Has swept around its dial-plate, ..


And with it thousands disappear

Time in the Desert

Spending time in a desert is not what most people look forward to. There are several reasons for this. The sun seems to beat down with much greater force than anywhere else around, the shade is almost non-existent, and watering holes are far and few between (if you can find any at all). When the wind does blow, it feels more like air from a blast furnace than the cooling breeze we are accustomed to. The endless sea of hot, gritty sand is a real problem too. If you try to make much progress walking through it, you find that each step is made with increasing effort. Sometimes you cannot walk on top of the sand...you might be required to wade through it.

Why, then, do people venture into the desert in the first place? A few reasons come to mind. After exploring them, perhaps we can understand why we find ourselves in a "spiritual desert" on occasion. We may not choose to enter that desert place, but we may find ourselves there anyway.

The last time I remember being in a desert was during a trip from Missouri to California. The route we chose went right through the desert in the southwest part of the United States. Since our time for the trip was limited, we chose this route for its directness. Sometimes we may desire to reach a particular "spiritual place" but find that between our present location and the place we wish to go is a vast, uninviting desert. Unlike our trip to California, we may come to realize that the *only* way to get there is right through the middle of that awful desert. We can't go north and get around it and we can't reserve a seat with an airline and fly over it. Our only two choices are to go ahead and prepare for the trip...or stay where we are.

In considering the Scriptures, there are several instances of God's people being in a literal desert place. These scriptures point to three main reasons that these people were there: (1) their particular

job happened to be in the desert; (2) they were sent there to prepare for a very important job later on; (3) or, in one case, God did not want them there. Their job was not there, nor was it preparing them for a job elsewhere. They were simply there because of unbelief and disobedience.

(1) Philip was right in the middle of enjoying great success in preaching the word in "Jerusalem...and in many villages of the Samaritans" when God spoke to him, "Arise, and go toward the south...unto Gaza, which is desert." It was here that Philip met the Ethiopian riding in his chariot and reading from the book of Isaiah. We read in the rest of this account in Acts 8:25-40 that the Ethiopian was baptized and "went on his way rejoicing." Since this Ethiopian worked for the Queen of Ethiopia, it is likely he had a positive influence for the gospel in his own country after that.

Philip had every reason to doubt God's calling to the desert. He could have refused, but think of the opportunity that would have slipped from his fingers! God knew that the best place for that little rendezvous to happen would be in the desert. Do you think the "Spirit of the Lord" would have "caught away Philip" and taken him to Azotus to continue preaching there if he had failed the desert mission?

Have you ever stopped to realize where John the Baptist spent his ministry? Read the account in Matt. 3:1-4. "In those days came John the Baptist, preaching in the wilderness of Judaea,... For this was spoken of by the prophet Esaias, saying, The voice of one crying in the wilderness,..." I ask this question of myself – would I be willing to spend my time working for God in the wilderness? The spiritual implications here point to obvious hardship and lack of the things we may feel we deserve.

January is a time when attention is turned to a new year—an unsoiled, fresh, inviting twelve months in which resolutions and philosophies are incorporated into people's lives in hope of making the new year more productive than the past.

Jesus said something which we would do well to keep in mind as we enter this new era of opportunity. He challenged, "He that hath ears to hear, let him hear."

We live in a world which doesn't hear well. This is sometimes because people prefer to occupy themselves by talking, even if it is about issues of little importance, or mere gossip. There are also those so full of their own knowledge and opinions that they feel no need to listen to anyone else. And if for no other reason, people are just too busy to take the time for effective listening.

History reveals a reason for listening. We are told that when Napoleon was making plans to invade England, he was informed that an American wanted to see him. "I can give him two minutes," Napoleon said. But two minutes was not long enough to grasp the significance of so revolutionary an idea as a ship propelled by steam. Had Napoleon listened longer to Robert Fulton, the history of the world might have been altered. If we would remove all limitations in listening to God, it is highly possible that there would be more victories in our lives also.

Jesus said that the least in the kingdom

of heaven is greater than John the Baptist. Then He said, "He that hath ears to hear, let him hear." (Matt. 11:11-15.) That statement alone should boost the self-esteem of those who take time to ponder it. It should also cut down on the number of people doing things simply to be seen and heard. It could prevent embarrassing words and actions as people realize they already have great worth in the eyes of God, and don't have to try to do or say something sensational to prove it. Probably all Christians know this, but how often do we fail to hear Jesus speak it to our hearts because we aren't really listening?

Does spreading the Gospel ever seem like a dauntless task? Have you ever been discouraged to the point of giving up laboring for God because so few seem to receive and profit by your efforts? Jesus offered the parable of the sower in which He said much of the seed would fall in places where it wouldn't bear fruit. Then he said, "Who hath ears to hear, let him hear" (Matt. 13:3-9.) Listening and taking these words into our hearts should eliminate some of the temptation to discouragement in the year 2001.

Jesus also spoke a parable about tares, which He then explained to His disciples. In concluding the explanation He declared that at the end of the world, "Then shall the righteous shine forth as the sun in the kingdom of their Father. Who hath ears to hear, let him hear." Matt. 13:43. How often has it happened that someone has wronged us and feelings of resentment flood our hearts? Emotions have a way of overriding the voice of God, and we fail to hear Him tell us that at the end the righteous will shine forth as the sun. It is only natural that we want to be seen as being in the right just as soon as an injustice occurs. But if we will listen to God's voice, we can accept being wronged for His sake, realizing it won't always be that way.

There are other instances where Jesus said, "He that hath ears to hear, let him hear." May we each have our hearts tuned to God's voice so that if He should speak to us during the coming year, we will be listening.

Throughout the services the Lord stirred everyone's hearts and different ones sought help at an altar of prayer. We are thankful to see how the Lord has blessed.


We appreciate each prayer that was prayed and each sacrifice that was made in order for this revival to be anointed. May God bless you as richly as He has blessed us.

Time in the Desert

We may feel lonely, thirsty and tired. Remember though, John the Baptist's ministry was very necessary and effective – right in the wilderness.

(2) Right after being baptized, "Jesus...was led by the Spirit into the wilderness, being forty days tempted of the devil." (Luke 4:1-21.) The primary reason for Jesus' time in the desert was for preparation of the ministry He was sent for. "And when the devil had ended all the temptation, he departed

from him for a season. And Jesus returned in the power of the Spirit into Galilee:...To preach the acceptable year of the Lord." If this desert time was necessary for Jesus, it may be necessary for us also.

How long did David live in the wilderness before actually sitting on the throne? History tells us that it took seven years. These were not seven *easy* years. "And David abode in the wilderness... And Saul sought him every day." (I Samuel 23:14.) No, Saul did not literally hunt for David every day of all seven years, but there were only a few days during that time that, given the opportunity, Saul would not have killed David. After several narrow escapes with his life, about the only thing David could do was leave his young bride (the king's daughter) and run for his life like a common outlaw. Seven years is a long time to wait for anything, especially waiting to be king...but how about waiting *forty* years?

Forty years rolled slowly by for Moses while he tended sheep for his father-in-law. We read in Exodus 3:1 that "he led the flock to the backside of the desert, and came to the mountain of God, even to Horeb." Moses may not have been in an actual desert every day for forty years straight, but it is very probable that he felt the desert in his heart. Exodus 2 teaches us that while still in Egypt, Moses felt that God wanted to use him to deliver the children of Israel out of bondage, but when he attempted to do so in his own strength, disaster came. The remorse and pain Moses carried with him for forty years must have been very hard indeed. So well was his lesson of humility learned, however, that he almost failed to heed God's call when it came in the fullness of time. "And the anger of the Lord was kindled against Moses, and he said, Is not Aaron the Levite thy brother? I know that he can speak well." (Exodus 4:14.)

We know that Moses was forty years old when he ran for his life from Egypt. He had to spend forty years preparing for the next forty years of wandering around in the wilderness with a multitude of folks whocouldn't seem to believe or obey God. Do you suppose that the Lord knew what kind of preparation Moses would need? Numbers 12:3 tells us that "Moses was very meek, above all the men which were upon the face of the earth." God knows what He's doing when preparing someone for a job.

(3) Moses may not have needed such a long time to prepare for the job of leading Israel out of Egypt if he had only had a little more cooperation from them. "And the Lord's anger was kindled against Israel, and he made them wander in the wilderness forty years, until all the generation, that had done evil in the sight of the Lord, was consumed." (Numbers 32:13.)


There are several distinctions between the first two causes for desert experiences and the third one.

- (a) God is the author of the first two, while we are the author of the third type.
- (b) The first two types are of a spiritual benefit to others around us, even though we may not see it or feel it at the time. The third type does no good to anyone, not even ourselves.
- (c) The Lord will preserve us during the first two types, but we can perish spiritually in the third type!
- (d) The first two types of desert experiences please God while the third type definitely does not!

If I ever find myself in the desert, it is important to ask myself this question: "Am I here because of unbelief and disobedience?" If I am, God will lead me out into a wealthy place if I ask for His forgiveness and strength. The children of Israel failed the Lord many times and ended up in a spiritual desert, but every time they turned to Him in true repentance, they were delivered. The caution here is that not all of them survived while in the desert. While the people as a whole were spared, there were many individuals who perished in that desert place.

If my desert experience comes about when I am trying my best to please God, I may well "wonder what I have done to get in this place," but I can rest

assured—God makes no mistakes. There is a job for me to do, either while I am in the desert, or after I come out on the other side.



QUESTION: Several questions have come in regarding sanctification: the need of this experience, the process of it, what it is and what it does, how it is done, what the conditions are for it, and when and how it is obtained.

ANSWER: Mankind in his unregenerate state is two degrees, or steps, below the state of moral purity and holiness in which he was created.

Originally, at his creation, man was in the image and after the likeness of God Himself. (Genesis 1:26-27.) In this state he was possessed of "righteousness and true holiness." In Colossians 3:10 we read, "And have put on the new man, which is renewed in knowledge after the image of him that created him." In Ephesians 4:24 it says, "And that ye put on the new man, which after God is created in righteousness and true holiness." These two texts make it clear that the image of God is "righteousness and true holiness." This is what man possessed in his original state.

Transgression of the commandment of God by the original pair changed all of this. Sin entered into this world by the willful choice of our foreparents and by this means they apostatized from God. (Genesis 3.)

Sin brought about a change in man's moral nature. Then, instead of the righteousness and true holiness that he had originally possessed, he became depraved and corrupt in his moral nature. In Ephesians 4:22 it says, "That ye put off concerning the former conversation the old man, which is corrupt according to the deceitful lusts." Ephesians 4:25-31 describes the corrupt deeds of the old man: lying, stealing, corrupt communication, bitterness, wrath, anger, clamour, evil speaking, malice.

The fact that the moral likeness and image of God was effaced from the human race by this means is evidenced by the fact that when we obtain the salvation of the Lord Jesus Christ, we are said to be renewed in that image. (Colossians 3:10.) In other words, it is a restoration to the image of God—hence we conclude it had been lost.

As a result of this, the moral nature of all mankind was affected

mankind was affected in this way, and became depraved and corrupt. Sin has become universal as a result of the sin of this first pair. "...As by one man sin entered into the world, and death by sin; and so death passed upon all men, for that all have sinned." (Romans 5:12.) "...For if through the offence of one many be dead, much more the grace of God, and the gift by grace, which is by one man, Jesus Christ, hath abounded unto many." (Romans 5:15.) "For if by one man's offence death reigned by one; much more they which receive abundance of grace and of the gift of righteousness shall reign in life by one, Jesus Christ." (Romans 5:17.) "For as by one man's disobedience many were made sinners,..." (Romans

5:19.) Romans 5:13-14 says, "(For until the law sin was in the world: but sin is not imputed when there is no law. Nevertheless death reigned from Adam to Moses, even over them that had not sinned after the similitude of Adam's transgression,..." Adam's transgression was that he violated a specific commandment spelled out by God Himself. But from Adam to Moses, when the law was given on Mt. Sinai by God to the children of Israel through Moses, there was no commandment in existence; hence, people could not sin after the similitude of Adam's transgression by breaking a specific commandment but, at the same time, they were in sin, and death reigned over them. The only law they had during this time was the law of their conscience. Concerning this we read in Romans 2:13-15, "(For not the hearers of the law are just before God, but the doers of the law shall be justified. For when the Gentiles, which have not the law, do by nature the things contained in the law, these, having not the law, are a law unto themselves: Which shew the work of the law written in their hearts, their conscience also bearing witness, and their thoughts the mean while accusing or else excusing one another.)" This text does not teach salvation according to man's conscience


as some suppose, but it does teach us that there is sufficient knowledge in every man's conscience to fix responsibility and render him a responsible being to God. Galatians 3:19 says, the law "...was added because of trans-

gressions, till the seed should come..." But if the law was added because of transgression, what were they transgressing? There was no actual commandment in existence between Adam and Moses when the law was given. There was nothing to transgress except the law of their conscience, and these poor fallen creatures were so under the power of sin they could not even live to their own conscience. Galatians 3:22 reads, "But the scripture hath concluded all under sin,..." Romans 3:23 says, "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God." "...Death passed upon all men, for that all have sinned." Romans 5:12. "For God hath concluded them all in unbelief, that he might have mercy upon all." Romans 11:32. II Corinthians 5:14 says, "For the love of Christ constraineth us; because we thus judge, that if one died for all, then were all dead."

If these scriptures do not prove all men to be under the dismal sway of sin, that they are thus affected because of one man and his sin, and that one man is Adam, what do they teach? How could this all be true except there is something hereditary about sin? Certain diseases, defects, and deficiencies (mental, physical, and otherwise) are said to be transmittable from parent to child and they are called hereditary. If it is carried through different members of the family or through succeeding generations, it is said this or that runs in the family. Their father or grandfather had that, or was that way, etc. The scriptures conclude something about sin being hereditary, a depravity of nature handed down through the generations of mankind from the original parent.

Adam begat children in his own likeness after his image. Genesis 5:3 says, "And Adam lived an hundred and thirty years, and begat a son in his own likeness, after his image; and called his name Seth." At this time Adam had lost the image and likeness of God (righteous-

ness and true holiness). He was now possessed of a depraved nature and could only transmit what he had to his posterity.

But let us notice a few more scriptures along this line. Psalm 51:5 says, "Behold, I was shapen in iniquity; and in sin did my mother conceive me." The psalmist is not saying here that his mother committed sin in conceiving him but that his parents were sinful people by nature and passed that on to him, and sin had him when he got here. Genesis 8:21 reads, "And the Lord smelled a sweet savour; and the Lord said in his heart, I will not again curse the ground any more for man's sake; for the imagination of man's heart is evil from his youth; neither will I again smite any more every thing living, as I have done." Genesis 6:5-6 reads, "And God saw that the wickedness of man was great in the earth, and that every imagination of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually. And it repented the Lord that he had made man on the earth, and it grieved him at his heart."

The fact of the universal depravity and the corrupt nature of humankind is further confirmed in the fact that God, in order to get a pure, holy seed (Christ) into the world that would be able to offer a sacrifice without blemish and without spot, qualified for making an atonement for the sins of all mankind, had to set the man aside. Without the use of man, God begat, by the Holy Ghost, a holy seed within the woman, and Christ is called the seed of the woman. In Isaiah 59:16 we read, "And he saw that there was no man, and wondered that there was no intercessor: therefore his arm brought salvation unto him; and his righteousness, it sustained him." God looked the whole universe of mankind over and found not one man who was qualified to redeem the human race from sin, so He made Him a Man who could qualify through the operation of the Holy Spirit. Jesus was the arm of God reached out to us to redeem us from sin.

Now I want to consider the point of how God reckons genealogies in the Scriptures. This is important to the point being considered here of how this depravity has passed from father to son through the generations of mankind. In Hebrews 7:9-10 it says, "And as I may so say, Levi also, who receive th tithes, paid tithes in Abraham. For he was yet in the loins of his

father, when Melchisedec met him." Levi was one of the children of Israel and head of one of the 12 tribes. Therefore it refers here to "Levi. who receiveth tithes." His tribe never received any inheritance in the apportionment of land in Canaan, but they were set apart to care for the tabernacle and to administer about the holy things. Their portion was a tithe from all the other tribes. Though he received tithes through the arrangement God made for him; yet it is said that he paid tithes in Abraham, and this is on the grounds that he was yet in the loins of his father when he met Melchisedec and paid tithes to him. Levi was the fourth generation from Abraham and was yet an unborn child in his loins when he paid tithes to Melchisedec, and it is said that he "paid tithes in Abraham." In Galatians 3:29 it says, "And if ye be Christ's, then are ye Abraham's seed, and heirs according to the promise."

In Romans 4:11, speaking of Abraham and his faith it says, "And he received the sign of

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circumcision, a seal of the righteousness of the faith which he had yet being uncircumcised: that he might be the father of all them that believe, though they be not circumcised; that righteousness might be imputed unto them also." Abraham is the first one of whom it was written that he was justified by faith. There were several champions of faith who accomplished great things through faith before the time of Abraham who are mentioned in Hebrews 11, but he is the first one of whom it is said that he "believed God, and it was counted unto him for righteousness." (Romans 4:3.)

We today become children of God by faith in

Christ Jesus, and it is said that we are justified by faith in Him. It is also said that the just live by faith and that we walk by faith and not by sight. But the principle of justification by faith and living by faith began in Abraham and therefore he is said to be the father of all those who believe. He was the beginning of a new race (believers) and became the royal head of that race. Therefore, when we are brought into fellowship with God through faith in Christ Jesus, we are said to be Abraham's seed by coming under that principle of justification by faith which began in him.
