Amy asks Jesus to also be her friend that day after school in the quiet of her bedroom.


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

STAINED GLASS CROSS

Supplies: Black paper, glue, colored tissue paper

Directions: Use the template to cut the cross out of a piece of black paper. Children may need help cutting the inside piece of the cross out. Choose one piece of whole tissue paper and use it the template to cut out a cross, making sure the edges overlap enough to glue onto the black "frame cross." Then, cut small squares out of the different colors of tissue paper and glue them to the one solid piece of tissue paper. Hang in a window and let the light shine through!

Father and son walk to the dining hall together to share a potluck Easter lunch with their church family.



Road to Emmaus


"Sing a song, or shout for joy!" Katherine offers.

Violet's mom watches her daughter and the joy bubbling out of her soul. She thanks the Lord for meeting her daughter in this ordinary moment in the garden.


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


JESUS ON THE ROAD


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THE TREE OF KNOWLEDGE

"You, my dear lady," Anderson says. "Now Jack and Violet will share something they love about you."




The boy looks eagerly at the food.


Violet's eyes fill with happy tears as she watches the children eating hungrily. Violet now knows what God means about giving with a willing heart.

Jack and Violet stare blankly at their father.




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NUMBER ONE DAD RIBBON
