Johnny anointed her and we had prayer for her, then Bro. Johnny went into the chapel to pray. Sis. Patsy and I were trying to keep cool water on the burn and call on the Lord at the same time. In a very few minutes Sarah stopped shaking and crying, and said, "It doesn't hurt anymore." Praise God! We fed her the remainder of her lunch and Sis. Patsy took her home. The wound was healed completely in less than ten days.

I want to say for myself that it was a wonderful experience to witness how quickly the Lord touched Sarah. I, and no doubt many of you, have had small burns of a much lesser degree and it would hurt for hours. How precious is God's mercy! I feel this description is feeble compared to the actual incident. The following is Sis. Velda Wisner's testimony of what happened after Sarah got home.

OK—Dear Saints: I would like to tell how the Lord blessed and worked in our behalf when my daughter (Sarah) got home from school. It had been approximately one hour since the accident happened and she was not in any pain. The wound was raw so I broke open an aloe vera leaf and spread the gel over the burn. She had little discomfort even from this.

I then tried to get her to lie down and take a nap, but she was full of "talk." She told nearly every detail and also expressed concern for the one who had caused the accident. She didn't want her to feel badly.

The wound looked real bad. One of the saints came to help me clean and dress it. On Wednesday morning when I removed the bandage from Sarah's arm it had developed some infection. The Lord gave Sarah and me this verse of song: "When you have done your best, let Jesus do the rest." It was a witness that the Lord was going to heal and take care of the infection. I had confidence when the bandage was changed in the evening the wound would be clear of infection. and it was! Praise God! I was so happy I called during prayer meeting to share the victory. The burn continued to improve from that day on. Sarah returned to school on Tuesday, the following week. Oh! how we thank God for all He has done.

I want to thank all the saints for their prayers during this time.

Question: Please comment on Matthew 5:47.

Answer: Matthew 5:47 reads thus: "And if ye salute your brethren only, what do ye more than others? Do not even the publicans so?" Now let us break this verse up a little. The first phrase is "if ye salute your brethren only." The 20th Century New Testament says "if ye show courtesy to your brethren only." Goodspeed's translation says "and if you are polite to your brothers and no one else." Phillip's translation says "and if you exchange greetings only with your own circle." All of these together—"salute," "show courtesy," "you are polite," "exchange greetings"-cover the whole scope of our general association with our fellows. Adam Clarke comments at this place that "brethren in this text could be properly rendered "friends." Then the whole scope of our association and attitude with our immediate circle of friends is comprehended here and it is altogether congenial

The second phrase is, "What do ye more than others?" Rotheram's translation renders this "What more than common are you doing?" Waymouth's translation says "Are you doing anything remarkable?" Olaf Norlie's translation says, "Does that give you any special distinction?"

The last phrase says, "Do not even the publicans so?" Rotheram's translation uses the term "the nations" instead of "the publicans." The James Moffatt translation says, "Do not the very pagans do as much?" The Centenary translation by Helen Montgomery says, "Even the Gentiles do that, do they not?" Beck's translation inserts "the people of the world" in place of "the publicans."

This seems to me to cover the whole scope of the direct meaning of this text. If we are courteous, polite, exchange greetings, and are congenial and friendly with our friends and brethren only, that in no way distinguishes us from the worldly crowd, because they all do the same. Matthew 5:47 is in a context with a number of verses which begin with verse 43 and continue through verse 48. So let us backtrack a little and consider the whole context and see how verse 47 fits in with the overall discussion of these verses.

"Ye have heard that it hath been said, Thou shalt love thy neighbour, and hate thine enemy. But I say unto you, Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate

you, and pray for them that despitefully use you, and persecute you; That ye may be the children of your Father which is in heaven: for he maketh his sun to rise on the evil and on the good, and sendeth rain on the just and on the unjust. For if you love them which love you, what reward have ye? do not even the publicans the same? and if ye salute your brethren only, what do ye more than others? do not even the publicans so? Be ye therefore perfect, even as your Father which is in heaven is perfect." Matthew 5:43-48.

In these verses is described the attitude of God, our heavenly Father, and His generous mercies toward all mankind, both the good and the evil, and how He gives rain and causes the sun to shine on all of them alike. Paul referred to this same disposition of the living God (Acts 14:15) when speaking to the heathens at Lystra in Acts 14:17 where he said that "He did good, and gave us rain from heaven, and fruitful seasons, filling our hearts with food and gladness." This, then, is the attitude and disposition of God toward humankind—generous and merciful. He has certain mercies that He dispenses to both the good and the evil. Of course, we understand that He has a special package of mercies which He reserves for His own (the righteous children of God). He enjoins upon us, His children, to be the same. In Galatians 6:10 we read, "As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith." The law standard said, "Love your neighbour and hate your enemy." However, Jesus came to offer the sacrifice of Himself for sin and to save us from our sins and establish the New Covenant with mankind that demanded a much higher standard of life than the law of Moses afforded. Jesus requires that we love our enemies, bless them that curse us, do good to them that hate us, and pray for those who despitefully use us and persecute us. (Matthew 5:44). He said we would have to be like this in order to be the children of our Father in heaven (verse 45). The salvation which Jesus established and provided is to make us partakers of the divine nature of God (II Peter 1:4) which makes us a partaker of the attitude and disposition toward humankind as is described to us in this group of verses (Matthew 5:43-48. Verse 47 has its setting in this context and teaches us that we must have a generous, kind, benevolent, considerate and courteous attitude and disposition toward all humankind, friend or foe. It forever obliterates clannishness from the hearts and lives of the children of God. To be perfect before God, we must be like this.

The exact same thing is taught in the group

of verses immediately preceding this group of verses we have just been studying (Matthew 5:39-42) where it says, "But I say unto you, That ye resist not evil: but whosoever shall smite thee on thy right cheek, turn to him the other also. And if any man will sue thee at the law, and take away thy coat, let him have thy cloak also. And whosoever will compel thee to go a mile, go with him twain. Give to him that asketh thee, and from him that would borrow of thee turn not thou away."

Now let us realize that all Scripture must be interpreted in its proper context. Therefore, the last verse of this group of verses (verse 42) which says, "Give to him that asketh thee, and from him that would borrow of thee turn not thou away." must be interpreted in context with the entire group of verses with which it is connected. These verses (38-41) teach us what attitude we should have toward our adversaries of whatever dimension they are and how we should respond to those who would oppress us, treat us unjustly and persecute us. We should go all out, even beyond reasonable and required bounds, to give satisfaction to the claims of anyone with whom we become involved. Then the general thought concludes with this 42nd verse which says. "Give to him that asketh thee, etc." In other words; if one of your adversaries—one who has smitten you on your cheek, sued you in the court and gained a judgment against you (justly or unjustly) or has taken undue advantage of you and compelled you to do something he had no right to require of you-needs help and comes to you and asks a gift or help or asks you to loan him something to enable him to meet an emergency, grant him the favor just as you would a friend. Never refuse him a favor just because he has mistreated you. This is exactly the same truth that is taught in Matthew 5:47 and its related verses. God is looking for people who can meet their problems in a different way than the man of the world meets his.



The Watchman On The Wall By Wayne Murphey



The next morning it seemed that the sun was unusually bright. Redeemed had much trouble focusing on the plains and wondered if something was wrong with his eyes. He would really rather be watching Persecuted's house anyway, so the day was spent with his back to the wall, his eyes on Persecuted's house and his mind on the troubles of the city.

Desire became a regular visitor to Redeemed's house, and much time was spent in discussing Persecuted: the influence that his unkept house was having on the morale of the city and what could be done about it.

Since the night of Desire's first visit when Redeemed had spoken unkindly to Conscience, she had been very quiet and had little to say about what was taking place. In one way this brought peace to Redeemed and yet in his heart he knew it was not peace, but silence.

Redeemed realized that he was not as happy as he used to be. His interest in watching for the enemy was nearly gone and he was constantly in a turmoil over what could be done about the problems of the city. He didn't feel as innocent as before and the pleasure that he once had in thinking about the Commander had diminished. However, he decided that perhaps this misery was just a disadvantage of his job and he would have to bear all this for the common benefit of the city.

After many days of dwelling upon his troubles, Redeemed felt he could contain them no longer. One morning, after the pre-watch meeting when everyone else had gone on to their post of duty, Redeemed sidled over to the Commander and inquired, "Commander, why is it that Persecuted has the west wall all the time and I have to face the sun on the east wall?"

The Commander gazed at Redeemed with a look of sadness in His eyes and replied, "Redeemed, why do you question and concern yourself with what your fellowservant is doing. Just follow my commands for you. Have you not considered that Persecuted must face the sun in the west when it goes down?" Redeemed really hadn't thought of that and he wondered why Desire had failed to mention it, but still he was not satisfied.

Then came the night when a third visitor was introduced into Redeemed's life. Desire appeared and with him a companion whom he introduced as Aversion. From what Redeemed could determine he thought that Aversion looked like he was kin to Desire. Well he might have thought this, for Envy and Hate are not very distant in relationship.

As time progressed Aversion and Redeemed had some heart-to-heart talks. The day came when Redeemed had very little use for Persecuted. It seemed that something rankled inside of him every time he saw Persecuted, his family, his house or anything belonging to him. If Redeemed had consulted the Commander, he would have been informed that his rankling was caused by a canker in his breast. Sad to say, Redeemed did not spend much time anymore talking with the Commander, unless he was trying to ferret out information that he could use against Persecuted.

Redeemed's mind was often focused on Persecuted rather than the Commander at the prewatch meetings. However, one morning something that the Commander said caught his attention. This is the exhortation that the Commander gave: "Men, in order to be good soldiers, you must be calm in the midst of the battle and have confidence in my leadership. One time I had a soldier who when just a boy, killed a bear and a lion. That was quite a feat for such a youth but it was a type of training and preparation that I was putting him through.

"Then one day a real test came. An enemy soldier who was a towering giant challenged my soldiers. All of my troops cowered back except this youth. He felt confident that my Spirit would be with him and that he would be victorious. As my soldier walked forth to the battlefield, the enemy made many abusive comments and mockingly described the harm he purposed to do. Neither was it idle boasting, for the giant was very capable of accomplishing everything he said. My soldier replied, 'Let all know that the true Commander does not save by the sword and spear: for the battle is His and He will give you into my hands.' This knowledge is what sustained him in the conflict. He knew that with my training and help he was ably prepared and he went forth in confidence and killed the enemy soldier. (Redeemed wondered at the Commander's purpose in telling this. It surely must be for Persecuted's benefit, he thought. Persecuted

doesn't seem to possess much courage. He would probably defect to the enemy at the first sign of battle.)

"This is a battle that all of you have enlisted in,' said the Commander, 'but remember, you are not in this battle just for the sake of fighting. If you are, you might as well return to your homes. You are in this battle because you have a cause at heart: you seek a good retirement and wish to see righteousness prevail here and now. It is not hard for me to tell which of you have joined just for the fight, because you are constantly at odds with someone else. I will not have anyone in my army who is a free lance fighter. You are not fighting your own little battle but we are all in this together. I will not keep anyone in my employ who is fighting for the approval of men. These kind of people will fight for the enemy if they think it will bring the most praise.

"Above all, watch, stand fast in your confidence and belief in me, quit you like men, be strong. Let all your things be done with love. Now go out and face the day at your post of duty with calmness. Don't let the drudgery of the daily watch deceive you, for the enemy is there and we must be alert."


God's Will

Through Thick or Thin

We have record of a man who lost everything that he had: 7,000 sheep, 3,000 camels, 500 yoke of oxen, 500 donkeys, servants, three daughters and seven sons. Besides, this man was afflicted with boils from the soles of his feet to the crown of his head. Yes, we are talking about Job. In Job 2:9, we read what Job's wife said to him: "Dost thou still retain thine integrity? curse God and die." Job told her that she spoke foolishly. At any rate, Job's wife was angry about the disasters which came their way and we have no more record of her in the Bible or in any reference books. She may have left him or died.

Suppose Job and his wife were living in our day and time. Would they be one among the hundreds in the divorce statistics we see in the newspapers? Much less financial stress has happened to some couples who end their marriage with divorce. It is only in fairy tales where a rich, handsome prince marries a wealthy, beautiful lady, but sincere, God-ordained marriages can last "happily ever after." The price of such a marriage is more than rubies or precious jewels, pure gold or tried silver.

My husband and I have not been married as long as some, but really a couple doesn't have to be married very long before they start feeling the pinch of meeting bills. Therefore, I would like to share with you a story and a saying we have in our household that reminds us of our first year of marriage.

My husband carried his new bride away to a beautiful 200 acre farm in the heart of the rolling Ozark Hills. On the farm, there were a couple of tall, stately barns, several big shade trees and under one hung a tire swing. There were other buildings and plenty of woven and barbed wire fencing. In the hollow of three hills

was a blue pond and to the east of it ran a clear stream over a smooth rocky bed. The two-story house was constructed of white and yellow hewn stone and in pictures it looked like a mini castle. This was the picture and description I gave my friends.

However, there were many untold flaws in this perfect setting. We were married in October and before Thanksgiving the well water was too low for the pump and the propane tank went empty. We didn't have any water nor any heat nor did we have the money that it would take to lengthen the well pipes and to refill the propane tank. That meant that we pumped all water from a small hand pump in the yard and we kept warm before the open fireplace in the living room.

Twice a day we pumped water for 100 odd head of hogs and feeder pigs. By staying up nights with mother sows and attending newborn baby pigs, we were able to keep a high pig average and eventually met our debts. The hogs did take their greedy share of income for feed and we were often looking at the empty bottom of the barrel.

One particular week we were really struggling. I hadn't gone to the grocery store because I wasn't feeling too well and because we really didn't have the money to spend. After Dwane went to do the chores, I went to look in the freezer and all the meat we had left was an opossum that Dwane and the boys had caught with their coon dogs. I set it out to thaw. I had never fixed 'possum before, but I was going to try. First, I boiled the meat, draining off the grease as much as possible. Then I took the meat off the bones and baked it in barbeque sauce. It took me all day to fix that 'possum so that by supper time I was sick of the smell and looks of it.

When Dwane came in for supper, I served him barbequed 'possum on bread. He ate two helpings and since I was still looking at it, I gave him mine also. I didn't bother to tell him what it was—he was enjoying it so much.

The next morning, Mother called to see how we were. I mentioned to her that I had fixed 'possum for supper the night before. Dwane heard me say that and he zipped right out to the freezer to check on the 'possum. Sure enough, he saw that it was gone! He had thought he was eating barbequed beef!

A few years later and five children down the line, we still find ourselves sometimes "looking at the empty bottom of the barrel." Then one of us will say to the other, "It's time for 'possum!"

We live in town now, but bills come to a town address as well as to a rural route number.

Debts and obligations are a monotonous humdrum and then there are financial blows that really shake us up. If a couple treasures financial gain more than married happiness, then financial blows may be fatal to that marriage. It doesn't have to be.

When any problems arise, together kneel at the feet of Jesus and together pour out the burdens to Him. A high ideal of marriage is a mighty incentive to purity of heart. In anticipation of a pure marriage, every step toward it should be in the path of pure mindedness. In entering into the holy covenant, the affections should be thoroughly tested. Something is needed more than a passing fancy, more than merely admiration of a beautiful person; a deep regard for true character and heart purity is essential.

Such thought as: "I may not have another chance"; "I am growing old and had better accept this one; it may be now or never," etc., should not be entertained. Most people desire marriage, and although such thoughts as these may seem to be heaven-born and beckoning to a happy life, yet they are more liable to be misguided desires for companionship. Home where love reigns is the vestibule to heaven; without it, the vestibule to hell. The relation between parent and child is holy and sacred, all will admit. Then the change warranted by marriage should be no less holy and sacred. Paul said, "Marriage is honorable," and it must be held sacred.

CONDITIONS OF TRUE LOVE

One of the conditions of a pure marriage and holy love is a lofty ideal in character. That is one of the qualities a woman is entitled to find in the man to whom she gives herself to be a life companion, because it is the pivot on which all things humanly desirable are balanced. Marriage is a failure when manhood is a failure. A home that is builded on the concrete foundation of a Christlike character will never collapse so long as it remains on that foundation. A woman joyfully anticipates being her beloved companion's helpmeet, but she recoils at the thought of a life of slavery.

The husband is entitled to find in the one whom he offers to protect and defend through life a virtuous character. He is right in looking to her for sympathy and affection. About the worst thing that can be said about a wife is that her affections are unsteady and that she has little sympathy. A man is exhorted to love his wife "as Christ loved the church," and surely there was a holy sacred love and sympathy

between Christ and his bride. Love towards the wife and reverence towards the husband is the basis of sacred sympathy and confidence. When the husband looks upon his wife as his property, and takes no interest in the things that interest her, she will fade and grow cold. When the wife locks herself in her room, does not interest herself in what interests her husband, he will, or may, carry himself and his interests elsewhere, and go to the place where she least desires to have him go.

If single persons would go slow and study carefully their own thoughts, if they would ask themselves the questions, "Why am I getting married? What have I uppermost in my mind? Am I ready to govern myself and to enter into that relation like a man?" there would be less trouble. If the penalities of God are graded, then I pity the viper who, impelled by lust and honeycombed disease, with the pretense of virtue seduces a pure girl to become his harlot and slave by a man-made marriage law. If vengeance is also graded, woe to be the one who with glittering eye and deceptive pretext, crawls into the home and fascinates a cherished wife or husband to the ruin of pure affection. The lightning of God's wrath will flash through his or her heart forever, for the reproach will not be wholly wiped away. And still more wretched will be the condition of the man who leaves a loving, confiding wife, betrays her trust and love, proves false to his marriage vow, and revels in the things that destroy character, love —J. Have You Considered Your Cross?

Today we are living in a comfortable, modern and at-ease age. There is a greater current working against anything that is righteous, upward or Christ-centered. The flesh wishes to be in a relaxed state.

Jesus, our Saviour, bore His cross; so must we. There are different areas of our cross. First, we must accept our cross. To accept is to take or receive with approval. In Matthew 10:38 we read, "And he that taketh not his cross, and followeth after me, is not worthy of me." Imagine Christ standing before you handing you a cross. It may be a different size than someone elses. We all have a cross—our own individual cross! If someone gives us something and we accept it, we must take it into our hands to receive it.

Fourth, we must love or take pleasure in our cross. To take pleasure means to have agreeable emotions, delight, enjoyment. Paul in following after Christ's sufferings learned to take pleasure in his cross. In II Corinthians 12:10 we read, "Therefore I take pleasure in infirmities, in reproaches, in necessities, in persecutions, in distresses for Christ's sake: for when I am weak, then am I strong." Christ went all the way through with His cross. He could have called heaven's angels, but He took pleasure in doing God's will. Do you take pleasure in doing the will of God?

Life is not spent on flowery beds of ease. We must press to gain a crown in glory. God will disturb our comforts; He will trouble our waters. Let us end with the Scripture in I Peter 2:21. "For even hereunto were ye called: because Christ also suffered for us, leaving us an example, that ye should follow his steps."
