part of Him while sinning. Believing in His shed blood as our cleansing fountain, will cleanse us from sin, and make US like Him, in Him. The Greek word eis (INTO) is translated ON in the following places in connection with the word "believe":

Jno. 1:12; 2:11; 3:15, 16, 18, 36; 4:39; 6:29, 35, 40, 47; 7:31, 38, 39, 48; 8:30, 31; 9:35, 36; 10:42; 11:45, 48; 12:11, 37, 42, 44, 46; 14:12; 16:31; 17:20; 1 John 5:10, 13. Since John used eis (into) so many times I am persuaded he meant that people really believed INTO Christ.

Luke uses eis (into) once, in Acts 19:4 where Paul is telling what John Baptist said, "Then said Paul, John verily baptized with the baptism of repentance, saying unto the people, that they should believe on (eis: INTO) him which should come after him, that is on [eis: INTO] Christ Jesus" Acts 19:4.

Paul uses epi (on or upon) in Romans 4:5, 24; 9:33; 10:11, but he uses eis (into) in Gal. 2:16, where it is translated "We have believed in [eis: into] Jesus Christ," and he uses eis in Phil. 1:29, "For unto you it is given in the behalf of Christ, not only to believe on [eis: into] him, but also to suffer for his sake."

Believing INTO Christ is more than just a head belief of believing ON Christ. It is more than believing Him as an historical character. It is more than believing He paid the price for our sins. It is an experience that must be experienced by each individual who expects to live with Him in the Glory world. Dear friend, have you believed INTO Him who died for you?

Practical Truth: Being a good Spirit-led steward of what God gives us will lead us to heaven, but if we use selfishly what God gives us it will lead us away from God and into sin.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

Some might say they have plenty of this world's goods and have godliness, therefore they are content. But our lesson brings out something deeper than that. We have godliness that brings a deep soul rest and peace that the riches of this world cannot give. That is the gain that is great. Paul said in another place, "For I have learned, in whatsoever state I am, therewith to be content." (Phil. 4:11). Can we say that?

It isn't money that is evil; it is the "love of money." There are many snares for those who love money. It may not be only the rich who love money, but those who are not rich also love money. They will go at all lengths to get it. The time payment plan is like a big whirl-pool. It sucks a person into it and soon there are more payments to be made than the check can pay. This will get a person into confusion, distress of mind and soul. The temptations then arise to cheat, lie, steal, and to cover up wrongs to get money. This will lead a soul to perdition. The rich will do the same when they love money in order to lay up more money and possessions. They also are headed for destruction.

We are warned to "flee these things." Paul tells us what to do that will give us eternal life. We are to have godliness and be rich in good works, ready to distribute what God has given us and therefore we will be laying a good foundation or firm grip on eternal life.

November 8, 1964 AN UNASHAMED WITNESS

Printed Portion 2 Timothy 1:6-14

2 Tim. 1:6 Wherefore I put thee in remembrance that thou stir up the gift of God, which is in thee by the putting on of my hands.

7 For God hath not given us the spirit of fear; but of

power, and of love, and of a sound mind.

8 Be not thou therefore ashamed of the testimony of our Lord, nor of me his prisoner: but be thou partaker of the afflictions of the gospel according to the power of God;

9 Who hath saved us, and called us with an holy calling, not according to our works, but according to his own purpose and grace, which was given us in Christ Jesus before the world began,

10 But is now made manifest by the appearing of our Saviour Jesus Christ, who hath abolished death, and hath brought life and immortality to light through the gospel:

11 Whereunto I am appointed a preacher, and an

apostle, and a teacher of the Gentiles.

Memory Verse: For God hath not given us the spirit of fear: but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind. II Timothy 1:7.

Practical Truth: If we are ashamed of Jesus here He will be ashamed of us in the Judgment Day.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

If you had been there that day when they dragged our precious Saviour up the hill to put Him on the cross, would you have been ashamed of Him? Even in front of the crowd that was going along and in one accord proclaiming that He be killed and done away with, would you have been ashamed to admit that you loved Him and you were one of His disciples? Or would it have been easier for you to say that you loved Jesus when he rode into Jerusalem that time on the donkey and the people were crying, "Hosanna in the highest! Blessed be the King that cometh"? (Matt. 21:9). There is a tendency in men to shirk bearing witness to the gospel of Jesus Christ under certain circumstances. Crowds change their minds. We cannot measure the real value of anything or anyone by what the crowd thinks. But right is right and wrong is wrong. We want to do right regardless of what the crowd or any person might think. Paul was not ashamed that he was in prison because the crowd would not accept his belief in Christ. He also exhorted Timothy to not be ashamed of God's children.

I like the words of Paul when he said, "I know whom I have believed, and am persuaded that he is able to keep that which I have committed unto him against that day. God wants us to have that same confidence in Him. He will take care of all we put in His hands and keep our

souls in the Judgment Day.

AN APPROVED WORKMAN

Printed Portion II Timothy 2:8-15; 3:14-17

2 Tim. 2:8 Remember that Jesus Christ of the seed of David was raised from the dead according to my gospel:

- 9 Wherein I suffer trouble, as an evil doer, even unto bonds; but the word of God is not bound.
- 10 Therefore I endure all things for the elect's sakes, that they may also obtain the salvation which is in Christ Jesus with eternal glory.
- 11 It is a faithful saying: For if we be dead with him, we shall also live with him:
- 12 If we suffer, we shall also reign with him; if we deny him, he also will deny us:
- 13 If we believe not, yet he abideth faithful: he cannot deny himself.

Memory Verse: Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth. 2 Tim. 2:15.

Practical Truth: We need to spend much time in studying the Word of God.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

Who could be a better approved workman than Paul? We think about how he was in prison but through his sufferings he still was a workman for God. His life was an example. Some in this world are free to go as they please but are bound by the Word of God. They are not an approved workman. If we suffer with the Lord here we will reign with him in glory. We are not better than our master and Lord.

A large part of the city of Rome had been destroyed by fire and the Christians were blamed for doing this. Many were killed and brutally mistreated. Paul was seized and put in prison. Paul had the word of God in his heart, mind, and soul.

Today we do not know when God's word might be taken from us. We need to study the Word of God. There is a comfort and blessings from studying the Word of God and storing it up in our mind and soul. What a comfort in the time of trouble the verse in the Bible which says, "I will never leave thee nor forsake thee." How you will rejoice and feel so good to know that Jesus is right beside you, in you, and all about you!

In prayer we talk to God and God talks to us through the Bible. When we read it we should think of it as God speaking to us. Believe it and live by it.

Practical Truth: Have a purpose in life and stay with that purpose.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

Some might say that they do not have the persecutions, afflictions, and struggles that Paul and others seemed to have. Did you ever realize that the way has been made easier for you because Paul, your pastor, the ministers of the gospel and older faithful warriors for God went through many persecutions and afflictions? Someone made the path through the woods and someone faced the issue squarely through suffering and you just fell in behind them. We should thank God for the faithful warriors of God who have faced the enemy and conquered. Because they conquered, it encourages us to know we can also, through the precious name of Jesus.

Each one of us has the devil to face, a battle to fight, and a victory to win. When we belong to God we never need to look for defeat but victory. Many suffer though because they yield more to self than to God. When evil is spoken of you, do you feel sorry for yourself? Do you feel you should be better treated? Do you try to trace it down? This is yielding to self. This will cause you a lot of trouble. Your mind will become troubled and generally you will spend time that you should be praying or working for God. God knows your heart and you do, too. "He will keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on Him." "Cast your care upon the Lord for he careth for you."

Printed Portion Titus 1:1-3; 2:11-14; 3:4-8a

Titus 1:1 Paul, a servant of God, and an apostle of Jesus Christ, according to the faith of God's elect, and the acknowledging of the truth which is after godliness;

- 2 In hope of eternal life, which God, that cannot lie, promised before the world began;
- 3 But hath in due times manifested his word through
- preaching, which is committed unto me according to the commandment of God our Saviour:

- 12 Teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly, in this present world;

- 14 Who gave himself for us, that he might redeem us from all iniquity, and purify unto himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works.
- 3:4 But after that the kindness and love of God our Saviour toward man appeared,
- 5 Not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to his mercy he saved us, by the washing of regeneration, and renewing of the Holy Ghost;
- 6 Which he shed on us abundantly through Jesus Christ our Saviour;
- 7 That being justified by his grace, we should be made heirs according to the hope of eternal life.
- 8a This is a faithful saying, and these things I will that thou affirm constantly, that they which have believed in God might be careful to maintain good works.

Memory Verse: Not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to his mercy he saved us, by the washing of regeneration, and renewing of the Holy Ghost. Titus 3:5.

Practical Truth: Only through the blood of Jesus can we be ready to enter heaven.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

How terrible it would be to live in a world of sin where there was no hope of a better life! That hope of eternal life, which God, that cannot lie, promised before the world began is the heart of the gospel. It shows the love and tender mercy of God toward mankind, toward you and me. Jesus was sent to this world to live, die, and arise again that we might have this hope of eternal life. God's great love caused him to give. He gave His Son to bring us back to him after Adam had sinned and plunged the whole human race into sin. Jesus will forgive us of our sins. This is the gospel which means "good news."

This salvation which Jesus brought is made known to all men. No one need to be without it. It is free for everyone who will meet the conditions. It teaches us that we are to deny or turn away from ungodliness and worldly lusts which war against the spirit. The world is clamoring for everyone to follow the fashions, pride, fads, jazzy songs, amusements, and careless ways of sin. We are instructed to live soberly, righteously and godly right here in this present world. Only through God's mercy did he save us and we need to be glad we can be a sacred, peculiar, special people, that He has purified unto Himself.
