A TREATISE ON THE SIN PRINCIPLE OR ORIGINAL SIN

To all the Saints of God, Greetings.

I have felt very much burdened of late to warn the saints concerning the actions of a little old man

that is causing so much trouble in homes, in the Church; and, in fact, in all the world. He sticks his nose (if he can) in everybody's business. In spite of all the heart aches, troubles, and divisions for which he is responsible, he is loved, petted, and cherished by the majority of people. He is so small at times that he can hide under a fig leaf, then again he is so puffed up he fills the whole world. He is a very old man born just before Adam was driven out of the garden of Eden. He was the first born of death, Job 18:13. His name is sin, his children's name-"sinners." A few are trying to get loose from him or his evil nature by trying to repress, suppress, oppress, compress, or somehow press him down; but he will not stay down, he is up at the least provocation. The only way to get rid of him is to kill him. He will not be tied down. We are commanded to kill him by crucifying him. (Rom. 6:6). This SIN is always spoken of as a unit, singular number. Read Psalm 51:2-5. Sin and iniquity are in the singular number sometimes called depravity, inbred sin, or original sin. This sin cannot be pardoned, but may be cleansed or washed. Transgression, sins, or iniquities may be pardoned. Original sin is not an act but a condition of the heart. A corrupt nature which is born in us all as a result of Adam's transgression. Notice in Isa. 6:7. He does not say thy iniquities are taken away and thy sins purged; but iniquity in the singular or sin as a unit. The cleansing deals with sin or iniquity, while pardon deals with sins, iniquities, or actual transgressions. Now notice Zech. 13:1- "In that day (referring to the crucifixion of Jesus) there shall be a fountain opened to (not in) the house of David (referring to the house or Church of God) for sin (not sins) and for uncleanness." The above is for the cleansing of the Church. Read Eph. 5:22-27. He gave himself for it to sanctify and cleanse it (not from their sins in the plural, but in the singular). This old man SIN, also called death, because he was the first born of death (Job 18:13) gave Paul much trouble. Paul wanted to do good but old man SIN was always present to hinder until Paul almost despaired of life and cried out, "O wretched man that I am, who shall deliver

me from the body of this death" (sin). But God heard his cry and came to the rescue and he thanked God. Rom. 7:24, 25. Thank God, some day he, the old man sin, the enemy death, shall be destroyed. 1 Cor. 15:26. The last enemy that shall be destroyed is death. This old man is also called carnal mind. He is an outlaw not subject to the law of God (Rom. 8:7). He is a murderer, he tried to kill me, set traps to catch me. He is doing the same for you. I caught him at it, called in the Officer (the Holy Ghost) had him arrested and I was the main witness against him. He was tried by the Word and found guilty before the great tribunal, and condemned to die by crucifixion (Rom. 6:6). As we have already shown the above cleansing is to the Church as in the 17th chapter of St. John-A promise of cleansing and not of pardon for the Church, not for sinners. "Behold the Lamb of God which taketh tway the sin of the world" (John 1:29) which refers to sin in the singular number, not some particular act of sin. Notice He said he would take it away, not pardon it. Some particular act might be the sin of one part of the world but not of another. The sin of the world has reference to the original sin which is the same in all nationalities, Jew and Gentile alike. John did not say Jesus would repress or regulate it but take it away. The 6th chapter of Romans treats especially on this subject, and reveals the divine method for inbred sin or the sin principle. It is to be crucified that the body of sin might be destroyed. (Rom. 6:6.)

In Heb. it is spoken of as a root of bitterness, the sin which doth so easily beset us. We will notice 1 John 1:7-10. I wish to invert the order of these scriptures to get a better understanding, reading from the tenth to the seventh verse. "If we say we have not sinned, we make him a liar" (10th); "If we confess our sins he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." Notice the couplative conjunction "AND" which joins two sentences. Forgive us AND cleanse us. (9th v.) "If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves." Why? Because all have sinned and come short of the glory of God. (8th v.) "But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin" (7th v.). We see by these scriptures two propositions: sins in the 10th verse; sin in the 8th verse. Then we have two "IF's," two requirements: first, if we confess (9th v.); second, if we walk in the light (7th v.) Then we have two promises: first, the forgiveness of our sins (9th v.); second, the cleansing from sin in the singular (7th v.). The eighth verse is often quoted by those who deny the second work of grace. If we should separate this verse from its context, it might seem to sustain such an argument, but notice the eighth verse is so sandwiched that one cannot back out through the

verse above 7th verse without being cleansed from all sin or go through the next verse below, 9th verse, without being cleansed from all unrighteousness.

God does not do things by halves. First He forgives us for all our sins, iniquities, and transgressions; second, he cleanseth us from all sin, depravity, inbred inherited sin.

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A CONSECRATION FOR SANCTIFICATION

We find in Rom. 12:1-2, "I beseech you therefore brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God."

What does this presenting our bodies a living sacrifice mean? It surely means this: that I henceforth, quietly, and in cold blood to myself, have decided that I will hand over all to God, lock and seal giving Him the key. That I accept His will for me, without question or debate. The will of God for me shall be the final deciding factor in my business, my home and family, in my relationship with other people, and in all my decisions and choices. In other words, I have given choices, rights, and all to God. I now accept every thing that comes or does not come, as permitted by God. I now begin to pray, "Lord, I am Thine. Keep me by Thy power from all sin and uncleanness, and help me, Lord, to live a life humble and patient, acceptable unto Thee." And at once God begins to answer prayer by trials. temptations, and afflictions; for He has said He would have a true and tried people. He also said, "My grace is sufficient for thee." Much that perplexes us in our Christian life is but the answer to our prayers. We pray for patience and God permits tribulation-for "tribulation worketh patience." We pray for submission and God permits suffering-for "we learn obedience through suffering." We pray for unselfishness and He gives us an opportunity to sacrifice ourselves, by thinking on the things of others, by laying down our lives for the brethren. We pray for victory, and the things of this world swoop down upon us in a storm of temptations—for "This is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith." We pray for strength and humility, and some messenger of Satan torments us until we lie in the dust crying for its removal. We pray for union with Jesus, and natural ties are severed and our best friends misunderstands us and seem indifferent to us, and we are left to walk alone—hallelujah, "Alone with God." We pray to be made perfect in love, and God permits peculiar suffering and puts us with apparently unlovely people, who rasp the nerves and

lacerate the heart-for love suffereth long and is kind, love is not impolite, is not easily provoked, beareth all things, love never faileth, for "God is love." We pray to be "Christ like," and the answer is: "I have chosen thee in the furnace of affliction"; "Can thy heart endure?" "Are ye able?" (No, but God's grace is sufficient to keep if we lean on Him.) And in the furnace of affliction He melts us into something of His tenderness and gentleness, and teaches us how to bear one another's burdens, and how to love even our enemies, and to make intercession for the sick and sorrowing. But while this is only the transitory side, there is an everlasting recompense of reward: praise, honor, and glory at the revealing of Christ's life in us. For our tribulations are working out for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory.

To be spiritually minded is life eternal, but to be carnally minded is death. Yes, God calls our hearts and minds away from the love of the world and its fleeting attractions. "But to be spiritually minded is life eternal." Yes, pray, for prayer changes things; not a mere mumbling of words, but words uttered unto God from our heart. For He has said, "Ask and ye shall receive, seek and ye shall find, knock and it shall be opened unto you." No IF's or AND's, but a positive shall be. Are we asking? Seeking? "Be careful for nothing; but in every-Knocking? thing by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your request be made known unto God. And the peace of God which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." Yes, pray without ceasing. Pray for God to keep from pride, and covetousness; for they are in direct opposition to God's will for us. They become as idols to us. "God resisteth the proud, but giveth grace to the humble." -Jennie Riley.

When Grace Abounds

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"But where sin abounded, grace did much more abound."

A few days ago while praying, these words of Scripture came to me so forcibly and were so deeply impressed upon my heart, revealing such a beautiful lesson and so greatly blessing my soul that I feel inspired to write a few words on them.

When sin abounds in our lives, our sins will also abound unto others and we will do evil unto others more or less according to our natural dispositions, stealing from them, lying about them, defrauding them, bringing reproach upon them, holding grudges against them, despitefully using and persecuting them; but after God saves us by His grace, "For by

grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God" (Eph. 2:8), His grace in our hearts and lives will truly much more abound unto others than our sins abounded unto them. Where our sins abounded unto others before, causing us to do evil unto them, His grace in our lives now will so abound unto others as to cause us to return good for evil, to overcome evil with good, and to do unto others as we would have them do unto us. It will cause us to leave our gift at the altar and go to our brother if we remember that he has ought against us. "First be reconciled to thy brother and then come and offer thy gift." (Matt. 5:23-24). It will cause us to forgive our brother seventy times seven times if necessary (Matt. 18:21-22); and to even love our enemies, bless them that curse us, do good to them that hate us, and pray for them which despitefully use us and persecute us. (Matt. 5:44.)

Has sin abounded so far in your life that it has caused you to do deep, bitter wrong against someone that can never be undone; or caused you to say harsh, cruel, stinging, cutting words to some one which sank so deeply into their heart or burned so deeply into their soul that they never can forget them and you never can recall them? And is your soul heavily burdened, your heart broken and wrung with anguish, and your sorrow seems more than you can bear because of the bitter memory of them? If so get down on your knees and plead with God to forgive you. Pray until His sweet peace floods your soul, and His grace abounds in your heart; for it is only by the grace of God that we can ever atone for our sins. "And God is able to make all grace abound toward you: that ye always having all sufficiency in all things, may abound to every good work" 2 Cor. 9:8. It is only by humbling ourselves unto Him that we can receive His grace, for He gives His grace only to the humble. "But he giveth more grace. Wherefore he saith, God resisteth the proud, but giveth grace unto the humble." (James 4:6.) with His grace abounding in your heart, seek ways of doing good unto that one in return for the evil you have done unto him. By His grace "Overcome evil with good." (Romans 12:21). Ask God for wisdom to guide you in seeking for ways of doing good, that you might grasp and use each blessed privilege, each golden opportunity, each little possibility. "If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not; and it shall be given him." (James 1:5.) Without God's wisdom to guide your human judgment, you might fail to recognize an opportunity for doing good.

Dear God, may we ever keep humble before Thee and others, that we may always have Thy grace in our hearts and lives, and where our sins did abound, may Thy grace much more abound. In Jesus name we ask, Amen.

The "saw and trimmer" recently installed in His shop is a source of much pleasure to have, for it does the work so splendidly; not only in the slug cutting, but we can saw the furniture at any angle and fit it together snugly. We give God all the praise for this machinery, and do know that some one, in supplying the needs here at His "Print Shop," will have treasures in heaven in that day.

The young saints in the congregation here at Guthrie are making progress in the Lord, growing in grace and in knowledge, and having a burden for souls. They are working for the Lord by reaching out into the surrounding country, and holding meetings in school houses. There are three or four places where they have been having meetings. Their Young People's Meetings here at the chapel are very spiritual, and much alive; and their meetings have often lasted for two hours or more at a time. This encourages our hearts, for they are going to be the future ones to keep the truth of the Gospel of Christ before the coming generations, and to exalt the one true Church which is the Church of God, the pillar and ground of the truth. (1 Tim. 3:15).

It is an easy matter for people to fall into the habit of grumbling, complaining, fault-finding, and giving out destructive criticism; but it takes the grace of God in the heart, and power of His meek and humble Spirit to be patient, to suffer long and be kind, to envy not, to vaunt not self and not become inflated and not think evil of others, bear and forbear and to forgive even as Christ has forgiven us, to look for the good in others, to have divine love in the heart sufficient to cover the weaknesses and mistakes of our brothers and sisters who are striving to do His will,

There are preachers that preach a gospel that is destructive and very injurious to the cause of God. Their gospel would quench the "Smoking flax" and would "break the bruised reed," and their vision of God is that He is a God that is standing over His subjects with a club ready to knock you in the head if you make an awkward move or mistake of any kind. A gospel of that kind would put our loving

God down as a very mean and cruel Creator. In-

nocent sensitive souls whom Satan may be accusing of being unsaved would accept his awful accusations, and thus precious souls would be destroyed.

A gospel of judgment without any mercy and love is Satan's gospel, and a gospel of mercy and love without any judgment is also Satan's gospel. The Psalmist David, in beholding the work of Christ with an eye of faith and prophetic vision exclaimed with joy, "Mercy and truth have met together; righteousness and peace have kissed each other." Psalms 85:10. Jesus Christ came not to destroy but to save life, to cause a lively hope to spring up in our souls. It is written that "Grace and truth came by Jesus Christ." As the true judgments of God are laid down, the grace, love, and mercy of God should also be exalted before the condemned, needy soul.

The Hebrew writer says that Jesus is able to save them to the uttermost that come unto God by Him (Heb. 7:25). This is a strong statement and yet it is most assuredly true, for Jesus has all power both in heaven and in earth (Matt. 28:18). As a soul comes to God with godly sorrow in his heart because of transgressing His commandments, seeks forgiveness and mercy and holds the innocent blood of Christ before the Father as an atonement for his sins; God will have mercy and blot them all out as a thick cloud and will not remember them against that soul any more. Jesus was the Just One that suffered for us, the unjust. He paid the penalty of death for the sins that we had committed.

If a soul would come to God in his sinful state and ask God to mete out justice to him, he would receive eternal punishment, for God's law is: "The soul that sinneth, it shall die." In another place he says, "All men have sinned and come short of the glory of God." When a soul comes to God pleading guilty of being a sinner and asking God for mercy and forgiveness, then God shows mercy and is faithful to forgive them and to cleanse them from all unrighteousness (1 John 1:9). As long as we follow him and do His will, we can keep free from all guilt; for the Scripture says, "But if we walk in the light we have fellowship one with another, (He with us and we with Him) and the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin." (1 John 1:7.)

It is sad to the humble saints of God to see and to know of the vast multitude of professing people that have no real knowledge of being freed from sin. Most of them are just following the crowd, the least way of resistance, and are on the broad way of destruction. It seems that so many folks are blind to the true way, and it is easy for blind leaders to get a good following.

It seems to me that those who read the Bible would know that the crowds of professors are on the

wrong road, for Jesus has said, "Strait is the gate, and narrow is the way, which leadeth unto life; and few there be that find it" (Matt. 7:14). Human organization is a mark of the "Beast power." It becomes an idol that men worship and will not be led by His Spirit. God's Church is divinely organized, and does not need any of man's help, for the members of His body are held together by the Divine Love of God in each heart, they are not of this world even as He is not of this world, their citizenship is in heaven and the heavenly life flows from heaven into their soul, and they bear the fruits of the Spirit because of this life and force from heaven in the soul.

Jesus says, "If the blind lead the blind, they both fall into the ditch."

Dear souls, you who are entangled with professors, with man-organized churches, and with this world; if you will cut loose from all and just swing out on the promises of God and let Him lead you by His Spirit, He will bring you into sweet fellowship with all others that are free from these things and the spirit of such. Just abide in Him, as the branch (You) cannot bear the fruits of the Spirit unless it abides in the Vine (Christ). (John 15:4).

OBITUARIES

Most of them were in captivity, all because they failed to do all the Therefore in this scattered condicommandments. tion and confused state, the heathen scoffed at them with "This is Zion, whom no man seeketh after;" but praise our God, He promised them deliverance, and they received it. The church at Corinth refused the teachings of Christ regarding the ordinance of the Lord's house, and instead, were making the house of God a place in which to eat, drink, and revel; just as the worldly-minded are doing today. They have their pie- and chicken-suppers and all all other kind of feasts in order to satisfy their fleshly, carnal minds. Yet some of them bear the name "Church of God," when down in their hearts, they despise the Church of God. To despise the Church of God, means to refuse its founder, its doctrine, its people, and its ordinances. Now dear ones, think a moment. How many do you know, besides the dear saints, who love the ordinances of feet-washing, greeting the brethren with a holy kiss, and many other things which we could mention? Few, I must say. Now, we want to notice some things why people despise the Church of God. First, because we believe Catholicism to be the "Mystery, Babylon the Great, the Mother of harlots and abominations of the earth." Rev. 17:5. Then, too, it teaches a clean ministry, which would be: first, Holy Ghost men and women, having only one living wife or husband (1 Tim. 3:2), obedient children, full of faith; and many other things which we cannot mention here. They despise it because it is against all false theories of a Millennial reign of Christ on earth. Last, but not least, God's Church is despised because it is what it is. First, it is the blood-bought of Jesus Christ (Acts 20:28), a divinely organized body of worshipers (1 Cor. 12:28; John 4: 24), the pillar and ground of the truth (1 Tim. 3:15), yes, and all the blood-bought, humble followers of Jesus from the beginning to the end, which make up the body of Christ (1 Cor. 12:12, 13), with Christ as the only head (Col. 1:18) of that body. Truly, God has always had a called out, sought out, separate people, and today is no exception. He has one today, those who are called out of sin and darkness into the glorious light with the people of God. - Acts 9:1. And Saul, yet breathing out threatenings and slaughter against the disciples of the Lord, went unto the high priest.
- 2. And desired of him letters to Damascus to the synagogues, that if he found any of this way, whether they were men or women, he might bring them bound unto Jerusalem.
- 3. And as he journeyed, he came near Damascus: and suddenly there shined round about him a light from heaven:
- 4. And he fell to the earth, and heard a voice saying unto him, Saul, Saul, why persecutest thou me?
- 5. And he said, Who art thou, Lord? And the Lord said, I am Jesus whom thou persecutest: it is hard for thee to kick against the pricks.
- 6. And he trembling and astonished said, Lord, what wilt thou have me to do? And the Lord said unto him, Arise, and go into the city, and it shall be told thee what thou must do.
- 7. And the men which journeyed with him stood speechless, hearing a voice, but seeing no man.
- 8. And Saul arose from the earth; and when his eyes were opened, he saw no man: but they led him by the hand, and brought him into Damascus.
- 9. And he was three days without sight, and neither did eat nor drink.
- 10. And there was a certain disciple at Damascus, named Ananias; and to him said the Lord in a vision, Ananias. And he said, Behold, I am here, Lord.
- 11. And the Lord said unto him, Arise, and go into the street which is called Straight, and inquire in the house of Judas for one called Saul, of Tarsus: for, behold, he prayeth,
- 12. And hath seen in a vision a man named Ananias coming in, and putting his hand on him, that he might receive his sight.
- 17. And Ananias went his way, and entered into the house; and putting his hands on him said, Brother Saul,

the Lord, even Jesus, that appeared unto thee in the way as thou camest, hath sent me, that thou mightest receive thy sight, and be filled with the Holy Ghost.

- 18. And immediately there fell from his eyes as it had been scales: and he received sight forthwith, and arose, and was baptized.
- 19. And when he had received meat, he was strengthened. Then was Saul certain days with the disciples which were at Damascus.

Golden Text: "If any man be in Christ he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new."

COMMENTS AND APPLICATIONS

Paul before Conversion— Before Paul's conversion he was a Pharisee. The Pharisees were a well educated sect of the Jews. They were very scrupulous in observing the ceremonial law and worship. They also believed in tithing and in the resurrection of the dead.

Paul was a real Jew. He loved the Jews and desired to preach to them at Jerusalem, but they would not hear him so the Spirit ordered him to go to the Gentiles.

As a persecutor— We first hear of Paul as a persecutor, when he was consenting to Stephen's death. Imprisonment and murder were the means used to crush the young church and to scatter the disciples first at Jerusalem and then abroad.

Paul's Conversion— Paul's experience gives us an ideal example of how the spirit of God changes man's ambition, attitudes; yea, and makes a new man entirely, and completely. The Lord will reveal himself unto honest hearted souls that He can use.

The Ministry of Man to Man— While Paul had been of the highest order of the Jews and very highly educated, yet it pleased the Lord to use Ananias, a very common member of the church entrusted with no particular office or position, to instruct him in the way. Is our brother not our keeper? Can we not realize that if we persecute one of His little ones, we are persecuting the Lord himself? We can be a very great hinderance, one to another, or we may be a great blessing, one to another.

Acts 13:16. Then Paul stood up, and beckoning with his hand said, Men of Israel, and ye that fear God, give audience.

- 23. Of this man's seed hath God according to his promise raised unto Israel a Saviour, Jesus:
- 24. When John had first preached before his coming the baptism of repentance to all the people of Israel.
- 25. And as John fulfilled his course, he said, Whom think ye that I am? I am not he. But, behold, there cometh one after me, whose shoes of his feet I am not worthy to loose.
- 26. Men and brethren, children of the stock of Abraham, and whosoever among you feareth God, to you is the word of this salvation sent.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATIONS

Paul at Antioch— The Spirit of Christ is a missionary Spirit, and when man possesses that Spirit it prompts him to carry the gospel message to those in sin. "To the Jew first and also to the Greek."

The Message - Jesus Christ according to prophecy- fulfilling prophecy- crucified- Risen-

The approach to the lesson was by way of law and prophets then presenting the New Testament which was new ground for them.

- Acts 14:1. And it came to pass in Iconium, that they went both together into the synagogue of the Jews, and so spake, that a great multitude both of the Jews and also of the Greeks believed.
- 2. But the unbelieving Jews stirred up the Gentiles, and made their minds evil affected against the brethren.
- 3. Long time therefore abode they speaking boldly in the Lord, which gave testimony unto the word of his grace, and granted signs and wonders to be done by their hands.
- 4. But the multitude of the city was divided: and part held with the Jews, and part with the apostles.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATIONS

When the word of truth is crushed in one place it rises in another. The Gospel must be preached to every creature. The Gospel is the power of God unto salvation. There is no other power by which man can be elevated from a life of sin. The Gospel preached under the anointing power of the Holy Spirit will accomplish something for the cause.

Persecution— The life that exemplifies Christ will receive persecution. Regardless of the persecutions at Iconium, some believed. When a person embraces the Gospel, a monument is raised, a testimony to the world that a Savior has come, was crucified and resurrected, and is an intercessor at the right hand of God. Printed PortionActs 15:23-29; Gal. 2:1, 2, 9, 10. . Acts 15:23b. The apostles and elders and brethren which are of the Gentiles in Antioch and Syria and Cilicia:

- 24. Forasmuch as we have heard, that certain 20. Howbeit, as the disciples stood round about which went out from us have troubled you with words, subverting your souls, saying, Ye must be circumcised, and keep the law: to whom we gave no such commandment:
 - 25. It seemed good unto us, being assembled with one accord, to send chosen men unto you with our beloved Barnabas and Paul.
 - 26. Men that have hazarded their lives for the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.
 - 27. We have sent therefore Judas and Silas, who shall also tell you the same things by mouth.
 - 28. For it seemed good to the Holy Ghost, and to us, to lay upon you no greater burden than these necessary things;
 - 29. That ye abstain from meats offered to idols, and from blood, and from things strangled, and from fornication: from which if ye keep yourselves, ye shall do well. Fare ye well.
 - Gal. 2:1. Then fourteen years after I went up again to Jerusalem with Barnabas, and took Titus with me also.
 - 2. And I went up by revelation, and communicated unto them that gospel which I preached among the Gentiles, but privately to them which were of reputation, lest by any means I should run, or had run. in vain.
 - 9. And when James, Cephas, and John, who seemed to be pillars, perceived the grace that was given unto me, they gave to me and Barnabas the right hands of fellowship; that we should go unto the heathen, and they unto the circumcision.
 - 10. Only they would that we should remember the poor; the same which I also was forward to do.

Golden Text: "A man is not justified by the works of the law, but by the faith of Jesus Christ." Gal. 2:16.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATIONS

Preceding Events—Paul and Barnabas as Missionaries from Antioch went into Galatia. Some of the Jews and many of the Gentiles were saved; not by keeping the law, but by simple faith in Jesus. The report of how the Gentiles had accepted salvation by faith soon reached Jerusalem. At once the Judaizing teachers came opposing the Apostles, saying that Gentile Christians must keep the law the same as the Jewish Christians. They went from one place to another causing division in the churches.

The church at Antioch desired Paul and Barnabas to go to Jerusalem and consult the brethren in regard to the necessity of Gentile converts keeping the law.

They were received by the brethren and were able with the aid of Peter's convincing argument (his vision) that they were not to fasten "a yoke" upon the neck of the disciples" that the fathers themselves had been unable to bear. Also James who had more influence than others at Jerusalem, arose and declared that they should not trouble the Gentiles who turn to God. The entire assembly placed its approval upon the decision and also commended "our beloved brother Paul and Barnabas" for their missionary work.

An Example—Unmoveable, yet tender; meek, yet not a weakling. Let us stand for our conviction, yet remain teachable.

Acts. 15:36. And some days after Paul said unto Barrabas, Let us go again and visit our brethren in every city where we have preached the word of the Lord, and see how they do.

- 16:4. And as they went through the cities, they delivered them the decrees for to keep, that were ordained of the apostles and elders which were at Jerusalem.
- 5. And so were the churches established in the faith, and increased in number daily.
- 6. Now when they had gone throughout Phrygia and the region of Galatia, and were forbidden of the Holy Ghost to preach the word in Asia,
- 7. After they were come to Mysia, they assayed to go into Bithynia: but the Spirit suffered them not.
- 8. And they passing by Mysia came down to Troas.
- 9. And a vision appeared to Paul in the night; There stood a man of Macedonia, and prayed him, saying, Come over into Macedonia, and help us.
- 10. And after he had seen the vision, immediately we endeavored to go into Macedonia, assuredly gathering that the Lord had called us for to preach the gospel unto them.
- 11. Therefore loosing from Troas, we came with a straight course to Samothracia, and the next day to Neapolis;
- 12. And from thence to Philippi, which is the chief city of that part of Macedonia, and a colony: and we were in that city abiding certain days.
- 13. And on the sabbath we went out of the city by a river side, where prayer was wont to be made; and we sat down, and spake unto the women which resorted thither.

- 14. And a certain woman named Lydia, a seller of purple, of the city of Thyatira, which worshipped God, heard us: whose heart the Lord opened, that she attended unto the things which were spoken of Paul.
- 15. And when she was baptized, and her household, she besought us, saying, If ye have judged me to be faithful to the Lord, come into my house, and abide there. And she constrained us.

Golden Text: "And after he had seen the vision, immediately we endeavored to go into Macedonia." Acts 16:10.

Practical Truth: "Go ye into all the world . . . and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world."

COMMENTS AND APPLICATIONS

The call for Paul to "Come help us" is a decisive event in missionary history. The commission "Go ye into all the world" was taking on new meaning.

Verse 4— Deliver the decree made by the apostles at Jerusalem to all the people. A decree made by man and yet not man-made, but under the anointing of the Holy Spirit. Being led by the Spirit is the secret to a successful life.

God leads in mysterious ways. A great missionary—a very small audience—the record of only one receiving the Word. Give other instances in the Bible where the audiences were small. A message to a few makes the message of no less importance.

Troas and Philippi— Name some interesting things that happened in ancient times at those places.

Verse 9—Notice a new missionary added to the number, none other than Luke. Before this he wrote what others told him, but from now on he wrote what he himself saw.

The first decade after the crucifixion the apostles remained close around Jerusalem. The second decade they reached Asia Minor, and it took about ten years more before they came into Europe.

The place of prayer by the river side.

The first European converts.

It is good to read about the missionary spirit sending and working with Paul, but we can testify that the same Spirit is upon the saints at Guthrie.
