The Significance of the Open Tomb

"Mr. Wesley, if you knew that you must die at twelve o'clock tomorrow night," once asked a lady, "how would you spend the time between now and then?"

"Why, just as I intend to spend it now," answered Mr. Wesley, "I would preach this evening at Gloucester, as I have appointed; and then again at eight o'clock tomorrow morning. After that I would ride to Tewkesbury, and preach there in the afternoon, and then go to meet the societies in the evening; and then I would go to the house of the friend with whom I am to stay; I would converse and pray with the family as usual; then I would retire to my room at ten o'clock, and commending myself to my heavenly Father, lie down quietly to rest, and sleep, and—at twelve o'clock wake up in heaven!"

THE EXPLANATION

With an earnestness becoming the momentous question, we ask: Where can we find the secret of this wonderful calmness? When the house, trembling with age, begins to fall; when beams are cracking and the light begins to shine through, how can the conscious tenant sit still without any sense of fear?

In our imagination we follow the discouraged and heartbroken disciples to the open tomb, and here the mystery begins to unfold. Like beautiful plants and flowers, springing from the earth, thoughts begin to arise from God's deep mysteries, forming themselves into definite proportions, until our questions are satisfactorily answered and our search is rewarded. The open tomb is the explanation. It tells us of one, only one, who had power to liberate Himself from the tomb.

Why important.— The mere fact that a man rose from the dead more than nineteen hundred

years ago, would extend but little hope to us in the dying hour were it not for the additional fact that He is the only one among earth's millions who rose from the dead with a glorified body. When we realize who He was and why He arose, we realize, as did Wesley, that death has lost its sting and the grave its victory.

Christ said He had power to lay down His life and power to take it again. (John 10:18). Many heroes have laid down their lives, but when Christ took back His life from the cold embrace of death, He proved His dominion over death.

It Gives Efficacy to the Atonement.— "If Christ be not risen," says Paul, "then is our preaching vain, and your faith is also vain." (I Corinthians 15:14). "And if Christ be not raised, . . . ye are yet in your sins." (vs. 17). Without the resurrection, the atonement has no efficacy—the cross is in vain. Faith in the resurrection is essential to salvation. ". . . If thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved." Romans 10:9. We can not preach the atonement without the resurrection. The apostles gave witness of the resurrection with great power. In his sermon on the day of Pentecost, Peter reached hearts when he said, "This Jesus hath God raised up, whereof we all are witnesses." Acts 2:32. The Apostle Paul preached the resurrection on variour occasions (Acts 17:18, 23:6; I Corinthians 15:1, 3, 4). To the apostles it seemed to be the central doctrine of the gospel. Without it, the atonement was precluded; they would have had no gospel to preach.

Christ's Resurrection a Pledge of Ours.— It is this truth, as expressed in I Corinthians 15:19-23, that makes death a victory. That is why a certain minister could say, "I know I am dying; but my death-bed is a bed of roses. I have no thorns planted on my dying pillow. Heaven is already begun. I die a safe, happy death. Thou, my God, art present. I feel that Thou art here, precious Jesus."

Glorious hope! Someday the stones will all roll away and we shall come forth in His likeness. For this hope Paul was willing to count all else but refuse. (Philippians 3:8-11). It is a balm in time of sorrow and pain, an inspiration to holy living, and an anchor to the soul that is both sure and steadfast. This hope has been attacked by great minds of the past, and is still being attacked; but it emerges from each conflict stronger and better qualified to give a reason. This intellectual conflict is not waged by Christians merely in defense of a doctrine made sacred by age, but because of the inspiration

received from the ever-abiding presence of the living Christ. His life is a power in the world, and that is why we are believing in His resurrection and preaching it with unabating energy.

The Final Resurrection.— The final resurrection will be universal and instantaneous. None will be exempted, for "all that are in the graves shall hear His voice and shall come forth." (John 5:28, 29).

Immediately following the resurrection will be the final judgment, when "before him shall be gathered all nations: and he shall separate them one from another, as a shepherd divideth his sheep from the goats." (Matthew 25:32).

Then all will be rewarded. The reward of the righteous will be the "new heavens and a new earth, wherein dwelleth righteousness." (II Peter 3:13). "The wicked shall be turned into hell, and all the nations that forget God." Psalm 9:17.

Monrovia, Liberia, West Africa—Dear Christian friends: Greetings in the name of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus.

I live in a country where moral conditions are low, though we claim that our country was

founded on Christian priniciples. About 15% of the population are Christians and the other 85% follow after the devil's ways in their daily activities. Christians, as well as non-Christians, are unconcerned about the moral breakdown in our society. Preachers philosophize their own thoughts and talk politics more than God's Word. What a pity! There is a great need for a nationwide revival or crusade for my country right now. Pray for my country to be saved from sin, because sin is a reproach to a nation.

I have a congregation that is about two years old. It all started with three families (six adults) worshipping together and using the Holy Bible as our only guide. Though we are not claiming to be perfect, we are trying to live and worship God according to Bible standards such as Leviticus 20:7 and I Peter 1:15, 16, among others. Though we receive sharp criticism for our emphasis on sanctification and holiness in the service of God, we have not given up our strongest hold. We continue to pray based on our faith in the Spirit of God despite those who think it is impossible for man to be holy before God in this world.

Through the prayers of faith, God has given us the victory. Some of our very critics are now members of our congregation. They have been convicted by the Spirit of God—I mean unconditional conviction. Our membership has risen from three families to 190 members in less than two years. They want to learn the Word of God. They want to be baptized. Our hearts rejoice daily because the Lord is blessing us with new converts nearly every Sunday. We have grown from the prayer group we used to be to a church now.

Because of the victories God has given us daily through our faith, we thought to call ourselves "Faith and Victory people." And so, on September 1, 1988, we named our congregation "Faith and Victory Church of God." We are now worshipping in a public school building every Sunday and Saturday on which the school is not in session. In addition, we have opened two Sunday schools with the combined enrollment of 700 students, or children whose ages are between six to fourteen years.

You can now see that the harvest in Liberia is great but the laborers are few. Pray with us that God in His own time will find faithful workers for the harvest in Liberia. Our arms are wide open to them from far and near. We need faithful saints from far to teach, direct, guide and supervise us. In Memoriam

On March 1, 1912, Jefferson Pierro was born to James Curtis and Josephine Pierro, at Luther, OK, and ascended to sit at the foot of our heavenly Father's throne on the morning of December 12, 1988, from the Sunset Guest Home at Pacoima, CA at the age of 76 years, 9 months and 11 days.

Brother Jefferson Pierro, or "Uncle Jack," as his neices and nephews called him, was the eldest of six children, having one brother and four sisters. He first attended elementary school at Slick, OK. The family moved to Newby, OK where he finished elementary school. Thereafter, he attended Bristow High School with his future wife, Geneva Roach, until they both completed the tenth and were promoted to the eleventh grade.

Growing up, he was a most precious and dear child. His parents testified to the fact that, "He never gave any trouble." He was given much responsibility and seldom required correcting by his parents. On such rare occasions, his father would correct and counsel after calling out, "Come here my little man."

He married Geneva Roach at the Sunny Slope School near Welty, OK on October 28, 1934, a union to which the Lord added sixteen children. In late December, 1938, he moved his family to Leavenworth, KS where they lived until the last day of January, 1939. Searching from church to church, he finally found the Lord when he moved his family to Bakersfield, CA. He remained there until the latter part of January, 1953, when he moved his wife and

their, now twelve children to Allensworth, CA where Brother Jefferson Pierro enjoyed his final years receiving of the Lord, and the rearing of his last four sons.

Bro. Jefferson let his light shine wherever he lived and sought to bring spiritual light to the community where he lived and to provide for a solid foundation and increased spiritual awareness by having Bro. I. C. Chandler to preach to the people of Allensworth.

He was recently instrumental in bringing good drinking water to the community from several miles away. He participated in special conferences with the, then, California governor, Ronald Wilson Reagan, and others, in a successful effort to have the townsite of Allensworth set aside as an historic park of California dedicated to and recognizing and highlighting many contributions to progress made by black Americans.

Above all things, and even to the end, he had an undying faith in the Almighty God. He prayed without ceasing and his prayers were answered by the Lord providing exactly what he and the family needed. He often asked the Lord to "make a way where there is no way." He consistently reminded the saints, "We are to be 'prayer warriors.' " He had unfeigned love which he bestowed upon all he met. He had a special love for all the saints and, towards the end, often declared with emphasis, "I love all the saints: all the saints!" He inspired love in others because he manifestly loved freely. Because of his ability to endure hardship and hardness, he was able to maintain his composure and even give a smile without retaliation in the face of what was sometimes stern criticism. He thus naturally garnered friends and allies wherever he went.

Jefferson Pierro was preceded in death by James Curtis Pierro, his earthly father, by Rosa Etta Tompkin-Wilson, his daughter, and by Rosalie Pierro and Elizabeth "Eleazer" Fuller, two of his sisters. He leaves cherished memories for his most precious and darling wife, Geneva Pierro, of the home, at Allensworth, CA; his loving mother, Josephine Pierro, of Stockton, CA, and recently of the Sunset Guest Home at Pacoima, CA; one brother, Everett Pierro of Stockton, CA; two sisters, Ethel Dillard and Ola B. Breckenridge of Stockton, CA; nine sons: James, of Pacoima, CA, Edward, of Long Beach, CA, David, of Clovis, CA, Alfred, of Allensworth and Bakersfield, CA, Charles of Paradise, CA, Samuel, of Allensworth, CA, Ralph, of Allensworth, CA, Isaac, of Stockton, CA, Jeryl, of Clovis, CA; six daughters, Jefferlene Pierro, of Allensworth and Stockton, CA, Pauline Pierro, of Carmichael, CA, Josephine Pierro, of Allensworth, CA, Bertha Pierro, of Allensworth, CA, Sheila Pierro, of Stockton, CA, Gloria Dyer, of Citrus Heights, CA; one son-in-law, six daughters-in-law, thirty-one grandchildren, four greatgrandchildren and a multitude of other relatives, saints and friends.

> Question and Answer Column Ъy Ostis B. Wilson

Question: This is a continuation from last month on the subject of poor in spirit or humility being the way into the Kingdom of God.

Answer: In I Peter 5:5-7 Peter said this, "Likewise, ye younger, submit yourselves unto the elder. Yea, all of you be subject one to another, and be clothed with humility: for God resisteth the proud, and giveth grace to the humble. Humble yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God, that he may exalt you in due time: Casting all your care upon him; for he careth for you." Again in Philippians 2:5 we read, "Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus:" The following verses tell of His condescension and humility in emptying Himself of the position, glory and honor He had with the Father in heaven, and condescending to come down to this world of human beings and taking our likeness upon Him and becoming obedient to His Father's will, even to death. Folks, this is great condescension, beyond our comprehension to fathom. But we read in verses 9-11 how God highly exalted Him and gave Him a name which is above every name.

Now to sum up a little to this point: In I Peter 5:5-7, Peter is giving instructions to ministers, pastors, overseers, elders-young and old-and exhorting them to be humble, submissive and subject one to another. Ah, brethren, we are to set the pace and furnish an example to the saints of what we teach them. If we teach them humility, be humble ourselves. Let us teach them by example as well as by precept and instruct them to behave themselves among themselves and get along among themselves just like they see us behaving and getting along among ourselves. The Church of God cannot operate smoothly and function properly outside of this perimeter.

There is a certain prescribed kind of humility saints are to have. A genuine lowliness of mind and humility of heart is to characterize the life and behavior of the saints—not a voluntary or "put on" humility which is very distasteful to a genuinely humble person. It is Christ's humility we are to be clothed with. "Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus:" Philippians 2:5, which is a lowly mind. (verses 6-8). In Romans 13:14 we are instructed to put on Christ. That is, be clothed with His divine virtue of humility, from which all other graces flow.

But let us make no mistake about it: we are to walk in Christ after the same manner in which we received Him. (Colossians 2:6). The Kingdom of God belongs to humble and lowly people. If, in order to enter the kingdom of heaven, we must become poor and stripped of our resources and drop all our claims to any mercies or favors from God and just recognize ourselves undone and "Nothing in my hand I bring; Simply to thy cross I cling," we must surely maintain our citizenship in the Kingdom of God by the same means. So it can still be said, "Blessed are the poor in spirit: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven," whether we are just entering in or remaining in. We remain in the Kingdom of God by the same means by which we enter the Kingdom of God.

Since it is Christ's humility we are to be clothed with, it must manifest itself in the same way in us that it did with Him. In His humility He made Himself of no reputation. (Philippians 2:7). Another translation says, "He emptied Himself." Then it must work the same way in us. We must empty ourselves of all self-interest, self-promotion, self-advancement, all self-seeking, (I Corinthians 10:24; Philippians 2:4), selfplanning, etc. As we empty out of self, we will be more filled with God. In John 3:30, John the Baptist said, "He must increase, but I must decrease." Oh, what a great truth this is. Christ cannot increase in us until we decrease in our own self life. Christ can only expand in us to the extent we make room for Him. There is an old hymn which I have seen but never heard. It contains four verses, and those four verses tell the whole story step by step. The first verse says, All of self and none of God. The second verse says, Some of self and some of God. The third verse says, Less of self and more of God. The fourth verse says, None of self and all of God. Ah, folks, there you have it; an emptying out of self and a filling up with God: we decrease and God increases in our lives.

Jesus humbled Himself and became obedient. (Philippians 2:8). Genuine humility involves obedience. God's Word establishes a clear chain

of obedience. This begins in the home. Wives are to be obedient unto their own husbands (Ephesians 5:22; Colossians 3:18; Titus 2:5; I Peter 3:1, etc.). Children are to be obedient to their parents. (Ephesians 6:1; Colossians 3:20). Parents should also teach their children a broader scope of obedience beyond the home; their teachers in school and anyone else who has authority over children and the management of children by reason of the position he holds or the office he occupies which has to do with children. Everybody-husbands, wives, parents, children, teachers, etc.—is instructed to obey the laws and ordinances of men and be law-abiding citizens. In the spiritual realm, saints are instructed to obey their pastors who are in charge and exercise oversight and watch for their souls and spiritual welfare. (Hebrews 13:7, 17). It also teaches ministers of the gospel, including pastors, overseers, elders and of any and all classifications and callings, to be subject one to another. (I Peter 5:5).

Right along with this instruction, Peter admonished all of them to be clothed with humility (I Peter 5:5) and to humble themselves under the mighty hand of God. (vs. 6). God's plan and arrangement for the Church to operate by cannot possibly function smoothly and effectively without humility on the part of everyone connected with it. God knew all of this, so He set it up to function and be well-lubricated with humility and all of its outflowing graces and virtues. He certainly will not long allow anyone who gets lifted up with pride and personal ambition to be detained in the Kingdom of God. So again, the final conclusion is, "Blessed are the poor in spirit [humble]: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven." Matthew 5:3.

In John 16:27, Jesus speaks to His disciples, "For the Father himself loveth you, because ye

have loved me, and have believed that I came out from God." This verse shows real, complete and fulfilled love, because the redeemed love God in return. Fulfilled love is not one-sided love, but a mutual blending of hearts.

When God's love had been so carelessly cast aside in the Garden of Eden from listening and obeying the tempter, God's great heart was willing to go to the full extent of His love, in order to have His love returned. He was willing to give His only Son.

God's love was further manifested, when He had to wait for the proper and exact time to send His Son down here. "But when the fulness of the time was come, God sent forth his Son, made of a woman, made under the law." Galatians 4:4. I'm sure God's loving heart must have yearned within Himself when He had to wait for "the fulness of the time," but this was a master plan and would require exact timing.

Let's read again Jesus' Word with our heart wide open to His love. "For the Father himself loveth you, because ye have loved me, and have believed that I came out from God." John 16:27. Is this love enacted in your heart? It is the greatest love ever known.

When we have God's love in our heart, it is going to reach out to others. "Finally, be ye all of one mind, having compassion one of another, love as brethren, be pitiful, be courteous:" I Peter 3:8.
