

"Yeah!" Tommy says loudly. His cheeks flush and he quietly repeats himself.


Jack looks around at the boys sitting at the table. "Tommy caught a big fish at my house last night," he announces.

At the last supper Peter professed his love for Jesus. But later he denied knowing Jesus three times.


What farm animal reminded Peter of his lies?

JAMES AND JOHN BEING A SERVANT


Supplies: Colored construction paper (including red), washable craft paint, paper towels, newspaper (or something to cover the table with), glue, markers/crayons

John- The Disciple Jesus Loved

Do you remember the "Sons of Thunder?" Right! James and John. John is one of the well-known disciples—we have a lot of information about him. In your Bible we have several books he likely wrote: The Gospel of John, 1st, 2nd and 3rd John as well as Revelation.

When Jesus and his disciples were eating the Passover together, the Bible tells us John was sitting close to Jesus and leaning on Him. It describes John as the disciple whom Jesus loved. (Read John 13:23.) How special to be loved by Jesus! Later, when Jesus was hanging on the cross, He looked down at John and asked him to take care of Mary, his mother. The day Jesus arose from the grave, John was told by Mary the tomb was empty. John ran as fast as he could to see it. How happy he must have been when Jesus appeared to him later! Can you think of any other stories that include John? (Hint: there is a song about fishing that includes him).

John focused on love in his writings. He explained that God loved us before we loved him. He encouraged us to love our brothers--not only say we love them but prove it by our actions and truth (1 John 3:18). Loving our brothers and sisters may not always be easy, but if we stick close to Jesus, like John did, it makes it easier to love those around us.

"I'm so glad Jack was with me," Violet says as she leans on her father's chest. "He kept me safe."


Jack puffs out his chest and tries to match his father's strides as they return home safe and sound.

Can you name the disciples we've studied so far? Let's focus on Philip today. When Jesus started calling his disciples, He called to Philip, "Follow me." Philip was so excited he found Nathanael and said, "We've found him! The one Moses and the prophets wrote about! Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph!" Nathanael came to Jesus and after talking with Jesus, agreed with Philip—they had found the Son of God!

Remember the story when Jesus fed over 5,000 people with five loaves of bread and two fish? When the people were hungry, Jesus asked Philip, "Where will we buy bread so everyone can eat?" We have already learned about five disciples that Jesus called to follow Him. Their names are Andrew, Peter, James, John, and Philip. When Philip was called, he was so excited that Jesus had found him, that he ran and told his friend Nathanael about the Messiah. Nathaneal wasn't sure that Jesus really was the Son of God, so he said, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?"

Remember, Jesus grew up in Nazareth, and most people did not like that place!

Philip convinced Nathanael to come and meet Jesus anyway, and when Jesus saw him, He said, "Behold, a man in whom is no guile!" That means, "Look, a man who always tells the truth." 


DOUBTING THOMAS


An hour later, the children crowd around their mother and the new little bundle she holds close to her chest. They stare in awe at the perfect little eyes looking back at them.

Amy doesn't look at Violet the rest of the day.


