Our Space

(The following article is adapted from a message preached at the 1986 Oregon Camp Meeting, and is continued from last month's issue.)

Look in the third chapter of Revelation, 20th verse. Again, it's an old familiar text, and yet it rings so true. Listen to what He says, "Behold, I stand at the door, and knock: if any man hear my voice, and open the door, I will come in to him, and will sup with him, and he with me." Notice how he started. He didn't start out saying, "Oh, I have a wonderful, wonderful banquet prepared. I have a wonderful provision made. All I am waiting for is an opportunity and I'll be more than glad to share it with you." The very first thing He said was, "I have come to the edge of your perimeter, and I knock. I pay you the respect of the dignity of your consent. I am here asking to be allowed entrance, but you have the right to refuse or to accept according to your own desire. This is given to you and I will not violate that. You look at the wares that I have if you would like. You see what I come offering you, willing to present to you, willing to bring in and sit down and share with you. I will give you of the fullness that is mine and I will receive what you can bring to the table and we both will sup together and I will be able to help you out with your problems; you will be able to partake of the bounty that I have to give. But unless you open the door, the provision will go on by."

Do you remember the story of the young man who came to the Lord in good spirits? He felt he had everything going his way. He asked the Lord, "Now what can I do to have eternal life?" The Lord started naming it off: "You keep the law." "All this I have done from my youth up." He was feeling better all the time. But the time came when the Lord looked right to the bottom; He saw exactly

what the trouble was. He said, "This is what is hindering you from having entrance, or from coming into my presence where we can partake of the same provision together. You take care of this situation, and everything will be all right." The young man turned and walked away. "Give up my riches in exchange for this?" He was still in possession of his space and he was not willing to open the door for someone to come in and share. Oh, dear ones, I think about the Saviour as He stood there.

where the trouble is. There could be something wrong in the manner in which you are governing the space that you occupy. You are dissatisfied with it, not pleased with its results. It doesn't bring to you the peace and satisfaction that you expected it to bring. You may say, "There is nothing wrong with me, somebody else is causing this to happen." Nine times out of ten it will work this way. "If so and so would just let me alone, I could be at peace." If you find that peace, that satisfaction,

It said He loved that young man, but He stood there in faithfulness to his perimeter and watched him walk away unsaved. That takes something, doesn't it? The Lord is not going to impose on your or my perimeter any more than He did on his. If we are not willing to yield the space that is ascribed to us to Him, we can just go on and conduct it as we see fit. To me this is solemn thinking.

I would like for us to turn to the book of James. This apostle wrote some things that to me are real profound. He writes some things that cause me to conclude his depth of thinking was so far beyond mine that I'm just not able to comprehend it. Listen to what he said in the 4th chapter. "From whence come wars and fightings among you?" Let's rephrase that a little bit to where it makes better sense to us in our relationships with each other. "From whence come conflicts and disputings among you?" Now if you are occupying your space and you are staying in the bounds that are ascribed to you, and I am occupying my space and staying within the bounds that are ascribed to me, the law of space says there won't be any conflict. When you see trouble arising, and confusion and disturbance beginning to show up, somebody is getting out of his space. Somebody is trying to occupy space that is not under his jurisdiction and perhaps someone else is responding in kind with an opposition that goes along with that in the physical world, and it can produce havoc. Space is a valuable thing; space is a critical thing. Space falls into our hands and we become responsible for the space that is given to us. "From whence come wars and fightings among you? Come they not hence, even of your lusts that war in your members?" The reason you may not get along with somebody else is a pretty good indication that you are not getting along inside yourself. There is that provision that the Lord was willing to bring in when you opened the door, others can do what they want to, and you will still be at peace in your space. I know this is right.

"From whence come wars, from whence come fightings and disturbances and conflicts and contentions among you? Come they not hence, even of your lusts that war in your members?" What is the first thing that the Lord starts out to do when He takes up His abode in our hearts? It is to get rid of the source of those lusts, desires, cravings and those attitudes and opinions that cause men to be carnal. He came to remove that. When our space is occupied under the influence of His guidance, it doesn't have things that hurt, destroy, wound and tear. All of that is taken out and that space is made pure. He said, "Ye lust, and have not: ye kill." When you get to the place where you are willing to see folks destroyed, that is a horrible thing.

"Ye lust and have not: ye kill, and desire to have, and cannot obtain: ye fight and war. Ye have not, because ye ask not. Ye ask, and receive not, because ye ask amiss." When you look at the situation and decide that there is nothing wrong with you, and it's other people that need to be changed, you will direct the thrust of your prayer in that direction. "Lord, you change this one, and you help that one, and you get this one out of my way," and all of that. He said you ask amiss. You don't receive because you ask amiss. You want to know the peace, joy, and satisfaction that goes along with a well-managed and well-regulated space that is ascribed to you? You find the peace that He can bring to that space and all the rest of this will take care of itself.

Why do men like to dominate space that belongs to somebody else? It's pride. It's a struggle

for power. I remember when I was a lad, a good many years ago, along about Christmas time one year, I got what I had been wanting since the time I was just a little fellow. My folks always purchased for me bib overalls with the suspenders that come up over your shoulder, and I hated them. I vowed to myself, "If I ever get to be a man, I'll never buy another pair of bib overalls." I have bought one pair since then. Christmas time came along and they wanted to be good to me. They made a concession, and bought me a pair of waist overalls. They called them bell-bottoms then. From about the knee down they flared out like a bell. And on the side there was a little triangle about five or six inches up and four or five inches wide at the bottom, that they had sewed a bright red strip of cloth on. You wouldn't believe how much faster I could run with that red flashing on the side. This made me stand out in the crowd, see, and when I could stand out in the crowd, and they would say, "We want to play tag," I could say, "No, let's play something else," and they would listen to me. It was influence over other people. It won't take long and other people will look at that influence and they will begin to know the influence of envy. You see what we have working now? I'm not willing to take my place in the crowd; I want to stand out in the crowd. "From whence come wars, strugglings, conflicts among you?" Oh, dear ones, Jesus told His disciples way back there before the Holy Ghost ever came. "This shall not be so among you." You be willing, in the humbleness of your heart, in the dedication of your space to Him, to be willing to go on the level of your brethren and to become just a face in the crowd. Our attitude to God should be. "If you just let me be in the midst and be saved, that is all I need. That is all I ask." When we begin to function with the thought in mind, "I'm going to

space, demanding that I do this, or that, or the other thing? No, it comes more like a suggestion. It comes more as an appeal, just like the knock at the door when the Lord wanted in in the first place. "Do you hear the appeal that I make to you? And if you do, are you willing to yield to its influence? And if you will, this problem will be solved and you can overcome and your space will be clean of all of that, and my blessings again will fill you through and through." You can just as easily push that influence away. "No, I'm right in what I have done, and I will not yield an inch. I'll stand right here. Somebody's gonna have to push me around to get me to move." Here is the conflict.

Notice this: "Wherefore he saith, God resisteth the proud." The man who desires to be in control over somebody else; the man who wants to be heard in every dispute that arises; in every discussion that is given; the man who wants to be there and be seen in every situation; the one that is trying to maneuver others into his pattern of thinking, God resisteth. But He giveth grace to the humble. Are we always careful to see to it that we give as much consideration to our fellow and the administration of his space as we want him to give to us and the administration of our space? You know what we are talking about here? Do unto others as though you were the others. That's The Golden Rule. "Submit yourselves therefore to God." Submit yourselves to imposing influences around you? No. You sit down and sup with your Saviour which you invited into your perimeter. You partake of what He brought into you, that He bequeathed to you, that He gave you the right to go and partake of, and you let those around you do what they want to. But the peace that you can know with Him will so neutralize that influence out there until it will have no effect on you and

outdo somebody else. I'll preach longer and louder than he did," we have already started in the wrong direction, haven't we?

Do you think the scripture saith in vain, "The spirit that dwelleth in us lusteth to envy? But he giveth more grace." If I find in my heart that I am looking at somebody and I feel a little envy in my heart, there is grace to take care of that. There is an answer. There is a solution. Does it come encroaching on me and crowding itself into my your experience. We can go on and live saved right in the midst of strong persecution, if we will get ahold of this truth.

Did you ever read Foxe's Book of Martyrs? They didn't exactly go to heaven on a bed of roses. You think what it would be like to be there in the midst of the crowd like Stephen was. He had done everything he knew to invite these that he loved and cared for to come and partake of the peace

We should all say to ourselves, "I am only one, but by God's grace I am someone and will fulfill my place by the side of God in His vineyard."

"But Christ liveth in me." This is self-replacement, which is the secret of a productive life. One musician told how that when he first began to play, his chief thought was "I." Later on, he came to include Mozart with himself, "I and Mozart." Still later, it came to be "Mozart and I.' But in the fulness of his powers, his one thought was "Mozart."

To learn how to re-live the life of Christ, not in location or time period, but in spirit, is the way God intends us to face life. "As ye have therefore received Christ Jesus the Lord, so walk ye in him." Col. 2:6.

And every man, with whom was found blue. and purple, and scarlet, and fine linen, and goats' hair, and red skins of rams, and badgers' skins, brought them. Every one that did offer an offering of silver and brass brought the Lord's offering: and every man with whom was found shittim wood for any work of the service, brought it. And all the women that were wise hearted did spin with their hands, and brought that which they had spun, both of blue, and of purple, and of scarlet, and of fine linen." Ex. 35:4, 10, 21-25.

The Lord's offering of a willing heart was diversified. Some gave money, others their services, others gave things that were necessary for the tabernacle. This was an on-going effort of the people of God working together for a common cause in providing for the tabernacle. We want every one to have liberty in giving whatever you want to contribute for the "tabernacle."

Question: When or how did the Devil come into existence? Did he always exist as does God, or did God create him? Also, will you please explain Isaiah 45:5-7?

Answer: This question of the Devil's origin often comes up and seems to never be resolved conclusively in people's minds. This is possibly due to the fact that there is no direct Scripture stating when and how he came into existence; also the widespread teaching in Christendom today that he was once a bright angel in heaven whose

name was Lucifer and he became exalted and lifted up with pride and through jealousy and envy started a rebellion in heaven in which he was the loser and was cast out of heaven and came down to earth. All of this doctrine is based on a misunderstanding and wrong conception of certain Scriptures. If the questioner in this case will purchase the booklet Was the Devil Ever in Heaven? from Faith Publishing House, P. O. Box 518, Guthrie, OK 73044, it gives a concise treatise on all those Scriptures.

I, personally, cannot conceive of a holy God creating an unholy Devil. That runs averse and contrary to the principles of truth set forth in the Holy Scriptures. Also, the idea of jealousy and pride ever getting into heaven and producing a rebellion and war up there is entirely foreign, to my thinking. If it were so, how could we have any assurance and find comfort in our hope in Christ of eternal peace, happiness, joy, and security, which are the things that prove an anchor to our souls in our times of temptation, trials, and sufferings in this world? If such a thing ever at any time got into heaven, could we have any definite assurance that it could not happen again?

As to the idea of God creating the Devil, I will refer the reader to a few Scriptures which in my mind presents an impossibility of this ever having happened. Jesus said in His sermon on the mount. in Matthew 7:16-18, "Ye shall know them by their fruits. Do men gather grapes of thorns, or figs of thistles? Even so every good tree bringeth forth good fruit; but a corrupt tree bringeth forth evil fruit. A good tree cannot bring forth evil fruit, neither can a corrupt tree bring forth good fruit." In James 3:11-12 we read. "Doth a fountain send forth at the same place sweet water and bitter? Can the fig tree, my brethren, bear olive berries? either a vine, figs? so can no fountain both yield salt water and fresh." Again we read in Job 14:4, "Who can bring a clean thing out of an unclean? no one." All the foregoing Scriptures are saying the same thing; viz., that an infinitely holy God could not possibly have created an infinitely unholy Devil, and all Scriptures bearing on this subject confirm this. Again in Genesis 1:31 we read, "And God saw every thing that he had made, and, behold, it was very good."

Could it be then that God created the Devil a holy and righteous being and he fell from that into a degenerate, corrupt and vile being afterward? For the following reasons, I hardly think so. Jesus said to certain of the Jews of His day who were disputing with Him (John 8:44), "Ye are of your father the devil, and the lusts of your father ye will do. He was a murderer from the beginning, and abode not in the truth, because there is no truth

in him. When he speaketh a lie, he speaketh of his own: for he is a liar, and the father of it." In I John 3:8 we read. "He that committeth sin is of the devil: for the devil sinneth from the beginning. . . . " We see, then, that he was a murderer, a liar, and a sinner from the beginning. He started out that way and has never changed. In regard to the beginning we read in Genesis 1:1, "In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth." That is as far back as we can go with any degree of certainty. Every thing before that is purely speculation. I would advise you not to try to delve into that. Now if that is the Devil's beginning or if he existed back before that point in time is really not important. This is the first time he appears on the scene of action. He used the serpent to seduce Eve and through her, subsequently, to seduce Adam, and from there started the corrupt stream of sin in all its categories; all the misery, ruined lives, all sickness, grief, sorrow, and trouble that the world knows or ever has known. So he was an evil being, a murderer, liar, and sinner, at the time of beginning that we know anything about.

Now in concluding this part of the discussion, I would admonish every reader that you not waste time trying to figure out where the Devil came from nor how he got here, but rather recognize that he is here now in very real form and just settle it in your hearts to steadfastly resist him in the faith and "Give no place to the Devil" lest he gain some advantage of you and seduce you, too.

Now a few thoughts and Scriptures on Isaiah 45:7, "... I make peace, and create evil: I the Lord do all these things. Evil has a meaning of moral evil (sin). But we could never think of a holy God ever producing or creating that. He gave His only Begotten Son, Jesus, to save us from that, so we could never rationally, reasonably think of Him creating that. But there is another meaning to evil such as famine, pestilence, war, and various kinds of calamities which God at various times has used to bring judgment upon people (even His own) because of their sins and injustices, etc., to punish them and bring them back in line with Him. In II Chronicles 20:9 Jehoshaphat prayed, "If, when evil cometh upon us, as the sword, judgment, or pestilence, or famine, we stand before this house, and in thy presence, (for thy name is in this house,) and cry unto thee in our affliction, then thou wilt hear and help." In I Kings 8:33-34 Solomon prayed at the dedication of the temple, "When thy people Israel be smitten down before the enemy, because they have sinned against thee, and shall turn again to thee, and confess thy name, and pray, and make supplication unto thee in this house: Then hear thou in heaven, and forgive the sin of thy people Israel, and bring them

again unto the land which thou gavest unto their fathers." This is one of the things for which Jehoshaphat prayed for and classified as evil. God decreed the overthrow of Nineveh for their wickedness and sent Jonah to pronounce judgment on them. He did not want to go on that mission so went the other way. After Jonah had spent three days and nights in the belly of a great fish which God had prepared for that purpose, he decided to go, and he did go to Nineveh and began to announce in their streets the message, "Yet forty days, and Nineveh shall be overthrown." The result was astounding! All the Ninevites, from the king on down, turned from their evil ways and repented and called mightily on God, and God saw and heard their repentance and turned from His purpose and spared them. Jonah 3:10 says, "... And God repented of the evil, that he had said that he would do unto them; and he did it not." The evil in this case was the destruction of the city of Nineveh by whatever means God chose.

Job referred to all his trouble and grief—the loss of all his animals, children, and his physical affliction, etc., as *evil*. In Job 2:10 he said to his wife, "What? shall we receive good at the hand of God, and shall we not receive *evil*?"

There are numbers of other Scriptures on this line, but I will go no further with it now. These are the kinds of *evil* God creates and uses for His purpose in chastising nations, cities, individuals, etc., for their sins, and to correct those wandering off-course from the straight and narrow way. But never moral evil. God forbid.

that he knew in his heart, and watched them reject it and rise up in violent rebellion and gather up the stones and begin to hurl them at him. He looked at them and saw the hatred in their eyes, the vengeance in their expressions, and at the same time was able to say, "Lord, forgive them, they don't know what they are doing." That is peace in that jurisdiction, isn't it? May we have that same kind of peace. "Submit yourselves therefore to God." There is where you will find that peace. "Resist the devil, and he will flee from you. Draw nigh to God, and he will draw nigh to you. Cleanse your hands, ye sinners; and purify your hearts ye doubleminded. Be afflicted, and mourn, and weep: let your laughter be turned to mourning, and your joy to heaviness. Humble yourselves in the sight of the Lord, and he shall lift you up." Isn't that a wonderful formula? The best part of it is that it works. It is not just a theory, it will work.

Every individual of normal intelligence who comes to the age of accountability, has bestowed upon him the responsibility of his own space to do with as he sees fit. None of the rest of God's creation seems to be like that. All of the rest of His creation is functioning under some kind of regulation laid down for them. But for you and I, individuals of intelligence, who can comprehend and understand, and know the difference between right and wrong, there is given to us an option. You can select whatever you want, and you can allow whatever you want within the bounds of your perimeter, but listen to this. This is the tenth verse of the fifth chapter of II Corinthians: "For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that every one may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad." You remember the text we read in the beginning? He said the thing is in your lap, but understand that the final disposing of it is going to be of the Lord. He is going to step in. The time will come when He will call everyone of us into judgment to stand accountable for what we did with the space that was ours, and that determines the destiny of our eternity. This is important, isn't it? "For we must all appear before the judgement seat of Christ; that everyone may receive the things done in his body according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad." You are going to meet the One who gave you the right to handle your space and give an account. That space belonged to Him to start with. He gave it to you and I, and what did He say, "Occupy till I come." Then He gave us a right to do with it what we want. Oh, I'm glad for the day when I found it in my heart to say, "Lord, I'll open this door just as wide as I can get it and invite you into my bosom to sup with me, that I might sup with you, and in partaking of that heavenly nutrient, you will bestow on me the knowledge and the understanding to know how to direct my space that I might get along with my fellows here in this world and meet you in peace at the end of the way."

Offering our Firstfruits to God

This article is written with a prayer that every Christian may desire to give himself wholly to God. We can scarcely comprehend the importance of presenting our "bodies a living sacrifice." The impact of our doing so, or our failure to do so, will be felt by our families, the church, and the world. Its effect will reach into eternity.

"And when the day of Pentecost was fully come, . . . " Acts 2:1. What was the day of Pentecost? By definition it means, "the fiftieth day." Historically, it was the fiftieth day after the second day of the Jewish Passover. Biblically, it was a day coming after the Passover. "Observe the month Abib, and keep the passover," Deut. 16:1. Then, in verse nine, "Seven weeks shalt thou number unto thee: begin to number the seven weeks from such time as thou beginnest to put the sickle to the corn." It was also concerned with new harvest of grain. "When ye be come into the land . . . and shall reap the harvest . . . ye shall bring a sheaf of the firstfruits of your harvest unto the priest: And he shall wave the sheaf before the Lord, . . . And ye shall count unto you . . . from the day ye brought the sheaf of the wave offering; seven sabbaths. . . . Even unto the morrow after the seventh sabbath shall ye number fifty days; and ye shall offer a new meat offering unto the Lord . . . they are the firstfruits unto the Lord." (Lev. 23:10-17). It was called "the day of firstfruits, when ye bring a new meat offering unto the Lord, after your weeks be out." (Num. 28:26).

The day of Pentecost was a day when the Jew would come with a grateful heart, bringing the first

of his fruit unto God. "Thou shalt take of the first of all the fruit of the earth, . . . and go unto the priest.... And thou shalt speak before the Lord thy God, A Syrian ready to perish was my father, and he went down into Egypt, . . . And the Egyptians evil entreated us, . . . and we cried unto the Lord ... And the Lord heard our voice ... and brought us forth out of Egypt . . . And now, behold, I have brought the firstfruits of the land, which thou, O Lord, hast given me." (Deut. 26:2-11). Pentecost was for God's people. It was a day to remember deliverance from Egypt's bondage, a day of rejoicing in the goodness of God's provision. "And thou shalt rejoice in every good thing which the Lord thy God hath given thee." It was a day of warm appreciation, and offering to God the first of the new fruits. God has always been pleased when we offer to Him our first things. (Gen. 4:4).

The day of Pentecost was a day of offering a new meat offering of the firstfruits unto God. What does this Old Testament type mean to the Christian? "As for the oblation of the firstfruits, ye shall offer them unto the Lord: . . . And every oblation of thy meat offering shalt thou season with salt; neither shalt thou suffer the salt of the covenant of thy God to be lacking from thy meat offering: with all thy offerings thou shalt offer salt." Lev. 2:12-13. "For every one shall be salted with salt." Mark 9:49. I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." Rom. 12:1. Oh, dear follower of Christ, do you begin to grasp the meaning of Pentecost? "I indeed baptize you with water unto repentance: but he that cometh after me is mightier than I, whose shoes I am not worthy to bear: he shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost, and with fire:" Matt. 3:11. The new meat offering of firstfruits was to be salted with salt. Jesus said that every sacrifice would be salted with salt. Paul besought fellow Christians to present their bodies a living sacrifice. John the Baptist said that Jesus would baptize us with the Holy Ghost, and with fire. Child of God, you who are redeemed through Jesus' blood, do you realize that "ye are not your own," by that "your body" and "your spirit" are God's? (I Cor. 6:19-20). Have you had your day of firstfruits? Have you offered yourself up entirely to vour God?

Pentecost, the offering up of our life in sacrifice to God, is for the Christian. A sinner cannot offer himself in sacrifice to God. "But whatsoever hath a blemish, that shall ye not offer: for it shall not be acceptable for you. Blind, or broken, or maimed, or having a wen, or scurvy, or scabbed, ye shall not offer these unto the Lord." (Lev. 22:20, 22). As a sinner we had no "fruit" to offer God. "What fruit

had ye then in those things whereof ye are now ashamed?" (Rom. 6:21). The sacrifice that God will receive from a sinner is "a broken and a contrite heart." (Ps. 51:17). The prayer of the penitent is joyous to God. "There is joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner that repenteth." (Luke 15:10). Dear sinner, God will hear your prayer of repentance. But of the Christian, those already washed from their sins (Rev. 1:5), God longs to hear the prayer of consecration.

There is a rest, a peace, a joy that God gives to us when we come to Him in repentance for our sins. "Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." And yet, Jesus bids us come still further, "Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls." Matt. 11:28-29. Jesus releases us from the yoke of sin and gives us rest. Now He holds out before us another yoke. This: "My yoke is easy, and my burden is light." (v. 30). Will we not accept this yoke? What is a yoke? It is "a bar or frame of wood by which two draft animals are joined at the heads or necks for working together." How clear the Scriptures are! We were yoked with Satan; we wrought with him, perhaps for many years. At times the yoke was so hard. We would not want to speak of the terrible things we did while yoked with Satan. But Jesus has set us free! Praise the Lord! Now another yoke appears. Jesus is in one side. Will we fully yield our life to Him and become a worker together with God? (II Cor. 6:1). As the "older work-horse," He knows the way of service. We have much to learn. He will gladly teach us. "The Holy Ghost . . . he shall teach you all things." (John 14:25). But we can not receive the baptism of the Holy Ghost until we offer ourselves a sacrifice, give our all to Him, and welcome His yoke, His full control in our lives.

One may well say, "I gave my life to Christ when He saved me from my sins." There is indeed

a yielding of our life to Christ when we come in repentance. That yielding involves an abhorrence of sin, turning from sinful living, and yielding to a life of righteousness. Herein is a wonderful change. Sinful things pass away and a new life of right living begins in us. (II Cor. 5:17; Rom. 6:4). Abiding thus in Christ, He commences to teach us the things of God. We grow in grace. If we prosper in Christ as we should, we will be yielding ourself to Him more and more. This is good, to the extent we follow Christ, and yet, can we not see that the lives of the apostles, the life that characterized the early Church, was more than this? They were not just good men who had turned from sin and were living upright lives. They were this, but they were more.

"For their sakes I sanctify myself, that they also might be truly sanctified." (John 17:19). To sanctify means to consecrate. Jesus consecrated His life to the will of God to the fullest measure, and He called for His disciples to do the same. The consecration that Jesus is asking of us is not a turning from sin. This we have already done. It is an offering up of our entire life in living sacrifice to God. We may need to leave our comfortable home, close friends, good position, and things dear to our heart. We may need to forsake the pleasant life that we had planned for ourself, to take on Christ's yoke of service. A peaceful country life may have been our dream; a busy life of toil may be Christ's yoke, but it will be "easy" and full of "rest."

Perhaps the strongest appeal to this consecration lies in our profession of being "a Christian," a follower of Christ. He was our example. We profess to follow Him. Jesus was baptized; we are baptized. Jesus washed feet; we wash feet. Jesus prayed; we pray. Jesus left heaven's riches and became poor, a servant, that we through His poverty might be rich, and we. . . what will we do?
