"It's your resolution," Mother said. "You ought to make it yourself."







"Because I want you to have it," said Betty.


At school the next day Betty noticed that Linda had no lunch. "Linda," she said, "Please come and help me eat my lunch."



"Della, I saw you love Sue and I really believe you meant it this time," Mother told her later. Remember what a dear saint said one time: be what you are and not what you are."



"Where did this come from?" Julia saw the bright penny the president had given her.


"Oh, that's the money Uncle Abe gave me!" she answered eagerly. I earned it helping him carry his valise."

Randy did go home and got saved. Sue was happy and Randy was also.



Oh, how great is the mercy and mindfulness of the Lord to us, who are His unworthy children! Let us magnify Him together.



"Do you mean that you and Mother feel as sorry when I do wrong as I did when my car quit running?" asked Johnny.


"We surely do, Son. We want you to do right always and be kind and obey us with a smile. That makes us happy and you are happy, too, aren't you?"

"No wonder the disciples were so happy on the day of Pentecost when the Holy Spirit came to fill their hearts," James stated.







"Oh, Mother, that was I," Raymond said smiling bashfully. "The boys didn't like it but I felt sorry for Mr. Jones. He is crippled."





"Two candy bars!" Mother said, with her voice full of love and excitement. "You spent your money for them. You are both lovely darlings."


"Mother liked our gift better than any other that she got, didn't she?" Johnny said to Marie when they were alone. "I am so glad we made her happy."


"I don't want it," Lois said. "Get it out of here."
