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The Bridegroom, the Bride and Beyond

"The bells are now ringing, There's love in the air, A lovely young couple is waiting to share. The joy found together..." So begins a wedding song that describes the joy of a man and woman coming together to be joined as one. The atmosphere is charged with anticipation of something precious about to happen. The sweet glow on the bride's face and the excited smile on the groom's lips are for each other. All they want to see is each other, to say the vows that make them one, to kiss and to leave alone for their honeymoon.

Marriage is honorable. (Hebrews 13:4.) God performed the first wedding ceremony when He gave Eve to Adam. Jesus referred to this union when He said, "...Have ye not read, that he which made them at the beginning made them male and female, And said, For this cause shall a man leave father and mother, and shall cleave to his wife: and they twain shall be one flesh? Wherefore they are no more twain, but one

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flesh. What therefore God hath joined together, let not man put asunder." Matthew 19:4-6. From the words of Jesus we know that marriage is between one man and one woman joined together for a lifetime.

Before marriage, there is a deep admiration for each other. The admiration becomes respect and honor, part of the wedding vows. "...Do you promise to love, cherish and honor, her/him...in sickness and in health; in poverty or in wealth; for better or for worse; and forsaking all others keep her/him only unto thyself so long as you both shall live?" When the man and woman have made binding promises of commitment to each other before God and the present witnesses, they are joined together in a sacred covenant. God records that covenant and He blesses the husband and wife who do as they promised and cherish one another until death separates them.

There is significance in the modest, long white dress adorning the bride on her glorious wedding day. A white, spotless dress—a pure, clean heart of the bride, they are to be one and the same. If the bride brings something less than virginity to the marriage altar, she has already put a crack in the love, cherish and honor of the marriage vows. Likewise, the bridegroom has the responsibility to bring godly integrity and purity to the marriage altar. On this purity of heart lays the foundation of a happy marriage.

The Webster Dictionary defines purity as: the quality or condition of being pure; (a) freedom

from adulterating matter (b) cleanness; clearness (c) innocence or chastity (d) freedom from elements regarded as corrupting. Using this definition as a reference, let's look at the purity in a marriage.

To remain faithfully committed to the wedding vows, the bride and groom must stay free of adulterating matter of the world. The songs, movies, advertisements, etc. of the world glamorize cheating on your spouse. The night club life of dancing and drinking alcohol, divorce and heartbreak portray images of marriage that are inferior to what God ordained for a happy marriage. A God-fearing couple will turn off these harmful elements and prevent them from slipping into their thoughts and attitudes. Because our society bombards the mind continually with wickedness, Christian men and women must tune their minds toward heavenly thoughts. The initial thoughts of evil will enter the mind, but we choose what we dwell or meditate upon.

Evil forces against pure thoughts have been in the world since Eve obeyed satan and enticed Adam to sin also. The pattern has always been that thoughts become attitudes which put on actions that speak of who we are as a person. A respectable person will guard against the corrupt media and flaunted wickedness lived around us daily, and think on the things that are true, honest, just, pure, lovely and of a good report. (Philippians 4:8.) Divine help through the Holy Spirit gives the necessary resistance against evil and strength to live righteous in this world of darkness. (I Corinthians 2:12.)

This purity of the heart and mind is vital to the intimacy of a married couple. It keeps the marriage bed clean or undefiled. (Hebrews 13:4.) Jesus spoke strongly against adultery and deceit when He said, "Ye have heard that it was said by them of old time, Thou shalt not commit adultery: But I say unto you, That whosoever looketh on a woman to lust after her hath committed adultery with her already in his

heart." (Matthew 5:27-28.) The devil knows the damage a glance at nudity can cause on the mind and he has made corrupt magazines easily available in nearly any store in our nation. Besides that, the media flashes perverted propaganda wherever possible, and the internet can invade the home with deceptive secrecy to spoil purity. This is only a scratch uncovering the cruelity and crime of child/adult pornography marketed in the world today. The Word of God cries out against such horror and for this cause He will bring this world to judgment and damnation. (II Peter 2:4-9.)

The scriptures compare a husband and wife relationship to that of Christ and His Church. Amidst all this worldly filth, the Lord is looking for a pure Bride; one without spot or wrinkle, or any such thing; one that is holy and without blemish. (Ephesians 5:26-27.) The bridegroom, Jesus Christ, has cleansed His bride with His blood and sanctified her with His Holy Spirit. He has lived a pure life before her, and when He comes for the final marriage feast, He is looking for His Bride to be clothed in white purity of heart. (I John 3:3; Revelation 21:2.) As the evening darkness thickens before the wedding ceremony, so the whiteness of the Bride's modest wedding dress will call attention to her purity.

The Bride of Christ is guarding her heart, keeping it pure and unspotted from the world. Anxiously waiting for that glorious moment when the Bridegroom shall burst through the clouds and claim His chosen Redeemed. Do you not feel the atmosphere charged with anticipation, for the time is drawing very near? "And the Spirit and the bride say, Come. And let him that heareth say, Come. And let him that is athirst come. And whosoever will, let him take the water of life freely." (Revelation 22:17.) Those prepared and watching with their lamps trimmed and burning say, "... The Importance of Our Promises

"Hope deferred maketh the heart sick: but when the desire cometh, it is a tree of life." Proverbs 13:12.

"What shall I do, for my people are starving?" David asked God. "There's been three long years without rain and no rain is in sight." "It's because of a broken promise." God told David. "The promise Joshua made to the Gibeonites." (II Samuel 21.)

Do you have a son or daughter that is rebelling? It might be related to a broken promise. It might have been one made many years ago.

There was a son who had been a very obedient child but in his teen years he began showing signs of rebellion. The parents were hurt and sought to find out what had happened to cause this change.

After praying daily for several months about the situation, the father decided to take the boy out for lunch and open up the subject. First, he made small talk about school, his friends, etc. Then the father asked questions about his son's interests and about what he planned to do in the future. Then he told the son that he loved him very much and asked forgiveness for anything he had done to offend the son.

The father was surprised when the son said, "Dad, do you remember the time you promised to take me fishing? That morning I got up and had my fishing gear ready before the sun came up. Mom told me that someone in the congregation needed your help. I waited on the porch until the sun went down. You never came for me nor called to explain the situation.

"Every hour I became more bitter as I thought of other times similar things had happened. I was convinced others were more important to you than me. I also concluded that others were more important to God because He didn't answer my prayer that you would return so we could go on the fishing trip. Why should I strive to please either you or Him?"

The father had a hard time remembering the occasion. He was a busy minister, but he also worked another job so his family could have what they needed. Wasn't that proving his love to his son? How could a child not appreciate what he was doing, and excuse him for not keeping those little appointments that he had made?

King David's generation was suffering drought because of a promise made many years before by another leader, Joshua, who had led the people into Canaan. Their first battle with Jericho was a great success, but the second was not successful because soldier Achan had broken his promise to God. After Achan had admitted his sin and God's wrath was appeased, then Ai was easily conquered.

The people of Gibeon, in another area of Canaan, heard what had happened to Jericho and Ai. They feared what might happen to them so they drew up a plan for their protection. They gathered worn out shoes, ragged clothes, old wine bottles and threadbare sacks. With these they dressed their leaders and their families. Moreover they packed moldy bread for the journey and set out to visit Joshua.

"We have traveled from a distant land," they said, "Our shoes (now falling apart) were new when we started out, so were our clothes, our wine bottles and sacks. This moldy bread we took fresh from our ovens the day we left."

Immediately, Joshua and his princes felt sorry for the poor travelers and took them in. Not only did they give immediate assistance, but without counseling with God they promised the Gibeonites residence in the land of Canaan.

Three days after the league was made, it was discovered that the Gibeonites were nextdoor neighbors. The promise was made, so it had to be kept. The Gibeonites lived among the Israelites for many years. Although they served as servants, they were as thorns continually pricking them.

More than 200 years later Saul became king of Israel. After learning of the trouble the Gibeonites had caused his people, he had many of them killed. David became king after Saul and during his reign a drought came. King David inquired of the Lord the reason for the drought. God answered, "It is because Saul broke the promise with the Gibeonites."

We might think that after all those years God had forgotten, but He had not. God's commandment to not make a league with any nation in the land of Canaan had been broken when the league was made; but nonetheless the league had to be kept. "You must be reconciled with the Gibeonites before I will answer your prayers," God said. King David made restitution and God sent rain.

We can readily see that the percentage of saved children coming from Christian parents is not very high. Are these children offended because of unkept promises? How often parents make promises just to get the child "out of their hair" at the moment. That's a good way to keep the child heavy on your heart for years to come.

Maybe the promise was made long ago and we have forgotten it. Has the child forgotten it or is he or she holding in there mind an offense against you? Is someone else offended because we have not kept a promise? Does your child know about a promise you made to your spouse that has not been kept? He or she might be resentful because of that.

Do you have a son or daughter growing bitter against you and the church because of a broken promise or promises? Rebellion is often caused because of offenses growing into bitterness. Take some time with your daughter. Try taking that troubled son out to lunch and find out if the roots of rebellion might have sprouted in you.

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
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"And he answering said तु unto him, Lord, let it alone this year also, till I shall dig Editorials 2 about it, and dung it. And if it bear fruit, well: and if not, then after that thou

shalt cut it down." Luke 13:8-9.

There were many people living during the time Jesus was on this earth who had a high profession of religion and yet were not bearing the W.... kind of fruit in their life that God was

looking for. This example shows how longsuffering the Lord is in dealing with mankind and how every opportunity is given to him to bring forth righteous fruit before his pilgrimage in this world ends. God is looking for righteous fruit from mankind today also. This illustration should be taken as a warning for the unrighteous man as well as the professing Christian. If our lives remain unfruitful, then we will be taken out of God's kingdom and those who are not in God's kingdom when they leave this world will be eternally separated from God's presence. When one understands the serious implications of being removed from the kingdom it should encourage that individual to give heed to their personal life and see that they are bearing fruit for the Master.

If a minister of God were to "dig" about the members of his congregation it would probably result in protests by the ones who need it the most. Generally these individuals have a dry, crusty cloak of religion wrapped around them and if one were to peer into the heart, beneath that cloak, they would likely find "hidden" things that do not bring approval from the eyes of the Lord. Protests, such as, "That is just Bro. or Sis. so-and-so's opinion," "Why don't they mind their own business," or "if the Lord would show me that, then I would measure up." These things are very likely to be uttered, either to others or to themselves. Once they have expressed their words of this nature, then they draw the rags of self-righteousness more tightly about them and continue in their fruitless existence. Failure to be receptive of godly counsel and righteous instruction has caused many to be removed from the King's garden-not by man, but by God.

A reasonable question might be "Is it possible for one to be in the Kingdom of God and not bear fruit?" The answer would have to be. "perhaps, for awhile." One would likely come into this condition by once having an experience and then allowing it to grow stale. We know that when outright sin is committed and that individual turns from the Lord, they are out of His Kingdom immediately. However, there are some who drift into a state of fruitlessness over a period of time. They still maintain their testimony but their lives have become barren of spiritual fruit. The longsuffering nature of our heavenly Father, Who is not willing that any should perish, sends His Holy Spirit to work with them and causes them to become productive.

Let us look at the fruits of the Spirit and consider what some of the hindrances might be for one to bear this fruit. All of us enjoy being around those who abound with these precious fruits. They spill over and bless saint and sinner alike and God would be pleased to see more of it produced by His people.

"But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, Meekness, temperance: against such there is no law." Galatians 5:22-23.

Elevation of "self" is generally the culprit that causes one to have a spiritual crop failure. Many of these fruits require "giving" as a basis for their maturity. When one becomes self-consumed, their giving slows down and their fruit dries up. Giving of oneself encompasses so many aspects of life, it includes our time, talents, companionship, financial and material blessings, abilities, knowledge, wisdom, influence, even our goals and ambitions.

Self can show up under different names. One of those is preoccupation. This can enter a person's life so innocently and gradually that it takes the spirit of the Lord to reveal it's detrimental effects. Generally this will occur with things that are considered, "necessary" in life and then carry over into things that are not really necessary but "desirable." When this happens and our focus is shifted to center on these things that are only desirable, perhaps our mind is still thinking "necessary," our fruit is diminished.

Jesus listed three things in Mark 4:19 that should be considered, "And the cares of this world, and the deceitfulness of riches, and the lusts of other things entering in, choke the word, and it becometh unfruitful." How careful we should be to not allow these things that are existing all around us to take control of our life and become the object of our affections.

Doubts and worry will also cause some of our fruit to go sour. It will especially steal our joy and it works contrary to faith. The other fruits will also be affected by these nagging problems.

There is a valuable wealth of counsel on this subject given in II Peter 1:5-8. It says, "And beside this, giving all diligence, add to your faith virtue; and to virtue knowledge; And to knowledge temperance; and to temperance patience; and to patience godliness; And to godliness brotherly kindness; and to brotherly kindness charity. For if these things be in you, and abound, they make you that ye shall neither be barren nor unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ." May the Lord help us give "all diligence" to keep the Lord the central object of our heart and give ourselves completely into His hands to be used for His glory. It will take work on our part to continually add these good things to our life but as the scripture says, we will not be "barren nor unfruitful" if we do. The Spirit of the Lord will work through a vessel that is totally yielded into His hands and the precious fruit will bless all who come into contact with them and one day they will hear their Father say, "...Well done, good and faithful servant;...enter thou into the joy of thy lord."
