Jesus Triumphant Entry into Jerusalem

Lesson Text: Luke 19:28-42; Matthew 21:1-11; Zechariah 9:9

Bible Story:

Five hundred years before Jesus came, it was prophesied in the book of Zechariah that He would enter Jerusalem on the back of a donkey as the KING and as the promised Messiah. A donkey, rather than being a symbol of poverty or humility, was a symbol of royalty. It was customary in the Old Testament and in Jesus' time for princes and kings to ride on the backs of donkeys in their processions. Horses were used to go to battle and symbolized war, but a donkey was a symbol of peace.

On what we now celebrate as Palm Sunday, five days before Jesus' crucifixion, Jesus told His disciples to go into the village where they would see a donkey tied up; a donkey upon which no man had ever sat. This donkey had never borne an inferior load, but was fresh and was meant to carry the Son of God, the King of all kings. Jesus told them to untie it and bring it to Him. He said, "If anyone asks you why you are untying the donkey (or colt), tell them it is because the Lord has need of him." Sure enough, when the disciples went into the village, they found the donkey and untied him. Just as Jesus predicted, one of the owners asked them, "Why are you untying the donkey?" The disciples then gave them the message Jesus had instructed them to give.

When the disciples brought the donkey to Jesus, they put their clothes on the donkey's back for Him to sit on. As Jesus rode into Jerusalem (known as The City of Peace), multitudes of people spread their clothes in the road in front of Him. Others cut palm branches and spread them in the road. The people cried and shouted, "Hosanna to the Son of David: Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord; Hosanna in the highest."

Some of the Pharisees knew the people would think Jesus was a king and they did not like it. They told Jesus, "Rebuke your disciples." However, Jesus said to them, "If these people hold their peace the stones will immediately cry

out." Jesus, while humble, did not stop the people on this occasion from proclaiming Him to be the KING OF PEACE--His true title.

When He drew near to Jerusalem,

He looked over the city and wept over it. He said, "If you had only known what would bring you peace, but now it is hidden from you." Jesus cried because the people whom He loved, and who so desperately needed peace in their hearts, would reject Him.

Application

Five short days later, many of the very same people who praised Jesus as king were involved in putting Him to death and denied they had ever known Him. We do not want to be fickle as those people were. We should not praise Jesus with our lips only when we are at church or when we think it will sound good, and then go home or to school and act in sinful ways. When we sin or do wrong, it is the same as putting Jesus to death.

Jesus still weeps over us when we do not choose to accept Him as King in our lives and have the peace He wants so badly to give us. We need to make Jesus the permanent King of our hearts. It is worth more than all the money in the world to be able to go to bed at night, lay our heads on our pillow, and have peace in our hearts because we have submitted our lives to Him.

A Crucified King

Lesson Text: Matthew 27:14, 27-29; John 18:33-38; 19:19-22, 30; Matthew 27:54

Bible Story:

Perhaps the crucifixion of Jesus was the darkest day the world has ever known. While just five days earlier the people had praised and hailed Jesus as a King, He now found himself betrayed and forsaken by His disciples. He was taken late on a Thursday night to the house of the high priest of the Jews for rough questioning. At the heart of the Jews' envy and hatred of Jesus was His claim that He was Christ, the Son of God. When morning time came, they led him into the council of the chief priests and scribes. They asked Him, "Are you the Christ?" When Jesus did not deny this allegation, they angrily took Him to the Roman governor of Judea, a man named Pontius Pilate, seeking his death.

A mob of people had formed as Jesus was led to Pilate early that Friday morning. Loud, raucous accusations were brought against Him by the rulers and people surrounding the fact that he claimed to be the King of the Jews. Jesus kept silent. When Pilate asked Jesus, "Do you hear what they are saying against you?" Jesus again answered him not a word so that Pilate greatly marveled.

Pilate could find no fault in Jesus, but because he feared the people, He turned Jesus over to the soldiers. The soldiers put a scarlet robe on Jesus and a crown of thorns, mockingly bowing before Him as one would a king. Pilate then wrote a sign and put in on the cross upon which Jesus willingly, and out of love, offered Himself. It said, "JESUS OF NAZARETH THE KING OF THE JEWS." The Jews did not like what Pilate had written. They urged him to change the sign to say, "He said, I am king of the Jews." But Pilate answered them saying, "I have written what I have written." The sign was written in three different languages; Hebrew, Greek, and Latin. Many people and foreigners visiting the city of Jerusalem that weekend were able to read the sign.

POSSESS THE DOUBLE

"And Jesus answered and said, Verily I say unto you, There is no man that hath left house, or brethren, or sisters, or father, or mother, or wife, or children, or lands, for my sake, and the gospel's, But he shall receive an hundredfold now in this time, . . . and in the world to come eternal life." Mark 10:29, 30

I remember as a very young child lying in bed at night and having my conscience convicted of some wrong I had done that day. I would go into my dad and mother's room and ask them to pray with me. Then with a light heart, I would go to bed and sleep soundly. I had a tender conscience from an early age and wanted to do right.

One Sunday afternoon, when I was nine years old, a baptismal service was being held. My father asked me if I was saved and if I would like to be baptized. I needed a complete assurance of salvation, so we bowed down by the chair in our living room and asked God to forgive me of my sins and come into my heart. That afternoon in March, in the muddy red waters of a farmer's pond, I sealed my testimony with God.

Again, as I was entering my teens, I felt the Lord calling me to make a complete surrender to God and give my all to Him. The time had come that obeying my parents and following the rules was not God wanted me to have a personal walk with Him. He heard my prayer and sent His Holy Spirit to direct my life. As I endeavored to let the Lord lead me in the choices that I made, He proved true to His Word: if I did my part, He would send His blessings accompany my obedience.

From my vantage point many years down the road, I can assure you that living for God has been the best way. fellowship of God's people has brought many wonderful friends into my life. We have a bond that is unlike the casual friendships that are formed in the world because there is a closeness that comes from our mutual faith. Godly living enhances our personal lives. marriages, our families and is a light to those around us.

There is a verse in Isaiah 61:7 that reads "Therefore in their land they shall possess the double: everlasting joy shall be unto them."

Some years ago, my pastor, Brother Ostis Wilson, said his boss came into the room where he was working and asked him if he would work for him if he were to give him a penny the first day and double it every day for a month. Brother Wilson thought about that for a while. penny on day one. Two cents on day Four cents on day three. cents on day four. And by the end of the week he was only making sixty-four cents. So he told his boss he didn't think he would take him up on the offer. His boss left the room and Brother Wilson continued think about to question. As he studied on it, he realized what a huge mistake it would be to turn down an offer like that. amazement, at the end of thirty days he would have made \$10,737,416.67.

God has promised His people that they would possess the double. As we follow Him and are obedient to His commands, His promises build one on top of another, enriching every area of our lives, and they will eventually lead us to eternal life.

Application:

No. He held his tongue and kept silent. Keeping silent is a very difficult thing to do when things are said about or to us that we don't like. Our natural desire is to raise our voice and say what we think. Jesus knew God would ultimately defend Him. God did have the final say and those who had unfairly became accused Jesus verv silent. Furthermore, Jesus forgave His enemies their wrongdoing.

When things are said about us that we don't like, many times we feel like responding in anger. Very rarely do we feel like having a quiet and forgiving attitude. When we are treated in ways we don't like, we need to pray and tell Jesus how we honestly feel. We then need to ask Him for strength to be quiet and forgive. God will give us strength to do this if we ask Him!

JESUS OUR RISEN SAVIOUR AND KING

Lesson Text: Isaiah 53:9; John 19:38-42; Matthew 28:1-8; Acts 1:1-3

Bible Story:

Approximately 700 years before Jesus' crucifixion, it was prophesied that He would be put to death with the wicked but buried with the rich. Executed criminals in Jerusalem were typically denied a proper burial and dumped in a deep, narrow valley right outside the city walls. Not Jesus.

Joseph was a rich man at Jesus' crucifixion. He was a disciple of Jesus, a counsellor, and a good and just man who had waited for the Kingdom of God. As soon as he knew Jesus had died, he went boldly to Pilate, the governor, asking permission to take the body of Jesus and bury Him. Pilate granted permission, so Joseph and Nicodemus (the Pharisee who had found Jesus by night to talk to him), took Jesus' body down from the cross. They wrapped Him in fine linen with spices, as was Jewish custom. There was a garden with a new sepulcher (tomb) made out of rock in which no man had ever lain. They placed Jesus inside and rolled a stone in front of the door. Thus, the prophecy of Jesus being buried with the rich was fulfilled.

The Jews were afraid and they also went to Pilate. They said, "Sir, we remember that that deceiver said, while he was yet alive, 'After three days I will rise again.'" They were afraid the disciples would steal Jesus' body away by night and then tell people that He was risen from the dead. (Or maybe they were afraid He would indeed rise from the dead?) Pilate said, go make the tomb as secure as you can. So they sealed the stone and set soldiers to guard it.

Early Sunday morning there was a great earthquake, for the angel of the Lord descended from heaven and came and rolled back the stone from the door and sat upon it. The angel's face was like lightning and his clothes were white as snow. The soldiers began to shake in fear and fainted as dead men. Later, when the chief priests heard about all that had happened, they gave the

DRAWN FROM DEEP WATERS

He sent from above, he took me, he drew me out of many waters. Psalms 18:16

Each year, over seven thousand people die in drowning accidents. I was one of those people. It's often said the age of miracles is past. The fact that I am still walking and breathing proves this to be false: miracles can and do happen.

In the fall of 2013, I was invited to join friends in going duck hunting at a lake in Oklahoma . The last memory I have of that day is waking up to an alarm at 3:30 that morning. The next memory is regaining consciousness in a hospital bed two days later. Wading into the lake to retrieve a duck, I slipped into an underwater hole and my leg was caught. I was trapped underwater for five minutes before my comrades were able to find me and drag me to shore. At that point I had no heartbeat and was not breathing. They frantically gave CPR for the next ten minutes, after which I began to breathe again--a total of fifteen minutes without a single breath of air. This was the first of miracles since, in ordinary physical conditions, brain irreparable damage permanent death comes well before this extended amount of time.

It was forty-five minutes before any medical assistance could even find where we were at on the lake. I was rushed to a hospital via MediFlight where doctors did their best to fully revive me, but without success. I was in a comatose state, unresponsive, without brain activity. Understandably so, the medical staff assumed that even if I somehow survived, I would be in a vegetative state, totally brain dead. But God. Brother Curtis, a local minister, was in the near vicinity and was the first person to arrive on the scene. He asked

if he could enter my room to pray, which was granted since the doctors could do no more. Upon his prayer that God would grant mercy, backed by hundreds of saints across the country who had heard of my plight, I began to move and show signs of life.


God did a miraculous work. Within two days of my entrance to the hospital I was out of my coma and fully conscious. Within four days I was allowed to leave the hospital on my own two feet. My recovery was far from painless--I suffered a heart attack the following summer from the sustained heart damage. However, I am able to go and do, exert myself physically and was able to return to my University studies (from which I graduate in only four months). For God to grant me life was a miracle in itself, but to fully regain mental and physical capacity is a miracle and blessing unlike any I have otherwise seen or experienced.

There is a dual blessing in what God did for me. Had I passed into eternity in the condition I was when I waded into those waters... I would not have made heaven. By granting me one more chance at life, I had the opportunity to fully gain Salvation and turn my life around for God. It certainly wasn't because I was deserving of anything from God--He has no obligation to anyone when they've denied Him. However. I've since been told of the countless saints across the country that were incredibly burdened and in prayer for me on the day of my accident, before they even got the call of what happened. Without the prayers of so many. I don't know if I would have made it that day. None of us know when our end will come. It is imperative that we heed God's calling while we have the know opportunity. We not tomorrow may bring, but we can face the future with peace and assurance if our place with God is secure.



What great, amazing joy filled the hearts of Jesus' followers. Jesus then showed Himself to His disciples for forty days, speaking to them of things about the Kingdom of God before ascending into heaven.

Application:

Incredibly, against all human reasoning, Jesus rose from the dead. Neither the stone nor the soldiers were big enough or strong enough to keep Him in grave. The terrible, cruel words and actions of those who betrayed and crucified Jesus also lost their power.

Nothing in our lives, no matter what it is, is stronger than the power of Jesus Christ. Whatever hard things we face—discouragement, loneliness, the betrayal of friends, cruel words, or any other mountain of trouble—is not strong enough to destroy us if we will draw our strength and help from Jesus. He is sitting on the right hand of the throne of God waiting and listening for our prayers. Nothing is too big for our risen Saviour. We serve an "ALIVE KING!"

Joseph's Lineage: God's Promises

Lesson Text: Genesis 12:2-3; 15:1-6; 18:14; 21:1-5; 25:21-26; 27:6-29; 30:22-24; 32:24-28

Bible Story:

Joseph was a great, powerful, and faithful man of God. He is often looked up to as a Biblical hero, and his story is a true testament to how God can work in a person's life.

Even before Joseph was born, God's plan was in motion. Several generations before his birth, God promised Abraham that he would be a great nation. Abraham's children were to be greater in number than the stars in the heaven! Abraham trusted in God's promise and continued on his way, his faith increasing with every circumstance he encountered. Application:

Have you ever been through a particularly hard time and wondered why God was allowing it? Perhaps you lost a beloved grandparent and your life hasn't

Lesson Text: Genesis 37:3-36

Bible Story: Joseph was his father's favorite son, and Jacob did not do a good job at hiding it. Instead of treating his children equally, Jacob made Joseph a coat of many colors. Then, to make matters worse, Joseph had several dreams. In the first, he saw twelve sheaves of wheat in a field. Each sheave represented one of Jacob's twelve sons. Eleven of the sheaves bowed down to the sheave that was Joseph's and worshiped it. In the second, he dreamed that the sun, moon, and eleven stars also bowed to him. When Joseph told his brothers his dream, they became very angry at his words and mocked him cruelly. They simply could not forgive him.

Later, Jacob sent Joseph into the fields to check on his brothers as they watched over the flocks. When they saw him coming, they started scheming amongst themselves. What could they do to enact revenge on their little brother? They mocked him, saying, "Behold, this dreamer cometh!" They were so angry, they decided to kill him and throw his body into a dry well.

Thankfully, the eldest of the brothers stopped the rest from killing Joseph. He said instead, "Do not shed his blood, but cast him into the pit." So when Joseph came upon his brothers in the field, they tore his beautiful coat from around his shoulders and threw him into the pit. Feeling proud of themselves, they sat down to enjoy their meal when they saw some Ishmeelites passing by on their way to Egypt. Quickly forming a new plan, they decided to sell Joseph into slavery and tell their father that he had been slain by an evil beast.

When Jacob heard this, he was so grieved that he tore his clothes and refused to be comforted by his family.

Application: Have you ever been in a situation where favoritism was shown? If you are the favorite, it doesn't feel too bad to be treated well! But if you are

Have you ever wished you could be more like someone else? Discontentment is an easy seed for the devil to plant, and a hard weed to root once grown.

I was never really happy, and spent a portion of life berating myself and refusing to accept who I was - who God made. I wanted to act and look like a totally different person, instead of focusing on how God wanted to work through my life.

Thank the Lord for His faithfulness, love, and for lifting me out of bondage. Though I never wish to revisit that time period, I learned valuable lessons and truths through the Lord's gentle dealings.

Jeremiah 1:5 says, "Before I formed thee in the belly I knew thee..."

Psalm 139:14-17 says we are "fearfully and wonderfully made," for "when I was made in secret, and curiously wrought in the lowest parts of the earth, Thine eyes did see my substance, yet being unperfect; and in thy book all my

members were written, which in continuance were fashioned, when as yet there was none of them. How precious also are thy thoughts unto me, O God! how great is the sum of them!"

I go to these verses when I'm tempted to complain. God, the Maker of the universe, created me, and I was so focused on myself that it took a long time to grasp this wonderful truth.

If the devil gets us discontented, he gets our eyes off the Lord. It's a fleshly tendency to focus on the world's standard of appearance and success. But no lasting value is found chasing after or longing for these shallow standards.

Speaking of success, it's so easy to look at what someone else has and ignore what you have. I did, for a long time. But God specifically made you and me, which means He has a specific purpose for us.

Some time ago, the Lord impressed me with the thought that He places talents that mirror a little bit of Himself in every person He forms. I heard the Lord so clearly, and I was both encouraged and chastised. I spent so much time looking at the talents of others that I'd failed to recognize my own talents the Lord wanted to use.

Romans 12:6-8 says that we all have different gifts given to us, and that we should utilize those gifts.

What are your gifts? Whatever the ability, skill or interest, it was given by the Lord. Don't ignore the talents God blessed you with, no matter how small you think they are. The Lord desires us to use our abilities to glorify Him and continue His cause.

These thoughts continue to challenge me, as I seek the Lord's guidance for my life and how I can use my talents for Him.

If you end up in a situation where favoritism is being shown to you, how can you act in order to make those around you feel better? Making an effort to include them and showing extra kindness goes a long way toward soothing the hurt of coming in second. Being humble and gracious is absolutely necessary, and definitely a part of God's plan, if you are the one in the spotlight!

But how do you deal with the hurt of being rejected? When someone else is being favored, whether justified or not, it is hard to deal with your emotions. It helps to remember that your worth is placed SOLELY in God. His love for each of His children is allencompassing and equally measured. His love for you is just as powerful as His love toward the person next to you. He does NOT play favorites. Hanging onto this truth can be a help if you are struggling with not being the favored individual in a certain situation.

Take a look at Jacob. How did he feel when his favored son died? He REFUSED to be comforted by his family. It is so important, if you are in a position of leadership or power, that you do not show favoritism between those around you. Not only does it hurt them, but you will end up being deeply hurt in the end, too.

Potiphar's Wife: Resisting Temptation

Lesson Text: Genesis 39:7-20; Matthew 4:10

Bible Story: Joseph was a very powerful man in Potiphar's house. Everything Potiphar owned was given to Joseph to manage. Because of his position of power, Potiphar's wife soon took notice of him and began talking to him. Joseph was a good, honest man and he knew it was not a good thing to become friends with another man's wife. But she would not leave him alone!

One day, she came to Joseph and asked him be friends without Potiphar knowing. He refused her, saying, "Your husband has put me in a position of power in his house. It would be very wrong of me to go behind his back, and it would be a sin against God." Despite the fact that Joseph refused, Potiphar's wife continued to pester him.

Soon, she became angry that he would not go along with her wicked schemes! When no one was in the house, she set up a trap to frame Joseph. That means that she made it look like he was going behind Potiphar's back when he really wasn't. Joseph tried to escape her trap, but before he could get away, she grabbed his coat and tore it from around him as he ran.

When Potiphar returned, his wife lied to him, saying, "That Hebrew servant you brought into our house came and hurt me." Potiphar was very upset. He believed what his wife told him for it looked as though she had proof. But Joseph knew in his heart that he had done nothing wrong. Still, Potiphar put Joseph in the prison where the king's prisoners were kept.

Joseph was now in a foreign land, separated from his family, accused of a crime he did not commit, and locked in prison. Still he trusted in God.

Application: It is often hard to do the right thing. There is a reason that God's way is called the straight and narrow. It is a lot harder to stay on a narrow path than it is a wide one! Part of staying on that narrow path is resisting when Satan tempts us.

LET GO AND LET GOD

Life is full of lessons. Any time we go through something, God wants us to learn and grow from it. And sometimes, the best lessons and the most growth comes out of the hardest places in our lives.

A few years ago, I was in one of those hard places. I was struggling with a lot of fears and doubts and worries. The more I tried to figure it all out and fix my problems, the worse they seemed to get. Others talked and worked with me and it helped, but it didn't fix me. I started wondering if I'd ever be free and at rest from it all and if I would really be happy again. I finally began to realize I couldn't fix myself and neither could other people. Some needs in life go so deep there's only one person who can really help us out of the place we're in, and that's our Heavenly Father. It was time for me to fully trust Him.

I think of the story about the little boy trying to get his ball of string untangled, but he can't so he asks his dad to help. His dad can't untangle it either until the little boy gives him both ends of the string. That's like what I was doing. I wanted God to help me and fix my problems, but I wasn't handing it ALL over to Him. I finally realized, though, that was the only way I was going to get better.

Did you know that, as I started letting God have it all (everything I was worried about, everything I didn't understand, etc.), He started working with it and my big, ugly, knotted ball of string started getting untangled. Little by little, the fears and doubts started getting smaller, and hope started rising. Why? Because I was finally "letting go and letting God."

All my questions and problems didn't just disappear, but I wasn't the one trying to undo all the tangles anymore.

And something else started coming because of that: rest, the very thing I was looking for in the first place. It didn't happen all at once, and I can't even explain exactly how it all happened. But I believe God gave me some answers in a verse He showed me later--Hebrews 4:9-10. It says there's still a rest for people of God, but "he that is entered into his rest hath also ceased (stopped) from his own works." Not until I stopped trying with my own efforts did I get rest!


God had given me another promise earlier, but I didn't see at the time how He was fulfilling it. As I looked back later, I could see He really was working it out. It was Psalms 37:5, "Commit thy way unto the Lord; trust also in Him; and He shall bring it to pass." That word "commit" means "to roll off onto." Think of a man with a big, heavy burden on his back, but he rolls it off onto God's back. He's not bearing the weight of it anymore, and God's the one making things happen. I can testify that this is exactly what God did for me. When I was trusting in myself, or even in other people, to fix all my problems, it wasn't working. But when I "rolled off my way" onto the Lord and started really trusting Him with it, He started "bringing to pass" the help and the healing I needed. I'm so thankful for His love and patience with me, and I'm grateful for the lessons this hard place taught me and the growth it gave me.

Lesson Text: Genesis 39:20-23, 40:1-19

Bible Story:

We learned in the last lesson that Joseph was thrown into the prison where the king kept his prisoners. While Joseph was in prison, God showed mercy and allowed Joseph to gain favor in the sight of the prison keeper. Soon, the prison keeper had given Joseph charge over all the other prisoners, and whatever decisions and activities went on were approved by him. Just like Joseph's former master, the keeper of the prison barely paid attention to the things that were happening in his own prison. His trust in Joseph was so complete that he didn't worry about anything!

Joseph met two men while he was imprisoned. They were palace workers—one a butler and the other a baker. Both of them had done something to anger the pharaoh, and that is how they ended up in prison. One day, Joseph noticed that both men looked sad. When he asked why, they said, "We have dreamed dreams but there is no one to tell us what they mean." Joseph responded, "God is the interpreter of all dreams. Why don't you tell me and I will see if I can tell you what they mean."

The butler said, "In my dream, there was a grapevine with three branches. On each branch was a ripe bunch of grapes and I took them and pressed them into pharaoh's cup." The baker said, "In my dream, I held three baskets of baked meat upon my head for the pharaoh. But the ravens from the sky landed upon the baskets and ate all the meat."

Joseph told the butler that his dream meant he would be restored to his position in the palace in three days. However, the baker's dream meant that Pharaoh would hang him in three days! Joseph asked the butler to remember him when he returned to the palace, for he was unjustly imprisoned.

LIFE LINE

We have all heard people say, "Sometimes things get worse before they get better." A few years ago, I could only hope things could get better. Now, even though I do not understand exactly when it happened, I know it did.

When I was a very young teenager, I struggled with depression and thoughts of self-harm. However awful that sounds. I was forced to contend with it often. Many days, I dreaded getting out of bed. I could not face the day, my problems, or others. In short, I could not face life and as a result. I could not face my own demons. Even though my parents attempted methods to help with my depression, it did not go away. As I got older and went through an emotionally scarring time, problems began to compound upon themselves. I couldn't control my depression or the problems that were destroying my life, so I began to control the one thing that I could--my weight.

constantly counted calories and purposefully starved myself in a vain effort to measure up mγ expectations. I wanted to be accepted, to feel happiness, to feel in control, so I fooled myself into believing that the thinner I became, the more I would attain those goals. If I had only realized how incredibly wrong I was! From that point, I became absolutely hateful. I only cared about myself. As the problem began to worsen, at one point I started to go not only without eating, but drinking as well, because I believed that even liquid would make me feel fat. My soul was hurting and it seemed that even it's screams for help sometimes barely heard. Some nights, I would lay in bed, unable to lift my arms

without hands my shaking uncontrollably. I felt weak and sick, but, regardless, I was happy that I was controlling how much nourishment I allowed myself. As things progressed, I began disposing of food I was supposed to be eating. Sometimes, I flushed my food or threw it outside. Some days, I wanted to just eat a huge hamburger with no regrets, but I could rarely ever let that happen. In retrospect, I look at how miserable I was and I didn't even realize it. My friends and extended family did not know the struggle I was going through. I could paste a smile on my face and maintain a semi-social life, but inside, I was battling a war I could not win. I do not know how many prayers were offered for me during this time, but I know it was many. I cannot imagine how much I must have hurt my mother as she watched me, unable to help. I know I must have hurt my family terribly with my selfishness and hateful spirit.

As bad as the situation became, God was faithful to love me, encourage me, and give me hope, which was what I needed most. When I was unlovable, He loved me. When I failed, He forgave me. When I could not find my way, He guided me. I cannot thank God enough for always being my rock. Now, my depression has disappeared and even though I have scars from my eating habits, I am at a healthy weight and thriving.

This is my first time sharing my whole story publicly, but I have learned to cherish my story of victory. All praise to God for safely bringing me through some of the darkest days I have ever faced. Having the support network that I had, I have made it out alive and am stronger than ever.

Joseph was in a place he thought he

would never be! How was he to find work to do for God when he was stuck in prison? Surely, all of his talents were going to waste in the dirty, dank cells. But that was not Joseph's attitude! We don't know exactly what Joseph was doing or saying, but the simple work that Joseph was completing was the work God had for him at the time.

If he hadn't been faithful in his work, this opportunity would never have come his way! When he was given another chance to work for God by interpreting their dreams, he was faithful again.

If you are praying for a specific calling, be sure you don't miss the everyday opportunities that you have to do God's work—clean the church after service, help your mom out around the house, or help your little siblings with their homework. Seven more cows, thin and starving, came out of the river and devoured the fat cows. In the second dream, he dreamed that a stalk of corn had seven hearty, delicious-looking ears on it, but seven thin ears of corn devoured the hearty ears.

Pharaoh was so troubled, he called for all his magicians and wise men to interpret the dreams. None of the men could tell the pharaoh what the dreams meant. Suddenly, the butler remembered Joseph and told the pharaoh about him. The pharaoh quickly called for Joseph, who was brought from the prison and given new clothes and a haircut.

Joseph told the pharaoh, "I cannot interpret dreams, but God shall give you an answer." So Pharaoh told Joseph his dreams. Joseph said, "The two dreams mean the same thing. God has showed me that the seven fat cows and the seven flourishing ears of corn represent seven years when the food will grow in abundance. The seven skinny cows and thin ears of corn represent seven years of famine. Have you ever had to wait for something you were very anxious for? Good things or bad, sometimes it is VERY hard to be patient and play the waiting game. It is often doubly hard if there is uncertainty involved. The enemy likes to attack us with questions and doubt. "What will I do

if this happens? How will things change if this happens? I won't be able to manage if this happens!" Thankfully, there is a peace and comfort that is especially provided for those times by God. A common verse in Jeremiah 29:11 says, "For I know the thoughts that I think toward you, saith the LORD, thoughts of peace, and not of evil, to give you an expected end."

Even in Joseph's waiting and wondering, God's plan was at work. It wasn't what Joseph wanted to be sold by his brothers, forced into slavery, falsely accused, and imprisoned unjustly. But God had a mighty plan that worked all of those terrible things for good, if only Joseph could wait for the right time.

The same type of situation occurred to another faithful servant of God. Esther was taken from her life and forced to become queen. She, too, suffered and was forced to wait for God's plan to be revealed. But her faith, even in her waiting, was strong. She said, "Who knoweth whether thou art come to the kingdom for such a time as this?" (Esther 4:14).

It goes against our human nature to wait when we want change or an answer right away. But take comfort: if you are waiting, your faith will carry you through. God's great plan will be revealed in His time.

It was a summer day in Oklahoma, about the time when the grass begins to lose its lush appearance. The sun was warm, and the wind blustered as persistently as it always did. At that time, we lived in a bricked doublewide that sat at the back of a five acre lot. There were woods on either side and the back of the property, and an open field in the front led up to the road. Running through the woods, there was a tiny creek that was fairly dry most of the time. But on this particular afternoon, my dad, my sister, and I were headed out to this little creek to turn our pet fish loose.

My sister and I were only about three and four at that time, but I remember following behind Dad, stepping carefully over this and that as we made a path between trees and over fallen limbs. I had on a pair of my favorite pink flip-flops, my short legs trying to keep up with Dad, as well as be cautious of where I stepped. I don't know exactly how I missed the little gray nest sitting on the ground, or how I managed to step on it, but it didn't go unnoticed for long as a much-dreaded hum drifted to our ears. Before I really knew what was happening, my dad whipped around and snatched Kaytra into his arms. The little bag that held our fish lay forgotten on the ground as he helped me onto his back. The hum grew louder as we became enveloped in an angry cloud of rudely awakened bees. Dad took off running for the house, jumping over branches and dodging trees as he carried Kaytra and me. As we gained sight of the house, I remember feeling like my arms could not maintain their lock on Dad's neck any longer. But somehow they did-perhaps it was the nagging of our angry pursuers or the fear of one particular inside critter buzzing my nostrils. Whatever the case, it renewed my desperation and determination to not let go, as my ride to the house solely depended on me hanging on with everything I had.

By the time Dad stumbled up the hill to the house and busted into the front door, Kaytra and I were covered with stings. Mom quickly got a bath of water and baking soda going. I remember wanting to get into the water, as my body ached all over from the stings. Meme and Papa were called over to pray for us. I must have lost consciousness after the bath, because I remember waking up on the couch in the den when it was still light outside. I was covered with bags of ice; it was so cold! I looked over across the room where they were huddled over Kaytra, also blanketed with ice, and praying for her. Uncomfortable, I began trying to remove the ice from my body until they stopped me and tried to help me understand that the ice was going to help the stings.

I don't remember anything else beyond that point, but I know things began to get serious. Momma and Dad had no idea if we girls were allergic to bees, which was a scary unknown. We were so young and so small, and our bodies had absorbed enough poison to be detrimental. Meme called Brother Stanley, who was our pastor at the time, for prayer and he warned her that if we started to gasp for breath, it could be too late for Kaytra and I. From a medical standpoint, there could be no hope. When Meme walked back into the room after the phone call, I was gasping for breath. She fell on her knees by my side begging God for mercy, because if He didn't step in, I could easily die.

Not too long afterwards, the Lord had mercy. He answered prayer! Kaytra and I could have died; we showed every symptom. But God had another plan. So He reached down, with His unmerited love and grace, and touched our bodies. Thank the Lord! Because of a loving Savior, my sister and I are alive today.

Lesson Text: Genesis 28:13-15; 32:9-12; 42:36-28; 43:1-14

Bible Story:

When Joseph's nine brothers returned home, Jacob scolded them saying, "You have taken my children away from me! First Joseph dies, Simeon is imprisoned, and you would take Benjamin from me as well. Everything is against me!" Reuben said to his father, "Kill my two sons if I do not bring Simeon and Benjamin back to you." Jacob replied, "My son, Benjamin, will not go with you. He is the only son of Rachel I have left and if something were to happen to him along the way, I shall die in sorrow." So the sons of Jacob stayed in the land of Canaan while the famine grew worse and worse. Soon, their large families ate all of the food they had brought back from Egypt. When Jacob realized this, he said to his sons, "Go again to Egypt and buy us a little food." Judah replied, "The man from Egypt commanded that we did not return unless our brother, Benjamin, went with us. If you allow him to go, we will go and buy more food." Jacob's heart was grieved. He said, "Why did you tell that man you had a younger brother in the first place?" Judah reminded his father, "The man asked us directly if our father was still alive and if we had any other brothers! How were we supposed to know he would demand to meet Benjamin? Please send him with us so we can buy food for our children. If we return without him, I will bear the blame forever." Reluctantly, Jacob said, "If you must take him, take our best fruits, balm, honey, spices, and nuts as a gift to this man. God give you mercy that you can bring Benjamin back to me, for if he is lost, I will be gravely grieved."

Application:

Do you remember the dream Jacob had early in his life? What did God tell him after he awoke from that dream? "I am the Lord God of your fathers, Abraham and Isaac. I will give you and your family the land where you now lie, and your children will be numbered as the dust of the earth, spreading in all directions.

CHANGE AND FAITH

I hope this little insight into the last couple months of my life has encouraged you not to let yourself be overwhelmed by how much life changes. If you let Him, the Lord wants you to grow in Him, and keep learning how amazing He is!

How different this prayer sounds than the words he spoke to his sons. Jacob's faith earlier in his life was almost tangible. He was SO sure that God would take care of him because God had promised it. Where was this faith when it came to his favored son, Benjamin? Where is the prayer full of confidence that God would deal well with him?

How easy it is to be like Jacob and forget God's promises to us. Did you know there are over 5,000 promises in the Bible that say God will take care of us? Sometimes it takes great faith to step forward and act on those promises, but it is far worse if we sit back and grumble in fear, as Jacob did in this instance. Choose to be like the young Jacob—his faith in God was unshakable, and only faith will ensure that God's promises will be fulfilled for us.

Joseph's Test: Repentance

Lesson Text: Genesis 43:15-34; 44; 45:1-9

Bible Story:

When Joseph saw his brothers coming, he told his servant to make a large feast and invite the men to eat with him. His brothers were afraid because of the money they had found on their way home, but the servant eased their fears and brought Simeon out to them. When Joseph came home to eat, he asked how his brothers were. When he saw Benjamin, he was so moved to see him that he ran from the room and wept. Later, they feasted, and Joseph gave Benjamin five times as much food as the rest of the brothers. When the brothers were leaving, Joseph placed his silver cup in Benjamin's sack. He then sent his servant after his brothers and accused them of stealing. The men knew no one had stolen a silver cup, so they promised if Joseph's servant could find it, the man whose sack it was in would die and the rest would become slaves. When the cup was found in Benjamin's sack, the men returned to Joseph and fell before him on the ground. They begged that Benjamin's life would be spared. Judah said, "Our father favors his youngest two sons. The one is dead, and Benjamin is left. If I came home without him, my father would surely die. Please, let Benjamin go and take me as a servant instead." Joseph could no longer stand the secret. He cried out with a loud voice and revealed who he was to his brothers. He said, "Do not be sad or angry that you sold me into slavery, for God sent me here to preserve our family through the famine. Now hasten to my father and tell him I am still alive and that God has made me ruler of Egypt!"

Application:

The Bible says that Joseph commanded his servants to make a feast for his brothers when he saw that they had returned to Egypt. Does this sound familiar to you? Is there another story where a feast was prepared when someone returned home? The father of the prodigal son did the same thing as Joseph. Both instances tell stories of repentance.

A GREAT ADVENTURE

By the time we started our long journey home back to the States, the sun was beginning to set over the desert horizon in the little Indian village of Santa Catarina, Baja California, Mexico. What an adventure it had been... and little did I know it would be the beginning of an unexpected and very surprising new adventure in my life!

It all started one day when my dad asked if I would like to go with a group of saints in search of a Pai-pai Indian tribe living miles into the desert interior of Virginia Wittenborn had read Mexico. about them in a magazine. The goal: find this tribe and take the gospel to them. Well, I was just a worldly, almost 15-year-old boy visiting my dad, and I had no interest in helping take the gospel to anyone; but, hey, I was goodto-go on what sounded to me like a summer adventure great before returning home and starting back to school! We did find the Indians we were looking for, and a gospel mission was eventually built there.

But what happened on the drive home that 4th of July weekend in 1958 changed my life forever. As I lay alone in the bed of the pickup camper Dad was driving, my mind was filled with the exciting thoughts of going home, seeing my friends, and starting high school. For an almost 15-year-old, my life was full of worldly fun and activities. I loved sports, music, parties... and dancing. stepdad and mom were quite well-todo; I had everything. Yeah, everything... but peace in my heart. sometimes lie awake at night and think about my life and the miserable way I acted and talked and lived. And I would think about heaven... and hell. Do you ever do that? Lie in bed at night and think about your life? Think about heaven? Hell? Eternity? I knew from a boy what it meant to be saved, have my sins forgiven and live a Christian life. I had even given my heart to God a few times when visiting my dad during summer vacations, only to go back to the same old life when I returned home to Mom and my stepdad. Deep down, I was not happy. Not happy at all.

As I lay there thinking about all that stuff, God began talking to my heart, convicting me of my sins, letting me know He loved me, and asking if I would give my heart to Him. Finally, alone in that camper, in the middle of the night, I said, "Yes, Lord." But then, as clear as anyone ever spoke to me, He said, "If I forgive you of your sins and come into your heart, will you live for me forever, and NEVER TO GO BACK ON ME AGAIN?" Whoa! Hold on! That stopped me cold. FOREVER? NEVER GO BACK? I hit the wall on THAT! That was one lifechanging decision to make! There I struggled for some long time: give up my sports? give up my worldly music? give parties? mν give uр dancing? Right then and there I said one big YES! And I meant it. A literal weight lifted off my shoulders! I felt light and free and happy! Liberated! I wanted to sing!

I have never wavered from that decision. Never gone back. It's been 58 years since that 4th of July weekend, and I have never once regretted that decision. It was the best decision I ever made. As the great American poet, Robert Frost, said, "...it has made all the difference." I thank God everyday for the change He brought about in my life.

"What a wonderful change in my life has been wrought, since Jesus came into my heart!"

that they were changed men by the time the famine struck the land.

Do you suppose sometimes God tests our repentance the way Joseph tested his brothers? Joseph wanted to be sure that his brothers were sorry for the wrong they had committed against him. It had been many years since he had seen them, and he had no way of knowing how their actions had affected them. So he set up tests to determine the state of their hearts. They proved to be repentant!

Often times, we tell God we are sorry for the sins we have committed, but we are unwilling to change our ways. God will send tests and trials to solidify our resolve to do what is right. Repentance is more than just being sorry for what we've done wrong—it's being willing to COMPLETELY change the way we live in order to do what we know is right. That takes a lot more commitment than simply uttering the words, "I'm sorry."

Let's learn from Joseph's brothers. If we commit a wrong, let's be willing to give up everything in order to make it right.

The Story of Joseph

Jacob Moves to Egypt: Parent's and Children

Lesson Text: Genesis 46:29-30; 47:7-10, 12, 28-31; 48:12; 50:1-14

Bible Story:

Joseph's brothers returned to Jacob and informed him that Joseph was alive! At first, Jacob did not believe his sons, but soon he was convinced to make the journey to Egypt to reunite with his beloved Joseph. When Joseph saw his father coming, he went out to meet him in a chariot and fell upon his neck, crying with joy.

Joseph settled his family in the land of Goshen, then took his father and presented him to the pharaoh. Pharaoh asked Jacob, "How old are you?" Jacob responded, "The days of my pilgrimage are one hundred and thirty years." The Bible says that Joseph nourished his aging father, giving him the best of the land, along with enough bread to feed everyone in his family. For seventeen years, Jacob lived in Egypt. In one instance, Joseph bowed himself before his father, displaying love and respect beyond words. When his time came to die, Jacob requested that his body be returned to the place where Abraham and Isaac had been buried. Joseph swore to his father that his wishes would be followed. When Jacob finally died, Joseph wept over his father's body and mourned deeply. He then took Jacob's body and returned it to the land of Canaan to be buried with his ancestors. Joseph dedicated seven days to the mourning of his father at his burial place. His grief was so intense, that the people of the land looked on and said, "This is a grievous mourning to the Egyptians."

Application:

It is clear as you read through Joseph's story that he was highly favored by his father. But how did Joseph treat Jacob? There is not much recorded about their relationship before Joseph was sold into slavery, but after he was reunited with his family, Joseph's respect and admiration for his father is abundantly clear.

JOURNEY WITH JESUS

I am a girl who has been raised in a very good Christian home. My parents taught me the ways of the Lord. They showed me by example how the Lord wants us to live a selfless life, and they showed me the benefits of a life lived for Christ. 

Upon first seeing him in Egypt, Joseph fell on Jacob's neck and wept for an extended period of time. He took the time and trouble of presenting his father, no doubt with much pride, to Pharaoh. He went to a great amount of effort to ensure that Jacob's family was cared and provided for in the land of Goshen. When Jacob was on his death bed,

Joseph made a promise to bury his father in the manner which he desired.

As children and young adults, we are subject to our parent's decisions and leading. The fifth commandment is to "honor your father and mother," but that is not always the easiest thing to do. Often times, their decisions cross what we to want do. or guidelines thev set seem too overbearing. Developing an attitude of resentment is such an easy thing to do, and it is a tool the enemy uses against us. However, God desires that our hearts remain soft and receptive to the leadership of our parents.

Like Joseph, there may come a time where you are highly successful or come into a position of leadership. Despite his power, Joseph showed immense respect for his father. That is how we should always treat our parents—with a deep honor and due respect for the sacrifices they made to raise us. Circumstances of life change. You will not always be subject to your parents, but how you treat them should remain consistent. Do as Joseph, and display a heartfelt and unmoving love and respect for your parents until their last day on Earth.

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
