Are You Wholly Sanctified?

The doctrine of sanctification as a second definite work of grace in the heart is very unpopular with a great many professed people. It is not taught much even by many ministers who claim its work, and this is an evidence of degression and a lack of esteem of the holiness of God living in the soul.

John Wesley and his brother, Charles, taught sanctification as a second, definite work, and so did nearly all of the early Methodist ministers, but alas, where is it taught and practiced among them now?

Justification or regeneration is a work complete in itself and is received by faith in the work of Christ. In justification all of our actual transgressions are forgiven and blotted out, as God separates them from us as far as the east is from the west and remembers them against us no more. That indeed is a happy state to be in. God never intended for any soul to stop in that state, as a justified condition is only the beginning of what Jesus has purchased for us when He bled and died on the cursed tree.

When the Hebrews were delivered out of Egyptian bondage (which is a type of our justification), it is said that they were only eleven days in making their way to the Jordan river which separated them from the Canaan land (which is a type of our sanctification). While there, they sent out spies, one from each tribe, twelve in number. They spied out the land and on returning, there were only two that had faith to take the land. The names of these two were Caleb and Joshua. God's wrath was kindled against all the others and He caused them to wander in the wilderness in confusion, strife and perplexities for forty

years until all those grown-up ones perished. It is a dangerous thing for any one to stop short of perfect salvation. God speaking through Peter by the Holy Ghost says to us, "Be ye holy, for I am holy." Holiness of heart is a sanctified state. A justified soul is in a holy state as far as actual transgressions are concerned, but perfected holiness is sanctification as the second work of the Spirit which destroys carnality, the seed of sin, the planting of Satan that remains in the heart of the justified soul. It cleanses and purifies our affections and gives us power to love the Lord with all the mind and with all the strength, and our neighbor as ourselves. Paul says, "Let us cleanse ourselves from all the filthiness of the flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God." 2 Cor. 7: 1. In 1 Thess. and 5th chapter he says, "The very God of peace sanctify you wholly: and I pray God your whole spirit, soul and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. Faithful is He that calleth you who also will do it." If the spirit, soul and body of a man are preserved blameless, there would be nothing left of him to commit sin and he would be truly wholly sanctified. In Hebrews the 12th chapter he says, "Follow peace with all men and holiness without which no man shall see the Lord." True and perfect holiness of heart denotes a sanctified condition. Jesus says, "Blesesd are pure in heart for they shall see God." Purity of heart is sanctification. In Rom. 15: 16 Paul speaks of the Gentiles (which we are) "being sanctified by the Holy Ghost." The Holy Ghost fire comes in and purges, purifies and cleanses the soul from defilement, "destroying the works of the devil," (1 John 3:8) setting us apart for God's sacred use, continuing to reign in the heart and is the "promise of the Father," the Comforter which Jesus said He would send.

There is a growth in grace and knowledge in a justified state, but you do not grow into sanctification. When we see and realize the need of being sanctified and know it to be the will of God, then do we by faith claim the promises and the work of sanctification is instantaneously done. One writer says, "This progressive work of a justified soul may be cut short and finished at any moment, when the intelligence clearly comprehends the defects of the present state, and faith, comprehending the power and willingness of God to sanctify us wholly, and to do it now, is excised."

In sanctification we do not become perfect in an absolute sense as God is, but our heart is in a perfect-

ly clean condition with an absolute willingness to do all the known will of God. We do not become perfect in knowledge or in understanding like God. If we had all the knowledge and understanding that God has He would cease to be God to us. Men are only good to the extent that God dwells in them. Men are never holy only when God dwells in them.

"Blest are the pure in heart,
For they shall see our God;
The secret of the Lord is theirs:
Their soul is His abode."

Holiness is attainable in this life, for God commands to be holy. "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy strength, and with all thy mind and thy neighbor as thyself." Luke 10:27. "Be ye holy, for I am holy." I Peter 1:13. These are positive commands and can only be done by the indwelling of the Holy Spirit. If holiness is not attainable in this life, then God commands that which cannot be done. Paul says, "Let God be true but every man a liar." Rom. 3:4.

We get from God what we believe for. If you do not believe that God will forgive you from all sin, you will never get forgiven. If you do not believe that God will sanetify your nature, you will never get sanctified.

A man in order to get sanctified wholly must first sanctify himself—set himself apart and all that he has and ever expects to have, for God's sacred use. Then as he lays it all on the altar as a gift to God. (Christ being the altar) the altar (Christ) will sanctify the gift, the Holy Spirit will come in, purify and cleanse the soul, take up His abode there and proceed to govern, guide and lead the living sacrifice given to God. Rom. 12: 12.

"Oh, matchless bliss of perfect love!

It lifts me up to things above;

It bears on eagles' wings;

It gives my ravished soul a feast,

With Jesus, priests and kings."

Dear reader, I cannot find words to express how clear and sweet the light of purity has shone through the very deepest parts of my soul, the complete satisfaction I have realized since the Comforter came in to stay. Its fullness, its sweetness and its richness can never be expressed. You can know it only by experience and this is your solemn duty. Will you not seek it? A holy life is the happiest life, the safest life and the easiest life you can live. This is the

preparation that Jesus Christ has given us for beaven and immortal Glory. Will you embrace it?

Brotherly Love

The writer to the Hebrews says, "Let brotherly love continue." It begins as soon as a person is born again. 1 Jno. 3: 14 says, "He that loveth not his brother abideth in death." John also says, "We know that we have passed from death unto life because we love the brethren." and in 1 Jno. 4: 7, 8 he tells us, "Beloved, let us love one another: for love is of God; and every one that loveth is born of God, and knoweth God. He that loveth not knoweth not God; for God is love." Also verse 20 shows that it is impossible to be saved and not have brotherly love. Charity, which means the love of God, suffereth long and is kind. "Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, and have not love, I am become as sounding brass or a tinkling cymbal."

It is well to remember the means God used in getting us to give up sin and error. How in many cases it was some of his children He used, who were filled with the real melting love of God, and we saw they loved us and cared for our souls, and so we were enabled to put confidence in them, and saw they were our real friends, and thus they were enabled to lead us into the truth.

And, too, it is impossible for the church to prosper in any locality, without brotherly love continuing. Where brotherly love abounds there is not room for coldness or suspicion to stay. Neither can "the accuser of the brethren" be successful in accomplishing his object of getting the brethren to lose confidence in one another, and so breaking the unity of the Spirit. "Out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaketh." So a person whose heart is filled with brotherly love will not use the tongue in backbiting.

We are told in Matt. 18: 15, "If thy brother shall trespass against thee, go and tell him his fault between thee and him alone." It does not say to go first and tell the church, nor does it say to tell the world, but tell him, the one who has trespassed against you. Brotherly love and wisdom are needed in speaking of the faults of others. In the second

chapter of Galatians Paul speaks of Peter being worthy to be blamed, but Paul's object in writing to the Galatians was to get them free from desiring to be under the law, and to show them the truth of the gospel and to get them to walk in the light of it. He did not speak thus of Peter, only as God was glorified in his making mention of this circumstance. This is far different from merely loving to magnify the faults of others, with a desire to do them an injury. "Love worketh no ill to his neighbor." "If any man offend not in word, the same is a perfect man and able also to bridle the whole body."

"Finally, be ye all of one mind, having compassion one of another, love as brethren, be pitiful, be courteous."

Any graceless soul can pick and find fault, but it takes God's grace in the soul to "bear and forbear in love," and to preach constructive and upbuilding truths.

Paul exhorted the brethren to "endeavor to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace." Eph. 4: 3. Many brethren today should apply this truth to their own souls so that one of the devil's clubs would be paralized.

The marriage and divorce question seems to be quite confusing to many. The Word of God is so plain on this subject and yet so many preachers and writers wrest the scriptures and give license for adultery and much looseness on this subject, while others get so extreme on this line that they manifest a murdering spirit. Both of these spirits are foreign to the spirit of Christ.

Jesus says in Matt. 5: 32, "Whosoever shall put away his wife, saving for the cause of fornication, causeth her to commit adultery: and whosoever shall marry her that is divorced, committeth adultery." In the 19th chapter of Matt. Jesus says, "What therefore God has joined together, let no man put asunder. Moses because of the hardness of your hearts suffered you to put away your wives: but from the beginning it was not so." You notice that He was giving this

truth to the self-righteous Pharisees, and if for them, how truly and surely it would be for us who profess to follow the lowly Jesus. As I see and understand the Scriptures, it would be wrong for a person to marry another with a living companion. The first few verses of the 7th chapter of Romans makes this very positive and clear. I feel sure that condemnation and guilt would be certain to come upon any one in this condition whenever they received true light and knowledge upon the subject.

REPORT OF MEETING AT CLOVIS, N. MEX.

On the 7th of September five of us, Bro. Earl Laughlin, Lavina Wahl, Selma Hiebert, wife and myself, motored to Clovis, New Mexico and commenced a revival meeting in the Saint's Chapel on Sunday, the 9th. At this writing the meeting has been in progress one week, and nearly all the saints, preachers included, have been looking on with wonder at the miraculous way that the Lord has been working. I will not attempt to tell it in detail.

Up to date, the Lord has saved four souls and sanctified four, and graciously healed a number of sick bodies. The Lord began to work in the very first message and has continued to give great liberty and power in the preaching of His word. Huskey, the pastor here, said that he had a notion to announce a midnight prayer meeting. The next night or two, a man brought his wife twenty one miles from the country to be healed. She was greatly affliction and suffering so much that it seemed that life would soon cease unless she got Divine help. He arrived with her in the midnight hours, and so Bro. Huskey had his midnight prayer meeting without announcing it. The Lord graciously healed her body and she was up and around when morning came.

The Church

The Church that Jesus said He would build is the only New Testament Church. Jesus said unto Peter, "For thou art Peter, and upon this rock (Himself the solid Rock) I will build my Church and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." Matt. 16: 18. It was never to be destroyed. "Other foundation can no man lay than that is laid, which is Jesus Christ." 1 Cor. 3: 11. Now therefore ye are no more strangers and foreigners, but fellow-citizens with the saints and of the household of God, and are built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets Jesus Christ himself being the chief corner stone, in whom all the building fitly framed together groweth unto an holy temple in the Lord, in whom ye also are builded together for an habitation of God through the Spirit. Eph. 2: 19-22. This Church was fully built, organized and set in order by the Lord and the Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost, and the Lord added numbers to it (Acts 2: 47) by the new birth, being born again (John 3: 3, 7), born of water (Word) and of the Spirit (John 3: 5). "Of his own will begat he us with the word of truth." James 1: 18. Jesus prayed the Father that He would keep it in His own name. "Holy Father, keep through thine own name those whom thou hast given me that they may be one as we are. While I was with them in the world I kept them in thy name." John 17: 11, 12. Now as the Father's name is God, therefore the name is, the Church of God. Paul wrote letters unto the local congregation (church) at Corinth and addressed them unto the Church of God (1 Cor. 1:2; 2 Cor. 1:1). It was the Church of God that Paul, when his name was Saul, persecuted. "Beyond measure I persecuted the Church of God and wasted it." Gal. 1:13. Paul begged the church to preach the same thing (gospel) and to be perfectly joined together (not apart in different sects or denominations called churches) 1 Cor. 1:10. The Church of God is the only true New Test-

ament church, the only church purchased by the Lord's own blood. "Take heed therefore unto yourselves and to all the flock over the which the Holy Ghost hath made you overseers to feed the church of God which he hath purchased with his own blood." Acts 20: 28. The Church of God is the spiritual body of Christ, and Christ is the head of it. He (Christ) is the head of the body, the church (Col. 1:18). "But now hath God set the members every one of them in the body as it hath pleased him." 1 Cor. 12: 18. The only creed or discipline of the church is the Word of God (Matt. 4: 4: Luke 4: 4). "All scripture is given by inspiration of God and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in right. cousness that the man of God may be perfect, throughly furnished unto all good works." 2 Tim. 3: 16, 17. The door into the Church of God is Christ. "I am the door, by me if any man enter in he shall be saved " John 10: 9. So there are none but saved people which are members of the Church of God, because Christ is the door and one has to be born of God to enter into it. "Whosoever is born of God doth not commit sin." 1 John 3: 9. "He that committeth sin is of the devil." 1 John 3: 8. The record of the church of God is kept by the Lord in heaven. "But rather rejoice because your names are written in heaven." Luke 10: 20. "To the general assembly and church of the first born which are written in heaven." Heb. 12: 23. "My fellow laborers whose names are in the book of life." Phil. 4: 3. So when the Lord keeps the book the members of the Church are not unequally yoked together with unbelievers. 2 Cor. 6: 14. Now when one is born again of God (John 1: 13; 1 John 3: 9; 5: 18), he is spiritually at home in the Church of God, and needs no other spiritual home that men can offer, but all are at home and members of the one and only spiritual family of God, and are all loving brothers and sisters in the family of God and have the same care. whom the whole family in heaven and earth is named. Eph. 3: 15. That there should be no schism (division) in the body (the church) but that the members should have the same care one for another." 1 Cor. 12: 25. The Church should not be scattered and divided up in different sect denominations called churches, but should be of one faith. "Stand fast in the faith." 1 Cor. 16: 13. The Lord is not pleased for his people to be divided, but they should assemble themselves together (not apart). "Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together." Heb. 10:25. "And hath raised us up together and made us to sit

together." Eph. 2: 6.

The denominators called churches in this country are modern. Not one except the Roman Catholic are over 404 years old. The first Protestant sect denomination was instituted in 1530. All others have been instituted since then. The Church of God was built by the Lord, fully organized and set in order ever 1900 years ago. Every Christian is a member of it. They are added by the Lord through the new birth. There is no command in the New Testament to join church. The Lord's people, when they are saved or born again, should not join a sect church. They should be satisfied at home where they are born and in the place where the Lord puts them, and to be called by the name that they are called by in the New Testament. The Lord still has people scattered in the denominations that have joined them on account of not having clear Scriptural light upon what the Church is and how we become members of it, and also through wrong teaching and training. Many are miserable on account of being voked up with unbelievers. The Lord is calling them out to remain only at home in the Church of God with their names written in heaven. "Wherefore, come out from among them and be ye separate, saith the Lord. And I will be a Father unto you and ye shall be my sons and daughters, saith the Lord." 2 Cor. 6: 17, 18. "Come out of her, my people." Rev. 18: 4.

Awful End of a Backslider

The following is a short account of the life and death of William Pope, of Bolton, in Lancashire. He was at one time a member of the Methodist Society, and was a saved and happy man. His wife, a devoted saint, died triumphantly. After her death his zeal for religion declined, and by associating with backslidden professors he entered the path of ruin. His companions even professed to believe in the redemption of devils. William became an admirer of their schemes, a frequenter with them of the public house, and in time a common drunkard.

He finally became a disciple of Thomas Paine, and associated himself with a number of deistical persons of Bolton who assembled together on Sundays to confirm each other in their infidelity. mused themselves with throwing the Word of God on the floor, kicking it around the room, and treading it under their feet. God laid His hand on this man's body and he was seized with consumption. Mr. Rhodes was requested to visit William Pope. He says: "When I first saw him he said to me, 'Last night I believe I was in hell and felt the horrors and torment or the damned; but God has brought me back again and given me a little longer respite. The gloom of guilty terror does not sit so heavy upon me as it did, and I have something like a faint hope that, after all I have done, God may yet save me.' After exhorting him to repentance and confidence in the Almighty Savior, I prayed with him and left him. In the evening he sent for me again. I found him in the utmost distress, overwhelmed with bitter anguish and dispair. I endeavored to encourage him. I spoke of the infinite merit of the great Redeemer, and mentioned several cases in which God had saved the greatest sinners, but he answered, 'No case of any that has been mentioned is comparable to mine. I have no contrition; I cannot repent. God will damn me! I know the day of grace is lost. God has said of such as are in my case, 'I will laugh at your calamity, and mock when your fear cometh.' 'I said, "Have you ever known anything of the mercy and love of God?" 'Oh, yes," he replied, "many years ago I truly repented and sought the Lord and found peace and happiness." I prayed with him after exhorting him to seek the Lord, and had great hopes of his salvation; he appeared much affected, and begged I would represent his case in our society and pray for him. I did so that evening, and many hearty petitions were put up for him.

Mr. Barraclough gives the following account of what he witnessed. He says: "I went to see William Pope, and as soon as he saw me he exclaimed, 'You are come to see one who is damned forever.' I answered, 'I hope not; Christ can save the chief of smners.' He replied, 'I have denied Him, I have denied Him; therefore hath He cast me off forever! I know the day of grace is past, gone-gone, never more to return!' I entreated him not to be too hasty, and to pray. He answered, 'I cannot pray; my heart is quite hardened; I have no desire to receive any blessings at the hand of God,' and then cried out, 'Oh, the helf, the torment, the fire that I feel within me! Oh, etcrnity! eternity! To dwell forever with devils and damned spirits in the burning lake must be my portion, and that justly!' On Thursday I found him groaning under the weight of the displeasure of God. His eyes rolled to and fro; he lifted up his hands, and with vehemence cried out, 'Oh, the burning flame, the hell, the pain I feel! I have done, done the deed, the horrible, damnable deed!' with him, and while I was praying he said with inexpressible rage, "I will not have salvation at the hand of God! No, no! I will not ask it of Him!' After a short pause, he cried out, 'Oh, how I long to be in the bottomless pit—in the lake which burneth with fire and brimstone!' The day following I saw him again. I said, 'William, your pain is inexpressible.' He groaned, and with a loud voice cried out, 'Eternity will explain my torments. I tell you again, I am damned. I will not have salvation.' He called me to him as if to speak to me, but as soon as I came within his reach he struck me on the head with all his might, and gnashing his teeth, cried out, 'God will not hear your prayers.' At another time he said, 'I have crucified the Son of God afresh, and counted the blood of the covenant an unholy thing! Oh, that wicked and horrible deed of blaspheming against the Hory Ghost which I know I have committed!' often heard to exclaim, 'I want nothing but hell! Come, O devil, and take me!' At another time he said, 'Oh, what a terrible thing it is! Once I might, and would not; now I would and must not.' He declared that he was best satisfied when cursing." The day he died, when Mr. Rhodes visited him, and asked the privilege to pray once more with him, he cried out with great strength, considering his weakness, "No!" and passed away in the evening without God.

Backslider, do you know you are in danger of the fires of hell? Do you know you are fast approaching the

You are, and unless you turn quickly, you with William Pope will be writhing in hell through all eternity. God says, "The backslider in heart shall be filled with his own ways." But he says again, "Return, ye backsliding children, and I will heal your backslidings." Oh, come back and be healed before God shall say of you, "He is joined to his idols, let him alone." WHAT WE LEARN FROM THE 51st PSALM

This has been called the Psalm of the true penitent. It is this; it is even more. It is a well-rounded and symmetrical concept of what God designs the true Christian life to be in this New Testament dispensation. Psalm 51 teaches us the following facts of note:

- 1. That Sin Is Primarily An Offense Against God Almighty. "Against Thee, Thee only have I sinned, and done this evil in Thy sight." Infidels who have sneered and scoffed at King David's atrocious crimes of adultery-murder would do well to cmulate his example of honest, complete, wholehearted confession of such sins.
- 2. That God's Judgments Are True And Righteous Altogether. "That Thou mightest be justified when Thou speakest, and be clear when Thou judgest." God never passes any hasty, snap judgment at people.
- 3. That Men Must Repent Of The Spirit (Disposition) Of Disobedience As Well As Their Actual Sins. "Behold, Thou desirest truth in the inward parts; and in the hidden part Thou shalt make me to know wisdom." Henceforth, he wanted reverence instead of contempt for the sanctity of pure womanhood.
- 4. That All Honest Men When They Repent Of Their Sins, Desire A Clean Heart And God's Holy Spirit As Quickly As They Can Obtain The Same. They desire an immediate safeguard from the always imminent peril of backsliding. It is a significant fact that none of the Old Testament men of God were ever pigeon-holed into two separate apartments: saved and sanctified. Nothing has disgusted me anymore in my last twenty years in the ministry than to hear the mechanical, parrot-like, sing-song testimony of holiness professors who would arise to their feet in meetings, saying, "I'm saved and I'm sanctified," just as if God was pleased with his children being pigeon-holed into two separate apartments. It is true that the Bible teaches two distinct works of God's grace—the one following the other—yet the idea that we are to minimize the importance of the one in order to magnify the importance of the other, is not Scriptural at all. True, that we are justified and then sanctified, but the first is the preparation for the second, and God is not pleased with folks supposing that justification is an end in itself. The Old Testament characters were right with God; and the moment they got right with God, even in their generation, they were taught by God to expect fullness of equipment to fight the battles of faith that would keep them right with God.
- 5. That Only Saved Folks Can Help Others To Get Saved And To Be Builders On The Walls Of Zion. After he has obtained a clean heart, "then will I teach transgressors Thy ways; and sinners shall be

converted unto Thee." Do good in thy good pleasure unto Zion: build thou the walls of Jerusalem.

- 6. That Saved Folks Are To Be Burdened For The Salvation Of Others. "Deliver me from blood-guiltiness, O God, thou God of my salvation: and my tongue shall sing aloud of thy righteousness." Salvation makes builders out of folks, nor knockers nor wreckers. How much time is worse than wasted in idle gossip that ought to be redeemed in believing, importunate praying. When folks pass day after day, week after week with not a single desire nor loving yearning for the salvation of others (even their own blood kindred), they are surely backslid at heart.
- 7. That Saved Persons Should Cultivate The Attitude Of Faith In God Coupled With the Spirit Of Praise (Worship). "O Lord, open Thou my lips; and my mouth shall show forth Thy praise. For Thou desirest not sacrifice, else would I give it: Thou delightest not in burnt offering. The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit: a broken and a contrite heart, O God, Thou wilt not despise." King David was guilty of the sin of misplaced affection. And he fully repented of that sin as the tap-root of his adultry-murder. After his restoration to the favor of God, he focused his affection on things above-not on If David in his generation things of this earth. realized his immediate need of God's Spirit upon his return to the favor of God, how much more do New Testament converts to Christ (as soon as they can sense their need of the Spirit) need God's Spirit to preserve and stabilize the soul. Amen.

"Fruit from Christ." He is the Giver of all good as the vine furnishes strength for the branches. "Fruit for the Father." He is the owner of the vineyard and connects us with the source of life in the true Vine. He expects us to bear fruit. May none of us disappoint Him. Fruit with others. Our fellowship with Christ makes us in fellowship with others who are in Christ and we bear the same fruit because we all draw our strength alike from the Vine. "What earthly association is sweeter than fellowship in fruit-bearing?" Fruit through discipline. While pruning is painful yet it is productive. Spiritual culture is much like horticulture and must have the husbandman's care in removing excess foliage and too many twigs. Fruit through development. Oh, precious souls, in order to develop we must keep in union with Christ. No branch can bear fruit severed from the Vine. Keep in touch with the source of spiritual life and fruit will be the result. through dependence. There is power in prayer, but that power is only available by a surrendered life to the will of God. "Ask whatsoever ye will."

Consecration, character and conduct all claim a place in fruit-bearing for the glory of God, testing our love for God and our service to mankind. In obedience we alike fulfill our duty to God and man, and full fruitage brings joy, joy unspeakable and full of glory.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Philip, one of the deacons in the church at Jerusalem, while in successful evangelistic work in Samaria, heard the call of God to go to the South, perhaps one hundred miles on the desert road from Jerusalem to Gaza. His instant obedience brought him in contact with an honest soul seeking truth—an eminent Ethiopian, a native of the rich region bordering on the banks of the Upper Nile. He was a man of great authority under Candace (the official name of the queen of the country). While being a man of prominence, ability and influence, he had been to Jerusalem to worship.

There were no doubt many Jews in his country, due to the fact he had a copy of the Septuagint, the same version used by Christ and the apostles. The lesson tells the story of where he was reading and Philip's teaching of the same Scripture in a way that it needs no comment.

Oh, that dear souls today would read the Bible. Read it as God's Word. Read all of it. Read it at every opportunity. Read it understandingly. Read it with all available help. Read to learn of Jesus. Read it believingly. Read it obediently, and on the confession of your faith and obedience go on your way rejoicing as did this convert of Philip's.

Oh dear souls, let us let the Word of God dwell in us richly in this life and be prepared for life eternal.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

We have for our lesson the portion of Scripture commonly or often called, "The Lord's Prayer." But it is said that this title dates from the third century and is taken from Cranmer's Prayer Book rather than from the Gospels. Jesus, on being asked by one of His disciples to teach them to pray as John taught his disciples, gave them this model prayer. We learn from this prayer to whom prayer should be made, the right time, the place, the right spirit and the right purpose in all prayers. Also, what to ask for—that Thy kingdom should come and Thy will be done here in our earthen vessels as in heaven.

Then we have physical needs, spiritual needs, social needs, individual needs, and we have a loving heavenly Father able, willing and ready to supply every need when *faith* wings the petition to the throne of grace in Jesus' name. Praise our God. For the Lord's Prayer, read John 17: 1-26.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

1. Emptiness. "Vanity of the mind." What is worse than an empty, worthless life? 2. Blindness. "Darkened their understanding." Blindness is bad Oh, the condition of this lost world—many physically blind, more morally blind, but the sad part, many more spiritually blind. 3. "The ignorance that is in them." To be ignorant of the truth as it is in Jesus is the worst kind of ignorance. God help us to remedy it by getting truth to them. 4. Obstinacy. "The hardening of their heart or being past feeling." How sad when hearts have stilled their conscience until God refuses to hear. 5. Sensuality, verse 19. 7. Uncurbed temper. 8. Moral co-6. Falsehood. lapse. 9. Wasted life. 10. Broken personality. "Be not drunk with wine." Such intoxication leads to wasted manhood and money, and ends in disaster and and death. But thank God, "we have not so learned Christ." "Be filled with the Spirit." Discard the old and put on the new, which means a complete consecration to all the known will of God. He is so willing to impart His will to His humble, obedient children.
