LIVING SAINTS

Do you know what a saint is? The Webster's New World Dictionary defines a saint as: (1) a holy person (2) a person who is unusually charitable, patient, etc.

Are you a saint? Do you consider yourself to be a holy person, charitable and patient? Do others consider you to be a saint?

When the Apostle Paul wrote to the Church of God at Corinth, he addressed the letter to, "...them that are sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints,..." I Cor. 1:2. God calls His saints "...with an holy calling, not according to our works, but according to his own purpose and grace,..." II Tim. 1:9. Our own righteousness is as filthy rags before the Lord and He will hide His face from the self-righteous in spirit. (Isa. 64:6.) Jesus said, "...That exceptyour righ-

teousness shall exceed the righteousness of the scribes and Pharisees, ye shall in no case enter into the kingdom of heaven." Matt.5:20.

Good works will not make a person holy. Neither will fasting and long, ritual prayers distinguish a holy person. Holiness comes from God, creates a pure heart within a person, and the good works will follow.

Therefore, the most important question is, Does God call me one of His saints? Is my heart holy and without spot before His searching eye? Does the Lord see me as charitable and patient?

When a person repents of sin and is born again, that individual is then spotless and pure before the Lord. When a born again, or saved person, dedicates himself as a living sacrifice unto the Lord, he is sanctified and ready for the Lord's service. As long as this person walks in the light of God's Word and obeys the leadings of the Holy Spirit. he is holy and righteous before God. (I John 3:1-5; II Tim. 2:21.)

A holy person is not set aside from others in order to stay holy, for he can be kept by the power of God. Jesus commissioned His saints to go out into all the world and take the gospel to everyone. Holy saints of God can live a common life in society and not be partakers of the wickedness in this world. Saints will not be

ashamed of the Lord but will witness for Him in example and in word. (John 17:13-21.)

This brings us to the second definition of a saint: a person who is unusually charitable. A saint will be kind and generous in giving help to those in need and he will be forgiving in judging others. There are so many needy, hurting people in our world today that it is often overwhelming to think about the magnitude of the work to be done. However, if ten saints of God will reach out to a different hurting person each day, 3,650 souls will be touched in one year. One by one the work can be done.

The Lord wants His people to be the salt, or seasoning, in the lives of those about them. Sometimes it only takes a few minutes out of a busy schedule to cheer someone by making a friendly phone call to a lonely widow; attending the funeral of an acquaintance, sending a getwell card or speaking a friendly word to a tired mother in the grocery store. Often the Lord's work takes more time and finances but nothing is more profitable than to help eternity-bound souls. (Matt. 25:31-46.)

It is important for saints to take every opportunity to work and witness for the Lord. "And let us not be weary in well doing: for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not. As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith." Gal. 6:9-10.

A mature saint of God also knows about patience. Jesus said, "In your patience possess ye your souls." Luke 21:19. In other words, the spiritual race is not for the swift but for those who will endure unto the end. The Lord is not slack concerning His promises, but He counts time differently than we do. Faithful endurance through temptations, trials, troubles and tribulation enriches the lives of God's saints. James 1:2-4 states, "My brethren, count it all joy when ye fall into divers temptations; Knowing this, that the trying of your faith worketh patience. But let patience have her perfect work, that ye may be perfect and entire, wanting nothing." A

saint of God must be patient with the Lord's time schedule.

It takes patience in prayer and supplication. When it seems the Lord is not even listening, patiently pray on. Even when the trial or trouble becomes worse, patiently endure. A saint will patiently hold on to faith, hope and charity and these three will carry him home some day.

"Here is the patience of the saints: here are

they that keep the commandments of God, and the faith of Jesus.... Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth: Yea, saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labours; and their works do follow them." Rev. 14:12-13. In the final judgment day, the God of creation will reward those who patiently endure until the end.

Does God call you one of His saints?

QUESTION: Is all this numbering system, everybody having a number and the computerizing of all transactions, banking, etc., which seems to be coming in the near future, the mark of the beast spoken of in the Bible?

ANSWER: No. To my understanding it is not and for the following reasons. The "mark of the beast" is referred to in Revelation 13:16-17. In this case the mark had a religious signification because those who received it were worshipping the beast—verse 12. Also, there were other things these people received besides the mark of the beast—it was all pertaining to the system.

The first thing to do in interpreting this text is to find out what the beast was. Also we must understand that the book of Revelation is written in symbolic language and the interpretation of it must be by analogy—that is; each thing mentioned is a drawn picture not of itself but of something analogous to it.

In this 13th chapter of Revelation there are two beasts mentioned, but it is clear that the first beast is the one under consideration here because the second beast caused the people to worship the first beast—verse 12.

Some of the identifying marks of this beast were seven heads and ten horns. There are others also but we use these marks for special identity. In the 17th chapter of Revelation we again see this same beast, having seven heads and ten horns, and with a glamorous woman riding upon him this time. This is important because it identifies a dual personality—a political-religious system. It is a false, apostate, corrupt system to be sure because this woman is described in verse one as "the great whore"

and further in verse five as "...MYSTERY, BABYLON THE GREAT, THE MOTHER OF HARLOTS AND ABOMINATIONS OF THE EARTH."

But this 17th chapter of Revelation proceeds to identify this beast religion in an unmistakable way. Verse nine says, "...The seven heads are seven mountains, on which the woman sitteth." Verse ten says, "And there are seven kings:..." The seven heads represented both the seven mountains and the seven kings. The city of Rome corresponds to this description because she is situated upon seven hills (mountains) and had seven systems of government during the time of her reign as a universal kingdom. The seven kings refer to these seven different systems of government she had. Verse 12 says, "And the ten horns which thou sawest are ten kings, which have received no kingdom as yet;..." This is a reference to the ten minor kingdoms which came out of the Roman Empire during its decline and fall. These are historical

Rome has been the seat of two major systems of false religion—Paganism and Papalism. This is also an historical fact. Paganism is symbolized in the Revelation by a great dragon having seven heads and ten horns—Revelation 12:3. Papalism is symbolized by the first beast of Revelation 13:1 which also had seven heads and ten horns which identifies it as the same power but in a different form. It was the mark of this beast which is referred to in Revelation 13:16-17.

An illusion is made here perhaps to the custom of marking or branding slaves to identify them as belonging to certain masters. Also certain cults and groups marked or branded their members. In many instances in the Bible allusions are made to general customs and practices of the time with which the people were familiar to illustrate certain truths.

God also seals, or marks, His subjects or (Continued on page 14.)





on the building, the cost has been very reasonable. In some cases, the labor has been donated totally.

The remaining figure of \$94,900.00 to complete the building seems an astronomical sum, and is somewhat higher than we previously anticipated, due to some unexpected expenses in the electrical wiring. Yet we launched upon this venture by faith, confident of God's leading and our great necessity to relocate out of the flood zone, and we therefore are relying upon His provision for the final phases of this project. We earnestly request your continued prayers for this need, as well as for the work here in general.

Next spring will mark our 75th year of publishing, and we feel it would be appropriate to mark that milestone with a reunion of former workers and an open house for the new facility, if it is finished. We will keep you informed as plans develop.

Who are we? Where are we now, and where are we going?

These are questions that must periodically and systematically be defined by any group or organization. In particular, it is the vision and self-identity which the Church of God must clearly understand about itself, and vocalize and teach to those new in Christ.

This need for a vision that makes for cohesiveness can lead into grievous error if not fixed within the bounds of the Bible and inspired by the Holy Spirit. The result of a vision outside of God's Word results in a manmade organization, by whatever name, where the keeping of outward observances and traditions are substituted for genuine spiritual unity.

When we feel the need to identify ourselves as something more than simple followers of Christ—when we are unsatisfied with that distinction alone—it could be that the flesh is at work, subtly seeking to glorify itself by assuming a title or an identity with a movement or a cause orchestrated through the flesh.

In the early 1500's, Martin Luther brought forth the dispensation of Justification. Then John Wesley, in the 1700's, was an instrument in the hand of God to teach of a sanctified life. At that point, the only thing lacking to make the Church what it was in its inception, was unity. Therefore in 1880, Daniel Warner, under the anointing of the Holy Spirit, preached that

Christians should come out from the confusion of sectarian bondage. Many responded by offering the hand of fellowship to every blood-washed believer.

Over 100 years have passed since that time and there is a need, as we await Christ's reappearance, to keep the fires of fervor burning. But in doing so, we do not look for another Gospel dispensation, for the Church is complete through justification, sanctification and unity.

Christ Himself prophesied what would take place during this waiting time and illustrated it with the analogy of the ten virgins, (Matt. 25:1-13), which contains a warning for us to keep oil in our lamps. To do this, we must approach God often, and draw from His vast storehouse of blessings for new anointing. We should not let the cares of life cause us to become lethargic.

Not only is a waiting time dangerous because of the peril of lethargy, but because of a vulnerability to rashness. When Moses went up on Mount Sinai to receive the Ten Commandments, the children of Israel grew weary while awaiting his return. They needed an identity of worship. This they did by melting precious metal to make for themselves a golden calf.

In this waiting period, let us not grow weary and foolishly attempt to create something to rally around. We have Christ to rally around. That is enough. The "golden calf" in many cases is nothing more than the desires and doctrines of men, and how inferior it is to worship an institution of man when we can worship God.

We are in the time when our purpose is to "occupy until He comes." (Luke 19:13.) One definition of "occupy" is, "To engage, employ, or busy oneself." What are we to be busy at in this evening time?

"And this gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come." Let us keep occupied spreading the gospel, so when Christ returns, the percentage of those ready to meet Him will be higher because of our efforts.

Through supporting the work of the Lord with our resources, our time and our talents, we stay involved, alert and encouraged, and avoid the threat of stagnation.

So what are we to rally around and what is our identity? Our identity is found in Christ. He is our rallying force. Our purpose should be to lift Him up in our daily lives, and in our individual spheres of influence. This we must

do so that others will come to Him and be saved. To accomplish this task, we must keep the Holy Spirit fresh within us and our energies focused on becoming more like our Saviour.

This must be our vision, and if we faithfully follow it, we will rejoice to see our Lord in the

skies.



On the morning of April 17, 1997, we read Psalm 115:11-15 in family worship. "Ye that fear the Lord, trust in the Lord: he is their help and their shield. The Lord hath been mindful of us: he will bless us;... He will bless them that fear the Lord, both small and great. The Lord shall increase you more and more, you and your children. Ye are blessed of the Lord...."

Late that afternoon. Herschel had a flat on the tractor, and was in a hurry to get it fixed before the station closed. It was one of those rare times when no one thought about the whereabouts of our baby, Davis, 14 months, who had been playing outside with the older children. Herschel could see there was no one on either side of the Suburban, but Davis was apparently directly behind. When Herschel backed up, he knocked Davis down and rolled over him. Then, in turning, the front wheel ran over his leg. Herschel thought it felt like one of the children's toys; then he saw his little boy lving in front of the vehicle.... One cannot describe the sheer horror we felt when we saw that such a dreaded thing had actually occurred. saints. In Revelation 7:3 it says "...Hurt not the earth, neither the sea, nor the trees, till we have SEALED [marked] the servants of our God in their foreheads." In Revelation 14:1 we read,

"And I looked, and, lo, a Lamb stood on the mount Sion, and with him an hundred forty and four thousand, having his Father's name written in their foreheads." This company represented the great host of triumphant, overcoming saints (the entire company of the redeemed) because we read in Revelation 3:12, "Him that overcometh will I make a pillar in the temple of my God, and he shall go no more out: and I will write upon him the name of my God,..." The votaries of this false religion received the name of the beast. The true people of God are all marked with His name in their foreheads.

"Forehead" is a symbol of intellect or mind and God marks all of His true followers with His law written in their minds and hearts—Hebrews 8:10. The members of this or any false religion are all marked with the laws, ordinances, doctrines, rituals and creeds of their respective religions in their minds and hearts—the "mark of the beast." God seals or marks His true saints with His Spirit, the holy Spirit of promise. (Ephesians 1:13; Ephesians 4:30; II Corinthians 1:22.) The Spirit of God, with His fruits as described in Galatians 5:22-23 being manifest in the life, is the identifying mark of all true Christians. So likewise, the false and apostate religions mark all their subjects with their spirit and the fruits of it in their lives. God's Spirit is the Spirit of Truth and guides His followers into all truth (John 16:13) and writes the truth in their hearts (II Corinthians 3:3). The spirit of this false system of religion is a spirit of error and marks its subjects with error, superstition, and doctrines of men.

There have been three major systems of false religion dealt with in the Revelation. One is paganism or heathenism (the dragon). The other two are Papalism and Protestantism, symbolized by the two beasts of Revelation 13. The same false spirit runs through the whole line and it is all God-dishonoring. In this way the second beast (Protestantism) caused its subjects to receive the mark of the first beast (Papalism) by injecting into them the same spirit of error, also by copying in their manmade creeds and disciplines some of the errors of the first beast. Also, they patterned their system after the human system of man-rule and human government.


It is said that no man could buy nor sell if he did not have the mark of the beast. Buying and selling are symbols of the ordinary pursuits and privileges of an ordinary citizen in intermingling

with society. To be forbidden to buy and sell would be equivalent to being banished from society. This same principle has been carried over into human religious systems where one who does not fellowship their spirit and subscribe to their creeds and doctrines of men have no rights or privileges among them. The true ministers of God are not permitted to give out or preach the gospel (sell) in their assemblies and wherever the true ministers of God are preaching the truth, the votaries of these religions are warned to not go there or to be affected by their preaching (buy). This idea has been especially pronounced in the Papal system in so much that any of their members who ventured to attend a church service other than the Catholic are required to do penance for it and if they persist in such a practice they are renounced as heretics and excommunicated and consigned to hell and shunned by faithful Catholics as those accursed. I understand that in recent years the Catholic stand on this is being modified as an ecumenical move, but up until recent times, one was severely dealt with for failure to recognize the church and its decrees as absolute. They could not buy nor sell-engage in the regular pursuits of life and mingle with society.
