The Resurrection of the Dead: "With What Body Do They Come?"

The doctrine of the resurrection of the dead has met opposition from the time the skeptical Sadducees tried to entangle Jesus until the present. Of the heathen Greeks and Romans, Zeno pronounced the resurrection the hope of worms and Pliny considered it impossible even to the power of God. Modern skeptics, as well as some of the liberal class of professed Christians, have continued to assail this doctrine. In spite of this opposition to the idea of a resurrection, multitudes today when following their beloved dead to the grave are comforted, like Martha of Bethany, with the thought that they "shall rise again in the resurrection at the last day." The doctrine is of special advantage to the average man, in that it makes immortality easier for him to believe in and to comprehend. Moreover, if it is a truth of Scripture and of practical value as a part of Christian faith, then we do well to attempt a statement of the doctrine and to answer the supposed objections to the doctrine.

The Body Will Be Raised

The truth of the resurrection of the dead can be known only through the statements of Scripture. Unlike the doctrine of future existence of the spirit, it cannot be known by rational processes. There is nothing in nature or reason to show that the body will be raised. Like other truths known only by revelation, such as the doctrines of the Trinity or the atonement, it is not unreasonable because it cannot be known by reason. On the other hand, when it is accepted on the ground of revelation it is found to be very reasonable. It is reasonable that as man was originally created with a body, he should retain it in the life to come, and that human beings should forever consist of body and spirit. It is not unreasonable that as the body has shared with the spirit in probation, it should also share in future reward or punishment, and that the bodies of ourselves and our friends to which we each are so strongly attached here, should be a part of each of us in our eternal

home. Whether or not these may be the reason for resurrection we cannot certainly know, but if not, there may still be a sufficient reason for it in the mind of God.

"Marvel not at this: for the hour is coming, in the which all that are in the graves shall hear his voice, and shall come forth" (John 5:28). It is the body that goes into the grave and not the spirit, which is said to "depart" at death. Therefore, the resurrection has to do, not with the spirit, but with the body. "Many of them that sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake." (Dan. 12:2). At death the spirits of the saved go to be with Christ (2 Cor. 5:8). It is the body that is in the dust of the earth, not the soul. The soul does not sleep but is conscious after death (Luke 16:24); it is the body that sleeps, and that shall awake on the resurrection day. Christ is the firstfruits of the resurrection, says the apostle Paul, and we know it was His material body that was raised. As surely as that was true of Christ, so surely Paul teaches in 1 Corinthians 15 that our material bodies shall be raised. Certain modern religious teachers who deny the resurrection of the body have endeavored to find support for their theory in Paul's statement, "It is raised a spiritual body." If this expression "spiritual body" means only the spirit that now dwells in our bodies, then the expression is a contradiction in terms; for a body that is only spirit is not a body. It can only be interpreted to mean a material body in the changed, incorruptible, glorified form that the apostle here describes. It is spiritual as to state, not as to essence.

Nature of the Resurrected Body

The resurrection is a transformation not a transubstantiation. The resurrected body is identical with the body that dies in some real sense, otherwise it would be a creation and not a resurrection. To deny a proper identity of the natural and the resurrected bodies is to deny the resurrection itself, because this is essential. It must be remembered that there is a distinction to be made between an absolute identity and a proper identity. An absolute identity requires that every atom of the body that dies must be included in the raised body. We do not suppose this sense of absolute identity to be required by the Scriptures. Only a proper identity need be held. This identity may be illustrated by that identity of your body with the body you possessed in early childhood. The body you possess now is different, yet identical. Our bodies are in a state of constant flux, new particles taking the place of old ones which are cast out of the body. Scientists tell us our bodies change entirely as to substance in a period of seven years. You meet a friend you have not seen for ten years and recognize him at once, although he is an entirely different being as to the particles of matter of which his body is composed. This illustration shows at least the possibility of an identity that does not require the gathering for the raised body particles that may have gone into the composition of other bodies.

This resurrected body, then, will be a material body; but not in its natural form. God's supernatural power will have given it supernatural qualities. It will be incorruptible, immortal, glorified, and spiritualized in that it will be adapted to that eternal world. It must be allowed that we cannot know in detail what such a body will be like, as we have nothing like it in the realm of our present experience; but the terms used to describe it assure us that it will be perfectly suited to our eternal happiness there. While the bodies of the wicked are to be raised up at the same time as those of the righteous, yet comparatively little is said of the nature of their bodies, and as to any differences between theirs and those of the righteous it is useless to speculate.

Why This Doctrine Is Not Unreasonable

The resurrection is not unreasonable because it has been divinely predicted. "Why should it be thought a thing incredible with you, that God should raise the dead?"

It is necessary to a complete redemption. The actuality of physical death is the result of sin, and Christ must raise the dead body to make his redemptive work complete. This "redemption of the body" Paul looked forward to.

A difficulty more theoretical and imaginary than real is that particles composing a dead body may become widely scattered, and through cannibalism and by entering the composition of vegetables may become parts of several different bodies during thousands of years. The proper identity already described solves the problem of the same particles in the composition of several different bodies; and as to the scattering of particles, if absolute identity were required it would be but a small thing for God to bring them together again.

Science may say the resurrection of the body is impossible; but what does science know about the supernatural? It has to do only with the natural, and this is claimed to be supernatural. As with any other miracle, science is entirely out of its province in attempting to say anything. But the remarkable thing is that some of these very so-called scientists who deny the possibility of a resurrection would ask us to believe the unprovable absurdity of abiogenesis—that both body and spirit originally sprang from lifeless matter!

"But now is Christ risen from the dead, and become the firstfruits of them that slept" (1 Cor. 15:20). "If we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so them also which sleep in Jesus will God bring with him"; "The dead in Christ shall rise": "Wherefore comfort one another with these words" (1 Thess. 4:14, 16, 18).

Our Intercessor

The Scripture says that the law of Moses was the shadow of good things to come. Heb. 10:1. I would like for us to consider the breastplate of judgment that Aaron was to wear when he went to minister in the tabernacle. This breastplate had four rows of stones; each row having three stones. Each stone had the name of one of the tribes of Israel, the number of the stones being twelve, representing all the names of the children of Israel. "And Aaron shall bear the names of the children of Israel in the breastplate of judgment upon his heart, when he goeth in unto the holy place, for a memorial before the Lord continually." Ex. 28:29. Now let us consider what one of the old prophets said about this. I am thinking especially of the memorial part. "But Zion said. The Lord hath forsaken me, and my Lord hath forgotten me. Can a woman forget her sucking child, that she should not have compassion on the son of her womb? yea, they may forget, yet will I not forget thee. Behold, I have graven thee upon the palms of my hands; thy walls are continually before me." Isa. 49:14-16. Now let us find the fulfillment of this in the New Testament. "For Christ is not entered into the holy places made with hands, which are the figures of the true; but into heaven itself, now to appear in the presence of God for us." Heb. 9:24.

Let us remember Aaron, the type of Christ, that it is said he had all the names of the children of Israel upon the breastplate and that he bore their judgment upon his heart continually before the Lord. Does not Christ bear our judgment upon his heart before God continually? (Our judgment means all the help we need.) Does not our faith take this in? If it does, we are a happy and blessed people. "Thou hast a mighty arm: strong is thy hand, and high is thy right hand. Justice and judgment are the habitation of thy throne: mercy and truth shall go before thy face. Blessed is the people that know the joyful sound: they shall walk, O Lord, in the light of thy countenance. In thy name shall they rejoice all the day: and in thy righteousness shall they be exalted." Psa. 89:13-16. Also, read Heb. 4:14-16 as follows: "Seeing then that we have a great high priest, that is passed into the heavens, Jesus the Son of God, let us hold fast our profession. For we have not an high priest which cannot be touched with the feeling of our infirmities; but was in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin. Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need." This throne of grace is sufficient for all our needs if we come boldly to it. The sinner can obtain salvation if he comes boldly to it. (Heb. 7:25) The justified brother can obtain sanctification if he comes boldly to it. (Heb. 10:19-23) All of us can have our needs supplied if we come boldly by faith to this throne of grace. Heb. 4:16; Phil. 4:19; —T. V. McMillian II Cor. 12:9, 9:8.

Christ Is Risen! . . .

"AND THE ANGEL answered and said unto the women, Fear not ye: for I know that ye seek Jesus, which was crucified. He is not here: for he is risen, as he said. Come, see the place where the Lord lay. And go quickly, and tell his disciples that he is risen from the dead; and, behold, he goeth before you into Galilee; there shall ye see him: lo, I have told you." Matt. 28:5-7.

Christ's resurrection, foretold by the prophets and consummated in reality, stands as the greatest miracle of all time. The empty tomb is the strongest proof of the divinity of Christ, and evidence of the supernatural power of the only true and living God. Mohammed remains in his tomb, as well as all the founders of pagan religions, the various cults and the creeds of men. Only the Christian can truthfully say that his Lord and Master is living today—not only at the right hand of the Father, but also actually reigning in Spirit within the heart and life of the consecrated believer.

It is true that people have been resurrected from the dead before and after Christ's resurrection, but none other has come forth with a "glorified" body as He did. The Apostle Paul writes by divine inspiration: "But now is Christ risen from the dead, and become the firstfruits of them that slept." First Cor. 15:20. Christ alone blazed the way and set the pattern for the general resurrection that shall take place at His second coming. "But every man in his own order: Christ the firstfruits; afterwards they that are Christ's at his coming." 1 Cor. 15:23. Again Paul writes: "For our conversation is in heaven; from whence also we look for the Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ, who shall change our vile [decaying] body, that it may be fashioned like unto his glorious body, according to the working whereby he is able even to subdue all things unto himself," Phil, 3:20 and 21. This is the blessed hope of the righteous.

Jesus said to Martha, whose brother had died, "I am the resurrection and the life." This truth He proved on this occasion and throughout His ministry. Jesus did not preach or conduct any funerals. Whenever He came in contact with the dead they were resurrected to life. It is also very true spiritually that when a soul, dead in trespasses and sins, comes in contact with "the Resurrection and the Life," he is resurrected and made a new creature in Christ to walk in newness of life.

The doctrine of the resurrection and immortality is the cornerstone of our faith and hope. Without it there would be no redemption for fallen man. The Apostle Paul says that Jesus "was raised again for our justification." Romans 4:25. Again, the Apostle contends in 1 Cor. 15 that if Christ had not been resurrected our preaching is in vain, our faith is vain, we are yet in our sins, the apostles were all

liars, the righteous dead have all perished, and the living saints have no hope after death.

Thank God for the truth that we are serving a resurrected Saviour, the One who came forth from the tomb triumphant over death, hell, and the grave. That blessed hope of immortality is instilled in the hearts of all who are partakers of His divine nature. Because He lives, we shall live also. Praise the Lord!

Thank you for your letter dated Jan. 5, 1980, contents of which have been noted.

Our brethren from the U.S.A., Bro. Jefferson Pierro, his wife Sis. Geneva Pierro, and their daughter Sis. Jefferlene Pierro, who have been in our midst since December 18, 1979, left Nigeria to return to the U.S. on Jan. 29, 1980. Saints from Kwale travelled to see them off at the Benin City Airport, while this writer went with them to Lagos where they were finally seen off.

Actually, their six-weeks stay in Nigeria constituted a fruitful period of activity. Our tour of Auchi from where we visited the village of Okpekpe put the U.S. visiting brethren in the picture of what a missionary is bound to suffer in the battle for the freedom of souls. No one can wear the great diadem without first passing through great tribulation.

Our oldest son had come home to spend a week with us and he insisted that I go with him that day. By the end of the day I realized there was something seriously wrong, so I went to bed. On Christmas day I managed to go to our daughter's home, so that the family could be together. From then until the 15th of February I was not able to get out of the house again. I continued to grow worse and suffer more for several days. I could not eat, nor could I sleep more than a few minutes at a time. I lost 25 lbs. during this time. I could only walk about 30 to 40 feet and then I had to lie back down. I would suffer such pain and cramping in my legs for thirty minutes to an hour that I would have to beg for mercy. My arms would become paralyzed and I could not use them. They would hurt terribly until someone would massage them for me. I asked the Lord to help me get something out of the suffering, and He showed me that He wanted me to feel how He suffered on the cross with His feet and hands nailed to it, trying to support His weight. I believe that I know now as I had often wondered. During this time I had seizures, would become paralyzed, and could not move, speak, open my eyes, or respond to anyone. Some of these spells lasted two hours or more. They would leave me very weak and nervous.

One morning my wife awakened about 7 o'clock and felt she needed to check on me quickly. She found me in my chair with my color gone and I could not speak above a whisper. She immediately began to pray, and I revived. She began to call different ones for prayer, and Bro. Merrill Williamson and some of the saints from Jena came, anointed and prayed for me, and I began to improve. The Lord has had to make me a new stomach, as I felt that mine was completely eaten up at one time. Today, I have a good appetite, though food still doesn't taste just right. I have been able to get outside and walk in the yard a little for the last four days. I can walk about 200 to 300 feet with a cane before I have to sit down and rest. This has been quite a trial as I have always been active.

Our son, who is an engineer in a hospital, researched this and said all the symptoms pointed to swine flu, which killed a number of people a few years ago. He also said some of the people who didn't die from it were unable to walk for a year. I feel that I have been blessed to have made this much progress. I can say that I have not been to a doctor, nor have I taken any medicine, so I can give God all the glory for what has been accomplished. I still need prayer that I can overcome the weakness in my body. I feel that this has also affected my mind and my eyesight.

Please continue to remember my wife and me, as she is not well, and I am a long way from normal.

It isn't just for me; it's for all of us who are willing to let God have His way in our lives. This is my desire—to please Him with my life so others looking on will see Christ and want Him, too.

When I was sixteen years old I had a wonderful experience with the Lord. For years I was fully saved, sanctified, and satisfied; but through neglect and by not taking the proper time to read and pray, I began to drift until one day what I had known was really wrong didn't seem so bad after all. The devil had his way of luring me into some traps he had set, and I fell prey to most of them. But, praise God, in May 1979, the Lord spoke peace to my soul once more, and I do thank Him for showing mercy to me once again. Since that time I have fought many battles, but I've also gained many victories, and it was only through the Lord that I was able to overcome.

Question and Answer Column

Question: Just what is meant by the expression, "The Person of Christ"? We see it in many articles, but the Scriptural meaning is not always clear.

Answer: First, I will insert the dictionary definition of the word person. I. A living human being, especially as distinguished from an animal or thing. 2. The composite of characteristics that make up an individual personality. 3. An individual of some specified character. 4. The living body of a human being. There are several others which clearly do not apply in this case and No.'s 1 and 4 do not closely apply as pertains to this discussion—No. 1 not at all. But we will note item No. 8 as appears in the dictionary. In theology: the separate individualities of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, as distinguished from the Godhead that unites them.

The term "Person of Christ" appears only one time in the Holy Scriptures. In 2 Cor. 2:10 Paul said, "To whom ye forgive any thing, I forgive also: for if I forgave any thing, to whom I forgave it, for your sakes forgave I it in the person of Christ." The margin here says, "In the sight of Christ." The Amplified Bible says, "In the presence (and with the approval) of Christ." Phillips' Translation says, "As before Christ." Another translation says, "By the authority of Christ." Forgiveness is one of those characteristics which make up the individual personality of Christ, and God be praised that it is. In our forgiving of another, we do so in the presence of Christ by His approval and instruction, by His authority and grace, in conformity with His doctrine and in keeping with His example which is full of mercy and kindness toward the penitent. Let us never forget this and in all our dealings and relations with our fellowmen remember that we are in the presence of Christ. We are to act under His authority, by His approval, conform to His doctrine, and follow His example. This is said in this case to be done "In the person of Christ."

While the expression itself only appears one time in Scripture, its equivalent is widespread throughout the New Testament and is a major element in our relationship with Christ. In 2 Cor. 5:20 Paul says, "Now then we are ambassadors for Christ, as though God did beseech you by us: We pray you in Christ's stead, be ye reconciled to God." In other words, Paul and every other God-called, God-sent minister of the gospel is a representative of Christ doing business for Him as an ambassador, in His name, and by His authority and commission—in the person of Christ.

All true saints live their lives in all of their aspects in the *person of Christ*. We are all representatives of Him to manifest His glory and likeness to the world. Paul said in 2 Cor. 3:2,3, "Ye are our epistle written in our hearts, known and read of all men: Forasmuch as ye are manifestly declared to be the epistle of Christ ministered by us, . . ." Col. 3:17 says,

"And whatsoever ye do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, . . ." This text covers every phase and area of the life, and it is all to be done in His name, under His supervision, by His authority and grace, and in keeping with His example—in the person of Christ.

In Mark 16:18, "They shall take up serpents; and if they drink any deadly thing, it shall not hurt them; they shall lay hands on the sick, and they shall recover." All the work of God in all its phases is to be done in His name, as His representative, in His stead, under His authority, commission, and power. In other words, in the person of Christ.

Although Christ was a human being among men in the likeness of men and in the form of a servant; yet he possessed within Him the full composite of divine characteristics that made up a personality that set Him apart from all other men. This was His real person. Saints are to conform closely to that pattern of divine characteristics which made Him what He was. And as we do this we manifest the person of Christ. Christ was ". . . the brightness of His glory, and the express image of His person, ..." (Heb. 1:3). This text refers to the relationship between Christ and His Father. Christ manifested the complete image or likeness of His Father. Col. 1:15 declared Him to be the image of the invisible God. Jesus said in John 14:9, "... he that hath seen me hath seen the Father . . . " All that God was in His divine attributes, Jesus revealed and manifested to mankind in His life. This is said to be the "Express image of His person. In other words, Jesus lived and acted in the person of God. Jesus never departed from this at any time, but He said, "The Son can do nothing of Himself, but what He seeth the Father do." In all His doings and teachings He was acting in compliance with His Father's will and under His direct authority, power, and commission.

Now the saints maintain this same relationship with Christ. 2 Cor. 3:18 says, "But we all, with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from glory to glory even as by the Spirit of the Lord." Romans 8:29 says, "For whom he did foreknow, he also did predestinate to be conformed to the image of his Son." We are to become the image of His Person and reflect His glory and manifest His characteristics to the world. Paul said in 2 Cor. 4:10, "Always bearing about in the body the dying of the Lord Jesus, that the life also of Jesus might be made manifest in our body." In Phil. 1:20 he says again, "... Christ shall be magnified in my body, whether it be by life or by death." Let us realize that nothing unlike Christ is ever going to get into heaven. He is the model, and we must conform to His likeness if we have this hope in us. Just as Christ's relationship with His Father was declared to be the express image of His person (in the Person of God); so our relationship with Christ is declared to be the image of His Person—in the Person of Christ.

Of course, the *Person of Christ* as He is distinguished from the Father and the Holy Spirit is

glorious in His own right if no one loves and serves Him and manifests His likeness to the world. To describe His glory and majesty would defy all human wisdom and rhetoric. Glimpses of His glory, majesty, power, and strength are given in Rev. 19:11-16, Rev. 1:13-16, Matt. 17:1-8, 1 Tim. 6:14-16, and other texts.

Erroneous Directions



On a certain occasion, while I was crossing the American plains, there was on the same train in which I was traveling a lady who carried a tiny baby in her arms. She had to get off in a very lonely place where the train hardly ever stopped to let off a passenger. The lady notified the conductor that she wanted to get off at that certain place. They've Been to Hell and Back

St. Paul, Minn.—Just when people maybe felt they could relax about dying—with all the reports flowing in from resuscitated patients who describe a luminous, floating afterlife—along comes a doctor whose patients say they have been to hell.

Dr. Maurice Rawlings claims to have examined reports from 300 persons who woke from near-death to tell of another worldly existence. Some were his patients, others patients of doctors across the country whom Rawlings consults with as a teacher in advanced life support for the American Heart Association.

Half the patients described a euphoric, heavenly experience.

The other half were terrified by dark, slimy pits, fiery lakes, swarms of crawly creatures.

One patient said he was carried along a conveyor belt into a room full of ovens. Another said he saw layers of hell, where the lower layer would rise up and attack the upper layer.

Rawlings made note of those experiences a year ago to write a book, "Beyond Death's Door," which he was promoting here recently.

Rawlings started paying attention to these experiences two years ago when working on a patient whose heart had stopped. He and the nurses were giving the man the full treatment—heart massage,

pacemaker, mouth-to-mouth breathing . . . "Each time he regained heartbeat and respiration, the patient screamed, 'I am in hell!'

He begged Rawlings not to stop pumping his

chest, not even for a moment.

"Don't you understand? I am in hell. Each time

you quit I go back to hell. Don't let me go back to hell!"

Rawlings said he told the man to be quiet about hell and let him get on with his treatment, but the patient's persistence got to him.

Rawlings had talked with Raymond Moody and Karlis Osis, earlier reporters of afterlife experiences, and says they have encouraged him to keep documenting cases. He was puzzled that they and Elizabeth Kubler-Ross had heard only reports of a heavenly after life. He says that is probably because they interviewed the patients several days after they had revived.

"And who, after he's had time to think about it, wants to tell you he's been to hell?"

Rawlings said he is convinced that the experiences are genuine visits to another life. If they were just dreams, he says, they would be random, varying substantially from one person to another.

But these death bed accounts, from persons of all religious persuasions and none, tend to follow the same basic sequence, Rawlings said.

The reports from hell speak of being flung down a tunnel into a dark place, an ocean or fire or a cave, a "blackness," a "black hole . . . all red and hot and on fire," a "world of horror."
