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## THE LAW OF BLEMISHES

"And the Lord spake unto Moses, saying, Speak unto Aaron, saying, Whosoever he be of thy seed in their generations that hath any blemish, let him not approach to offer the bread of his God. For whatsoever man he be that hath a blemish, he shall not approach: a blind man, or a lame, or he that hath a flat nose, or any thing superfluous, Or a man that is broken footed, or brokenhanded, Or crookbackt, or a dwarf, or that hath a blemish in his eye, or be scurvy, or scabbed (leprous), or hath his stones broken; No man that hath a blemish of the seed of Aaron the priest shall come nigh to offer the offerings of the Lord made by fire: he hath a blemish; he shall not come nigh to offer the bread of his God.

"He shall eat the bread of his God, both of the most holy, and of the holy. Only he shall not go in unto [through] the vail, nor come nigh unto

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the altar, because he hath a blemish; that he profane not my sanctuaries: for I the Lord do sanctify them.

"And Moses told it unto Aaron, and to his sons, and unto all the children of Israel." Leviticus 21:16-23.

If a Levite had only one son, and he was born deformed or had other blemishes, or contracted leprosy, or an accident caused a crippled foot which didn't heal, or any manner of deformity, that son could not perform the duties required in the temple. However, God permitted him receiving his allowance of bread so he and his family did not have to be beggars.

How sad for that family! The honor and prestige which went into serving God in such an intimate manner in the temple, was denied them. Not only would the parents be disgraced, so would their son. They could only lift their heads when, and if, their son might have a son born to him who was without blemish. Then how they could rejoice.

Now, the annals of time have rolled forward many generations. God's only Son has been born, with a new message for all.

"Come unto Me," He begged, "everyone who is sad, downcast, heavy laden with grievous sins, and I will give you rest. Come in your humility. Come with your sins."

Within a few years of saying this, the Son of God was Himself bleeding, scarred with the whip, nails protruding from hands and feet, with blood and water gushing from His side. What was the meaning of all this? Why the suffering? Why the ignoble death? Why?

Now, in this new year of 2002, we still find people with blemishes and deformities— loads of unspeakable sins. How can

they and others approach unto God, when His own Son became so horribly deformed?

Because after He died, HE WAS RESUR-RECTED TO SIT ON THE RIGHT HAND OF GOD.

When the people now approach, though their sins be as scarlet, though their loads be greater than the weight of many mountains, there sits the Son.

He turns to the Father and says, "Father, see My hands, see the blemishes of My feet. Notice, I pray Thee, my side from whence came the blood and water I shed for this man, this woman, this aged person, this child. Remember, I was there; I understand these people, I walked with them. I suffered for them."

God saw tears roll freely down Christ's cheeks. "Accept this one," Christ says. "Do it for My sake...do it for My sake."

God lifts His voice, the sound as mighty thunder rolling down the halls of heaven, "For my Son's sake, come,...approach My throne. You are welcome here because of the blood of My Son! Mingle your tears with His blood. Wash yourself, and exchange all your blemishes for rest and peace. We desire your presence. Come sit around our table with Me and My Son. We shall partake of the evening meal. I will see no more blemishes. You will bask in Our presence."

All because of Jesus! Come...my weary friend, come.

## HOUSE OF MERCHANDISE OR HOUSE OF PRAYER?

"And the Jews' Passover was at hand, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem, And found in the temple those that sold oxen and sheep and doves, and the changers of money sitting: And when he had made a scourge of small cords, he drove them out of the temple, and the sheep, and the oxen; and poured out the changers' money, and overthrew the tables; And said unto them that sold doves, Take these things hence; make not my Father's house an house of merchandise." John 2:13-16.

I invite you to visualize the scene that Jesus stepped into.

"...Jesus went up to Jerusalem..." What does "Jerusalem" typify? The church. Jesus took a walk through the "church." "Him that overcometh will I make a pillar in the temple of my God, and he shall go no more out: and I will write upon him the name of my God, which is new Jerusalem, which cometh down out of heaven from my God: and I will write upon him my new name." Rev. 3:12.

"...And found in the temple...." We are the temple—you and I. A place designed for the dwelling of the Savior. "Know ye not that ye are the temple of God, and that the Spirit of God dwelleth in you? If any man defile the temple of God, him shall God destroy; for the temple of God is holy, which temple ye are." I Cor. 3:16-17.

What did He find there?

"...Those that sold oxen...." Visualize a cattle show, where animals are presented in tip-top shape. Their fur is powdered so as to appear whiter. They look good as they are paraded around a course to impress the judges and onlookers.

What am I willing to "powder," in order to look "whiter" to those around me? And am I "adding" to the "course" to make an impression on those looking on?

"...Jesus found in the temple...sheep...." Poor, helpless, frightened, bleating animals! Who are the sheep? We are. You and I, listening for the tender voice of the Good Shepherd, afraid to follow any other. "....We are his people, and the sheep of his pasture." Ps. 100:3. Jesus said in John 10:11, "I am the good shepherd: the good shepherd giveth his life for the sheep."

"...Jesus found in the temple...doves..." Timid birds known for their gentle, affectionate disposition, symbols of purity and peace and the Holy Spirit. "And the Holy Ghost descended in a

bodily shape like a dove upon him,..." Luke 3:22.

What was God's plan for such a beautiful bird? To move about without encumbrance or hindrance. It is His plan for the Holy Spirit to have free course among us, both in our personal lives and in the collective body. Have I caged up the Holy Spirit's



freedom to deal with me or work through others?

"...Jesus found in the temple...money changers...."

...Men in control of the whole bill of sale. People determining if your money is worth as much as you wish...deciding whether you have exchanged enough for their selfish gain. Individuals who set the value and standard on the exchange of moneys.

Am I a "money changer?" Do I determine if others are measuring appropriately, sacrificing enough, paying a sufficient amount? Do I attempt to enforce the value and standard by which they must live?

Jesus walked into the temple and found a room full of people trading, bargaining and bartering for their own profit, hurrying to fulfill their own desires and agendas. The scene is SO contrary to what He came to dwell in and so incompatible with the sanctity of true worship.

"...And when He made a scourge of small cords, He drove them out of the temple...."

"Take these things hence; make not my Father's house an house of merchandise...."

"...Is it not written, My house shall be called of all nations the house of prayer?..." Mark 11:17.

## House of Prayer...

"House of prayer" describes a place of serenity and unity. It portrays a serene ambiance of people unified for the same cause. It is a place where the Holy Spirit is allowed free reign and where the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, long-suffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance. (Gal. 5:22-23.)

It is a place where people are invited in and encouraged to stay, where wounds are allowed to heal, and the injured are nursed back to health—a place where souls will be encouraged and uplifted, and growth is recognized.

What does Jesus find when He walks into my "temple?" Am I merchandising...bargaining...trading...? The Lord wants us swept clean and filled with only His graces. Then, and only then, will He find a "House of Prayer."

## IT APPEALS TO ME

It appeals to me...the gentle Jesus, knocking patiently at my heart's door. Not demanding an entrance, not yelling or threatening or accusing,...not bellowing "I knowyou're in there! Open up!" Not kicking in the door. No, ...He simply knocks, and waits for a willing response. (Rev. 3:20.)

Won by His winsome approach, I respond, "Won't You please enter? I am honored at Your visit. Sorry to have kept You waiting."

Another description of Christ's approach is found in Isa. 1:18. "Come now and let us reason together, saith the Lord:..." My reply? "I accept Your invitation. I want to hear what You have to say. You are treating me with regard—why should I not respond with the same?" As Christ approaches with His winsome appeal and gentle entreaty, I open like a flower to sunshine.

Perhaps you've felt a similar sense of compliance when, on occasion, someone politely requested something of you. Do you remember the power of their positive persuasion and the pleasure you felt at complying? What a willingness welled up within you, all because of a

gracious approach! Such is the appeal of One who rules by love. Our reverence for Him is born of respect, for has He not shown consideration for us? His regard compels us to obey.

Opposite the approach Christ used, is the method employed by some well-meaning theologians, who in their zealous attempt to influence others to righteousness, "thunder from Mount Sinai." The result? People sometimes choose to submit through dread and fear, or else raise a resistance.

Such a response underscores the need for wisdom in how the Word of God is presented. As Prov. 11:30 declares, "...He that winneth souls is wise."

One consultant, paid to tell people what to do, said "Most listeners raise their defenses and become guarded when other people try to tell them what to do or claim to know what's best for them. The tendency to resist advice may not make sense," he said, "but it's human nature."

With that in mind, it would be well to work to create a climate of compliance.

Think about it. Maybe you recall an experience of your own when you were approached in an agressive or accusatory manner. If so, you probably felt defensive or resentful, or perhaps

Our lost baggage was found; Roberta sprained her ankle but the Lord blessed by removing the pain and making her able to walk despite the swelling. It's been a great help for Linda to be here too. ## **WEST AFRICAN TRIP REPORT**

Greetings to all the saints in Jesus' name. I am very thankful for the blessings of God on my recent trip to Africa. God has proven His mercy and power, and He is truly worthy to be praised.

I left for Africa on November 29th and spent time in Ghana and Nigeria. I returned home on December 25th well in body and blessed in my soul.

The saints in Ghana are encouraged and there have been souls saved in all three congregations since last year. I baptized about 17 new converts. While I was in Akumadan, we had Bible studies, answered questions and had service at each of the congregations. On the last Sunday I was in Ghana, the congregations from Tanaso and Tadieso came to Akumadan so we could all worship the Lord together.

Bro. Maxwell, the pastor in Akumadan, has a physical disability in his legs. Approximately 17 years ago Sis. Dorothy Keizer purchased a motorcycle and had a three-wheeled machine built for Bro. Maxwell. The machine was very old and in poor working order. I spent a day in the city of Kumasi and purchased a motorcycle, a heavy metal sheet, and other parts for a mechanic to build a new machine to replace Bro. Maxwell's old one. Part of the funds for this project came from money that had been donated last year from the operation of the concession stand at Monark.

The saints in Ghana need continued prayer that they will grow spiritually and be rooted and grounded in the truth. The ministers there are also worthy of our prayers and support as they labor for the furtherance of the gospel.

After leaving Ghana and flying to Nigeria, I had a few days in Lagos that I spent with Bro. Essien and his family. I had time to study, pray and rest; and it proved to be a blessing to me both physically and spiritually. Bro. Essien and I traveled on an all night bus from Lagos to Port Harcourt. In the middle of the night, the axle on

the bus broke. It was the mercy of the Lord that it broke right as we were pulling into a bus station. The roads that we were traveling are treacherous and dangerous, and we were thankful that God "kept" the bus until we were at a convenient place for a breakdown. There was another bus at the station to which we were able to transfer. We arrived in Port Harcourt on Sunday morning and were in service with Bro. Igbanibo and the saints there.

We then traveled to the village of Asana where I spent the rest of my time. The congregations in the Asana area lost their way a number of years ago. The Lord is beginning to do a work in that place. We had Bible studies and question/answer sessions on three consecutive mornings with the ministers and gospel workers. It proved to be a real blessing and their desire is to grow and prosper. The convention in Asana was held from December 20-23. There were over 500 people in attendance the first night and many souls were saved. The Lord continued to be faithful throughout the meeting. Bro. Igbanibo and some of the saints from Port Harcourt came to Asana to help support the meeting. We concluded the convention on Sunday, December 23rd, with the Lord's Supper.

Bro. Igbanibo recently hosted a ministers' meeting of brethren from around the country of Nigeria in the interest of unity and fellowship. They plan to have another meeting in a few months. I firmly believe that God is doing a work in Nigeria to bring about the unity of faith and Spirit. There are needs and problems and the enemy will do everything he can to hinder spiritual progress. I encourage every reader to please pray that every stronghold of the enemy be broken down, that the Spirit of God could move as He desires. The brethren in Nigeria desire to eventually hold a national camp meeting. This effort is worthy of our support. They are looking forward to the day that a number of saints from America who are established in the way will come and be with them in services.

There are many needs in the gospel work in Africa as there are in other foreign works. The work is great but I thank God that He is in control. Lord help us each one to do our part and hear the voice of the Spirit. I thank each of you who carried a burden for me, my family, and the efforts in Africa while I was gone. Your prayers were not in vain and I thank God.

I thank God for this opportunity to write. I want to thank God for the success, last December, of the convention in Asana. I thank Him also for bringing Bro. Michael Smith safe and sound down to be with us in fellowship during the convention, and for taking him back to the United States in good health. I really thank God for what He used Bro. Smith to accomplish during the short stay in Nigeria. The Lord really used him as a pastor and as an evangelist in handling the teaching on the general theme of the convention—LIBERATED UNTO HOLINESS. Souls were liberated and are determined to be marching on in holiness. It is our prayer that the tempo be maintained and improved upon on a daily basis.

Bro. Smith and I worshipped in Port Harcourt Church on Sunday, December 16th, 2001, before proceeding to Asana that evening. Bro. Smith had three days teachings in Asana, on the doctrines of the Bible from Monday, December 17th, 2001 until Wednesday, December 19th, 2001. This was primarily for the elders and workers in the church. It was a blessed and very refreshing moment in the presence of the Lord. The convention proper took off on the evening of December 20th. The first night had an attendance of 509 people. This increased steadily to 1,812 people on Saturday night and to 2,341 on Sunday, the last day of the convention. Souls were saved as they surrendered their lives to Christ. It is on record that 67 people answered the altar call to surrender their lives to Christ in the first night of the meeting and many other souls were added in subsequent days, increasing steadily to 108 altogether on Saturday. The ordinance of Holy Communion was observed Sunday, December 23rd, 2001. and that was the last day of the convention. Brethren from Port Harcourt, Tombia and Kwale came all the way to join up with the 15 congregations in the Asana area in the convention. We

were very delighted to have them around to strengthen the work of God in that area of the mission field. Continue to pray for the work over here.

Bro. Michael Smith had an opportunity to see the pupils in the adult education program while in session. This is mainly made up of people who did not have a formal education but want to be able to read the Bible. A good majority of the elderly people in the locality fall into this category. The school currently has two teachers, Bro. Udo Emmanson and Sis. Imaobong Benson and the number on role was over 30 as of last December. This is an outreach arm of the Pruitt Foundation for the poor and needy which we do pray should take off as the Lord will provide for it. We covet your prayers.

With increase in awareness and acceptance of the gospel over here, the work load is expanding and more evangelism tools are needed. Bro. U.M. Akpan can no longer cope with the field work all alone. We are praying that the Lord should provide more workers and the necessary tools for the sustenance of the work in this area. We really solicit your prayers for this work....

Where's the Balance?

**Question:** What does the phrase "things under the earth" in Philippians 2:10 mean?

Answer: The verse in question says: "That at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of things in heaven, and things in earth, and things under the earth."

The first thing to note about this verse is that the word "things" is italicized, indicating it was added by the translators. A straight rendering of the scripture from the Greek reads, "So that in the name of Jesus every knee should bend of heavenlies and of earthlies and of underground ones." So this verse does not apply to inanimate objects, or things, but to people.

In naming heaven and earth and "under the earth," the apostle is expressing the thought that everyone everywhere, whether alive or dead, will bow before Christ on the day of judgment.

John the Revelator offered a similar expres-

sion in Rev. 5:13. "And every creature which is in heaven, and on the earth, and under the earth, and such as are in the sea, and all that are in them, heard I saying, Blessing, and honour, and glory, and power, be unto him that sitteth upon the throne, and unto the Lamb for ever and ever."

The translation for the Greek word used by Paul means: subterranean. The definition of subterranean means: beneath the earth's surface.

It might seem that Paul was being redundant by referring both to those in heaven and those in the grave. John might seem redundant also, for he mentioned those under the earth and those in the sea. But indications are that both Paul and John wanted to make it plain no one would be unaware of the dominion of Jesus Christ.

a little hurt. It's probably safe to say you failed to enjoy the experience. Did it inspire you to obey? Through fear or compulsion you may have opted to comply, or perhaps you were one of those who planted your toes and refused to budge.

Sometimes we do not realize how important our tone of approach is in conversing in general. Whether parenting or teaching or opinionating, we can fail to realize how we project ourselves, and overlook the effect we have on our listeners. Sometimes we even forget our manners in our zeal for a righteous cause. To bully is to raise resistance to the acceptance of a message and makes us our own worst enemy. But it need not be so.

How about this challenge? What if we conformed our methods to those of Christ—His tone and approach in sharing the Gospel? One of the best ways to understand His ministry is to study the record of it in the gospels.

Matthew offers a great deal of insight and inspiration regarding Christ's conduct toward the common people. In particular, consider the sermon on the mount, laden with "blesseds." (Matt. 5:3-11.) Consider also His invitation to "Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden,..." Matt. 11:28, and "...Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men." Matt. 4:19. (Fishermen offer enticing bait.)

Christ's ministry was also one of comfort, as

in "Jesus went about...teaching...and preaching the gospel of the kingdom, and healing..." Matt. 4:23.

A description of His ministry can also be found in a prophecy of Isaiah, which said, "Behold my servant, whom I have chosen; my beloved, in whom my soul is well pleased: I will put my spirit upon him,... He shall not strive, nor cry; neither shall any man hear his voice in the streets. A bruised reed shall he not break, and smoking flax shall he not quench, till he send forth judgment unto victory." Matt. 12:17-20.

Christ's outreach even included a loving invitation to little children. Matt. 19:13-15. "Suffer little children, and forbid them not, to come unto me: for of such is the kingdom of heaven. And he laid his hands on them,..." (He was approachable.)
