"How Shall We Escape?"

"How shall we escape, if we neglect so great salvation?" Heb. 2:3. If we were to judge the importance of being saved or not being saved by the careless, indifferent attitude of the masses of our fellow men, we might easily conclude that salvation is not a weighty consideration. The greed for worldly gain, the lust for pleasure, the pride of life, are gratified, but little attention is given to seeking after God.

"How shall we make money?" "How shall we keep and enjoy our possessions?" "How shall we spend the time for pleasure?" "How shall we make a name for ourselves in the world?" "How shall we become beautiful and attractive in our person?" "How shall we hide from others the impurity, malice, envy, bitterness, anger, hatred, murder, adultery, and infidelity that is in the heart?" are questions that are taking up more of the precious fleeting hours of life than the all-important question of being saved.

The important and serious facts connected with time and eternity are purposely avoided altogether, or lightly esteemed. A theater, circus, or some superficial attraction of a kindred nature will draw thousands, where a plain, serious discourse concerning the realities of this life, heaven, and eternity, can scarce draw a score of hearers, unless the speaker has his name previously known and extolled as a popular preacher. Notwithstanding the awful fact that hell is enlarged to receive countless myriads, and warnings are being given, the multitudes still choose to enter in at the gate that is wide, and walk the way that is broad. "The wicked shall be turned into hell, and all the nations that forget God." Psa. 9:17. "Therefore hell hath enlarged herself, and opened her mouth without measure: and their glory, and their multitude, and their pomp, and he that rejoiceth, shall descend into it." Isa. 5:14.

While people are allowing themselves to be engaged with the questions already mentioned, we are confronted with the most serious and important of all questions: "How shall we escape, if we neglect so great salvation?" No answer is given, and none is offered, and none can be found. There is no other way of

escaping the wrath of God against sin and its perpetrators, than through the salvation of Jesus Christ. "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved." Acts 4:12. How shall we escape? We cannot, except we are saved from our sins. There is no other way to escape.

Sanctification

The great underlying principle of the Church of God is scriptural unity. This is what Jesus prayed for in John 17:21. "That they all may be one; as thou, Father, art in me, and I in thee, that they also may be one in us: that the world may believe that thou hast sent me." The experience that produces this divine unity is named in the 17th verse of this prayer, "Sanctify them through thy truth: thy word is truth." In Heb. 2:11, there is another text that reveals this truth and gives us the true bond of unity: "For both he that sanctifieth and they who are sanctified are all of one: for which cause he is not ashamed to call them brethren."

It is this precious grace of sanctification that takes out all the discordant elements of carnality. Carnality is the soil in which the germs of division spring up and grow. Where this soil is removed from the moral nature of man, division is impossible. Unity is the sublime standard raised by the Lord Himself. He prayed that we may all be one as He and the Father are one. This unity between the Father and Son is such that nothing can break it. He prays that this may be the standard among His disciples.

From human viewpoint it would be impossible for man ever to become so spiritual that he would be united in this sacred bond, to the same extent as are the Father and Son; but from the divine point of view, it is possible. After the soul passes through the divine process of sanctification, there is nothing left but unity with the Father and Son, and when another soul gets the same experience, the same unity exists between them as exists between each one and God. This is God's own process of making His people one—one with God, and with all His people.

Human creeds which have divided Christendom into multitudes of factions and sects, are the production of human reasonings. These creeds are contrary to God's plan. Some of the people of God have been deceived into some of these places where carnality has its way; but when they hear the doctrine of truth concerning the unity of the people of God, and when they get the experience of sanctification, they are forever spoiled for all creeds and doctrines of men.

Without this grace, it would be impossible to bring unity among us; it is beyond the power of man, but it is the will of God that we should have this unity. There is much popular sanctification in sectarianism today, which claims the Scriptural experience, but does not bear the Scriptural fruits. A sanctification that does not produce true unity, is not the Bible kind. This popular kind teaches that people should remain in their creeds, and continue in the corruption and confusion of the religions of men; but the Bible kind calls us out of all these places, and into the unity with the Father and Son, and all sanctified people.

In speaking of the power of God to break the captivity of literal Babylon, where the people of God had been held, we read in Isa. 10:27, "And it shall come to pass in that day, that his burden shall be taken away from off thy shoulder, and his yoke from off thy neck, and the voke shall be destroyed because of the anointing." Sanctification is the anointing that breaks off and destroys all the yokes of men, and makes the soul free to worship and serve God in the beauty of holiness. It is this beautiful experience that first brought out the truth in this reformation. There was a wonderful revival of holiness all over our land. Thousands of people came out of the different denominations, because it was impossible to remain there and follow in the liberty of holiness. Other thousands were put out, because of their experiences and their consequent testimonies which would not be tolerated in the sectarian churches.

As long as this teaching was continued, separation from the various sects went on; but through the subtlety of the enemy, the denominations began preaching holiness and numbers of those who had been separated from them, again became united with them. God had something to be accomplished in these last times. He would have His Church separated from all the unholy alliances of Babylon, and have her come out separate and distinct from all confusion. The voice from heaven has now been heard throughout the land for many years: "Come out of her my people, that ye be not partakers of her sins, and that ye receive not of her plagues." Rev. 18:4. All who have obtained and maintained Bible sanctification, and have heard the voice from heaven, have gladly responded to this voice, and made their escape. Others who have not yet heard it, are ready to do so as soon as they hear.

To endeavor to carry out the principles of this reformation without the grace of sanctification, would be useless. It is only as this sublime grace is manifest, that the Bible Church is manifested. It is this experience that unifies, and beautifies the saints of the

Most High. It is this experience that manifests the bride of Christ in these dark times.

May God help us all to keep this sacred experience in our hearts, to hold it up to the world as it was held when the saints first made their escape from Babylon. It has taken this experience to bring the Church out of Babylon, and it is needed to keep it out. To let down in this respect, would soon be to lose the principles of the reformation, and soon the lines of distinction would be lost. God will have His bride separated from all sectarian confusion, separated unto Himself alone. The standard must be lifted up as it was in the beginning.

"Go through, go through the gates; prepare ye the way of the people; cast up, cast up the highway; gather out the stones; lift up a standard for the people." Isa. 62:10.

In giving the Commission to His Church, Jesus' vision was world-wide. He said, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature." Then again He said, "This gospel must first be published among all nations." To reach the unreached in the "regions beyond" is the purpose of this gospel literture ministry which is primarily and essentially a work by faith in God. Without His blessings it could not continue. This institution operates under a valid charter from the State of Oklahoma as a non-profit religious and charitable corporation, and no one connected with it receives any personal profit. All proceeds from offerings and sales above the actual operating expenses are kept in the work to expand and increase the output of free gospel literature. who work here have volunteered their services as unto the Lord with no promise of remuneration other than that in God's holy Word, and His promises have not failed. Of course, all of God's work involves sacrifice and self-denial which is the pattern and example that Jesus set before us.

Second Class Postage Rates Nearly Doubled . . .

When we mailed the February issue of "Faith and Victory" paper, we received a postage statement or charge which was nearly double that of the preceding month. Each copy of the February paper mailed to an address in the U.S. cost 5.3c in postage, and for overseas the rate is over three times that amount. Figuring eleven issues for one year times 5.3c brings a total cost of 58.3c for a year. The wholesale price of paper in eleven issues is 50c, plus the postage of 58.3c, makes an approximate total of \$1.08, not counting the cost of labor and other supplies in producing the publication. As you see, the yearly subscription price of 35c pays a little over half of the postage cost of 58.3c, and the balance of the necessary cost of production must be met by freewill offerings.

This large jump in postage rates for second class religious publications was not scheduled to take effect until 1987, but President Reagan instituted it now, as he is determined that all religious magazines and papers will eventually pay the same rate as commercial magazines and papers.

We have appreciated how our readers have responded with sufficient freewill offerings to cover

all added costs of production, so we have not had to increase the present low subscription price of 35c per year which does encourage a wider circulation. We will hold this subscription rate as long as possible, or until the Lord directs otherwise.

Within those months, our family has had four deaths. First my sister passed away the day after I arrived in Washington. I'd prayed very much about making the trip and felt the Lord's assurance that it would be a good time for me to go. How glad I was for the nice visit my sister and I had at a family reunion in August and during a phone call prior to my departure. Then not long after I returned, a nephew, who had a precious young family, was killed in a trailertruck accident. His death was very difficult for me as he looked so much like my only son. Then my late husband Forrest's brother-in-law passed away. Then December 9, my brother-in-law in Missouri died. His wife (my sister) is still grieving and looks to me for comfort.

No doubt, these deaths made a strain on my nervous system, and I began having some physical problems. Through them all these Scriptures were such a blessing to me: "Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you: For everyone that asketh receiveth; and he that seeketh findeth; and to him that knocketh it shall be opened." Matt. 7:7, 8. "And he said, The things which are impossible with men are possible with God." Luke 18:27. Also: "As he saith also in another place, Thou art a priest for ever after the order of Melchisedec." Heb. 5:6. A fourth Scripture: "For the eyes of the Lord are over the righteous, and his ears are open unto their prayers: but the face of the Lord is against them that do evil." 1 Peter 3:12. And another one in 1 Peter 5:7, "Casting all your care upon him, for he careth for you." Many times I was doing just that, casting my cares upon Him, for He alone was able to help me.

My physical ailments first started with a growth at the base of one fingernail. It grew over the nail in layers, and when it cracked open it appeared dry inside and rather flaky. After the nail healed, a couple of "spurs" (as I called them for lack of a better word) grew on my inside wrist bone. After much prayer, I noticed one night at prayer meeting that the place was flat. At the present, another spur has grown on my wrist. I'm thankful that it doesn't hurt or hinder me in using my hand. I'm trusting this will be removed by God, also.

That affliction was followed by another which was quite unexpected and scary. I was eating lunch at my daughter Rada's house. My left jaw and ear suddenly felt funny. I reached up and felt a large knot. It scared both of us. Rada phoned my other daughter, Ruby, who phoned the saints at the Golden Rule Home and our pastor. The knot would go down and then, after eating would come back up. I decided to have a doctor tell me what was wrong. I went with the intention of fully trusting the Lord to do the

work. I only wanted to know what it was. The doctor said that it was saliva stones, and he felt that I should have surgery in two days, not later than three days. Well, praise God! I never had the surgery and I no longer have the saliva stones.

My last afflictions, which were the severest in pain and suffering, consisted of three attacks, each somewhat different. First, one night my stomach hurt so much I couldn't straighten up. Question and Answer Column

Question: Will you please discuss the matter of God's hardening Pharaoh's heart and how God could do this and why?

Answer: The time of the Israelites' deliverance from Egypt was at hand and the hour of Egypt's judgment was about to strike according to God's promise made to Abraham in Gen. 15:13-16, and God was marshalling the principals into position for the

impending drama.

God had arranged for Moses to be spared at the time of his birth even though a decree had gone forth from the king for all male babies born to the Israelites to be slain at birth. Further, God had arranged for Moses to be brought up in the king's court as the son of Pharaoh's daughter and to be learned in all the wisdom of the Egyptians. Also, he was well trained in the Egyptian army and learned all the arts of war and became mighty in deeds. Further, he was placed as a commanding officer in the army where he learned well the arts and skills of leadership. God had far ranging plans for Moses' life from the start and put him through all this grooming and preparation and now he was God's man and ready to be put in the position of leader and ruler of God's people, Israel.

But just so, Pharaoh was God's man as ruler of Egypt for the coming drama. God said to Pharaoh in Ex. 9:16, "And in very deed for this cause have I raised thee up, for to show in thee my power; and that my name may be declared throughout all the earth." Let us not forget that "The most High ruleth in the kingdom of men, and giveth it to whomsoever He will"-Dan. 4:25b. He brought Pharaoh to the Egyptian throne for this very purpose, and the proceeding and facts will prove that He had the right man for the purpose and had made no mistake in His choosing. For all the major events of the Bible God brought forward selected men whose peculiar characteristics and dispositions fitted them for what He wanted them to do in that particular case. It was so here—Moses for the Israelite's leader and Pharaoh for

Egypt's ruler.

There was a long line of Egyptian rulers in the Pharaoh dynasty. All of them were not like the Pharaoh of the Exodus—strong willed with an obstinate determination and a bitter, hard, unrelenting disposition—perfectly fitted for the operation at hand. In fact, the ruler just ahead of him was of a mild, generous disposition even toward the Israelites and made their burdens lighter. God could not have carried out the full scope of His judgments upon Egypt with a ruler like that, because that ruler would, no doubt, have capitulated before it was finished. But God had decreed judgment upon the nation of Egypt (Gen. 15:14), and also judgment against all the gods of the Egyptians (Ex. 12:12). But under this Pharaoh of the Exodus who was proud, haughty, defiant,

unrelenting and showing no signs of capitulation until the judgments were complete and the land of Egypt was destroyed, and in the process, judgment had been executed against all the gods of the

Egyptians.

Now let us consider that God was preparing to bring out the Israelites from Egypt and establish them as people for Himself. Let us also consider that the Israelites of that generation were 430 years down the line from Abraham. That generation had come up in Egypt among the Egyptians, and had only a faint knowledge of Abraham's God but were deeply involved with the Egyptians in the worship of their gods; they were pretty much idolaters themselves. Therefore, if was very much necessary that all the gods of the Egyptians with whom the Isralites were familiar and participated in the worship of be judged and proved to be impotent, powerless, and worthless, and He Himself established in the minds of the Israelites as the true and living God, possessing all power and superior to all other gods.

All the plagues poured out on Egypt were directed against their gods one at a time. The Egyptians worshipped the serpent in the temple of Uraeus. The first miracle was directed against this god-Aaron's rod becoming a serpent. The Egyptian magicians did the same thing, but Aaron's serpent devouring theirs proved their serpent god to be impotent and the true God superior. The Nile River was also held sacred and revered as a god and its fish regarded as holy. When its waters were turned to blood and all its fish died and became putrid and stank, they loathed their god and fled from his banks in horror. The Egyptians also worshipped the frog; unclean mammal that he was. The plague of frogs turned their god into a curse to them. They dared not kill them because they were sacred; hence, they became to them a terror and disgust.

The plague of lice brought to an abrupt end and total halt all of their religious rites for its duration. It was directed against their priests and temples. Their law forbade any priest to approach to the altar with this loathsome insect on his body. To protect against any chance accident of this kind, they wore white linen and shaved their heads and bodies every day. But now there was no escape; the lice were every where and on the bodies of every Egyptian.

Baal-zebul was the Egyptian god of flies and had the reputation of protecting them from the swarms of flies which, at certain seasons, infest the air throughout all Egypt. The plague of flies proved the inability of this god to ward off the infestation of flies and the inability of the Egyptian magicians to remove the flies proved the superiority of the true God over their false god or idol.

The plague of rain, hail, thunder and lightning, such as they had never seen nor heard of before, was directed against the worship of Isis, as the moon, who controlled the seasons, clouds and weather. When all the prayers to Isis failed to stay the fearful tempest of God's wrath, it surely proved the folly of idolatry and

trusting in an idol god that could not protect them against the power of the true God.

The god Serapis was regarded by the Egyptians as their protector against the devastating power of locusts. There was quite an elaborate and sophisticated system of worhip to him. The plague of locusts was directed against this idol god and his system of worship and proved his inability to do what they credited him with doing.

The plague of darkness was aimed at the universal worship of Osiris, or the sun. It served to show that the true God was superior to their "lord of the sun" and could veil his splendor any time He chose and for as long as He chose.

The plague of the very grievous murrain upon all the cattle of the Egyptians which produced the death of all their cattle was directed against their system of brute worship. This system prevailed throughout, and they had a large image of the sacred bull at the entrance of some of their temples.

It was customary for the priests at their heathen altars to take some of the ashes of the sacrifice and throw into the air. They believed this would protect them from and ward off any evil. When Moses at God's command took ashes and cast into the air, it became a very fine dust throughout all Egypt and produced boils on the bodies of all the people of the Egyptians, thus turning what they believed to be their protection from evil into a very painful and grievous torment to them.

Thus the whole idolatrous system of the Egyptians with all of its gods was judged in this operation as well as the nation of Egypt who had oppressed and afflicted the Israelites being judged and destroyed. At the same time, a separation was made between the Egyptians and the land of Goshen where the Israelites dwelt, and none of these things were happening over in Goshen, but the Israelites were only beholding these things with their eyes. This surely should have confirmed to them that their God was above all other gods and there was none beside Him, and that the true God of their fathers was their refuge, strength, defense and protector.

Suppose this chain of events would have been interrupted at any point and not have been carried through to its conclusion. There would have been some of the idol gods who would not have been judged, and therefore the Israelites would have come out with perhaps as much reverence for them as the true God of their fathers. Therefore it was absolutely imperative that Pharaoh remain adamant throughout the entire operation and not capitulate at any point.

Therefore, God kept hardening his heart that he would not surrender until God's work was finished and His objectives gained. God had raised up Pharaoh for this special time and purpose (Ex. 9:16). Again, God said He would have mercy on whom He would have mercy and whom He would He hardened (Rom. 9:18). But let us not make the serious mistake of questioning God's sovereign rights to deal with every individual as He sees fit because He is the One Who searches all

hearts and tries all reins and knows exactly what is in men's hearts, and we don't. And He possesses the power and ability to make even the wrath of men to praise Him, and when He is dealing with someone who is obstinate, rebellious and defiant against Him, He can use him in whatever way necessary to accomplish His purposes and be justified in it.

The Consequence

"For to be carnally minded is death . . ." These words still burn in my soul as they did some time ago when my Bible fell open to the eighth chapter of Romans. Since then, I have been asking God more than ever to guide me with His Spirit and by His grace, and to show me any carnality in my life. He has made me to know that this is a serious, life-ordeath matter.

"There is therefore now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit. For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus hath made me free from the law of sin and death. For what the law could not do, in that it was weak through the flesh, God sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh, and for sin, condemned sin in the flesh: That the righteousness of the law might be fulfilled in us, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit. For they that are after the flesh do mind the things of the flesh; but they that are after the Spirit the things of the Spirit. For to be carnally minded is death; but to be spiritually minded is life and peace. . . . For if ye live after the flesh, ye shall die; . . ." Rom. 8:1-6, 13.

By the help of God, I will endeavor to show some of the consequences of living after the flesh. Oh, everlasting, eternal death! The Scripture plainly tells us that if we live after the flesh we shall die, eternally and spiritually. Paul also said in the sixth chapter of Galatians that if a person sows to the flesh, he will of the flesh reap corruption.

Dear reader, if you will persist in sowing to the flesh, on the authority of what God has said, if you do not turn around, your end is the inevitable—you will die. The greatest tragedy of all is that not only will hardened sinners be found in that dark place, but among them professed Christians who, in many people's eyes, were just fine. Somewhere in their experience we can see that self was allowed to live and the flesh was minded more than the Spirit.

Dear Christian, whether or not you make heaven depends on what you are doing right now. Are you minding the Spirit—or the flesh? "To them who by patient continuance in well doing seek for glory and honor and immortality, ETERNAL LIFE: but unto them that are contentious, and do not obey the truth, but obey unrighteousness—indignation and wrath, tribulation and anguish, upon every soul of man that doeth evil, of the Jew first, and also of the Gentile." Romans 2:7-9.

Eternal life is yours, Christian, if you follow the Spirit, moved continually by its beckenings.

But if your footsteps begin to follow the flesh, wrath, tribulation and anguish are sure to be yours. If a born-again, sanctified saint of God fails to follow the Spirit's leadings, provides openings for the flesh to abide, brings to life Self, and does not immediately repent, his mind will be programmed by the flesh and not by the Spirit. Eccl. 8:11, "Because sentence against an evil work is not executed speedily, therefore the heart of the sons of men is fully set in them to do evil." If I do not kill a carnal thought instantly, when the same idea appears again, it will most likely lodge in my mind and become a part of me. Thus, I have become corrupted.

Because the devil is so subtle, this takeover is gradual and many times unknown to the individual. The person has been following the flesh for so long that he does not realize when the Spirit leaves. This is the reason why it is so dangerous. In Hebrews 6:4-8, this type of person is described and his end told. The consequence is that he will lose his salvation, and, sad to say, his condition is worse than it was before he was ever saved.

One of the consequences of following after the flesh is that you will lose the fellowship of the saints—of spiritual people. Fellowship is the blending and uniting of one's spirit with another. If your spirit is corrupted by the flesh, is it any wonder why you feel you don't belong any more? Is there any wonder why you can't understand your brother?

Minding the flesh will remove all the joy and natural flow of devotion and praise out of your life until you must resort to other sources to "pump up" your joy. Your emotions take the place of spirituality, and since emotions go up and down like an elevator, when you reach the bottom floor you'll begin saying, "Is this salvation??"

Since you'll be trying to cheer yourself up all the time, you will have no time to help those around you. Besides, you feel ashamed to say anything about God to anybody. Sin brings a shame upon a person, and though he may try to cast it aside and "chin up," it is still there. He knows his salvation is not what it used to be.

Another consequence is that the things of the world will begin to look better and better to you, because salvation just doesn't satisfy you anymore. Since the temptation to think about these things was not resisted the first time, it is easier to yield now. James 1:13-16. Whether or not I have been walking after the Spirit will affect the way I will be able to face these temptations. There will always be temptations to the saint, but these are from outside influences and cannot harm him if he stays near God. The trouble lies in the person's heart. When a saved and sanctified person yields to sin, it is because something akin to sin was first allowed in his heart, a little at a time. With outside influences pulling, and with the inside weakened and something 'pulling" down there, the person is soon conquered.

The last part that I would like to deal with is the fruit produced by walking after the flesh. What kind

of fruit are you bearing? James said, "The fruit of righteousness is sown in peace with them that make peace." Read Galatians 5:16-26. The Scriptures here are vital to our daily lives. Compare and contrast the fruits of the Spirit with the fruits of the flesh. Can you imagine such evil fruits in the life of a saint? But how beautiful the person who is bearing the fruits of the Spirit! Friend, the emphasis and whole matter rest on whether we are walking after the Spirit. If we are, the Spirit will become such a part of us that all self will be slain. Our fruits are determined by what is inside producing the fruit. If the Spirit is there, unhindered by self, all that will be produced will be fruits of the Spirit. If self is there, however, those fruits we bear will be unlike Christ.

Eph. 4:29 says, "Let no corrupt communication proceed out of your mouth, [If it comes out of the mouth, was it not first in the heart?] but that which is good to the use of edifying, that it may minister grace unto the hearers." 1 John 4:20, "If a man say, I love God and hateth his brother, he is a liar." (Where does hate come from?)

1 Cor. 1:10, "Now I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye all speak the same thing, that there be no divisions among you; but that ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment."

Dear reader, as I read these verses and many more in the Bible, I am more and more persuaded that everything that the Church of God teaches, everything that salvation through Christ has given us, everything we as saints of God strive for, will be affected and destroyed if we walk after the flesh. If we walk and follow after the Spirit, a happy, holy, sinless life is ours.

The choice is yours. Will you not seek the Lord earnestly, and ask Him to forgive you for walking after the flesh? If you have been having this type of problem, I beg you to begin a self-denial right now, and put to death all those fleshly things and self that have been making your life so miserable. Let go of yourself, and enter into the joy of the Lord.
