#### At Ease In Zion

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"Woe to them that are at ease in Zion" Amos 6:1. What is Zion? Part of the definition in the dictionary says: "The chosen people; the Church of God; the New Jerusalem." "At ease" means relaxed; freedom from pain (not bearing the cross), labor (preach-

ing or other spiritual work), burden (unwilling to share others' trials, etc.), responsibility ("let somebody else do it").

So often we hear someone say, "There does not seem to be anything I can do to work for the Lord; I cannot preach or teach, etc." It is true, we are not all called to preach, but we all have a place to fill. I Cor. 12; Eph. 4:4-16; and 5:30, all teach us that we (all members) are the body of Christ (the church) and each member has something to do, even the ones "which seem to be more feeble, are necessary" verse 22. In verse 28 it mentions "helps." We can all be helpers in some way, if we do not have the other gifts.

First, we should pray. Pray for one another, and for all men; be "prayer warriors." We should ask God to guide us and direct us by His Spirit, and give us wisdom and understanding how, where, and when to work for Him.

In Jesus' parable of the talents, Matt. 24:14-30, it says He called His own servants and delivered unto them His goods and gave to every man according to his ability. One man buried his talent. He had a talent (or ability), but he was afraid. Oh, how many today are afraid! afraid to tell their neighbor, their friend, their relatives, or a sinner of the wonderful blessings of Salvation, or how blessed it is for their bodies to be healed by God's divine power when they obey His Word. There are so many things the enemy makes one afraid to do. There is a remedy for that kind of fear: "Perfect love casteth out fear" I John 4:18. Let us pray God to give us that perfect love and love will find a way to make us fruit-bearing Christians, St. John 15:8.

Some say, "Oh, I'm too timid," yes, and all too often it is nothing but shame that the enemy has slipped into the heart. Peter had an experience of that kind, but he did something about it—"He went out and wept bitterly." Afterwards, when he was filled with the Holy Ghost, he boldly told the gospel story. Get filled with the Holy Spirit and He will give you boldness too. "We are saved to serve."

There is so much to do; "Lift up your eyes and look" John 4:35. There are so many needs. Give! Give money; "give alms [gifts] of such things as ye have" Luke 11:41. There are so many things one can

give. Give Bibles, Testaments, tracts, etc. Stand on a street corner where children pass coming from school and hand out "Beautiful Way" papers and tracts. They soon watch for you every week. vite them to your home for a Bible Story Class. Have some cookies etc., for them, or teach the older ones to make cookies or candy or to sew. They will like that and you can get the truth to their hearts. Be a Dorcas (Acts 9:36, 39), help busy mothers or teach the young mothers.

One lady makes many quilts from good parts of old clothes for the needy—flooded areas, mission fields, etc. One went to a hospital ward once a week and wrote letters for those who could not write. wrote about 200 letters a month to shut-ins. watched the papers for deaths and sent tracts and comfort to the loved ones. Mother Harmon, when past 90, often walked up the street to read the Bible to a blind lady.

Give a smile. If you have real Salvation it shows in your countenance. Some have been asked on the street or bus, "You are a Christian, aren't you? I could see it on your face." A man went up the sidewalk whistling, "I Must Tell Jesus." A woman hanging up clothes in her back yard with a heavy heart and tears running down her cheeks heard him and went inside and told Jesus, and He took her burden. One dear old man (not a pulpit preacher) when on the street would lay his hand on a boy or young man's arm and say, "Young man, how is it with your soul today?" Maybe he would say a few more words then pass on to another. Because of his interest in the souls of men, his love and kindness to children, his help to widows and orphans, he was known throughout the town and country as "Brother Hassler."

Visit the sick? I was won to the truth by two sisters visiting me and praying for me; and by the sweetness and kindness of a dear mother-in-law. Visit jails, old people's homes, and orphans' homes. And do not forget to sing the songs of Zion—in your homes, around the family altar, at work, over the radio, and everywhere. Many hearts are touched and won by the truth in a song.

"Woe to them that are at ease in Zion."

There are many "Woes" pronounced against wickedness in the Bible, but to me, the saddest of all are against those in the church. Is it possible that those who are at ease in Zion will be among those who replied to Jesus in Matt. 25:44: "Lord, when saw we thee naked, or sick, or in prison, and did not minister unto thee?" Notice the answer. "Inasmuch as ye did it not to one of the least of these, ye did it not to me."

May God help us to work while it is day. 

# The Corrupt Tree

On the eleventh limb of the corrupt tree let us write "strife" (Gal. 5:19-21; Matt. 7:18-20). Strife means discord, conflict, quarrel, enmity, war, contention for superiority. (Web. Dic.)

As we think about the meaning of strife we surely can agree with what we read in James 3:16, "For where envying and strife is, there is confusion and every evil work." In the 17th verse we also read, "But if ye have bitter envying and strife in your heart, glory not, and lie not against the truth." A person can not get into heaven with strife in his heart, which will show out in his life. We must just face it here and get rid of it or it will meet us over there and condemn us to eternal damnation.

In this same chapter James deals with the tongue. He brings out the thought that the tongue is a fire. If it is used to bring out what is in the heart, much trouble can be caused from it. A great fire will be kindled and cause much confusion. In Prov. 26:20 we read, "Where no wood is, there the fire goeth out: so where there is no talebearer, the strife ceaseth." When strife is in the heart of a person, he is ever watchful to see something that he can go tell so as to cause more trouble or down the person whom he is working against. How sad these things are when we see them. God has deliverance for every soul that has a heart full of strife. God will take it out and put love in place of strife. There will be no quarrel, enmity, or contention for superiority. You will be obeying the Bible which tells us to forgive one another, and to bear and forbear.

"Let nothing be done through strife or vainglory; but in lowliness of mind let each esteem other better than themselves" Phil. 2:3. This is a warning that the Apostle Paul is giving to God's children. He warns us to check to see why we do a certain thing. Is it done for strife or vainglory? Is it done with humility? Is it done by esteeming others better than ourselves? The Apostle Paul goes on to say in verse five, "Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus." Jesus proved His humility by taking on the "form of a servant." (verse seven.) He committed Himself into God's hands and let Him lift Him up. Just so. the Lord wants us to do the same.

"And the servant of the Lord must not strive; but be gentle unto all men, apt to teach, patient, in meekness instructing those that oppose themselves; if God peradventure will give them repentance to the acknowledging of the truth; and that they may recover themselves out of the snare of the devil, who are taken captive by him at his will" II Tim. 2:24-26.

It is possible for a person to get into strife by just holding up for a truth clearly taught in the Word of God. God wants us to stand for truth firmly, but do it with gentleness, kindness, and patience. If we strive we will be as bad as the person who is in error, not because we do not stand for truth but because of the way we stand for it. Many times when I am talking with a person about a truth and they seem to want to argue or strive, I tell them that I do not want to argue about the Word of God and I will not talk about it any farther. Unless we can help someone there is no point in talking about it and get our soul in trouble with God, for as the Scripture says, "the servant of the Lord must not strive; but be gentle unto all men."

May the Lord help those whose hearts are full of strife. Come to Jesus and He will take it all away and cause you to be at peace. There is hope for you, dear one. Let the saints of God watch and pray, lest the enemy try to work in a little strife and cause you to lose your soul.

#### Contentment

NOT IMPOSSIBLE—Restlessness is the opposite of contentment Greater is the number of the restless than the contented; and yet contentment is not impossible in any situation of life. Contentment is the virtue of being satisfied with whatever state or condition in which we find ourselves. It consists not so much in adding fuel to the fire as in taking some away, not in multiplying wealth, but in diminishing desires, in realizing that thirst can better be quenched out of a cup than out of a river. Velvet slippers do not cure gout, and a bed of gold does not ease sickness more readily than a mattress of straw.

SPIRITUAL ROAD—There is no psychological road to tranquility of soul, but only the spiritual. Those who lack the spiritual are always discontented. As Esaias the prophet put it; "The wicked are like the troubled sea, when it cannot rest, whose waters cast up mire and dirt. There is no peace, saith my God, to the wicked" (Isa. 57:20, 21). Contentment never comes with the mere having, regardless of its proportion because having is external of our being and peace resides within. Unless we are happy on the inside, nothing on the outside can reach the depths of the soul. It will be found that most discontentment

is over material things, which proves that they are sought more ardently than the goods of the soul.

GOODNESS OF GOD—This does not mean that contentment is incompatible with an earnest desire to enlarge our provision of earthly things, in order to give blessings to those around us; nor does contentment mean slothfulness in business or neglect of worldly interests. Contentment is not the opposite of thrift and industry, but of covetousness and unbelieving anxiety. Contentment is a disposition of the mind, arising from absolute TRUST in God, so that the scales (or balance) of our hearts are equally poised in both prosperity and adversity.

We become content as we realize: FIRST—That goodness is of God. When we say that God is good, we do not mean that He is good like some grandfathers who care not if their grandchildren tear the house to pieces; rather God is good after the manner of the Father who tempers JUSTICE with MERCY to bring His children to perfection of character. God does not always give us what we want, but He gives us what we need. If He multiplied thousand dollar bills instead of loaves and fishes in the desert, no one would have said that he received enough. But the Gospel tells us that "Each had his fill." When manna was given to the Jews in the wilderness, it was a sufficiency for each day; those who would have stored up in an avaricious fashion found that it could not be used.

SECOND—GOD'S OMNISCIENCE—Contentment also comes from a steady recognition of God's knowing of all things, and His ever-presence every where, where ever His children are, and His unlimited Power to provide us with all things needed at the time needed and in the exact amount needed. Having a deep sense of His unsearchable WISDOM is well calculated to allay our fears and compose our spirit. What we know in relation to God is less than the mouse knows in relation to us. We may not understand the trials of life for the moment, but in the Divine Mind they all co-operate unto good to those who love Him.

THIRD—A REALIZATION OF OUR ILL DE-SERTS—A diabolical pride lurks in the heart of any one who complains, saying, "What did I do to deserve this?" as if our lives were so blameless and so innocent as to merit no reproof or correction. If the Father did not spare His Son and the Son did not spare the Mother, then shall we, in the face of what Innocence suffered for the guilty, repine against the absence of those things which the heart covets?

Two things are incompatible: Trust and fear. He who trusts, Loves, and where there is Love there is no undue worry. Much of this contentment is lost by putting ourselves outside the Divine area of Love, as a waif of the street is outside the care and the blessings of a home.

TRUST HIM when dark doubts assail thee; TRUST HIM when trust is small, TRUST HIM when simply to TRUST HIM is the hardest thing of ALL.

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# **Editorials**

We are now traveling in the New Year of 1958. Days and weeks are slipping by and each one of us is drawing closer to our departure from this world. The most important question is, "Are we prepared to meet God?" whom we depend upon for our existence. We live off Him day by day: the air we breathe is given by Him, the water we drink is His, the food we eat is given to us by His hand of love and care as He sends the rain and the sunshine to cause the earth to produce food for man and beast. The glory of God is seen everywhere: the stars, the moon, the sun tell of His goodness to man day by day and night by night. Another question is, "What are we doing to prove to Him that we appreciate His goodness to us?" Oh, that men would fall down before God in repentance and godly sorrow and acknowledge His Son as a Lamb without spot or blemish who gave himself as a blood sacrifice for our sins, and we should receive God, the Father as the supreme ruler of the universe.

The sad thing is that the world in general has rejected Christ the Son of God, as Jerusalem rejected Him, and their souls are left desolate and in a condition for them to believe the devils' lies and be destroyed by the righteous anger of a sin-avenging God. They have hardened their hearts and seared their consciences until it seems that only the flames of torment will waken them to their awful condition. How sad to think of this. Then we think of the vast crowd that professes Christ, yet goes on sinning more or less all the time being deceived by Satan and his preachers. Just think, they also will be awakened some day in torment where there will be weeping and wailing, and gnashing of teeth. May God have pity on poor deluded souls! In I Cor. 15:34 we read, "Awake to righteousness, and sin not; for some have not the knowledge of God: I speak this to your shame." In Eph. 5:14 we read, "Wherefore he saith, Awake thou that sleepest, and arise from the dead, and Christ shall give thee light," Oh, that men would obey the Word of God!

The State Assembly meeting at Guthrie was well attended and the interest was good throughout the meeting. Some were saved along through the meeting and some were healed. One remarkable case of healing was performed on Bro. Charles Smith's twelve year old boy, Merrill, who was stricken with rheumatic fever which left him crippled in his legs insomuch that he could not walk and had been that way for seven weeks. He was in a wheel chair and when the prayer of faith was prayed he got out and walked. and has been walking ever since. It was easy to see that God was working in the meeting in a very gracious way. Quite a number were in the meeting who had been separated from the saints in light for many years and they rejoiced in the truth and declared they had found the true saints of God.

I was not able to attend many of the day meetings as duties were pressing me in the office of the print

shop. The printing work is increasing and growing and with this the burdens pile heavier upon us. We need much grace and strength in the work He has laid upon our hearts. The printing work, or getting the clean gospel out to men by the printed page, lies heavily upon us. In reflecting over the recent meeting at Guthrie, I thought of the different ministers that God used in preaching the Word which was good. Then the thought came to me, and I believe that the Lord gave it, that the Lord will preach more sermons through the books, tracts, and papers given out in the meeting that will be taken home than all other ministers' sermons combined. The beauty of it is that they will just keep preaching as they are handed from one to another. I thank God for the printing ministery, and I know that it would please God for all the holy ministers to say, "AMEN".

A lot of damage is done to the cause of God by those who find fault and speak evil of others. James 4:11 we read, "Speak not evil one of another, brethren. He that speaketh evil of his brother, and judgeth his brother, speaketh evil of the law, and judgeth the law: but if thou judge the law, thou art not a doer of the law, but a judge." In the next verse he says, "There is one lawgiver, who is able to save and to destroy: who art thou that judgest another?" In I Cor. the 13th chapter, the love chapter, we are told that one who has the real charity or love of God in his heart will think no evil, for it says, "Thinketh no evil." When you speak evil of another you grieve the Holy Spirit if you are a possessor of Him. Therefore the Word says in Eph. 4:31, "Let all bitterness, and wrath, and anger, and clamor, and EVIL SPEAKING, BE PUT AWAY FROM YOU. WITH ALL MALICE." In I Pet. 2:1 we find Peter writing the same truth to the new born babes. It seems that a lot of folks need to be fed on the milk of the Word and grow thereby. To find fault, retaliate, or think evil of another would be going contrary to new covenant teachings and will in time destroy your soul and others'. Let us take heed unto the precious Word of God and not be guilty of justifying ourselves when doing contrary to His Word.

On the first day of January of this year, the Lord poured special blessings into my soul both in the morning and in the afternoon and I thought of what Bro. James Glasgow said one time when coming into Sunday School and the Lord was blessing him. He said. "I do not know what kind of a hard trial I may soon have to undergo." The thought came to me also that some one must be talking about me and speaking or thinking evil of me and God is blessing my soul for thinking good of others. Remember, this occured on the first day of January, 1958. Let us remember, brethren, when we have good thoughts we are sowing to the Spirit, but when we are fault finding and have malice, retaliation, envy, or evil thinking we are sowing to the flesh and the reaping will be corruption or destruction. Let us refrain our tongues from speaking evil of any one. Pattern after Christ when hanging on the cross. He asked God the Father to forgive them for they knew not what they did. The Word says, "Great peace have they that love thy law: and nothing shall offend them" Psalms 119:165.

In Matt. 22:29 Jesus said to the Sadducees, "Ye do err, not knowing the scriptures." It seems that the world is filled up today with doctrines on the Bible by men who do err, not knowing the scriptures. For this reason Christendom is in a clamorous dying condition and many are wondering at this and perish for want of clear scriptural truth on even some vital subjects. There are so many that mix up law doctrines with the New Covenant teachings of Christ and the apostles. When the woman who was in adultery was brought before Jesus by religious men of the law, they wanted her stoned to death, but Jesus used much wisdom in speaking to them, and these men were so condemned that they slipped away and left the woman standing alone before the Lord. The Lord then said unto the woman, "Hath no man condemned thee?" and she said, "No man, Lord." Jesus said unto her, "Neither do I condemn thee: [He forgave her right there] go, and sin no more." He did not tell her to go to the Priest and offer a blood sacrifice for her sins. He was teaching New Covenant doctrines to her.

In Matt. 5:32 we read, "But I say unto you, That whosoever shall put away his wife, saving for the cause of fornication, causeth her to commit adultery: and whosoever shall marry her that is divorced committeth adultery." The Lord did not have under consideration previous adulterous marriages, but those who had wives that were approved of God. This truth is made clear by what he said in Matt. 19:6, while teaching along the same line. "What therefore God hath joined together, let not man put asunder." Any and all adulterous marriages which God has not joined together should be put asunder.

In John 4:18 Jesus said unto the woman at the well. "For thou hast had five husbands; and he whom thou now hast is not thy husband." She was living in adultery. After this woman believed that He was the Christ, she was so filled with Him and His words that she forgot and left her watering pot and hurried away to the city and began to point people to Christ that they too might believe and be saved. She went right to work for the Master and through her efforts many of them believed on the Lord. In the 39th verse it is recorded that many of the Samaritians of that city believed on Him for the saying of the woman which testified, "He told me all things that ever I did!" It is also written that many more believed because of His own word for they had heard Him themselves and knew indeed that He was the Christ, the Saviour of the world. The evident conclusion is that through this forgiven formerly-adulterous woman a congregation of believers was gathered unto the Lord. The scripture was being fulfilled which was prophesied of Christ in Genesis 49:10 which says, "... and unto him shall the gathering of the people be." I am persuaded that it is not pleasing to God for us to interpret the Word of God in such a way as to condemn

the innocent with the guilty. To hold a rigid law attitude in that way would be classed as extremism and some precious souls would be crushed and bruised if not stoned to death because some do err, not knowing the scriptures.

I wish to inform my beloved brethren that this editorial is written in love and kindness and with a deep burdened heart for the welfare of the Church of God in general. The Lord has called us and placed us in the Body as it has pleased Him and we feel that meek and lowly minded children of God or the holy brethren will respect this calling and the burden He has placed upon us in getting the Gospel to men by the printed page, and will have good thoughts toward us even as God has toward them.

Our advice is strictly against any one going into any and all single or double adulterous marriages; we firmly believe in keeping all adultery and all other sins out of the Church of God. This should be done in harmony with the teachings of the New Covenant wherein, "Mercy and truth are met together; righteousness and peace have kissed each other" Psalms 85:10. When done in righteousness and in a "True Holiness" way, the Lord will be with us and take care of all results. The Lord Jesus Christ still retains the government of His Kingdom or Church on His shoulders, Isaiah 9:6, 7. However, there are some who have gotten into adultery when under the power of Satan and in darkness, sin and ignorance who need the New Covenant teaching, instruction, love, and mercy on the subject, (not stones) that they may find their way out into the liberty and freedom of the Lord Jesus Christ which is the heritage of every "born-again" child of God. The heathen woman no doubt had been under the power of Satan, in gross darkness, sin and ignorance all her life until she met the Lord Jesus Christ at the well and then the light of heaven began to shine into her darkened soul, for she had found and believed the Messiah. God imputes sin to us or withholds it according to our individual light and knowledge. This truth is clearly set forth by the following scriptures. James 4:17 reads, "Therefore to him that knoweth to do good, and doeth it not, to him it is sin." If one was in sin and in darkness, God would not impute sin to him in a certain act, but another who had light and knowledge would be for the same act condemned. In this is manifested the righteousness of God. Let us be like Him.

John 9:41 reads, "Jesus said unto them, If ye were blind, ye should have no sin: but now ye say, We see; therefore your sin remaineth."

John 15:22 reads, "If I had not come and spoken unto them, they had not had sin: but now they have no cloak for their sin."

In the 24th chapter of Deut., we find some teaching on adultery when they were under the law and the teaching was thus, "When a man hath taken a wife and married her, and it come to pass that she find no favor in his eyes, because he hath found some uncleanness in her: then let him write her a bill of divorcement, and give it in her hand, and send her out of his house." Now listen to this second verse. "And when

she is departed out of his house, she may go and be another man's wife." Now, let us quote to you the New Covenant instructions on this line. In Romans 7:3, we read, "So then if, while her husband liveth, she be married to another man, she shall be called an adulteress: but if her husband be dead, she is free from that law; so that she is no adulteress, though she be married to another man." It seems to me that we who are spiritually minded could easily see what kind of a mess the church would get into if they followed law doctrines on this subject: if a man put away his wife she would have a right to marry another man while her former husband was living, which New Covenant teachings forbid.

In the 3rd and 4th verses of Deut. 24, we find some more law teaching that is out of harmony with the New Covenant teachings of Christ and the apostles. Before Christ came, men under the law could not be cleansed from sins and uncleanness, but since Christ has come and made the blood sacrifice, we can have our sins forgiven and in the second definite work of grace be cleansed from all uncleanness, from the defilement of sin that passed upon all men through Adam's fall. The blood sacrifice that Christ made for mankind not only cleanses the soul but reaches to our physical bodies and cleanses us from otherwise incurable diseases, for with his stripes we are healed, Isa. 53:5. In I Pet. 2:24 we read that Jesus bore our sins in his own body on the tree, and the verse ends with these words, "By whose stripes we were healed." Both the prophets and the New Covenant teachings agreed on this subject.

Mo .- To the readers of the "Faith and Victory" paper.-Greetings of Christian love to all. I am glad to be saved and sanctified, and I am trusting in God for both soul and body. Praise the Lord! I wish to testify to the goodness of God to me of late. On the 7th day of December, 1957 I was strickened down in my hip and back. It was so severe I had to take my bed at once. Two days my suffering was so severe I could not stand to be moved in any way. I believe I was turned over once, by being turned on a sheet. I was so thankful to God that He heard and answered prayer at the end of two days of severe suffering. I began to amend from that hour. The eighth day I was able to be on my feet and walk. I have had severe attacks in the last few years, but none as severe as this one. God has healed me every time, so I give Him all the praise.

I am glad that I learned to trust God in the days of my youth. About the year of 1910 I was bitten by a poison snake (Copperhead). My suffering and sickness for about fourteen hours was great. My parents did not go to sleep that night, neither was God asleep. They were by my bedside praying for me. I was very sick until the mid-night hour, when God so wonderfully looked down from heaven and touched me. Such perfect relief He gave me! All sickness and pain was completely gone so that I went off to sleep. By morning the swelling was leaving my foot and limb. We could testify that God had done the work for we did not call a doctor or take any medicine or rub any on. To Him we gave all the praise. About the year of 1917 or 1918 the Lord healed me again after taking my bed for 17 days with that terrible flu that was sweeping across the country taking the lives of many.

We hadn't gone but a little ways when I noticed a man out in his yard and recognized him as the man who had wanted prayer for his child. I also noticed the child there with him playing around. I stopped my car and asked him if that was the child that was sick the night before. He said, "Yes." We left the camp ground for home much encouraged to keep our trust in God.

When we were ready to leave Bro. Pruitt handed me a copy of the "Faith and Victory" paper of which we have been a reader since that time.

The Lord blessed us with six children to rear without giving them any medicine or rubbing any thing on. There were no operations. #### THE TEACHING MINISTRY OF THE CHURCH

#### February 9, 1958

- 1 Tim. 4:6. If thou put the brethren in remembrance of these things, thou shalt be a good minister of Jesus Christ, nourished up in the words of faith and of good doctrine, whereunto thou hast attained.
- 7. But refuse profane and old wives' fables, and exercise thyself rather unto godliness.
- 8. For bodily exercise profiteth little: but godliness is profitable unto all things, having promise of the life that now is, and of that which is to come.
- 9. This is a faithful saying and worthy of all accepttation.
- 10. For therefore we both labour and suffer reproach, because we trust in the living God, who is the Saviour of all men, especially of those that believe.
  - 11. These things command and teach.
- 12. Let no man despise thy youth: but be thou an example of the believers, in word, in conversation, in charity, in spirit, in faith, in purity.
  - 13. Till I come, give attendance to reading, to exhorta-

tion, to doctrine.

- 14. Neglect not the gift that is in thee, which was given thee by prophecy, with the laying on of the hands of the presbytery.
- 15. Meditate upon these things; give thyself wholly to them; that thy profiting may appear to all.
- 16. Take heed unto thyself and unto the doctrine; continue in them; for in doing this thou shalt both save thyself, and them that hear thee.
- 2 Tim. 2:1. Thou therefore, my son, be strong in the grace that is in Christ Jesus.
- 2. And the things that thou hast heard of me among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also.

Practical Truth: Through various channels the church should teach the truths which are essential to salvation and to a consistent Christian life.

#### COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

Teaching God's Word is commanded in both Old and the New Testament. We know that the parents have the primary responsibility of teaching the young, yet they need the cooperation of Spirit-filled teachers in the church. God's people need teaching on doctrinal points so they can go forth and teach others. Philip was able to teach the eunuch about Jesus because he had the understanding of the passage given to him through a personal contact with Jesus. We can do that also.

Timothy, to whom our lesson was written, was a young man, possibly in his thirties, yet was a pastor of the large church of Ephesus. 1 Tim. consists mostly of instructions concerning the oversight of the church. Of course he would preach the gospel, but his teaching ministry is stressed. Much of the ministers' teaching is done in the homes through visiting and example. By committing this precious truth to others through teaching and they in turn give it out to others, we are able to reach many souls with the gospel. This is God's way of spreading the truth through human instrumentality. God wants us to give out that which is given to us whether it comes through others or by the Spirit of God illuminating the Word of God to us.

The word profane means secular or irreverant. Secular means worldly or temporal. We are to leave profane and old wives fables out of our teaching and give the precious Word of Life.

- 15. And how shall they preach, except they be sent? as it is written, How beautiful are the feet of them that preach the gospel of peace, and bring glad tidings of good things!

- 10. To the intent that now unto the principalities and powers in heavenly places might be known by the church the manifold wisdom of God,
- 11. According to the eternal purpose which he purposed in Christ Jesus our Lord:
- 12. In whom we have boldness and access with confidence by the faith of him.
- 13. Wherefore I desire that ye faint not at my tribulations for you, which is your glory.
- 14. For this cause I bow my knees unto the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ,
- 15. Of whom the whole family in heaven and earth is named,
- 16. That he would grant you, according to the riches of his glory, to be strengthened with might by his Spirit in the inner man;
- 17. That Christ may dwell in your hearts by faith; that ye, being rooted and grounded in love,
- 18. May be able to comprehend with all saints what is the breadth, and length, and depth, and height;
- 19. And to know the love of Christ, which passeth knowledge, that ye might be filled with all the fulness of God.

Memory Verse: So then faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God. Rom. 10:17.

Practical Truth: The most effective preaching will be by men who are filled with the Spirit.

#### COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

The preaching ministry is needed in the world today to take this precious gospel or good news to souls so they can know the way from earth to heaven. There is not much difference in the teaching ministry and the preaching ministry. In the preaching ministry stress is made in trying to get others to act upon the truth that they perceive. This is a special calling, as our lesson brings out how a person can not preach unless he is sent. God gives a special anointing to those whom he calls. It is a gift, as the Apostle Paul brings out, and the preacher must have a burden on his (or her) own heart first before he can reach others, which Paul calls "the effectual working of His power."

Blessed are the preachers who can pray. Paul not only preached but also prayed. The prayer that he prayed while on bended knees recorded in verses 14 to 21 moves any heart to a greater love for God and faith. With all humility he bows before God "of whom the whole family in heaven and earth is named" which is the church of God. Oh, that our vision may be enlarged to such an extent that we may truly know that God's love is without limit, and end; that His love does not have a bottom to it nor a top. Truly, truly it is without comprehension to those who are not filled with the Spirit. Paul ends his prayer and the chapter with the thought that God is able to do more than we are able to ask or think according to the power that works in us, which is the Holy Spirit.

Printed Portion: Matt. 18:19, 20; John 4:23, 24; Acts 1:12-14; Col. 3:16, 17.

Matt. 18:19. Again I say unto you, That if two of you shall agree on earth as touching any thing that they shall ask, it shall be done for them of my Father which is in heaven.

20. For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them.

John 4:23. But the hour cometh, and now is, when the true worshippers shall worship the Father in spirit and in truth: for the Father seeketh such to worship him.

John 4:24. God is a spirit; and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and in truth.

Acts 1:12. Then returned they unto Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet, which is from Jerusalem a sabbath day's journey.

13. And when they were come in, they went up into an upper room, where abode both Peter, and James, and John, and Andrew, Philip, and Thomas, Bartholomew, and Matthew, James the son of Alphaeus, and Simon Zelotes, and Judas the brother of James.

14. These all continued with one accord in prayer and supplication, with the women, and Mary the mother of Jesus, and with his brethren.

Col. 3:16. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom; teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord.

17. And whatsoever ye do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God and the Father by him.

Memory Verse: It is written, My house shall be called the house of prayer. Matt. 21:13.

Practical Truth: Worshiping together with other Christians is a means of grace which we should not neglect.

#### COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

Worship means paying divine honors to God, especially through religious reverence and homage. Genuine worship does not consist in going through some form at some designated place. Rather, it consists in coming into vital touch with God through His Holy Spirit. With the touch of God upon our souls there is an inner joy, a welling up of emotions that sometimes bursts forth with praises, even tears or laughter. All Spirit filled children of God know what I am writing about. We sing songs of Zion from our hearts. We do not have our mind on something else and just sing words but we sing them and mean When we listen to the Spirit filled message our hearts say, "Amen." If it is to sinners we listen with a burden that God will cause those words to enter their hearts. When we kneel to pray, we know that Jesus is there with His presence interceeding with us to the Father that our petitions be granted. We agree with the earnest prayer that is being offered by saying amen or pleading that God grant our needs. Truly prayer is precious when there is one accord and earnest supplication which our lessons tells us about in the upper room in Jerusalem. Let us pray God to make our coming together in worship more effective. This will be where there is freedom felt by each one to move and speak in the spirit. Be sure you do not "quench the spirit."
