A Mystery of God's

Resurrection! The word flies in the face of all our eyes as experience only tells us about death. As driven cattle balk before cattle rail crossings, so our minds stall before the Word, even before the *Hope* of a resurrection.

We see before us the still body of a departed loved one. No longer will we see the shine of their eyes, the smile of their lips, nor hear their voice, and we are asked to believe they will live again.

Resurrection is at once accepted or rejected as a total impossibility. A person's belief in God does not automatically bring a sound faith in the resurrection. The Sadducees believed in the one God. They wanted to claim Abraham for their father too, but declared the resurrection of the body and soul null and void. They were pragmatic realists concerned with the here and now—what they saw they believed.

One of the mysteries of God is that Christ was received up into glory, not before death as one prophet experienced, but after death, an ignoble death at that. His steps were death, resurrection, glory. (I Tim. 3:16.)

Paul was once in a tight place, battling, one might say, for his very life. Cleverly, he pitted the Pharisee's belief in the resurrection of the dead against the Sadducees non-belief. (Acts 23:6.) Because of Paul's belief in the resurrection, the Pharisees backed away from pressing further charges. "We don't want to fight against God," they said.

I have always accepted the theory of resurrection, but it was brought to me more vividly through the eyes of my five year old grandson, Sheldon, a number of years ago. We discussed visiting my friend, Janyce. "Who is her father?" he asked. I replied, "He was Amos Porter, he's dead now." Immediately he latched on to the finality of what I said. "What happened to him? Did God lose His power to keep him alive?" Realizing Sheldon had little, if any, experience with death, I breathed a prayer, "Lord, what do I tell him?" I literally opened my mouth and God filled it. "No, He didn't lose His power," I replied, "but God used His power to give him eternal life." With that, Sheldon was totally satisfied. And I was too. May you too be comforted and satisfied knowing that God uses His power to give us eternal life.

Has there ever been a great king in history, who has taken the blame for wrong doing, and been willing to accept the consequences of punishment and the sentence against wrong?

Most kings think it below themselves to accept any judgment against themselves; after all, the king is the one in position of power and judgment. The King I am acquainted with has received a position of great power because, though "...being in the form of God, thought it not robbery to be equal with God: But... took upon him the form of a servant,... And being found in fashion as a man, he humbled himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross." Philippians 2:6-8.

What importance is there that a god should die for its creation? Man had trespassed the divine law of the Most High God, the only true God, the inhabiter of eternity. The trespass price was death. Adam plunged the human race into the circuit of sin; his offspring were born in his likeness, which was sinful. Mankind has begun life every time in sin. "Behold, I was shapen in iniquity; and in sin did my mother conceive me." Psalm 51:5. There are no exceptions. Our merciful Creator did not leave us without hope. As our forefathers were being punished for their wrongdoing they were also given the light of hope; a redeemer would be born of a woman who would save His people from their sins. (Matthew 1:21.) Our redeemer, Jesus, who did no sin, neither was guile found in his mouth (1Peter 2:22), was holy and pleasing to God in every capacity.

"Though he were a Son, yet learned he obedience by the things which he suffered;"

Hebrews 5:8. What were the sufferings of Christ? He bore the sins of the whole world. It pleased God to let His Son bear this disgrace and shame that we might be set free from corruption and sin. Jesus was tempted with the greatest temptations contrivable. Though He was God, He was God in the flesh. The flesh has feelings and Jesus was tried through the appetites that are common to all the human race—feelings.

I know you have felt the guilt of sin; how heavy it feels and how impossible it is to get away from when you are carrying it. Jesus never sinned but He had to carry the guilt of sin. Jesus came down to the level we were at. He humbled Himself to the lowness of a corruptible human body, so He could take on our sin. (He was acquainted with grief.) Christ was extremely aware and conscious of the sin He bore. This sin was as real to Him as it was to us before we were saved from sin, and it was as real to Jesus as it is to the sinner now who is still carrying his own sins. He bore sin in His body so He could experience what we experience. You've heard the expression, "Don't judge a man until you have walked a mile in his shoes." "And when he putteth forth his own sheep, he goeth before them, and the sheep follow him: for they know his voice." John 10:4. Jesus does not require more from us than He has experienced Himself. Jesus resisted unto blood. Jesus' experience gave Him the authority to be a faithful high priest. "Wherefore in all things it behoved him to be made like unto his brethren, that he might be a merciful and faithful high priest in things pertaining to God, to make reconciliation for the sins of the people." Hebrews 2:17.

To experience the life of a human, He had to come in under the law already given by God to Moses and be in subjection to the sin trespass which was death. Christ made it all the way in the human capacity, from birth to death. He experienced all we will ever experience. Jesus knows how heavy sin feels. Jesus knows about rejection. Jesus knows about great temptations and He knows what it is like to die bearing sin. He was not let off easy on any line. He left no feelings unattended. He was faithful to bear our transgressions to death.

The curse of death could not hold the righteous man Jesus. He was not confined to the grave as all other human subjects have been. Jesus was made a curse for us but Himself was not cursed because He had not trespassed the laws of God. He arose.

He has received a name above names, an exaltation above exaltations. "Wherefore God also hath highly exalted him, and given him a name which is above every name." Philipians 2:9. Jesus is the only God among all the gods that lowered Himself to man's level, died as all men must die, then returned, by resurrection from the dead, to confirm the promise of His salvation. All other false prophets, false priests and false kings return to dust, never to live again. Only in Christ is there hope of eternal life after death. Why would anyone want to serve a false god or the devil himself? None has the power to raise you above the death the Father has decreed will happen. Only in Christ is there hope of a resurrection of everlasting life. All other gods give everlasting death. If the price of death was the end of the curse placed upon sin, there would be an end. However, after death and the judgment is a banishment from all that is good. There is an everlasting lake of fire where the fire is not cooled and the soul dies not. Those who die without Christ will abide in this place of everlasting torments. Since Christ and His Father have gone so far out of the way to make sure we can escape this place of doom, don't be found there.

Depression Was Not His Choice

One of my favorite Old Testament characters is David. The Lord greatly loved David who was a man after his own heart. (I Sam. 13:14 & Acts 13:22) There were many reasons why the Lord favored David. One very encouraging story about David is found in I Samuel, chapters 28 and 29. Let us fill in a little background detail before relating this inspiring story.

The old prophet, Samuel, had gone to David's home in Bethlehem where he had reviewed seven of Jesse's sons before asking that David be brought in from the fields. The Lord chose David, and Samuel anointed him before his family and proclaimed him to be the next king. We have no record that David received any special family favor at this time, he just went back to the sheep, but the spirit of the Lord came upon him. (I Sam. 16:13.)

Later he was called to the palace to play music for King Saul who was troubled in spirit. The king was pleased with David's music and so their first meeting was pleasant. In fact, chapter 16, verse 21 states that King Saul "...loved him

greatly; and he became his (Saul's) armourbearer."

When Israel went to war with the Philistines, David was called home by Jesse, his father, who later sent this son to check on the welfare of the three older brothers in King Saul's army. David was around 20 years old when he set out for the Valley Elah, some 16 miles southwest of Bethlehem. No doubt he did not realize at the time that he would never again return home as a shepherd boy.

While at the battle front, David heard the Philistine giant, Goliath of Gath, challenge the Israelites. David persuaded King Saul to let him face the giant with only five stones and a sling. God honored David's faith and courage and David slew the giant.

Victory songs proclaimed David a hero of the Israelite army. It was then that King Saul allowed envy and hatred to rule in his heart and he desired to slay David. Twice he tried to stab David with a javelin while David played the harp for him. Two of King Saul's children, Jonathan and Michal, David's wife, helped David temporarily escape from their father's evil wrath. David sought protection and comfort from the old prophet, Samuel, who lived in Ramah three miles from the palace. Even Samuel could not protect David, and again he had to flee.

Furthermore, anyone who assisted David in his flight from King Saul was in jeopardy. David was faint with hunger when he came to Nob where Ahimelech, the priest, gave David bread to eat and Goliath's sword to use. Soon David fled but later Ahimelech, 84 other priests, and the entire city of Nob died because of this one act of kindness to David.(I Sam. 22.)

Now David knew his parents were not safe living in Bethlehem and he went to the King of Moab for help. His great-grandmother, Ruth, had been a Moabite so David asked that the King of Moab protect his parents until his future was more certain. Here they lived for ten years while their son was a fugitive.

Samuel died, David's parents were in exile, and all his countrymen were afraid to befriend him. David surely was tested to the limit when he went to the King of Gath for friendship. This was one of the Philistines' central cities and home of Goliath's family. David was desperate. He pled for sanction and King Achish gave him nearby land for his family and men. David called this "city" Ziklag.



David was a man after God's own heart, already anointed to be the next king, yet he suffered rejection and persecution. What had David done to deserve this? He had even spared King Saul's life twice when he could have taken revenge on this enemy. His divine wisdom had prevented him from killing the Lord's anointed. Not only was David a mighty man of war but more importantly, he was strong of character and self-control. Circumstances were grim but David kept his integrity with God. Read Psalm 7 and notice how the first part of the psalm speaks of distress but the latter part praises the Lord. Should not such faithfulness be rewarded by God?

Then David suffered more tragedy. When the Philistine armies gathered to prepare themselves for war, David and his men joined them as a courtesy to the king of Gath. However, the Philistine princes did not want David to join their troops and they commanded him to return to Ziklag. David obeyed. When he reached Ziklag, he discovered the Amalekites had destroyed

Ziklag with fire and had taken every person with them. This was almost more than the men could bear and they lifted up their voices and wept over the loss of their families. David was particularly distressed, for the men spoke of stoning him—they were blaming him for the loss he could not have prevented.

What a difficult position to be in! David had no one to comfort him. No family member was there to weep with him. No old prophet was there to give counsel. He was in enemy territory, rejected by his own nation, and now angrily accused by his last handful of friends. David stood alone, despised and shamefully treated. He could have felt hatred, bitterness, self-pity, resentment, and a longing to die.

Then we read in I Samuel 30:6 that "...David encouraged himself in the Lord his God." He began to arise above the emotional valley of depression that circumstances had brought his way. Perhaps he remembered all the past times when God had spared his life and brought him through with victory. Mr. Wannamaker said that he soon was the best boy in his Sunday school. It was LOVE that won that boy's heart! -Selected


Come Alive
