Man Needs a Saviour

"Go, and Sin No More"

Our heart has been burdened for some time because we hear so much of the modern "sin-you-must" religion. To believe and advocate this teaching is to disbelieve God's Word and His plan of redemption.

God created man (Adam) in His likeness and in His moral image, pure and holy. He placed the man and his wife in the beautiful garden of Eden and gave them one commandment to obey. Gen. 2:17, "Of the tree of knowledge of good and evil, thou shalt not eat of it: for in the day that thou eatest thereof thou shalt surely die." Bear in mind, there is a literal death and also a spiritual death. When they disobeyed God's law, he drove them from the garden, and being separated from God, they then died a spiritual death. "Wherefore, as by one man [Adam] sin entered into the world, and death by sin; and so death passed upon all men, for that all have sinned." Rom. 5:12. In Gen. 5:3 we read that Adam lived an hundred and

thirty years (before he died a literal death) and begat a son in his own likeness after his image. So all of Adam's posterity were born in his fallen moral image, inheriting his fallen or sinful nature. In other words, they were born with the seed of sin in their hearts.

But listen to the Apostle Paul again: "For the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men, teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously and godly [where?] in this present world." Titus 2: 11-12. Salvation means deliverance from sin. Jesus said, "If the Son therefore shall make you free, you shall be free indeed." John 8:36.

Jesus tells of two men who went into the temple to pray. One was a Pharisee who had a profession of religion. The other was a sinner. The Pharisee stood and prayed with himself, enumerating his selfrighteous deeds. "The publican, standing afar off, would not lift up so much as his eyes unto heaven, but smote upon his breast, saying, God be merciful to me a sinner. I tell you, this man went down to his house justified [saved] rather than the other: for every one that exalteth himself shall be abased; and he that humbleth himself shall be exalted." Luke 18:10-13. God did not hear the proud Pharisee's prayer, but when the sinner humbled his heart, acknowledged his condition, asked for mercy, God saved him. He will do the same today for every sinner who does likewise. Praise the Lord! Jesus said again, "Except your righteousness shall exceed the righteousness of the scribes and Pharisees, ye shall in no case enter into the kingdom of heaven." Matt. 5:20. I am so glad salvation is real and we can know when our lives are in harmony with God and His Word.

In Luke 1:73-75 we read, "The oath which he [God] sware to our father Abraham, that he would grant unto us, that we, being delivered out of the hand of our enemies, might serve him without fear, in holiness and righteousness before him [just on Sunday or one day? No, but] all the days of our life." Paul tells us how some folks found freedom or deliverance from sin. In Rom. 6:17, 18 we read, "But God be thanked, that ye were the servants of sin, but ye have obeyed from the heart that form of doctrine which was delivered you. Being then made free from sin, ye became the servants of righteousness." We are saved from our sins, not in them, by faith in his Son and obedience to his Word.

How sad indeed to see so much unbelief! People claim to be saved (or a Christian) and yet say they can't quit the sin business. Jesus forgave a sinful woman, then said unto her, "Go, and sin no more." John 8:11. He healed a sick man and said unto him, "Sin no more, lest a worse thing come unto thee." John 5:14. If people don't get rid of sin, the "worse thing" is sure to come unto them.

One came to Jesus saying, "Good Master, what good thing shall I do that I may have eternal life? And he said unto him, why callest thou me good? there is none good but one, that is God." Matt. 19: 16-17. Jesus knew this man's heart and how hard

it was for him to believe that he was the Christ. Evidently He was trying to help the man to see him not merely as a man, but as God's Son, and God working in Him. Jesus said to Philip, "The words that I speak unto you I speak not of myself, but the Father that dwelleth in me, he doeth the works." John 14:10. We must acknowledge the frailities of man, and his failures in all generations. Jesus once said, "Without me ye can do nothing." Again in Matt. 10:20 we read, "For it is not ye that speak, but the Spirit of your Father which speaketh in you." Jesus was teaching the twelve apostles here.

Oh, dear ones, if the power of God was truly working in every heart that professes to be a Christian, this world would be like Jesus prayed it would be: "That they all may be one as thou Father art in me and I in thee, that they also may be one in us that the world may believe that thou hast sent me." John 17:21.

Is "Eternal Security" a Bible Doctrine?

Let us examine this popular belief, "once saved, always saved," in the light of the Scriptures. Many texts bear on this subject, but we will cite just a few.

Though Judas Iscariot was chosen by Jesus as one of His twelve disciples, was ordained and sent out to preach the gospel, heal the sick and cast out devils, yet we read in Acts 1:25 that "Judas by transgression fell." He betrayed innocent blood, committed suicide and was eternally lost. In John 17:12 Jesus said of those whom his Father had given him that "none of them is lost, but the son of perdition."

In John 15:2 Jesus said that "every branch in me [Christ] that beareth not fruit he taketh away."

The Apostle Paul was surely saved, but he recognized the necessity of holy Christian living "lest that by any means, when I have preached to others, I myself should be a castaway." 1 Cor. 9:27.

Jesus, in teaching His disciples, said: "Ye are the salt of the earth: but if the salt have lost his savour, wherewith shall it be salted? it is thenceforth good for nothing, but to be cast out, and to be trodden under foot of men." Matt. 5:13.

In 1 Tim. 4:1 we read: "Now the Spirit speaketh expressly, that in the latter times some shall depart from the faith, giving heed to seducing spirits and doctrines of devils."

"But Christ as a son over his own house, whose house are we, if we hold fast the confidence and the rejoicing of the hope firm unto the end." Heb. 3:6. "For we are made partakers of Christ, if we hold the beginning of our confidence steadfast unto the end." Heb. 3:14. If these texts teach anything, it is that salvation is conditional, and that it is possible for a Christian to apostatize and fall from grace.

In 2 Peter 2:15, 17 the apostle writes of those who "have forsaken the right way, and are gone astray; to whom the mist of darkness is reserved forever." "For it had been better for them not to have known the way of righteousness, than, after they had known it, to turn from the holy commandment delivered unto them." 2 Peter 2:21.

In Revelation 2 Jesus told the Church at Ephesus that they had left their first love. "Remember therefore from whence thou art fallen, and repent, and do the first works; or else I will come unto thee quickly and will remove thy candlestick out of his place, except thou repent." Sin separates man from fellowship with God, but repentance will restore that relationship.

Read Ezekiel 33:13 and 18. When the righteous turn away and commit iniquity, he shall die for his sin. If it is not possible for a Christian to fail of the grace of God, why are there so many texts warning against it? Such a belief would certainly tend to produce carelessness in maintaining holy living. No wonder there is much profession and very little possession of the grace of God.

The doctrine of "eternal security" is not consistent with the God-given freedom of choice to mankind. "Choose you this day whom ye will serve." Joshua 24:15. God sets before man good and evil, life and death, and entreats him to choose life and live forever. Even after he accepts the gracious invitation, he still possesses the power of choice to do otherwise. Man is never forced to serve God. Acceptable service is based on love for God alone. Jesus said, "If ye love me, keep my commandments."

Some advocates of "once saved, always saved" affirm that God is married to the backslider, but nothing is farther from the truth and has no basis in the Scriptures. Jer. 3:14 refers only to the "backsliding." Repentance is the call to the backslider, and he must repent before he can be reinstated in favor with God.

Please, dear reader, do not depend upon that false hope of eternal salvation if you are living in sin and disobedience to God's Word, regardless of how many times you have been baptized or how many churches you have joined. Multitudes are deceived and will be sadly disappointed on that reckoning day when they are turned away on the left hand into the lake of fire. If you die in your sins, you cannot go where Jesus "Where the tree falleth, there it shall lie." Eccl. 11:3. As death finds you, so will the Judgment. You must be born again from above and live free from sin in order to meet the Lord in peace. Fall upon your knees, repent with godly sorrow for sin, and plead the atoning blood of Christ for the redemption -Lawrence Pruitt of your soul.

With this March issue the "Faith and Victory" paper is beginning its 44th year of publication. Needless to say, this gospel printing work and paper has weathered many storms, and stands today as a witness of God's preservation and a verification of His unfailing promises to those who would step out by faith and obey His call. Even as Abraham of old answered God's call and by faith "went out, not knowing whither he went" (Heb. 11:8), so my father, Fred Pruitt, responded to God's call, left his farming occupation on the homestead on the plains of New Mexico in 1918, and devoted his entire life and means to his new and untried field of spreading the gospel by the press in addition to the pulpit. God is still looking for vessels whom He can use. "For the eyes of the Lord run to and fro throughout the whole earth, to shew himself strong in the behalf of them whose heart is perfect toward him." 2 Chron. 16:9.

As the second one of the family of six children, this writer grew up with the gospel publishing work. Looking back over those early crucial years, he remembers vividly a number of severe trials of faith in keeping the printed page going forth to the people. Many times the family did without sufficient food in order to save money to buy paper, ink and postage. "Give us this day our daily bread" was not a mere formality. Yet those days were good for us, as we witnessed remarkable and definite answers to prayer. We learned the valuable lessons of walking by faith, that "without faith it is impossible to please God," and that "this is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith." 1 Jno. 5:4. ("God's Gracious Dealings," a 240-page autobiography of the life and labors of the late Fred Pruitt, is available at this office for 50c, postpaid.)

The first seven years the paper was published without a subscription price, sent out freely to all who wanted a copy, but the postage rate then was extremely high on free printed matter. In order to secure the much more reasonable second class postage rates, we were required to set a subscription price and maintain a bonafide paid subscription list. The present price of 35c per year does not pay the cost of producing the paper, but it does place it in reach of all and encourages a wider circulation. Over the years the unmet difference in the cost has been supplied by the Lord through His people who hear His voice and give freely to spread the gospel message of salvation through faith in Christ's atonement.

This literature ministry is primarily and essentially a work of faith in God. It is God's work and it has been proved that He will take care of His own. As "workers together" with the Lord we are delighted in His service, and we appreciate all those who have and are faithfully supporting the literature ministry by your prayers and finance. Your treasures are being laid up in heaven where your affections are centered. What you have sown you will reap in everlasting happiness.

The devoted child of God will not only give to the Lord of his increase while in this life, but also he will, if possible, direct by a will or trust that his assets or estate be used to the glory of God after his departure to the Glory world. Unfortunately, in some cases the estates of saints never benefit God's cause. If one dies intestate (not having made a will), then the court divides the estate according to the State statutes and often God's cause receives no benefit. A Christian will is one in which provisions are made for the advancement of the cause of Christ. Indeed you want to know that the pure standard of Bible truth will be held up to the world after you are gone, so do not neglect the important matter of making a Christian will. Any reputable attorney will assist you in writing out your wishes in a legal manner for a nominal fee.

A popular pastor, whose congregation gives about \$300,000 a year to missions, wrote recently: "I know of no other way by which we can carry out our Lord's command to reach every creature, apart from the printed page. I know of no method to compare with the printed page. It is needed on every field. The Bible says, "The gospel must first be published among all nations.' Well, then, let us publish it. Let us put out simple salvation messages, filled with Scripture, and let us circulate them far and wide. Why then waste God's money? Why not put it where it will count most? Why not invest it in the printed page?"

Sister Dorothy Wilson, one of our faithful coworkers here at the office, received the shocking news of the death of her sister, Gertrude Bunting, on Feb. 4, the auto accident occurring that day near Dinuba, Calif. The next day she left by plane for California to be with the family. (My wife, Maybelle Pruitt, accompanied her to Los Angeles where she visited relatives and friends in that area.)

The greatest comfort to the family is that Sister Bunting met the Lord in peace, and our loss, though great, is her eternal gain. The righteous have that bright hope of meeting her again, never to part. Let us pray for all the bereaved family, that her Homegoing will beckon the others to prepare and make the circle unbroken up there.

Sister Wilson returned to the office on Feb. 14. We certainly appreciate her and her husband, Clifford Wilson, as well as all the other workers, for their sacrificial labors in helping to get out the gospel by the printed page. May God's sustaining grace be their portion each day, knowing that they "have in heaven a better and an enduring substance." Heb. 10:34.

Sixty years ago, on March 14, 1906, the congregation of the Church of God, Sixth and W. Warner, Guthrie, Okla., was issued a charter by the Secretary of Oklahoma Territory. The five members of the board of trustees were as follows: R. L. Glasgow, pastor and chairman, C. N. Jones, J. L. Glasgow, G. W. Winn and Geo. D. Oldham, an uncle to Dale Oldham of the Christian Brotherhood Hour. These original charter members are deceased, but the services of the Church of God have continued over the years at the same location, though the original frame building was replaced in the year of 1952 with a masonry structure.

Since 1906 many members have come and gone from the number to join the family of God in heaven. God has remarkably preserved the congregation, and apparently the compromise of 1910-12 did not seriously affect it. The precious principles of Bible truth which the pioneer ministers of this congregation and the "evening light" reformation taught have been maintained in spite of opposition from many angles. The present pastor is Bro. Ira D. Stover who has spent many years in the gospel work in various fields of labor.

Forty years ago, in December, 1925, this writer, then a boy of 14 years under deep conviction, was gloriously saved, along with others of his age, one night during the annual Assembly meeting here at the Guthrie chapel. Bro. Ostis B. Wilson, Sr. had preached a soul-stirring sermon that night. The house was crowded, but we made our way to the altar. That was the turning point in my life. I had come to the crossroads, and Jesus won my heart and affections. Thank the Lord! The burden of sin was rolled away. I counted the cost, paid the price and today God's service is my greatest delight. —L. D. P.

REPORT OF MEXICO MISSION WORK

Patzcuaro, Mexico—Dear Fellow Laborers: As we begin this letter to you, we want to take this opportunity to say that by God's grace we are saved, sanctified and our only desire is to spend and be spent for God. He gave His all for our redemption and we have a great debt to pay.

As this new year came and we have completed one year here, we are more challenged than ever before to be kept in a way that God can use us in His service.

We were privileged to be in the California Assembly meeting in December and feel that we were blessed by having been there, trusting that we will be better equipped to serve God in this place.

We are grateful for your prayers for the work of God here in Patzcuaro. We feel very encouraged this evening. Yesterday in children's meeting there were around 30 children who were attentive to the gospel stories. Today there were more than 50 in service. (At times before there were 9 to 15 people.) Today there were not enough benches and chairs to seat them all. The Lord gave a message about obedience taken mainly from 1st Samuel 15. God's Spirit was felt and He was dealing with souls. When the altar call was given, two came to the altar weeping their way and received the help they sought. We truly feel that God is working in this place, so let's pray on and on.

We have met two very serious and delicate problems since we returned from the meeting and we earnestly ask you to remember these requests to God in prayer and for us that everything will be done by divine inspiration, wisdom, love, and understanding.

Perhaps you remember us writing of Pablo who was so very ill and God in His mercy blessed him and he found the Lord as his Saviour. I am sorry to say that we are afraid for his soul's condition today. Please remember him to God in prayer, for he is a very needy man in his soul and body. Also, pray for a poor woman who has T. B. in the last stages. Today she told us that she is ready to meet God. She has a good testimony and is measuring up to God's Word.

There have been new contacts made and some have been coming to services. But let us pray above all that God's Spirit will deal with these souls and they will be saved and live for God.

As we close this letter, we want to say that we deeply appreciate you and your interest in God's work in this place. Please continue to pray for us that we may serve God acceptably in every way. May God bless you is our prayer.

MISSION WORK IN INDIA

In a letter dated Feb. 3, Bro. V., minister in South India, acknowledged receipt of a down payment from the Missionary Fund to start building the new chapel on land which he set apart for that purpose. He expressed appreciation to the saints for their concern and compassion for precious souls in that country. He is kept busy traveling, answering calls for meetings, besides keeping up a heavy correspondence.

The large tract which he translated into the native language will soon be off the press for free distribution.

Bro. V. expresses the urgent need at present for three central cemeteries, as "the poor saints in different places are in a dilemma as to where they will bury their dead." Each cemetery will cost about \$250. The brethren at one

center promised to furnish one-half of the cost if they could get help from abroad for the other half. Accordingly, on Feb. 15 we mailed to Bro. V. \$125 to meet the need at this particular place. Now there remains the need for cemeteries at the other two locations.

The cost of the new chapel will be at least \$1,000, which, added to the cost of these cemeteries and ministers' living and traveling expenses, means that regular giving by the church will be necessary in order to keep the gospel work progressing in that great sub-continent of India with its teeming millions in sin's dark night.

NIGERIAN MISSIONARY REPORT

Bro. B. U. Etuk, minister of the Nigerian mission in West Africa, wrote under date of February 3, thanking all the contributors to the missionary fund which aids the Nigerian work. He says "the field is widening without measure," and trust that "God who is rich in mercy will supply every need."

Bro. Etuk writes that the Christians and their work have not been affected by the political trouble in Nigeria, for which they are very grateful.

Bro. Jackson Etuk, who lives in another district, wrote on Feb. 4 that he had brought in 18 congregations to the Church of God mission. He and Bro. B. U. Etuk were planning a trip to Ikot Ekpene District to bring in about 14 more congregations. Using these comparative figures, it is easy to see that they have more congregations in Nigeria than we have in this country. Whether the church here can nearly totally support the much larger work there is a question. In fact, we have repeatedly encouraged Bro. Etuk by letter to teach his members and congregations to become self-supporting and that they will not prosper spiritually until they are contributing from what they have to their own maintenance. However, "let us not be weary in well-doing" until they are able to discern their Scriptural duty on this line.

A one-third down payment was sent to Bro. Etuk from the Missionary Fund on Jan. 24 to start a substantial building to be used as a house of prayer or infirmary to care for the sick while they are being prayed for. Bros. Inyang and Sunday Udo Udo itemized eleven cases of individuals who were completely healed recently at the Ukpom congregation in answer to prayer. Seven other cases were there to be prayed for, and they stay until they are healed. They write that the preacher's house and the church building are congested due to the many sick people. God is certainly honoring their simple faith and working miracles.

Bro. Etuk enclosed the typewritten report of the mission activities for the month of January written by Bro. Nse B. Umanah, the secretary. On various Sundays of the month they were in services with several of the new groups who have recently accepted the teachings of the mission. They were favorably impressed with the sincerity of these new people.

Bro. Umanah reports that during this dry season of the year an epidemic of measles is in all the congregations, attacking young and old. He requests special prayer of the church for quick relief from this epidemic.

Let us agree in prayer for the eradication of this disease, and especially for the spiritual needs of Nigeria's 56 million people. Resident missionaries from the church here in the U. S. are desperately needed. Who will hear God's call and dedicate their lives to the cause of Christ and precious souls on the mission field? Pastors, are you challenging your young people with the call of the mission

field, or do you console them in settling down in comfortable homes to the neglect of the Great Commission? Christ's Spirit is a missionary spirit. —Lawrence Pruitt

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

Our lesson continues about man. Last Sunday we talked about man being redeemed and brought back to God from sin through the gift of God's Son. God's great love for man is beyond comprehension. Now today we want to talk about the wonderful privileges that man

has since his redemption.

We notice that there was perfect fellowship and communion between Jesus and his Father. The disciples longed to have the same communion. He taught them to take the place of a son and look up to God, with utter helplessness, as their father. He then taught them what to ask for according to their needs. If we have sinned we need to ask for forgiveness. If we do not forgive others, God will not forgive us. We do not deliberately seek temptation, but sometimes when we are going God's way, temptations will come, but we can be assured that God will deliver us from evil and make us overcomers.

Our faith should be increased when we know that God will give to us much more than our earthly parents because His compassion is much greater. The disciples witnessed the works of Jesus and had fellowship with

Him and so can we.

31 Let all bitterness, and wrath, and anger, and clamour, and evil speaking, be put away from you, with all malice:

32 And be ye kind one to another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you.

James 2:8 If ye fulfill the royal law according to the scripture, Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself, ye do well:

9 But if ye have respect to persons, ye commit sin, and are convinced of the law as transgressors.

10 For whoseever shall keep the whole law, and yet offend in one point, he is guilty of all.

14 What doth it profit, my brethren, though a man say he hath faith, and have not works? can faith save him?

15 If a brother or sister be naked, and destitute of daily food,

16 And one of you say unto them, Depart in peace, be ye warmed and filled; notwithstanding ye give them not those things which are needful to the body; what doth it profit?

17 Even so faith, if it hath not works, is dead, being

alone.

18 Yea, a man may say, Thou hast faith, and I have works; shew me thy faith without thy works, and I will shew thee my faith by my works.

Memory Verse: Let love be without dissimulation. Abhor that which is evil; cleave to that which is good. Be kindly affectioned one to another with brotherly love; in honour preferring one another. Romans 12:9, 10.

Practical Truth: We are to give others faith, hope, and love.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

It is very important for each of us to know how to live with others. It is true as the Scriptures say, "For none of us liveth to himself." (Rom. 14:7.) Daily we cross the paths of others. If we love others as we love ourselves we will be very careful how we treat them. We will not want to injure them in any way, whether it would be by action, deed or speech. Sometimes we know things concerning others and because it is true we might feel we can tell it, but if it injures them or reflects upon them we should not tell it. Job has given us a little insight on how to feel or treat others by these precious words: "If your soul were in my soul's stead." (Job 16:4). Let us put ourselves in the other person's place, sit in his seat for awhile, look out his windows and walk down his path. Things would look differently then. One time two wonderful children of God had a deep misunderstanding. It was pointed out to both of them when they were together, how much they had suffered. They began to tell of their sufferings. God melted their hearts togther and the misunderstanding was wiped out. They had begun to sit in each other's seat.

We must be tender and listen to the Spirit of God and not grieve Him. He will ever lead us in right paths by being our brother's keeper. We will work with our hands in an honest way and keep a forgiving spirit toward all. We will not give place to the devil.

Memory Verse: I beseach you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. Romans 12:1.

Practical Truth: We must serve God with all of our heart, mind, soul and strength.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

Our souls should be stirred today as we study this lesson. God wants our all. Jesus gave His all. He drank the whole cup, but as the poet has aptly said, we take just one sip. We have been bought with a price. We are not our own. (1 Cor. 6:20) Why then do we act as if we have so many rights and need to be treated with such importance? God resists the proud but He gives grace to the humble. (James 4:6) We need to take the humble place and realize that we must always seek those things above and keep our affections there.

Jesus taught these truths to those who wanted to follow him or whom he called. We must be willing to go where He calls. It might call us away from many comforts of life. I heard Sister Opal Wilson say a number of years ago that she was willing for the Lord to call her away from her good bed. He did just that and she laid down her life in Africa while ministering to others.

Others may have to bury our dead and we might be called to leave them without farewells, but the King's business requires haste. It must be first in our lives, for we are dead to the rudiments and ordinances of this world and our life is hid with Christ in God. When Jesus appears in the clouds of glory, then we shall also appear with Him.

THE NATURE OF THE CHURCH

1 Cor. 12:12, 13, 27; Col. 1:18-20; 1 Peter 2:4-10

1 Cor. 12:12 For as the body is one, and hath many members, and all the members of that one body, being many, are one body: so also is Christ.

13 For by one Spirit are we all baptized into one body, whether we be Jews or Gentiles, whether we be bond or free; and have been all made to drink into one Spirit.

- 27 Now ye are the body of Christ, and members in particular.
- Col. 1:18 And he is the head of the body, the church: who is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead; that in all things he might have the preeminence.
- 19 For it pleased the Father that in him should all fulness dwell:
- 20 And, having made peace through the blood of his cross, by him to reconcile all things unto himself; by him, I say, whether they be things in earth, or things in heaven.
- 1 Pet. 2:4 To whom coming, as unto a living stone, disallowed indeed of men, but chosen of God, and precious,
- 5 Ye also, as lively stones, are built up a spiritual house, an holy priesthood, to offer up spiritual sacrifices, acceptable to God by Jesus Christ.
- 6 Wherefore also it is contained in the scripture, Behold, I lay in Sion a chief corner stone, elect, precious: and he that believeth on him shall not be confounded.
- 7 Unto you therefore which believe he is precious: but unto them which be disobedient, the stone which the builders disallowed, the same is made the head of the corner.
- 8 And a stone of stumbling, and a rock of offence, even to them which stumble at the word, being disobedient: whereunto also they were appointed.
- 9 But ye are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, an holy nation, a peculiar people; that ye should shew forth the praises of him who hath called you out of darkness into his marvelous light:
- 10 Which in time past were not a people, but are now the people of God: which had not obtained mercy, but now have obtained mercy.

Memory Verse: And I say also unto thee, That thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it. Matt. 16:18.

Practical Truth: The church of God is made up of each soul that is saved.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

Our memory verse points out that the basic truth Peter uttered was the rock upon which the church is built. Peter said, "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." The church has a firm foundation. We each are lively stones in the building, which is a habitation of the Spirit. (Eph. 2:19-22)

The body of Christ, which is the church, (Eph. 1: 22, 23) is one, and each of us who are "born again" of the Spirit, are members of the whole unit. Each of us has our place. We need to work and stay in the place the Lord has called us. Each member of our natural body is important and so is each one that is in the body of Christ. When one member suffers, all the members suffer. If you strike your thumb with a hammer the other hand is quick to grab it. The whole body suffers with it. What a beautiful example that is, of the church of God.

The precious stone, which is Christ, was rejected by men. The Jews refused to accept Christ as their Saviour. Jesus became a "stone of stumbling" to them. He told them that their "house was left unto them desolate." They wanted His blood to be upon them and their children.

We have a royal calling and are a separate people. We are kings and priests reigning in this life over all the power of the devil. The Spirit of Christ within us does not blend with the spirit of this world. —Marie Miles
