The Debt We Owe

In the beginning, God said to Adam and Eve. "But of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, thou shalt not eat of it; for in the day thou eatest thereof, thou shalt surely die." Gen. 2:17. Let us notice that God said, "Thou shalt surely die!" Adam and Eve plunged the entire human race into death, or separation from God, by their transgression of God's Word. Human efforts, even of the deepest sincerity, could not restore us mortal creatures to the plane of purity that would meet our infallible Creator's approval. In Rom. 3:23 we read, "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God." Also, we find in Rev. 5:4, that "No man was found worthy." Praise the Lord, for the "new song," as sung in verses 9-14, and for Jesus Christ the Son of God "who did no sin, neither was guile found in his mouth; who his own self bare our sins in his own body on the tree." 1 Pet. 2:22, 24a. This was the greatest debt ever paid by anyone for someone else.

Complete Separation Announced!

Daniel S. Warner's account of how he was led to sever his connection with the holiness association, which he began to see was but a milder form of sectism, is given in an editorial for June 1, 1881:

Saturday, April 22, the hand of the Lord was heavily upon our soul, had no relish to converse with anyone but God. Finally, in company with two brethren we went into the house of God at Hardinsburg, Ind., and placed ourselves under the searching eye of God, when the Spirit of the Lord showed me the inconsistency of repudiating sects and yet belonging to an association that is based upon sect recognition. We promised God to withdraw from all such compacts. Being dearly attached to the holiness work, we attended the Association at Terre Haute, and tried to have the sect-endorsing clause removed from the constitution. Its substance is as follows, speaking of local associations:

"It shall consist of members of various Christian organizations and seek to work in harmony with all these societies."

We offered the following substitute: "It shall consist of, and seek to cooperate with, all true Christians everywhere."

We had supposed that fellowship and cooperation should not exclude any person or truth that is in Christ Jesus, and that we should not be compelled to bow down to anything not in, nor of, Christ Jesus.

We were positively denied membership on the ground of not adhering to any sect. And now we wish to announce to all that we wish to cooperate with all Christians, as such, in saving souls—but forever withdraw from all organisms that uphold and endorse sects and denominations in the body of Christ.

An event that had to occur sooner or later was Brother Warner's separation from the Northern Indiana Eldership. At the Eldership meeting which convened at Beaver Dam, Kosciusko County, Ind., in October, 1881, he proposed some measures by which that body might be made to conform more perfectly to the Bible standard with reference to government. In this he would not be heard, and on their rejection of his reform measures he realized, probably for the first time, that the new Eldership, bent on continuing their human organization, was a sect with which he must sever his connection, and he then and there did so. This event does not properly mark his coming out of spiritual Babylon, as some have supposed. In heart he had already been out, and had preached against sects. But he ignorantly supposed that the Northern Indiana Eldership of the Church of God was not a sect and therefore that he was keeping clear of sects. Thus his act at Beaver Dam was a keeping out of Babylon as much as a coming out. It was the latter only in the outward sense, but of course it emphasized and gave more definite character to the anti-sectarian stand he had previously taken.

There were others in attendance at the Eldership meeting who had heard his preaching against spiritual Babylon and who also took the same step with him. They were David Leininger, William Ballenger and wife, and F. Krause and wife. We give their names as being of those originals who declared themselves free from all outward forms of Babylon.

A similar thing occurred in Michigan. About the same time the Northern Indiana Eldership was formed, there originated near Pompeii, Gratiot County, Mich., the Northern Michigan Eldership of the Church of God. This body was formed because its members had been isolated from and generally dissatisfied with the old Eldership, which sanctioned secrecy and was steeped in tobacco. About the fall of 1878 there joined this new Eldership J. C. Fisher and his wife, Allie R. They had never heard of Brother Warner at that time. In the spring of 1880, J. C. Fisher had occasion to visit Indiana on business, and it happened that while there he heard Brother Warner preach, and he accepted the doctrine of holiness and received the experience. The following autumn the Fishers sent for Brother Warner to come up to that part of Michigan and preach holiness. It was then that Allie R. consecrated for and also received the experience of sanctification.

A year later, just before the annual meeting of the Eldership (Oct. 1881), the Fishers and others, thinking to get the Eldership to accept holiness and thus make good the claim of being the true church, started a holiness meeting at Carson City, where the Fishers lived, and again had the Brother Warner present. This was right after the meeting in Indiana where Bro. Warner had declared his separation from the Northern Indiana Eldership. The situation was similar to what it had been in Indiana. Bro. Warner had been preaching on the true church and setting forth its divine government, and the hope of these Michigan saints was that if they could get the Eldership to accept holiness they might get them to do away with the human machinery and fill the true church requirement. In this they were disappointed. Before the holiness meeting was over, the Eldership showed its opposition. Upon this, the Fishers and a good number of others, nearly twenty in all, withdrew from the Eldership.

Thus there were two centers where a stand of independence with regard to the Eldership and human ecclesiasticism had been taken. These two congregations of saints—at Beaver Dam, (Ind.), and Carson City, (Mich.),—were the earliest in the United States (so far as the author knows) who had stepped completely out of Babylon and had taken for their basis that of the New Testament Church alone.

Cleansing the Inside of the Cup



"Ye make clean the outside of the cup and of the platter, but within they are full of extortion and excess. . . . cleanse first that which is within the cup and platter, that the outside of them may be clean also. . . . ye also outwardly appear righteous unto men, but within ye are full of hypocrisy and iniquity." Matt. 23:25-28. Jesus spoke these words to some people who appeared to men to be righteous, but their hearts were full of sin. If the "inside of our cup," or our heart, is not clean it makes little difference to God how clean we get the outside. Sometimes people can spend so much time in cleansing the outside to meet the approval of man that they neglect the inside. We surely don't want to "strain at a gnat and swallow a camel."

To illustrate this point, let's consider a car. Someone could keep his car clean and shiny, polishing it every week, but if he neglects the engine and its parts, the car will one day prove of little service to him. Naturally we want a car that looks good on the outside, but the most important part is the car's motivating parts. The same is true with men. The body is what man sees, but God looks at the "motivating parts." Our heart must be kept clean and oiled with the love of God so that His graces can flow out.

We measure up on the outside as God gives us understanding because it is our desire to do what we know pleases Him. His laws are "written in our mind and heart." Measuring up to God's standards in our daily living is not salvation, but is a result of salvation of the heart. "A good man out of the good treasure of the heart bringeth forth good things: and an evil man out of the evil treasure bringeth forth evil things." Matt. 12:35. When someone refuses to clean the "outside of the cup," or the body, and things that pertain to earthly living, we can be sure there is uncleanness on the inside. "For from within, out of the heart of men, proceed evil thoughts, adulteries, fornications, murders, thefts, covetousness, wickedness, deceit, lasciviousness, an evil eye, blasphemy, pride, foolishness: All these evil things come from within, and defile the man." Mark 7:21-23.

Let us realize that we must have our hearts — the will, affections, desires, attitudes — pure before God in order to be His child. May we sincerely pray the prayer of David: "Search me, O God, and know my heart: try me, and know my thoughts: and see if there be any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting." The date of the National campmeeting next year is set for July 18 to 27, 1980.

Thirty-four years ago, in Aug., 1945, the American military airmen dropped atomic bombs on the cities of Hiroshima and Nagasaki in Japan which killed a bout 214,000 persons instantly. Another 111,000 are reported to have died later of injuries, radiation sickness, and disease. Japan is the only country to be attacked by nuclear bombs, and that tragedy of war has left a deep scar on mankind and the Japanese especially.

Most of the dead and injured were civilians, and such a massacre should leave a "deep scar" on the American conscience. God's unchangeable law still reads: "Be not deceived; God is not mocked: for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap."

Gal. 6:7. This law of truth applies to nations as well as to individuals. As the song says, "God is keeping a record," and surely the United States is in line for a terrible reaping in retribution for the death of thousands of innocent civilians.

She was known as "Aunt Vera" to young and old alike.

Her husband, Erle Forbes, was called from this life on Feb. 8, 1961. In Sept., 1973, she moved to Guthrie, Okla., to be near her daughter, Sylvia, and her family. In April of this year, she moved into the home with her daughter. During the nearly six years with the Guthrie Church of God congregation she won the love and respect of all there. She will be greatly missed from their midst. Some of her last words included love and concern for her family and love for all the saints, with a desire to meet each one in heaven.

She leaves to mourn her passing: three sons, J. Warner Forbes of Foley, Al., Glenn E. Forbes of Burbank, Calif., and Ivan M. Forbes of Sylmar, Calif.; one daughter, Sylvia J. Busbee of Guthrie, Okla. She is also survived by 11 grandchildren, and four great-grandchildren, beside a host of other relatives, saints, and friends.

A memorial service was held at Guthrie, Okla., on Friday evening, June 29, 1979, with Bro. O. C. Porter officiating, assisted by Sis. Marie Miles. The regular funeral services were held at Pacoima, Calif., with Bro. Ostis Wilson officiating. Burial was in Grandview Cemetery of Glendale, Calif.

[Editor's note: For more than 60 years this writer has know "Aunt Vera" Forbes, as she and her family lived at Clovis, N. Mexico, when my parents were saved on the old homestead near there and first met the saints of the Church of God at Clovis in 1916. Ever since the beginning of the Faith and Victory publication in 1923, she and Bro. Erle Forbes were faithful supporters of this gospel literature ministry, having distributed many tracts, papers, and books from this office. Their daughter Sylvia, now the Guthrie pastor's wife, volunteered her services and faithfully worked here at the Lord's Print Shop about twenty years ago when she was a single woman. "Aunt Vera" is now at rest in the paradise of God with the untold numbers of saints, and the effects of "their works do follow them," not only in this world, but also in that which is to come. May God comfort the bereaved family and the whole church, as her passing was a great loss to all of us.

Question and Answer Column

By Ostis B. Wilson

Question: Should women braid their hair? I believe it is wrong to bind ornaments in the hair, but some saints tell me that it is all right to braid the hair. What do you think?

Answer: 1 Tim. 2:9 and 1 Peter 3:3 are the two Scriptures in the New Testament which refer to women's hair with reference to its arrangement, etc. 1 Tim. 2:9 says, "In like manner also, that women adorn themselves in modest apparel, with shame-facedness and sobriety; not with broided hair, or gold or pearls, or costly array;" 1 Pet. 3:3 says, "Whose adorning let it not be that outward adorning of plaiting the hair, and of wearing of gold, or of putting on of apparel."

It is important to the thought to note that both of these Scriptures have the emphasis on ornamentation and adornment. The doing of the hair is mentioned in these texts right along with gold, pearls, costly array and different adornments and ornamentations. Therefore the particular method of fixing the hair in these verses is to be identified with ornamentation and adornment. This could hardly be said of just the plain braiding of the hair as we know it today and as the saint women do it. It is just another way of fixing the hair. Some do up their hair in a "bun" on top of their heads; some in a similar way but wear it on the back of their heads; some put it up in a figure eight on the back of their heads; some wear it in a French roll down on their necks; some (especially the younger sisters) just let it hang full length; some braid it and let it hang or put it up in different arrangements on their heads. Of all these ways the women arrange their hair, I do not see that any one of them could be singled out as worldly adornment any more than any other. No doubt, each sister tries to fix her hair in the way that is most becoming to herself.

But in the Bible times it was different from the common braiding that saint sisters use in our day, and with which we are familiar. In the Scriptures it refers to something directly identified with worldly adornment and therefore something to be avoided by saints. Let us look at what was under consideration in these Scriptures and why such was written in the Bible at all.

1 Tim. 2:9 refers to "Broided" hair (the margin says "Plaited") and 1 Pet. 3:3 refers to "Plaiting" the hair. "Broided" and "Plaited" hair involves more than the common braiding with which we are familiar today.

In the article on dress in the Zondervan Pictorial Bible Dictionary edited by Merrill C. Tenney we read these words: "Women often added to their adornment by an elaborate 'plaiting' of the hair. 1 Pet. 3:3 finds it necessary to warn Christian women against relying upon such adorning to make themselves attractive." It is clear here that this writer at least,

connects the statement in 1 Pet. 3:3 with worldly adornment and ornamentation.

Smith's Bible Dictionary in the article on hair says, "The women wore their hair natural, but braided, and dressed with strings of silk with ornaments." Also in the article on dress it says, "Jewesses did not vail their faces but covered the hair only. Women wore the hair long, braided, curled, etc., and decorated with jewels and coins. . . . there were many ornaments in use for the hair, head, ears, nose, and neck . . ." All that is said here concerning the hair is in regard to adornment and ornamentation.

1 Tim. 2:9, "Not with broided hair, or gold" is variously translated in other translations of the New Testament as follows: "Not with braided hair, and gold" — American Standard Version; "And not with wreaths of gold ornaments for the hair" — Twentieth Century New Testament; "Not with plaitings and ornamentation of gold" — Rotheram; "Not with (elaborate) hair arrangement of gold" — New English Bible; "The adornment of a Christian woman is not a matter of an elaborate coiffure" — Phillips.

Adam Clarke comments on 1 Pet. 3:3 as follows (in part). "Plaiting the hair, and variously folding it about the head, was the most ancient and simplest mode of disposing of this chief ornament of the female head. . . . Thin plates of gold were often mixed with the hair, to make it appear more ornamental by the reflection of light and of the solar rays. Small golden buckles were also used in different parts; and among the Roman ladies, pearls and precious stones of different colours."

The word found in 1 Tim. 2:9 is "broided" hair. "Broidered" is defined in the dictionary as, "To ornament with needlework; embroider." The thought here is the imposition of ornamental work on an already existing cloth or fabric. Then to broider hair would suggest the thought of imposing ornamental substance onto the already existing hair in whatever way it might be arranged.

Nothing that is said above by the various writers, dictionaries, and various New Testament translations could refer to the plain common braiding of the hair as we know it in our day, but would involve the addition of ornamental and adorning substances and materials with it. The ornamenting of the hair, or any other part of the body to create eye appeal or invite admiration is branded in God's word as evidence of pride in the heart and is forbidden for all saints, both men and women.

As far as I know this has been the position of the saints and early ministers of the Evening Light Reformation from as far back as I can remember and still is, as far as I know.

The tie of Christian love is the tie that binds God's people together (Col. 2:2; 3:14). It is the strongest tie that is known. It held the early Christians in unity through all the vicissitudes of the pagan persecutions. It was said, "Behold how these Christians love each other."

Love Covereth

"The tongue is a little member, and boasteth great things. Behold, how great a matter a little fire kindleth!" James 3:5.

I am sure we all have heard this verse many times, but it comes to my attention that we sometimes don't apply what we have heard to our conversation. As saints of God, we need to apply this matter to our hearts, search it out and see if we need improvement. So often we say or repeat things to others that should not be said at all. If it is not edifying, why say it? We often do this with no maliciousness toward the person at all, but if we repeat a mistake, fault, trial, or hardship to another, we can leave dents in the first person's reputation. We need to realize that what we repeat to others about someone may follow them all through life. We are our "brother's keeper." We need to keep his reputation intact.

We realize that people in this world are going to make mistakes and have faults. It is sometimes through our own mistakes that the Spirit purges out the dross in our lives by making us see our need of the Lord. So, when we hear about, or are involved in a situation with another person, we should not tell others about it. We are not protecting our brother's or sister's reputation when we do that.

It has been explained to me in this way. When we tell or repeat a tale on someone, it's like what happens in a pillow fight. If one of the pillows rip, the feathers will go everywhere. We are not able to retrieve all of the feathers. So it is when we tell someone about a fault in another person. That person may tell five others and those five may each tell five; then the brother's or sister's reputation is blackened by many. If the brother or sister corrects the situation, receives help and gets clear before God, the mark is still on him because others have spread it around. The ones hearing about the brother's or sister's fault may never hear about its being cleared up. The mark on his reputation may remain throughout his life. That person's testimony or God-given gift loses its power because some have lost confidence on hearing about the mistake or fault. That person may be clear before God, and yet we are still remembering the mistake that may have happened years ago, and has now been cleared up.

Can we not see how damaging this talebearing is? We are ruining people's reputations by repeating things to others. We need to search our hearts to see if we find ourselves partaking of this damaging practice, and ask God and the ones we have talked about to forgive us. May God help us to see ourselves.

"Moreover if thy brother shall trespass against thee, go and tell him his fault between thee and him alone: if he shall hear thee, thou hast gained thy brother." Matt. 18:15. We should have such a love and compassion for our brother and sister that we will not tell others about the trespass. "Brethren, if a man be overtaken in a fault, ye which are spiritual, restore such an one in the spirit of meekness; considering thyself, lest thou also be tempted." Gal. 6:1. If we had a son or daughter who was taken in a fault or sin, would we tell it all around, or would we try to shield and protect our own? Don't we realize that our brothers and sisters in the Lord are our own? We're all "bought with a price" and in the family of God. We need to protect one another. We are to esteem others better than ourselves, and have a strong binding love for each other. To be perfect in love covers a lot of ground. "Hatred stirreth up strifes; but love covereth all sins." Prov. 10:12.

Let us look to God for help in controlling our tongues. "I said, I will take heed to my ways, that I sin not with my tongue: I will keep my mouth with a bridle, while the wicked is before me." Psalms 39:1. We need to pray as David: "Set a watch, O Lord, before my mouth; keep the door of my lips." Psalms 141:3.

The reason I write these things as a warning to others is because I found myself hurting and offending someone. I had to ask forgiveness for the hurt I had caused. Let us be careful what we say, and consider our brothers' and sisters' feelings. It's God's way!
