A BELIEVER'S BAPTISM

"Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins...." —Acts 2:38

In the early 1500s, the flames of reformation were kindled and spread rapidly through Europe as God began to restore the knowledge of Biblical truths. The world had been in relative spiritual night from the dark, papal reign of the Roman Catholic church who had apostatized the truth of the early morning church. The Protestant Reformation, beginning in Germany with Martin Luther in 1517, grew as people began to see the fallacy of Catholicism. Many of the reformers, while not seeing all the light, were getting pockets and rays of truth on various doctrines and practices.

Conrad Grebel and Felix Manz were young men who studied under the reformer, Ulrich Zwingli, in Zurich, Switzerland. They severed ties with him over the long-standing Catholic practice of infant baptism, which was contrary to the practice of the New Testament church. Grebel and Manz, amongst

others, received light and understanding that water baptism was for those who had repented of their sins and been born again. They advocated a "believer's baptism" and taught that



candidates for baptism should make their own confessions of faith. They rejected infant baptism because infants can neither repent nor believe, so they should not be baptized.

There is no scriptural support for infant baptism nor are there examples of it in the Bible. It appears that infant baptism probably began in the late second century and gained widespread acceptance by the middle of the third century. The practice gained popularity as it was falsely taught that infants would be lost to hell and that baptism itself saves from sin. Water baptism does

not save the soul. Infants are innocent before God because there has been no willful transgression and they will go to heaven if they die.

Infant baptism has done a great disservice to many. Children grow up thinking that they will go to Heaven because they were baptized as infants, and yet as adults they live very sinful lives. People need to be washed in the blood of

Jesus and should not lean on the crutch of infant baptism.

Those who took a stand against infant baptism and advocated a believer's baptism became known as Anabaptists (one who baptizes over again). The first baptism was the infant baptism which was unscriptural. The second baptism, or "re-baptism," was the believer's baptism.

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The Anabaptists were persecuted by both the Roman Catholics and the Protestants for baptizing adults. Felix Manz suffered much persecution and was imprisoned numerous times for preaching about baptism. On March 7, 1526, the Zurich council in Switzerland passed an edict that made adult rebaptism punishable by drowning. Manz was once again placed in prison. Upon being released, he continued to baptize and preach. Manz was faithful and obedient to not compromise this truth in the face of great opposition.

On December 3, 1526, Manz was arrested again and placed in the Wellenberg prison. On January 5, 1527, he was sentenced to death by drowning. Death by drowning became known as the "third baptism." As Manz was led to the Limmat River, with a loud voice he praised God and testified to the people. A minister walked beside Manz encouraging him to recant his beliefs. In the distance, his mother and brothers encouraged him to stand firm and suffer for Jesus' sake. Manz's hands were bound and pulled between his knees and a stick placed between them to immobilize him. He was then tipped into the water and drowned as the first Anabaptist martyr. His alleged last words were, "Into thy hands, O God, I commend my spirit."

The truth of a believer's baptism did not come cheaply. God be thanked for restoring this beautiful truth to His people and for those who were willing to lay down their lives for its preservation. May the ordinance of baptism continue to be valued and respected among God's people.

Scripture Reading: Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. —Matthew 28:19

Summary: Believers in Jesus Christ are commanded to be baptized by water. This obedient act of immersion under water symbolizes death, resurrection and the changed spiritual life that occurs through the actual cleansing of the blood of Jesus.

Definition of Baptism: From the Greek word *baptizo* which means to dip, to immerse, to submerge, to overwhelm.

WATER BAPTISM

Companion article for Bible Study

JESUS SET AN EXAMPLE

John the Baptist plunged Jesus under the water in baptism. As Jesus broke the surface of the water coming up, the heavens opened and the Holy Spirit descended upon Christ like a dove. A voice spoke from Heaven: "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased" (Matthew 3:15-17). Some of the last words Jesus spoke to His disciples were instructions to go and teach all nations and to baptize the believers (Matthew 28:19-20).

BAPTISM IS AN ORDINANCE

There are very few outward rituals or ceremonies to be observed in the New Testament. Baptism is symbolic in nature and was commanded and exemplified by Christ. It

is therefore one of three ordinances that Christians are instructed to observe in this dispensation.

Baptism is closely tied to the divine work of salvation. "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved" (Mark 16:16). God desires every repentant person to be baptized. On the day of Pentecost, the people asked Peter what

they should do when they were convicted of their sins. "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins..." he replied (Acts 2:37-38). Baptism is not to be taken casually but is to be respected as a divine ordinance from the Lord.

BIBLE EXAMPLES OF BAPTISM

The early morning church taught and practiced baptism. On the day of Pentecost, about three thousand souls were saved and baptized (Acts 2:41). Philip preached to the Samaritans and the men and women who were converted were baptized (Acts 8:12). The apostle Paul was baptized shortly after his conversion experience on the road to Damascus (Acts 9:17-18). The gentiles of the

House of Cornelius followed the Lord Jesus' example in baptism (Acts 10:44-48). The Corinthians who repented were baptized, as were the disciples at Ephesus. The keeper of the prison, who had watch over Paul and Silas, yielded his life to Jesus and was saved and baptized that very night (Acts 16:30-33). Almost 2000 years later, this same practice of baptism is still being observed by true followers of Jesus Christ.

ONE IMMERSION

Jesus instructed his disciples to baptize "...in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost" (Matthew 28:19). One immersion in the name of the three parts of God follows the instructions of Christ in the actual observance of baptism.



"He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved."

Mark 16:16

PRACTICED ONLY BY BELIEVERS

Baptism is not for infants nor for the unsaved seeking membership in a church. The scripture teaches a "believer's baptism." An individual is to repent of sin and be saved before being baptized. Those who were baptized on the Day of Pentecost were those who had received the Word. Baptism is inexorably linked with belief. When Philip shared the gospel with the Ethiopian, the eunuch asked: "What doth hinder me to be baptized?" Philip said, "If thou believest with all thine heart, thou mayest" (Acts 8:36-37). Repentance and belief in the saving power of the Lord Jesus are prerequisites or

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qualifications for baptism. If someone does not believe and repent first, baptism will be of no value. It is damaging to the true meaning and purpose of baptism when infants and unbelievers are baptized with the hope of attaining salvation.

BAPTISM DOES NOT SAVE THE SINNER

Water baptism does not wash away sin from a life. There is no spiritual cleansing accomplished by baptism. Only "...the

blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin" (1 John 1:7). An unsaved person who is baptized will come up out of the water just as sinful as when he went under. Salvation and heart cleansing only come from the divine grace of salvation through the blood of Christ. A man could be baptized 20

times and be just as sinful unless there was a spiritual birth. If there is not death to sin, baptism becomes a dead ceremony without validity.

A SYMBOL OF DEATH AND RESURRECTION

Baptism is a symbol of the death, burial, and resurrection of the Lord. It is a ceremonial representation of the change that has taken place in the life of the person who has been born again. "Know ye not, that so many of us as were baptized into Jesus Christ were baptized into his death? Therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life" (Romans 6:3-4). As someone goes under the water, it symbolizes the spiritual burial of the old life of sin. When he comes out of the water, it represents the resurrected life of freedom from sin in Christ Jesus. There is no actual cleansing in the water but it is a symbol and testimony of the

previous cleansing of the blood. There is a sealing experience that happens through obedience to the Word.

BAPTISM IS FULL IMMERSION

The Biblical word "baptism" comes from the Greek word baptizo. By definition it means to dip, immerse, or to submerge. The definition itself bears witness that baptism, as taught in the scripture, is full immersion under water. Many religious movements practice sprinkling or the pouring of water over an individual for baptism. This is contrary to the teaching and plan of Jesus. Pouring and

sprinkling fall short of the beautiful symbolic nature of baptism. Full immersion represents clearly the total life change that comes from being buried and resurrected with Christ.

Full immersion baptism was practiced in Bible times.
John the Baptist baptized in the river Jordon (Mark 1:5).

The passage in John 3:22-23 states that John baptized where there was much water. This would be needless if one were baptizing by sprinkling or pouring. Philip and the eunuch "went down into the water" (Acts 8:38). Most importantly, Christ himself left an example of being fully immersed under the water in baptism (Matthew 3:16-17).

OUTWARD TESTIMONY OF AN INWARD WORK

Baptism is an outward testimony of an inward work of God. It is "the answer of a good conscience toward God" (1 Peter 3:21). Baptism does not bestow a good conscience but is an act of obedience and a statement of clearness before God. People who follow the Lord in baptism are declaring before all that they are new creatures in Christ and that they are now a part of the family of God. Baptism, as a public confession of faith, is a wonderful, outward act that demonstrates a new identity in Christ—no longer a servant of the world but a child of God.

1. Can people go to Heaven if they have not been baptized?

"Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God" (John 3:3). People will go to Heaven who have been born again and saved by the grace of God. We are not saved by works or by outward observances but by faith (Ephesians 2:8-9). Therefore, we are not saved by the physical act of baptism. There will be people in Heaven who have not been baptized by water, but they will have been forgiven of their sins by the blood of Jesus.

This is exemplified by the thief on the cross. "And he said unto Jesus, Lord, remember me when thou comest into thy kingdom. And Jesus said unto him, Verily I say unto thee, To day shalt thou be with me in paradise" (Luke 23:42-43). The thief had a conversion experience on the cross and never had opportunity to be baptized. Jesus accepted him and stated that he would be in paradise. There are people who have time to pray for salvation, but may not have time in life or be in a physical condition to be baptized. They will not be hindered from entering Heaven.

However, it is disobedience if someone chooses not to be baptized when there is opportunity. This would constitute sin and would result in a loss of salvation.

2. Why did Peter tell people on multiple occasions to be baptized in the name of Jesus? Does this contradict Christ's teaching to be baptized in the Trinitarian formula?

Jesus clearly taught the ministry in Matthew 28:19 to baptize "in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost."



Peter told the people on the Day of Pentecost "to be baptized...in the name of Jesus Christ" (Acts 2:38). Speaking to the house of Cornelius, Peter "commanded them to be baptized in the name of the Lord" (Acts 10:48). He was not contradicting the teaching of Jesus but was distinguishing the Christian baptism from other baptisms of the time. Further, and possibly even more noteworthy, is the fact that many people believed in God but rejected Jesus as His son; hence, the specificity of being baptized in the name of Jesus who is the fullness of the Godhead bodily (Colossians 2:9). Those who once rejected Christ were instructed to make a public profession of their belief in Jesus as

their Savior and to profess that they were now disciples of Christ.

Peter's instructions did not negate the Trinitarian formula but placed emphasis on that which had been neglected. It is right and scriptural to baptize in the Trinitarian formula.

3. Should someone be rebaptized if they leave a false church to be in fellowship with God's true people?

A baptism that is not a "believer's baptism" is not in accordance with the scripture. Infant baptism or being baptized when there is still sin in the life undermines the very purpose and testimony of baptism. An individual would need to be re-baptized once he was truly saved from sin and had a born-again experience.

Salvation is what brings someone into the Church of God and into fellowship with God's people. While a believer's baptism may have occurred in a false denomination, God honors the obedience of that baptism as He does the work of salvation. When people leave a false church to be in fellowship with God's true people, there is often a desire to renounce the system of religion where they used to be members. Part of that testimony may be in being re-baptized. While it is not specifically required in the Bible, it is understandable why someone would want to make that clear declaration of freedom from false religion to the world through baptism again. To be re-baptized after leaving a false church is a decision that is left for individuals to make as they are led by the Holy Spirit. -mws



The practice of water baptism was not foreign to the Jews when John the Baptist began to preach the baptism of repentance. In the Old Testament period of time, baptism was a ritual of conversion to Judaism. Pagans would become proselytes though the ceremonial practice of baptism in order to become part of and to be identified with the Jewish people.



Give Them Warning

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Holiness Unto the Lord

Son of man, I have made thee a watchman unto the house of Israel: therefore hear the word at my mouth, and give them warning from me. —Ezekiel 3:17

If you are a true minister of the gospel, God has set you as a watchman to His people. You are a sentinel to stand guard over the ministry to which you have been entrusted. Your ministry is not a profession but a calling from God and a commit-

ment to the people. Listen to the Spirit of God and let the Word of God have preeminence in everything you teach and preach.

When the enemy is at work and souls are at stake, give warning from the Lord. Do not be afraid to sound the alarm and expose the enemy. People like to hear those things which comfort and encourage them. Those are necessary and important but not to the neglect of godly warnings. Many families and congregations have compromised truth because ministers neglected their duty to sound the alarm.



You are an ambassador for Christ, a representative of God. You are to feed, teach, admonish, and warn the flock. Love the people and sacrifice for them. Set an example of holiness and purity. When the trial is hot and things are difficult, remember that you are a minister of the Lord. He will stand by His own and help and strengthen you as you stay faithful.
