You Can Live Forever!

"I am the resurrection, and the life: he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live: and whosoever liveth and believeth in me shall never die." John 11:25, 26. This is not a head belief, but with the heart man believeth unto righteousness and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation.

Most people shrink from death and go to any extent to live. In Jesus you can live forever: not here, for there are so many things undesirable in this world. There are sickness, pain, hardships, disappointments, to say nothing of crime, wars, dangers, and calamities.

What is this offer of eternal life—never die? Of Abraham it was said that, "He looked for a city which hath foundations, whose builder and maker is God, . . . and confessed that they were strangers and pilgrims on the earth. For they that say such things declare plainly that they seek a country. . . . But now they desire a better country, that is, an heavenly: wherefore God is not ashamed to be called their God: for he hath prepared for them a city." Heb. 11:10-16.

God made this provision by giving His Son. John 3:16. Eternal death was brought on the world through disobedience. Man could no longer be trusted with the tree of life to live forever in his sinful state. Jesus tasted death for every man, so the death sentence is revoked for those who accept Him as their Saviour from sin and the Lord of their lives. "This is the record, that God hath given to us eternal life, and this life is in his Son. He that hath the Son hath life; and he that hath not the Son of God hath not life." I John 5:11,12. In Christ alone we have eternal life, which is spiritual life. By the new birth He transforms and translates us into His spiritual kingdom where He rules, and we submit to His will and Word. "If any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new." II Cor. 5:17.

The natural man would not fit into the heavenly country. There will be no television, bars, night clubs, theaters, for this is a spiritual place. Spiritual things are foolishness to the natural man. He can't know them, for they are spiritually discerned. I Cor. 2:14. Only those who are born again can enjoy the things of God. God has provided a new heart and a new spirit that delights in the things of God. "A new heart also will I give you, and a new

spirit will I put within you: and I will take away the stony heart out of your flesh, and I will give you an heart of flesh. And I will put my spirit within you, and cause you to walk in my statutes, and ye shall keep my judgments, and do them." Ezek. 36:26,27.

Our earthly house will be temporarily vacated at the death of our bodies. II Cor. 5:1 tells of moving out of our earthly quarters—that body wracked with pain, maimed, feeble, and burdened, which can no longer be repaired. As a poet wrote, "We don't need this old house any longer."

Jesus has gone to prepare a place for His Bride the Church. Later, when He returns, those bodies will be raised to be glorified for the new country.

Jesus said, "I go my way, and ye shall seek me, and shall die in your sins: whither I go, ye cannot come." John 8:21. Only one alternative: live eternally with Christ who paid your sin debt, or have eternal death for your sins. Only God's children inherit eternal life with the Lord. "If children, then heirs; heirs of God, and jointheirs with Christ." Rom. 8:17.

We become children of God by being born into His family. Jesus said to Nicodemus, a religious man, "Ye must be born again." There must be confessing and forsaking of all sin. He that confesseth and forsaketh shall have mercy. "The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit: a broken and contrite heart, O God, thou wilt not despise." Psa. 51:17.

Do you want to live forever? Then "seek ye the Lord while he may be found, call ye upon him while he is near: Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts: and let him return unto the Lord, and he will have mercy upon him; and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon." Isa, 55:6,7. Both life and death are eternal. Who would reject Christ who gives life and died for our sins, to suffer eternal damnation? "I call heaven and earth to record this day against you, that I have set before you life and death, blessing and cursing: therefore choose life, that both thou and thy seed may live: that thou mayest love the Lord thy God, and that thou mayest obey his voice, and that thou mayest cleave unto him: for he is thy life, and the length of thy days." Deut. 30:19-20. -Elsie Dietrich

"Tossed To and Fro"

It was high noon, and the wind was blowing briskly as we sat looking out of the window at the airport, waiting for the time for my sister to board the airplane. She had come to the wedding of my granddaughter Connie, and was returning. The men were servicing the airplane; the food service truck backed slowly up to the side of the plane. It stopped at the proper distance and the man got into the bed of the truck. It began to rise up to the door of the plane. When it was at the proper place, he opened the door of his truck, and let down a platform on the level with the door of the airplane. He opened the door of the plane and began to unload the food. As he worked, a napkin was caught by the wind and was tossed to and fro. It would go up and down, and back and forth, finally drifting to the ground. As I watched that napkin, a part of a Scripture came to me, which was, "tossed to and fro, and carried about with every

wind of doctrine." No doubt, the Apostle Paul had seen how the wind would toss paper or just anything about, and he compared it to people who did not have a firm foundation upon which to build their faith.

The Apostle Paul brought out the fact in the Ephesian letter that God had given gifts to different ones for the "perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ." To some He gave the gifts to be "apostles, some prophets, and some evangelists; and some pastors and teachers." Eph. 4:11-14. He knew this was needful "that we henceforth be no more children, tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the sleight of men, and cunning craftiness, whereby they lie in wait to deceive." Those who had these gifts would speak the "truth in love," so we could "grow up into him in all things, which is the head, even Christ." (ver. 15).

How sad it is there are so many false prophets in the world today and many people who are willing to believe everything they say. God has given the truth to those who are His workers and we need to know who they are. Just because some preacher has a D.D. after his name, or is called Reverend, that does not mean he is ordained of God. Those who are ordained of God to teach, have the Holy Spirit within them and they can "rightly divide the word of truth." It takes the Spirit of God to reveal the deep Bible truths to people. It takes more than just studying or being able to quote a lot of Scriptures. I have known people who could quote whole chapters and yet misinterpret their meaning. Many will take out a part of a verse and try to base a doctrine on that part of a verse. They do not take the whole context of the chapter or what it is meaning. People who follow false prophets are like the napkin falling from the platform of the food service truck. They are "tossed to and fro" by false teachings. They become so confused that they finally lose faith in any of God's Word.

Some false prophets will quote Romans 3:10, "There is none righteous, no, not one." On this verse he will base his false teaching that no one is righteous, nor ever can be. He might even use the verse on down in the chapter which says, "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God," (verse 23). Those who believe this interpretation think there is no hope for them to be saved from sin and be righteous in God's sight. They will be "tossed to and fro" with doubts, fears, unbelief, and false teachings.

The true prophet will say that the Bible says, "There is none righteous, no, not one," but through Christ we can be forgiven of our sins and have the righteousness of God. He will read the whole context of the chapter which says, "Even the righteousness of God which is by faith of Jesus Christ unto all and upon all them that believe," (verse 22) and that through Christ we are justified "through faith in his blood, to declare his righteousness for the remission of sins." The whole chapter teaches that once we were unrighteous, but through faith we are saved from our sins and can have the righteousness of God within us through Christ.

After our volitional sins are forgiven, then we can be cleansed or purged by the Holy Spirit from the sin principle that "passed upon all men" through Adam. Rom. 5:12; Acts 15:8,9; Rom. 15:16. Many today do not teach two definite works of grace in the heart and many

who do teach it are in confusion. They are "tossed to and fro" with winds of false doctrines and do not have a settled experience in Christ that brings power in their lives, nor soul rest. I know by experience that we can have two definite experiences of the work of grace in the soul. It's real and it's precious. It brings one to the place of perfect rest and faith in Christ.

May the Lord help souls to search the Word of God and find the chain from the beginning to the end that links God's truths that they may be settled on a firm foundation, is my prayer.

"Bring Up Your Lives"

I once heard a story of a military standard bearer who, in the time of battle when his company was charging up a hill against a fortified enemy position, was going ahead of his company carrying the flag. Enemy fire was very effective as the enemy was strongly entrenched and the company was being shot up badly. The officer in charge deemed the battle lost and that he should pull back his men, so he called to the standard bearer ordering him to bring back the flag. The standard bearer called back over his shoulder as he continued to charge on into the enemy position, "I won't bring back the flag; you bring up your men!" According to the story, the beaten and battered army rallied to the standard and the result was victory.

Brethren, let this be the spirit of every one of us. There is a cry from some in our day that the standard is being held too high and we are too strict about this and that, etc., and some are seeking for a modification of some of the old teachings which our fathers stood by, lived and taught, and to which God attested His sanction by miracles, signs and wonders, and abundance of divine grace, producing great joy and victorious living among His people. When the cry goes out to bring down or lower the standard, let the spontaneous response of every one of us be that "We won't do it; you bring up your lives." And if all will bring up their lives to the definitely established standard and principles of truth (rally to the standard) the result will be victory.

In Numbers 2:34 we read, "And the children of Israel did according to all that the Lord commanded Moses: so they pitched by their standards, and so they set forward." Ah, folks, there you have it! "They pitched by their standards and SO they set forward." If we want to set forward and make real solid progress in our individual lives and in the work of God, we must pitch by the standards which God will honor and work through. Otherwise, we are doomed to certain defeat.

Variance is classified in Gal. 5:20 as a work of the flesh. For us to vary in any degree from the established lines of truth laid down by Christ and the apostles and perpetuated unto us by our fathers is to give place to the flesh. Two straight lines running parallel can be projected around the world and still be the same exact distance apart as at the beginning. But if there is a little variation in one of them, be it ever so slight, by the time it is projected around the world it will be off a long, long way. So with the lines of truth: if there is just a slight variation some way, by the time it is projected through this age, or through a few generations even, there is no way of calculating how far off it might be.

One has said, "Individuals are but atoms. They are born, they live, they act, they die. But truth is an eternal principle and can never be changed." This is very true. Change truth to any degree at all and it becomes false. There may be different conditions and different things to meet in our day than in the days of Christ and the apostles or in the early days of this reformation and, no doubt, there are. But the clear principles of eternal truth, if solidly held, will meet the problems of our day the same as theirs.

We cannot move established landmarks to suit our land lines. We must move our land lines to suit the established land marks. At this point I think of Bro. George Winn of Guthrie, Oklahoma, whom some of you may still remember. He said at one time that if God would hand him the Bible and say, "Here, George, just take this book and fix it to fit you," he would just hand the Bible back to God and say, "God, the book is all right just like it is. Just fix George to fit the book." Brethren, that is the attitude we all need and must have. Let us not be trying to change any part of God's Word to suit our way of life at any point, but let us earnestly be seeking God to change our lives in any way they need changing to conform to the truths of God's Word.

For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord." Luke 2: 10, 11. Question and Answer Column

By Ostis B. Wilson

Question: Are men supposed to be lords over women as we think of it today? Would you please explain the Bible version of a man and wife role in the home?

Answer, Part 1: No, I do not think that men should be lords over women or that any person whatever his position is, should be lord over any other person. I do not feel that God has given to any person to dominate the life of any other person. He does not even allow a God-called, God-ordained pastor over a congregation to be a lord over that congregation. I Pet. 5:3. God did not permit Christian masters to be lords over their servants. Col. 4:1 and Eph. 6:9. Neither is a man authorized by God to lord over or dominate the life of his wife.

Let us make no mistake at this point. When two people enter into marriage, both are cast into a new role different from any role they have ever been in before and their respective roles are clearly defined and outlined in the Scriptures. Up to this time they have been just a man and woman like all other men and women. But now that man is no longer just a man but he is a husband with certain fixed and clearly defined duties and responsibilities toward that certain woman he has taken to be his wife. That woman is no longer just a woman but she is now a wife with clearly defined duties and responsibilities toward the man she has chosen to be her husband.

The Bible does not require you to marry. It just requires certain things of you if you do. If you do not want to come under these regulations you are perfectly free to stay out of marriage and that is what you should do. But the question has to do with those who have already entered into marriage and what the role of each partner is, in that relationship. Once you enter into marriage you are no longer free to determine what you will or will not do. The terms are not optional but are clearly defined and outlined in the Scriptures.

In I Tim. 5:14 we read, "I will therefore that the younger women marry, bear children, guide the house, give none occasion to the adversary to speak reproachfully."

The first thing mentioned here as a duty of a married woman (wife) is to bear children. If a woman does not want children and the responsibility of taking care of them, teaching, and training them, etc. she had better stay out of marriage because that is the natural fruit of marriage. The next thing mentioned is that she is to guide the house. Upon her is placed the responsibility by God to teach, train, and guide the lives of the children which God gives her and to manage her house and family well so that there will be no occasion for the adversary to speak reproachfully.

Titus 2:4-5 says, "That they may teach the young women to be sober, to love their husbands, to love their children, to be discreet, chaste, keepers at home, good, obedient to their own husbands, that the Word of God be not blasphemed." Here the wife is commanded to love her husband. She must do this and in so doing support, comfort, console, encourage and stand back of him in his life's work, his burdens and all of his doings. She is also commanded to love her children and in so doing she will properly care for them, guide, teach, and train them. She

is also commanded to be a keeper at home and to be obedient to her own husband. The wife is to be the homemaker and to keep and maintain her house in a proper and attractive manner. If a woman does not maintain her home and herself in a proper manner and keep her house in order, her marriage is going to suffer and not be what God ordained it to be.

This text enjoins upon a wife to be obedient to her husband. If a woman does not want to be subject to her husband and have a man telling her what to do, she should leave marriage alone. The Bible is quite explicit on this point in numbers of texts. If a woman does not want to spend her time in her own home taking care of her house, she should not marry because the Bible is explicit on this point also. This is the course God set for women in the marriage relation and she cannot expect God's blessings upon her life, home, and marriage if she comes short of her obligations on these lines.

I said in the beginning of this discussion that I did not believe that a man (husband) should lord over a woman (his wife). I say the same again. Let us not be mistaken or overlook the fact that God's Word requires a wife to be in subjection and obedient to her husband. Eph. 5:22-24 says, "Wives, submit yourselves unto your own husbands, as unto the Lord. For the husband is the head of the wife, even as Christ is the head of the church: and he is the saviour of the body. Therefore as the church is subject unto Christ, so let the wives be to their own husbands in every thing." Col. 3:18 says, "Wives, submit yourselves unto your own husbands, as it is fit in the Lord." I Pet. 3:1 says, "Likewise, ye wives, be in subjection to your own husbands. . . ." It is unmistakably clear that a wife is to be in subjection to her own husband and obey him. There is a big difference between a wife being in subjection to her husband and being lorded over by him. This is God's Word. He wrote the Bible, and set up this arrangement and we will just have to fall in line with it, if we want God's blessings on our marriage and in our lives.
