Bible Lessons for Adults and Young People

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Theme for First Quarter, 1981

Here is a series of Bible Studies for this quarter that we shall entitle The Fundamental Truths of the Christian Faith. These are vital, indispensable doctrines, foundation stones sealed by the Almighty for the preservation and promotion of His great cause. GOD ALMIGHTY, THE CREATOR

Genesis 1:1 In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth.

2 And the earth was without form, and void; and darkness was upon the face of the deep. And the Spirit of God moved upon the face of the waters.

Psalms 33:6 By the word of the Lord were the heavens made; and all the host of them by the breath of His mouth.

- 7 He gathereth the waters of the sea together as an heap: He layeth up the depth in storehouses.
- 8 Let all the earth fear the Lord: let all the inhabitants of the world stand in awe of him.
- 9 For He spake, and it was done; He commanded, and it stood fast.

Psalm 24:1 The earth is the Lord's, and the fullness thereof; the world, and they that dwell therein.

2 For He hath founded it upon the seas, and established it upon the floods.

Psalm 104:1 Bless the Lord, O my soul. O Lord my God, thou art very great; thou art clothed with honour and majesty.

Memory Verse: Thou art worthy, O Lord, to receive glory and honour and power: for Thou hast created all things, and for Thy pleasure they are and were created. Revelation 4:11.

Central Thought: The Almighty God created the heavens, the earth, and everything therein. He created mankind for His pleasure, and upholds all creation by the power of His Word.

Word Definitions: Create: to make something out of absolutely nothing. The Spirit of God Moved: The Hebrew word for "moved" is that which means to overshadow or to "brood." What a beautiful and encouraging thought that God created the earth and mankind with a love and kindness and much forethought!

LESSON BACKGROUND

What a difference there is in being fully persuaded that the earth and the heavens were the work of the great Jehovah God, and in thinking, or theorizing, that all these things came about through a process called evolution! It makes all the difference in the world. When we really look at everything as being backed by a God of love and tender mercy, and when we can be persuaded that we ourselves are the handiwork of a God so just and righteous that we need not be afraid to come to Him and accept His goodness, it gives us great consolation and courage to face life and live successfully. Perhaps we take for granted this thought—believing in God is the foundation of our church faith. But let us today give new and more earnest consideration to the value of our faith concerning the creation. What if we were not the creation of God? What if there really were no God? Think how different life would be! Think how empty and meaningless everything would be. What if there were no uniform and faithful force upholding and controlling everything? How uncertain and shaky would be our existence! From the various writers in Holy Scriptures, we have taken several clear-cut decisive statements concerning the truths of God in the creation. These writers wrote under

the inspiration of the Holy Spirit. Open your heart, and let your very inmost being feel the weight and the impact of these words. Visualize the Spirit of God brooding over the vast. empty chaos of space and waters. Think of the words: The deep, darkness, without form, void. What a hopeless mass! But look! Something is moving. See in the distance a light beginning to spring forth. What is that light shining in the darkness? See if you can compare this to the new creation that is brought forth when God recreates a soul that has been marred by Satan and sin. Think of the decline of the law system and the apostasy of Israel. Look at the darkness overshadowing mankind in the dark days of the captivity in Babylon. But a light is beginning to shine. The Sun of righteousness arises out of the dark sea of human despair. Oh. how we can rejoice in a creating God! How He can take the broken pieces of our lives and make them anew!

THE HOLY THREE IN ONE

Genesis 1:26 And God said, Let us make man in our image, after our likeness: and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the fowl of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the earth, and over every creeping thing that creepeth upon the earth.

1 John 5:7 For there are three that bear record in heaven, the Father, the Word, and the Holy Ghost: and these three are one.

Matt. 3:16 And Jesus, when he was baptized, went up straightway out of the water: and, lo, the heavens were opened unto him, and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove, and lighting upon him:

17 And lo a voice from heaven, saying, This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased.

John 5:17 But Jesus answered them, My Father worketh hitherto, and I work.

- 18 Therefore the Jews sought the more to kill him, because he not only had broken the sabbath, but said also that God was his Father, making himself equal with God.
- 19 Then answered Jesus and said unto them, Verily, verily, I say unto you, The Son can do nothing of himself, but what he seeth the Father do: for what things soever he doeth, these also doeth the Son likewise.
- 21 For as the Father raiseth up the dead, and quickeneth them; even so the Son quickeneth whom he will.

John 14:23 Jesus answered and said unto him, If a man love me, he will keep my words: and my Father will love him, and we will come unto him, and make our abode with him.

24 He that loveth me not keepeth not my sayings: and the word which ye hear is not mine, but the Father's which sent me.

25 These things have I spoken unto you, being yet present with you.

26 But the Comforter, which is the Holy Ghost, whom the Father will send in my name, he shall teach you all things, and bring all things to your remembrance, whatsoever I have said unto you.

John 15:26 But when the Comforter is come, whom I will send unto you from the Father, even the Spirit of truth, which proceedeth from the Father, he shall testify of me.

Memory Verse: Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Matthew 28:19.

Central Thought: There are three Persons in the Godhead. They are one in purpose, aim, duration, mind, and nature, yet they are individual and distinct in office, function, and position. They are the Father, the Son (Jesus), and the Holy Spirit.

Word Definitions: One of the Hebrew words for God is *Elohim*, which is plural. The term Holy Ghost means *Holy Spirit*. The word *Trinity* means Three in One.

LESSON BACKGROUND

Remember our theme for this quarter. We are studying the foundation truths of the Christian faith.

Although the Scriptures are very plain on the Trinity, it has been a matter of dispute and speculation with many people. There are those who emphatically declare that there is no such thing as the Trinity, affirming that Jesus is the Father, as well as the Holy Ghost. A very simple approach to this question could be put this way: "If I saw an individual perform or appear three different times in different forms and manifestations, it might be possible for someone to tell me that these three are really the same person, just dressed up differently, etc. But if I saw all three of them appear and manifest themselves individually at the same time, it would be very difficult for anyone to make me believe that they are the

same person." If in speaking of Himself, God uses a plural term such as "us," it would be a good indication that there was more than one individual on hand. As Jesus spoke of His Father, talked and prayed to His Father, worked with His Father, and constantly referred to His Father, I would be persuaded that His Father was a different Being than Himself. And if Jesus refers to the Holy Spirit as coming from the Father to testify of Himself, and if He makes this assertion a number of times, it would be wise for us to recognize that the Holy Spirit is a separate and distinct Third Person in the Trinity. We could have used many other Scriptures, but these are sufficient to show clearly the separateness, and yet the harmony, that there is in the Trinity, the three Persons of the Godhead.

One of the most beautiful relationships in the Bible is found in the association and harmony between Jesus Christ, our Saviour, and His Heavenly Father. There was a fellowship there and a union that manifested such a vital part in the salvation of man. "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God and the Word was God. All things were made by Him." John 1:1, 2, Jesus Christ was the Word before He came into this world. God created all things through Him. He was the Means by which God made the world and mankind, and He was the Means by which redemption has been offered for the souls of men. Jesus prayed in the 17th chapter of John that all of His disciples would be one even as He and the Father were one. His disciples are individuals, distinct and separate persons. Yet they are to be united in heart and mind just as the Father and the Son are united. One other striking statement that Jesus made that shows the

individuality of the Father and the Son is found in Mark 13:32 in His discourse concerning His second coming. "But of that day and that hour knoweth no man, no, not the angels which are in heaven, neither the Son, but the Father." Now if we are going to believe the whole of the Bible, we had better believe this Scripture, also. It is not a misprint. It is a fact. God the Father and God the Son are individual enough that the Father can withhold information from the Son if He sees fit to do so. If they were one and the same Person, this would be impossible. But laying aside the controversial aspects of this subject, let us think of the blessedness of the Holy Three in One. The Almighty alone could not have effectively produced a plan of salvation for mankind. He chose to work through the avenue of His Son and His Holy Spirit. The Son took on a human body and wrought the atonement for man's sin. He wrought reconciliation, paying the ransom for mankind. The Holy Spirit is sent into the world to draw, enlighten, convict, teach, guide, inspire, bless, and comfort the souls of men. All of this is done to please the Father and to accomplish His supreme will. The three that bear record in Heaven are the same three that appeared simultaneously at the baptism of Jesus. These three work in perfect harmony and agreement. They are to be honored and glorified together, worshipped and praised forever. —Leslie C. Busbee

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

We are living in an age when people want to figure everything out. They do not want to just accept a fact as it is. When we deal with the Godhead, we have to admit that there is a great mystery in it, yet we see the Godhead at work. We do admit that divine titles are applied to the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, and are represented as special persons distinct from each other, yet they are classed together as the Godhead. We do admit that each have divine attributes that are ascribed to each and divine works attributed to each. "Since the exact manner of existence in the Godhead manifestly lies above and beyond the range of mortal mind, the basis of our theology respecting God should be laid solely in what is revealed to us in the Holy Scriptures. And if we appeal directly to them, we find it is impossible to avoid the doctrine of the Trinity taught therein, without doing great violence to scores of plain texts bearing on the subject."

We can say that man is sort of a trinity. He has a will, an intellect, and possesses sensibility, yet these three are distinct from each other and unexplainable, but they blend together. This of course doesn't explain the Godhead, but it should lead us to expect the Infinite One to be held in a greater mystery than what exists within ourselves.

To some the Trinity may seem unimportant, but if Christ is not God, then He has only succeeded in showing us the great gulf between us and God, which would be impassable without His being God. Christ is truly the divine One and is truly "God manifest in the flesh" for the very purpose of bridging the gulf between us and God, the Father. Christ came to this world and took on the flesh of man so He could transform sinful man into His own image, through His death and resurrection. What a wonderful Saviour! We also have the indwelling Holy Spirit to lead, to guide us into all truth, and to give us power to live according to the commands of God.

THE ETERNAL PURPOSE

Ephesians 3:8 Unto me, who am less than the least of all saints, is this grace given, that I should preach among the Gentiles the unsearchable riches of Christ.

- 9 And to make all men see what is the fellowship of the mystery, which from the beginning of the world hath been hid in God, who created all things by Jesus Christ:
- 10 To the intent that now unto the principalities and powers in heavenly places might be known by the church the manifold wisdom of God.
- 11 According to the eternal purpose which He purposed in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Ephesians 1:3 Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who hath blessed us with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ.

- 4 According as he hath chosen us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before him in love:
- 5 Having predestinated us unto the adoption of children by Jesus Christ to himself, according to the good pleasure of his will.
- 9 Having made known unto us the mystery of his will, according to his good pleasure which he hath purposed in himself:
- 10 That in the dispensation of the fulness of times he might gather together in one all things in Christ, both which are in heaven, and which are on earth; even in him.
- 2 Tim. 1:9 [God] who hath saved us, and called us with an holy calling, not according to our works, but according to his own purpose and grace, which was given in Christ Jesus before the world began.
- 1 Peter 1:18 Forasmuch as ye know that ye were not redeemed with corruptible things, as silver and gold, from your vain conversation received by tradition from your fathers:
- 19 But with the precious blood of Christ, as of a lamb without blemish and without spot.
- 20 Who verily was foreordained before the foundation of the world, but was manifest in these last times for you.

Memory Verse: Known unto God are all his works from the beginning of the world. Acts 15:18. Central Thought: God purposed, planned, designed, and fashioned His creation to be to His glory and praise. He willed a people in His own image who would love and obey Him in unblameable holiness and love. He ordained a plan of redemption and had it all ready to be executed in the event man should fall from His favor. In this plan of redemption He purposes to gather all who willingly serve Him into one body unto Christ. This is all to be done in cooperation with man's will.

LESSON BACKGROUND

When light from Heaven shone into the heart and mind of Paul, he was made aware of the great eternal purpose of the Lord God of Israel. He saw that the Jesus that he and the other Jews had been persecuting and trying to destroy was the real fulfillment of the will of God for mankind. Those earnest words he wrote to the Ephesians were the fruits of the divine revelation that God had given unto him. The apostle Peter joins Paul in our lesson today magnifying the eternal purpose of God. He recognizes that Jesus was foreordained before the dawn of creation to do what He did. It was all the carrying out of God's gracious plan, a plan that had been in His great loving heart from everlasting. It was the design and the blueprint that preceded all things. His goings forth have been from of old, from everlasting. Micah 5:2. Every great invention of man is completely programmed and engineered on paper before it is ever put together. First is the idea, or the thought. Much contemplation and study follows. Then comes calculation and planning. Every angle and aspect is considered. Then the idea is drawn to scale and a projection of assembly is made. Finally after many cooperative hands have been employed in its fulfillment, the finished product rolls off the assembly line. It is thus with God and His eternal purpose. The work of creation was not a haphazardous adventure. It was pre-planned, pre-calculated, and filled with definite and clear-cut objectives. And this was all done before man ever came on the scene. Many today live careless and pointless lives: not so with the real Christians. The Christian's life has a great objective. It is to let the will of God and the eternal purpose of God, be done in his or her life. Knowing that the Christian endeavor is backed by the great eternal purpose of God, great courage and determination are employed to carry it through to the end of the way.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

There is much controversy over the doctrine of eternal predestination. Yet it need not be so.

"It may be necessary to examine the meaning of the term predestination that those who do use it may employ it according to the sense it has in the oracles of God. The verb proortizo from pro, 'before,' and horizo, 'I define, finish, bound, or terminate,' when horos, 'a boundary or limit,' signifies certain bounds or limits; and is originally a geographical term, but applied also to anything concluded, or determined, or demonstrated. Here the word is used to point out God's fixed purpose or predetermination to bestow on the Gentiles the blessing of the adoption of 'sons' by Jesus Christ, which adoption had been before granted to the Jewish people; and without circumcision, or any other Mosaic rite, to admit the Gentiles to all the privileges of His Church and people. The apostle marks that all this was 'foredetermined' by God.' (Clarke)

The mystery of the election is somewhat a puzzle to some. But we must remember that those who are willing are always the elect; those who will not, are not elected. No need to be puzzled over this fact. These are truths belonging to God alone. If you are troubled about them it is only because you are troubling about something that does not concern you. God has never set aside our free agency and final accountableness; nor must we so explain away God's sovereignty and grace as to exalt man to a state of independence. To imagine that God chooses some to eternal life without regard to their faith and holiness is to suppose that some are saved without these qualifications or saved contrary to his purpose. If we admit that we are sinners and insufficient for our own redemption, then our salvation must ultimately be resolved into God's own pleasure. There is no other source from which it can be derived. The plan of redemption is offered without respect of persons to all who will hear the gospel. "Whosoever will may come and take of the water of life freely." -Marie Miles

Central Thought: Because of the disobedience of Adam, sin came into the world. With sin came death, or separation from God. This produced a sinful condition upon the whole human race. God gave the law to Moses to help man to sense

his guilt and the grossness of his sins. No man is good and clear before God in his own ability. Our nature is sinful, and it will take the deliverance that God affords to save our soul from sin and its binding clutches.

Word Definitions: Sin: to miss the mark; to err. Iniquity: that which is not right or equal. Transgression: Disobedience or departure from prescribed rule or conduct. Justified: made just and rendered innocent.

LESSON BACKGROUND

The background of the 51st Psalm is David's repentance. David had been raised up from the sheepfolds to become the King of Israel. All seemed to be going well and prospering with him. God had blessed him richly. One day as he walked on the roof of his house, he saw a woman bathing across the way. His natural passions were inflamed, and sin began to take hold. He had the woman brought to his house, and later she sent the message back that she was with child. After an unsuccessful attempt to get her husband (who was one of his trusted soldiers) to come home to her, David ordered his general to place him in the heat of the battle and then get away. Uriah was thus killed and out of the way. David took the woman to be his wife, and all seemed well. But sin had been in this case. God was displeased. Great sorrow and trouble came into David's life because of this awful sin. No doubt he prayed like our lesson reveals, and was made aware of the awfulness of his sinful condition. The apostle Paul quotes from different places in the Old Testament as he declares the terrible sinful state of men. Man needs a Saviour. He cannot save himself from sin and its consequences by his own strength. For this purpose Jesus came that all men might be saved. -Leslie C. Busbee

To fail to realize one's need of a Saviour or to be indifferent to the issue is a pathway to damnation. God has done no wrong. He has not changed His position or attitude toward man. His arm is not short, nor his ear heavy. But it is sin and transgression unrepented of and unwilling to be exposed that keeps His gracious presence from embracing the souls of men. Everyone has sinned. No one has escaped the awful snare. God has concluded all in sin, so that He can have mercy upon all. We have nothing to boast of. One sin brought the condemnation and wrath of God against man. We inherit this condition by birth, or nature. When we are born into this world, we have a sinful disposition, or nature. We have a natural inclination to do wrong. As one gets older, the principle of sin begins to increase and grow. Very early in life it takes form in lying, pride, covetousness, jealousy, and other things. The older one gets, the greater the magnitude of sin. Sin is no respecter of persons. Satan works in all mankind. One must feel the wrongness of sin, its weight of condemnation and woe before he can really appreciate the Saviour. God gave the law so that sin could be exposed and be made to seem even more sinful. "But where sin abounded, grace did much more abound." Christ has come to break the binding chains of sin, that we need no more be under its domination.

The mother did not give exactly the right answer to the question. The majority of so-called Christians today believe that they sin all the time. They will dwell on the verse of Scripture, "There is none righteous, no, not one." We need to take the context of the Scriptures where the Apostle Paul is treating this subject. He is first bringing out the fact that God concluded all under sin so that He might save them from their sins. If all were righteous then there would not be any need for Christ to die on the cross to save them from their sins. So our lesson in Romans ends: "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God." The next verse tells us what the plan of God was in stating this fact: "Being justified freely by his grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus." (Rom. 3:23, 24) We cannot take out a verse from the context and build a theory on it, as some have done in wanting to believe that we cannot live without sin but must ask God to forgive us of our sins every day.

Let us see what the definition of mistake is. "A mistake means to understand or perceive wrongly; a fault in understanding." In other words, a mistake is to not understand what we are to do and therefore we do not do it. But sin is the "breaking of religious or moral law, especially through a willful act." So, there is a big difference between a sin and a mistake. The Bible says, "Therefore to him that knoweth to do good, and doeth it not, to him it is sin." James 4:17.

The lesson we have today concerning the prophecies of the expected Messiah is very important because of the contents which were explicitly fulfilled at the appearing of Jesus Christ into the world. These are rich veins of gold for study, meditation, and understanding. Once comprehended in their wondrous value, these Scriptures remain alive and so inspiring to the earnest student of the Word of God.

THE VIRGIN BIRTH OF CHRIST

Luke 1:26 And in the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent from God unto a city of Galilee, named Nazareth,

- 27 To a virgin espoused to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David; and the virgin's name was Mary.
- 30 And the angel said unto her, Fear not, Mary: for thou hast found favor with God.
- 31 And, behold, thou shalt conceive in thy womb, and bring forth a son, and shalt call his name JESUS.
- 32 He shall be great, and shall be called the Son of the Highest: and the Lord God shall give unto him the throne of His father David:
- 33 And he shall reign over the house of Jacob for ever; and of his kingdom there shall be no end.
- 34 Then said Mary unto the angel, How shall this be, seeing I know not a man?
- 35 And the angel answered and said unto her, The Holy Ghost shall come upon thee, and the power of the Highest shall overshadow thee: therefore also that holy thing which shall be born of thee shall be called the Son of God.

Matthew 1:18 Now the birth of Jesus Christ was on this wise: When as his mother Mary was espoused to Joseph, before they came together, she was found with child of the Holy Ghost.

- 19 Then Joseph her husband, being a just man, and not willing to make her a publick example, was minded to put her away privily.
- 20 But while he thought on these things, behold, the angel of the Lord appeared unto him in a dream, saying, Joseph, thou son of David, fear not to take unto thee Mary thy wife: for that which is conceived in her is of the Holy Ghost.
- 21 And she shall bring forth a son, and thou shalt call his name JESUS: for he shall save his people from their sins.
- 22 Now all this was done, that it might be fulfilled which was spoken of the Lord by the prophet, saying,
- 23 Behold, a virgin shall be with child, and shall bring forth a son, and they shall call his name Emmanuel, which being interpreted is, God with us.

Memory Verse: For with God nothing shall be impossible. Luke 1:37.

Central Thought: Jesus Christ, our Lord and Saviour was the Son of God, born of Mary who conceived by the miraculous power of the Holy Spirit. Almighty God was His Father and Mary was His mother.

Word Definitions: Espoused: engaged or promised to marry. "Not willing to make her a publick example, was minded to put her away privily:" Joseph loved Mary very dearly. When she was found to be with child, which could have meant the sentence of death, Joseph thought how he could secretly break off their engagement, so that the public would not be aware of the matter.

LESSON BACKGROUND

Let us remember again that we are studying in this series the foundation truths of the Christian faith. These are truths that help support the structure of our faith in God and His great plan of salvation. It had been prophesied that a virgin would bring forth a son. This Scripture was well known in Jewish minds. It is a well known subject today, but there is much doubt and speculation about it. Many renowned religious leaders doubt it and question its really being so, and there are some who flatly deny its possibility. If we doubt or deny the plain Scriptures that we have in our lesson today, we may as well throw the whole Bible away. It, along with the truth of the resurrection, draws upon the supernatural power of God for verification. As the angel said, "With God nothing shall be impossible." To believe that God can do the impossible is vital to our faith in Him. If we limit His working to natural means and procedures, we are taking out of the truth of God the most vital ingredient there is. If God created the world from nothing. He can create anything and do anything from nothing. It is His Word that upholds all things, anyway. The same God that quickened Sarah's aged body to enable her to conceive and bear her son Isaac of Abraham whose body was in that sense dead also, is the same God we trust in today. Being fathered by God, Jesus Christ was pure and holy to begin with. He was not defiled with sin.

Yet it must be done in a way that would protect her from public reaction, whatever it might be. It could be serious, and it could even mean her life. These were doubtless the serious thoughts that filled Joseph's mind as he pondered the situation. When the angel of the Lord visited and spoke to him and explained the matter in God's sight, it made all the difference in the world. Now if we leave God and His supernatural workings out of anything, we are going to be faced with impossible situations. If we deny the miracle of the creation, if we deny the miracle of prophecy, and if we deny the miracle of the virgin birth, we are denying the existence and the reality of God himself. We will fall under the category of those who have a form of godliness, but deny the power thereof. 2 Tim. 3:5. Oh, let us trust in God! Let us make it our motto: "With God nothing shall be impossible." For every phase of the Christian life, let us hold fast this confidence. God will allow us to get into impossible situations where we will come to our wits' end, for the purpose of making known to us His wonderful, miraculous working power.

This of course is true, as we read the title, "Son of David" given to Jesus, in a literal sense. We know, as we are afterwards told of

- 8 And being found in fashion as a man, he humbled himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross.

John 1:1 In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.

- 2 The same was in the beginning with God.
- 3 All things were made by him; and without him was not any thing made that was made.
 - 4 In him was life; and the life was the light of men.
- 5 And the light shineth in darkness; and the darkness comprehended it not.
- 10 He was in the world, and the world was made by him, and the world knew him not.
- 11 And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us, (and we beheld his glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father) full of grace and truth.

Memory Verse: For the bread of God is he which cometh down from heaven, and giveth life unto the world. John 6:33.

Central Thought: The Almighty God took human form in the personage of His Son Jesus Christ to make a way for mankind to be delivered from sin and that they might behold His glory and the love that He had for them.

Word Definitions: Without controversy: Confessedly, beyond all question and dispute. Manifest: made to appear or to be seen. Thought it not robbery to be equal with God: The Greek literal rendering of this passage is thus: Though Christ was in the form of God, He counted not equality with God to be the thing to be grasped or held to, but emptied himself. The darkness comprehended it not: The light shone and the darkness did not prevent or hinder the light.

LESSON BACKGROUND

From several New Testament quotations we have a clear, definite teaching concerning God's being manifest in the flesh. The apostle Paul, who at first discredited Jesus Christ as being from God, affirms the solemn persuasion that the whole thing was a visitation from God. Of all people who had a chance to be sure of what Jesus really was. John was very emphatic and clear in his declarations that Jesus Christ was the very Word by which the heavens and the earth were made. Christ was with God. This makes Christ a separate person. He was God. This expression shows that all that God did. He did through Christ. There are mysteries about this sort of thing. but it is no secret that God came down in human form to accomplish man's salvation and deliverance from sin and death. John was able to see His glory. We also can see His glory as we view the sacred accounts of Christ's early ministry. His power, beauty, and love. Here faith can be stronger than sight. As we read and visualize in our minds the Holy One of God in His advent into this world, it can mean as much and even more than it did to those whose vision took in only His natural bearing. -Leslie C. Busbee

There are several worthy lessons to be seen in the truth of God's being manifest in the flesh. First we see the interest, the love, the concern, and the outreach of God's great heart for His creation. He was willing to take upon himself the same infirmities and temptations that man was bearing, and exert power and grace that would enable man to overcome and have the victory. It shows His willingness, not only to offer help to mankind, but to actually carry out a plan of salvation with Himself being the victim in man's place. It shows that He was willing to make the first gesture of reconciliation. He was willing to take the first step in the direction of the restoration of harmony between God and man. It shows that He held no grudge or malice, but that He was willing, not only to forgive, but to bear the punishment for man's sins. This put Him down on man's level, to make clear His attitude and disposition

toward us. This He wanted to do, to clarify any doubts or fears on our part, so that we could have a great consolation as concerning our acceptance with Him. It showed His fairness and His good will. He not only showed us what was right, but He took upon Himself the bands and limitations of our mortality and actually did what was right, thereby supplying grace and ability for us to do the right, also. There was no other way. No other human could have accomplished this. His own arm brought salvation to Him. There was no man. no intercessor, or Saviour, other than Himself. In doing this. He set a fair example that He wills that we follow. It was His humility. It is the same humility that we are to engage in our lives toward one another and toward our fellowman. His was a splendid example of humility and self-denial. He showed us how to bear the cross. Through the sorrows that He bore in our stead, He became a perfect Saviour, touched with the feeling of our infirmities, and close to our lowly lives.

Hebrews 9:11 But Christ being come an high priest of good things to come, by a greater and more perfect tabernacle, not made with hands, that is to say, not of this building;

- 12 Neither by the blood of goats and calves, but by his own blood he entered in once into the holy place, having obtained eternal redemption for us.
- 13 For if the blood of bulls and of goats, and the ashes of an heifer sprinkling the unclean, sanctifieth to the purifying of the flesh:
- 14 How much more shall the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself without spot to God, purge your conscience from dead works to serve the living God?
- 15 And for this cause he is the mediator of the new testament, that by means of death, for the redemption of the transgressions that were under the first testament, they which are called might receive the promise of eternal inheritance.
- 18 Whereupon neither the first testament was dedicated without blood.
- 19 For when Moses had spoken every precept to all the people according to the law, he took the blood of calves and of goats, with water, and scarlet wool, and hyssop, and sprinkled both the book, and all the people,
- 20 Saying, This is the blood of the testament which God hath enjoined unto you.
- 21 Moreover he sprinkled with blood both the tabernacle, and all the vessels of the ministry.
- 22 And almost all things are by the law purged with blood; and without shedding of blood is no remission.

Memory Verse: But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin. 1 John 1:7.

Central Thought: The sin of man in his separation from God demanded a just price of atonement. Nothing but the precious blood of the Son of God would qualify in God's sight for retribution for sin. The blood of Jesus Christ will cleanse a person from all sin as he or she walks in the light of His Word

Word Definitions: Atonement: Reconciliation for men to God. Testament: a disposition, a will, a contract (Greek). Conscience: moral consciousness, co-perception of right and wrong (Greek). Hyssop: a leafy plant used like a brush to dip into a liquid and sprinkle.

LESSON BACKGROUND

Surely no Christian should be in the dark about the part that the blood of Jesus Christ plays in the plan of salvation. It does seem, however, that at the time of the crucifixion of Jesus, his disciples were quite unaware of just what was really taking place. About all they could comprehend at the time was the suffering death and loss of their dearest Friend. The awful scene of Calvary with its writhing, groaning victims crudely fastened by nails to the Roman crosses was such sorrow and anguish, that no doubt they wished to blot it from their memories. But after Christ was resurrected and had opened up their understanding of the Scriptures and the real plan of God in it all, they became conscious of the value and virtue of that fountain of blood they had seen flowing from the wounds of their Saviour. WHAT SHALL THE HARVEST BE?

In the winter of 1876, Mr. Moody and I were holding meetings in Chicago in a large building owned by John V. Farwell, one of Mr. Moody's first and most valued friends in that city. It was our custom to hold temperance meetings on Friday afternoons. At one of these meetings the following testimony was given:

"At the breaking out of the war in 1861, I enlisted in the army and was soon appointed a first lieutenant. I was not yet eighteen, and had never been away from home influences. I had never tasted liquor, and did not know one card from another. The regiment to which I was assigned was principally officered by young men, but many of them were old in dissipation.

"This new life was attractive to me, and I entered upon it with avidity. I was soon a steady drinker and a constant card player. I laughed at the caution of the older heads, and asserted with all the egotism of a boy that I could abandon my bad habits any time I wanted to.

"I soon found that my evil desires had complete control over my will. In 1870, being a physical wreck, I resigned, and determined to begin a new life. Time and again I failed; and at last I gave up all hope and abandoned myself to the wildest debauchery, speculating with reckless indifference on how much longer my body could endure the strain. In anticipation

of sudden death, I destroyed all evidence of my identity, so that my friends might never know the dog's death I had died.

"It was while in this condition that I one day wandered into this tabernacle and found a seat in the gallery. There I sat in my drunken and dazed condition, looking down upon well-dressed and happy people.

"I concluded that it was no place for me, and was just about to go out, when out of a perfect stillness rose the voice of Mr. Sankey singing, "What Shall the Harvest Be?" The words and music stirred me with a strange sensation. I listened till the third verse had been sung:

"Sowing the seed of a lingering pain, Sowing the seed of a maddened brain, Sowing the seed of a tarnished name, Sowing the seed of eternal shame; 'Oh, what shall the harvest be?'

"These words pierced my heart. In desperation, I rushed downstairs and out into the snowy streets. I soon found a saloon, where I asked for liquor to drown my sorrow. On every bottle in the barroom, in words of burning fire, I could read, "What shall the harvest be?" When I took up my glass to drink, I read, written on it, "What shall the harvest be?" and I dashed it to the floor and rushed out again into the cold, dark night.

"The song still followed me wherever I went, and finally drew me back to the tabernacle two weeks later. I found my way to an altar and was spoken to by a kind-hearted, loving brother. With his open Bible, he pointed me to the Great Physician who had power to cure me and heal me of my appetite, if I would only receive Him. Broken, weak, vile, and helpless, I came to Him, and by His grace I was able to accept Him as my Redeemer; and I have come here today to bear my testimony to the power of Jesus to save to the uttermost."

We were all deeply touched by this testimony, and there was scarcely a dry eye in the audience. A week later the man came into our waiting room and showed me a letter from his little daughter, which read about as follows:

"Dear Papa: Mamma and I saw in the Chicago papers that a man had been saved in the meetings there, who was once a lieutenant in the army, and I told Mamma that I thought it was my Papa. Please write to us as soon as you can, as Mamma cannot believe that it was you."

This letter was received by the man at the general post office. The mother and her two children were sent for, and with the help of Mr. Moody a home was soon secured for them

and employment for the man. He was asked to go to many places to give his testimony, and he soon became very effective in his ministry. His name was W. O. Lattimore. He wrote a hymn for me, entitled, "Out of the Darkness into Light," which I set to music.

The author of "What Shall the Harvest Be?" was a frail. delicate woman, always an invalid, never having known, as she once said, an hour of good health in all her life.

JUSTIFICATION BY FAITH

Romans 3:20 Therefore by the deeds of the law there shall no flesh be justified in his sight: for by the law is the knowledge of sin.

21 But now the righteousness of God without the law is manifested, being witnessed by the law and the prophets;

- 22 Even the righteousness of God which is by faith of Jesus Christ unto all and upon all them that believe: for there is no difference:
 - 23 For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God;
- 24 Being justified freely by his grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus:
- 25 Whom God hath set forth to be a propitiation through faith in his blood, to declare his righteousness for the remission of sins that are past through the forbearance of God;
- 26 To declare, I say, at this time his righteousness: that he might be just, and the justifier of him which believeth in Jesus.
- Romans 4:4 Now to him that worketh is the reward not reckoned of grace, but of debt.

Central Thought: To be justified, one must be forgiven of all of his sins. This renders him innocent before God, and can only be attained through faith in the shed blood of Jesus Christ which He shed for that purpose.

Word Definitions: Justification: being made innocent, freed from guilt. Propitiation: Atonement. Staggered not: stumbled not.

LESSON BACKGROUND

How can a man be just before God? The law has concluded all under sin. This makes a breach between man and God. How can this breach be healed and the gap between God and man bridged so that once again God and man can be reconciled? Our lesson today has the answers for these questions. Although it seems so very plain in Bible teachings, we must remember that in ages past this was a dark issue in the minds of people. The throngs were led to believe that being made justified in God's sight required severe works of penance and self-denial. Martin Luther was in the act of doing penance climbing on his knees up a long flight of steps, when a voice spoke to him saying: "The just shall live by faith!" Light from heaven broke through all around his soul. The doctrine of justification by faith began to unfold before him. In taking his stand on this issue and other truths revealed to him and others, the great Reformation of the 1500's was ushered in. It is still an important doctrine of the Church, and a very important foundation truth of the Christian faith. It is very important that every child of God have a good understanding of this truth. The apostle Paul declared justification by faith in contrast to the Jewish traditions of keeping the law. It brought him much persecution, but he stood true.

In justification one's sins are forgiven and washed away. In Christ, God provided the means for man's justification on Calvary. Until a person turns from his sinful ways and fully repents of his grieving God and sinning against Him, he is still unsaved and lost. One must truly repent with a godly sorrow for his sins. He must come with a broken heart to

Christ, confessing his need of a Saviour, and pleading for mercy. It is an experience so wonderful and real when one comes repenting and turning to God with all the heart. For God sees the soul that is reaching out to Him, and He comes to meet him with welcome arms of love. In a glorious moment the load of sin is gone, and gladness and peace fill the soul. A witness from heaven fills the heart and makes that one know that his sins are truly forgiven, and that he is a new creature in Christ Jesus. This is justification. This is being born again. This is an experience for the sinner who comes. His faith and confidence anchor in Christ. He accepts the blood as the sacrifice for his forgiveness, and he is therefore justified, having peace with God. He is a new creature, born from above. Old things of sin and the world pass away, behold, all things are become new. He is born into the family of God, quickened by the Spirit, and raised up to heavenly places in Christ Jesus. Right then and there he becomes a member in the one true Church of God, which is the bride of Christ, and his name is recorded in the Lamb's Book of Life. It is not gained by keeping the law, but it is laid hold of by faith in response to the gospel of Christ, which is the power of salvation to everyone that believeth. It changes one from sin to righteousness. from darkness to light, from the power of Satan to the power of God. Its effect is a new life with new desires and purposes. Praise the Lord for justification by faith!

Central Thought: After a person is forgiven of his sins he becomes eligible to receive the Holy Spirit, which will cleanse and purify his soul of all dross and carnal elements and give him power to witness for God and to work the works of Christ.

Word Definitions: Sanctification: Moral and spiritual purity, consecration to God for divine service. Holy Ghost: Holy Spirit.

LESSON BACKGROUND

Our lesson today is surely another great fundamental doctrine of the Christian faith, yet it has been one of the most controversial topics ever. It is surely true that Satan hates the truth of the doctrine of sanctification. He knows that if he can get some confusion befogging people's minds concerning this precious truth, it will keep people from obtaining the experience. Paul said to the Ephesians that after they were saved they would receive the Holy Spirit. It is all so plain, and what is more, it is all so wonderful! Oh, the glorious plan of salvation!

THE MOTHER'S STEADFAST FAITH

Years ago a man and his wife moved from New England to Western New York. "I am going home, and I am happy. Here in my heart God has given me an assurance that you, my husband and children, will all join me in the company of the redeemed. Not one of you will be left out; sooner or later you will lay down your unbelief and rebellion, and serve Him who died for you. Do not put off that blessed day, but hasten to prove that God hears and answers prayer. Thirty years I have taught you and prayed for you. Some of you, I feel, will stand before men and preach the gospel of Christ, and souls will be converted through your means." Firmly as in days of health the dying woman spoke to her family. When the message was given, with a smile on her face she sank to rest.

The mother's assured trust was fulfilled. Her children all professed their faith in Christ, and five out of the seven sons became preachers of the gospel. The father lived as he had done until his eighty-second year, when in a powerful revival in the place which had grown from a forest to a town under his own eyes, he became convicted of sin. Humbly lamenting a long, wasted life, at the eleventh hour he entered the vineyard. Four years only were added to his days, and for two of these he was scarcely able to walk. But his was a true regeneration; every word and act revealed that he was born of God. He lived lamenting the past, and holding up his long life of rebellion as a beacon to others. Central Thought: Jesus Christ built His Church, a structure that is spiritual in composition and eternal in duration, upon the solid Rock of His eternal essence to be revealed to the souls of men by the Holy Ghost. Every person who is truly saved from sin through faith in Christ is a lively part of the Church of God.

Word Definitions: Gates of hell: It is evident that by the term "gates of hell" Jesus is speaking of the hand of death that quenches the hope of living again. Hell is translated from the Greek word Hades which means the unseen. There may be various other thoughts one can gather, but the fact that Jesus conquered death and affords His disciples the same victory is paramount. "The Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved." The Greek Diaglot renders this thus: And the Lord was adding those being saved every day to the Church.

LESSON BACKGROUND

An understanding as to what the Bible teaches about the Church is truly an important foundational doctrine. A good

and accurate understanding of God's plan for His Church is vital for the child of God in these days. With so many different kinds of churches and organizations in the name of Christianity around us, we can keep ourselves from much confusion and error by adhering to the plain teachings of the Bible concerning the structure, nature, and workings of the Church of God. Our lesson today dwells on the Church of God pictured as a building, or house. This is such a common object with which we all are acquainted that it is very fitting and proper to show a comparison as such. Divinely built, divinely operated and controlled, the great Church of God is unique. It is what it is because of the guidance and administration of the Holy Spirit. Christ as the foundation and the Holy Spirit as the framing structure build together men and women into one building, which is a habitation of God through the Spirit. -Leslie C. Bushee

For a building to meet the demand for its use and purpose it must have a good strong foundation. For the great soulsaving institution that God purposed and planned that His Church should be, there must needs be a good solid foundation. It must be built upon a solid unmoveable substance. outwearing and enduring the storms and turbulence of the ages of time. In the midst of much corruption, error, great apostasy, and ruin, the holy prophet Isaiah foretold the building of the Church: "Behold, I lay in Zion for a foundation a stone, a tried stone, a precious corner stone, a sure foundation." Then he added the great promise and declaration: "He that believeth shall not make haste." Isa. 28:16. Christ Jesus was to be that Stone. It was the same stone that Daniel saw smiting the earthly kingdoms and becoming a great mountain, filling the whole earth. Jesus Christ was the Son of the Living God. Peter was confident and sure of this. Jesus said that this was revealed to Him by the Father in heaven, and not by flesh and blood. This is an important point. Close observance of many professed Christian churches today reveals the great lack of Holy Spirit inspiration and revelation. Members and converts are taught the doctrines of the respective churches by "flesh and blood." Man, in some form or another, rules the church. Laws and rituals are taught and enforced. Souls are not granted the great and wonderful opportunity to be led and inspired by God in their individual lives. Many professed Christian churches today were started through the efforts of godly, Spirit-led men, but were formulated into cold, lifeless organizations through the departure of the followers from Holy Spirit discipline and guidance. This is what makes the Church of God what it is. It is governed and controlled and operated by the Holy Spirit. Each member is responsible to live close to the Lord so that the Holy Spirit will inspire, anoint, and direct. Against such a church the powers of sin, darkness, and death have no power. It is truly triumphant and possessor of the divine risen life of Jesus Christ, its founder and Head. -Leslie C. Busbee

Memory Verse: For as we have many members in one body, and all members have not the same office: so we, being

Central Thought: The Church of God is pictured in comparison to the natural body with many members, each different in function and office, yet united in one body by the Holy Spirit that works in each one according to His will.

Word Definitions: FIRST apostles, SECONDARILY prophets, THIRDLY teachers: first, second, and third. The apostles planted the truth and were followed by the prophets and teachers. Members in particular: each member a separate part. Vocation: calling.

LESSON BACKGROUND

The success of any organization depends largely on its foundation or backing, and the relationship that its members have with one another. It is a proven fact that confusion, lack of control and discipline, and factions and divisions can disrupt and ruin any organization. What stopped the work of the building of the tower of Babel? It was the confusion of tongues and the division that followed. They could no longer work together because of the lack of communication. Frustration comes with dividing and pulling asunder. Paul at one time disrupted the council that was arraved against him because he declared that he was in question concerning the resurrection. The topic of a resurrection was a controversial issue. It threw the council into an uproar. God has designed His Church to operate as a body in unity, with no division or confusion. This calls for a mind, attitude, and spirit of cooperation and humility. No greater likeness of what God wills that His Church should be is found than that of the physical body. Each member functioning and operating in its individual place is a perfect picture of the Church of God functioning in this world with all the members working in perfect harmony. -Leslie C. Busbee

This person has a burning desire to get out as many tracts as he can, and it seems he knows just where to put them and how to give them out so they will be the greatest blessing. Now, this could cause some friction if each child of God did not look at it rightly. The one who did not have a burden to give out tracts, but was laboring in another capacity, might look on the other one's efforts as not being very valuable. He might say, "It's just a waste to give out those tracts. Most of them are torn up or thrown away." The one who gives out tracts might say about the ones who don't, "I wonder why they don't give out tracts. They must not have any soul burden at all or they would give out tracts." Both have wrong attitudes. The one who is called to give out tracts should labor in his calling and pray for others who do not have that calling but are burdened in another direction. The one who does not have the calling to give out tracts should pray for the one who gives them out, and it might even help if he would give that one some money with which to get more tracts to give out. This is the working in harmony of the body—one member working with another.

A certain sister had a burden to go from neighborhood to neighborhood teaching the children. Another sister said, "She is just wearing out her life doing that, because those children do not have any training at home." This sister didn't have any burden for teaching children, so that was her thought about it. The attitude should be: "I do not have a burden or calling to teach children, but I am glad that Sis. B— is doing it, and I am praying for her." Oh, how beautiful it is for each member to supply the other and pray for each other as they labor in the calling God has given to each!

"IT'S MORE TO ME HOW HE LIVED."

Charles Baker was fifteen years older than his only brother Edwin, who seemed to him more like a son than a brother. Charles, during his childhood, knew no mother's care, but in his fourteenth year his father married again, and Charles welcomed to his heart a baby brother, and was permitted to name the darling Edwin.

The father of these boys was not a Christian, though his strictly moral life had led the pious woman whom he married to think him one. When she discovered her mistake she was greatly grieved. Her regrets were increased when she perceived that he made morality his idol, and that he had trained his only son to his own views. She hoped at first to induce them to change their opinions, but soon found that all her attempts would be firmly and persistently repelled. When her little Edwin was born, she commended him in faith and prayer to God, and her fond hope was, that through him she might be able to reach the hearts of his father and brother. She trained him in the knowledge and ways of the Lord, storing his memory with hymns and Scriptures, and constantly seeking the divine benediction upon her efforts.

Mr. Baker and his eldest son, in the pursuit of their business were most of the time absent from home, but their return was always greeted with joy by little Edwin, who delighted to climb upon their knees and repeat the pretty verses and beautiful Bible stories which his mother had taught him. Neither father nor brother could or wished to repulse him, his affectionate and winning ways taking their hearts by storm. Fondly the mother saw and hoped, yet she was not permitted to witness the consummation of her wishes.

When Edwin was ten years old and his brother twenty-five, an epidemic carried to the grave in one day both father and mother. Charles was overwhelmed by the blow, yet his first consolation came from the little one for whose sake his regrets had been keenest. As he was pressing the child to his heart in the anguish of their sore bereavement, Edwin gently whispered, "Don't cry so, Charlie; I know a beautiful verse which I think was written on purpose for us: 'When my father and my mother forsake me, then the Lord will take me up.' Isn't that good, Charlie?" The weeping young man could not answer, but he folded the darling boy closer to his breast and was comforted.

Years passed on. Edwin never forgot his mother and her God. Through her prayers he had a tenderness toward God from his cradle, and his life was a daily picture of constant, yet unobtrusive piety; for "even a child is known by his doing, whether his work be pure and whether it be right." Charles almost idolized the young brother so worthy of his love, yet was strangely blind to the secret of his rare worth. He saw that his mind was one of no common order, and resolved to bestow upon him an ample and liberal education. For this purpose he pursued his calling with untiring diligence, their father not having left sufficient means to carry out such a

plan without his utmost efforts. Love for Edwin made every burden light, and he pictured to himself a brilliant future when he should see his young charge an orator or statesman, at the bar or in the senate chamber.

The first check to Charles' ambition was when dear Edwin, in his fifteenth year, publicly presented himself to profess his hope and purpose to be the Lord's.

Charles still held his father's views of the sufficiency of worldly morality, and he felt that with these, his brother's profession of the gospel wholly conflicted. Yet he could find no cause for complaint against Edwin, who, aware of his brother's notions, was doubly careful in seeking by divine help, to live consistently with the higher standard which he had taken for the law of his life.

Three years more passed away, and the young Christian, now partly through his college course, annonced to his brother his desire and hope to prepare for the gospel ministry. Charles had never anticipated such a calling for his brother, and his heart rose in stern opposition. Edwin meekly avowed his own convictions of duty, but finding his brother inflexible, felt it right to delay his final decision until his college studies were ended. Saying kindly but firmly, "Then, Charles, I shall be a man, and the responsibility of deciding what my heavenly Father requires of me will rest upon my own conscience and heart," he patiently "bided his time."

Charles could no longer be blind to the reality and the beauty of his brother's piety. He looked at Edwin with keen eyes, for if he could see any glaring faults or inconsistencies, he could found upon these unanswerable arguments against the profession which he wished to follow. Edwin was not perfect; he had shortcomings sometimes to mourn over, but they were so humbly confessed and so heartily lamented, that his penitence and humility were so many cumulative proofs of his sincerity.

The period now drew nigh when Edwin must decide for himself the weighty question which he trembled to approach. He sought the counsel of Christian friends, but more than all he asked the aid and guidance of the Spirit of God. His decision was at length reached. He said to his brother with trembling and tears, "Woe is me if I preach not the gospel"; and though Charles did not consent to his plans, he ceased to oppose them.

But neither Charles nor his brother foresaw the issue. Edwin never had a strong physical body, and the long conflict of mind and suspense in which he was with regard to his future course, made serious aggressions upon his health. Charles was the first to feel alarm, but shut his eves to the progress of the malady. Death, however, waited not for Edwin's hopes or Charles' fears. With cheerful submission the young Edwin bowed to the king of terrors, while Charles felt that with his young brother's removal from earth every ray of hope would be for ever quenched. He had no ears for the song of victory which the dying child of God shouted even amid death's waves: Charles felt as if his own heart were dead. But when he looked upon that peaceful face beneath the coffin lid. the memory of Edwin's consistent Christian life, the picture of his daily walk with God, rose vividly before him. Stronger witnesses for Jesus were these than even the radiance of the closing scene. With Edwin's Bible in his hands, and the remembrance of Edwin's piety in his heart, upon his knees beside those marble features, he sought, and there is reason to believe, truly found the Saviour. Thus it was, that when the earth fell upon his brother's coffin, and a friend tried to soothe his grief by bidding him remember how triumpahtly Edwin died, Charles earnestly replied in the words at the head of this narrative. "It's more to me how he lived!"

62:4 Thou shalt no more be termed Forsaken; neither shall thy land any more be termed Desolate: but thou shalt be called Hephzibah, and thy land Beulah: for the Lord delighteth in thee, and thy land shall be married.

5 For as a young man marrieth a virgin, so shall thy sons marry thee: and as the bridegroom rejoiceth over the bride, so shall thy God rejoice over thee.

Isaiah 54:5 For thy Maker is thine husband; the Lord of hosts is his name; and thy Redeemer the Holy One of Israel; The God of the whole earth shall he be called.

Romans 7:4 Wherefore, my brethren, ye also are become dead to the law by the body of Christ; that ye should be married to another, even to him who is raised from the dead, that we should bring forth fruit unto God.

Ephesians 5:25 Husbands, love your wives, even as Christ also loved the church, and gave himself for it;

- 26 That he might sanctify and cleanse it with the washing of water by the word,
- 27 That he might present it to himself a glorious church, not having spot, or wrinkle, or any such thing; but that it should be holy and without blemish.
- 28 So ought men to love their wives as their own bodies. He that loveth his wife loveth himself.
- 29 For no man ever yet hated his own flesh; but nourisheth and cherisheth it, even as the Lord the church:
- 30 For we are members of his body, of his flesh, and of his bones.

Memory Verse: For the husband is the head of the wife, even as Christ is the head of the church: and he is the saviour of the body. Ephesians 5:23.

Central Thought: We that believe, love, and obey Jesus Christ are united to Him in one body as His holy Bride, the Church of God. The relationship of a man and his wife is a likeness of the close union of Christ and His Church.

Word Definitions: Hephzibah: delight. Beulah: married. Husband: from the word House-band, one who holds the household together with love, ingenuity, wisdom, and honour. Wife: from the word Weave, which means one who weaves the various cords of domestic life into one strand of happiness. Nourish: to rear up or train (Greek). Cherish: to warm, to brood, to foster (Greek).

LESSON BACKGROUND

Today we will study the Church of God in the spectrum of being the Bride of Christ. It is a most sublime and inspiring thought to think that the saved ones can have an association with the King of kings like unto that of husband and wife! It was prophesied thus to be. From Isaiah's writing, we see it foretold that the Church would be united to the Lord as a precious and holy Bride. We are persuaded that when God instituted holy matrimony in the beginning, it was to portray to us this truth. God would have us to know how dear and

When my Willie was sixteen, he accidentally dropped a valuable watch into the well. His father was absent from home; and without consulting me, he resolved to recover the treasure. Providing himself a long-handled rake, he gave it in charge to his sister Jennie, two years younger, and bidding her lower it to him when he called, he stepped into the bucket. and holding fast by the rope, commenced his descent. The bucket descended more rapidly than Willie expected, and struck heavily against the side of the well; the rope broke, and he was thrown into the water.

"Mother, I shall be drowned," was his despairing cry; which Jennie reechoed with a wail of anguish. But I knew the depth of the water, and shouted to him as calmly as I could. "Stand upon your feet, Willie; the water isn't over four feet deep." "But I shall sink in the mud," said the poor boy, still striving to keep himself afloat by clinging desperately to the slippery stones. "No. Willie, there's rock at the bottom. Let go of the stones, and stand up."

The assurance of a hard foundation, and the impossibility of holding much longer to the slimy surface of the stone wall. gave him confidence. He felt for the rocky bottom, placed his feet firmly upon it, and to his great joy found that the water scarcely reached to his shoulders. I sent Jennie to the house for a new strong rope, and fastening one end of it securely. I lowered the other to him to be tied into the bucket, and we drew him safely up. "O Mother," said the dear boy when he was rescued, "those were precious words to me, 'There's rock at the bottom': I shall never forget them."

Two years after, in a commercial panic, my husband's property was swept away, and we were reduced to poverty. At first I bore bravely up. I did not prize wealth and luxury for my own sake, neither did I covet it for my children. I chiefly mourned for my husband's disappointment and his crushed hopes, and strove by unflagging cheerfulness to chase away the gloom which settled so heavily upon him. I endeavored to assist him, not only by the utmost economy in household expenses, but by devising plans for the future. Willie and Jennie were old enough to earn their own support, and even to assist in the education of the younger children. I succeeded in putting them in the way to do this. I felt strong and brave. and almost wondered at my husband's despondency.

But new reverses came. The bank in which Jennie had deposited her quarter's salary, which might partially meet our

necessities, suddenly failed, and her money was lost. I could bear this too; she would soon be able to replace it. Next, the school in which she taught was disbanded, and Jennie had to take much lower wages; but she still earned a little. I said cheerfully, "We will not murmur; half a loaf is better than no bread." Next Willie's hand was disabled by an accident, and he lost his job. My courage began to give way; but rallying myself for one more effort, I resolved to brave the reproaches of friends and the world's dread laugh, and seek remunerative employment for myself. It sorely tried my womanly delicacy, yet it brought the needful aid, and I battled with my wounded sensitiveness, and again boosted my failing courage. The last blow came—sickness suddenly laid me prostrate. "I shall give up, now; we must all sink together," was the language of my despairing soul.

"Dear Mother," said Willie, when he heard my lamentation, "do you remember what you said to me when I was at the bottom of the well? I have often thought of it of late. I know we are in deep waters, but God has promised that they shall not overflow us. And is not His word a solid foundation? Let us plant our feet upon His promises, and stand firmly. We

cannot sink, for 'there's rock at the bottom.' "

I heard, and took the lesson to my heart. I saw that I had been clinging to the slippery stones of human strength and self-dependence; and so, when the providence of God bade me let go my hold, I was in despair. But the bank of heaven had not failed; God was able to redeem His promises, and though I stood in deep water, it should not overwhelm me, neither should I sink, for "there's rock at the bottom."

So from the chamber where pain and illness still hold me prisoner, I send to each burdened and weary child of God who is tempted to feel that all is lost, the key-note of my new and grateful psalm, Whatever your sorrow or strait may be, plant your feet trustingly upon the Rock of ages, and with me, "thank God, and take courage."
