God said to Jonah, "Should you be angry?"


Jonah went out of the city and sat under a booth. He sat there to wait and see what would happen to Nineveh.


God made a vine to grow up by Jonah's booth. The vine was nice and shady. Jonah was very glad to have the vine.


Mary said to Jesus, "Son, don't You know that we have been looking for You? We have been worried."

Jesus said to him, "Baptize Me anyway. I should be baptized too."



Jesus' mother told the servants, "If Jesus tells you to do anything, do it."


Jesus said to the servants, "Fill the wine jars with water."

Nicodemus said, "How can I be born again? Can I become a baby and be born again?"



Jesus' relatives tried to make Jesus come and eat. They said to each other. "Jesus is beside Himself."


Some scribes came from Jerusalem. They said, "Jesus can make devils go out of people because He has a devil in himself."

The other records said to each other "That's had. Jesus is going home."


The other people said to each other, "That's bad. Jesus is going home with a sinner."

Now, which of the two men do you think was the happiest? Which one loved that man the most because he didn't have to pay the money?"


Simon said, "I suppose the one who owed the most money loved him most."







The Pharisees said, "Tell us again how he made you well."


The man said, "Do you want to be His disciples too?"


The Pharisees said, "We are Moses' disciples. We don't know where this other man came from."



Right away the man was made well. He did as Jesus said. He picked up his bed and walked. That day was the sabbath day.


The Jews saw the man carrying his bed. They said to him, "It is wrong for you to be carrying your bed on the sabbath."


The man said to them, "The man who made me well told me to pick up my bed and walk."

That night JESUS, God's Son, was born on earth. Mary wrapped her little baby in swaddling clothes and laid Him in the manger.


Shepherds came to see JESUS. They said that angels had appeared out of heaven to tell them about this baby. The angels said, "Glory to God and peace to men."
