Perfected Love

God has given to mankind His ultimate gift of perfect love to fulfill the greatest need that mankind ever had or ever will have—what he has the deepest longing for, even though he may not be aware of it. "Behold, what manner of love the Father hath bestowed on us, that we should be called the sons of God. . . ." 1 John 3:1. This is the perfect love of God that we want to look into. There is no greater.

In the New Testament, God has given us a new dimension of His love. It is different than the love for God or the love expressed in the Old Testament. John 3:16, says, "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." Rom. 5:7, 8, says, "For scarcely for a righteous man will one die: yet peradventure for a good man some would even dare to die. But God commendeth his love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners. Christ died for us." This is the love that the world does not know, "because the love of God is shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost which is given unto us." Rom. 5:5. Without the Holy Spirit we cannot understand this kind of love because it is different than the kind of love that the world knows about.

Our language is very inadequate in describing the different kinds of love there are. The Greek language has at least three different words to describe this feeling or emotion we call love. The Greek "eros" describes the love moved by attraction, or erotic love as in the attraction of a young man for a maiden, or vice versa. This is an emotional attraction which draws people together for the God-given purpose of forming a family. This love without the love of God in our hearts too often does not hold up after the first attraction wears off.

A second kind of love is "philia" which is the love of parents for their children. This love also must be tempered by the "agape," the third type of love which the New Testament speaks of. This is the kind of love that comes only from God, the kind Paul speaks of in 1 Cor. 13:4, which the King James Bible

translates as "charity." It seeketh not her own. This spontaneous, uncaused, self-giving love has a real concern for others without any expectation or desire for anything in return. As John says in 1 John 3:18, "My little children, let us not love in word, neither in tongue; but in deed and in truth." This "agape" is due to the character of the one who loves and not to the one being loved. "But I say unto you, Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you." Matt. 5:44. It is a giving love: "Husbands, love your wives even as Christ loved the Church and gave himself for it." "Hereby perceive we the love of God, because he laid down his life for us: and we ought to lay down our lives for the brethren." 1 John 3:16. We are able to love, "because he first loved us." 1 John 4:19. "He that loveth not knoweth not God; for God is love." 1 John 4:8.

Agape love is not native to man's soul or the nature of man. Self-existing rather than self-giving is the character of human nature until one has become a new creature in Christ (2 Cor 5:17). Sometimes this becomes a point of tension in homes when one partner feels the other one is spending too much time helping others to the neglect of the home. This can be true and needs to be evaluated by both husband and wife, as our home is the primary responsibility for both parents.

Great emphasis is placed upon our love for our neighbor in the New Testament, with the Lord clarifying who is our neighbor by the parable of the good Samaritan. Paul also says that all the commandments are comprehended in this; "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself." Rom. 13:9. It is the fulfilling of the law. "He that loveth another hath fulfilled the law." We are not only to "... love the Lord, thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind," and "thy neighbor as thyself," but we are also to love the brethren. "We know that we have passed from death unto life, because we love the brethren. He that loveth not his brother abideth in death." 1 John 3:14. Jesus made it plain in Matt. 12:49-50, who our brethren are. "Behold my mother and my brethren! For whosoever shall do the will of my Father which is in heaven, the same is my brother, and sister, and mother." We have a special duty to love (agape) our Christian brethren—to be concerned about him in all circumstances—to hold him up in prayer for all his needs. "Beloved, if God so loved us, we ought also to love one another." 1 John 4:11. We even go so far as laying down our lives for the brethren, if necessary, as Christ died for us. Read 1 John 3:16-18. "By this we know that we love the children of God, when we love God and keep his commandments." 1 John 5:2.

God always wants us to be perfected in love as we grow in grace. "If we love one another, God dwelleth in us, and his love is perfected in us." 1 John 4:12. We are perfected in love as we obey His Word and let His love have full exercise in our lives. It is only with God's love (agape) dwelling in our

hearts that we are able to love others. People of the world do not have love or concern for other people because they do not have this love in their hearts from God. "And we have known and believed the love that God hath to us. God is love [the very source of agape]; and he that dwelleth in love dwelleth in God, and God in him. Herein is our love made perfect . . ."

1 John 4:16, 17.

Perfect love casts out fear, for perfect love brings perfect trust, and perfect trust brings perfect assurance that God is in control of every situation. "There is no fear in love; but perfect love casteth out fear: because fear hath torment. He that feareth is not made perfect in love." 1 John 4:18. If there is a spirit of fear in our lives, it is not from God but comes from the enemy; it should be rebuked, and we should stand on the promises of God. "For God hath not given us the spirit of fear; but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind." 2 Tim. 1:7.

May this perfect love of God be in the heart of every one of His dear children that there might be perfect unity and accord in the wholy family of God. This whole world is in need of not only salvation, but of this love (agape) perfected in their hearts. May God bless each one of us with more of His precious love, and let it be fully perfected in us.

Respect

As we survey the condition of the world today, we find very little genuine, old-fashioned respect in our society. Individuals do not respect authority or each other. There is a reason for this. A hasty explanation would lay the blame at the door of those who fail to show respect, but a more careful analysis would indicate that many people actually are not deserving of respect. Numerous officials are involved in political corruption and it is becoming difficult to find a person who is reliable and faithful to his word.

If we are not careful, we may become influenced by such tendencies. We should not live a careless, shady life. The Bible teaches that our lives should demand the respect of God, our brothers in Christ, and people in general. Some individuals demand respect by their words alone. This serves only to frustrate and confuse, for true respect is gained by a worthy life.

Respect means to show consideration for. The Old Testament bears record that God had respect unto the children of Israel. As the omnipotent God views our actions, or the things that make us what we are in daily life, is He stirred to show respect unto us? Undoubtedly each of us will face a time in life when we will hope for His consideration.

"Though the Lord be high, yet hath he respect unto the lowly: but the proud he knoweth afar off." Psa. 138:6. It is the life that is lived in quiet steadfastness and holy sincerity before God that brings His respect, not in doing deeds to be seen of others or commended of men.

The newspaper cartoonist, H. T. Webster, once amused himself by sending telegrams to twenty of his acquaintances whom he selected at random. Each message contained just one word: "Congratulations!" As far as Webster knew, not one of his friends had done anything special for which to be complimented. Yet each person was so flattered that he immediately wrote a letter of thanks. All twenty assumed that they had done something worthy of a congratulatory telegram. This is somewhat amusing, but it illustrates the deceptive nature of pride. It is through lowliness of mind and heart that we are made recipients of God's consideration. It is by considering ourselves as unprofitable servants.

As we gain the favor of God, we also attain the respect of His saints for the constant life we live. Respect does not develop overnight. Paul, in writing to the Thessalonians, said, "And we beseech you, brethren, to know them which labour among you, and are over you in the Lord, and admonish you; and to esteem them very highly in love for their work's sake. And be at peace among yourselves." 1 Thess. 5:12, 13. In Rev. 3:1, God said to tell Sardis that, "I know thy works." God determines the sincerity of man's heart for He is omnipotent. We, however, are hampered by our humanity and therefore must use discernment. That is why we are told to "Try the spirits whether they are of God." This may take a process of time, but as this is applied and put in action, esteem and honor come to those who are worthy.

The qualifications of a bishop, according to 1 Tim. 3:7, are that "he must have a good report of them which are without." This is applicable to saints in general. To be a saint is a high calling, and therefore we are to live so that the world recognizes it. If the world finds saints squabbling and disagreeing among themselves, the Church suffers a loss of respect. The Spirit of Christ brings about a unity of God's children.

The respect of outsiders is not attained by a show of harshness or severity among God's people even though the doctrine itself is correct. Bro. D. S. Warner once wrote, "Even the 'sons of Sceva,' vagabond Jews, exorcists, could 'stir up the devil' and get a good flogging for it, so to report that souls turned to righteousness is a far better indication 'that ye are born of God' than simply the report that the 'devil was stirred.'

The respect of the world will be directed toward those who are living a consistent life of dependability, purity and holiness. Sinners will show their consideration by refusing to tell sordid jokes in your presence, taking your side when others oppose you, and respecting your beliefs in general.

Let us strive more earnestly to manifest the fruits of righteousness that will secure the regard of those about us, and glorify the One whom we are seeking to honor.

Come Out of Babylon

In Memorial

Aaron Eugene (Gene) Harmon, son of George and Vienna Harmon, was born Feb. 9, 1894, at Tyrone, Missouri, and went home to be with the Lord from his home in Orland, California, on Aug. 4, 1983, at the age of 89 years, 5 months, and 26 days.

In 1919, he was united in marriage with Beulah Ellen Seddon at Clovis, New Mexico. To this union four children were born. The first born son, Ralph Eugene, died at the age of two years. They moved to Glendale, California, in 1920, where they lived for 48 years until Beulah's death in 1968.

In 1969, he was united in marriage with Loretta Miles. They located in Orland, California, and lived there until the time of his departure.

Both Brother and Sister Harmon were saved in a tent meeting at Duarte, California, which was held by his father, Bro. George Harmon, and Brother L. E. Davey. This was probably in the early 1920's. They accepted the truth as taught and practiced by the Church of God (Evening Light Saints) and remained in that faith throughout the remainder of their lifetime. Not long after his conversion he was called to the ministry and served God and His Church in that capacity for nearly 55 years.

He was active in the ministry throughout the southern California area as well as in other parts of the country for several years and then became the first pastor of the Glendale Church of God. He served in that pastorship for a number of years. In later years he worked extensively with the Church of God of Jefferson, Oregon, and also did considerable building work for that church as he was a builder by trade. He served the church at Orland, California, for a time after going there, but before long, advancing age and failing health forced him out of active service there.

He is survived by his wife, Loretta, of Orland, Calif., one daughter, Virginia League, of Canyon City, Calif.; two sons: Gerald Harmon of Loranger, La., and Richard Harmon, of Sugarland, Tex.; two stepsons: Jim Miles of Beaverton, Calif., and Sam Miles, of Orland, Calif.; 8 grandchildren, 8 great-grandchildren, and 3 step-grandchildren.

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REPORT OF MISSION WORK IN INDIA

S. India (June 20)—Dear Sis. Maybelle and all the other dear ones at the Print Shop, and everywhere in the U.S.A.: We send our Christian love and greetings to you dear ones again in the most holy name of Jesus Christ. Thank you very much for your kind letter and the enclosures were noted with much appreciation and heartfelt gratitude. May God bless each donor.

The drought in our state is still in the same situation. . . . The government declared a 90% electricity cut in the state. No electricity supply in the day time . . . almost all the factories were closed due to the power cut; hence many are without jobs now. We pray God to send some heavy rain soon.

By the grace of God there is not much hindrance for the activities of the Church here. Very recently God opened a new station for us at Poomala in North Kerala. One brother got a special burden to go over there and work, and as a result twenty souls were saved from the Catholic church. These new converts need a place to assemble to worship. A temporary shed made of bamboo rod, coconut leaves, and mud walls is needed now. It will cost \$200 to build such a temporary shed which may last for two years. As they were excommunicated from the Catholic church, they need a separate cemetery of their own. It costs \$300 to buy a cemetery. These are some urgent needs of these poor, new converts. May God open the hands of someone who loves the work of the Lord.

(July 18)—Finally it started to rain here last week. Surely, this is a delayed blessing for us. "Be patient therefore, brethren, unto the coming of the Lord. Behold, the husbandman waiteth for the precious fruit of the earth, and hath long patience for it, until he receive the early and latter rain. Be ye also patient; stablish your hearts: for the coming of the Lord draweth nigh." James 5:7, 8. We appreciate the earnest prayer of the saints in America for rain in India. . . .

I received invitations from North India to open new stations there. This is a challenge to my heart, but I cannot go to N. India without support. N. India is full of Hindus. As William Carey said, "I will descend and dig, but you at home must hold the ropes." . . . If anybody is interested in the work of N. India, please let me know. If the interested saints come over here, we will go together and open new stations there. Also, we invite the saints there to attend our 18th general convention at Karikkom in January, 1984. . . . building. They are looking to Nigeria for some of their needs as supplies are scarce and high-priced in Ghana. Pray that God will guide them.

Testimonies and Answers to Prayer

Ala.—Dear ones: I just want to tell this, for God's glory and the encouragement of the saints. On Thursday morning, July 26, I got up and started to the bathroom. My legs were shaking and I grabbed the side of the doorway, but with all the holding and trying to stand up, my legs gave way and I could not walk. I crawled about that day and in the afternoon I tried to call the Faith Pub. House but could not get an answer. Finally, I realized that they must be somewhere in camp meeting, so Friday morning I called Sis. Hightower and asked her to request prayer at Monark Springs Camp Meeting. I didn't seem to make much improvement, so the next morning, I called again and I soon began to get strength. By the afternoon I found that I could walk some by using a stick. I went and watered the garden. After a while I forgot my stick and was walking without it, but when I thought of my stick, the weakness came back and I had to get it. Now I confess my lack of faith and ask God's forgiveness. Please pray for my complete healing; I am trying to exercise healing faith. They wanted to take me to the doctor, but I refused to be taken and by God's grace managed to stand out against their arguments. I walk some now without the stick. . . . Okla.—Dear saints: Diann and I would like to share some of God's gracious dealings with us, especially concerning the birth of our second son, Naron. It was a time of great rejoicing and a deeper revelation of the special love that God has for His children here below.

The Lord said unto Abraham, "Is any thing too hard for the Lord? At the time appointed I will return unto thee, according to the time of life, and Sarah shall have a son." Gen. 18:14. In this experience the Lord revealed Himself as a deliverer who is able to overcome any difficulty and bring victory to His children. This story has its beginning in the delivery of our first son Matthew. Due to severe complications it became necessary for him to be delivered "c-section." That experience caused us extreme spiritual distress, soul searching, and a hungering for a deeper faith and fuller measure of victory. In the midst of that

trouble, God still glorified His holy name. The doctors determined that Diann had a life-threatening infection that could only be cured by medicine. We indicated to them our desire to trust the Lord. They listed the sequence of symptoms that would follow this infection, with the last one being death. We took our stand and Diann chose to leave the hospital against medical advice. Step by step the symptoms began to develop as they had predicted, but God intervened and gloriously delivered before death could come. The news of Diann's decision spread throughout the hospital staff, and the attending physician was astonished to find that Diann did not die.

Upon returning to this physician for a final postdelivery exam, we were warned that we probably would be unable to conceive more children because of our decision to refuse medical aid. However, the Lord revealed to Diann's heart that another child would be born. After the second conception was certain, we contacted the physician group which oversaw the birth of our first son. We were refused any opportunity for service unless we would agree to a preplanned "c-section." Afterwards we received a letter warning us of the dangers involved in a normal birth, and disclaiming any responsibility for the consequences of our action. The next physician we approached for help reluctantly agreed to take our case temporarily. He requested and received a copy of the medical report on the first delivery. After reading it he decided he could not offer us any help. The report was very grim in its graphic description of the complications that developed with the first birth, and it caused some careful examining of our position before God. Diann was strengthened with a calm assurance from God that everything was going to be all right. I was awakened the morning after reading this report with the words, "The soul that on Jesus doth lean for repose, He will not, He will not desert to his foes."

We were rejected by two more physicians in our attempt to find help with this delivery. However, through a connection with a man (who belongs to a conservative religious group) on my job, we were able to obtain two midwives to perform the delivery. During the time of travail it was most comforting to know that saints all over the Monark Springs Camp Grounds and in congregations around the country were laboring in prayer for us. When Diann's travail became most intense and it appeared that complications would develop, we contacted the brethren at the National Camp Meeting who were continuing in prayer for us during the early morning hours. One of the brethren asked if we desired for him to come. While awaiting our answer, he received a special witness from the Lord that deliverance was near, and he stated that he was giving the child 30 minutes to be born. Within 15 minutes deliverance had come. A sister in a local congregation testified that during the time of Diann's travail, she was inspired hourly with words of prayer for her deliverance. However, about 3:00 in the morning she arose with words of praise in

her heart. The baby was born at 2:17 a. m. A sister in another state testified to being literally lifted out of bed and placed on her knees to pray for Diann's deliverance between one and two o'clock in the morning. This was the period during which her travail became most intense. During this trial there were two key Scriptures that served as the bulwarks of our faith. For Diann it was Matt. 7:7-8, "Ask, and it shall be given you; . . ." For myself it was Rom. 4:18-21. In particular I found verse 20 most encouraging, "He staggered not at the promise of God through unbelief; but was strong in faith, giving glory to God." We surely thank God for his delivering power.

Finally, we want to tell of God's healing of our son, Matthew, of an apparent case of tick fever. During the early part of June he was bitten by a brown spotted tick. About two weeks later, we saw a progressive development of Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever symptoms. He suffered severe headaches, high fever, joint pain, and other symptoms that accompany this disease. At one point his temperature went above 104 degrees. In answer to prayer God healed him and we praise His holy name.

We want to thank all of the saints who prayed for us during these trials, and we desire your continued prayers that we will be faithful to the Lord.

Okla.—Dear Sis. Maybelle: "My hope is built on nothing less than Jesus' blood and righteousness; I dare not trust the sweetest frame, but wholly lean on Jesus' name." I am finding that in a world of much confusion and trouble on every hand that "on Christ, the solid Rock, I stand; all other ground is sinking sand."

Just recently I slipped on something in a parking lot and twisted my foot. I could feel the bones cracking, and one of my first thoughts was, "I've broken my foot." The devil was right there to discourage and make things look very dark, but God assured me that He would heal me. I purposed in my heart right then that my trust would be anchored in God. No bones appeared to be broken, but my foot began to swell considerably, and it became very painful to walk on. I had planned to go to Bible study that night, and had scheduled time off at work for vacation the next week to be in part of the Monark Springs Camp Meeting. I thought, "I'm not even going to be able to walk." I prayed and submitted my plans to the Lord and asked for God's will to be done. On returning home, I found I had received a letter from one of the saints; she was praising God for something special the Lord was working out for her. That letter gave my faith the extra boost it needed to ask God to take away the swelling in my foot. Within hours, praise God, it was gone! The soreness was still there making it difficult to walk, but the Lord let me know that I was to press over that. The more I walked around, the better my foot felt. wasn't completely healed, the swelling would come right back. I told the devil that even if the swelling did come back, I was still going to trust God. I went to Bible study that night, and as I was testifying, leaning over on my foot, there was no pain! A sister told me that if the pain came back to just "Resist the devil." The devil was back all right, but I had already claimed my healing even though I could feel pain as I walked around. I felt a real thanksgiving in my heart that the victory through faith was already mine. Today I can walk without limping, and having only the slightest pain. Question and Answer Column

Question: Does God's Spirit dwell within the heart of a justified believer to any degree before he is sanctified (baptized with the Holy Ghost)? In what manner does Christ come into the heart of a person when he gets saved, or does He? Please comment on Romans 8:9, in regard to this.

Continued from last issue.

In Mal. 4:5, there is a prophecy concerning John the Baptist which comes in good place here. It savs. "Behold, I will send you Elijah, the prophet, before the coming of the great and dreadful day of the Lord." To prove that this was John the Baptist we refer you to Matt. 11:10-14. "For this is he, of whom it is written, Behold, I send my messenger before thy face, which shall prepare the way before thee. Verily I say unto you, Among them that are born of women there hath not risen a greater than John the Baptist: notwithstanding he that is least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he. And from the day John the Baptist until now the kingdom of heaveeth violence, and the violent take it by force. For all the prophets and the law prophesied until John. And if ye will receive it, this is Elias, which was for to come."

Now someone may say, "How could John the Baptist be Elijah or Elias?" Granted that in physical actuality he was not; but figuratively and in spirit he was. This is clarified in the statement of the angel to Zacharias, the father of John the Baptist in Luke 1:17—"And he shall go before him in the spirit and power of Elias, to turn the hearts of the fathers to the children"

This makes the point clear and throws some light on the text in Rom 8:9. John came at a time of deep apostasy and great spiritual darkness such as at the time of Elijah, the most outstanding of all the prophets. He came to Israel and turned the hearts of the people to God as Elijah had done in his day, and manifested the same vehemence against error and the same zeal and boldness for truth that Elijah had shown. It brought a great spiritual awakening such as Elijah's work had brought. So it is said that he went in the spirit and power of Elijah in so much that he was called Elias.

This is the way I see us having the Spirit of Christ. It is in us possessing within ourselves that same vehemence and righteous indignation against sin and error, the same zeal and boldness for truth and righteousness, the same humility, meekness, gentleness, mercy, obedience, behavior, and every other characteristic of Christ Himself and doing His work.

Col. 1:27, says, ". . . Christ in you, the hope of glory"

Eph. 3:17, says, "That Christ may dwell in your hearts by faith. . . ."

John 6:56, says, "He that eateth my flesh, and drinketh my blood, dwelleth in me, and I in him."

The way, then, that I interpret having the Spirit of Christ is to have Christ living within us and the Christ life predominant in all of our behavior because "the Lord is that spirit." (2 Cor. 3:17).

This happens when an individual complies with all the conditions of God's Word for salvation, properly repents of all sin, believes the promises of God, and accepts and receives God's forgiveness for all his sins; Jesus Christ comes into his heart then to direct his life and give him power over sin to live a holy and righteous life free from sin. This is what constitutes conversion, being saved, being born again, born of the Spirit, etc. This experience is described by all these terms and maybe others in the holy Scriptures.

Then as one walks in the light as he is directed and led by the indwelling Christ in his heart, he comes to the point to present his body a living sacrifice to God and consecrate and dedicate his whole life and being to God for divine service and sacred use. When that consecration is complete ("When thy soul the perfect price hath paid; God will send the holy fire.") he is filled and baptized with the Holy Spirit, (wholly sanctified) who applies the blood to his heart, purging out that old depravity of nature received from Adam with which he was born, and purifying his heart by faith (Acts 15:9), and he is made holy in heart as well as in life. This is called in the Scriptures the baptism of the Holy Spirit and also sanctification. This is the perfection, completion, or fulfilling of one's salvation. (Heb. 10:14.)

In summing up, let me emphasize that in order to have a clear understanding of what Rom. 8:9, is actually saying and teaching, we must maintain a clear distinction between the "Spirit of Christ" and the "Holy Spirit". The Holy Spirit is not the spirit of any one or of any thing but is identified by His own name and in His own right. Jesus told His disciples in Acts 1:5, ". . . ye shall be baptized with the Holy Ghost not many days hence." Note Jesus said, "the Holy Ghost," (not the Spirit of Christ). On the day of Pentecost the disciples were all filled with the HOLY GHOST (Acts 2:4)—not the Spirit of Christ. When Peter preached Christ to the household of Cornelious, while he was yet speaking, the HOLY GHOST (not the Spirit of Christ) fell on all them who heard the Word. In the 19th chapter of Acts when Paul found certain disciples at Ephesus, (Acts 19:2) he asked them, "Have ye received the HOLY GHOST (not the Spirit of Christ) since ye believed?" Note that in all these cases the Holy Spirit is identified by His own name and in His own right as a distinctly authoritative person and not as the spirit of any body or any thing. We must render Him this same reverence.

"For the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men, teaching us that denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, right-eously, and godly, in this present world." Titus 2:11, 12.



Wanted: Christian Fathers

Have you ever stood on a high promontory and gazed in awe upon a vast expanse of mountains and valleys, rivers and forests, and marvelled on the miracle of creation? I have, but in this article I wish to relate an experience that, if possible, even surpasses that splendid wonderment, in which my godly earthly father played a vital part. I was a boy of sixteen years with a Sunday School knowledge of God and His Word, and with no surprisingly great degree of faith. We were operating a small farm and it was the time of haying. The clover and timothy mixed hay in a seven-acre triangular field had been cut and, after a period of drying, had been dumpraked and hand-cocked, suited for pitching on a rig for drawing which we were about to undertake. While engaged in the process of harnessing the team to fasten them to the wagon, the sky darkened and, as we drove into the field, a heavy storm rapidly approached us. For a moment we were in a quandry as to whether to proceed or wait out the storm. We realized that there was no time to make up a load, and clover hay loses much of its nutritional value and palatableness and, also, it will sustain a loss of many of its leaves after it has become wet and dried again. What to do? Dad looked at me, and in serious reflective deliberation said, "Earl, let's ask God to keep this hay dry until we can get it into the barn."

If this arbitrary suggestion gave me a moment's hesitation and doubt, I quickly dismissed it in favor of the hope such a proposal offered. I had been brought up to believe in a miracle-working God and was mindful of the many articles portrayed in Scripture in God's dealing with His people. We dropped to our knees there in the middle of the field and, after we both had prayed, we arose and went about making our load as though there were no black, threatening and thundering sky above us. The storm broke and we could hear the heavy drops of rain falling, but we and the hay in the field were untouched. A little later, I traversed the entire perimeter of the field and, to my amazement, everything outside the hay plot was literally and liberally drenched with rain.

Some people make a great play on the word "utterance", but there is a spiritual glory whereby one is made speechless. I just stood there, emotionally enrapt in wonderment as my heart lifted up

to believe that God, too, had just visited this spot. He had actually heard our prayers and had answered! In later years I have realized that two predominant facts stood out in this experience giving me a more perfect realization of God: first, the incident presented to me, at least, a virtual monumental revelation—a spiritual awakening—a soul consciousness in the fact that "God . . . is, and that he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him." (Heb. 11:6.) Second, it is to His eternal praise and my everlasting gratitude and good fortune that I had a God-wise father who, without benefit of eloquent sermon, theological discourse, or trumpet's blare, led me quietly into this unsurpassed knowledge of living faith in Jesus Christ which has stood by me through the years.

Though many are the flowers strewn at mother's feet and many the eulogies delivered in her honor expressing the feeling of loving universal humanity, and while, perhaps, fathers have not been known to be so universally adored, still, fathers, too, are very often loved and respected by their boys and girls, and fathers have an obligation—God ordained—to play out their vital role of spiritual leadership in the home. And what a soul-exalting privilege to know that you are monitoring these precious little lives to salvation and eternal life! But the day is far spent; times are perilous and there is no guarantee that we may have tomorrow in which to do the Father's work. So, in view of the incredulously temporal-minded wickedness and atheism in the world today, let me urgently entreat you fathers to rise up in all your manhood and dignity and assert the spiritual leadership in the home which God has charged to your account. I am convinced that as you draw toward the portals of life you will discover nothing more heart and mind fulfilling (not the love of money nor of fame) than the fact, possessed in the knowledge that you have tried, and with God's help, done your best.

Now I should explain that I have rarely given the foregoing testimony of dry hay versus the rain, and never before have I done so publicly. The public, generally, are not susceptible to supernatural phenomena and my testimony has not gone without skepticism and incredulity. To the "Greeks" it was "foolishness": "but unto us who are saved it is the power of God," (1 Cor. 1:17-31) as He witnesses His love and His care for His own. The only party who could have validated the account would be my father and he would gladly have affirmed its accuracy. He has gone to his reward many years past. But I positively do affirm that the account as I have given it is absolutely true. Now here I close with a dictum: To His everlasting praise, we Christians have the supreme honor of serving a miracle-working God. He ever has been, and He's just the same today.
