A Pioneer Mother

The pioneer mothers endured many hardships in rearing their children and helping to develop the new lands in these United States. These trying experiences produced in them the wisdom, courage, determination and strength of character for which they are known.

My mother, Mary Ann Pruitt, was a pioneer woman. Married to my father, Fred Pruitt, in Kansas in the year of 1906, she went as a young bride that same year to the territory of New Mexico (not admitted to the union as a state until 1912) to make a home on 160 acres of virgin land on which my father had previously filed a claim for homestead purposes. They were required to live on and improve it for five years before they could obtain a clear title. The area was a vast plain or prairie with no trees and very little rainfall. The homestead was about forty miles northwest of Portales which was the closest railroad town where they could get supplies. Many hardships lay ahead of them. My father made a "dugout" which was four feet deep, eight feet wide and ten feet long. Over this "dugout" he built a room with the floor two feet above the ground level. In winter they lived in the "dugout" and in summer in the room above. Many times my mother told me of the hardships she underwent as they faced together the many obstacles that go with that kind of life. Later, my father wrote in his book, "God's Gracious Dealings," about those days with these words: "I can hardly keep back the tears . . . when I think of the hardships that accompanied this pioneer life, and how my young wife bravely stayed with me through it all. . . ." They suffered the loss of property, loss of crops from dry years, and had to haul every drop of water by wagon twelve or thirteen miles for themselves and the livestock to drink. Fence posts, and firewood for cooking had to be hauled 35 miles from a canyon. They also buried two infants. Those first six or seven years of their married life were mostly poverty and extreme hardships.

What was the Lord doing all this time as He looked down upon these two who did not serve Him nor know much about Him? He was preparing them in the school of hard knocks for something ahead. They heard the gospel preached, and in the year of 1915 they were both saved. Soon after, they heard the call of God to be pioneers for God in the gospel work. My father made appointments to preach at various schoolhouses as far as thirty miles from their homestead, traveling to these appointments in a Model T Ford. The Lord called for greater service and sacrifice. In 1917, they had a farm sale, rented out the farm and moved to Clovis, New Mexico, eighteen miles away, where there was a congregation of the Church of God pastored by Brother George Harmon. From Clovis, he made some evangelistic trips to other states. Then in 1918, at the Lord's direction, he and his family moved here to Guthrie, Oklahoma, where the Lord worked it out for my father to learn the printing trade in a small shop which published only gospel literature. Later, my parents sold their homestead and other property in New Mexico, and placed the proceeds in the purchase of the family home at 924 W. Mansur and the erection of printshop buildings—first, at 611 W. Mansur, and later, in 1926, at 920 W. Mansur—for the purpose of publishing gospel literature and making it available to all people. Of course, their personal funds soon ran out, and since that time it has been essentially a work supported by faith in God. In 1923, the first edition of the "Faith and Victory" paper was printed and mailed out free of charge, and continued without a subscription price for seven years.

My mother had a family of six children—three boys and three girls. She took care of the home and helped in the office when she could. She would be writing letters, helping with the office correspondence, many times at night after she had gotten the children to bed. She also had the workers, who helped in the office, living in her home. This was an added burden, as you know, their way would not always be her way of doing things. She had the washing to do for the young brethren, had to manage the buying and do the cooking for the large group. There were many times that money was very scarce and she would try to fix meals without sufficient ingredients to make certain dishes. In those years they could afford to buy only skim milk which was used only for cereal and cooking. If we had unexpected company, Mother would call one of us aside and tell us that when the eggs were passed around for breakfast not to take any, as there wasn't enough to go around. She, of course, would always do without first before she asked us to do so. She gave her company the best she had. Our home was the usual stopping-place of the readers of the literature when they were in Guthrie. Mother would sometimes tell us to dip lightly from a dish of food so our company would have plenty.

Many times I saw tears in Mother's eyes, but, of course, I didn't understand it all. She wanted us to be happy. In later years she told us girls of how it hurt her so much because we didn't have very many nice clothes. She had to buy the cheapest material with which to make our clothes. Those were difficult days for my pioneer mother, but she had been prepared for them, and she knew how to look to the Lord for added strength and grace. Sometimes an issue of the paper would be printed and in the mail sacks, but it remained there until God supplied the money for the postage, and He never failed. My parents served the Lord in their calling to the gospel work, and His work always came first.

My mother received some inheritance money. She used it to buy a new 1927 Chevrolet car and to help build the present office building. It was our first enclosed car. For several winters previously, my father had taken pneumonia from going out in cold weather to meetings and to pray for the sick in the old Model T Ford whose loose side curtains offered little protection. Again,

my mother thought of others. The car was used in gospel work.

"Children, come on now. Let us go into the living room and have worship," mother would say, when we were with her in the kitchen. My father would be waiting for us to come. Worship time was held in our home morning and night. We sang a song or two, and my father would read from the Bible or from the Bible story book. Then we knelt in prayer. All of us took turns and prayed.

Mother took time to listen to our problems. She would advise us on many lines, and taught us solid Christian principles. She also used the leather strap to remind us that we needed to obey her. She truly was a good mother.

Many times mother was called to pray for others who were sick. God honored her prayers and healed them. When we were sick, our mother and father prayed for us, and God healed us. They never thought of calling the doctor or giving medicine, but trusted fully in God. As long as I was at home, I never remember my mother bringing a meal to my bed. They would pray for us, and then we would get up and go to the table if we wanted to eat.

My parents did not leave me one penny of inheritance, but the life for God that they lived is worth more to me than millions of dollars. I thank God for my pioneer mother and father.

WHAT SIN WILL KEEP YOU OUT OF HEAVEN?

mit in ourselves. Some think they are being "merciful" because they overlook sin, or excuse it in the lives of others.

God is a merciful God. His mercy is beyond our human conception. We are sometimes enabled to catch a clearer realization of it when we see it manifested toward those who have sinned, and who seek God's pardon. But God will not overlook or excuse sin if it is continued in. His Word tells us He is of purer eyes than to behold evil, and He can't look on iniquity. Hab. 1:13. God will forgive sin when it is repented of and forsaken. However, the only way God can do this is through the shed blood of Jesus Christ. That is why Jesus came, suffered, bled and died on the cross—to atone for men's sins, and to open the way of forgiveness and deliverance from sin. Before Jesus came, there was no deliverance from sin as there is today. Jesus came to destroy the works of the devil. 1 John 3:8. He came to give us liberty and to set us free from the awful curse of sin.

The devil, hating the Son of God, thought to destroy Jesus through death, but that only brought to pass the plan and fulfillment of all God's promises for deliverance from sin. When Jesus was nailed on the cross, and delivered for our transgressions, what a defeat, what a crushing blow was dealt to Satan! Now men can be saved from sin! No longer does sin have dominion or rule over us.

Ah, but sin is still raging in this world in spite of the great love and mercy of God that opened the fountain of blood where men can be cleansed and delivered from all sin. Why? Because, like Herod and his men, people still set Jesus "at naught." What does "naught" mean? The dictionary defines it as: "nothing, zero, worthless, of little value." Jesus is considered of "little value" in the present day. He is rejected as King in the hearts and lives of mankind, even as He was in Pilate's and Herod's day.

Jesus came to save sinners. There is no sin too great to be forgiven. Let us consider some who found deliverance from sin.

Think of the thief on the cross, who was crucified at the same time as Jesus. The Bible describes him as a "malefactor, a thief." A malefactor is a criminal. Surely, the two men who were crucified with Jesus were great sinners, or very wicked men, because crucifixion was reserved for the very worst criminals. Yet one of the thieves turned to Jesus (while the other railed on Jesus) and prayed, "Lord, remember me when thou comest into thy kingdom." (Let us note that the thief first acknowledged his own transgressions!) Luke 23:40, 41. Jesus graciously forgave this man. Oh, what mercy and grace is opened to the sinner if only he will acknowledge his transgressions and seek God's pardon!

Think of the woman taken in adultery—"in the very act." John 8:3, 11. She was not condemned to death by Jesus. She was delivered from her sin, and told to "go and sin no more."

One time, a person, speaking to me of her belief that we could not be delivered from sin, used the Scripture, "He that is without sin among you, let him first cast a stone at her." Immediately, the Spirit gave the answer, "Go and sin no more." Would Jesus tell someone to do the impossible?

Then there was the woman at the well as recorded in John 4:7-29. She had had five husbands and was then living with another man. But as she acknowledged her sin, Jesus gave her the water of life—salvation. So we see that adultery in the lowest degree was forgiven by the Lord.

In 1 Cor. 6:9-11, Paul lists a catalog of sins from which the Corinthians had been delivered. "And such were some of you, but ye are washed, but ye are sanctified, but ye are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and by the Spirit of our God." If we look at that catalog everyone of us who is saved by the grace of God can find our past sins there. Were these not great sins? Yet we were delivered from them.

Consider the Apostle Paul, who was once "Saul, the persecutor." Ah, what havoc he wrought of the church! Acts 8:3. In his own words, he calls himself "a blasphemer. and a persecutor, and injurious." 1 Timothy 1:13. Yet he obtained mercy. Paul's zeal as a religious Pharisee was "persecuting the church." Phil. 3:6. God forgave "Saul, the persecutor," and Saul became Paul, the great apostle, who suffered great things for the name of Jesus.

We know also that the demon-possessed people found deliverance and salvation when they came in contact with Jesus. Mark 5:1-20; Matt. 12:22, and many others.

Can we think of any sin that was not forgiven by Jesus? So we see that no matter how wicked or sinful we might be, Jesus will forgive us if we repent with godly sorrow. "Though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow." Isa. 1:18. Jesus came to seek and save the lost (sinners). No sin you may have committed will keep you out of heaven, if you confess your sin to the Lord, repent and willingly forsake your sin.

There is only one sin that can cause you to be forever lost-if you set Jesus "at naught." That will cause you to be lost forever! "At naught"-of no value, not worthwhile, despised, rejected as your Saviour. If you say as the multitude did then, "Away with him, crucify him, crucify him!" —then, you will be barred out of heaven. It's possible you may have already been doing this in your life. You haven't been interested or concerned about your soul. You have thought only about a good time; or the things you wanted to do, to get, and to be. You had no time to think of your soul, but now you realize you need something more to make life complete, satisfying and worthwhile. There is still mercy extended to you! What you have been doing, you were doing in ignorance and unbelief. God will forgive and receive you if you repent and seek Him now! If, however, you refuse again, reject, and "set Him at naught"; oh, what danger you are in! Danger of eternal damnation and of missing heaven!

Can you really think, deep in your heart, that One who loved you so, and gave Himself for you, is "of naught"? Can you read the account of Jesus' death on the cross, and not be touched in your heart? It was your sins (and mine) that helped nail Him to that cross. He died willingly for you and me, so each of us could be saved. Can you do less than love and serve Him, or will you again "set Him at naught"?

They destroyed the paddy rice fields, completely sucking the milk out of the plants. All the farmers are desperate. As you know, we depend mainly on rice for our food, and this loss of the rice fields has resulted in unlimited famine. Pray that God might save us from this famine and pestilence.

PROFITABLE MISSION TRIP TO MEXICO

Dear saints scattered abroad: Greetings in the precious name of our living Savior and Redeemer. How precious it is to my soul to be among the redeemed of God who are not afraid to stand in the truth which God has given us in His divine and ever-faithful Word!

I would like to report to all of the faithfulness and goodness of God to us on our trip which was completed this morning (April 23) at 5:30. He was ever faithful to protect and keep us and bring us safely over some 4200 miles of very dry and rugged country in visiting the several native missionaries in various sections of Mexico

Bro. James Huskey and myself, being led of the Lord to visit several new workers as well as other contacts and native missionaries in Mexico, left Guthrie on Friday morning, April 4, in my VW camper which the Lord helped me restore from the accident in Baja, Mexico, a couple of years ago, when it was badly damaged. Brother Huskey felt impressed of the Lord to visit a new Brother. Efrain, who lives in a small town about six miles south of Ciudad Mante, 284 miles south of Reynosa, where we crossed the border. We found Bro. Efrain at home with his father who also is devoted to the Word. His mother, also a lover of the Word, came home later. Efrain is only 19, but truly devoted to the Lord. We visited one family, who worships with them, living a couple of miles out of Celaya, and they, too, are holding family worship regularly, but desire more victory. The Lord again impressed us to speak to them of growth in the Word which we found they needed very much. We hung our gas lantern on a post in the yard and sat around there and discussed the Word for about four hours. Others who saw our light came in. About ten young people were there listening also. When we got back to Celaya, there was a young man who wanted prayer for a special problem.

The previous night we had a meeting with Efrain's family in the yard and several, seeing the light, came in. (There is no electricity in Celaya.) On Sunday, we heard of one village which had literally chased previous mission-aries out and were ready to tie them up when they came back, but one man who was interested in the gospel went down the road and warned them. We were impressed to go see this man as his 28-year-old son was in the hospital from an accident. The father had sought out Efrain before, seeking the truth, so we went up to the village. We found they had put up a barbed wire fence and gate, but the Lord got us in with no difficulty and we found the man and talked to him; later visiting his son in the hospital.

We traveled on to Uruapan and found Bro. Irineo Rama and family encouraged. They have a new baby, three weeks old, their fourth boy, Noe. They also have one little girl, Olga, about three years old. We bought enough roofing to finish the roof on the chapel and ce-

ment to pour one-half of the floor. We were able to hold Easter services in it on Sat. and Sun. Three families came down from San Lorenzo, a couple families from another town and some neighbors came in. We had a very precious time. (Bro. Irineo is continuing the work to finish the chapel, mainly the floor, partition and doors.)

We had a couple of incidents indicating the power of a tract. Brother Efrain picked up a tract that had been thrown out the window of Bro. Huskey's van a couple of years ago and wrote to this office for information. He said to me, "There is something different in you folks from these other missionaries here."

Another incident, we were going from Uruapan to another town to have a meeting and picked up a family. We gave them a tract and the woman immediately became interested, wanting to know where she could learn more. She came over to the meeting that night, as she lived in that town.

We went over to the west coast of Mexico and Bro. Huskey flew over to La Paz to see Bro. Miguel Gaspar who is living there now. He has had some very severe trials with the loss of his oldest girl in an accident and another child who broke her arm. The baby has been sick, mostly due to malnutrition, but he was not discouraged and felt there were a number of opportunities there to serve the Lord. He has a job paying about \$4.00 a day and lives in a small house (more like a shed), but has hopes of building something for the family.

We were unable to take the car across to Baja and continue up the peninsula, as previously we wanted to do, because of the flu I developed, so we returned home by way of the mountains and through Piedras Negras, stopping to see Bro. Sanchez and family. Their 21-year-old boy had had an accident and was in bed. We had a chance to talk to him about his soul and he wants to follow the Lord.

We surely want to thank the Lord for a safe and profitable journey for the Lord. There is much Catholic opposition to the gospel there yet, but the Lord is opening up many opportunities for planting the truth of His Word. Pray for these faithful workers there, and for the many who are seeking the truth that God's Word may be more abundantly applied.

Pray for the endeavors of the Huskey family, myself and others who feel led to go this summer to help our dear brethren in Mexico. We want to take windows for the chapel and used hand tools for the carpentry shop. We are also looking to the Lord to lead and supply equipment for gospel radio programs in the interior area of Mexico.
