Knowing this work is upon us, our heart is enlarged toward God and toward our fellow-men and we take hold of God (so to speak) with one hand and reach the other to men that we might bring them to Christ who, through His death, reconciles them to God. Our heart goes out to every reader, and we pray that God may make this paper or rather the contents therein as light from heaven to your souls, believing the truth is what makes men free. If we really believe the truth from the heart, we will practice it and that brings freedom to the soul. Every saved man and woman ought to be much interested in getting this truth to people through the printed page. It is not a work for one, but it is a work for all of us, for the whole body of Christ, the family of saved people that constitutes His Church; each member in the body is a particular member and has a particular work to perform in the support of the whole body. One poor old man came weeping to the altar, seeking God for forgiveness, pleading guilty. God heard his cries and saved his soul. Last Sunday (Jan. 13) a company of us went there again and they informed us that the man who had gotten saved had passed on to Glory. Our hearts rejoiced to think that he got saved just before God took him. The Lord greatly blessed in the services again and another old man came to the altar all broken up because he saw himself as a sinner before God. He wept and called upon God, and we prayed with him. The Lord forgave, and he testified that he felt good-the burden of sin was gone. Our souls rejoiced with him and magnified the Lord who gave His Son that men might live. O glory to His name.

A company of us have also been going to Crescent, Oklahoma, a town about fifteen miles from Guthrie, and holding cottage prayer-meetings. Three souls have gotten saved and several bodies healed. God is working there, and we expect Him to open up things there for a continued meeting. Dear ones, pray for us as we mean by His grace to do all we can to get souls to Christ. We can only do as He gives strength and makes ways.

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The Lord is blessing and encouraging our hearts in the printing work and tracts and papers, booklets and pamphlets are continually going out, the larger portion of which is going out without any direct financial returns as we like to send them to all who ask. The Spirit of God is truly making it a blessing to a host of souls.

Lawrence, my son who operates the linotype machine, has been asking me about getting a magazine for the linotype. We have three sets of matrices and only one magazine and another magazine is needed very badly, also about thirty dollars' worth of other repairs. The magazine will cost \$100.00. I told Lawrence that we would seek the Lord for these things and so we have been praying God to supply us with these needed items, and also for means to buy two cases of paper to print tracts which need to be re-stocked. The paper would cost at least \$70.00. Just this morning a letter came from a distant state containing five dollars, the writer saying it was for the Lord's work. I told Lawrence that the Lord was beginning to hear our prayers and our hearts are

encouraged that He will give us this greatly needed help. We are certain that God is not poverty-stricken, neither does financial depessions affect him. We are asking God to equip us better for the producing of clean gospel literature. We know that He owns the cattle on a thousand hills. The earth and the fullness thereof belongs to Him. Our Father is rich.

A Brother was testifying the other night in prayer-meeting and he told of a time when he was a long way from home and wanted to get home. He started to walk and he thought about how that God owned all the railroads and that Jesus had said in His Word that our heavenly Father was more willing to give to us than we were to give to our children. He told the Lord that he knew that if his earthly father owned all the roads that he knew that he would not let him walk but would give him a ride. He came to a railroad station feeling assured that God would let him ride. The train pulled in while he stood on the platform, and the conductor jumped off, came up to him and said, "Preacher, where are you going?" He told him and he said, "Come, ride with me." He did not know how the conductor knew anything about him, but His heavenly Father gave him a free ride home. It is true, dear readers, that God's power is above all the powers of men and He is able to bring things about that seems in a natural sense to be impossible. We are exhorted to have faith in God.

THE CHARACTERISTICS OF A CHRISTIAN

"Then shall ye return and discern between the righteous and the wicked, between him that serveth God and him that serveth him not." Mal. 3: 18. You ask a great many people why they don't go to church, and they will enswer, "I don't see much or any difference between those that go and those who do not."

There is a marked difference between a churchmember and a real Christian. In the social sense, most any one can be received as a member of a church by those who were never called or sent by God to preach the gospel, and who have lowered the standard of truth to suit the world.

They who serve the Lord are much unlike the unsaved, for they are a peculiar people zealous of good works, so declares the gospel truth. They have experienced a new sense of life by a new and spiritual birth, being restored to the spiritual image of our Creator. By their fruits (works of righteousness) ye shall know them, for they daily live a devoted, holy life and appear the one and same person to all people without respect of persons.

The most outcanding and foremost definition of the characteristics of a spirit-born and filled person is recorded in two different places, one in the 13th chapter of 1 Cor. and the other in Romans 12: 9 to 21 verses. These are classics and masterpieces of the inspired Word of God, and I earnestly urge and ask you to be sure to read these, for they will give you light and knowledge richly valuable to every seeker of light on Christian living.

They that serve God have a definite, conscious sense of inward peace and happiness of the soul wholly unknown to the unsaved. Since salvation is a happy experience, the saved are interested in the salvation of the lost and the welfare of all mankind.

They are not fault-finders and busybodies in other people's affairs, and are sympathetic, kind-hearted, unselfish, forgiving one another's faults and mistakes, even loving their enemies.

The Christian character is the richest and most valuable possession of mortal life, indeed it is priceless and should find a response and life in the heart of the unregenerated. The self-righteous person who contends they need no repentance are badly deceived, for they are under condemnation with a sense of a guilty conscience which will torment them when death is apparent. Such a person lives in an uncertainty as to the future life.

Having a conscience void of offence toward God and mankind, being rewarded with eternal life and glory for service to God, how wonderful and unspeakable. On the authority of 2 Cor. 7: 11 a righteous person is cleansed from all filthiness of the flesh, and the use of tobacco in all its forms is one, and the use of intoxicants or taking sides with the booze traffic, is another abomination to God.

A holy or sanctified life (absolute surrender of self) gives one a power to control or master every evil passion or temper; and in no wise can Satan break into our house which is the temple of the Holy Spirit, and bind and rob us; hence the injunction of Jesus, "Whatsoever is bound on earth is also bound in heaven."

The redeemed do not conform to the ungodly fashions of the worldly, nor do they decorate themselves with unnecessary costly array, gold, silver, expensive jewels or pearls which the inspired Word of God prohibits. See 1 Tim. 2: 9 and 1 Peter 3: 3. The Lord God looks on the heart as the source of loveliness and everlasting beauty; not on the outward appearance whatsoever. To become lovely and attractive they have gone to the beauty shoppe of Jesus and had an operation performed upon the heart.

They walk exclusively where Jesus would go—not to worldly carnivals, picture shows, dancing halls, horse racing meets and other questionable places; neither would you find them joking and entertaining with jesting or humorous sayings of untruth.

Are these things strange or repulsive to you? If so, then it is evident you do not prayerfully study your Bible. It's a very poor reflection upon you as a professed Christian, and also your minister who is supposed to be a teacher of these very essentials of the principles of a Christian life. "How shall they preach (or teach) except they be sent," that is, called of God, anointed and baptized with the Holy Spirit? Romans 10: 15.

"FOLLOW ME"

"Then said Jesus unto His disciples, If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross and follow me." Matt. 16: 24.

Every Christian is supposed to be a follower or disciple of Jesus. A disciples is one that learns from another. Now if we are a disciple of Jesus, we are learning from Him. So the first thing that we must do is to fully give ourselves into His hands and be guided by His Spirit. His first lesson then is one of self-denial. The next lesson that we must learn is to take up our cross. Every Christian must bear a cross. Some seem to bear heavier crosses than others, but all must bear his own. Possibly we can help another bear his cross but cannot bear it for him. Now a cross is something very unpleasant and does not gratify the flesh or self. It means suffering, but not just any kind of suffering. To suffer for our own mistakes or faults would not be bearing a cross for Jesus. Jesus never suffered for doing wrong, because He never did wrong. Yet He bore His cross and suffered for doing right. When the just suffer for the unjust, that is bearing a cross. When we suffer for doing right, then we are following our Master.

The next thing to learn is how to follow Jesus. A certain scribe came and said unto Jesus, Master, I will follow thee whitherscever thou goest. And Jesus saith unto him, the foxes have holes, and the birds of air have nests, but the Son of man hath not where to lay His head. Matt. 3: 19, 20. This did not seem to be a very encouraging reply to one that sought to be a disciple of Christ. But let us remember that Jesus never made Himself of any reputat on by accumulating this world's goods. He rather chose the sacrificial way. Now let us follow Him in the wilderness of temptation, of fasting and prayer; when He was by the sick bed; feeding the multitudes on heavenly and earthly bread; on the stormy sea; in the presence of blasphemous Pharisees; mocked and scoffed at by those He was trying to save; praying for those that despitefully used Him; rebuked by His own disciples; hungry and thirsty, weary and worn, yet ever kind and gentle and compassionate, a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief; in the garden of Gethsemane without earthly companions, agonizing in prayer to gain the victory for the next battle; betrayed by one of His own disciples; brought to judgment and forsaken by those who had promised to go with Him even unto death; mocked and crowned with thorns; spit upon and lashed; exchanged places with a murderer; led to Mount Calvary bleeding and weary; nailed to the cruel cross and died with a broken heart for those who hated Him. But wait, that does not end the story. Let us follow Him into the grave, resurrected and ascended to heaven with His Father. Oh glory! let us bear a cross and wear a crown.

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Since the beginning of time, God has always used the humble, the lowly, the contrite and unlearned in worldly wisdom as instruments to carry on His great work and to bring about the fulfillment of prophecies. As a result, many people have failed to be useful in His service because they did not recognize this fact. God has chosen the weak of this world, but strong in faith, to serve Him that all the honor, glory and praise might be ascribed to His name and not to the one who serves. The proud are not employed by the Lord. When King Saul was lifted up with pride, he was dethroned and David, the young shepherd boy, was anointed king over Israel in his place. Pride goes before a fall.

Jesus, the Savior, came in a lowly way, and set the example of meekness and humbleness throughout His ministry. Several of His chosen disciples were unlearned fishermen, whom He called to become fishers of men. To them were committed the spreading of the gospel of the kingdom. After learning of Jesus (which is the only profitable learning) they went to their work without the aid of a theological seminary or conference. The many honorary titles and degrees ascribed to theological teachers are recognized by God as only a brand or pass-word to the "dump pile" as worthless, so far as service to Him is concerned. If the world could have been won to Christ through classical singing and eloquent oratory, it would have been evangelized by these highly educated scholars several decades ago. The Apostles did not preach with the words of men's wisdom, but with the power and authority of the Holy Ghost. The truth that they proclaimed "pricked the heart" instead of "tickling the ears." I would much rather hear the testimony of an uneducated saint of God filled with the Holy Ghost, than a lengthy discourse from the lips of any theologian of our day.

In Matt. 11: 29 Jesus says, "Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls." Those who are proud have not really learned of Jesus. He alone teaches meekness and lowliness of heart.

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In the 13th chapter of Matthew we find the parable of the sower who sowed the seed which is the Word of God. Some fell on good ground and bro't forth fruit to perfection. Others fell on poor ground and did not bring forth fruit. The seed which was sown was all good, but the ground on which it fell was the cause of its failing to bring forth fruit. The Word of God is all right, but when it is not received into an honest heart, the fruit is lacking. In the 22nd verse He says, "He also that received seed among the thorns is he that heareth the word; and the cares of this world, and the deceitfulness of riches, choke the word and he becometh unfruitful." The devil brings up many devices to choke the Word when it is received in the heart. The device most successful for the devil is "the cares of this world." By being over-

18. Verily, verily, I say unto thee, When thou wast young, thou girdedst thyself, and walkedst whither thou wouldest: but when thou shalt be old, thou shalt stretch forth thy hands, and another shall gird thee, and carry thee whither thou wouldest not.

19. This spake he, signifying by what death he should glorify God. And when he had spoken this, he saith unto him, Follow me.

Memory Verse—Lord, thou knowest all things: thou knowest that I love Thee. John 21: 17.

Central Thought-Restoration.

Practical Truth—We have in Scripture after Peter's restoration how he preached and many were born into the family of God. Read David's experience after he was restored. Psalms 23: 3; 51: 12, 13.

Suggestions To Teachers

When Jesus restored the joy to Peter, it gave him inspiration, so he tried again. How to prove our love for Christ, and the test of loyalty.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Peter's hope renewed by the resurrection. 1 Peter 1: 3-5. Dear saints, draw Jesus close to you by faith. Remember His love and learn to manifest this love-Divine love to those around you. Dear precious souls, do not become discouraged because you may have failed some time, some where. Jesus knows and He cares. Peter relied on the thought that Jesus knew. Jesus loves and longs for cur love, "Lovest thou Me more than these?" Jesus said to Peter, "Follow me," and he followed in life and until death, even in death. Will we be faithful? Can He trust us to live by faith? He is entitled to our deepest, sublimest and continual love. David said that after the power of restoration fell on him that he was able to teach transgressors the way and sinners were converted. God bless all with victory over self and discouragement. Jesus still loves. He still calls to faithfulness, and the same Holv Spirit will lead in the truth that saves. Oh praise God for saving truth! "Lovest thou Me more than these?" This great net of fishes or the labor through which you gain a living? Can you lay all down and follow me? Through all your labor, know that God is taking note, giving strength, helping where you least expect, giving victory over the things we cannot understand, granting faith, courage, peace and rest in believing, which is faith.

Practical Truth --Repentance toward God and faith toward our Lord Jesus Christ as Peter preached on the day of Pentecost will add souls to the church of God today as it did then.

Suggestions To Teachers

A good preacher, preaching a great sermon. The story of a wonderful day and the source of spiritual power.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Peter's first sermon after he was restored to the favor of God through repentance and the receiving of the Holy Ghost was one acompanied by great power and a great number were saved, regenerated or born again. He opened the Holy Spirit dispensation by this wonderful message, called his "epochal sermon" or in other words, "marking the beginning of a period in reckoning." He told them of their wickedness in killing the Just One and explaining to them how Jesus was the Savior and Lord.

The works of Jesus, "Approved of God by mighty works." None ever walked this earth with such Divine witness as He and none ever will. Matt. 17:5. His loving surrender to the Father's will was under an agreement before the world was. How could cruel hands have treated Him so? While the cross was an instrument of execution, it was also an altar of sacrifice. "The bore the sin of many." But thank God, He had power to lay down his life and to take it again. John 10: 18.

They were all witnesses of His appearance, and His ascension. "Being by the right hand of God exalted, reigning in this life by one Christ Jesus." As the Lord was directing the affairs of His kingdom, before His death He promised to send the Holy Spirit, which after His ascension He fulfilled. Praise His dear name! He left the command, "Repent ye." Acts 2: 38. Man repents and God regenerates, then comes baptism. We are in Gods' church, and by the power of the Holy Spirit we are led on and up in loving service to God and humanity.

Central Thought-Good Citizenship.

Practical Truth—There are good citizens who know nothing of the transforming power of God, but Peter is teaching in this lesson the goodness that prepares a man or woman for citizenship in two worlds.

Suggestions To Teachers

Peter becomes a teacher of good citizenship, and the responsibilities of the same.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

To be a citizen in the kingdom of God will surely prepare men and women to fill their places in this world as good citizens.

1st "In restraint." No citizen in the kingdom of God could indulge in things mentioned in the first part of our lesson text, and we soon learn to be subject to every ordinance of man for Jesus' sake, for the law was made for the lawless. 1 Tim. 1: 9. 2nd We will be good citizens in observing the law. "Be subject to every ordinance." Good citizens have liberty, but do not use that liberty as a "cloke of wickedness." Liberty does not mean license. But the liberty to do right is the greatest liberty in the world, having a consciousness always that "as Christ suffered, we are to arm ourselves with the same mind, living to the will of God." So many mind earthly things. "There is a nobler investment to be made of life," and no one can reach the "higher heights" and "deeper depths" in the will of God except his consecration reach all in God's will concerning him. A continual, yes, to God's will brings us to the place where faith carries us to a precious resting place—peace that passes all understanding, joy the world cannot give and cannot take away while anchored in God, and our citizenship is secure in God's Church or kingdom.

Lesson Text, Printed Portion-Acts 3: 1-10; 4:8-12.

3: 1. Now Peter and John went up together into the temple at the hour of prayer, being the ninth hour.

2. And a certain man lame from his mother's womb was carried, whom they laid daily at the gate of the temple which is called Beautiful, to ask alms of them that entered into the temple;

3. Who seeing Peter and John about to go into the temple asked an alms.

4. And Peter, fastening his eyes upon him with John, said, Look on us.

5. And he gave heed unto them, expecting to receive something of them.

6. Then Peter said, Silver and gold have I none; but such as I have give I thee: In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk.

7. And he took him by the right hand, and lifted him up: and immediately his feet and ankle bones received strength.

8. And he leaping up stood, and walked, and entered with them into the temple, walking, and leaping, and praising God.

9. And all the people saw him walking and praising God:

10. And they knew that it was he which sat for alms at the Beautiful gate of the temple: and they were filled with wonder and amazement at that which had happened unto him. 4: 8. Then Peter, filled with the Holy Ghost. said unto them, Ye rulers of the people, and elders of Israel,

9. If we this day be examined of the good deed done to the impotent man, by what means he is made whole;

10. Be it known unto you all, and to all the people of Israel, that by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom ye crucified, whom God raised from the dead, even by him doth this man stand here before you whole.

11. This is the stone which was set at nought of you builders, which is become the head of the corner.

12. Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved.

Central Thought-Divine healing.

Practical Truth—Faith in the Great Physician brings healing to all who have it.

Suggestions To Teachers

Peter carrying on Jesus' work. Gifts that are better than silver and gold.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Peter and John's gift was far more valuable than silver or gold. "Devout help." Praying men are the world's best helpers. Men who are good worshippers make good workers. The hour of prayer brought these worshippers in touch with a needy one, so helpless that he was carried daily and placed where he could ask alms of those who entered the Temple. He was placed at the Beautiful gate, which is said to be seventy-five feet high. made of Corinthian brass and adorned with plates of silver and gold, but this man lame from his birth, asked help of the ones who had neither silver or gold. In only the name of Jesus Christ of Navareth was said to him, "Walk," and he walked and praised God.

When Peter and John were brought in question for this wonderful healing. then with great courage and by the power of the Holy Spirit Peter said the miracle was wrought by the one "whom ye crucified, and whom God raised from the dead." So Christ was held up to the world as the Divine healer, and it was known He was the one and only Savior. The help this lame man received was the kind of help that helped him to help himself. God make all of His children the helpers that can and will glorify His dear name.
