


Jacob worked hard for Laban during his stay. One day, Laban came to talk with him about wages. "You are my family. You should not work for nothing," Laban protested.



One day, Jacob went to Laban. "Let me go to my own country," Jacob requested. "Let me take my family and my children. I have worked for you. You know that I have done well for you."


Laban urged Jacob to stay. "The Lord has blessed me because of you," Laban said. "Tell me what you wish to work for and I will give it to you."
