"Thy Will Be Done"

"Father, if thou be willing, remove this cup from me: nevertheless not my will, but thine, be done." Luke 22:42.

Much has been said about this verse; many songs have been sung; and many tears have fallen. Yet I'm drawn more and more to the One who was so endued with grace and power to have the ability to say these words and to mean them from the depths of His heart.

Song No. 152 in the Evening Light Songs, "Thy Will Be Done" has always been so poignantly beautiful to me. I look at the words and sing them softly and feelingly; and hot, scalding tears come unbidden to my eyes. Within the very depths of my soul, there springs up an earnest desire and longing in my heart to serve Him with all my talents, time, and entire life. I feel an indescribable emotion: it is pain, joy, sadness and determination all mixed together, and still it is more than that. I know exactly what someone means when they say that something is so beautiful that it hurts. This scene of Christ in the garden is so beautiful and awe-inspiring that it brings a deep pain and longing.

Let us be silent awhile and contemplate what Jesus, the Son of God, did there in the Garden of Gethsemane.

It is night time and there is no light, save for the moon and the stars. In my imagination, there is a half moon shining which gives out just enough light for me to see vague forms and shadows.

Shhhh! There's Someone kneeling there; over there, in the garden. He's kneeling on the grass and I can see that His head is bowed low. I can see that the moonlight is bathing Him; but He notices nothing. I can tell, even from this distance, that this One is in deep anguish and agony of mind. Oh, see Him there as He struggles with some deep inner conflict.

I hear a groaning from where I stand. He is saying, "Oh, Father, if Thou be willing, remove this cup from me. Father, my flesh cringes at the thought of the pain I know I must suffer. I know that Thou

lovest me; if Thou be willing, remove this cup from me." But, in the same breath, "Yet, not my will but Thine, be done." I can see Him there in agony, wrestling with the flesh; and then His meek and humble disposition as He consents to His Father's will.

He gets up and walks slowly to a rock where now I perceive three figures in a heap. He looks sorrowfully at them for a moment and says, "Oh, why are you sleeping? Rise and pray, lest ye be tempted. Do you not understand what is to come?" He walks away and the disciples try to pray but sleep overcomes them again.

Jesus slowly and tiredly walks awhile, and then in desperation falls to His knees again. "Oh, God, help me, Father!" And then again, "Nevertheless not my will but thine, be done." He continues to pray; I see His lips moving, and, stepping closer, I see great

drops of blood on His forehead.

Then a light, a soft, luminescent light, descends from above and I see the form of an angel come to Him and gently smooth the pallid brow. Jesus leans on the angel for a moment, and then He straightens up with a sigh and stands with bowed head and clasped hands before the heavenly Being. Neither of them say a word; they stand silently facing each other. Almost imperceptably I see Jesus nod slowly with a deep sadness. The angel looks at Him with compassion for a moment longer and then gently, and slowly ascends to heaven.

I see Jesus looking up after this angel and then walk to where the disciples sleep yet again. Perhaps He's thinking that He is now ready; He can do what must be done. But he sees them sleeping and His shoulders sag a little. Again I see Him wake them up to pray as He goes back yet another time to converse

with His heavenly Father.

After another agonizing prayer, He again rises and stands, His hands loosely by His side.

I hear in the distance the sounds of people shouting, and as the moments go by I hear them getting louder as the soldiers get closer. I realize with a sudden, awful certainty what is about to happen. I quickly look to Jesus to see Him for the last few moments.

He makes no movement. He merely stands there meekly, accepting the fact that the soldiers are coming NOW. Again I see His lips move: "Thy will be done."

REPORT OF SIS. KEISER'S MISSIONARY TRIP TO GHANA, W. AFRICA

Dear Bro. Flynn, co-workers, and all saints scattered abroad: Greetings of Christian love to all of you in the precious name of Jesus.

"He hath shewed his people the power of his works, that he may give them the heritage of the heathen." Psa. 111:6.

I arrived home on Jan. 25, 1983, from a very successful visit on the mission field in Akumadan-Ashanti. Ghana, W. Africa. Jim Akwasi's uncle, John Duku Agyemang, a military man, met me and quickly whisked me through customs. Soon I found myself face to face with the young man to whom I had been writing concerning the true Church of God. His younger brother Kofi Beriman and a young sister, Glenna, were also there to meet me. After a short ride we were all bedded down in the uncle's home. It took the better part of the next two days to travel the 190 miles from Accra where the airport is, to Akumadan-Ashanti, the village where I was to spend a very busy week. After very long waits, we traveled by two different buses, packed like "sardines in a can," over very rough roads. We were stopped several times by the police for inspections. Every place we stopped we were met by women carrying on their heads things to sell, and with babies wrapped on their backs. Oranges were a very popular item.

Upon arrival at our destination, I was given a room in an experimental agriculture division where Anane Cromwell, the overseer, and his wife lived. There was no running water or electricity in the building. Jim Akwasi and his brother Kofi Beriman cooked for me on a single-burner kerosene stove. Food was scarce and very high priced. Such commodities as bread, sugar, and milk were almost impossible to buy. No kind of butter was available.

Jim took me to the offices of several of the denominational preachers in the village. I talked the true Church of God to them; about being born into her, and Holy Spirit leadership. They each one agreed I was saying it right. Then they came collectively to talk and ask questions. I could only see union and 'not unity, unless they would come out of their false doctrines. When I told them the ministry in the Church of God didn't receive salaries but rather looked to God for their living, it was too much for them to take. After four or five visits they all left, went back to their little flocks, and never returned. I was thankful to God for taking care of this situation. I knew God wanted to plant a true Church of God in

Ghana, and all of this other would have meant division and confusion.

On the morning of the only Sunday I was there, we had a service on the veranda of the place where I was staying. A good many came from the village, and after preaching the plan of salvation from the heart chart, a good number were saved including Jim Akwasi's mother Elizabeth Baah, who came out of the Catholic church; his brother Kofi Beriman, and Anane Cromwell. A young man, Kofi Appiah, interpreted for me. He is in another church and is very unhappy with conditions there. I talked to him at length about the Church of God, the leadership of the Holy Spirit, and he was very pleased. I am trusting he will "come out of her" and receive the truth.

Sunday night we had a street meeting with loud speakers. The lighting was so poor we did not try to read from the Bible, but brought a simple gospel message from the heart, anointed by the Holy Spirit. An altar call was given and fifty pressed their way forward from out of the crowd to be saved from their sins.

The last night we were there over 150 people came out to a service on the veranda. They filled the veranda, the steps, and the yard. We talked about the Church of God; went over the qualifications for pastors, deacons, and various duties concerning husbands and wives in the Church, and duties of the congregation. Bro. Jim Akwasi was appointed overseer of the congregation. He was the one who carried the burden to have the Church of God planted there.

I am very thankful for the leadership of the Holy Spirit in this mission to Ghana. It was He who led Bro. Jim to write to me, and put a desire in his heart to have a Church of God planted there; it was He who prompted me to respond to the letters sent across the miles with letters about the true Church of God; and it was He who kindled a fire in my breast to respond to the need there. It was the Holy Spirit who put down and out the elements of division which tried to creep in; and it was He who led people to repentance and to a born-again experience which made them members of the true Church of God. We ascribe all praise, honor, and glory to God for all He has done on behalf of this mission.

This victory presents some very present needs. The Church there is asking for a missionary to come and spend some time with them. So this request has burdened me to ask God for someone who will consecrate their life to go and stay with them for as long as they are needed. I am praying and seeking to obtain a prolonged visa for at least one year, either for some brother of God's choosing who will feel the burden and answer the call, or even for myself to go back on the field if it is the will of God for me to do so. Lasting good cannot be accomplished over night. God has begun a work there and He wants to finish it with the help of His people. The work is so new it shouldn't be left alone too long without some experienced worker to help them become established in the truth.

Bro. Jim's mother has donated two acres of land on which to build a chapel and mission house. They are looking to the Church of God in America to help them. The mission house should be built first so that whoever will give themselves to this work will have a clean place to stay.

Dear saints, will you pray with me concerning these needs? And then go a little farther and sacrifice that this new work will be established? The end of time is upon us. May we, as the people of God with the truth, be stirred as never before to take this gospel to the ends of the earth. We owe this to a lost world.

I've been writing to Sis. Dorothy Keiser for about two years. I wrote of spiritual things and she, most of the time, answered questions and preached about the true Church of God. I was encouraged by her letters to have a Church of God established here in Akumadan-Ashanti, Ghana. I wrote to her three or four months ago and she felt inspired by the Holy Spirit to make a trip here. By God's grace she arrived in Ghana safely as scheduled, and she was welcomed to our soil with much iov.

A day after we arrived home, we held a veranda meeting at the home of an agriculturist. About 50 people were attracted that morning, and I was glad that almost all got saved.

There was a street meeting the following two days and to the glory of God hundreds of people were there to listen to the good news which was delivered by Sis. Keiser. About 80 people out of the lot gave their lives to Jesus. We visited the secondary school in the town and the headmaster and members of the staff welcomed us to the school to meet and preach the good news to the students. Five students gave their lost souls to Jesus. The headmaster was highly impressed by Sis. Keiser's preaching and invited her to the school the following day. We want to testify how God healed Delbert's bleeding tongue, and brought him from what seemed to be the "jaws of death." He bit his tongue while eating his lunch at work. Thinking the bleeding would stop any moment, we left for La. when he got off work at 2:30 p.m., as we had planned. We were driving all night, Mike and Kay Stover being with us. Delbert's tongue continued to bleed, or we might say it was hemorrhaging. Oh, how we prayed and looked earnestly to the Lord for the bleeding to stop, also that the tongue would be healed. We realized it was making him weak, and he wasn't able to take any nourishment. We kept ice on it much of the time, pleading for the Lord's mercy and help. We asked the Lord that if Delbert had bitten an artery or blood vessel, to please heal or mend it for him. We knew He could, and took a firm stand against the bleeding. After ten hours of constant bleeding, the Lord stopped it instantly. It didn't just taper off, but when it stopped, it really stopped! There was no more; not a sign of blood. Oh, how we did thank the Lord for coming to our rescue! Our God is able, praise His great name!

Little did we know that we would be introduced to another trial before reaching Loranger. Delbert, being weak and tired, laid down in the back seat for a nap, and after waking from a second nap he said, "I'm sick; I feel like I'm going to vomit; I can't see!" and his head dropped on my shoulder. I told Mike to stop the car and open the door for air. As I looked upon my dear companion, his eyes appeared to be set, he was cold, clammy, and had broken out into a heavy sweat; neither could I find a pulse. We prayed for mercy and help. He came to and spoke a few words and then fainted away again. We prayed, rebuked death, weakness, and asked God to come on the scene, pleading for God to heal him. Thank the Lord, in just a few moments he raised his head and said with a good strong voice, "Oh, I feel better; let me out to get some air!" So at about 3:30 in the morning we were out on I-20 near Vicksburg, Miss., thanking the Lord for what He had done. Delbert walked around a little and said, "Oh, I feel so good; I surely do feel better; thank the Lord, I feel good!" We felt he needed some nourishment, so we stopped at the next town. He ate an egg, two slices of bacon and toast, hashbrowns, and drank a large glass of milk. What a mighty God we serve!

I thought of Jacob when he was left alone and wrestled with the angel until the "breaking of day." Jacob said, "I will not let thee go, except thou bless

me." We were so dependent on God in those early hours of the morning, and how we did hold on to Him! There was no telephone, no way to get in touch with any of the other saints for prayer—just us that were in the car. We were so thankful to have Mike and Kay Stover with us. This has drawn us closer to the Lord. Delbert often says since that experience, "We need to be ready at all times, for at a moment like that if we're not ready, there is no time." He testifies that was a real miracle of divine healing, and we are still rejoicing for what the Lord has done for us.

When Delbert was 14 years old, he fell from a tree and was unconscious, but in answer to prayer, the Lord healed him.

The Lord surely has been good to us; we are enjoying His rich blessings each day, our lives are in His hands, and we desire to be faithful to the end. We covet your prayers that we will be found conquering soldiers in each battle.

Christian Instruction in Home Life

We are concerned about the destruction of home life everywhere. Satan attacks the home life because he knows it is the foundation of our society. But God has provided a way to escape this "roaring lion of destruction" and bring peace, love, and tranquility to every home. If every family would obey the admonitions of God, they would find this condition brought about in their own homes, and would have a life pleasing to themselves and to God. Jesus said in Luke 6:46, "Why do you call me Lord, Lord, and do not the things I say?"

Paul said in Phil. 1:27, "Only let your conversation [conduct] be as it becometh the gospel of Christ." In 2 Tim. 3:16, 17, he said, "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: that the man of God may be perfect, throughly furnished [fully equipped] unto all good works." Nowhere does Christianity shine forth more beautifully and meaningfully than in the home life. The home is like a haven of rest and a refuge from the outside pressures of life for each member. It changes the home of strife and tensions into a peaceful habitation and the poorest home into a palace. It brings peace where there was tension and strife; and love where there has been malice. It fortifies each member to go out and not only resist Satan, but be a productive member of society and a zealous witness for the Lord. The Bible gives full instruction for each member of the home.

The Home Instituted by God

The home is an institution planned and perfected by God to fulfill His plan for mankind to be perfected in His image. It is to be headed by a husband with the cooperation and assistance of a wife to rear children in the nurture and admonition of God. (Eph. 6:4). Jesus said, "For this cause shall a man leave father and mother, and shall cleave to his wife: and they twain [two] shall be one flesh; Wherefore they are no more twain, but one flesh. What therefore God hath joined together, let not man put asunder." Matt. 19:5, 6. Marriage is more than just a civil contract; it is a vow made to God to "love, honor, and protect, until death do you part." It can never be pleasing to God to break this vow in any way and weaken or destroy His plans.

One of the greatest weaknesses in the family today is a lack of communication among the mem-

bers of a family. We have all the instruction necessary for our guidance in God's Word. If we understand and practice the real meaning of God's love as Paul describes it in 1 Cor. 13, it will assist us greatly in accomplishing a happy home life. Paul says here that, "charity suffereth long and is kind." The love of God gives us patience through trials and suffers all the weakness, ignorance, errors, or mistakes of the other members; not merely for a time, but as long as necessary. "Then came Peter to him, and said, Lord, how oft shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? till seven times? Jesus saith unto him, I say not unto thee, Until seven times, but, Until seventy times seven." Matt. 18:21, 22. Could there be any more important place to practise this guidance than in the home? We need to commit every circumstance unto God and give Him a chance to work each problem out. If we are thoughtful and considerate and share our plans and desires in kindness with each other, we can build up confidence in each other and our communications will not break down. "Submitting yourselves one to another in the fear of God." Eph. 5:21.

Compassion and tenderness is a part of kindness shown in the family. What a beautiful thing it is to see a closely knit family loving each other in the fear of God! It will certainly be greatly rewarded in heaven. "I will behave myself wisely in a perfect way. . . I will walk within my house with a perfect heart." It is necessary for the cooperation of each member to achieve this goal because one bad spirit will affect and obstruct all.

"Charity envieth not . . . vaunteth not iself, is not puffed up, doth not behave unseemly, seeketh not her own." These all have to do with pride and jealousy among the members of a family. This may sound foolish to some, but sometimes a husband may be jealous of the abilities or attention his wife has, or the wife may be jealous of the time or attention a husband gives to his work. Possibly he has a desire to help others who need it, and is thought to be neglecting the home. This is why it is necessary that each share their burdens and desires with the other. The home is our first responsibility in our duties to God, but there are also additional labors He may want us to carry on. Charity does not vaunt or set itself forward, or desire to be noticed or applauded or inflated with its own sense of importance; but looks on the welfare of each member of the family. "... is not easily provoked. . . ." The word "easily" is a word that has been added here and is improper to use. Charity is not provoked to anger or irritated or sour or bitter by another's actions.

"... thinketh no evil...." What may seem bad may not be at all where the full explanation is found. However things may look, wait for the full truth. "... whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report, ... think on these things." Phil 4:8.

Question and Answer Column --

Question: "And why beholdest thou the mote that is in thy brother's eye, but considerest not the beam that is in thine own eye? Or how wilt thou say to thy brother, Let me pull out the mote out of thine eye; and, behold, a beam is in thine own eye?" Matt. 7:3, 4.

Answer: The question of this article is one Jesus Himself asked. Jesus asked a number of very pertinent and thought-provoking questions to which He did not directly give the answers. This is one of them. He put forth this very straightforward question to faultfinding, nitpicking, judging, criticizing people and did not give an answer to it. But there are some answers to it and Jesus left us to find them. Surely every earnest, honest, sincere person who is endeavoring to serve and honor Christ will search out the answers and seek to avoid the causes they discover.

The very setting of this text and the principal objects in the text will be sufficient to convince any of us that Jesus was not commending this kind of behavior, but rather condemning it and warning us against it. One object in the text is a man with a mote in his eye; the other object is a man with a beam in his eye. Now, to be fair we will have to acknowledge that there is an extraneous, foreign substance in the eyes of both men; something in their lives that needs to be corrected. But a man with a beam in his eye (a log or big timber; a glaring fault) is not the man to try to extract the mote out of his brother's eye.

If this little story were reversed, it would make better sense; if the man with the mote in his eye were trying to help the brother get the beam out of his eye, he could probably see sufficiently well to get hold of the beam and extract it. But Jesus did not set it up that way; He did not intend to. In setting it up this way, He was trying to make faultfinding, motehunting, nitpicking, and criticizing appear just as ridiculous as possible and something to be laughed out of court at the very outset. In verse 5, He declared the man with the beam a hypocrite. He instructed him to get the beam out of his own eye (straighten out his own life) before going after the man with the mote. Note: Jesus nowhere intimated that the man with the mote did not need to get rid of his mote but indicated that he might need some help to do it. But He did make it unmistakably clear that the man with the beam was not qualified to do it as long as he had his beam. However, verse 5 does indicate that this very same man with the beam could turn out to be the man who could help the man with the mote if he got rid of his beam and got his life straightened out. It is remarkable to note how effectively God can use a person in helping others who have been way out and far off course, if he will just see his need, confess it, humble his heart, repent, straighten out his life, and just come clear and clean with God.

In verse 6, Jesus speaks about not giving the holy things to dogs nor casting pearls before swine. So it is evident that in these verses He is not forbidding us to properly evaluate the worth of other people. How could we avoid giving holy things to dogs and casting pearls before swine if we had no God-given ability to discern who was swinish or doggish? But what is actually involved here is a rebuke of an attitude on anyone's part to look for the worst instead of the best. Blindness to his own faults has overtaken the man who is looking for specks. My father used to say that motehunters got their hunting licenses from the devil. A person would not likely see a mere speck unless he was actually looking for it. The person who is a perpetual faultfinder and chronic critic is usually anxious to find something wrong because the attitude of his heart renders him unwilling to give a clear bill of health to the one criticized. Herein is one of the answers to the question in the text: the person's attitude and motives are not right and cause him to do this.

In some cases this thing is done with an objective of salving one's own conscience. If we have glaring faults in our lives, somehow it seems to help us feel a little better if we can make someone else look bad along with us. We somehow get a false and mistaken idea that we won't look quite so bad if someone by the side of us can be made to look bad, too. But let us take no comfort in this. If you were dying with some malady, what comfort would it be to you for someone to come visit you and say, "Oh, brother, be of good courage and don't worry about a thing; hundreds of people out there are dying with the same thing you have." What comfort could it possibly be to you just to know that many others were being destroyed right along with you?

Another answer is that some people seek to build up themselves by tearing down others. They reason thus: God is blessing and using this person in an unusual way, and he is having strong influence among the people. If I can point up enough faults about him, criticize his methods, point out something that has not been accomplished, and downgrade him in the eyes of the people, then I can stand forth as a paragon of perfection in their eyes by just comparing myself in his trimmed down size.

Another answer is *envy*. Envy is the most malignant of all vices; a child of hate with a long, ugly, criminal record—Cain, Saul, the Prodigal's elder brother, the Jews against Jesus, the 70 princes of Babylon against Daniel, and on and on. Cain envied Abel because God respected Abel and accepted his sacrifice and did not respect Cain and accept his sacrifice. Cain never bothered to check into the cause of this, but just saw that it was that way and flew into his brother in a rage of envy and slew him. Saul became envious of David because the people ascribed to David ten thousands and to Saul only thousands, and from that time on eyed him and sought opportunity to destroy him. The Prodigal Son's elder brother became envious of his younger brother because of the

graciousness of his father to his brother when he returned from his wanderings. The prodigal's brother found fault with his father for receiving him back and refused to go in and share in the bounties of the banquet and the rejoicing of the occasion. He wound up on the short end and in worse shape than his prodigal brother, and deprived himself of many bountiful benefits that he could have had and enjoyed. We always do when we give place to envy in our hearts toward another person. Pilate discerned that the Jews delivered Jesus to him to be crucified because of envy. We sometimes inflict the pangs of crucifixion upon our fellows with our tongues of envy; and, oh, the terrible loss we suffer on account of it. The 70 princes of Babylon were moved with envy against Daniel because they saw him being favored by the king and promoted above them and concocted a scheme to destroy him. But God preserved Daniel in the lion's den and was glorified in him. And so He does all those who humbly submit themselves and trust Him in those times. He says in Psalms 31:20, "Thou shalt keep them secretly in a pavilion from the strife of tongues."

A Message to Saint Women
