The Gospel

The gospel is the most important and interesting thing in the life of a Christian. In the gospel by St. Mark we read, beginning at the fourteenth verse of the first chapter: "Now after that John was put in prison Jesus came into Galilee preaching the gospel of the kingdom of God, and saying, The time is fulfilled and the kingdom of God is at hand; repent ye and believe the gospel."

The gospel is for all. It's first message is to repent and the next is to believe. There are some things about the gospel that make it so important to us. Let us call your attention to a few of them by the Word.

The gospel is the Word of God (St. John 14: 24). It is true (John 17: 17). It is the spirit and life of the Christian, yea, eternal life (John 6: 63 and 68). And without this spirit and life we are none of His. That is to say that if the gospel is not the ruling factor in our lives working through our love for God and our Savior Jesus Christ, we are not Christians no matter what we call ourselves (Rom. 8: 9).

It is even more than that; it is the food for the soul to keep it alive unto God. After bringing life it sustains it (Matt. 4: 4). This gospel is also the water of Life spoken of by our Lord Jesus in the fourth chapter of St. John. Now some of the things it teaches may be found in Titus 2: '1-14 where Paul summed up a few of them, "For the grace of God that bringeth salvation, hath appeared to all men. teaching us that denying ungodliness and worldly lusts we should live soberly, righteously, and godly in this present world. Looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ, who gave himself for us, that he might redeem us from all iniquity, and purify unto himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works."

This is the word which Paul told both Timothy and Titus to preach, and the gospel which Jesus commanded to preach to every creature (Mark 16: 15). That takes in high, low, rich and poor of every race of men, and I am not ashamed of it, for it is the power of God to my salvation, and will be to every one that believes and obeys it. — Ray Key.

DIE OUT TO SELF

"The spirit of self, whether it take a material or a moral shape, has ever the same result, that of utterly blinding us. We fancy that we see and know ourselves truly, but nothing can be a greater delusion: we will not let our eyes be opened, and are vexed with those who attempt the task. All suggestions and remonstrances are attributed either to unkindness or error; no matter how justly fault is found, wounded self-love is irritable and intolerant of the slightest touch. On the same principle we feel perfectly competent to judge and direct ourselves, and even those whose office it is to direct us. Self love thinks no director wise who will not soothe and flatter it: and he who requires the submission of our own opinion and will, stands a chance of being forsaken as depriving the conscience of liberty. Tell us when under the influence of this dangerous enemy, self, that we must resist it, and conquer our dislikes, try to open our eyes to our pet faults, point out the serious result and wrong influence, ask any sacrifice of us and we start away at once from the intolerant yoke. Excuses without end are at hand; we are misunderstood, it is all exaggeration or mistake, in short every body is wrong save ourselves. Yet, there can be no real holiness without the destruction of odious self; all Christian doctrine, all the workings of grace aim at this point. The love of God and of self are as the two opposing scales of the spiritual balance. and it one rises the other must inevitably sink.

Johannes Seitz, Mighty In Prayer

"When I was in East Prussia at one time a young fellow came to me who was the son of a landed proprietor. He said he was in such a fearful condition that he intended to shoot himself, but an acquaintance had said to him, 'Don't do that. I was in the same misery, but I went to Brothers Blaich and Seitz in Bahnau, and the Lord delivered me. You go

thither and you also will get relief.'

"So he came to us. He was honest and straightforward, but confessed to so many and such horrible misdeeds as to give one a clear idea of what abysses of sin well-to-do people sometimes throw themselves into. He was following hard on his evil course when one night satanic powers overpowered him. He told us very much of that night in which these hellish beings took possession of him. From day to day his sufferings became greater. Twice he had attempted In this terrible condition he came to us. suicide. He bowed honestly before the Word of God, but could not find in himself a trace of faith. No single word of promise or comfort touched him in the least. He asserted that there was no rescue for him, no more forgiveness. He had sinned too greatly.

"I said to my wife, 'If he leaves us without being helped he will surely take his life. He is really plagued by the enemy and his sufferings are great. We must be determined to pray again and continuously.' We prayed therefore hours at a time in the day, and my wife, with a friend of hers, deep into the night. When we had continued for a long time there came from himself a fearful beating upon the breast. This caused him so to cry out that the whole neighborhood collected before the house, and I feared that they would call the police. He was also cast about the room so violently that chairs were upset.

"This led us to cease praying, for every time we stopped praying the outcries stopped. I determined the next evening to move him from the ground floor to a higher story and to pray below, but only after he had gone to sleep. In this way he would not be conscious of the fact that we were praying for him. But when we had continued for a little we began to hear the same fearful outcries and noise as on the preceding evening. We ceased not, however, and held on until midnight. All at once the cries suddenly ceased, and instead we heard a kind of very loud talking. I slipped up to his door and listened. I heard him crying to God out of the depths of his soul. 'Ah, dear God, I have acted as no beast would act, but thou hast had pity on me, and hast freed me from the power of the Devil.'

"It was an alternate cry and thanksgiving to God for freedom. I went into his room to quiet him out of regard to the neighbors. He continued a long time praying, and on the next morning came to us overflowing with joy, saying that he was now free. The attendant who slept in his room said that, before the possessed was liberated, demons had cried from within him, 'We must go! We cannot hold out against this eternal praying!' This shows what power there really is in persistent prayer.

"One other thing was wonderful. Now he could really believe. It was as if the Spirit of God had indeed come over him. The working of the Spirit showed itself in our prayer-meetings. He ever prayed first, and in such a spirit of joy and with such power that old and experienced Christians had the greatest blessing from his prayers. When he reached home he worked among his associates with blessed results. This is but one example of how the powers of evil prevent belief, which comes, however, in answer to the priestly intercession of the believer."

"I have found," said this experienced Christian, "that one can accomplish nothing against satanic powers unless one stands on the site of Golgotha and the blood of Christ. And if one cannot cast out a single evil spirit without the help of Christ's blood, how can all mankind be converted and brought out of the power of sin and Satan if Golgotha be evaded? In our time nothing can help but primitive Biblical Christianity. All Christians should see to it that there be no rest until we get back to the power of the primitive church, that the same mighty things may happen which occurred through Christ and his apostles."

Seitz often faced the terrible satanic depressions, which held others in bondage, and overcame them by prayer. He tells the following striking story:

"About this time I came into Silesia to a colony of Moravians. In the family where I lodged the mother of the house was tortured with the most fearful depressions. She battled for life until she was quite worn out. But when she came to God and was cured her joy was such that she could only cry to him, 'Tell me only how I can thank Thee and please Thee.' Then she received an indubitable command to go after the most deeply sunken women and girls of the city and to say to them, 'The Saviour has loved and sought and redeemed you, too. His whole redemptive work is for you also.' Thereat in great joy she went to these outcasts and was able to rescue a number of them. She brought them to her house and I held various meetings for them.

"One day she came from a funeral, saying, 'Bro. Seitz, the depths of God's grace have been manifested in her whom we buried today. She was a second Rahab, and God did for her what he did for Rahab. She was among the lowest street-women, and because of her evil life had for some years been on a bed of

sickness. I visited her often, but she was so hardened that no word of Scripture had any effect. When I saw that death was approaching I went home, took my Bible into my prayer room, and said, 'Heavenly Father, it is written in the Bible, "Is not my word... like a hammer that breaketh the rock in pieces?" (Jer. 23: 29.) I have not found the word that can crush this stony heart. If there is in Scripture that which can melt or break it show it to me.'

"Her attention was called to Isaiah 43: 1-4, 'Fear not: for I have redeemed thee, I have called thee by thy name; thou art mine,' and so on. When she read the lines she was startled and felt that there was some mistake. Such words were surely too good for so deprayed a person. But the Spirit of God insisted: 'These are the words I have given thee: theu must bring them to her.'

"So she put her Bible under her arm and went to see the dying woman, saying, 'I have brought you something beautiful. The Saviour sent me to say to you, "Fear not: for I have redeemed thee, I have called thee by thy name; thou art mine." 'When the woman heard these words she sank back on the pillow, drew the bedelothes over her head, and, after a little, began sobbing. Finally she broke out with. 'Is it true? Can he love me? I have been too wicked. But it must be true, otherwise he would not have sent it to me.' Her heart was broken. On the days following she asked that this text be read again ard again."

In contrast to this, read Matt. 5: 21; 6: 14, 15; 31-33; 7; 21. He wants the best for His people, and to obey is better than sacrifice. He referred to these teachings as, "Sayings of mine." Matt. 7: 24.



EDITORIALS

The writer had the pleasure of attending part of the Shawnee, Okla. camp-meeting held in July, and we can say that it was a precious meeting. The attendance, singing and preaching were good. Unity, harmony and peace prevailed. Some were saved and some sanctified. All were rejoicing in the Spirit and felt it was good to be there.

We also attended the last five days of the Neosho, Mo. camp-meeting and found a large gathering of people at this meeting. About 24 camp tents were on the grounds. Crowds came in to the night services from all around the country. The large tent was packed and many standing all around. The preaching was with power and authority and much holy anointing, and the altar of prayer was filled with seekers night after night; many getting saved and others taking their places, praying through to victory. Many voices of the "newly born" were heard in the meeting as God forgave and sent peace. Quite a number were sanctified wholly and a great many were healed of bodily afflictions and shouted the victory for his wonderful power of healing. The ordinance service was an impressive scene with much joy and comfort in the Spirit. Some 115 happy saints took part in these services, showing humility, love for Jesus, our sacrifice and holy love to one another. It was a melting time in the Spirit to long be remembered by those in attendance. All praises be to God who gives us the victory again and again.

The Oklahoma City camp-meeting was very well attended, even though the weather was extremely hot and dry. A large body of ministers were present, ineluding five from Calif. and some from Missouri. The first part of the meeting was somewhat in a deadlock, spiritually speaking, on account of conflicting forces. The saints kept in earnest prayer and Gcd worked. There was a giving up, a melting down, confessing and repenting done and a running together which brought liberty and unity with freedom, and the meeting continued with much shouting and praising God with quite a number of souls saved. Twelve or fourteen were at the altar the last night of the meeting and the Lord lifted the burden from souls and set the captives free.



In the Gospel Trumpet paper of 1908 the question was asked, "Why do not saints (men) wear neckties?" The answer was: "For the reason that they are for adornment only and as such are not needful nor useful." This answer is fully in harmony with the New Testament teaching of the apostles on the dress question. "Be not conformed to this world," found in Rom. 12: 2, which should be sufficient scripture to cause those who love the Lord to refrain from dressing in the fads and fashion of the world. "That women adorn themelves in modest apparel," recorded in 1 Tim. 2: 9, should be all the scripture that would be needed to cause an humble saint to put on dress enough to cover their limbs and other portions of their body which vulgar, worldly-minded women expose.

The editor of the Faith and Victory was never more determined than now to stand for the old time truths taught by Jesus Christ, voiced and witnessed by Peter, James, Paul and John and the other apostles; uncovered and taught by D. S. Warner and later "Evening Light" ministers. When we see Satan's cunning, crafty ways of deceiving and blinding preachers and others who walked in the true light for many years, it makes us strong to steer clear of all worldly rubbish and all other things which would have a tendency to undermine our faith in God. The following is a message she wrote to those attending her funeral. She wrote it during last winter with great difficulty, as her arms were in a sore, painful condition:

"Dear ones: Thank God for the blood of Jesus that covers every stain. Though I may be separated from you in body, my spirit has only gone back to the One who gave it. "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of His saints." How blessed to be one of them—"a child of a King." I'm only going to inherit that place which my Father has been preparing for a long, long time—"a beautiful mansion." No more sickness, sorrow, pain nor death, but all will be sunshine and happiness.

My loved ones and friends have been so good to me during my illness, but He is better still. Many times my Jesus has healed me and, at times, when near death's door. He raised me up for the honor and glory of God, but there comes a time when He does not see fit to heal—wants to take us to a better place than this old world. Whatever He does is right, for He knows what is best for our good. "All things work together for good to those who love the Lord," etc.

Please do not accuse Him for not healing me this time. He can see further than we can and His way is best. I'm rejoicing because of this, and have resigned fully to His will. All I ask is that all who have not accepted this great Savior will do so, and meet me in that beautiful land where we'll see Jesus face to face—never to part no more.

But my conflicts have been when influences were brought to bear upon me to induce me to lose my confidence in Christ as my personal Savior, and to separate from Him. My mistakes have been made when I have allowed something to come in between me and Him to prevent me from looking into His blessed face with the look of faith. When I fix my eyes upon the enemy, or upon the difficulties, or upon myself and my past failures, I lose heart, and fail to receive the victory. Therefore, "Looking unto Jesus," is my motto.

The fight which I am to fight is "the good fight of faith," but the weapons of this warfare are not of the flesh. I do not believe in myself, and therefore I have no confidence in my own power to overcome evil. I hear Him saying to me, "My power is made perfect in weakness," and so I surrender my whole being to be under His control, allowing Him to work in me "both to will and to work," and when I act upon the faith that He will do this in the way of

victory, He does not disappoint me. By living His life of victory in me, He gives me the victory. This means that I offer my body a living sacrifice; that I must not wilfully choose the way of disobedience; and that I will not consent to any known sin. Such a course, which is the life of faith, makes it possible for Him to impart to me the victory which He has won for me.

If literal Israel needed to hear the denunciations of the prophet, what does spiritual Israel need today? "O my people." They came before God, but not in the right way. They offered burnt offerings of standard quality (calves of a year old), but failed to surrender themselves to God. Evil in heart, in mind, in act against God and man was the cause. It is not enough to sacrifice as did Israel, even to "thousands of rams and rivers of oil." What does God require? Micah 6: 8. Live the obedient life. God is our God. We are His servants. He has something for us to do. He expects us to do it, and grow in the righteous principles. Live the humble life. Pride disables, debases and destroys. But God comes to walk with us in the vale of humility.

- 3. For they could not keep it at that time, because the priests had not sanctified themselves sufficiently, neither had the people gathered themselves together to Jerusalem.

- 5. So they established a decree to make proclamation throughout all Israel, from Beersheba even to Dan, that they should come to keep the passover unto the Lord God of Israel at Jerusalem: for they had not done it of a long time in such sort as it was written.

So the posts went with the letters from the king and his princes throughout all Israel and Judah, and according to the commandment of the king, saying, Ye children of Israel, turn again unto the Lord God of Abraham, Isaac, and Israel, and he will return to the remnant of you, that are escaped out of the hand of the kings of Assyria.
- 7. And be not ye like your fathers, and like your brethren, which trespassed against the Lord God of their fathers, who therefore gave them up to desolation, as ye see.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Hezekiah's good leadership was due in a great measure to his mother's "sterling moral qualities" and the teaching he received from Isaiah. His father, Ahan, was one of the most ignoble of all the princes of the house of David, yet through the in-

fluence of right teaching from his mother, Abijah, and God's hand upon him, his was a righteous reign of 29 years. He re-opened the temple, re-organized the services, and summoned the Israelites from Dan to Beersheba for the observance of the greatest passover in the history of the "Hebrew monarchy." Through the Passover observances a great revival was on. O precious leaders in spiritual Israel, take courage; urge a revival in church-going, in Bible observances, in repentance, in reconsecration, in vital godliness and in love unfeigned. God is gracious. Praise His dear name. He will not always chide.

While Hezekiah was king over the southern kingdom, he included the northern kingdom in this invitation to assemble at Jerusalem where God was pleased to record His name.

- 11. To what purpose is the multitude of your sacrifices unto me? saith the Lord: I am full of the burnt offerings of rams, and the fat of fed beasts; and I delight not in the blood of bullocks, or of lambs, or of he goats.
- 12. When ye come to appear before me, who hath required this at your hand, to tread my courts?
- 13. Bring no more vain oblations; incense is an abomination unto me; the new moons and sabbaths, the calling of assemblies, I cannot away with; it is iniquity, even the solemn meeting.
- 14. Your new moons and your appointed feasts my soul hateth: they are a trouble unto me; I am weary to bear them.
- 15. And when ye spread forth your hands, I will hide mine eyes from you; yea, when ye make many prayers, I will not hear: your hands are full of blood

- 16. Wash ye, make you clean; put away the evil of your doings from before mine eyes; cease to do evil;
- 17. Learn to do well; seek judgment, relieve the oppressed, judge the fatherless, plead for the widow.
- 18. Come now, and let us reason together, saith the Lord: though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they be red like crimson, they shall be as wool.
- 19. If ye be willing and obedient, ye shall eat the good of the land:
- 20. But if ye refuse and rebel, ye shall be devoured with the sword: for the mouth of the Lord hath spoken it.

Memory Verse —Who shall ascend into the hill of the Lord? And who shall stand in his holy place? He that hath clean hands, and a pure heart. Psa. 24: 3, 4.

Central Thought—Contrasting false and true worship.

Practical Truth — True worship is spiritual. God requires those who worship Him to worship Him in spirit and truth.

Suggestions To Teachers

When sin separates from God as Israel was, repentance is the only way back. True worship is humble submission to God and spiritual worship, recognizing by faith the blood that shelters or covers.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

"The book of Isaiah has been called the gospel of the Old Testament." Many quotations are found in the New Testament from this book.

Worship God sincerely. Assemble for worship. "Forsake not the assembling of yourselves together, as the manner of some is." Sacrifices in worship, burnt offerings, oblations, incense and all external things became an abomination to God. Our sacrifices must be spiritual first of all. Then, of course, we will make our external sacrifices in the right way and God will accept them. Penitence in worship—"wash you, cease to do evil." "If we regard iniquity in our hearts the Lord will not hear us." But O hew precious to know the waters of cleansing are free. The penitent heart is pleasing to God. Knowledge thru worship—"Learn to do well." Let us get our lesson. The Divine Teacher set the example. "I do always those things pleasing to Him." Right worship includes so much. "Seek justice, relieve the oppressed, the fatherless, the widow." The best workers are the best worshippers. They who find spiritand relief at the throne of grace will be very apt to

relieve those in need. Worship is intelligent. "Let us reason together." No one is forced to be good. If ye be willing God accepts the "whosoever-will," if ye be obedient. Praise God, there are blessings in worship. It is all obtained at the "mercy seat."

SUBJECT—Isaiah Counsels Rulers.

Lesson Text, Printed Portion —Isaiah 31: 1-9: 37: 36, 37.

- 31:1. Woe to them that go down to Egypt for help; and stay on horses, and trust in chariots, because they are many; and in horsemen, because they are very strong; but they look not unto the Holy One of Israel, neither seek the Lord!
- 2. Yet he also is wise, and will bring evil, and will not call back his words; but will arise against the house of the evil doers, and against the help of them that work iniquity.
- 3. Now the Egyptians are men, and not God; and their horses flesh and not spirit. When the Lord shall stretch out his hand, both he that helpeth shall fall, and he that is holpen shall fall down, and they all shall fail together.
- 4. For thus hath the Lord spoken unto me, Like as the lion and the young lion roaring on his prey, when a multitude of shepherds is called forth against him, he will not be afraid of their voice, nor abase himself for the noise of them: so shall the Lord of hosts come down to fight for mount Zion, and for the hill thereof.
- 5. As birds fying, so will the Lord of hosts deferd Jerusalem; defending also he will deliver it; and passing over he will preserve it.
- 6. Turn ye unto him from whom the children of Israel have deeply revolted.
- 7. For in that day every man shall cast away his idols of silver, and his idols of gold, which your own hands have made unto you for a sin.
- 8. Then shall the Assyrian fall with the sword, not of a mighty man; and the sword, not of a mean man, shall devour him: but he shall flee from the sword, and his young men shall be discomfited.

9. And he shall pass over to his strong hold for fear, and his princes shall be afraid of the ensign, saith the Lord, whose fire is in Zion, and his furnace in Jerusalem.

37: 36. Then the angel of the Lord went forth, and smote in the camp of the Assyrians a hundred and fourscore and five thousand: and when they arose early in the morning, behold, they were all dead corpses.

37. So Sennacherib king of Assyria departed, and went and returned, and dwelt at Nineveh.

Memory Verse —Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on thee; because he trusteth in thee. Isa. 26: 3.

Central Thought —God the only source of help at all times.

Practical Truth —The folly of trusting in the arm of flesh—horses, chariots, when God is the only source of power.

Suggestions To Teachers

1. God a prayer-answering God. He answered a king's prayer. How God directs and rules nations. EXPLANATORY NOTES

From the darkest prison of distress there is a way to happy deliverance thru faith and trust in God. Let it be known that God is stronger and wiser than Egypt or Assyria, or any foe that can assail spiritual Israel. All these assailments (horses, chariots, and horsemen) are flesh and not spirit. The Egyptians and Assyrians are men and not God. What triumph through the Lord even in literal Israel! Isa. 37: 36, 37.

What greater triumph in this Holy Spirit dispensation! Yet triumph through God is always conditional. Repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ is certain triumph. prophecy did not fail, nor did Hezekiah and his prople rely in vain upon the "word of the Lord." God sent His angel to the camp of the Assyrians and smote 185,000 soldiers in one night. The king of Assyria made a swift retreat to Nineveh. He sat upon the Assyrian throne 20 more long years, but did not dare again to defy the people of the living God. We have a precious example of national victory when God was sought through repentance and trust in God. "Happy is that nation whose God is the Lord." O spiritual Israel, take courage and rely on God. Peace is always desirable—peace with God, peace with others, peace in perplexity. God's mercy and grace are always available as we surrender to Him. Isa, 26: 3,
