Salvation Reasonable

"Come now, and let us reason together saith the Lord." (Isaiah 1:18). In olden time God reasoned with His people through the prophets. Through Isaiah He spoke to His people, requiring them to put away their iniquities, and to cease to do evil, and then announced the fullness of His pardon, that though their sins were as scarlet they should be white as snow, and though red like crimson they should be as wool. Samuel reasoned with the people of Israel, recounting the Lord's righteous acts and showing that His dealings were just. (I Samuel 12:6-15).

In the New Testament times we find the Apostle Paul reasoning with the Jews in their synagogues and persuading both Jews and Greeks to believe in Christ. (Acts 17:2). Before Felix he reasoned of righteousness, temperance, and judgment to come, until that profligate and cruel governor trembled in his seat. (Acts 24:25). In the hearing of King Agrippa, Paul related the story of his own conversion, until the proud ruler, convinced of the scripturalness and reasonableness of Christianity as a proposition, made the expression which has since become proverbial: "Almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian." (Acts 26:28).

People like reasonable things. Salvation appeals to reason. Through the dark period of Roman Catholic supremacy, as well as during the succeeding years of Protestant confusion, salvation's true aspect has been much hidden and misrepresented. Even we, in our own day, are not unfamiliar with the spectacle of professors of Christianity whose lives either wholly or in part belie their profession. But salvation in its true light is reasonable; it appeals to men, and here may be emphasized the Christian's responsibility of rightly representing Christ to the world, of letting the

true light of salvation so shine that men, beholding the same, will by their reasonable acknowledgements glorify the Father which is in heaven. (Matthew 5:16).

Salvation is reasonable because from every view-point of the soul it appears consistent. It is not reasonable to the flesh because the flesh would pursue its own independent way: but the flesh is not, however, that department of our life which is to rule; it only adapts us to the earth, this mundane existence. The soul is the real man. In its sphere, and not in the sphere of the flesh, are the human verities. If the soul is happy the individual is happy in the highest department of his nature. If the soul finds its perfect adjustment to the divine will, then life is complete, and one realizes himself restored to that state in which man was originally created, wherein the flesh, fully ruled by the soul, nevertheless finds a sufficient existence and exercise. There being no discord, all is harmony. Is not such a state consistent and reasonable?

Salvation is reasonable because in its attainment the sinner sacrifices nothing that is good. He becomes entitled to every good thing. He sacrifices only that which is inconsistent with the will of God. He must give up sinful pleasures, but these are only momentary; they have brought him into bondage and have reacted in remorse and wretchedness. Instead of these he receives deliverance and abiding peace. Pleasures of a higher, spiritual order, become his to enjoy. He must yield up the pride of life, the honor of the world, but this is unreliable and no dependence can be placed upon it. Instead of worldly honor he receives honor that comes from God. (John 5:44). If for Christ's sake he must sever the earthly relations of father, mother, brother, sister, home, or possessions, he receives a hundredfold of these things in this life, besides the promise of eternal life in the world to come. (Mark 10:29, 30).

It will be noted that it is the lot of every Christian to have persecutions. "All that will live godly in Christ Jesus shall suffer persecution." (II Timothy 3:12). Persecutions, however, if they are really for Christ's sake, only add to the glory of the Christian experience. From the slightest offence to martyrdom at the stake, they but open the avenues of grace and contribute to the appreciation of the heavenly riches.

The Christian meets with what are commonly called "trials," tests of his faith and of his loyalty to God. These are times when Satan would overwhelm with discouragement and the suggestion that to give up the faith would be a relief. Temptations and trials are, of course, some of the things which must be

endured; but if properly borne they are stepping spiritual to greater attainment. So if these be reckoned as some of the "expenses" of the Christian career, to state it in a business way, the assets accumulated are manifold more than the expenses. Whatever one has to expend in the Christian life is more than equalled in the grace received. When the Christian thinks of the riches that are his, the tremendous bank deposit that is placed to his credit, he feels he can afford all things, and the "trials" fade into insignificance. "Godliness with contentment is great gain." (I Timothy 6:6). Salvation, then, is a reasonable investment.

Some of the grandest personages who have ever graced the world have regarded the divine way as reasonable. Thus we have Abraham, Moses, David, Solomon, Paul, the Christian reformers and martyrs, and the numerous Christian lights and heroes of more recent centuries.

Yes, sinner friend, salvation is reasonable. There is absolutely nothing on the side of the world that can tip the scales against the benefit and blessings salvation will afford you. A life of sin is a deviation from man's normal existence. Salvation is a restoration to the original state of the soul's happiness and purity. To attain it we must forsake all that is contrary to God, and having forsaken all that is sinful and received the pardon of our transgressions, we must yield ourselves a living sacrifice, in a perfect consecration, unto God. This means a complete transformation, a death to the old self-life; but, after all, it is our "reasonable service." (Romans 12:1, 2). -A. L. Byers -Taken from The Gospel Trumpet, 1915.

Behold What Manner Of Love

Are the burdens and cares of life about to cast you down? There is someone that is anxiously waiting to help bear your heavy burden—someone who knows and understands your situation far better than anyone. That someone is JESUS. He not only knows the circumstance, but can look into the future and know the end of any situation.

Not long ago, I was in the midst of a heavy trial. The devil tried to bring discouragement and confusion to my mind. I soon realized that was all from the devil. In my weakness I could only cry out, "Jesus, Jesus, help me!" That was a cry from the bottom of my heart. This thought then came to my mind, "Behold what manner of love." Such a comforting and soothing feeling went all through me as I began thinking what that really meant to me.

God had the power to cause everything to work together for my good. Isn't that wonderworking power—to turn bad into good? Sometimes God has to get our attention by allowing something hard to come our way—something that is humanly impossible to work out. God loves to work out our problems for us, and it blesses Him if we bring them to Him. We limit God's wonder-working power if we don't believe in Him, for God's power works according to our faith. Our faith many times will become weak when we have to wait on the Lord's timing, yet the Bible plainly tells us we have to wait on the Lord. Doesn't the Lord have to wait on us, before He can see His image clearly reflected in our life?

When waiting on the Lord, it causes us to do much praying and heart-searching, thus anything un-Christ-like is revealed to us, and we can ask God to help us overcome anything. God in His wisdom, permits this waiting period, but the devil tries to take advantage of every waiting period to sow seeds of doubt and unbelief in our heart.

The devil has never created anything good, only evil and is jealous toward God and His goodness. It's the devil's business to foil every plan God has designed for us.

In the Bible, the children of Israel are a good example of God working and showing His great love and power toward His people. Time after time, God performed miracles, but as soon as a situation arose that required waiting and exercising faith, the devil told them that God had forsaken them. Many times they complained and murmured against God and against their leader, Moses, who was chosen by God. Only a few had real faith in God, and thus God was able to eventually carry out His plan to deliver the children of Israel into the land of Cannaan, the land of plenty. Behold what manner of love He had bestowed upon them, yet they were so quick to forget the moment any hard times came and it was needful for faith to be exercised.

Behold what manner of love was bestowed when we think about God's gift for mankind—a gift that cost God His only Son. Almost 2,000 years ago, God sent Jesus down here for our salvation. It should thrill our hearts to think of the shepherds as they listened with awe and great wonderment to the angels as they sang, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men." Jesus wants that song to ring in our hearts today.

Behold what manner of love when we consider how God was willing to let His only Son be offered as a sacrifice for our sins. Imagine

what sorrow God knew He would have to face! If we have had a loved one close to us die, we can only understand in part what God faced when He allowed His Son to die in disgrace and in such a horrible way—but God was looking at the end result.

Let us behold what manner of love was bestowed upon us when Jesus left the honors and glories of heaven, and willingly lived a life much more lowly than most of us now live. Still yet, there was something much harder to bear than this lowly position, that was the ridicule, scorn, hate and jealousy from His own creation.

Behold what manner of love when we think of Jesus fasting for forty days and nights and then resisting every temptation that the devil had so alluringly and cunningly presented to him. The devil even used Scriptures to try to prove his point and cause Jesus to yield. Praises to be our Lord, He firmly resisted the devil and was victor over all!

Behold what manner of love Jesus manifested in the garden of Gethsemane. His flesh dreaded the sufferings He knew He would soon have to undergo—the scourging and the tortuous crucifixion. However, there was something that bore much more heavily upon Him than His coming physical sufferings and death, even more than the scorn and the mockery of the people. That was the grief of lost and dying souls. Jesus knew that when He willingly laid down His life for all the sins of the world, that every avenue and preparation possible would then be fulfilled for mankind to be redeemed; but how saddening and heart-breaking it was to know that so many would spurn all this love and go their own way. Think about Christ's feelings. A part of His creation—lost!—lost because they persisted in their own way.

What is our own way? Unbelief in God, pride, mistakingly thinking that God's way is too hard, persisting to take things in our own hands and not letting God work in His own time.

Let us visualize in our minds that scene when Jesus so willingly bore the crushing weight of the sins of the whole world. While hanging from the cruel cross, Jesus proved even further His great love, for He saved the soul of the repentant thief hanging from another cross nearby.

Meanwhile, some among the crowd railed on Jesus, wagging their head and mocking Him said, "Save thyself, and come down from the cross. Likewise also the chief priests mocking said among themselves with the scribes, He saved others; himself he cannot save. Let Christ


EDITORIALS

Business Notice

CHURCH OF GOD NATIONAL CAMP MEETING MONARK SPRINGS. MO

The tabernacle used for the National Camp Meeting is badly in need of repair. It was suggested that we consider replacing the old structure with a new open-sided metal building. The trustees contacted the various congregations with the question. Of the fifty-seven congregations listed, fifty-four responded. Twenty-four favored replacement, twenty-two wanted to repair and eight gave no opinion. Some congregations responded with an actual count of people. Considering total responses, 128 were for replacement and 129 were for repair.

The trustees met December 2 to consider the result and make a decision. The trustee's decision is to repair the old structure. Because the count from the congregations was so evenly divided and without overwhelming support for replacement, the trustees upheld the earlier decision to repair made in the business meeting last July. The question was made a subject of prayer and we accept the decision as the Lord's will.

Some have questioned how we stand financially. The repairs will cost about \$6,000 which is in addition to normal expenses for the meeting. We have a little over \$8,000. While our current balance will cover the repair cost, we still have the usual meeting start up expenses. Normally we start the camp meeting with about \$6,000 to \$8,000 in the bank which helps cover the preparation expenses and expenses that occur early in the meeting. From year to year our balance has remained pretty constant. When expenses have increased for special projects the income has increased accordingly. Praise God! I certainly appreciate God's plan of Holy Spirit leadership and am pleased to report that it works.

Question and Answer Column

Bro. Ostis and Sis. Evelyn Wilson have recently moved from Albany, OR, to Shawnee, OK. Due to the much work and time involved, it was not practical for Bro. Ostis to write a column this month. We recently received a letter asking that the scriptural interpretation of plaiting the hair be commented on, so the following is the answer taken from a back issue which dealt with this subject.

Answer: I Timothy 2:9 and I Peter 3:3 are the two Scriptures in the New Testament which refer to women's hair with reference to its arrangement, etc. I Timothy 2:9 says, "In like manner also, that women adorn themselves in modest apparel, with shamefacedness and sobriety; not with broided hair, or gold, or pearls, or costly array;" I Peter 3:3 says, "Whose adorning let it not be that outward adorning of plaiting the hair, and of wearing of gold, or of putting on of apparel;"

It is important to the thought to note that both of these Scriptures have the emphasis on ornamentation and adornment. The doing of the hair is mentioned in these texts right along with gold, pearls, costly array, and different adornments and ornamentations. Therefore, the particular method of fixing the hair in these verses is to be identified with ornamentation and adornment. This could hardly be said of just the plain braiding of the hair as we know it today which is just another way of fixing the hair. Some do up their hair on top of their heads; some in a similar way, but on the back of

their heads; some put it up in a figure eight on the back of their heads; some wear it in a French roll down on their necks: some (especially the younger sisters) just let it hang full length; some braid it and let it hang, or put it up in different arrangements on their heads. Of all these ways the women arrange their hair. I do not see that any one of them could be singled out as worldly adornment any more than any other. No doubt, each sister tries to fix her hair in the way that is most becoming to herself.

In the Bible times it was different from the common braiding that the saint sisters use in our day, and with which we are familiar. In the Scriptures it refers to something directly identified with worldly adornment and therefore something to be avoided by saints. Let us look at what was under consideration in these Scriptures and why such was written in the Bible at all.

I Timothy 2:9 refers to "broided" hair (the margin says "plaited") and I Peter 3:3 refers to "plaiting" the hair. "Broided" and "plaited" hair involves more than the common braiding with which we are familiar today.

In the article on dress in the Zondervan Pictorial Bible Dictionary edited by Merril C. Tenney, we read these words: "Women often added to their adornment by an elaborate 'plaiting' of the hair. I Peter 3:3 finds it necessary to warn Christian women against relying upon such adorning to make themselves attractive." It is clear here that this writer at least, connects the statement in I Peter 3:3 with worldly adornment and ornamentation.

Smith's Bible Dictionary in the article on hair says, "The women wore their hair natural. but braided, and dressed with strings of silk with ornaments." Also in the article on dress it says, "Jewesses did not vail their faces but covered the hair only. Women wore the hair long, braided, curled, etc., and decorated with iewels and coins. . . There were many ornaments in use for the hair, head, ears, nose, and neck. . . . " All that is said here concerning the hair is in regard to adornment and ornamentation.

I Timothy 2:9, "Not with broided hair, or gold" variously translated is in other translations of the New Testament as follows: "Not with braided hair, and gold"- American Standard Version; "And not with wreaths of gold ornaments for the hair"—Twentieth Century New Testament; "Not with plaitings and ornamentation of gold"—Rotheram; "Not with (elaborate) hair arrangement of gold"-New English Bible; "The adornment of a Christian woman is not a matter of an elaborate coiffure"—Phillips.

Adam Clarke comments on I Peter 3:3 as follows (in part). "Plaiting the hair, and variously folding it about the head, was the most ancient and simplest mode of disposing of this chief ornament of the female head. . . . Thin plates of gold were often mixed with the hair, to make it appear more ornamental by the reflection of light and of the solar rays. Small golden buckles were also used in different parts; and among the Roman ladies, pearls and precious stones of different colours."


The word found in I Timothy 2:9 is "broided" hair. "Broidered" is defined in the dictionary as, "To ornament with needlework; embroider." The thought here is the imposition of ornamental work on an already existing cloth of fabric. Then to broider hair would suggest the thought of imposing ornamental substance onto the already existing hair in whatever way it

might be arranged.

Nothing that is said above by the various writers, dictionaries, and various Testament translations could refer to the braiding of the hair as we know it in our day, but would involve the addition of ornamental and adorning substances and materials with it.

Toward mid-morning, as the sun was beaming hotly upon him, Redeemed left his post for a drink at the water station. On the way he was forced to step over the legs of three watchmen who had their backs against the wall and were gazing off into the city. "Exactly what is going on here?" Redeemed wondered. "No one is really watching for the enemy." This frightened him and he spent the rest of the day carefully guarding the plains.

Upon returning home that night Redeemed commented to his wife about the watchman he had observed that day. Perhaps it was because Conscience detected some real concern in Redeemed, (for she had for some time been silent upon this subject) that she said, "Redeemed, you are guilty of the same thing."

Redeemed started in surprise and asked, "How do you know?"

"Because," she answered, "for some time now when I would pass the wall you would be looking off into the city. If you would be honest with yourself," she continued, "you would admit that something is wrong here. It is really becoming quite evident. If the enemy can influence the watchmen to quit their post of duty and focus on the city, the enemy can make a major raid and catch us napping."

Redeemed made no comment, for he was not quite ready to admit that he had been wrong in all of his thinking concerning Persecuted. At any rate, Conscience's words stirred him deeply. He left the house and spent the rest of the evening walking the streets in deep meditation. Finally, as dusk settled in, he passed a wooded area which he entered. Throwing himself upon a fallen log he began to pray earnestly. He had reached a point where he no longer thought of anyone's deficiencies but his own.

Once it starts it poisons you throughout. It lifts you up above your companions, the ones you really need to stand by your side. Pride will ultimately lead you to hate both your companions and me.

"The enemy used pride that you might be defeated yourself and also to cause havoc among your brethren. The enemy took advantage of your job and used it for his purpose. He had you watching on the wrong side of the wall. The things that you see on this side of the wall are domestic affairs. The things that you see on the other side of the wall are military affairs. I am the one who has founded this city and made it beautiful, and it is my duty, not yours, to maintain it. I have given you the job to make sure that no enemy comes to take the citizens away. This is a very important job. I do not belittle the importance of domestic affairs, for one that is careless in domestic affairs will be careless in war. However, you cannot instill this carefulness into others as I can."

Here the Commander paused and began once more. "A man casts seed into the ground. He watches daily, waiting for the seed to spring up and grow. However he doesn't know how it will grow, for the earth bringeth forth fruit of herself. When I forgive a person of their wrongs and plant a seed of everlasting life in my Father's kingdom, it defies human understanding. It is like the wind that blows. We cannot grasp it nor contain it, and neither can a man literally take hold of my Spirit. Nor can he say who will have it or who will not, for it is given to whom I desire and it is not understood by man.

"As this seed grows, first just a blade will show above the ground. As the man watches over his garden he is anxious that it should grow and bring forth something that he can see, something tangible. He may be very tempted to grasp the blade and attempt to stretch it a little, but this is vain. He cannot force growth. He understands that the earth brings forth fruit of itself. After a while the plant will put on the ear. By this you can see that there are great possibilities for it. Then in time there is a maturing and full corn comes into the ear. This is the fruit that the planter desired for it to produce.

"Those who live in this city are the little plants that I speak of. It is my desire that they would grow and produce love, joy, peace, long-suffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness and temperance. These are the things that each individual must strive, by my help, to produce in their lives. But just as you cannot make the plant grow, neither can you make others produce these fruits. If you were to make Persecuted paint his house, it might still be messy on the inside. This is where my part comes in. I know and understand all that is happening in this city, whereas you can only judge what takes place by what you see.

"I am sure that you recall the times that I have admonished the watchmen to judge not that you be not judged. Let me enlighten you regarding how this principle works. It is to your credit that you have come to me before an open confrontation between you and Persecuted took place. You had already found a cause against Persecuted, formed a dislike for everything concerning him, and began to work on the problem of how to make it a public issue. If you had not come to me tonight it would have been but a matter of a short time before you would have had a visitor whose true identity is Gossip. However, he often goes by the name of Concerned. Gossip would have influenced you to whisper your conclusions in the ears of your friends. It would not have stayed a secret for long for your friends would have spread it far and wide. Persecuted would have heard it and it would have become open talk. It would only be natural that Persecuted and others would have looked just as critically at your house and found it was not spotless. Persecuted may have had

the grace not to openly contend it, but in his mind and in others you would not be without blemish. Always keep in mind that you cannot use your own judgment and come out of the situation clean.

"I am striving and doing all I can to present all of you someday to my Father as a blameless people and you must not interfere. I gave you a wife that was well-trained and also I have given you my Words and Spirit. These things should make you bear the fruit that I wish. As you bear fruit, I enjoin you to give my Word and be an example in domestic affairs and then leave the growing to me and them."

These words of truth pierced deeply into the heart of Redeemed. As the Commander lifted him to his feet, He assured him that all was forgiven. It seemed a great load was gone. Redeemed felt as he did before Pride appeared.

Wiping the tears from his eyes Redeemed said, "Truly those were words of great wisdom and I clearly see my place as a watchman, but what am I going to do about Pride, for I know he will surely return."

the King of Israel descend now from the cross, that we may see and believe. And they that were crucified with him reviled him. And when the sixth hour was come, there was darkness over the whole land until the ninth hour." Mark 15:30-33.

Jesus experienced total, complete, excruciating torture and agony. Listen to His heart-rending cry as He cried out, "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" (Mark 15:34).

"After this, Jesus knowing that all things were now accomplished, that the scripture might be fulfilled, saith, I thirst. Now there was set a vessel full of vinegar: and they filled a spunge with vinegar, and put it upon hyssop, and put it to his mouth. When Jesus therefore had received the vinegar, he said, It is finished: and he bowed his head, and gave up the ghost." John 19:28-30.

God, the Father, experienced all the pangs and agonies of grief while His Son was dying. God heard that agonized voice when Jesus cried out, "Why hast thou forsaken me?" Suddenly Duncan grabbed his left side, walked a few steps, staggered, collapsed, and then died. A half-inch piece of wire, no bigger than a pencil lead, had been hurled into his heart by the power mower he was using. His death was sudden.

A twenty-four-year-old newspaper reporter, Jost Lemann, put a bottle on top of his head and asked another man to shoot it off. J. Poetschke took aim with a .38 calibre pistol, pulled the trigger and missed.

The bullet penetrated the head of Jost Lemann. He died on the spot, and the "William Tell" episode ended in a tragedy.

A little girl, Theresa Conn, was playing hide-and-seek with her dog. She hid a ball on the table and waited for her dog to find it. The large collie dog jumped up on the table to get the ball. In doing so the steel table was upset and crashed on Theresa's head. She was pronouced dead on arrival at the hospital. The dog unwittingly had killed her.

Goliath died, being hit by a stone; he was not ready for death. He had defied the God of Israel. "The stone sunk into his forehead; and he fell upon his face to the earth." I Samuel 17:49).

Stones also caused the death of Stephen, but he was ready. He had glorified the name of Jesus by his outstanding witness.

Don't Live In Confusion


