The Brethren

In the November issue of the Faith and Victory, I wrote a message on "The Brethren." Since printing that message, I have felt impressed to add some to it. The thought we want to deal with is restoring our brother.

Restore means to bring back to the original. When something has been lost, marred, or is not just exactly what it used to be, we restore, or bring it back to the original. In Galatians 6:1, it says, "Brethren, if a man be overtaken in a fault, ye which are spiritual, restore such an one in the spirit of meekness; considering thyself, lest thou also be tempted." We are told here that for one to be able to restore or bring back somebody to the original, and help him to overcome his fault and see himself (his error), we first have to be a spiritual person ourself. If we are not spiritual, we will not deal with that one in mercy as we should. We need to put ourself in his shoes, so to speak. We need to consider if we were the one that was being admonished, and deal with them in the same spirit and attitude in which we would want them to come to us. That way, if we consider ourself, we will always give justice.

Matthew 18:15-17, says, "Moreover if thy brother shall trespass against thee, go and tell him his fault between thee and him alone: if he shall hear thee, thou hast gained thy brother. But if he will not hear thee, then take with thee one or two more, that in the mouth of two or three witnesses every word may be established. And if he shall neglect to hear them, tell it unto the church, but if he neglect to hear the church, let him be unto thee as an heathen man and a publican." Sometimes brethren do trespass against each other-maybe not intentionally, but they do things that try our patience, and things that we are not able to understand. Too many times when a brother trespasses against us, we go and tell someone else, or we tell it to the church or the public. But the Bible said to "go and tell him his fault between thee and him alone." Many times things could be restored and overcome with just a good heart-to-heart talk. The Scripture went on to say if he would not hear you, to take one or two more with you. Get some more good spiritual brethren and take them with you and

try to reason the thing out. If you can't, then after ample time, you could take it to the church, the body of saints, and discuss the problem. Then if that person should neglect to hear the church and rejects admonition, we could let them be as a heathen and a publican; we don't have to have fellowship anymore. But this is not something that can be done overnight. It is something that takes a lot of patience, endurance, and longsuffering before we should let them be as a heathen and a publican.

Abraham set a good example. When he and Lot were unable to dwell together anymore because their substances were too great and their herdsmen could not get along, Abraham gave Lot a choice. If he would go one way. Abraham would go the other, and vice versa. Lot chose the rich, fertile valleys, the good grazing land, and pitched his tent toward Sodom. Lot made a bad mistake. After a time, the enemy took Lot, his family, and all of his possessions. When Abraham heard of it, he did something about it. He still remembered that brotherhood; he took all his armed soldiers and went and brought Lot and all his substance back. Now, reason could stand that Abraham could have said, "Lot, you should not have pitched your tent toward Sodom anyway. You shouldn't have chosen this rich land and let me have what was left over, so I'm not going to help you out." No, Abraham did not feel that way. Lot was still his brother and he loved him, and went and brought him back. Oh, we need such love for the brethren that we can reach out in compassion and love, and do our best to restore them and bring them back if possible.

Joseph often went to the field where his older brethren were taking care of the flocks. In Gen. 37:14, Jacob told Joseph, "Go, I pray thee, . . . again." Perhaps Joseph took some nice food to them, some good parched corn, maybe some butter, honey, and good bread. When he found them he would want to know how they were faring. You know, God wants us to check on our brother once in awhile; see how he's faring, how he's doing, see if you can give him a little encouragement, or if you can give him a little lift along the way. 1 John 3:17, says, "But whoso hath this world's good, and seeth his brother have need, and shutteth up his bowels of compassion from him, how dwelleth the love of God in him?" We need to have pity for our brothers and sisters in the Lord and check on them once in awhile to see if there's anything we can do to encourage them.

Now comes the sad part of this message. Sometimes the brethren do leave the Church; sometimes they do betray us and go astray, and follow after false doctrines. We have witnessed this thing and it is heartbreaking. Sometimes our brethren can be restored and brought back, and sometimes they can't. However, God wants us to do our best lest we fail.

There are some situations in which we go as far as we can and we cannot do any more. There was a certain situation that existed between a brother and me in which we disagreed on a certain thing. We talked, and tried to get it out of the way, but we were not able to come to an agreement. God spoke to me and said, "You've said the last thing that I want you to say about the situation to this brother. You just leave it in my hands." Never again did I bring this subject up, and God did work it out later on, thank the Lord. Sometimes it is good to talk to a certain extent, or up to a certain point, but then we reach the place that we have done all we can, said all we are required to say; we will then just have to leave it in God's hands.

The Scripture says, "But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another." 1 John 1:7a. That's what brings this wonderful fellowship—both parties walking in all the light they have. But if I fail to walk in the light and you continue walking in the light, it will break our fellowship.

We know that there are false brethren, because the Apostle Paul said he was in perils of false brethren. Paul had them to contend with in his day and we still have false brethren today. There are still people who have a bad spirit and come in among us, try to be a saint dressed up in sheep's clothing, but inwardly they are ravening wolves. They cannot get by very long without the saints detecting what kind of spirit they are of.

In 2 Thessalonians 3:6, we are commanded to "withdraw yourselves from every brother that walketh disorderly, and not after the tradition which he received of us." Now to walk disorderly means more than just having a fault or making a mistake. It means someone that has gotten out of line; someone going off and teaching against the traditions of the Bible, bringing in other doctrines, and doing things that we know are contrary to the teaching of the Bible and the saints. After those people have been dealt with in the Bible manner and they will not hear, then we have to withdraw ourselves from them. This is a sad condition to think of—that we would have to withdraw our fellowship from anyone. Nevertheless, it does happen sometimes; however, it should be our last resort after every effort has been exhausted to try to restore and bring them back and convince them, after much prayer, maybe even fasting, much patience, longsuffering, and we have done everything we know to do. Then if they will not hear us we have to discontinue to fellowship them. This is not an easy thing to do. David mentioned that if it was someone that was our enemy, or a stranger that did us wrong, it would not be so bad; but it is those in whom we have had sweet counsel and sweet fellowship. Oh, how sad this is: sometimes, those that we had sweet counsel with, those we had sweet fellowship with, those that we toiled and labored with-now they are gone from the saints. They went their way; they are no more with us. Sometimes they return and sometimes they never return; nevertheless, let us be sure that we have done everything that we know to do before we pass judgment.

Where Do You Stand?

He that hath clean hands, and a pure heart; who hath not lifted up his soul unto vanity, nor sworn deceitfully. He shall receive the blessing of the Lord, and righteousness from the God of his salvation." Meditate on this for a few moments: I am sure that your heart's desire is to live in the presence of God, but you will never be able to stand there if you have any blemish upon your soul.

Are you holding back from forgiving someone? This leaves such a coldness upon one's heart. Until you have consecrated to it, you will never be able to pray freely. Without unconstrained prayer, a soul is not able to live. This is exactly what the enemy wants. Are you harboring an attitude of self-righteousness inside of you? Do you fully understand what self-righteous means? Confident of one's own righteousness, especially smugly moralistic and intolerant of the opinions and behavior of others. It is imperative that we realize that we have NO righteousness of ourselves. Isaiah 64:6, says that "all our righteousnesses are as filthy rags."

Is there some bit of vanity hidden away, deep down in your heart that shows up once in a while? Oh, be ever so careful to recognize this evil thing. Vanity means excessive pride in one's appearance, qualities, achievements, etc. Job 35:13, says, "Surely God will not hear vanity, neither will the Almighty regard it." Perhaps the reason you don't have enough of God is because of this pride.

The opposite of vanity is humility—the greatest Christian virtue. J. W. Byers, in his book Bible Humility writes, "We are all seeking to be more useful in the hands of God and ofttimes we fail to find this place because it is down so low in the path of humility that to take such a path seems to lead us into complete uselessness and the qualifications we have sought become disqualifications. Now we must learn to become disqualified. This is what God wants to teach us. He can only work perfectly in us when we are wholly abandoned to Him."

Give up all of yourself to God. The enemy will certainly try to hinder you as you gain ground, but run, dear Christian, with your fingers in your ears crying, "Eternal life, eternal life!"

In these days of moral wickedness, the Church of God must be watchful. We must all search ourselves to see if we have picked up any worldly attitudes or compromised in any way. Destruction starts with something that seems small and petty, and ends up in hell. We must each individually defeat the purposes of the devil.

As the darkness of sin and wickedness crowds in closer around the camp of the saints, may the light of our lives shine brighter and brighter. Christian, brighten the corner where you are! The light of your life may serve as a beacon to some poor soul struggling to know the right way to go.

The freedom that America offers should be held dear to our hearts. Think of what it would mean some Sunday morning to find the chapel doors locked by the government. What a blow it would be! Unfortunately, our government is not incapable of this type of action. Some of the articles passed into legislation make it increasingly more difficult for one to exercise freedom of religious convictions.

In some states, citizens are no longer at liberty to determine the environment in which their children are educated. Many schools are required to be state-certified or may be forced to close. Parents who wish to trust God for the divine physical healing of their children are subject to trial and prosecution. The irony of this is that the government has condoned, legalized, and in some cases actually financed the murder of unborn children through abortion.

In a fairly recent city counsel meeting, the counsel gave support to the organization of Planned Parenthood. The organization offers the alternative of abortion to those who are unwilling to accept responsibility for what they have brought on themselves. At the same counsel meeting, a decision was delayed on whether or not dogs from the city pound should be donated to a college for research, because it was feared that such a measure would be inhumane.

Such is the society that we find ourselves facing. Values are misplaced and priorities confused. Let us make a renewed effort to earnestly and diligently pray for the leaders of our land. Pray for a general revival of traditional moral values and for a renewal of righteousness in the spirit of the people.

We read in Luke 9:55, that Christ informed two of His disciples, James and John, that they knew not what manner of spirit they were of. Jesus had rebuked them for their impetuous desire to call down fire from heaven and destroy the Samaritans who had refused to entertain them because they were Jews. No doubt James and John felt their anger toward the inhospitable Samaritans was justified, for their refusing the Son of God and the truth. Yet Jesus rebuked His followers.

Some people of our present day are just as zealously defending their truth and are unaware of the spirit they are of. The Judgment Day will declare the condition of each spirit, so it would be well to take an investigative inventory now.

"For the Word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing even to the dividing asunder of soul and spirit, and of the joints and marrow, and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart. Neither is there any creature that is not manifest in his sight: but all things are naked and opened unto the eyes of him with whom we have to do." Heb. 4:12, 13. By this we know that God discerns our very intents. He, by His Word, can separate between soul and spirit.

Soul and spirit are one, yet may be separate. The soul is that part of us that will live eternally. It does and will always exist. There is no way to change certain set conditions of the soul. It is a set requisite for eternal life and is, in a sense, out of our jurisdiction. However, there is a part of our soul that we

can change. This is the spirit. Think of it this way. There are some characteristics about an individual that he can affect and some that he cannot. The shape of the nose and chin are inherited and there is little one can do to alter this. However, one can affect his appearance by personal grooming, manner of dress, etc. Our entire appearance makes an impression upon those with whom we come in contact, yet the impression can be altered by these things that are changeable.

As we live from day to day, the thoughts and attitudes that we form make up the kind of spirit that we have. The Bible speaks of a haughty spirit. Some think themselves of more worth than others. Those who have the Spirit of Christ will manifest a genuine humility.

In Romans it speaks of a spirit of slumber. There are some who have developed opinions with which they have walled themselves about until it is nearly impossible to penetrate their souls with the untainted gospel.

Let us take care how we shape our spirit. As God views our hearts and discerns the intents thereof, let's endeavor to display that which He will find pleasure in. "Whose adorning let it not be that outward adorning... but let it be the hidden man of the heart, in that which is not corruptible, even the ornament of a meek and quiet spirit, which is in the sight of God of great price." 1 Peter 3:3, 4.

MISSION REPORT FROM SOUTH INDIA

Who Will Go?



"Then flew one of the seraphims unto me, having a live coal in his hand, which he had taken with the tongs from off the altar: and he laid it upon my mouth, and said, Lo, this hath touched thy lips; and thine iniquity is taken away, and thy sin purged. Also I heard the voice of the Lord, saying, Whom shall I send, and who will go for us? Then said I, Here am I; send me. And he said, Go. . . ." Isaiah 6:6-8. 9a.

"Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, . . . teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you. . . ." Matt. 28:19, 20. "And the Lord said unto the servant, Go out into the highways and hedges. . . ." Luke 14:23.

The question is, Who will go? Go where? How about a little place in the hills where a few have come out of sectism, taking their stand for the truth, where a number expressed they were tired of sectism, where at least a dozen men and women lifted their hands acknowledging they needed spiritual help? There is not much pay, but a lot of hard work. Who will go?

How about a place where there is a real nice group of new converts who are begging for someone to come and teach them? "But," you say, "I would have to leave my nice new home." Who will go?

How about down South where there is a large congregation pleading for someone to help them? "But," you say, "I don't like down South, and how would I live?" Who will go?

What about over in North Carolina where a little group has been trying to hold on for years? Some get discouraged and give up, then they will try again. "What we need," they say, "is a pastor." "But," you say, "I want to live where my children are." Who will go?


I Am Your Tongue

Question and Answer Column

Question: What are some of the identifying signs of SELF and how does it manifest itself?

Answer: This is a follow-up of last month's article in this column. SELF is such an important fellow and so predominant in people's lives that I feel he deserves more attention than was given him in the one article last month. And, oh, how he loves that attention! SELF thrives on attention and will pay any price to get it—whether good or bad. Some times when things have been going rather smoothly for a time, a self-dominated person who has been starved of attention will "throw a spell" or "act up," and create a commotion, or act naughty in order to get the attention he craves.

Now I will identify SELF as a murderer and insurrectionist. He may not like that exactly, but he will pay that price, too, in order to draw attention to himself. Barabbas was a murderer and insurrectionist and he stands as a topnotch type of SELF. He stood directly opposed to Christ in Pilate's judgment hall that day. Pilate, in his effort to release Jesus and save Him that day, picked out the worst prisoner he had and set him up against Christ and said to the Jews, "Which one of these two shall I release unto you?" It would appear obvious, so Pilate thought, too, that the choice here would be an easy one—that the Jews would choose Christ rather than Barabbas. But they didn't. They said, "Crucify Jesus and give us Barabbas." In the anti-type of this, the SELF-LIFE stands directly opposed to the Christ life in the hearts and lives of many people. SELF will murder the Christ life in your soul. There is no possible grounds for coexistence of the two in the same heart. Jesus said, "No man can serve two masters." Matt. 6:24. Folks, when Jesus says a thing cannot be done, we should just as well accept it that it can't be done and quit trying. A choice must be made: We must in our hearts either say to give us SELF and let the Christ life die; or say to give us Christ and let the SELF-

LIFE die.

SELF is also an insurrectionist and will be continually and perpetually rising up in rebellion against the laws of the kingdom of God and the kingship of Jesus Christ. Jesus knew that no man could serve Him while SELF was prevalent in his life, so He just said for us to unload it at the start if we intended to follow Him. In Matt. 16:24, He said, ". . . if any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me." Self denial is the first condition of discipleship.

We have another good example in type of SELF the Gibeonites. They dealt wittingly and deceitfully with Joshua and the elders of Israel and tricked them into making a league with them. (9th chap, of Joshua) Joshua and the elders very soon learned that they had been tricked and deceived by the Gibeonites but because of the league between them they could not destroy them. But they were reduced to perpetual bondage and servitude to be hewers of wood and drawers of water for the Israelites. SELF must be put under. Paul expressed it this way: "But I keep under my body, and bring it into subjection: lest that by any means, when I have preached to others, I myself should be a castaway." 1 Cor. 9:27. Paul knew the destructive power of the self-life and of the flesh so he just put it down, kept it down, and never gave it a chance to assert itself at all. God help you and me to do the same thing with this pestilent fellow.

When a person actuated by SELF is hurt, he will go about seeking someone to tell his hurt to in order to receive their sympathy. Every person actuated by SELF relishes sympathy. They feed on it and are nurtured by it. But the sad part is that they will not shrink from destroying by slander and gossip the person nearest to them in order to get sympathy. The saddest part of all is that he is actually destroying himself while, at the same time, being deceived into thinking he is building himself up because of the sympathy he is receiving from another. This makes the one extending sympathy in such a case a contributor to the delinquency and destruction of the one seeking such sympathy.

This course of action is only feeding and nourishing that which one should be seeking to mutilate and destroy. God permits hurtful things to happen to us to give us an opportunity to further destroy the self-life out of us. If we cooperate with God at this point, humble our hearts and submit to Him, the desired end will be obtained. But if we resent, buck up against it, and go the sympathy seeking route, we will feed and nourish that self-life with all of its destructive powers within us and weaken ourselves to meet our problems in life.

The course we should follow in such cases are these: (1) When you are hurt and feel starved for sympathy and feel you must get to some certain individual as soon as possible to talk things over with him, just remain separate and aloof from him and refuse to discuss your problem even if you are with him. (2) When you feel that you just have to say something and if you don't say something you will

burst, that is the best time in the world to just keep quiet and say nothing. (3) When you feel strongly inclined to pout, just get more talkative and more involved than usual in the activities going on around. (4) When you feel that you just want to give someone a good "letting alone," just get closer to him and become more conversant and friendly with him than ordinarily. By these means and more we are cooperating with God in those times to destroy the self-life and increase the Christ life within us.

We are told by the experts that self preservation is the first law of nature. The Bible verifies this, too. In Job 2:4, we read, "All that a man hath will he give for his life." Therefore, I conclude that if you could only see the power of SELF to destroy your health and happiness here and your eternal life hereafter, you would be inclined to resent, reject, and stoutly resist it by every effective means available to you.

Eternal and Temporal Things

The things we see are temporal, or passing. The things we cannot see are eternal, or everlasting. God is eternal, having neither beginning nor end. Rev. 22:13, "I am Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the end, the first and the last." The Word of God is eternal. John 1:1-5: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. The same was in the beginning with God. All things were made by him; and without him was not any thing made that was made. In him was life; and the life was the light of men. And the light shineth in darkness; and the darkness comprehended it not." John 1:14, "And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us, (and we beheld his glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father,) full of grace and truth." Psalms 119:89, "For ever, O Lord, thy word is settled in heaven." Matt. 24:35, "Heaven and earth shall pass away, but my words shall not pass away." In Christ is eternal life. John 3:16, "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." Heaven is eternal. Rev. 22:5. "And there shall be no night there; and they need no candle, neither light of the sun; for the Lord God giveth them light: and they shall reign for ever and

Now let us consider some things that are not eternal. This life and the things that pertain to it are passing. Sometimes a night may seem so long that we feel it will never end, but it will. Perhaps we get sick, or know of someone who has been sick for a long time. It seems the sickness will last forever, but it won't; it will come to an end—either with healing or in death. We may have a good job, a nice house, a devoted wife or husband, and a dear little family. Maybe we think we will just take it easy and enjoy our secure lives. We can for awhile; but it will end. Children grow up and leave the nest. One by one each of the family will die. You will bury them and perhaps remember them a few years by carrying

flowers to their graves. But after a time that person's affect on our life gradually fades. If we want to never be forgotten, let us come to Christ and get to know Him and Him to know us. God will never forget us, nor leave us. John 14:16: "And I will pray the Father, and he shall give you another Comforter, that he may abide with you for ever." No end to this abiding!

Sometimes there are things in life that men seem to think will last. There was once a ship which cost almost ten million dollars to build. It was the *Titanic*. She had been referred to as "unsinkable." On the night of April 14, 1915, on her first actual voyage, the *Titanic* was sailing smoothly across the North Atlantic. No one on the ship dreamed of how near death he was. They had been told the ship was unsinkable; therefore, there was no reason for worry or anxiety. The ship was not eternal; it came to an end—a quick end. Practically head on the ship hit an iceberg. The submerged portion of the iceberg ripped open a 300 ft. gash below the ship's waterline. Within a couple of hours fifteen hundred lives were lost when the ship went down.

We should never put our confidence in the flesh, or material things, for they will come to an end. Let us grasp the things that are eternal—the true and living God and the salvation He has to offer. Let us be sober, watch, and pray, and put more value in eternal things than in temporal things.
