What the Cross Meant to Jesus

When heaven was searched for a sacrifice, we see the Son of God step forth with a countenance shining like the sun as He declared to His Father and the holy angels that He willingly dedicated Himself as an offering for the cross to redeem man. He sacrificed His Father's society, the worship and adoration of myriads of angels, and His kingly authority. The Son of God had pleasures in glory that are beyond description by the human tongue or pen; yet He sacrificed it all for us.

He had riches untold, but Paul tells us that "though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, that ye through his poverty might be rich." (Heb. 8:9). It almost staggers the human mind when we try to comprehend what the cross meant to our Saviour.

What did it mean to Him after leaving His bright home above? It meant a lowly birthplace, a manger for a cradle, clothing used by the poorest people of the land, hatred from wicked Herod, who tried to kill him in infancy.

When He began preaching, hatred and intrigues of all kinds were brought to bear upon Him; bitter disappointment came because of the unbelief and hardness of heart of the chosen people of God. After a long fast of forty days and a storm of temptation, severe and long, he triumphed over Satan and sin. In the garden of Gethsemane, He sweat, as it were, great drops of blood in contemplation of the agonies of the cross.

Betrayed by his "own familiar friend" into the hands of the Roman soldiers who mocked Him, scourged Him, and spat upon Him, Jesus faced the howling mob of angry Jews and heard them cry, "Away with him, crucify him, crucify him." The cross meant to face the high priest, Herod, and Pilate, and to listen to the malicious lies of his persecutors who sought to have him destroyed. It meant finally to hear the cruel verdict that gave the robber his freedom and the Saviour His sentence of death.

My friend, can you picture your meek Saviour and mine toiling His way to Calvary, bowed beneath the load of your sins and mine?

Wicked hands stretched His form on the cross, pierced His hands and feet with cruel nails, reared the cross in its place, and, lo, our Lord was crucified.

What has He borne in the garden, in the judgment hall, and on the cross? When you came to repent of your sins they seemed like mountains; but Jesus bore the sins of the entire human race — what a burden! What a weight! The Lord laid upon Him the iniquity of us all.

At the cross He saw His mother stand and weep for her son, and she was cared for thereafter by one of Jesus' faithful ones. The mocking Jews passed by and railed upon Him. His Father's face was veiled: for did He not cry out in great agony of soul, "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" Finally, His cup was full; the tragedy ended; our Saviour gave up the ghost. But is this all the cross meant to Jesus? No; a thousand times no.

It meant a victorious resurrection. The bars of death could not hold Him. The tomb, though sealed and barred and guarded, yielded to the touch of the angel; He came forth to triumph over death and the grave. He spent a few days with His disciples, speaking words of cheer and comfort to strengthen them for the great work before them. Then followed His glorious ascension to the Father. Heaven rang with the joy of the angels, when, after making a perfect sacrifice for sin by the cross, He was welcomed back home again. He "for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of the throne of God." (Hebrews 12:2).

Is The Lord Your Shepherd? *****

This is quite a thought-provoking question. Let's consider what shepherd means. Part of Webster's Dictionary definition is: "to tend, herd, guard, lead, etc., as or like a shepherd."

We are all familiar with the wonderful, true story of David, the shepherd boy. It was needful in olden days, to have a shepherd for their sheep as there were no fences or modern ways to care for them. David was the youngest son of Jesse, so he was chosen for the humble job of watching over the sheep. This could have been a very lonely and sometimes boring job for David, but David learned to make the most out of a lonely situation by taking his harp and playing and singing praises to his God while watching over his father's sheep. No doubt when David wrote some of the Psalms he vividly recalled his days of watching his father's sheep and his close communion with God.

"I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills from whence cometh my help. My help cometh from the Lord, which made heaven and earth. . . Behold, he that keepeth Israel shall neither slumber nor sleep." "The Lord shall preserve thee from all evil: he shall preserve thy soul." (Psalm 121). So if we are saved, the Lord is our shepherd and He will preserve our souls from evil; but a soul that takes their salvation for granted and does not take time for God, will find that when trouble or trials come there is not enough grace to go through them. We will have to cry out to God for mercy and help, and recognize our short comings and draw closer to Him. "Draw nigh to God, and he will draw nigh to you." (James 4:8). Yet, how much better it is to strive to stay close to God, as it would save us from suffering through trials brought on by our short comings.

We are living in a wicked world where sin is abounding and will destroy us if possible, so it is a necessity to have a shepherd to tend, guard and lead us as long as we live. Jesus wants to be our Shepherd. He desired it enough to give up all the splendor, riches and glory of heaven to come down here to this sin-cursed earth and live one of the lowliest lives ever lived, and then He freely gave His blood for us.

Picture in your mind the agony He went through in the Garden of Gethsemane. All the powers of hell came in such force against His heart, mind and soul, that He cried out: "O my Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from me!" But there have never been any sweeter and more blessed words uttered than when He finished His prayer to His Father by saying, "nevertheless not as I will, but as thou wilt." (Matt. 26:39). He was in such agony before His Father that He had to pray this prayer three times before He received a blessing and the strength to go on and bear all the sins of the world. He willingly sacrificed His body on the cross for our redemption.

We read in Genesis 3:15 where God told the serpent (the devil) in the Garden of Eden that there would be enmity (open conflict) between him and the seed of the woman. "And I will put enmity between thee and the woman, and between thy seed and her seed; it shall bruise thy head, and thou shalt bruise his heel." The devil knew that to have his head bruised would mean his power would be broken over mankind if they repented of their sins through the precious blood

of Jesus Christ, so the devil was bringing all the forces of hell against our Saviour in the garden in order to try to foil God's plan of redemption for mankind. "And thou shalt bruise his heel," would signify the trials and temptations that we all have to face and meet with. The devil is going to continue his battle against the truth and right, but praise God, the devil's power is broken! He can only present temptations to us. He cannot make us yield. Surely we need a Shepherd to face our foe.

Jesus is a most diligent Shepherd for He never slumbers nor sleeps. He is sitting at the right hand of the Father, ever listening to our cries and prayers to Him. He understands our every problem as He "was in all points tempted like as we are, vet without sin." "Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in

time of need." (Hebrews 4:15, 16).

How Christ Is Seen

When Christ was in this world He portrayed the image of God. (John 8:19). Through His actions of love and concern people could see God in Him, for God is the very epitome of love. (1 John 4:8). For others to see Christ in us we must likewise follow in His footsteps. Our actions must portray His spirit. We cannot decide within ourselves that we are going to love as Christ loved, for it is not in man to do so. We must have the spirit of God and then we will find that love is the basis for all of our actions toward others.

The following was written by Uncle Lawrence Pruitt.

"Jesus said, 'By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another.' John 13:35. Divine love in the heart of man is the crowning grace of Christianity. That is the only heavenly element sufficient to convince the world that God has a people or Church in the world. Unity, which is the fruit of love, is that attribute for which Jesus prayed to be exhibited in His disciples in His prayer as recorded in the 17th chapter of St. John. The burden of that prayer was 'that they may be made perfect in one; and that the world may know that thou hast sent me.' When one is born from above he is then and there inducted into the Church of God and brought into the unity of the Spirit with all the children of God, 'for by one Spirit are we all baptized into one body.' As we walk in the light of God's Word we continue to have fellowship one with another."

Love is a vital part of our worship services. One song says, "Yes, 'tis love, 'tis burning love divine, Filling all my soul's desire; Oh how sweet its glories ever shine! Now I feel the glowing fire." The Church, when operating as God designed, will be attractive and so full of the fire of love that people will have a desire to be there. Robert Louis Stevenson wrote in his journal, "Went to Church today, and was not greatly depressed." No one should ever be depressed by going to Church where God's love is in practice. God's spirit may convict a soul that is not what it ought to be, but it is in a spirit of love that the invitation is offered, "Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." Matt. 11:28.

All hope of things ever changing, that is, getting better—had vanished. It was like someone had turned the light of hope out altogether and that is when I attempted suicide. had allowed me to come to the point where no man could help me. I certainly couldn't help myself. As the world understands hope, it was completely gone, at least in my mind.

Several years before my jump off of the freeway, I had gone against my intuition and had agreed to take some harmless medication, so the doctors said. Unfortunately I had a severe allergic reaction that left me a little more than a pain riddled zombie. It blew my mind and took my health. I had to leave my job and I am still on disabilty almost 4 years later. Before things started to get better they got worse, so much so that for many months I was forced to crawl around on the floor, sometimes 12 hours a day! It was the only way for me to go on at the time. I finally came to the place where I just couldn't cope any longer. I felt trapped in an endless cycle of confusion and chronic debilitating pain, as well as being cut off from society and ultimately from those I loved the most. I began to mentally crack from the intensity of it all, and as all human reason for hope had disappeared, I felt compelled to kill myself.

Deep down inside I didn't want to die. However there just seemed like no other option or solution as I had built my hope on the ability of man and he had absolutely run out of answers to my problems. Man had become my basis for hope and I reasoned that if he couldn't help then I couldn't go on any longer. God seemed too slow and uncaring for me to depend upon Him. He just wasn't real enough to me to believe He would come to my rescue. I couldn't see God for who He really was and is, that is, a God who is all things to His children, for He always brings exactly what we need at the perfect time. He always comes through for that's His true nature. He can't fail us for it is contrary to His unchangeable personality—which is one of the many trustworthy things that distinguishes His personality from man's. He never changes and never fails.

So it was my incorrect concept of who God is that caused an inability to trust Him. My hope needed to be in His ability to deliver me and not in any man-made god. He will have no other gods before Him!

I didn't realize that God was purposely allowing me to come to the end of my limited resources and self, that is, where there wasn't anything I or anybody else could do to change my situation. It would either cause me to turn from my old ways and cling to Christ, or lose my mind or life without hope. It was do or die. It was the biggest fight of my life, but it was necessary to trust Him (even if only barely) to be faithful to do what was best for me no matter

where things led. It was all the hope I had left, so I decided to hang onto it with all my might as I gave Him all the available faith I had.

Here I am now almost 8 months later in right mind and glorifying God besides. I praise God for the Church of God! The saints have loved me and literally prayed me out of darkness into the glorious light! Hallelujah!

Question and Answer Column

Question: This is the third and final installment of the discussion on John 14:1-3.

Answer: This discussion will focus on the statement that Jesus spoke here, "I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there you may be also."

Where did Jesus go to prepare a place for us? My answer is, to Calvary, and I will bring forth some Scriptures (just a few of many) to confirm my thinking on this point. In Hebrews 10:19-23 we have this passage: "Having therefore, brethren, boldness to enter into the holiest by the blood of Jesus, By a new and living way. which he hath consecrated for us, through the veil, that is to say, his flesh; And having an high priest over the house of God; Let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith ..." Verse 19 speaks of our entering into the "holiest". The discussion through the 9th and 10th chapters of Hebrews is a running comparison between the Old Testament sanctuary and it's system of sacrifices and worship and the New Testament sanctuary (the Church of God) and its spiritual system of spiritual sacrifices (1 Peter 2:5 and Hebrews 13:15) and spiritual worship. That Old Testament sanctuary had two compartments in it, the holy place and the holiest of all, or most holy place. This was a type of the New Testament temple, the Church. But for the antitype to conform to the type it must have two compartments also; and indeed it does. These correspond to two parts of our salvation, justification and sanctification. This text only mentions the "holiest" which is the ultimate of our salvation. Hebrews 10:14 says. "For by one offering he hath perfected forever them that are sanctified." The sanctification of God's people required an acceptable sacrifice and that sacrifice was the blood of Jesus which was shed at Calvary. Hebrews 13:12 says, "Wherefore Jesus also, that he might sanctify the people with his own blood, suffered without the gate." Hebrews 10:20 said that He consecrated a new and living way for us through His flesh. But His flesh was torn and His body broken for us and His blood flowed out at Calvary to open up a way for us into an experience of full and free salvation; saved and sanctified—filled with the Holy Spirit.

In Ephesians 2:16, we read, "And that he might reconcile both unto God ("Both" here refers to the Jews and Gentiles) in one body by

the cross. . ." Verse 18 says, "For through him we both have access by one Spirit unto the Father." Hence we see that a way was opened up for us to approach unto God and be brought into fellowship with Him and be reconciled with Him through the sacrifice that Jesus made at Calvary and our faith in the merits of that sacrifice. Some of the words of a song I used to sing said, "Jesus Christ the Lord opened up the way to glory, when he died to save us from our ruined state." One of our present songs says, "Let us sing a sweet song of the home of the soul, the glorious place of our rest; It is not far away in the heavens untold, but deep in the infinite breast." The "home of the soul" spoken of here is the Church of God, the body of Christ, where the soul finds it's glorious rest in Christ the blessed rest giver. The Church of God was purchased with the blood of Christ. (Acts 20:28, Eph. 5:25-27).

We could multiply Scriptures on this thought on and on. But to what profit? We always wind up at the same place; that we enter into this glorious place of rest and peace, perfect love and holiness, victory over sin and victorious and triumphant living, the abundance of divine grace, the glorious estate and habitation that Jesus prepared for us by the sacrifice He made and the blood He shed when He went to Calvary.

However, all of this pertains to our salvation and our habitation in the kingdom of God in this world. But this is not the end or ultimate. When Jesus died for our sins at Calvary, He didn't stay dead in the tomb where He was laid. On the morning of the third day He burst the bars of death and the grave asunder and came forth a living Christ, immortal and glorious to never die any more. Jesus said to His disciples, and us, in John 14:19, "Because I live; ye shall live also." Read also 1 Cor. 15:51-57, Phil. 3:20, 21, 1 Thes. 4:13-18. All of these passages and many more attest to the fact that in Jesus' rising from the dead and ascending to heaven, He prepared a way for us to ressurect and be glorified and gathered to Him where He is in heaven. In 2 Peter 1:11, Peter speaks of the faithful saints having an abundant entrance into the everlasting kingdom of Jesus Christ. We are in the present earthly phase of the kingdom when we are saved, but we enter into the everlasting phase of the kingdom at the time of our resurrection at the last day. Jesus went to prepare the entrance into this place for us when He arose from the dead and ascended into heaven.

The first excuse recorded was when Adam and Eve were in the garden. Genesis 3:12, 13, "And the man said, The woman whom thou gavest to be with me, she gave me of the tree and I did eat. And the Lord God said unto the woman, What is this thou hast done? And the woman said, the serpent beguiled me and I did eat." God commanded that they should not eat of the tree of knowledge of good and evil, but they did anyway! There is no excuse.

In Exodus 4:1-12, God told Moses to speak to Pharoah. Moses didn't feel worthy and he started rendering excuses. He said, "O my lord, I am not eloquent, neither heretofore, nor since thou hast spoken unto thy servant: but I am slow of speech, and of a slow tongue." The Lord asked him, "Who hath made man's mouth? or who maketh the dumb, or deaf, or the seeing, or the blind?" Now go, and I will teach thee what thou shalt say. Praise God for His leading! He will tell each and everyone what to say and what to do at His own time! There is no excuse.

Luke 9:59-62 reads, "And he said unto another, Follow me, But he said, Lord suffer me first to go and bury my Father. Jesus said unto him, Let the dead bury their dead: but go thou and preach the kingdom of God. And another also said, Lord, I will follow thee; but let me first go bid them farewell, which are at home at my house. And Jesus said unto him, No man, having put his hand to the plow, and looking back, is fit for the kingdom of God." There is no excuse.

unto him, I have bought a piece of ground, and I must needs go and see it: I pray thee have me excused. There are many more Scriptures in the Bible that tell about excuses, but I feel these will help each one understand the danger.


FOLLOW ME
