The Dangers in the Public Schools

The following is a talk that was given by Bro. Keith Fuller of Akron, Ohio, on April 27, 1986, at the minister's meeting held in Myrtle, MO. The talk has been edited and condensed to fit into this written format.

We appreciate being here with you this morning. We also appreciate very much being a part of this ministry.

I want to first of all state my purpose very clearly. I think that is important. My purpose is to make us aware of some things and to give us some understanding. It is not a purpose to persuade you necessarily, but it is a purpose to make the ministry, by the grace of God, aware of things.

I taught in the public schools for ten years. I was an observer of quite a few things while I was there. That was my career. I had gone to school and studied to be a school teacher. I taught English and History on the highest school level and I was in a system. At the time that I started teaching, I was not fully aware of what was going on around me. Initially I was against the thought of pulling our children out of the public schools, but then, as I said, there were some things I was not fully aware of. The Lord began to deal with my heart along some lines and to show me some things. I began to hear various ones speaking who had a burden to have a Christian school. Some of the things they were saying, and I was still very hesitant about those things and didn't agree with those things, yet some of the things that were said left some seed in my heart and I began to open my eves to see what was going on around me. I began to be a little more sensitive to what I had been doing. At that point I really feel the Lord began to deal with me. He began to show me things.

I love teaching very much. The Lord has blessed me in it. I give credit to God because when I first started teaching I had some real battles with students who came from homes where they were not taught godly principles; homes where the father was not the head of the home, and in many cases wasn't even in the home. We had some real battles. In my first year of teaching I got, and this is the case for all beginning teachers, the worst classes. I had two students that first year of teaching who took a man up into the woods and killed him. I had a student who was a rapist. I had all kinds

the Lord was dealing with my heart. I began to see some things.

I want to tell you some of the things that are going on in the public schools that you need to be aware of. I know some of us here probably can't have a Christian school and I don't want you to be under any pressure, but I exhort you to pray for your children that have to go to the public schools. The system that we call the public school system is one that has been shaped by things from a long way back. Philosophies have developed, atheistic philosophies, godless philosophies, tendencies opposed to righteous-

of characters including forward young ladies. I came into that system with real ideals of how I would handle it and I would come home every day with a headache, but the Lord blessed me. At the end of my first year of teaching my students told me, some of those very ones that I just described, "Mr. Fuller, you didn't know but we had a plot. We got rid of five English teachers before you and we had a plot going that we were going to get rid of you too, but somehow . . . We thought you were a young, wet-behind-theear teacher, just coming out of college and we figured you'd be easy to get rid of." But I was praying.

I remember one time in my class room I was having a battle and I just stopped the class and I told one young lady, "I'm praying for you that the Lord will do something about you." The Lord blessed me. I can say it to the glory of God, that the Lord helped me and I got through that first year. I stayed the remaining nine and a half or ten years and things improved all the way up and I progressed. At the end of my career, I had no problems in my classes. By the help of the Lord, I was in control of my classes and I appreciate that. I saw where I started and I knew how I got to where I was. I knew it was the hand of the Lord. I want to make that clear. My principal sat down and talked with me. He asked, "Would you reconsider?" He said there was much room for promotion for me, the students had a regard and respect for me in my classes and "we don't want to see you leave." It was a hard decision to make because as I said I love teaching. I got attached to the students and it was a difficult choice that I had to make but

ness down through history. Some of those have arisen out of the French Revolution in the 18th century and some before that. When we forsake religion, salvation, pure primitive Christianity, there is something that replaces it and these are some of the things that have replaced it. In the 19th century we had Darwinism. I'm not going to belabor these things, but mention them in general and I want to bring us down to today and show you just where we are. There was the German higher criticism in the 19th century. which was a religious movement that opposed traditional beliefs in the infallibility of the Bible, the virgin birth of Jesus, the idea that Jesus was both human and divine and the Son of God. All these things came out in the 19th century and yet they have roots further back in the past.

One of the leaders in developing the education system, you have possibly heard his name. John Dewey, started what we call the progressive education system in the 1920's and the 1930's. John Dewey was a socialist. His main idea was to clear education of religion. He was a humanist that believed that man was the center of everything and that man had potential to develop himself without the assistance of God and could go very far without the assistance of God. Our modern education comes from his philosophy. I took education courses in college and he was one of the leading writers that we read at that time. I didn't know about his goals. I was kind of ignorant and innocent in the whole thing. It took the Lord to really open my eyes to what was going on. The modern education system has very little of God in it. It is not

religious. God is not mentioned one percent of the time. I was under quite a bit of pressure and yet I used every opportunity I could to tell my students about the Lord. When I signed my agreement to become a teacher they knew I was a preacher and they made a point to tell me, "You are a teacher first in our eyes and you are not to be a minister in our class rooms." I was willing to covenant myself into that kind of agreement. I wanted to teach. But at the same time. (I felt like I was true to what I had told them) when the students asked me questions or when it opened up that I could, I would in a way testify to them. I did that on several occasions. I want to tell you again, and this is important, in all the literature, social studies, economics or whatever else, God is not the focal point.

Back when schools were started in colonial times the main textbook was the Bible. As we come down from the colonial times to the 19th century, we find that God was still mentioned about 50 percent of the time. But over a period of years, coming down to modern times, it has come down to about zero percent and I want to say it does have an affect. It might be a half percent but it is about zero percent. The teachers are under pressure. I had one girl tell me she was going home and telling her parents that I had said something about God. I was only teaching a poem that mentioned God in it.

We were requested not even to mention God's name. It creates a duality in the mind of our children that come from homes where the Word of God is taught for them to face a system where they are surrounded by teachers who

What really opened my eyes were two events. The Lord permitted me to take another education course and I said now I am really going to observe and see what they are teaching; what the professors are teaching; what the teachers are going to teach our children. It was the last education class I took. It was to upgrade my certificate. That was about 1983 or 82. In that class they made fun of religion. We were talking about cannibalism and the professor said, "I don't know if cannibalism is wrong. It is according to your particular value system if cannibalism is wrong." That stunned me and I questioned him but he was a very bright man and he started talking and going into depth and he had the sympathy of all the teachers. He said, "Cannibalism isn't wrong, it is according to the circumstances whether it is right or wrong." They question whether there are any absolute values of right or wrong. "It is just what you think is right or wrong." I watched the teachers. They took it all in. Some of them, I believe, were very naive and gullible about it. I observed that. In one complete session of that class they just made fun and laughed. They played a tape that had to do with some people who were, because of their traditional Christian values, questioning some of the things that were being placed in textbooks. They analyzed that tape. They made fun of it. The Lord really opened my eyes.

That is a typical education class, educating teachers who are going to come out and teach the students, your children. They are teaching your children more by what they are than even by what they are saying. It creates a duality for your children. It creates confusion in their mind.

Our children can't help but be affected by those who are standing before them seven hours a day, five days a week. They are actually spending quite a bit more time teaching your children than you are.

don't believe in God and who make fun of religious principles. I am aware of that very much. I observed some things in our teachers who are instructing our children. Our children can't help but be affected by those who are standing before them seven hours a day, five days a week. They are actually spending quite a bit more time teaching your children than you are. We teach a little by what we say, more by what we do, but most by what we are. The teachers in the public school are not the traditional teacher that some of the older ones here were around. They are not the traditional teacher that had absolute values of right and wrong.

They are taught one thing and then they are inundated with this other system that has no God in it at all. I want to tell you, it is very convincing. It is reasonable to the logical mind. I had to battle things myself.

That class room settled the issue pretty much for me. I saw I needed to make a break. It was hard. I was still in the valley of decision about it. Then we had a faculty dinner. Our principal was retiring and I went to his retirement gathering. I was amazed, and then again I wasn't. I had observed some things as a teacher, but I was amazed at some of the things that

EDITORIALS

"If a man therefore purge himself from these, he shall be a vessel unto honour, sanctified, and meet for the master's use, and prepared unto every good work. Flee also youthful lusts: but follow righteousness, faith, charity, peace, with them that call on the Lord out of a pure heart." II Tim. 2:21, 22. Every saved person is a potential vessel for God to use, but in order to be an effective vessel we must be sanctified. Sanctified means to be set apart for God's use. It means to be empty of all hatred, wrath, strife, envying and all other carnal traits.

Carnality and crudeness in the work of the Lord is counter-productive. I am reminded of an Aesop fable which so well illustrates the point. A donkey and a house dog belonged to the same master. Each evening the donkey was stabled and fed and should have been more than content with his lot in life, though he was busy hauling wood all day, and on occasion took a turn at the mill at night.

Meanwhile, the dog was always sporting and gamboling about, and being affectionate toward his master to such an extent that he became a great favorite, and was permitted to lie in his master's lap. The donkey began to feel sorry for himself. It galled him to see the house dog live in such luxury, and enjoy the favor of the master.

One day, thinking that if he behaved in the same fashion toward his master as the house dog he would fare the same, the donkey broke from his halter and rushed inside where the owner sat. Here he pranced about, swishing his tail and imitating as best he could the antics of the house dog. Upsetting the dinner table and smashing the dishes, the donkey jumped upon his master and pawed him with his roughshod feet. At length the servants, seeing their master in no little danger, released him from the donkey's wild caresses. Thereupon they so belabored the silly creature with sticks and stones that he never rose again. It did not matter how well intentioned the donkey was, his animal characteristics were not suited for what he set out to accomplish. A sanctified nature is the only kind suited for the work of the Lord.

Listen to an experience Ezekiel had. "So the spirit lifted me up, and took me away, and I went in bitterness in the heat of my spirit; but the hand of the Lord was strong upon me. Then I came to them of the captivity at Telabib, that dwelt by the river of Chebar, and I sat there astonished among them seven days. And it came to pass at the end of seven days, that the word of the Lord came unto me, saying, Son of man, I have made thee a watchman unto the

house of Israel: therefore hear the word at my mouth, and give them warning." Ezekiel 3:14-17. God gave Ezekiel a message and it was a powerful one, but Ezekiel went down to deliver it in the heat of his own spirit. Humanity was cropping up. The Lord restrained him though, so that he went down and just sat among the people for seven days in wonder. Perhaps by this time he realized that the people he was to minister to were sensitive human beings. They were vulnerable and Ezekiel's message needed to be delivered in such a way that the people would feel it was a rebuke from the Lord and not from him. At the end of this time, God said, now speak. We must sanctify "our" spirit and go in God's.

"And the servant of the Lord must not strive; but be gentle unto all men, apt to teach, patient, In meekness instructing those that oppose themselves; if God peradventure will give them repentance to the acknowledging of the truth; And that they may recover themselves out of the snare of the devil, who are taken captive by him at his will." II Timothy 2:24-26.

were going on at the faculty party. The whole time the Master of Ceremonies told nothing but sexual and suggestive jokes. The teachers laughed and enjoyed themselves. I was grieved. That also catalyzed my decision.

The Akron school system is the best in the state of Ohio in terms of your large cities. We didn't have a lot of murders in the hallways and those things like the Cleveland schools and some of those bigger cities have. The problem I had was not so much that there are drugs and so forth but there were sensual things going on; teachers and students, teachers and teachers. They had a faculty party and one teacher made passes to another teacher's wife. All those things are going on. Those are the kind of morals that the present day teachers have.

I stood in the hallway one day and I watched the students going back and forth and it was one of the times that I was pretty burdened. I said, "Lord, I can't allow my children to walk in this kind of hallway. I can't do it. Will you make a way for me to provide something else for my children?" I didn't want them walking in the hallway with the things I was seeing; the lack of respect, the unsoberness, just all kinds of things that I saw every day.

However, the biggest threat is not an open thing. The drugs and sexual deviation is open. but there is something going on that isn't open. It is a slow undermining affect. The textbooks erode away the things we are trying to teach our children. May the Lord bless us. It all comes from that higher criticism, the philosophy of humanism. It is the philosophy that pervades our public school system. In the last education class I took, the professor asked, "Where do you think we get our textbooks? Who do you think determines what textbooks we are going to use?" Various ones responded and said, "Well, the parents determine it." He laughed and said, "Oh, no, the parents don't determine what textbooks your students are going to use." Someone said, "The school boards do." He kind of laughed at that and said, "No, the school boards don't. The people that really determine what textbooks are going to be used in the public schools are the textbook companies, and they are going to sell whatever they can for the money. They put anything in there to please the people. They are not going to put anything in there that the majority of the people are going to oppose. They want to make money so they are going right along with the trend of our age." The textbook company's interest is not the souls of the children or their spiritual well-being at all. It is

what will sell and that is getting worse. Now saints, I wanted to make us aware of these things. I pray that we will have the understanding. I know the Bible says in all your getting get understanding, and this is my purpose today to give you an understanding. We want to educate our children with a strong moral and spiritual focus. That is our desire. You pray for us.

The History of Halloween



Halloween is probably the strangest celebration of the year. Children masquerade as witches, goblins, ghosts, and other creatures and characters, door to door, chanting "Trick or Treat", while carrying a sack to fill with goodies. You see black cats, witches on brooms, jack-o'-lanterns, etc., posted in various places. People go through "haunted houses" to be spooked and scared by costumed demons.

Are these ideas and activities the simple innocent holiday fun that most people believe them to be? Where did this holiday originate? Why is it celebrated?

History tells us that the earliest Halloween celebrations were held by the Druids in honor of Samhain, Lord of the dead, whose festival fell on November 1st.

It was a Druidic belief that on the eve of this festival, Samhain called together the wicked souls (spirits) that within the past 12 months had been condemned to inhabit the bodies of animals.

The Druids, an order of priests in ancient Britain, believed that on Halloween, ghosts, spirits, fairies, witches and elves came out to harm people. They thought the cat was sacred and believed that cats had once been human beings but were changed as punishment for evil deeds. This belief brought about the present day use of witches, cats and ghosts, in Halloween festivities.

The ancient pagans believed that on that night of the year, the souls of the dead returned to their original homes. The souls of the good men were carried away to paradise, and the souls of the wicked men were left to wander in space between the earth and the moon haunting the living. These wicked spirits had means of exercising their spell. To be free from their evil sway, you would have to set out food—give the demons a treat—and provide them shelter for the night. If they liked your treat, you would live in peace. If you did not provide, or if they were not satisfied with your treat, then the

spirits would "trick" you by casting a spell on you.

In the A.D. 800's, the Roman Catholic church established All Saints' Day on November 1. The mass said on this day was called Allhallowmas.

When the early Catholic church was unable to stop pagan practices, it accepted them and gave them a religious tune. It designated the October 31st date as All Hallow e'en or Halloween—it means hallowed or holy evening.

Does not history show that Halloween is unmistakably a "religious" (pagan & Roman) holiday? It is obvious that the traditions of Halloween observe evil spirits and demonic activity.

I Thessalonians 5:22 reads, "Abstain from all appearance of evil." In I Corinthians 10:31, it says, "Whether therefore ye eat, or drink, or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God."

Question and Answer Column by Ostis B. Wilson

Question: Please discuss I Timothy 5:23 and does this Scripture teach the use of home remedies, etc.?

Answer: I Timothy 5:23 reads thus: "Drink no longer water, but use a little wine for thy stomach's sake and thy often infirmities." First, I will apply the teachings of this same man, Paul, in another text to this same man, Timothy, found in II Timothy 2:15, "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." Surely it is necessary to rightly divide the word of truth in this text the same as in any other text.

The Bible has quite a little bit to say about wine in both the Old and New Testaments. If we use the term "wine" indiscriminately we will run into numerous dead ends and difficult complications. There was fermented wine which the Bible condemns generally in every reference to it. Proverbs 20:1 says, "Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging: and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise." Proverbs 21:17 says that he that loveth wine shall not be rich. In Proverbs 23:29 it asks who has woe, sorrow, contentions, babblings, wounds without cause and redness of eyes? Verse 30 says, "They that tarry long at the wine; they that go to seek mixed wine." Then verse 31 and 32 adds this admonition, "Look not thou upon the wine when it is red, when it giveth his colour in the cup, when it moveth itself aright. At the last it biteth like a serpent, and stingeth like an adder." All the texts and many others clearly refer to wine as an intoxicant in an advanced state of fermentation and is stoutly condemned and is strongly admonished against throughout the Scriptures.

There was also a sweet or fresh wine (grape juice) which is also referred to as "Wine" in the Scriptures with no distinguishment. Therefore we cannot arbitrarily accept the argument of some that "Wine is wine and it is all the same. Wine just means wine where ever you see it." It would be difficult to fathom the idea that in this place Paul was instructing Timothy to drink something that was so strongly condemned in other Scriptures in the Bible. Neither can I fathom the idea Jesus Himself would have passed to His disciples at the institution of the Lord's Supper a cup filled with this abominable, condemned substance and declare it to be His blood of the New Testament which is shed for the remission of sins. He didn't. But He called it the "Fruit of the vine"—Luke 22:18. Mark 14:15 and Matthew 26:29.

I realize that every one may not concur in my conclusions in this text and question but my conclusion based on the foregoing Scriptures is that Paul was instructing Timothy to drink grape juice (the fresh, sweet variety) as it would be good for his stomach and system in general. It is commonly known that grape juice is an excellent health food—good for the stomach, good for the digestive tract, and a good blood purifying agent. The water in the area may not have been all that good and pure and it would help his health to drink some wine (grape juice) along instead of water all the time. It seems from the text that he was instructing him to discontinue water altogether and drink grape juice (wine) instead. But I do not think of this as a remedy such as medication or pills or home remedies for an ailment, but for him to avail himself of the good health food that was available.

The New Testament Scriptures abound with teachings for saints to trust God with every phase and area of our lives (spiritual and physical—soul and body) and offers much incentive for that in multitudes of healing of the people by Christ and His apostles and others and the promise of its continuance for all believers throughout this dispensation—Mark 16:14-(18). God's Word gives positive instructions to the saints what to do when they become ill—"Call for the elders of the church and let them pray over them anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord, and the prayer of faith shall save the sick, and the Lord will raise them up." James 5:14.
