## Praying Love

Have you ever seen the picture of the upright, clasped, praying hands? There is an inspiring story behind this masterpiece of art known around the world as the "Praying Hands." Please allow me to tell you how this masterpiece came to be.

During the 1490's, two young friends, who were very poor, lived together and worked to support themselves while they studied art. Advancement in the school of art was very slow because they spent most of their time working to keep food on the table, a roof over their heads and supplies for both of their art pursuits.

One day the two friends made an agreement together. They would draw lots and one of them would work to support both of them while the other would study art. Then when the accomplished artist became wealthy, he would relieve the other friend so that the working man could also study art.

The lots were drawn. Albrecht Durer won. He soon went off to the big cities of Europe to study art while Franz Knigstein labored to support them both. In time Albrecht became famous for his talented, creative work. His paint-

ings and sculptures found important places in many big art galleries in several countries.

Then Albrecht remembered the promise he had made to his friend who had faithfully sent him money during those years. So Albrecht went back to the



tiny apartment where his friend still lived and there he discovered the enormous price his friend had paid for his success. Franz's slender, sensitive fingers had become so stiff and twisted that he could no longer hold a small paint brush nor make the delicate brush strokes necessary to fine painting.

Franz Knigstein would never have inspiring paintings in art galleries but he was not embittered about this fact. Instead he rejoiced over his friend's success and wanted Albrecht to tell him all about his studies. This touched Albrecht's heart and he did all he could to lighten Franz's work load.

One day Albrecht found his friend quietly kneeling in prayer with his gnarled hands clasped upright before him. Quickly, Albrecht took a pencil and paper and sketched the hard-working hands of his praying friend. In time he developed this sketch into a truly great masterpiece known world-wide as the Praying Hands.

Today Praying Hands still remind people that there is strength and comfort in helping and praying for a friend.

Jesus taught us to do so. He prayed for us and this beautiful prayer is recorded in the seventeenth chapter of the book of John. He prayed, "Father, ...I pray not that thou shouldest take them out of the world, but that thou shouldest keep them from the evil. They are not of the world, even as I am not of the

world.... Neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on me through their word; That they all may be one; as thou, Father, art in me, and I in thee, that they also may be one in us: that the world may believe that thou hast sent me."

After Jesus had prayed for us, He entered the Garden of Gethsemane where in "...agony he prayed more earnestly: and his sweat was as it were great drops of blood falling down to the ground." Luke 22:44. He felt the weight of your sins and of mine and He knew the cross was before Him. He laid aside His will and freely gave Himself a supreme sacrifice that none of us should perish but that all of us might have eternal life. (John 3:16.)

This October Faith and Victory finds us thanking God for His blessings toward us as well as for this work. God has been sustaining and carrying the burden of these Gospel labors. We owe much to Him and the only way we know to repay these mercies is to continually involve ourselves in the mission He has upon this earth.

It is our desire that God's commission become clearer to every Christian as time continues. It is recorded in Proverbs 29:18, "Where there is no vision, the people perish: but he that keepeth the law, happy is he." Jesus expressed His vision when He said, "Say not ye, There are yet four months, and then cometh harvest? behold, I say unto you, Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest." John 4:35.

The need of man for salvation has existed since the days of Adam and Eve. My sister, Kathleen McMurrin, having done extensive research into the Pruitt ancestry, uncovered a story which revealed the need for the Gospel on the American frontier in 1772.

Our great, great, great, great-grandfather, William Pruitt, and his son, Martin, were part of a group of people on the Virginia frontier who wrote a letter to a preacher by the name of Charles Cummings. The letter is self-explanatory and is as follows:

"Worthy and dear Sir: We, being in very destitute circumstances for want of the ordinances of Christ's house stately administered amongst us; many of us under very distressing spiritual languishments; and multitudes perishing in our sins for want of the bread of life broken among us; our Sabbaths too much profaned, or at least wasted in melancholy silence at home, our hearts and hands discouraged, and our spirits broken with our mournful condition, so that human language cannot sufficiently paint.

"Having had the happiness, by the good providence of God, of enjoying part of your labors to our abundant satisfaction, and being universally well satisfied by our experience of your ministerial abilities, piety, literature, prudence and peculiar agreeableness of your qualifications to us in particular as a gospel minister - we do, worthy and dear sir, from our very hearts, and with most cordial affection and unanimity agree to call, invite and entreat you to undertake the office of a pastor among us, and the care and charge of our precious souls, and upon accepting this our call, we promise that we will receive the word of God from your mouth, attend on your ministry, instruction and reproofs, in public and private, and submit to the discipline which Christ has appointed in His church, administered by you while regulated by the word of God and agreeable to our confession of faith and directory."

What preacher could turn down a call like this? The plainness of the need described and the evidence of the humility of the writers tug at the heart. But when the sacrifice required of a preacher living on the frontier is equally viewed, the glow of the office is greatly tarnished. The dangers of the forests were so great that no one went to church without being armed and taking their families with them.

Mr. Cummings, who accepted the pastorate, had the habit of taking a short walk alone while the congregation seated themselves. He would return, hold a few words of conversation at the door with some of the elders of the church, then gravely walk through the crowd, mount the pulpit, deposit his rifle in a corner near him, lay off his shot pouch and commence the service of the day.

The lay of circumstances have drastically changed since 1772. Advances in technology and societal evolution have changed the perception of need in man's soul, yet it is just as great. In our age, it seems to take a greater vision to see and feel the need.

We hear a lot about entering the 21st century. Businesses are changing, gearing their advertising to relate to a new generation and politicians are defining how to meet the need of

a new society. Should God's people do any less in imparting the Gospel?

Before a vision can be seen, a mountain has to be scaled. That mountain is "self." Unless we get past our own needs, we can never see the need of others. One of the worst things that can happen to those who profess Christ is to fall into the condition of the Pharisees. Because "self" and pride ruled in their lives, they were promoting a system rather than God. Jesus confronted this by saying, "But woe unto you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! for ye shut up the kingdom of heaven against men: for ye neither go in yourselves, neither suffer ye them that are entering to go in." Matt. 23:13.

How did the scribes and Pharisees shut up the kingdom of heaven rather than win souls? For one thing, they paid lip service and operated on pretense. "All therefore whatsoever they bid you observe, that observe and do; but do not ye after their works: for they say, and do not." Matt. 23:3.

It is human to feel the need of other's approval, so "self" sometimes shows great piety. Job said, "I put on righteousness, and it clothed me:..." Job. 29:14. Job's profession of righteousness fit him. But when one's profession doesn't fit, and people see the nakedness of inconsistency, it proves a hindrance to others seeking God.

The Pharisees were indifferent to human need. "For they bind heavy burdens and grievous to be borne, and lay them on men's shoulders; but they themselves will not move them with one of their fingers." Matt. 23:4. As long as they were within the approval of their own circle of friends, they felt comfortable. Their vision didn't extend beyond the outside of the cup. (Matt. 23:25.) They were meticulous about some things concerning the law and very careless about weightier matters. The character sketch Christ paints of a Pharisee is of one who is blinded to his own faults, lazy, judgmental and indifferent to the need of others.

Although no one will be able to offer an excuse on the day of judgment as to why they failed to accept the cleansing power of Christ's blood, imagine the horror of having someone look at us with accusing eyes because our life, attitude or inconsistencies had hindered them.

In order to be successful in the coming days, God's people must humbly seek for a continuing clearer vision of the need of souls. This work in our life is accomplished by the power of God's Holy Spirit and is available to all who seek it. The end result in eternity is an inspiration to ponder. Jesus said it this way, "And he that reapeth receiveth wages, and gathereth fruit unto life eternal: that both he that soweth and he that reapeth may rejoice together." John 4:36.



righteous in Sodom, changed the mind of God to save those few he could. (Genesis 18:23-32.)

Jacob—interceded with the angel, obtaining the willingness of God to preserve him and family from the wrath of his brother (Genesis 32:9-11); one prayer showing his humility before God (appears to be prayed in the morning) and verse 24 shows him wrestling that night with a man from God and in verse 28 the man says: "You have prevailed and have power with God and man."

Moses—means "Drew out from the water"—or "Deliverance" or "Deliverer." (Exodus 32:11-14; 32:31-32; Numbers 14:13-20.) Moses had total selflessness by offering himself that the people might be spared; wanted the Glory of God to be maintained; with his power with God, got God to change his mind and attitude from anger to willingness to spare the people from destruction, thereby paving the way for the Messiah to come from Israel. God even said He would be willing to do away with these people and bring the Messiah through the seed of Moses.

**Elijah**—known as the "Prophet of Fire"—there were at least three recorded times of intercessory prayer: raised widow's son to life, rain after three-year drought, turning an idolatrous nation back to God. (I Kings 17 and 18.)

**Elisha**—interceded for his friends' only son, but the Bible doesn't report his prayer. He performed a greater number of miracles than any other prophet except Moses. Each miracle takes a certain amount of interceding.

Isaiah—(Isaiah 20:2-5; Isaiah 59:12-17.) "...And the Lord saw it, and it displeased him that there was no judgment. And he saw that there was no man, and wondered that there was no intercessor." Isaiah 53:12, "...He hath poured out his soul unto death: and he was numbered with the transgressors; and he bare the sin of many, and made intercession for the transgressors." This prophecy, probably brought about by Isaiah's intercessory prayer, when asking God what His plan consisted of for mankind.

Jeremiah—known as the "Weeping Prophet." (Jeremiah 14;19-22.) This covers one of Jeremiah's intercessory prayers. God answers in Jeremiah 15:1, "... Though Moses and Samuel stood before me, yet my mind could not be toward this people, cast them out of my sight and let them go forth." Sometimes the answers to our intercessory prayers may not be what we want to hear! Jeremiah says that in verse 10; verse 11 is God's promise to him. "... Verily I will cause the enemy to entreat thee well in the time of affliction."

**Daniel**—(Daniel 2:18-19; 27-28, 30.) This intercession was for the interpretation of the king's dream. What his prayers were like in order to have his visions is not stated. Visions such as he had are not obtained through unfocused prayer.


**Stephen**—interceded with man for God—Acts 7, and in the last two verses he intercedes for himself and begs for forgiveness of those who are stoning him. Saul (Paul) was in that crowd.

**Paul**—Every missionary field benefited from Paul's intercessory prayers for them. (II Thessalonians 1:11-12; Philemon 1:4, II Corinthians 11:28.)

Romans 8:16-27, 34—We find here that the Spirit makes intercession for us: also Christ makes intercession for us (verse 34) because He is at the right hand of the Father. Now look at verse 27 again—"he that searcheth the hearts" must be God the Father Himself. (See I Chronicles 28:9, Jeremiah 17:10. These and others lead me to believe the Lord God Jehovah is the Searcher of the hearts and He knows the mind of the [Holy] Spirit who, as one of the Trinity, has an individual personality of His own.) Christ and the Holy Spirit work together to intercede with the Father for that which we pray. But going a step further, it is the Holy Spirit who must dwell in the human body, and burden the soul with the prayer which the Holy Spirit wants prayed. What a mystery of mysteries!

Intercession is not a substitution for sin. There has only ever been one substitute for a world of sinners, Jesus Christ the Son of God. But intercession so identifies the intercessor with the sufferer that it gives him a prevailing place with God. He moves God. With Jeremiah we see God accepting him as an intercessor, but rejecting the intercessory petition, yet He was moved to give Jeremiah a place of acceptance with the nation's conqueror.

I find it very interesting to see how frequently the position of intercession is taken by the prophets of old for the nations around Israel as well as for Israel itself. Brother Ostis Wilson said that things have happened in our nation which should not have happened because the saints quit praying for their nation. Our vision has tended to go inward and not outward as that of previous generations.


