God Is Everywhere

There is a message that the Creator of all things has written to man that is so plain and evident, and yet so overlooked by the majority of mankind. It is not written in books, nor proclaimed over the pulpit as clearly and as loudly as it is in its own setting where God wrote it. It is so obvious and so common that mankind in his pride and loftiness of heart so seldom dreams that it could be.

Of this, Paul, the apostle of Jesus Christ, was speaking when he said in Rom. 1:19, 20: "Because that which may be known of God is manifest in them; for God hath shewed it unto them. For the invisible things of him from the creation of the world are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made, even his eternal power and Godhead; so that they are without excuse." Listen to this: The invisible eternal things are clearly seen. How are they seen? By the things that are made! In each and every part of God's creation is revealed the truth and goodness of God. The animal kingdom, the plant kingdom, and the realm of men are full of vivid, undeniable proofs that there is a Master-Mind, an intelligent, affectionate Being back of all things. The Holy Scripture also declares that the things that are seen were made from things unseen. See Hebrews 11:3. All the theories of evolution and the logic of mortal man are not built on truth, but all on how things appear. It is pride and blindness in the hearts of men that causes them to want to deny the force and existence of an eternal God. And then it is pride and hardness of hearts that deny His power when they profess to know Him.

Psalm 19:1-4 tells us: "The heavens declare the glory of God; and the firmament sheweth his handywork. Day unto day uttereth speech, and night unto night sheweth knowledge. There is no speech nor language, where their voice is not heard. Their line is gone out through all the earth, and their words to the end of the world." Oh, what wonderful knowledge! Surely, as we look up into the heavens and the splendor and majesty of the night, our hearts are

awed with worship and adoration and belief in that wonderful God who is back of it all.

And then we think of how the Spirit of God has been sent forth into all the earth. His presence is everywhere. If man will hear His voice and be willing to serve his Maker sincerely, he can find Him. Man is without excuse as far as God is concerned. God has done everything possible and needful to make access for man to Himself. But He wants man to seek with earnest and fervent desire.

Solomon, the king of Israel, was given a special gift of wisdom. But he wrote that wisdom stands in the midst of the concourse of men and lifts up her voice and calls to them. See Prov. 1:20, 21 and also 8:1-4. Wherever man is found, there can be heard the voice of wisdom calling and speaking to the sons of men. And then on top of all of this, Jesus, the Saviour, has come into the world and shed His blood to save man from the terrible night of sin. He has sent His word and His gospel to reprove and convict man, and exhorts him to repent and be saved from sin and evil. He said, "He that hath an ear to hear, let him hear."

We need to realize that God is everywhere and is speaking to our souls. Jesus said, "I stand at the door and knock!" And surely He is, but who is it that will listen and open up the door? How about you, dear friend? Are you living such a life of pride, greed, and selfishness that you do not hear the voice of God calling you? How sad it will be on the Judgment Day when the Lord has to say, "I called you, but you would not hear." Today, while you still have a chance, if you will hear God's voice, you should listen and give heed.

"Resist Not Evil"

A Christian family returned home from their vacation to find their backyard in chaos. They were shocked to see the children's play house destroyed, the shrubs and flowers pulled up. They did not know that they had any enemies on the block where they lived. They had been friendly with all of them. The Sister went over to the next door neighbor to ask about what had happened, and she shut the door in her face. On making further inquiry, she found out that the neighbor had a drinking party and all but two families in the block had been invited. During the party they had torn up this family's back yard. This was such a shock to them that they were in tears. They prayed about it and asked God to give

them grace. The neighbors mistreated them. They were told that they didn't want them in the neighborhood and they wanted them to move. They tried to sell their house, but couldn't. This went on for about a year.

Now what caused this trouble to come to those who loved God? They had not done anything to deserve this kind of treatment. How should they face this problem which was so grievous?

Dear children of God, we must realize that the devil is at the bottom of all of our troubles. We are not to resist the people, nor try to return evil for evil. Jesus has said, "That ye resist not evil." Matt. 5:39. If we can't do that, then what are our weap-"For though we walk in the flesh, we do not war after the flesh: For the weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but mighty through God to the pulling down of strong holds." 2 Cor. 10:3, 4. We are not fighting against "flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers" (Eph. 6:12), and other means that the devil uses to work through. So our weapons are spiritual weapons. We are to do as Jesus instructed us to do. "Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you; that ye may be the children of your Father which is in heaven." Matt. 5:44, 45. So our weapons are love, doing good, and prayer. Oh, yes, we want to be the children of God. Then if we do, we must follow His instructions and resist not evil. We must use the weapons that He has given to us. We can do this if we locate who is causing the trouble. It is the devil, so we must use spiritual weapons against him. He will try to keep us from using God's weapons, so we must resist the devil. We must not let the devil cause any ill feeling to creep into our hearts. The devil causes these things to come against us so he can kill the Christ-life out of our souls. That is his main purpose. We must guard that life of Christ in our souls. We do not fight the people, but fight against the devil that would try to cause us to lose our souls. "Recompense to no man evil for evil. Provide things honest in the sight of all men. If it be possible, as much as lieth in you, live peaceably with all men. Dearly beloved, avenge not yourselves, but rather give place unto wrath: for it is written, Vengeance is mine: I will repay, saith the Lord. Therefore if thine enemy hunger, feed him; if he thirst, give him drink: for in so doing thou shalt heap coals of fire on his head. Be not overcome with evil, but overcome evil with good." Rom. 12:17-21. This is a plain course laid out for us so we can keep clear before God and before mankind. This will take much watching unto prayer. But God has promised grace for us in every time of need.

This Christian family tried to be nice to the neighbors. They prayed much for grace. One day the little seven-year-old girl from the family next door came over and told the Sister that she loved her. The Sister assured her that she loved her, too. In their talking, she said she had told her mother that if she didn't love her that God wouldn't love them.

The little girl then said that all of their furniture had been taken (it had been repossessed), and they were all sleeping on the floor. She also mentioned that she hated to see their little babies sleep on the floor. (The woman had two babies about ten months apart). Now this touched the Sister's heart. She had a baby bed, furniture and also clothes in their garage that her children had outgrown. She talked to her husband about it; and in prayer, the Lord told her to give it to the neighbors. She sent a note over to the woman next door and offered her the things. Later, the man came over and apologized for what they had done and accepted the furniture. Soon the woman was nice, and then all the neighbors, one by one, apologized for what they had done and told them that they knew they were Christians or they would not have treated those neighbors so nice after all the evil they had done to them.

Now after a year of persecutions, and things were cleared up, someone came to their door and wanted to buy their house. They sold it and moved. But they did not get a buyer until the trouble was all cleared up in the neighborhood. God had used them as he wanted to before He let them move. It pays to wait on the Lord to work out things with patience. Use the weapons of God's design against the enemy—and victory will come. —Marie Miles

How a State of Entire Sanctification May Be Retained

There are many who once enjoyed the blessing of perfect love who have now lost it. Some have received it several times, and, after all, are now without it. The conditions of retaining perfect love, like the conditions of retaining justification, are the same as those by which it was obtained; namely, a complete submission of the soul to God, and simple faith in Christ for present salvation. This submission and faith, graduated by increasing light and grace, must continue through life if perfect love be retained. To retain this grace:

- 1. You must maintain a continuous entire consecration—a complete self-abandonment to God. "The altar sanctifieth the gift"; and it is only when our all is upon the altar of consecration that we can be in a state of sanctification. No part of the price can ever be taken back if we would retain the witness of perfect love. Your consecration must continue complete, corresponding with increasing light, through all your life; and you will have occasion to watch yourself, and guard this point thoroughly. Keep yourself, your all, submitted to God.
- 2. To retain full salvation, you must continue to believe. "The just shall live by faith." We are "kept by the power of God, through faith, unto salvation." As soon as people cease to believe, they lose the blessing; for "we stand by faith." Sanctified Paul said: "The life which I now live in the flesh, I live by the faith of the Son of God." Faith is the vital bond between the renovated soul and God; and by it we

are to abide in Christ as the branch abides in the vine.

- 3. To retain the witness of the Spirit, and continue in the light of purity, you must confess it. "For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness, and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation." The fear of man often hinders people from this duty. This fear, which brings a snare, must be overcome. Many have resisted the Holy Spirit when they ought to have confessed the blessing, and in this way have lost it. Confessing entire sanctification does not exalt self; it humbles the soul, and gives glory to God. The call for clear witness and specific testimony for holiness is more imperative in some places than in others, as in many places the witnesses for perfect love are very scarce and greatly needed.
- 4. You must live in the spirit of watchfulness. Watch over your heart, and keep it "with all diligence." Watch over your lips, and be jealous of your tongue, and guard against a light and trifling spirit, by which multitudes have fallen into darkness and ruin. Watch for seasons of prayer and special communion with God. Watch for opportunities of doing and receiving good. Watch against the allurements of the world, and against everything that is sensual and has a tendency to lull the soul to sleep. Watch against temptations, and resist them in a moment—steadfast in the faith. "Be sober, be vigilant, because your adversary, the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour."
- 5. You must be faithful to the teachings and drawings of the Holy Spirit. "For as many as are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of God." We must follow the Spirit of God, let consequences be what they may. The Holy Spirit will remind you of duty and you must instantly obey. The Spirit is very easily grieved, and you must promptly attend to all His teachings, or you may in a moment forfeit full redemption. His chosen emblem is the tender dove, and it will take its flight if its gentle monitions be not heeded.

The Spirit teaches and guides mainly by illumination, and little by impressions. He throws light upon nature and providence, but especially upon the Scriptures and our minds, illuminating the sacred page and our path, leading us to truth and duty. His teaching always accords with the Word; hence, we are not to look for dreams, visions, or impressions; these may have served their purpose in the earlier dispensation. We have now the voice of the Spirit—the Bible. We should never assume "wisdom above what is written."

6. You must read the Holy Scriptures daily. The Word of God is the voice of the Spirit. He is grieved when the truth is neglected or disobeyed. The Bible is soul-food. Perfect love will require nourishment daily. If you do not feed it with Bible truth it will die. Holiness furnishes a strong appetite for spiritual aliment. Those who have been the clearest in perfect love are those who have paid the most attention and deference to the Word of God. The Bible

EDITORIALS



Hearty Christian greetings to all our readers: According to our usual practice, no paper was published for the month of August, which allowed time for our faithful co-workers to attend campmeetings in July. However, activity continued here at the Lord's Printshop through most of the summer. The orders for gospel literature were filled almost every work day, and letters were answered.

Quantities of gospel tracts, papers and booklets were sent or taken to various campmeetings and tent meetings for free distribution. Your free-will contributions have made this literature ministry possible, and thereby you are laying up treasures in heaven, as Jesus commanded.

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This writer and his wife were privileged again to attend the National campmeeting at Neosho (Monark Springs), Missouri, which closed with victory on July 28. This was the 37th year that the Lord permitted us to attend this National meeting. The attendance from over the nation was as large or larger than ever, especially the first Sunday when perhaps 1,000 were on the grounds. The Spirit of conviction rested heavily by the preached Word and the long altars were filled with seekers again and again. It was a pleasure to have Bro. John Varghese, native missionary in India, with us here at the office, as well as at the National campmeeting and other campmeetings over the nation. The messages of truth which the Lord gave through him, and his humble Christian spirit won for him a special place in the hearts of the saints wherever he went. His coming has been a mutual benefit to the Church here and in India. May our enlarged missionary vision continue to expand world wide until the gospel of Christ is carried to "every creature" according to Jesus' last commission to His Church. Continue to pray for

Bro. Varghese and Bro. George Hammond, who arrived in India on August 17, that they will be able to secure and put in operation the printing press to publish the gospel in the Malayalam language, as well as to obtain the vehicles needed to carry the gospel to India's millions. In our concern for the vast field of India, let us not forget to pray for and support our faithful missionaries in Nigeria and Mexico.

Dear saints, a very great problem is facing the Lord's Printshop, but it is not too great for our God. The problem is not a spiritual matter, but it does threaten to stop or hinder the publication of the gospel from this office. Please agree with us in earnest prayer that the attack of Satan will be defeated and that this problem will be solved for the glory of God.

Many souls have been saved, believers sanctified, and bodies healed by divine power. At this writing, the campmeetings at Boley, Okla., and Blackford, Ky., are in progress. A number of us from Guthrie attended the Boley meeting on the first Sunday, and others during the following week. The tabernacle was filled to capacity on Sunday and the Word was preached with holy anointing.

We pray and trust that when all the campmeetings are ended for the season no one who heard the gospel invitation will voice this lamentation: "The harvest is past, the summer is ended, and we are not saved." Jer. 8:20. God's Spirit may not strive with that soul again. How sad if He's gone forever!

Christ is the Head of His Church which He purchased with His own blood, and the government is upon His shoulder. Christ rules this divine organization through the agency of the Holy Spirit who is the Executive Officer. He bestows charismatic gifts on men and places each member in the Church as it

pleases Him. This divine charisma enables the possessor to function for the benefit of the Church.

Man-rule — "the image to the beast" — has no place in God's Church, neither the rule by a board or committee in spiritual matters. The true visible Church today does not have a mission board or a tent-meeting board which exercises any authority over the spiritual activity or leadership in these various phases of God's work, neither does the Faith Pub. House claim or use any such authority. Let us continue to function by the gifts of the Spirit, and remember that a divine spiritual gift will make room for itself in the Body of Christ.

America is experiencing the worst crime wave of teen-age delinquency ever known in the history of the world, and crime is increasing four times as fast as the population. The principal cause can be laid at the door of the movies, television and rotten literature.

Television is helping to fill the jails, the hospitals, the insane asylums, the divorce courts, the clinics for venereal disease, the houses of ill-fame and even hell itself. Television is robbing the attendance at the church services and is putting out the spiritual fires of many who once loved God. No one, without exception, can look upon TV for long and be deeply spiritual, or carry a burden for lost souls. Television employs the quickest, surest route to the polluting of the mind and the damning of the soul.

Fifteen years ago (in 1959) the ministers of the Church of God came together to consider the influence of the television in the light of the Scriptures. Here, in part, is their signed decision: "The ministers of the Church of God, seeing the spiritual and moral detriment and sinful influence of the television, definitely believe and teach from the Scriptures that the use of the television is wrong and should have no place in the home. . . . Therefore, we warn every one against its (television's) use, and advise that anyone who has professed to be out in the clear light of God's truth and has begun using the television or bringing it into the home over which they have control (1 Tim. 3:4, 5), has lowered the standard and has disqualified himself as a pattern for the saints."

That which comes over the television has gotten much worse over the years, and the true ministers of God are still crying out against the use of the television because of the soul-destroying filth that comes over it. The minister who fails to cry aloud against this great evil will have the blood of souls upon his hands at the Judgment.

A compromise on one principle of Bible truth will open the gate for other compromises, and on it goes from bad to worse. Now large numbers of a compromise group claiming to be the Church of God are accepting the "anti-cleansing heresy," the same false theory that was renounced by the pioneer ministers of the Church of God in 1898. It only further proves that when a people departs from the truth on one point, there is no end to the false doctrines that

will enter. The only safe course for any honest soul is to "come out from among them," and go "back to the blessed old Bible, back to the City of God, back from the land of confusion, passing the wrecks and the creeds, back to the light of the morning, Jesus our Captain leads," back to the Bible truth that was taught and practiced by the pioneer ministers during the first thirty years (1880-1910) of this Church of God reformation. How sad to see that the so-called Church of God groups now bear very little resemblance to the victorious saints of those early years. God's truth remains the same and does not change with the passing of time like people do.

Reinhart Wollert Sr., son of Carl and Anna Elizabeth Wollert, was born Feb. 16, 1898, in the Ukrainian Valley, Russia, and passed away at Lamar, Colo., on July 6, 1974, at the age of 76 years, four months and 20 days.

He came to the United States as a young man with his parents at the age of 16 years, and settled on a farm near Russell, Kansas, later moving to the Lamar, Colo., area where he was engaged in farming and ranching activities.

HOW A STATE OF ENTIRE SANCTIFICATION MAY BE RETAINED

(Continued from Page Three)

is a well of living water. You will need to draw water daily out of this well of salvation; you can never drink it dry. The Bible is your chart and compass, and you will have occasion to examine it daily.

- 7. To retain the blessing of perfect love, you must constantly aim at growing in grace; there is no standing still in grace. If we are not advancing, we are retrograding. Many people have lost the witness of the Spirit by not pressing after a greater fullness. Christian holiness secures the best possible preparation for growth in grace; and there are depths, heights, lengths, and breadths of the love of God, to which we must be constantly aspiring. If we do not press after them, we shall be likely to go backward and lose what we have attained.
- 8. You must live constantly under a sense of the presence of God. Always remember, "Thou, God, seest me!" You are watched and seen every moment by an eye a million times keener than the eyes of angels—the infinite eye of the all-seeing God. If you know that a legion of angels were watching you every moment, how careful you would be to act right! Remember, you are always in God's immediate presence.
- 9. You must lead a life of prayer. You must be a person of prayer. Pray early in the morning, and, if possible, remain some time on your knees with God. This will prepare you for the day. Pray often, and then prayer will become a delight. Stay with God in prayer—stay until He melts you, and then stay when you are melted, and plead with Him, and He will answer, and you will be transformed, renewed, and strengthened.
- 10. You must labor faithfully for the salvation of sinners. It is the nature of perfect love to long for the salvation of souls; and if you do not go out for the salvation of men, your love will cool into apathy and indifference, and you will lose the evidence of entire sanctification altogether. When your heart yearns over sinners, go to God and pray; then go to sinners with loving sympathy, and you will find it an excellent means of grace to your soul. It will be a holy oil that will anoint you. You must also seek to lead saints into this grace. Wesley says: "One great means of retaining what God has given, is to labor to bring others into this grace, and to profess it to all mankind."
- 11. To retain it, you must oppose sin of every name and kind, without any compromise. Like your Lord, you are to show it no quarter, at any time, or anywhere, either in or out of the sanctuary. In respect to sin and holiness, it is eternally true that "No man can serve two masters." You must allow no exceptions, either in high places or in low, in great things or little things, among enemies or friends. Your duty is plain—"Abstain from all appearance of evil."

From Myrtle we visited the wife and family of Bro. Hammond at Anderson, Ind. From there, we returned to Guthrie to attend the night meeting there on August 7th. The next evening Bro. O. C. Porter of Guthrie took us to Green Pastures, Okla., (Denver and 57th) to attend the night meeting with the saints there.

On Sunday, August 11th, Bro. Hammond and I attended all-day services at Wichita, Kansas, where Bro. Lewis Williams is the pastor. That congregation was very attentive to the preached Word, and their concern and sacrifice for the gospel work in India are appreciated. The same Sunday night we worshipped with the saints of Bro. Archie Souder's congregation in Oklahoma City. They took an additional special love offering for my beloved wife and mother, for which I am very thankful.

The night meeting at Guthrie, Okla., on Wednesday, August 14th, will be my last meeting this time in the United States. The Lord willing, Bro. Hammond and I plan to fly to India from Oklahoma City, leaving on August 15th. I am sorry we were unable to visit several congregations due to the lack of time. We appeal for your earnest prayers for a safe trip to India.

We covered over 12,000 miles in the U. S. and I owe much to Bro. Hammond who drove all those miles to take me to those meetings. I thank God for his good heart and willingness to make sacrifices for the Lord's work. He also taught me four "evening light" songs which are treasures in my life.

Also, I appreciate much the deep concern and compassion of Bro. Lawrence Pruitt for the souls in India, Mexico, Africa and everywhere, and his great vision of the work of the Church of God. Surely, he is handling a most precious and responsible work. May God strengthen his hands and heal him completely, is our prayer every day. I also appreciate Sister Marie Miles and Sister Maybelle Pruitt who assist Bro. Pruitt with much sacrifice in the Lord's work at the Faith Publishing House. I cannot forget Bro. Randall Flynn, Bro. Gene and Sister Dora Lela Beisly, Sister Roberta Hightower, Sisters Thelma and Mary Sprague, Sister Rosalie Johnston, Brother Mark Spinks and all others who give their time and effort in the gospel literature work at the Lord's Printshop. "And now abideth faith, hope and charity, these three; but the greatest of these is charity." (1 Cor. 13:13).

Dear saints, I wish to invite your special attention to the sad, recent news that the heavy monsoon rains in India have resulted in great floods and destruction, and consequently the rapid spread of contagious diseases and famine. BRO. HAMMOND'S FIELD REPORT

Guthrie, Okla. (Aug. 12)—Dear Bro. Pruitt and all the saints: Greetings in the precious name of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, who has sustained us so abundantly this summer. Our hearts are overflowing with the blessings of God and filled with thanksgiving for His goodness and mercies to us. Bro. John Varghese and I have finished the last long trip, having traveled more than 12,000 miles over the country since June 2nd, visiting 25 congregations and campmeetings in 28 states.

I would like to thank all the saints for their generosity, love and kindness shown to Bro. Varghese and me as we traveled. I surely appreciate how God has stirred the hearts of the saints in many ways, and especially in the field of missions. God is surely trying to show us the great need in these faraway lands where our brothers and sisters in Christ are struggling against many odds to carry the gospel. As the saints found the precious spirit in Bro. John was the same on the other side of the world as God puts within His own here, their hearts were encouraged and they felt a great bond of fellowship and burden to help them.

I can say that this has been a most precious time of fellowship and getting acquainted with saints and congregations all over the country that I had never known before. Each meeting with a group of saints became more precious and more difficult to leave. Many we met again and again all around the country. No other people on this earth enjoy the sweet fellowship with each other and with God as the saints do. What a glorious day that will be when we are at last all together with our Lord and sing His praises forever! There is surely no need of any musical instruments in worship as you couldn't hear them anyhow! One visitor in the saints' meeting said, "Now I see why you don't have musical instruments. You don't need them!" A school teacher heard the saints singing and wanted to borrow some of our books to teach the songs to her children. Returning the books, she remarked, "It is no use. The songs do not sound the same

as you sing them." The songs must be sung "in the Spirit."

I thank the Lord for His mercies to me in giving me the strength in body to drive this distance. Before April, I would not have been able to have done this. A year ago in February, I felt the Lord had released me for a time from the Printshop to do some work in Kenosha, Wisc., which He put on my heart. I made a trip up there to see what could be done. On arriving, I found that my old job had opened up just the day before I arrived. I felt the Lord would have me take it and do the work He showed me, too. But I got so busy with side jobs that I did not accomplish anything for the Lord, and He let a severe arthritic pain come on my bad hip, so that I had to ride a cart around the shop. I told the Lord I would get back to Guthrie as soon as I could, but I didn't get back here until last January. God left the pain on me, even though it eased some when I came to Oklahoma. The folks in Wisconsin thought I was peculiar for not using the insurance at the shop and having the hip operated upon. It wouldn't have cost me anything, but I knew the Lord had a reason for letting it come so severely upon me and I wanted to know what He wanted to do with me. I felt strongly that He wanted me to make a mission trip down into Mexico again, so I finally arranged to go there with Bro. James Huskey in April. We were there about two weeks, visiting the brethren. I was sick with flu and cold all the time, but upon returning I found that the Lord had completely removed all the pain from my hip and prepared me for the mission of taking Bro. John Varghese around to the meetings this summer. Praise His holy name! He knows just how to work things out.

Last summer Bro. Varghese was unable to get his visa to come to the U. S., but the Lord had a reason for it. There would have been no one to take him around to the meetings. I had not planned on this, although the Lord put it upon my mind while I was down in Mexico, but I said nothing to anyone. I had planned to go back to Mexico with the caravan in June, but Brother Pruitt asked me if I would consider taking Bro. John around as there was no one else available. The Lord worked it out so we could do so according to His plan.

The Lord willing, I will be leaving Thursday, Aug. 15, with Bro. John Varghese to go back to India for four months. I surely covet the prayers of the saints as I go there that I might be as good an example of the Lord while there as Bro. John has been while among us. After returning from India, the Lord willing, I will try again to get a visa for Nigeria and spend some time with the believers in Africa. I was unable to get a visa for Nigeria three years ago, but I believe the Lord will work it out now.

We are expecting to get more transportation vehicles for Bro. Varghese in India in order to carry on the gospel work. They have two bicycles now, but need about ten more. As the Lord has supplied, we will endeavor to purchase a new car or van also, as Bro. Varghese has to travel several hundred miles in visiting the various congregations. We plan also to purchase a printing press and necessary equipment so Bro. John can print the gospel literature in his Malayalam language. There are other urgent needs, such as the construction of another chapel, or more if possible. They have two chapels now and land on which to build another. He estimates that it will cost about \$600 to \$700 to erect this chapel. Bro. John also will have to build a house for himself and family when his younger brother, Phillip, gets married, as the home of his parents will go to Bro. Phillip


according to their custom. They have one acre of land on which they raise rice for his family, his mother and four brothers. The acre will only produce about fifteen bushels. Last spring a brown hopper insect ruined their rice crop, but they are praying that the second crop coming this fall will be good. Along with the famine, which is increasing more than ever before, has come extremely hard rains and flood conditions which also spread disease. One of the newly converted Catholic families has lost a child from disease. Let us pray constantly for relief from these adverse conditions.

I surely thank the Lord for all the blessings He has given us in this country, and I pray that I might be of some help and encouragement to our brothers and sisters in other lands. Thank you again for your prayers and concern for us, and as Bro. Varghese said, "We can't remember all your names, but we can never forget your faces nor the great love you showed us."

May God's richest blessings be upon each one of you, and may His mercy and grace surround you and carry you through every trial.
