MEMORY VERSE:



Joseph's brothers hated him. Each time they saw Joseph wearing the beautiful multicolored coat their father had made just for him, it made them angry. One day when Joseph returned from watching the cattle with his brothers, he reported their evil actions to his father. This intensified their hatred for him. After that he had two dreams. In the first dream, his sheaf stood tall while his brothers' sheaves bowed before his. In the second dream, the sun, moon and eleven stars bowed before him. Even his father rebuked him for that dream.

His brothers smoldered with anger. They watched for a chance to get rid of him. Then, one day while they were far from home with the cattle, they saw Joseph coming toward them.

"Look!" one of them said. "Here comes the dreamer!" They decided they would kill him and throw his body into a deep pit where it would never be found. "Then we will see what becomes of his dreams!" they agreed.

Reuben, Joseph's oldest brother, persuaded them to just put him in a pit instead of killing him. He planned to come back later and rescue Joseph. But when some Ishmaelite traders came by on their way to Egypt they decided to sell Joseph to them. They were sure they were rid of him forever!

Joseph was taken into Egypt and sold there as a slave. While he was cleaning pig pens, mopping floors, grinding corn and baking bread, he must have often asked, "Why has this happened to me?" He may have wondered if God was still alive. Perhaps he blamed himself, wishing he hadn't tattled on his brothers or told his dreams. We do not know what Joseph thought while working in Egypt.

We do know he obeyed God's commandments. Even when strongly tempted, he did not yield to sin. When suffering in prison, he did not grow bitter. He trusted God, although he did not always understand.

Joseph turned his troubles into stepping stones. He took each trial as a lesson sent from God to educate him for the future. Joseph did not know his future work, but he learned the lessons well. When the time came that God needed him, Joseph was prepared.

We, too, must learn lessons from trials. When we can't have things the way we want them, we

must learn to he happy anyway. If others hate us and abuse us as Joseph's brothers did him, we must suffer patiently.



If others try to force us to do wrong, we must be strong as Joseph was. Trials help us to build character which we will need in the future.

Remember, all things will work together for good to those who love the Lord—under one condition. The condition is that we keep the right attitude and do the very best we can under troublesome conditions.

Many times troubles turn into blessings. Troubles are like dark clouds that cover the bright sun. The sun, like God's will, shines always, but we may not see it. Sometimes the clouds bring rain that interrupts our plans but furnishes needed moisture. Later, when the hills are green and producing food for cattle and wildlife, we thank God, although the rain was unpleasant. It is the same with many troubles—later we see they work for our good.

The old man stood on a spot of ground where his little home used to be. He was grief-stricken. Why, oh, why, had this happened to him? He tried to do right. Was God angry with him?

Just yesterday the flash flood came so fast and the water built up so quickly it just swept his meager possessions away. It is true he didn't have much. But it had taken a lifetime to get them. He thought and thought but he did not get an answer to his dilemma.

Then, as he looked dejectedly down at the ground which had been swept clean by the flood he saw something sparkling. Poking at it with the toe of his old shoe he noticed other sparkles here and there.

Upon closer examination he found that the bits of sparkle

were actually gold! He was actually standing on great riches but it took his awful loss to reveal it. If everything else had not been swept away he probably would never have discovered the gold.

It is easy to get caught up in the busy activities of life and forget the things that really matter. God in His mercy often sends storms that sweep away the vain, temporary treasures that we may find Him and eternal life. Paul suffered the loss of everything he had worked for. But he said he could not count it a loss because He had found Christ, the true treasure! He lost his prestige among the strict Pharisees but God sent him to witness for Him before kings. Paul's name and life is known throughout the world while the worldly dignitaries of his time are all but forgotten.

How do we as Christians handle the storms of life that come? No matter who we are, saint or sinner, trouble will come and it will hurt. But it all depends on how we face our troubles. Do we give up in deep despair or do we still, even while grieving our losses, remain confident of God's wisdom, love, and power and move on with hope into tomorrow?

Thomas Edison, the great inventor, was sixty-seven years old when he suffered the loss of a lifetime of work. A great fire destroyed his factory! Yet the very next morning while walking among the smoldering rubble of the buildings that had housed so many of his projects, Edison said, "There is great value in disaster—all our mistakes are burned up! Thank God we can start anew."

Abraham realized God was calling him to leave his birthplace and follow wherever He led. 

Saul was saved.


In our story Charlie Coulson, even while in extreme pain, showed this same spirit of love and concern

He steadied the doctor all the way to the station. He said little except cautioning about dangerous places in the walk.

SOWING SEEDS



Matthew 13:1-8

- 1) The same day went Jesus out of the house, and sat by the sea side.
- 2) And great multitudes were gathered together unto him, so that he went into a ship, and sat; and the whole multitude stood on the shore.

Matthew 13: 18-23

- 20) But he that received the seed into stony places, the same is he that heareth the word, and anon with joy receiveth it;

- 21) Yet hath he not root in himself, but dureth for a while: for when tribulation or persecution ariseth because of the word, by and by he is offended.

MEMORY VERSE:

Now the parable is this: The seed is the word of God. Luke 8:11



Farmers in Jesus' time did not have fenced protected areas in which to plant their seed. Their fields were usually just open areas. Only ancient landmarks or perhaps ridges of stones divided one field from that belonging to a neighbor. Through these open fields were paths where people walked from one place to another.

So when the farmer, as the one in Jesus' story,

went out to sow his seed he would try to scatter it where it would have the best chance to grow. But as he walked along throwing his seed this way and that some would fall on the hard beaten paths. Some would

fall in rocky places or in corners where weeds, nettles and thistles grew thick.

Jesus wanted to show that those who preach the gospel are like the farmer. First they must receive the good seed to sow. They must, by spending much time with God, learn the deep gospel truths so they may teach them to others. Only then are they ready to share the gospel with others.

Their field is the hearts of men. Only God knows a man's heart. As the preacher gives out the truth he has no way of knowing which hearts will receive it. His responsibility is to faithfully preach the gospel at every opportunity to everyone who will hear. After he has sown the seed that God has given he must commit the seed to the Lord who alone can make it fruitful.

Jesus said some seed fell by the way side and the birds came and devoured the seed. It didn't

have a chance to take root and grow. The devil knows the power of the gospel seed. He never misses a service where God's word is taught. He will quickly take the truth from your mind if you allow it. The seed is then lost; your life will never produce the good fruit God intended.

Then Jesus tells about seed that fell on stony places. This seed sprouted quickly but, just as quickly it withered away. We must prepare our hearts by confessing and turning from all sin before the gospel can grow there.

Some seed fell among thorns. The soil was good and before long the seed sprouted and grew. But alongside it were other little sprouts growing too. These weeds soon grew so thick they shut out the light and took up the nutrients that should have gone to the good plant. These weeds are like the cares and temptations that everyone faces in life.

Last of all Jesus told about the seed that fell on good ground and produced much fruit. God wants

to make our heart a beautiful and fruitful garden. As we yield to Him He will teach us His own ways. He may use trials to break up the hard places. But all is done in love and for our good.

Dr. Rossvally was entirely opposed to Jesus and all He

stood for. As a Jew he was taught that Jesus had wrongfully claimed to be the Messiah. His people still expected the true Messiah to come. His dark hard heart appeared to be a most unlikely place for the gospel to grow and bear fruit.

But Charlie and the barber wanted everyone to know Jesus, the One who had given them such peace and joy. They faithfully offered the seed; God caused it to eventually sink into Dr. Rossvally's heart and take root. His life was wonderfully changed.




His first impulse was to share the good news with his wife. But her heart had not been prepared; she could not accept the truth nor share his newfound joy.

Probably the first verse you learned was, "God is love." When we hear something so often it is easy to just take it for granted. Two missionaries in China were troubled when they saw such misery and sadness all around them. These people worshipped many gods. They sacrificed their precious food to these idols. Most of us can quickly recite, "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." We know the words so well we hardly have to think about what we are saying. Yet, to these hungry hearts each word brought wonder and hope.

"Will you explain how and why He died? Will you explain how it is He could love me?" some would ask eagerly. The wonder of God's love obsessed them. The story of Christ's death on Calvary filled their minds with awe and reverence.

Dr. Rossvally could not help but wonder at the courage and strength Charlie Coulson had to endure such extreme pain without a groan. He did not believe in Jesus but he could not deny that it had to be a divine power. He was amazed when Charlie told him that, while the doctor was cutting off his leg without anything to deaden the pain, he was praying that the doctor would be saved. He marveled at Charlie's great love for Jesus.

We have heard many times that God is love. But have we ever thought about the power it brings? If God did not love us we would have no peace here on earth and no hope of ever living with Him in heaven. If Jesus had not been willing to come and die on the cross at Calvary we could have no power to break out of the awful bondage of sin and selfishness. The devil would be our dreadful master and we would have no hope of escaping his cruelty.

But Jesus did come. God did make a way so we could be free from sin. He forgives everyone who will repent then He cleans our heart, fills it with His love, peace and joy and comes to live right in our heart! Such love is beyond our ability to understand. We must open our heart then we will experience its power and wonder!

What are you doing with the offer of salvation, the greatest gift you can ever receive? To reject God and His great love leaves you at the mercy of the devil that has no mercy or love for you. 

Prayer is a powerful and wonderful gift from God. Since we are completely dependent on God we should always be in a spirit of prayer continually lifting our hearts to God asking Him for help, guidance and, also, thanking Him for His many blessings to us. It is in this way that we are always praying.

Even the best earthly father sometimes is too busy or tired to listen every time we come with our little problems or desires. But God loves to have us pour out our hearts to Him and tell Him every detail of what is bothering us. Day or night and as often as you choose you can pray to Him and He will hear. In the most urgent and extreme need and danger He is there just in time.

I remember an incident that happened several years ago. My brother, Dale, and I were driving from Guthrie, OK to the camp meeting in Green Bank, WV. Dale had driven all night and we still had many miles to go. It was a difficult time to drive with the bright morning sun in his eyes. I looked down to choose one of Bro. Leslie Busbee's story tapes to listen to help keep Dale awake. When I looked up I saw that the cars ahead had merged into one lane and were stopped. On the left side was a concrete wall and in the right lane there were workers. We did not have time to stop at the speed we were traveling!

Dale saw the situation about the same time and braked as hard as he could. I said, "Lord, help!" but it seemed a crash was inevitable. Then, just as we screeched closer to the stopped car, that driver eased over to the right. By hugging close to the concrete wall Dale came to a stop about a half car

length beyond the back bumper of the car ahead of us. We did not hit the car or the concrete.

It was a miracle! I couldn't help exclaiming, "He did it!" I was certain there was no way to avoid a terrible collision vet God did it in answer to that short little praver!

When we have a need we should bring it to God in prayer. Our prayer may not be answered immediately. We are taught then to continue to pray until the need is met. God cannot be compared to an unjust judge—He loves us more than we can realize and will give us the very best. If our prayers are not answered at once we must continue to pray, knowing that God has a purpose in the delay. Sometimes, God may be saying no to our prayers. We can rest assured in knowing that He knows what is best for us

Charlie prayed for Dr. Rossvally to be saved. He never lived to see it but years later God wonderfully saved the doctor. Charlie's mother knew about his prayer for the doctor and no doubt added her petition for the doctor's salvation. God blessed Dr. Rossvally to be present when the mother told about Charlie's prayer. He was able to let her know Charlie's prayer had been answered. Both he and his wife were saved in answer to that prayer!

Prayer is a powerful privilege God has given us. Ask the Lord to teach you how to pray. Live a life of obedience to God and He will gladly answer your prayers.

The next day Ruth and the children went to stay across the street in their own home. Every day they watched the road for a carriage bringing their father.

One day the carriage came. Ruth, Sarah, and Abraham rushed from their house to the carriage. Dr. Rossvally jumped down and hugged all three at the same time.

Ruth's parents saw them together and pronounced a curse against them in the name of the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.

Later, a letter came from Dr. Rossvally's mother who lived in Germany. He was so happy to hear from her. He laid the other letters on the table and hurriedly opened the letter. "Oh, my," he said, "Listen, Ruth, and I'll read your Mother's letter. It doesn't say, 'Dear Son', as usual, it just says, 'Max: You are no longer my son; we have burned you in effigy; we mourn you as dead. And may the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob strike you blind, deaf, and dumb, and damn your soul forever. You have left your father's religion and the synagogue for that Jesus, "The Impostor," and now take your mother's curse. Clara.'

LIONS IN THE ROAD!

Part 11

We knew there were lions around, but we felt fairly safe on my big 500 c. c. motorcycle. Deng, my African friend, was riding on the seat behind, and I was driving the motorcycle as best I could over the rough dirt road in the half darkness of early morning.

We had left our S. I. M. station at Kabus Bridge before the sun rose; so we wouldn't have to travel in the fierce heat of a dry-season day. Deng and I often traveled together to preach the gospel to people who were serving false gods, and living in sin. We wanted to tell them that Jesus loved them so much that He died on the cross for them. As we roared along, kicking up dust behind us, I remembered one day when my wife and I saw 5 lions coming toward us as we rounded a bend. Only we weren't riding a motorcycle; we were walking! We looked around for trees to climb. There weren't any. We couldn't turn and run-they would have jumped on us at once. We had no guns. We prayed quietly for God's protection. (And I hope that you always pray for the safety of your missionaries. You never know what they are experiencing.)

They kept coming closer. The only thing we could do was to walk toward them. Then they stopped. God must have spoken to them. Suddenly they bounded off to the side of the road and stood there roaring at us. As we walked by, it was as if some unseen Hand was holding them back. While I was thinking about that frightening experience, we had been riding down a steep, rocky hill. I had to slow down, so we wouldn't slide in the loose stones.

Suddenly, I felt Deng's knuckles dig into my sides, and I heard him hiss in my ear. I looked up to see four eyes gleaming in the light of the headlamp. I jammed on the brakes as I saw the outline of 2 full grown lions. They were standing only 15 yards away, right in the middle of the road. The first rays of the sun were lighting the sky, and I could see that one was a hungry looking female, and the other a big male, his "collar" of fur bristling fiercely around his head.

Deng hung on tight, as we put our feet down on the road to steady the motorcycle, which I kept running. What should we do? I prayed that God would show us. I thought about how these lions were like Satan. The Bible says he goes about as a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour. We have to ask God to keep us from Satan, just as Deng and I needed to be rescued from these lions. The male lion decided to act. He disappeared silently into the long grass beside the road. "That's bad," I thought. "The male lion always stalks the prey, chasing it towards the female, who does the killing. He's going to circle round and come up behind us."

If we had turned around, the lioness would have jumped on our backs. And if she had missed the first leap, we still could not have gotten away up the steep hill in time. I moved a little closer. She didn't budge. I blew the horn; I raced the engine; I flicked the headlight dimmer switch up and down. But she stood her ground. I didn't know how close her mate was behind us by now. Then she put her head close to the road and switched her tail back and forth like a cat watching a mouse. I knew she was going to spring on us.

After the policeman was gone, Anna asked, "When did you put that note in my pocket?"


"I did not write a note." "Then who did? It was in my pocket. How did you know I was coming?"

man. Immediately He planned a way that men could be rescued from the devil's grip. One day He would send a Savior to break the power of the devil and give men power over sin and evil.







Paton explained that he must first learn to read, and then he could make the book speak. Noticing that the chief's sight was poor, he found a pair of glasses to fit him and Namakei cried with glee, "I have gotten back the sight I had when I was a boy. O Missi, make the book speak to me now!"

Namakei studied hard. As soon as he could read, he would say to the people, "Come and I will let you hear how God's book speaks our own Aniwan words. Listen to these beautiful words, telling why the Missi came to live among us wretched people and of his friend Jesus who always goes with him, to make him strong in all his work."

Somewhat haltingly he read the words: "Go and make disciples of all nations.

Lo, I am with you alway."

Little by little the savages learned that the missionary was not alone. They could see by his life that God was working through John Paton. Now God's precious promise could be read in their own language!

Paton wrote, "Among the heathens every true convert becomes at once a missionary. The changed life, shining out amid the surrounding darkness, is a gospel in largest capitals which all can read."

It is hard to imagine a time when Bibles were not available. Now anyone who wants a Bible can find a way to get one. If they have no money there are many places to get one for free. How thankful we should be for the privilege of reading God's Word at any time. Many have died so we might have this opportunity. Do you value your Bible? Do you read it often?

When fire from heaven came and burned not only the sacrifice but also the stones and licked up all the water, the people declared,

"The Lord He is God!"

At Elijah's command, all the prophets of Baai were destroyed. Ahab's wife, Jezebel, worshipped Baal. When she heard that all her prophets were dead, she was so angry she told Elijah that he also would be dead by that time the next day.

Elijah was so frightened he ran all the way to Beersheba. Then just to make sure no one could track him, he left his servant at Beersheba and walked on another day into the wilderness. California. My office is in Yakima, Washington."



Jesus was able to show the mighty power of God through this man's blindness.

When trouble or afflictions come our way it is good to always take inventory of our lives. If we find anything that needs straightening up we must be sure and do it. If the Lord assures us that all is clear then we should put ourselves and our situation totally in God's hands. Our prayer then will be for God to be glorified and for His will to be worked out for our eternal good. If He chooses to not remove the affliction we can trust His love and wisdom. His Word assures us that "all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose." Romans 8:28

God has a plan for each of our lives; He made us as we are for a purpose. As we submit our lives into His omnipotent hands He will work out this wonderful plan in us.

Handicaps in God's hands become blessings. Those who are not able to engage in normal activities and heavy work schedules have more time to spend with God in their quiet hours. It seemed unreasonable that God would allow the apostle Paul to be imprisoned when he was spending his life traveling from place to place spreading the gospel. Rather than bemoan his fate, Paul found another way to tell the good news of salvation. Even though he was denied every comfort, Paul

accepted it all as God's will for him. He called himself "the prisoner of the Lord!" He may have been shut up in some dungeon when he wrote, "I have learned, in whatsoever state I am, therewith to be content." Philippians 4:11

Paul wasted no time in self-pity but quickly found another means of spreading the gospel within his present limitations. The epistles Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, and Philemon were written while he was in the quiet confines of prison. By this means God preserved Paul's godly instructions for us!

Fanny Crosby was blind almost from birth. Even as a child, Fanny accepted her blindness as God's will for her. When she was only eight years old, she wrote:

"O what a happy soul am I!

Although I cannot see,
I am resolved that in this world

Contented I will be;
How many blessings I enjoy
That other people don't!
To weep and sigh because I'm blind,
I cannot, nor I won't."

Fanny Crosby wrote many more poems and famous hymns. At the end of her long life, Fanny said, "I do not know but on the whole it has been a good thing that I have been blind. How in the world could I have lived such a helpful life as I have lived had I not been blind? I am very well satisfied."



Fish for Supper

In June, 1962, my husband, James Huskey, and I were serving as missionaries in Baja California, Mexico. At that time, our family included five small children. We lived in a tiny house. Besides the family, three teenagers lived with us: Shirley, Mary and Rudy. We were poor and food was scarce; a salad was a real treat.

The usual breakfast was potatoes, cereal without milk, or some kind of bread. The other meals of the day consisted of either potatoes and dry beans, or dry beans and potatoes, whichever way it was said. Sometimes the family and their friends could hardly eat because they were so tired of dry beans and potatoes!

One morning after worship, I said, "Let's get our work done early today and then take a walk to the beach." Everyone was delighted, and all that were big enough to work began as fast as they could. Mary swept and mopped the floors; Shirley washed the dishes; Rudy helped fill the tubs for mother to wash the clothes, while the smaller children helped by making beds and putting their clothes up. Soon the work was all done and everybody was ready to go.

How pleasant it was to skip along singing newly learned choruses about Jesus! The sand felt warm on our bare feet. The huge span of blue ocean stretched before us as far as we could see. Mary began singing, "How Great Thou Art", then "The Love of God." As everyone joined in, we sang:

"Could we with ink the ocean fill and were the skies of parchment made; Were every stalk on earth a quill and every man a scribe by trade

To write the love of God above Would drain the ocean dry; Nor could the scroll contain the whole Though stretched from sky to sky."

For a long time, we sat singing and talking of our great Father in heaven. The children built homes, ranches and castles in the sand—all to be destroyed by the rising tide. I thought, "So it is with the homes, ranches, bank accounts and any other thing we have built upon this earth, they will all be destroyed before long by fire, as God told us in His Word. 'The earth also and the works that are therein shall be burned up."" (II Peter 3:10)

They looked up and down the beach for buying prospects, but there was no one left except me and the children. Seeing me, they came over with a fish the same height as Bobby, who was six-years old.


"Would you like to buy this fish?" asked the man. "It is very late in the evening and I have not been able to sell much today. I need to sell it. We will sell it to you for two dollars."

Keeping His Covenant

I was greatly impressed with a true story that I heard recently concerning a young fellow who enlisted in the army of the South during the Civil War. He had been raised in a Christian home, and as he prepared to leave for the front, his godly mother persuaded him to make a covenant with her that each morning and evening, every day, they would come before God in prayer at the same hour. She would kneel beside his bed at the appointed time and wherever he might be in the battle lines he would also kneel before the throne of God.

Soon he found himself surrounded with all the elements of warfare, far from home, and little sympathy among his fellows for such a thing as prayer. He tried to slip out near his tent to keep his prayer rendezvous with his mother, but his comrades laughed and jeered him to scorn. So he decided he would slip out in front of the battle lines alone and find a secret place to pray. He discovered a cave among some rocks that afforded a most desirable place of private prayer.

As days went by, suspicions began to prevail throughout the camp that the secrets of the army were being given to the enemy. Every move, every strategy seemed to be anticipated by the Northern army, and as a consequence the losses of the South were mounting higher and higher. Every move of every man was watched, to discover the traitor. Soon this young man was seen to slip out day after day, each morning and evening, towards the line of the enemy.

After several days, he was taken into custody and brought before the court-martial. He was tried and convicted of treason, in spite of all his protests. When he sought to persuade them that he had only gone out there to pray because of the ridicule that had been heaped upon him in the camp, his story was brushed aside as ridiculous.

The day came for his execution. They dug a grave and stood him beside it. The firing squad loaded their rifles and prepared to fire the fatal shots, when the old General stepped forward and said to the boy, "Well, have you a confession to make or anything to say further, before we shoot?"

The boy replied, "No, sir, nothing else other than what I have repeatedly told you. I only went to pray at the appointed hour as I promised my mother before I left home."

"Well," said the old General, with a sneer stealing across his face, "if you have been doing so much praying out there alone every day, you ought to have plenty of practice by this time. Suppose you kneel down there and show us how you do it!" The boy fell to his knees and turning his face toward heaven, began to pour out his heart to God with all the earnestness of his being. Soon he became utterly lost in prayer. He seemed to have shut himself in alone with God, utterly oblivious to his surroundings and the circumstances under which he was praying.



I have been thinking about the power of prayer and how God led Paul and Silas. They had been visiting the various churches, encouraging the saints in each congregation. But what they really wanted to do was to go to the people that had never heard the gospel before. With this in mind, they made plans to go to Bithynia. They were surprised when God let them know that they were not to go there.

So, after talking things over, Paul and Silas decided to go to Asia, preaching along the way. But the Spirit of God spoke to them very plainly saying they should not preach in Asia. Now they were puzzled! They wondered just where God would finally lead them. Finally, one night God spoke to Paul in a vision. He saw a man from Macedonia who begged him, "Come over to Macedonia and help us."

Do you remember ever having God answer prayer for you? When I was little, my parents had each of us children pray in family worship. My prayers usually went like this, "Dear Lord, help Daddy and Mommy, help me be good, help my brothers and sisters . . ."

But later I learned that I could ask God for what I needed and actually believe that He would answer my prayer. I learned that, just like I trusted my parents when they told me they would give me something, I could have the same confidence in God. Betimes I had to wait but I knew my parents would do what they said. It is the same way when we pray.

The Lord gives the answer to our prayer as He sees we need it.

Sometimes He gives us something other than what we prayed for because He knows our need better than we do. And what He gives will always be better. Paul and Silas obeyed God and went to Macedonia. They found where the people met for

prayer and joined them. Everything went well until a girl possessed with an evil spirit began following them. Each day she would call after them, "These men are the servants of the most high God!"

One day, Paul turned to her and commanded the evil spirit to come out of her. The girl immediately knew that she was at last free. But her masters were furious! They seized Paul and Silas and threw them into prison after giving them a brutal beating.

With their backs bleeding and their feet held fast in the stocks, Paul and Silas could have wondered just where they went wrong to get into so much trouble. But they knew God had sent them there in answer to their prayer. And since they were right where God wanted them to be they were so happy they sang praises right there in jail even though it was midnight!

The other prisoners heard them. They were used to hearing moaning and curses, but not singing! Then a great earthquake opened the prison doors. The jailer was sure all the prisoners had escaped but before he could kill himself Paul assured him that they were all there.

The jailer's first response was "Sirs, what must I do to be saved?"

Look at the great deliverance that came from Paul and Silas praying for God to lead them. There is wonderful power in prayer. Though it may not look like the answer will come, keep looking to God expecting the answer. He still answers prayer!

A Chinese Boy of Twelve

Young people need to realize that God still hears the voice of the boys and girls. (Genesis 21:17) The following true story is related with the earnest desire that prayer may be their heritage, their very life, and that answered prayer may be their daily experience. Some time ago, a Chinese boy of twelve years of age, named Ma-Na-Si, a boarder in the mission school at Chefoo, went home for the holidays. He is the son of a native pastor.

While standing on the doorstep of his father's house, he saw a horseman galloping towards him. The man—a heathen—was greatly excited. He eagerly enquired for the "Jesus-man"—the pastor. The boy told him that his father was away from home.

The poor man was much distressed and hurriedly explained the cause of his visit. He had been sent from a heathen village some miles away to fetch the "holy man" to cast a devil out of the daughter-in-law of a heathen friend. He poured out his sad story of this young woman, torn by devils, raving and reviling, pulling out her hair, clawing her face, tearing her clothes, smashing up furniture, and dashing away dishes of food. He told of her spirit of sacrilege, and outrageous impiety, and brazen blasphemy and how these outbursts were followed by foaming at the mouth, and great exhaustion, both physical and mental

"But my father is not at home," the boy kept reiterating.

At length the frenzied man seemed to understand.

Suddenly he fell on his knees, and, stretching out his hands in desperation, cried, "You, too, are a 'Jesus-man'; will you come?"

Think of it—a boy of twelve being called to cast out a devil! Yes, but even a boy, when fully yielded to his Savior, is not fearful of being used by that Savior. There was but one moment of surprise, and a moment of hesitation, and then the boy put himself wholly at his Master's disposal. Like little Samuel of old he was willing to obey God in all things. He accepted the earnest entreaty as a call from God.

The heathen stranger sprang into the saddle, and, swinging the Christian boy up behind him, he galloped away. Ma-Na-Si began to think things over. He had accepted an invitation to cast out a devil in the name of Christ Jesus. But was he worthy to be used of God in this way? Was his heart pure and his faith strong? As they galloped along he carefully searched his own heart for sin to be confessed and repented of.

Then he prayed for guidance what to say and how to act, and tried to recall Bible instances of demoniacal possession and how they were dealt with. He then simply and humbly cast himself upon the God of power and of mercy, asking His help for the glory of the Lord Jesus.

On arrival at the house, they found that some of the members of the family were by main force holding down the tortured woman upon the bed.

Before telling the story of the unjust judge, Jesus first tells us the meaning of this parable—we ought to pray always. It is both a privilege and a duty to pray. 

Peter told Him, "Master, we have toiled all night, and caught nothing. But at your word I will let down the net."


So Peter obeyed Jesus. When they let down the nets, they caught enough fish to fill both boats so full they began to sink!


The Weakest Saint
