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La.—Greetings of love to the readers of the "Faith and Victory" paper.--I feel it will be to the glory of God that I write briefly some of my life's story.

My mother died when I was ten. For three years my father had a housekeeper who was very good to my sisters and brothers. There were six of us; I was the old st. The lady seemed to have a pick at me because I could tell Father of some of the things she did. Oh, how I missed my mother! When I was thirteen years of age, Father put us in a Catholic convent so I could go to school. I had helped with the work at home and had missed much school. We left home on July 20, 1910. My two brothers were in one place and we four girls in another. We were separated for the first time. Oh, how I cried and longed for Papa and home.

The Catholic sisters were good to us. Then a new life began. I went to school and studied catechism. I took my first communion, was confirmed by Bishop Shaw and went regularly to confession and communion as all good Catholics do. Three years later I was a good Catholic and would fight for its teachings. Then Father took me out of the convent and he died a year later. Left alone. I entered training for a nurse—a profession which I have kept all along and still nurse where I can to the glory of God. I have seen many sad things while nursing. I have seen many souls go into eternity unprepared to meet God; have heard men who were strong while in health, pleading for more time on their death beds.

^{*} November 16, 1916 I was married to a man who professed in the Church of Christ. We were married by a Justice of the Peace, and I thought he would have our marriage blessed by the priest. We were happy for awhile, but he didn't have our wedding blessed. I was excommunicated from the church and was in trouble in mind and in the home. I was high-strung and wanted to go to communion and take a part in my church, but couldn't. My husband and I fussed and both cried. He said that he would not go to church anywhere. I didn't go either. We had quite a pull, but, thank God, we stayed together. We are still together after twenty-nine years and love each other. Even as a Catholic, I did not believe in divorces.

Dear ministers of God, we need to cry aloud and spare not against the awful evils of divorce and double marriagc. So many of our young people are in adultery. If they want to get saved and live for the Lord, what a price they have to pay! There is no way around Matt. 19:9, "And I say unto you, Whosoever shall put away his wife, except it be for fornication, and shall marry another, committeth adultery: and whoso marrieth her which is put away doth commit adultery." Young people, you that are saved, be sure that you marry saved companions.

Eight years passed with hard work, worry, no contentment of soul, and no children to bless our home. We took a sweet, little boy ten days old. What a joy and comfort he was to us!

Some friends lived a quarter of a mile from us. The old grandma called herself a saint. At that time I did not understand that any saints existed on the earth. But she was a sweet old lady. Her daughter, whom I knew well, danced and played cards as I did; but the dear old saint kept living for God. She would leave home when her daughter would give parties or dances. At last the daughter went to a campmeeting and claimed to get saved but she did not change much. She invited Bro. and Sister Watson (now Sister Key) to our community to preach. They came and this sister dug down and got a good case of salvation.

On the first night of the little tent meeting I went out for curiosity only. I thought it was awful for a woman to preach. I was very bold and did ugly things. I thought i was spiting the preacher. I even told her that I just came out to hear a woman preach. However, the Lord began to talk to me the first night of the meeting. I was a snuff user, and when the Word went forth on that dirty stuff, I said, "Those Holiness preachers don't buy my tobacco, and it isn't any of their business." But I was ashamed of it and wouldn't use it in company. I was miserable, for something told me I was wrong. I would stay at home away from service, but the Lord talked to me. Then I would go again and He would still talk. Oh, how miserable I was. The truth went forth on modest dress. I took the shield out of my dress and made the neck as low as I could. I sat so bold, but the Lord followed me. He knew I was just ignorant and was letting the devil cause me to do those mean things. Finally, cn the last day of the meeting, while at home, I was doing my work when the load got so heavy I could not carry it. I went into my bedroom and in my simple way asked the Lord to save me. I told him I would guit everything I knew that was wrong. Praise God, he spoke peace to my troubled soul.

I did not know just what I would need to do, but my faith was in God. I gave up my snuff, told God I would quit it if it killed me. Well. I thought it would kill me, but the Lord knew my heart. He said that He would not let me be tempted more than I could bear—I did not know that then for I had not studied the Bible.

Dear people, we can and must give up all filthiness of the flesh and spirit for Jesus. Heaven is holy; there are no spittoons there, and here on earth is the place to clean up. We must be as clean here as the saints are over there. After Jesus saved me and I began to tell the folks, they made light of me. They said I would be using my snuff in a few days and that my religion would last three months; but twenty years have passed, and I am still free. My sister, who was Catholic, would not let her little girl spend the night with me any more, she said, since I was sanctified. Oh, I came up against so many things.

I did not know at first that I needed to make my wrongs right. I was so happy I didn't see the need of taking off my wedding ring, but in a short time the Spirit of God began to teach me. If we are honest, the Lord will teach us what to do. His teachings and the Word of God will be the same; the Word and the Spirit agree. One night while reading aloud by the fireside, I read 1 Peter, 3rd chapter. When I got to the 3rd verse where it tells us about "not the wearing of gold," my husband asked me what I was going to do with my wedding ring. He was not saved, but he was watching. He knew more of the Bible than I did. A light flashed on my pathway, so off came the ring and other things as I received light. Persecutions came and many things happened..

I was in meeting one night when the word of God was being preached. I was saying, "Amen." Then something was said and I then saw that I had wrongs to make right. While clorking in a store I had taken fifty cents. That was not much, but enough to bring condemnation to my soul. The devil said, "Now what about your amens?" I said, "Amen, Lord, I'll make it right." The man from whom I had taken the money was a millionaire and had been really nice to me. When I went home from meetin; I wrote to him and confessed what I had done. I told him that the Lord had saved me. His answer commended me for the stand which I had taken and said that if there was anything he could do to erase it from my mind to count it done. Another wrong I had to make right was the killing of a pesty pig which persisted in rooting up the garden. I threw it into the pasture. I did not have money at that time to pay for it, but the Lord showed me that I had a cow to s ll. J said, "All right, Lord, give me a buyer." The next evening a lady came and wanted to buy my cow. I asked how much she would give me, and the price was more than I had expected. There was nothing left for me to do but go and confess and pay. My hasband told me there was no need of that, that I would only make a show of myself; but I went and confessed and was ready to pay. The people broke down and cried. They said, "We believed you were a good woman, now we know it." They wouldn't have any pay. I felt good in my soul when I had gone all the way for the Lord. I could tell many experiences.

The Lord called me to preach the gospel. I thought that was something I just could not do; surely the Lord did not mean that I sho ld 70 out and preach. I could nurse, clerk in stores, do house work, work in the field; but the thought of speaking before crowds horrified me. I did not know the Bible well. Too, I had made my income by nursin~ and preaching would be by faith. I did not understand that the Lord would supply all of my needs. I compromised by teaching a Sunday School in my home. The Lord blassed, but that was not enough; He had called me to preach. I did not let anyone know that I felt called to preach. One day one of the ministers asked me if I did not feel my call. I started, but did not go verv far. I went back to nursing. I got away from the Lord; not into open sin, but I failed the Lord and lost the ioy or t of my soul.

 t_{C} . Dear people, we cannot trifle with God; He knows our hearts. "Ob dience is better than sacrifice." I renewed my consecration, but I still had to preach to please

the Lord. I had begun to get stout. I weighed 180 lbs. when saved and in a short time I had gained 100 lbs. My size embarrassed me. I knew that some people would make remarks. What a struggle I had! The Lord permitted me to be sick with heart trouble and other afflictions, until I wasn't able to do much work. Finally, I promised the Lord that by His help I would preach. He healed me and gave me the scripture in Psalms 81:10: "Open thy mouth wide and I will fill it." I still stand on that scripture, for of myself I can do nothing; what is done the Lord has to do it. —Catherine Simpson.

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Since the campmeetings are over, the office force is back in the Lord's print shop and the machinery is humming again. While campmeeting was in progress here at Guthrie, the "Automatic Feeder" for the 12 x 18 Job Press arrived. We hal ordered this Automatic Feeder last fall and on account of war conditions we could not get delivery until now. The company sent two men up from Dallas, Texas to attach it to the Press. It is in operation now, printing the gospel tracts which are going forth in a steady stream to all parts of the country, bringing vital gospel messages to thousands of precious souls. We are truly thankful to God for this machine and know that God will not forget to reward those who gave of their substance to make this printing and publishing possible. The Lord is encouraging us much in the printing work. He is getting the shop equipped so that when the paper shortage is over we shall be able to double the amount of printed material and send it forth to rescue precious souls.

Continue to pray for us, dear readers, that all phases of the work may be kept up in divine order and that the brighter shining light of the gospel may reach every honest soul, separating them from the world and all its foolish ways.

We feel it needful to write to the saints everywhere about a matter concerning the General Southern Camp ground located here at Hammond, La., which camp ground is beautifully situated and an ideal place for saints' annual camp meetings to be held which are strictly run on the iree-will offering plan—no charges for meals or sleeping quarters—and with God's help we endeavor to cling to the truth as it was first preached by Bro. D. S. Warner, Mother Sarah Smith, and other precious saints, and desire to see this place continue this way until Jesus comes.

This camp ground has been located here for about 38 years, as we just closed the 38th annual camp meeting July 8, 1945. Bro. F. M. Williamson was an humble minister of God whom the Lord used as founder of this work. He passed to his reward some years ago but his widow is still living here, who is still preciously saved. A tract of land was purchased for the camp ground and buildings were erected on it for camp meeting purposes, but because of financial strain some of it, including five lots, was sold to one of the brethren at that time in order to raise money to carry on the needed improvements. We understand that at that time this brother expected to build on it for a home but later changed his mind, and now after a space of over 30 years he has decided to sell and the saints here feel it pleasing to the Lord to buy it back and add it back to the camp ground like it was at the beginning, for the main reason of keeping away undesirable neighbors. For instance, this plot of ground is about the right size for a worldly playground or anything else similar to it, which we feel would be a great hindrance spiritually to this neighborhood and campmeetings held year after year to have anything like that close by. During the camp meeting just closed it was decided upon to buy this land back for the sum of \$500. \$150 has already been paid on it, leaving a balance of \$350 yet to be met. And the matter is left so if later any of the saints feel led of the Lord to purchase any of these lots for themselves a home they may be free to do it and the money received from such purchases will be used for further improvement of the camp ground, which is greatly needed. Some improvements have been made along, but as everything is in constant deterioration, there is constant need of replacement. Right now many things need to be done on the grounds. COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

Joseph's life is a remarkable example of faithfulness to God in the face of difficult circumstances. It seemed unfortunate for him when his brothers sold him into Egypt, but through this God was making a means of deliverance for Jacob's family when the years of famine came. Joseph could not have been more than twenty years old when he entered into Potiphar's service, but inrough God's help he proved to be a gifted administrator and proved his faithfulness by refusing to yield to the corrupt, immoral influence of Potiphar's wife. This young man would not stoop to evil, however great the temptation or convenient the situation.

Joseph's dreams had no doubt stirred jealousy in his brethren, and they tried to get rid of him, but God had a plan to work out in his lire. His life is absolute proof that no mischance of fortune or circumstance can cut a man off from the mercy and favor of God.

Difficult circumstances should never break the spirit of God's saints.. The aged Apostle Paul, weighted with chains, gave the church inspired scriptures; St. John banished on the isle of Patmos, in the Spirit on the Lords day, saw the church in her glory; John Bunyan was in a dungeon when God gave him a dream and the allegory, "Pilgrim's Progress."

Joseph had tound a grace which was more than equal to any Egyptian dungeon. One never knows in the midst of imprisoning circumstances how soon deliverance may come. This very day may bring it. Then let us look up and take heart. Many are the afflictions of the righteous, but the Lord delivereth him out of them all.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

Although this is a temperance lesson, let us consider Joseph as a type of Christ. He began a great work at the age of thirty. The enemy designed to kill him but God preserved him, and in today's lesson we find him in Egypt with marvelous resources for the sustenance of physical life. He was thrust from his home twenty-two years previous to this time, but now in a foreign land he is the preserver of life, under one condition that souls would do as Pharaoh said regarding Joseph: "What he saith to you, do it." There was a turning to Joseph of all who realized the position to which the king had assigned him and thus their physical life was preserved. How good of Joseph that he refused none, not even his brethren who had wronged him so greatly. They came humbly and received sustenance.

Jesus began His ministry at the age of thirty. The enemy had tried hard to kill Him, but He came forth with all power within Himself to heal the sick, cast out devils, and also had power to perform any miracle necessary to destroy the works of Satan. He preached the gospel with all power and had authority to grant a penitent thief on a cross an entrance into paradise. At one time souls heard these words from the lips of His mother, "What-"soever He saith unto you, do it." That is the message to us today. No one need die, spiritually. Jesus the Lifegiver, is here in this dark and sinful world in spirit. Those who seek Him for spiritual sustenance as folks sought Joseph of old for literal bread shall never die. The blessed Holy Spirit is here to teach us truth. He inspires our hearts to exercise faith in the blood that was shed. Dear souls, will you determine that no power in carth or hell shall keep you from Jesus who has the supply of all you need?

In regard to temperance, suppose Joseph would have yielded to a temptation to use the grain God gave for another purpose than for food. What destruction of life would have been in the land. Oh, the cost of intemperance! The Lord causes even children to know the awfulness of drinking liquor. Let us pray for the youth of our land so that we may have more characters as Joseph. Temperance in little things that seem insignificant

often brings blessings. Many years ago I read an admonition to be temperate in regard to sleeping. Medical authorities agree that each hour spent in needless sleep does the body more harm than good. Surely the Lord wants us to have enough sleep to refresh our bodies for service for Him, but let us remember that we are useless while we sleep. Jesus sometimes remained awake all night in the interest of God's kingdom. Let us all seek to be temperate in all things.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

Judah realized the time had come when he had to make every effort to change the mind of the ruler before him who had the power of a king. He felt small and insignificant, but he had a petition weighing heavily upon his heart. He became willing for ANYTHING just so the petition might be granted. He had the interest of his family at heart.

It is our privilege to pour out our hearts to Jesus as Judah did to Joseph. Has the enemy ever tried to keep you from being real open-hearted in prayer? Has ne ever tired to keep you from becoming real willing for the Lord to have His way? Has he ever tired to whisper to you to be careful for you know not what you will have to suffer? When our life is clear it is the greatest blessing to go before the Lord in prayer, all given up for the Lord to undertake and work things out. No doubt, Judah felt persuaded down deep in his heart that Joseph would do him good, regardless, and we are thus fully persuaded concerning Jesus, for His precious promises cannot fail.

Joseph could have revealed himself to his brethren immediately but they had concealed their evil deed so long and now it was time for them to make their own confession, so that they would never glory in the presence of Joseph any more. The enemy succeeds in having sould refrain from open confession today. Each time reverses come they remember it is no doubt the judgment of God meted out for the concealed wrong. How much better to make confession and know it is all under the blood and that we have escaped from the wrath of God.

No doubt our petitions would be granted immediately if the dear Lord did not have our good at heart. Nothing is more profitable than waiting before the Lord. We KNOW He will do us good. While we have a way mapped for deliverance we see the Lord work in a far more glorious way. How many mothers expected the Lord to undertake for their boys by restoring peace the fourteenth day of August? They were praying for the safety of their precious boys, expecting the Lord to work in some way they had mapped out, no doubt, but the mighty hand of God stretched out in mercy and love and pity and silenced all artillery-oh, our lips are almost dumb and our very hearts bow before Him in humble submission. 3. And Joseph said unto his brethren, I am Joseph; doth my father yet live? And his brethren could not answer him; for they were troubled at his presence.

Practical Truth: God can overrule even the wicked acts of men and make them links in a chain of providence by which his purposes are carried out.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

We should learn anew from the story of Joseph that no man can escape the obligation and responsibility of being his brother's keeper.

In Joseph's dealings with his brethren, it seemed he desired to find out if they were still the hard-hearted. men that they were when they sold him into iealous Egypt. Notice Joseph's attitude toward them from the time he first recognized them as his own father's sons: how he yearned to reveal his identity to them but acted wisely and addressed them through an interpreter as though their language was a foreign language to him. On one occasion he had to conceal himself and give vent to his emotions. When it finally was revealed to them who chis Egyptian official actually was and they were suddenly confronted with him who once had been their victim, the guilt which follows sin and the utter impossibility of escape was utmost in their minds and hearts. Jeseph, knowing this. drove straight to the question of guilt when he said. "I am Joseph your brother whom ye sold into Egypt." He well knew their sin and guilt, yet he did not reproach them. He said that this which his brothers had meant for evil had worked out for good. God had sent him there to preserve life. It was through the warning dreams of Pharaoh and the Godgiven wisdom of Joseph that there was plenty of food saved from the seven fruitful years against the years of famine.

We find in Joseph's dealings with his brothers the process by which God deals with sinners through Christ Jesus. As the Holy Spirit deals with men, they become conscious of pest sins. They are restless and uneasy until conviction leads them to surrender to Christ. The only relief for guilt is confession. This linked with godly sorrow leads to repentance not to be repented of. We need to learn that as with Joseph it is with Jesus. The confessing and making wrongs right seems hard to do, but when we do the thing that is just and right, our God will give grace and help us to do it. Let us never think we may do evil that good may come of it. God's purpose can be wrought out more effectively through the obedience of one like faithful Abraham than in spite of evil like Joseph's brothers had committed. Yet God's purpose will not be defeated even though men sin.

THE ISRAELITES IN A FOREIGN LAND

Gen. 47.1. Then Joseph came and told Pharaoh, and said. My father and my brethren, and their flocks, and their flocks, and their herds, and all that they have, are come out of the land of Canaan; and behold, they are in the land of Goshen.

 \cdot 2. And he took some of his brethren even five men, and presented them unto Pharaoh.

3. And Pharaoh said unto his brethren, What is your occupation? And they said unto Pharaoh, Thy servants are shepherds, both we, and also our fathers.

4. They said moreover unto Pharaoh, For to sojourn in the land are we come: for thy servants have no pasture for their flocks, for the famine is sore in the land of Canaan: row therefore, we pray thee, let thy servants dwell in the land of Goshen.

5. And Pharaoh spake unto Joseph, saying, Thy father and thy brethren are come unto thee:

6. The land of Egypt is before thee; in the best of the land make thy father and brethren to dwell; in the land of Goshen let them dwell; and if thou knowest any men of activity among them, then make them rulers over my cattle.

7. And Joseph brought in Jacob his father, and set him before Pharaoh: and Jacob blessed Pharaoh.

8. And Pharaoh said unto Jacob, How old art thou? 9. And Jacob said unto Pharaoh, The days of the years of my pilgrimage are an hundred and thirty years: few and evil have the days of the years of my life been, and have not attained unto the days of the years of the life of my fathers in the days of their pilgrimage.

10 And Jacob blessed Pharaoh, and went out from before Pharaoh.

11. And Joseph placed his father and his brethren and gave them a possession in the land of Egypt, in the best of the land, in the land of Rameses, as Pharaoh hac commanded.

12. And Joseph nourished his father, and his brethren, and all his father's household, with bread according to their families.

Golden Text: Lord, thou hast been our dwelling place in all generations. Psalm 90:1.

Fractical Truth: It was the providence of God that the Israelites should sojourn in a foreign land while they were increasing into a nation.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

This going down into Egypt was an important event in Hebrew history. It was God's plan for them. God's dealings with Israel should help us to more fully realize that however hard or unpleasant our circumstances may be, if we are serving God we do not come to our place by accident or chance, but it is part of God's plan for us.

Before Jacob arrived in Egypt, God appeared to him in a vision by night, saying, "Fear not to go down into Egypt; for I will there make of thee a great nation: I will go down with thee into Egypt, and I will also surely bring thee up again." God had told Abraham that his seed would sojourn in a strange land four hundred years where they would be slaves but it is doubtful if Jacob and his sons realized at this time the many afflictions which they would have to suffer before they would become a great nation. Their purpose in going to Egypt was to be nourished and cherished. God permits his people to be nourished and cherished for awhile, but He knows it takes opposition to make them strong.

They remembered the promise, "I will also surely bring thee up again" and chose to be known as sojourners in Egypt so they could leave again. Joseph could have desired and secured places of honor in the state for his brethren and had them to keep their identity as shepherds hid from the king lest they disgrace him in the eyes of his admirers, for a "shepherd is an abomination unto the Egyptians," but Joseph feared God and was more concerned for their purity and their remaining a nation separate unto God than he was about the honors which the king could bestow upon them. Goshen was a good land in Egypt where they could live and their temporai needs be met without them being exposed to the evil influences in Egypt. Neither were his brethren ambitious for places of honor.

Though it was God's plan for them to be in Egypt, it was not His plan for them to be OF Egypt. It is the same with His children today. They are in the world but not of the world. In our dealings with the affairs of this life, we should not seek places of honor where our souls will become ensnared and we will be robbed of our heavenly inheritances, but we should make ourselves of no reputation, not entangle ourselves with the affairs of this life, and esteem the reproaches of Christ greater riches than the treasures of Egypt.

Jacob had lived 130 years, yet his days seemed few and full of trouble to him as he looked back over them. It is ever thus with human life upon this earth. Without the assurance of eternal life, man's life here is surely vain; but the child of God can turn from the sad thoughts of this short troublesome life, to the hope of a neverendirg life. Lord, teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom.
