Observe All Things

Observe means "to guard, watch, to keep, to conform one's actions or practice to rules." In Matt. 28:19-20, Jesus said, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world."

REGOODE

There are many preachers in our time, and yet so few that are teaching us to observe all things Christ has commanded. When He began to preach, His first command was "repent." (Matt. 4:17.) The dictionary says that repent is "to feel sorry, to turn from sin, to dedicate oneself to the amendment of one's life, to feel regret, to change one's mind." This is in harmony with Christ's teaching to Nicodemus, "Ye must be born again." John 3:7.

For preachers to teach us to observe all things will be more than to just say, "Accept Christ as your Saviour." We need to understand how to repent. I must be sorry for my sins; I must turn away from sin. I must make amend for my sins; if I have stolen anything from anyone, I must restore it to the person from whom I took it. If I lied to, hurt, or mistreated someone, I must confess and ask their forgiveness. I must change my mind, or have a new mind. I must be born of the Word and Spirit. All sin must go. I must forgive those who do me wrong; I cannot have hate in my heart and expect Jesus to come into my heart. I cannot be dishonest in my dealings. This is what is meant by "repent" or to be "born again." It means a complete change of heart, mind, and deeds. 1 John 1:9, tells us, "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." Thank God for a life free from sin and guilt!

Next, Jesus said, "baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost." In Mark 16:16, Jesus also said, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved..." Baptize means "to dip, to immerse, the act of immersion, baptism by complete submersion of the person in water." Some preachers say that it makes no difference; you can be sprinkled or dipped—it's just up to you. But Jesus

said, "teaching them to observe all things whatsoever. I have commanded you." When Jesus was baptized by John, He "went up straightway out of the water." Matt. 3:16. In Acts 8:38, we have the account of where Philip baptized the eunuch. "And he commanded the chariot to stand still: and they went down both into the water, both Philip and the eunuch; and he baptized him." In Rom. 6:4, we read, "Therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life." There is a teaching that we should be baptized three times, face forward; the first time in the name of the Father, the second time in the name of the Son, and the third time in the name of the Holy Ghost. But Jesus said to baptize in the name of all three (Matt. 28:19). John wrote in 1 John 5:7, ". . . and these three are one." Baptism represents a burial. Do we bury our deceased on their face? No, they are lying on their backs. So it is in our baptizing; we are layed down into the water, fully covered in the watery grave, and raised up out of the water to face the world with a newness of life. It is a testimony to the world that we have left all the world to follow Jesus.

Some preachers teach that our sins are washed away in baptism, but if the first command that Jesus taught is preached, which is repent, we will need to observe it before we are baptized; therefore, there will be no sin to wash away. We've already been washed in the blood of Christ; we go down into the water a clean, saved person, witnessing to the world that we are dead to sin. Praise the Lord!

There are so many good things Jesus taught while He was here on earth. He taught us to love one another; He taught us to abide in Him and bear much fruit; to do good to all men. He said that He would pray the Father, and He would give us another Comforter, that He may abide with us for ever; and He prayed for us to be sanctified, and for us all to be one.

He also taught the disciples to wash one another's feet (John 13). He also set forth the ordinance of the Lord's supper. In keeping this we are to do it in remembrance of His death "till he come."

Let us be faithful to observe all of His blessed Word.

"The Holy Remnant""The Radicals"



In the face of present day religion that has come short of real Bible holiness possessed by the Early Morning Church, we are reminded, "even so than at this present time, also there is a remnant according to the election of grace." Rom. 2:15. A remnant is that which is left over from the original quality, but the quantity is smaller. The true Church of God has a reputation: known as the Evening Light Radicals. The definition of "radical" is as follows: "Original, fundamental, proceeding from the root; reaching to the center or ultimate source; affecting the vital principal; persisting in defending an issue."

Having the knowledge of this definition, we ought to be honored to have such a reputation. "Church of God" has become a prominent name in the religious world today with a multiplicity of standards. In the root of the midst of this confusion, God has an original that proceedeth from the root of the Early Morning Church. It affects the vital principals that never change.

Some folks relate the word radical with the word fanatical. A fanatical person goes beyond the fundamental doctrine of holiness and puts one's self and others in a strait jacket. They are extreme in setting themselves a higher standard than that required of God.

Everyone has a conviction of some kind. What we need is a conviction that determines an established law that never changes. Pride has been established by the Word of God as a forerunner of downfall. "Pride goeth before destruction, and an haughty spirit before a fall." Prov. 16:18. "A man's pride shall bring him low, but honor shall uphold the humble in spirit." Prov. 29:23. Read also Eze. 16:49, 1 John 2:16, Prov. 2:2.

Humility has also been established by the same Word, as a beginning of honor. "The fear of the Lord is the instruction of wisdom; and before honor is humility." Prov. 15:33. Read also Isa. 57:15, Matt. 18:4, Prov. 22:4, Prov. 16:19.

These two extreme opposites have always affected the fall and rise of man and will never change in their nature. Pride makes man the central figure of importance, disregarding moral or divine principals that will stand in the way. He is willing to suffer and sacrifice if it will bring him to honor. Pride breeds quickly in the field of propsperity; being self-sufficient, man feels no need of God and becomes less sensitive to the needs of others and to the cause of God. Read Rev. 3:17, 18.

Traditions and customs may change to suit man, but principals never change, because they apply to established laws that apply to God and His Church in this world. Traditions that are governed by divine principals that determine right or wrong must never change, regardless of situations and circumstances. In 2 Thess. 2:15, we read, "Therefore, brethren, stand fast and hold the traditions which ye have been taught, whether by word or our epistle."

In the early part of this Church of God Evening Light Reformation, humble brethren recognized di-

vine truth. They taught and practiced divine healing and modesty of dress. They denounced any superfluity that adorns the outward man-jewelry, including rings, necklaces, bracelets, earrings, or any other ornaments that were an outward demonstration of pride. Pride was and still is the prominent factor in putting on these outward adornments, which the Word of God condemns. 1 Pet. 3:3, 4, says, "Whose adorning let it not be the outward adorning of plaiting [decorating the hair with gold strips and other adornments to make it glitter. Clarke's Commentary.] the hair, and of wearing of gold, or of putting on of apparel; but let it be the hidden man of the heart in that which is not corruptible, even the ornament of a meek and quiet spirit which is in the sight of God of great price." This early reformation was radical in holding the Word of truth and God blessed their assemblies—in healing the sick and performing miracles in the healing of cancer and many incurable diseases.

In duration of time, the hearts of the brethren who were spiritual giants in their day began to change. Spirituality began to decline from their personal lives as they began to allow and permit people to build around them.

I want to mention here the danger of saints building around certain ministers. We are exhorted to build up ourselves "on our most holy faith." Jude 20. We are to have confidence in the lives of our ministers if their lives are in harmony with the Word of God in meekness and sobriety. "And we beseech you. brethren, to know them which labor among you, and are over you in the Lord, and admonish you; and to esteem them very highly for their work's sake. And be at peace among yourselves." 1 Thess. 5:12, 13. We need to know the lives of the ministry, and honor the work of righteousness in their lives and build on that principal of truth; not on the man himself, but on what he represents with his life. If we build around man's influence, we'll be on an uncertain course-if he goes down, we"ll go down; whatever course or direction he takes, we'll take, whether he be right or wrong, because we didn't consider the principal or motive involved. Man is inclined to build on personality; which can be very deceptive. There is a vast difference between spirituality and personality.

The root of the Early Morning Church was a spiritual root of holiness. Spirituality was the ultimate goal to obtain in this life, which consisted of watching and praying, guarding against the cares of life, the deceitfulness of riches, the lust of the flesh, and the lust of the eyes. Jesus explicitly gave us an example of how to live. He taught us how to live, and lived what He taught. This was passed on from generation to generation through the lives of His saints. The true Church of God has been kept unspotted from the world up to this present time.

Some of these pioneer ministers wanted to win the better classed people, such as the lawyers, bankers, and other prominent figures. They worked hard to win them. Looking too conspicuous in dress to win them, they began to rebuild the things they destroyed through the gospel—the very things they had denounced as unnecessary articles of dress or adornment which was based on Scriptural grounds (1 Pet. 3:3, 4, and James 1:21), on which the principal of pride was defined and established. Folks, we must not try to win anybody to Christ at the expense of the gospel and our spirituality. If the gospel does not set them free from the world, nothing else will.

The so-called First Church of God today is walking hand in hand with the world. As the blind leading the blind, they dress and act like the world and have fellowship with it. They are a member of the World Council of Churches in which recently a Catholic bishop has been nominated as president. One of the early pioneer ministers, in his latter years, said he never had thought that the pendulum would swing so far away from the truth and holiness. A little letting down was the beginning of a great falling away. I am persuaded that the pendulum will never swing back.

Let's not bring the world to Christ, as many false prophets are doing, because to do that we'll have to compromise. Christ never did win the applause of the world, and you and I won't, either. In John 15:18, 19, it says, "If the world hate you, ye know that it hated me before it hated you. If ye were of the world, the world would love his own: but because ye are not of the world, . . . therefore the world hated you."


Jesus said, "This is the work of God, that ye believe on him whom he has sent." St. John 6:29. We need to believe strongly enough in what Christ stood for that it will become the paramount issue in our lives. Being like Him will produce the work that will glorify God. A pure love for the truth will give us a pure hatred for worldliness.

I love the true Church of God and what she stands for. I could write a lot more, but I feel like I've unburdened part of what's been on my heart for the last two years. MISSION REPORTS FROM GHANA, W. AFRICA

Ghana (Jan. 23)—Dear saints at the Print Shop, in the U. S., and scattered around the world: Greetings of Christian love to all in the lovely name of Jesus.

After picking up my baggage at the airport on Thursday morning (Jan. 12), Bro. Jim Akwasi and I traveled on to Akumadan-Ash, the village where I will be living and call "home" for the next year. It took eight hours to travel the 220 miles from Accra, over nearly impassable roads. I couldn't walk very straight for a while after I arrived.

I am temporarily settled in a single room with outside facilities. I do my little cooking on a one-burner kerosene stove outside my door on an open porch. The Methodist lady who let me have the room doesn't charge me anything. When she came to see me she said I could stay 10 years if I wanted to. She is precious, and I desire her soul for God.

The Church is meeting in a Methodist school house at the present time, free of charge. My first Sunday here we were in service from 9:30 a. m. to noon. A good lesson was given on "Prayer" by a Bro. James. It was given in both Twi and English. A space was given for testimonies, and two of the preachers testified how they were led by the Holy Spirit out of the places they were in, into the true Church of God. Preaching service followed, and Bro.

Williams Kusi brought a message on the young man who came running to Christ (Mark 10). This was delivered in the Twi language and translated into English. My eyes were filled with tears many times during this service as I could see what God has done in this place in a year's time. . . .

I have been able to get Bibles, benches, and rice for the two congregations. Most everyone found something they could wear amongst the used clothing I brought on the plane, and there is more clothing coming by boat. I want to thank everyone for their prayers and offerings that have made this missionary effort possible.

The roof is going on the mission house, and it should not be too long until I can go there to live during my stay here. The land on which the chapel is being built is beautifully located on a hill just above the river. There is a dense jungle between the property and the river, but a wide path leading down over which the natives tread their way for water. Eventually a wall will be built around it all.

A good water supply is hard to find here. Water is carried on the heads of very young children and adults. . . . It is my heart's desire to see if water can be obtained for their use either by a well or piped in from the river. The well would be best, as the water could be consumed without purifying it. I am praying about this. There is nothing too hard for God to do when His people have a mind to work. I desire your prayers that everything done here will be done to the honor and glory of God, in the salvation of precious, never-dying souls.

I am feeling well, and have made several personal contacts. There is a hunger here that God can satisfy.

The rains have ceased for the past four months, and we are in a serious drought. Sis. Keiser has suggested for a pump to be installed at the mission house to draw water for the farms which could feed the church. Please pray for this need.

ABIGAIL

There is a story in the Bible about a wise woman named Abigail. (1 Sam. 25) Let me briefly relate this story.

King Saul was still in pursuit of David, so David and his men were in the wilderness at this time. Nabal, a very wealthy man, was in a nearby town (Carmel) shearing his three thousand sheep. David sent ten young men to go unto Nabal and ask for some of his wool, food, or whatever he wanted to send because David and his men had been good to Nabal. They had never stolen from his flock; instead they had protected the shephereds and their flocks. Being men of war, David and his army could have plundered much from Nabal. Nabal did not feel they had done him such a great favor, and he spoke rude words to the ten young men and sent them away with nothing. This greatly angered David and he gathered 400 men with him to take vengence on Nabal.

One of Nabal's servants told Nabal's wife, Abigail, about the messengers David sent and what they had said. This servant verified that David and his men had been good to the shepherds, but he was afraid now that David would come against them. Quickly Abigail took two hundred loaves of bread, wine, five sheep already dressed, five measures of parched corn, raisins, and two hundred cakes of figs and put them on donkeys. She and her servants with their load met David and his men at the bottom of a hill. They were on their way to destroy all that Nabal possessed. Abigail quickly fell down at David's feet and begged mercy for her husband, asking David to take the gifts she had brought instead of avenging Nabal. David listened to her and took the gifts. Then they parted in peace. Abigail went back to find her husband very drunk from a feast he had held. Ten days later, Nabal died, as verse 38 says, "The Lord smote Nabal, that he died."

Let us dwell briefly on the personality of Nabal and Abigail. The Scripture tells us that Nabal was a "churlish" man, or a man without manners. One translation says "He was a doggish man." The name Nabal means "foolish, base or villainous." No doubt many times Abigail suffered from his hands. She was a beautiful woman with good understanding. She filled her place as a wife and did her work well to please him. Probably she was accustomed to Nabal's railings and knew how it felt to be treated evil for good. She was somewhat afraid of him because she took her gift secretly, thinking her husband would stop her before she could go. When she returned from giving the gift to David, she didn't tell her husband until the next morning after he was sober from his drunken feast. Abigail tolerated much as the wife of Nabal. Yet she quietly did her work, mending relations her husband broke, and calming the servants when they were mistreated or upset. Generally speaking, she kept the household running smoother with her pleasant, understanding ways. Later, after Nabal died. David sent for Abigail because he realized her goodness and value as a wife. No doubt her life became easier when she was the wife of the king. We have record that she bore David at least one son. Chileab. (2 Sam. 3:3)

Let us now imagine a liberated, 1984 American "Abigail" in this same situation. The servant has just told her the foolish thing her husband did in sending the men away so rudely.

"Well," she may say, "I am so tired of Nabal making such dumb mistakes! He'll have all of us killed! Get my things together; I'm going to a lawyer. I'm going to leave Nabal right now!"

At the lawyer's office she tells him of her annoyance at Nabal. The lawyer may say: "Ma'am, you do have a case against your husband! He jeopardized your life in this situation! From what you tell me, he is a wealthy man. Now what you should do is sue for a share in his business besides taking a certain part now. As for me, I only take a percentage . . ."

So on the suit would go. Society today thinks divorce is the answer to troubled marriages. Jesus said the bill of divorcement was written because of the hardness of hearts. In the beginning it was not so. (Mk. 10:2-12) God planned for a husband and wife to be a "help meet" one to another (Gen. 2:18). Even though times and customs have changed since the story of Abigail, the Lord's desire [rules and guidelines] for a husband and wife have not.

The story of Abigail is a lovely one indeed. We can see that she was a help meet to her husband, Nabal. Where her husband failed, she met the need he left empty. She was married to an unusually harsh man, but she came forth shining as a beautiful, treasured jewel. Her goodness blessed her husband, her household, and it pleased the Lord. It still pleases the Lord today.

Apostle Paul wrote in 1 Cor. 7:12-17: "If any brother hath a wife that believeth not, and she be pleased to dwell with him let him not put her away. And the woman which hath an husband that believeth not, and if he be pleased to dwell with her, let her not leave him. For the unbelieving husband is sanctified

by the wife and the unbelieving wife is sanctified by the husband: else were your children unclean; but now are they holy. But if the unbelieving depart, let him depart. A brother or a sister is not under bondage in such cases: but God hath called us to peace. For what knowest thou, O wife, whether thou shalt save thy husband? or how knowest thou, O man, whether thou shalt save thy wife? But as God hath distributed to every man, as the Lord hath called every one, so let him walk."

In the Church of God, there are women "of good understanding," like Abigail, who are a genuine help meet to their companions. They have taken the counsel of Apostle Paul and walk as the Lord has called them. Christians who have a saved companion are blessed, but those who walk alone on the Christian pathway are truly a treasured jewel, noticed and loved by God. Though a loved companion be against a child of God, there is victory in the ways of God. "If God be for us, who can be against us?" Rom: 8:31. It is blessed to do the will of God and know all is well with one's soul. May the Lord continue to direct each one who is walking as the Lord has called them.

Question and Answer Column

Question: Since it states in the Bible that women can be saved through child-bearing, then would women have no need of being born again? Does this mean that women can get into the kingdom of God just by bearing children; thus absolving them of the spiritual aspects of salvation?

Answer: No, it does not absolve them from the spiritual aspects of salvation nor from the need of being born again for the following reasons. But first let me insert the Scripture text here that I assume to be alluded to in this question. 1 Tim. 2:14, 15, reads thus: "And Adam was not deceived, but the woman being deceived was in the transgression. Notwithstanding she shall be saved in childbearing, if they continue in faith and charity and holiness with sobriety."

When Jesus said to Nicodemus in John 3:3, "Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God," He was referring to mankind—the human race. He was not referring to just "man," the male side of the race, but to the race itself—both male and female. This term is used this way throughout the Scriptures. In Gen. 1:27, we read, "So God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him; male and female created he them." The male and female are component parts of one another and we see in this text they, both male and female, are referred to as man. The only times this is not true is when the male and female are being distinguished between the different roles that each of them fill in their relationships together as husbands and wives and parents in the home, and a few cases where a particular or specific woman is referred to. Thus we conclude that every person (male or female) getting into the kingdom of God must be born again and come in the same way. Acts 5:14, says, "And believers were the more added to the Lord, multitudes both of men and women."

The Amplified Bible renders the text this way, and I feel turns the true light on it. "Nevertheless (the sustenance put upon women (of pain in motherhood) does not hinder their (souls') salvation), and they will be saved (eternally) if they continue in faith and love and holiness, with self-control; (saved indeed) through the Child-bearing, that is, by the birth of the (divine) Child." This text introduces two important points. First: that the pain suffered in childbearing, which was a part of the penalty for her transgression, and even if she die (and many have), none of this is any hinderance to the salvation. Also note that the thought carried here is not that her soul is saved because of this, but that none of this is any hinderance to her being saved. Second: that the childbearing referred to here was the bearing of the Christ Child, Jesus, the Divine and only begotten Son of God who was born of the woman without the man and was the Saviour of all mankind-both men and women.

In my thinking I cannot come up with any solution to this text that satisfies me better than this. I will insert here a quote from Adam Clarke. At this place on page 593, of Vol. 6, he inserts a quote from Dr. Macknight which says in part, "The female sex shall be saved (equally with the male) through childbearing—through bringing forth the Saviour, if they live in faith, and love, and chastity, with that sobriety which I have been recommending." And again on the same page we read this: "The salvation of the human race, through child-bearing, was intimated in the sentence passed on the serpent in Gen. 3:15, 'I will put enmity between thee and the woman, and between thy seed and her seed. It shall bruise thy head.' Accordingly, the Saviour being conceived in the womb of His mother by the power of the Holy Ghost, He is truly the seed of the woman who was to bruise the head of the serpent; and a woman, by bringing Him forth, has been the occasion of our salvation.

It is interesting to note in this connection that Jesus Christ is the "Seed of the Woman." In Scripture, all the genealogies are reckoned on the male side; so and so bagat so and so, and he begat so and so, and he begat so and so, and on and on it goes. A man's seed was reckoned in his sons. This is true even though he may have begotten a number of daughters, too. But there is one exception to this rule. He who was the chief of them all, Jesus Christ, the King of kings, the Lord of lords, the Prince of the kings of the earth, the King of saints, the Blessed and only Potentate, the only begotten Son of God, the Saviour of all mankind is reckoned as the "Seed of Woman." True, after the stream of His genealogy started it was picked up and run through the male side, too, from generation to generation; but it was headed in the woman and He was declared to be the "Seed of the Woman."

After the stream ran through the male side for several hundred years, it surfaced in the woman in Isa. 7:14, where we read, "Therefore the Lord himself shall give you a sign; Behold, a virgin shall conceive,

and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel." Accordingly, we read in the first chapter of Luke, verses 26-35, that the angel Gabriel appeared to a virgin named Mary and announced to her that she was going to conceive and bear a son and said some very exalting, majestic things about Him. She questioned how this could be since she was a single woman, but Gabriel explained to her that the Holy Ghost would come upon her and the Highest would overshadow her, and therefore that holy thing which would be born of her would be called the Son of God. The prophecy of Isa. 7:14, surfaces again in Matt. 1:20-25, where the angel is explaining to Joseph about this miraculous, spiritual phenomena which was baffling him. The angel told him that it was by the Holy Ghost and that it was the fulfillment of Isa. 7:14.

So the Saviour was clearly and totally the seed of the woman and I am satisfied in my own mind to accept this as the solution to 1 Tim. 2:15. Acts 17:30, says that now God "commandeth men every where to repent." As before noted, when the Scriptures speak of man or men in regards to salvation, they are referring to human kind—all of them; both male and female. So women are required to repent the same as men. That much is clear.

The Relationship Between Humility and Love

Humility is the state of being emptied of self. To be humble is to be emptied of the love of self—one's own life, desires, achievements, opportunities, etc. Jesus Christ lived a humble life, one emptied of the love of Himself. One translation renders Phil. 2:6-8, ". . . Though (Christ Jesus) was in the form of God, (He) did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped (or retained), but emptied Himself, taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. After He had appeared in human form He abased and humbled Himself still further and carried His obedience to the extreme of death, even the death of the cross!" After first emptying Himself of His natural divine rights and privileges and becoming a mere human being, He further emptied Himself, even of His natural human rights and privileges, allowing Himself to suffer the ignominious death of crucifixion.

Because He was emptied of selfish love, He was in a position for God the Father to fill Him with perfect divine love. Only empty containers can be filled. Only hearts emptied of selfish love can be filled with God's love.

This infilling process can best be demonstrated by placing a supposedly empty bottle in a tub of water. There is a certain way to completely submerge the bottle in the water and yet not get a single drop of water inside the bottle. But by tilting the position of the bottle while under the water, several air bubbles will be allowed to escape and water rushes into the bottle. We then see that the supposedly empty bottle was not empty after all but was actually full—full of air. Only as the bottle is emptied of air can it be filled with water. Furthermore, the degree to which it can be filled with water depends on the degree to

which it has been emptied of air. When you stop emptying the bottle of air, that is the end of your filling it with water. Filling the bottle with water and emptying it of air are thus simultaneous processes.

Spiritually speaking, God can fill only emptied bottles. That is, He can fill you with Himself only as you become empty of yourself. If He is filling you, then you must be emptying. If you are not emptying, then He is not, and cannot be filling you. Perhaps you may be filling your life with more religious duties and sacrifices, but unless you are emptying your heart of your self-love, God is not filling your heart with His love. Self-love is another name for pride, and pride and divine love cannot coexist in the same heart.

Thus, humility and love are different sides of the same coin. One is "heads," the other is "tails." The chief difference between the two qualities is in who is doing what: man does the humbling—nothing more—and God does the filling with love and grace (James 4:6). Thus, to describe a humble man is to describe a love-filled man. To describe a man filled with love is to describe a man who has humbled himself. The two go hand-in-hand, and neither acts independent of the other, for where one is, there is the other also. To prove this, notice the humble characteristics of divine love in Paul's description of charity (1 Cor. 13).

The more perfect the emptying process, the more perfect the love. Jesus humbled Himself perfectly. Therefore, He was exalted to the highest position humanly attainable: perfect love—most like God.

The spirit of a thing is whatever characterizes it most accurately. The Spirit of Christ is whatever describes His character, His life, His motivation, and His mission. That spirit is humility—the spirit of self-emptying, the spirit of "not my will but thine be done," the spirit of total submission to God. That is Jesus in a nutshell, for He is humility personified. The spirit of God is love. That is God in a nutshell. (1 John 4:8-16; St. John 3:16; Rom. 5:5-8.)

We are now led to this final point: One must first possess the Spirit of Christ, humility, in order to receive the Spirit of God-divine love. This is what Jesus meant when He said: "I [perfect submission] am the Way, the Truth, and the Life: no man cometh unto the Father but by me [perfect submission]. Humility, far from being merely one of the many graces, is actually the "seedbed" from which all other graces sprout and grow. It is the "seat of holiness." God only anoints us with Himself-His graces and attributes-when He sees Jesus Christ in us. If we want His divine anointing, then we must aim to possess and keep the same spirit Christ possessed. The problem is, too many people are engaged in the futile attempt to have and manifest love and other graces without first having and manifesting humility. Such attempts will never be successful from God's perspective. You may do a lot of good deeds and make a lot of great sacrifices, but unless you possess true humility and perfect submission, God knows that your actions are not prompted by true love.

The rule then is that in every situation you must humble yourself before you can love. Do you find it difficult to love God supremely, i. e., to put Him first in your life, to obey Him, to practice the things that

you know are pleasing to Him? If so, then you should know that your main problem is not an inability to love, but a failure to humble and die to yourself. Humble yourself, empty yourself, acknowledge that your way is adverse to God's and that God's way is best, and you will find the ability to love God truly. Do you find it difficult to love others? Is it easy for you to judge and condemn them, finding fault and being intolerant of all their weaknesses? Is it hard for you to forgive and forget, and easy to treat others according to the way they have been treating you? Then you must realize that there is only one reason for all this difficulty: you love yourself too much-you have not humbled yourself towards God nor towards others. You will find grace to forgive only after you empty yourself of your self pride. You will be able to change your attitudes about others only after you have changed your attitude about yourself. Their faults will not look half as bad after you have realized you are not such a great person yourself.

Do you want more love for others? Do you need more faith, more patience, more joy and peace, more of the other graces? Then humble your soul. Don't even bother to ask God for more love or more patience. Ask Him to help you recognize and cast out your pride. God will automatically do His job of filling you with more love after you have done your job of reaching a humble, submissive, self-emptied attitude of heart and mind. The more you are emptied of yourself, the greater will be your capacity to love.

Foundations

It is a well understood fact that Jesus established His Church while here upon the earth and that He established but "one" pure and holy Church. He left all of its members in harmony, working together in "one body." Paul called this Church "Zion" or the "heavenly Jerusalem." "But ye are come unto mount Zion, and unto the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, and to an innumerable company of angels, to the general assembly and church of the firstborn, which are written in heaven, and to God the Judge of all, and to the spirits of just men made perfect, and to Jesus the mediator of the new covenant, and to the blood of sprinkling, that speaketh better things then that of Abel. See that you refuse not him that speaketh. For if they escaped not who refused him that spake on earth, much more shall we not escape, if we turn away from him that speaketh from heaven: whose voice then shook the earth: but now he hath promised, saying, Yet once more I shake not the earth only, but also heaven. And this word, Yet once more, signifieth the removing of those things which are shaken, of the things that are made, that those things which cannot be shaken may remain. Wherefore we receiving a kingdom which cannot be moved, let us have grace, whereby we may serve God acceptably with reverence and Godly fear: for our God is a consuming fire." (Heb. 12:22-29)

This is a startling Scripture and needs to be read over again and again until our minds are dyed with the spiritual significance and truth it purports to reveal to us and until it inspires us with a living sense of the sublime as it casts our vision from its summit to which it carries us that we may view this holy temple of God, resplendant with the morning light of Christ's own glory. He said, "I will build my church," and shortly after He died upon an ignominious cross, leaving to the world a treasure that cannot be counterfeited, humanly substituted, nor ever fully defined because its Maker; its Builder and Sustainer is God; it is THE CHURCH OF GOD.

Now, let us notice that it has been quite an accomplishment of Satan that he has convinced (or nearly convinced) Christiandom that there is but one antichrist, and both Roman Catholicism and Protestantism are now pretty well agreed that he is the coming foe of the church—out in the distant future. But the Bible tells us that there were a number of such false Christs active in John's own time, and we are convinced that he has persisted in his hellish deceptions and manifestations down to the present. We have never heard of his going out of business; and we must, therefore, realize that antichrist is even now accomplishing his mission. One of his most brilliant strategems has ever been to persuade Christians that they can justly devise substitutions for things divine and the spiritually real. And so, spiritually blinded men have gone about laying "other" foundations to conform to their own carnally and stupidly conceived theological creeds and church platforms. Thus, fellowship is a thing based upon the denomination's organizational human position—the personal concepts of Christian doctrine instead of fellowship based upon the individual's relation to. and confession of, Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord.

But now it must be understood that whatever it may be that antichrist speaks to certain religious groups, he is always able to make them build their fellowship around things other than the Son of God, whether it be upon a written creed or a tacitly understood form of doctrine. Whatever it is that sets a believer apart from his fellow believer, that is Satan's foundation for fellowship, and that foundation is laid by antichrist, and this fact bears historical proof. Therefore, denominationalism built, as it is, upon the varied forms of theology—a written creed or form of doctrine-is, so far as reality is concerned, a non-entity based upon a non-existent foundation. And further, for one to feel impelled to ask God's blessing upon these unsanctioned and unsanctified church foundations is to ask God to deny His "only begotten Son" who, very positively said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life." This, then, God cannot do, for "other foundation can no man lay than that is layed, which is Jesus Christ." 1 Cor. 3:11.

This evil of sectism is clearly demonstrable to any who want to see, by the long lists of church announcements in the Saturday press of almost any newspaper. Here church titles are many and should point out to rational minds that Christiandom is being either pitiably deceived by the serpent (antichrist), or is brazenly disobedient and blasphemous. Christian charity, however, demands that we attribute, in large measure, this form of disobedience to the sheer spiritual ignorance of the church-going masses, and, secondarily (and primarily) to Satan's supernatural subtlety in practicing his artful craft of deception upon the human family, just as he demonstrated his perpetual evil to Adam and Eve in the

Garden of Eden. "... He was a murderer from the beginning, and abode not in the truth, because there was no truth in him. When he speaketh a lie, he speaketh of his own: for he is a liar, and the father of it." (Jn. 8:44).

But let the true follower of Jesus take hope. We are living in a period when more and more Christians are giving thought to this serious problem under discussion and, as the light shines, they are turning away from these many Godless professions to the One and only true Church of the living God. And so, for truth-lovers everywhere, this: "Nevertheless the foundation of God standeth sure, having this seal, The Lord knoweth them that are his. And, Let everyone that nameth the name of Christ depart from iniquity." (2 Tim. 2:19)

"But Thou, O Lord, Art a Shield for Me"

"Lord, how are they increased that trouble me! many are they that rise up against me. Many there be which say of my soul, There is no help for him in God." Psa. 3:1, 2. When David wrote these words, he was in deep trouble. His son, Absolom, had subtily stolen the hearts of many of the people of Israel, and had himself proclaimed as king. David was fleeing for his life. He was bitterly reaping for his sins and he knew it. The devil was shooting fiery darts at David in many ways, seeking to overthrow him, and his soul was in danger.

Some years before this, David had committed the awful sin of adultery. Instead of humbling his heart, confessing, and forsaking it, he tried to cover it up. In his plan to cover it, he sent word to Joab to put Bathsheba's husband, Uriah, in a dangerous place in battle where he would likely be killed. Therefore David was responsible for his death, and was then

guilty of two gross sins.

God sent the prophet, Nathan, to open David's eyes to his undone condition before God and to tell him of the judgments that would fall upon him as a result of his sins. David immediately acknowledged that he had sinned and humbly sought the Lord for forgiveness. Psalms 51, shows us how deeply and sincerely he repented. He begged God to have mercy upon him and wash him thoroughly from his sins. He wanted full restoration so he could teach transgressors the way of the Lord and sinners would be converted. He wanted God's Spirit to be with him again. He sought the Lord until he was assured of God's acceptance again. Oh, how important this is whenever a person has turned away from God to any degree, little or much. David was a man after God's own heart, and he could not be satisfied with anything less than a full restoration. We can see the full assurance of David's heart in his words to his servants after God took Bathsheba's child. He said, 'I shall go to him, but he shall not return to me." (2 Sam. 12:23)

David was restored to fellowship with God again; nevertheless, he had given "great occasion to the enemies of the Lord to blaspheme." He also had some bitter reaping to do. He was doing some of that reaping while fleeing from Absolom and many were saying, "There is no help for him in God." No doubt he was deeply grieved in heart, but he had the assur-

ance that God had forgiven him and he was able to say, "But thou, O Lord, art a shield for me; my glory, and the lifter up of mine head." Psa. 3:3.

This was a time when David really needed God's help lest he be overwhelmed by the devil. He needed a strong confidence and unwavering faith. It is a real blessing to our souls to realize what a deep hold David had on God. When the enemy was coming in like a flood, David was able to testify, "But thou, O Lord, art a shield for me." Verse four reveals that he knew God heard his prayer. Then he added, "I laid me down and slept; I awaked; for the Lord sustained me." Oh, what victory God gave him in those trying hours that he was able to lay down and sleep!

When a person has sinned, whether it be small or great, there is a need of genuine repentance. The sooner a person will humble his heart and repent, the better it is. The longer he goes on without repenting, the more the heart is hardened. He will likely become more involved in sin and the loss will be greater. Immediate repentance is best. There needs to be a seeking of God until that person has a knowledge within his own heart of forgiveness from God. If restitution or confession to someone is needed, be diligent in that respect, too.

The devil is an accuser and will continue to torment and hinder a soul long after he has truly repented and made restitution (if it was needed). Then when trouble comes as it did to David, the devil will whisper, "There is no help for him in God"; but if that soul has truly met the conditions of repentance, he can resist every attack of Satan, declaring, "But thou, O Lord, art a shield for me; my glory, and the

lifter up of mine head."

David found that assurance of forgiveness while living under the law and was able to stand against the devil, the "accuser of our brethren." How much more can we today who are living under grace! Consider the new covenant, when God said, "And their sins and iniquities will I remember no more." Heb. 10:17.
