CONFIDENCE

"For ye had compassion of me in my bonds, and took joyfully the spoiling of your goods, knowing in yourselves [or for yourselves] that ye have in heaven a better and an enduring substance. Cast not away therefore your confidence, which hath great recompence of reward. For ye have need of patience, that after ye have done the will of God, ye might receive the promise." Heb. 10:34, 35. The foregoing passage points out the necessity of two very important virtues that one must possess in order to be a successful warrior. Paul had commended the brethren for their endurance in the great fight of afflictions, and their willingness to become a gazing stock, both by reproaches, and afflictions, and also to be numbered with those who were being persecuted in the same manner as they were, and for their love and compassion of him, being so great, they were willing to, and did take joyfully the spoiling of their goods, because they knew in themselves that Christ had promised them a great reward in heaven. Their faith, their trust, their confidence in God, their inner experience, having been illuminated by the Holy Spirit, built up within them the power to joyfully endure in the fight.

After his commendation, Paul exhorted them to hold fast to the faith, with patience; saying, "Cast not away therefore your confidence, which hath great recompence of reward, For ye have need of patience, that, after ye have done the will of God, ye might receive the promise." We see then that the two virtues needed are confidence and patience.

Definition of confidence: Firm belief, a trust.

Definition of patience: A calm bearing of pain, a calmly waiting.

To succeed in any line of business, there must be confidence. There must be confidence to form a partnership or an industrial company. If one is to go on a journey, he or she must have confidence in the operating crew, if on a railway train; or in the driver, if going by bus; or in his own vehicle and in himself, if traveling by auto. If one is engaged in farming or in any pursuit in life; if he succeeds, it is because he has confidence in his efforts and is expecting to be rewarded for his labors. And of course, after the labor is finished, there is usually a period of waiting before the reward is received. We might call this patience with expectation and hope, he looks forward to the time when he shall be rewarded.

Generally speaking, there are three sources from which we receive confidence; namely, recommendation, experience, and observation. If we, through experience, have confidence in someone and that one in turn recommends some other person to us, we have confidence through recommendation. If we have confidence in some others by watching their conduct and actions and listening to their conversation, we have received confidence through observation. Should either of these fail to live up to the recommendation or experience, or performance of deeds or actions, our confidence is shaken or destroyed; or, in other words, we cast away our confidence in them because they have been unfaithful, have betrayed confidence,

or have proven themselves unworthy of our confidence.

"Confidence in an unfaithful man in the time of trouble is like a broken tooth, and a foot out of joint." Prov. 25:19. On account of the unfaithfulness of men, and their failure to fulfill their promises, many hearts have been made sad; hopes and expectations have been blasted, purposes defeated, burdens made heavier, and many have gone down in despair. Micah 7:5, "Trust ye not in a friend, put ye not confidence in a guide: keep the doors of thy mouth from her that lieth in thy bosom." "It is better to trust in the Lord than to put confidence in man. It is better to trust in the Lord than to put confidence in princes" Psa. 118:8-9. "For the Lord shall be thy confidence, and shall keep thy foot from being taken." Prov. 3:26.

Although so many men have failed, betrayed confidence, have walked unworthy, yet God has a host of servants walking in the light of His holy Word, directed by His Spirit, that have proved themselves worthy of our confidence through the Lord. Unto some Paul wrote, "And we have confidence in the Lord touching you, that ye both do and will do the things which we command you. And the Lord direct your hearts into the love of God and into the patient waiting for Christ." 2 Thess. 3:4, 5. The Lord said to the disciples, "In your patience possess ye your souls." Men fail, men fall, but we can recommend and lift up an infallible guide, in whom we can place implicit faith and confidence, a perfect trust without fear. Jesus never fails. He will never give an occasion to cause one to lose confidence in Him. Cast not away your confidence in His promises. A great recompence of reward is waiting. He has said, "Be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee a crown of life." Rev. 2:10.

In 2 Tim. 1:11-12 Paul makes this declaration. "Wherefore I am appointed a preacher, and an apostle, and a teacher of the Gentiles. For the which cause I also suffer these things: nevertheless I am not ashamed: for I know whom I have believed, and am persuaded that he is able to keep that which I have committed unto him against that day." His confidence in God was unshaken, his trust was complete. was acquainted with Christ and was, as he said, persuaded that He was able to keep that which he had committed to Him. He exhorted Timothy to "hold fast the form of sound words," "preach the word." The word of God is sure and steadfast; it will never fail; it will never pass away. When out on the stormy deep, Paul said, "Wherefore sirs, be of good cheer: for I believe God, that it shall be even as it was told me." Acts 27:25. Even though it seemed as if the ship would be torn to pieces, which it finally was; still he held fast to his confidence in God's promise and all on board had a safe landing—not one was lost.

Do you believe the Word of God? "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God." And the "Word was made flesh and dwelt among us," (St. John 1:1 and 14a) which was Jesus Christ. After his resurrection He said, "I ascend unto my Father and your Father; and to my

God and your God. When the martyr Stephen was being put to death, "he being full of the Holy Ghost, looked up into heaven, and saw the glory of God, and Jesus standing on the right hand of God." Remember, Jesus said, "If I go . . . I will come again." The angel said, "This same Jesus will come again." Enoch prophesied, "Behold, the Lord cometh with ten thousands of his saints." Infidels and scoffers are saying, "Where is the promise of his coming?" Peter says, "But the day of the Lord will come as a thief in the night." James exhorts us, saying, "Be ye also patient, for the coming of the Lord draweth nigh" James 5:8. Now we can see the patience of the saints. "So Christ was once offered to bear the sins of many; and unto them that look for him shall he appear the second time without sin unto salvation." Heb. 9:28.

Dear ones, hold fast onto faith in and obedience to the word of God, trusting and confiding in his promises through honor and dishonor, through adversities, and reproaches, through applauds and hissings and ridicule. Whatever comes or goes, hold on with love and faith, with confidence, watching and waiting for the Lord's return. "Cast not away therefore your confidence, which hath great recompence of reward."

What Lack I Yet?

The rich young man that came to Jesus may have been overbalanced by his love of riches, yet he had an anxious desire to know his duty toward God. After being told what was required of him, the question, "What lack I yet?" certainly indicates a disposition of heart that is to be praised. He was not just exactly satisfied with his present record although it included that great foundation principle—"Love thy neighbor as thyself." And the fact that Jesus loved him argues sincerity in all his claims and questions.

Paul manifests this same disposition of heart when he said, "Now I rejoice in my sufferings for you, and fill up that which is behind of the afflictions of Christ, in my flesh for his body's sake which is the church." It seemed that the young rich man could not live out his desire, but Paul has given us a real example of faith that knows no bounds; and surely we should not be willing to follow the character that has come down in history as a failure in preference to characters, the very mention of whose names make us better.

But perhaps the young rich man,—failure as he seemed to be—, is ahead of many of us. It seems that we suffer no uneasiness over the thought of "What lack I yet"? We find various excuses for not doing many of the commands of the Lord, and rejoice that we have been permitted to indulge ourselves in the fads and conveniences of a fast age, while souls all about us are going to perdition for lack of the living Bread of life. Instead of the question, "What lack I yet?" we so often hear, "Do you think the Lord will require that of me?", in reference to some

of His plain commands. They seem to want to get through with the least possible service or sacrifice.

The feeling that prompted the question, "What lack I yet?", if nourished and kept alive, would solve the problem of building up the cause of Christianity everywhere. If such a restless desire were in the hearts of God's people, it would mean a missionary in every destitute field, and they would not be left to starve or be bound hand and foot for lack of means to carry on their work. It would mean a fellowship that would bind God's faithful together so that when one member suffers all the members would suffer with it.

It would seem that this great desire in the young rich man was smothered out by greed for worldly riches. It makes us sad to think of him. But brother, sister, the absence of this restless desire, —"What lack I yet? What more can I do?"—in our hearts indicates the same condition of heart that led this young man to his destruction.

With Paul let us watch for the opportunity to suffer hardship for Christ. —Lottie L. Jarvis

The following was related in an evangelistic meeting: A woman who had been bedridden for years lived near the railroad track, a long way from any other house. Near by was a deep gully over which the railroad passed on a new, substantial iron bridge. as was supposed. There was a terrible wind one night. This poor woman, as was often the case, was alone. All at once she heard a fearful crash; she felt sure it was the bridge. She looked at the clock. In ten minutes the through passenger train would be along. What should she do? Her son was away from home. Praying earnestly to God for help, she took the only light in the house, a tallow candle, and began to crawl (for she could not walk) toward the railroad track. How she ever got there she never knew. Reaching the track, she could hear the roar of the coming train. In 1 Peter 2:5, we read, "Ye also, as lively stones, [every one in the church is spiritually alive] are built up a spiritual house, an holy priesthood, [His people are holy] to offer up spiritual sacrifices, acceptable to God by Jesus Christ."

You can be a son of Abraham by doing like wise today. Very few today seem to go far enough in their consecration to really become a son of Abraham. Most of them say that all they have is consecrated to God, but it seems that the Lord has a hard time getting much of it to use in His work of taking the gospel to men; therefore the souls of many do not prosper. Giving is to the soul as air is to the body. When air is shut off from the body, in a small degree, it will begin to weaken and unless it gets air the body will die. When you cease to give out as God gives in, your soul will dwindle and die and you will be left with a cold profession. Folks need to obey the Word of God for it is God's voice to you. Paul told Timothy to "preach the word; be instant in season, out of season; reprove, rebuke, exhort with all longsuffering and doctrine. For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine; [that time is here now] but after their own lusts shall they heap to themselves teachers, having itching ears; and they shall turn away their ears from the truth, and shall be turned unto fables." They misinterpret the scripture and thereby lead the people in a false way.

In 2 Timothy 3:15 we read, "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: that the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works." The minister is exhorted in the third chapter of Ezekiel to warn the righteous that they sin not or else God will require their blood at his hand.

God works by His Word and Spirit to cause the seeking heart to soften up to all truth and to abide in Him. In Hebrews 4:12, we read, "For the word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing even to the dividing asunder of soul and spirit, and of the joints and marrow, and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart. Neither is there any creature that is not manifest in his sight: but all things are naked and open unto the eyes of him with whom we have to do." No one will be able to escape the day of judgment and that day is coming very soon. Dear soul, prepare to meet thy God. In this world God is allowing you to do as you please. You have the choice to make. You can serve Him or you can go on in sin, but remember, God will

bring you into judgment on that terrible day where you will be summoned to give an account to God of all your deeds done in this world and receive your eternal doom.

God says in Eccle. 12:13, "Let us hear the conclusion of the whole matter: fear God and keep his commandments: for this is the whole duty of man. For God will bring every work into judgment, with every secret thing, whether it be good or whether it be evil." Christ is the only hope for man; cover your soul by faith in His precious blood and then you can have access to God through Him and he will succor you in time of need, will make you able to live a holy life before Him and in that great judgment day receive you into glory to live with Him forever. In that heavenly abode you can wear a crown that will never fade away. How glorious it is to have that hope in your soul right here in this present world. Oh, taste and see that the Lord is good. "Great peace have they that love thy law and nothing shall offend them."

A REPORT FROM THE FIELD

Calif.—Dear Bro. and Sister Pruitt: We greet you in holy Christian love in the name of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Saviour. Surely we can say He has done great things for us whereof we are glad.

Friday night my wife fell and sprained her ankle. She has a lot on her now with sick ones to care for. Also we had the funeral service for Bro. Erle Forbes on hands for Saturday and were preparing dinner here at our home for the family and relatives following the funeral. That all made a lot of responsibility and duty for her and Saturday morning she was crippling around much but going ahead about her duties. When we had our morning worship we just laid that matter before the Lord and told Him how badly she needed to be healed of that and able to get about freely, and He was entreated of us and right away she was walking better. By funeral time she only had a slight limp, and yesterday morning the trouble was all gone and I could detect no limp at all in her walk. We surely thank and praise the Lord for hearing prayer and coming to our aid in this matter at a time of great need. He said in His Word that He would supply all of our needs according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus, and we should just believe it that way and not be surprised when He does it.

We made the trip Thursday to Enseneda, Baja Calif., Mexico to hold a service in the prison there. We go every two weeks, on Thursday, and there are some there in the prison who show a good interest in the gospel and some have professed salvation. I don't know how much they know about it—possibly very little as yet. But it manifests a working of the Spirit of God in their hearts when they will step out from a bunch of rough men like that and express their desire to be saved and ask for prayer. It makes a pretty rugged day for us in the days we go down there. We drive more than 500 miles and have the service and do some visiting and usually leave early and get back late. We distribute Bibles and song books among those who show a good interest and are hoping for some fruit from the effort in those prison services.

At the funeral service of Brother Erle Forbes the Spirit of the Lord hovered very near and it was a real sacred and precious service. There was a large crowd and lots of tears all through the congregation, but the saints felt victory and there were many "amens" and praises to God from all parts of the congregation all the way through the service. Someone said to me that they had never been in one of the saints' funeral services had hever seen one like that. Another party said they had been attending funeral services among the saints all of their life but had never been in one like that. Some-

one said to me yesterday that there just was not any room for sadness there. It surely is a blessing from God when the Spirit of the Lord comes in times like that and banishes sadness and fills hearts with peace and comfort.

Yesterday was all day meeting in San Bernardino. Bro. Gene Harmon always goes there for their all-day meeting, but he was sick in bed. Sister Poulos and Gus are both pretty frail so they asked me to come over and help them out, which I did. Sister LaVern Manual had a bad attack yesterday morning. They phoned over here for prayer and the Lord heard and relieved her.

Some of the Pomona folks came to San Bernardino in the afternoon and Sister LaVern sent word to me that if I possibly could to come to Pomona and take care of the service there last night and come in time to go by and pray for her. I went and found her feeling much relieved and better than she had been, but so weak she could not walk without stabbing pains and turning dizzy. Her condition still was not good. The Lord blessed us with a good service. When all were gone and I was getting ready to drive out, I was called to go pray for Sister Stonecypher who was in a bad condition. Other saints were contacted, who met me there, and we prayed with her until she got the victory. Thank the Lord for His mercies to His children.

What Shall We Do?

In Psalm 11:3 we read, "If the foundations be destroyed, what can the righteous do?" The second verse the scripture reads thus: "For, lo, the wicked bend their bow, they make ready their arrow upon the string, that they may privily shoot at the upright in heart."

Let us see what the Bible says about foundations. Turn with me to Eph. 2:20 and let the word of God tell us: "And are built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the chief corner stone". By this scripture we can see that the apostles and prophets are foundation stones and that Jesus Christ is the chief corner stone in the Church of God, the body of Christ, the family of God which is functioning in the world and showing the truth to men. Paul tells us in First Timothy 3:15 that the house of God is the Church or family of the living God, the pillar and ground of the truth. Paul tells us in 1 Cor. 3:11, "For other foundation can no man lay than that is laid, which is Jesus Christ." Those that build on any other foundation besides Jesus Christ and the apostles are building on sandy foundations that will be sure to crumble and fall when the storms of life beat upon the building. Any one that is not diligent about keeping the teachings and sayings of Christ and the apostles that he has had light on will in that way destroy the sure foundation from under his own understanding; and in the end will find himself like the five foolish virgins: the oil or Spirit will have been sapped or leaked out and the door into heaven will be shut. How sad that will be for him!

I feel that it would please the Lord for us to warn the righteous that they sin not, sow not to the flesh but to the Spirit. Here is the word of the Apostle Paul in the 6th chapter of Galatians, beginning at the 7th verse: "Be not deceived: [You can deceive your own soul, but you cannot deceive God] God is not mocked: [He knows what you are doing.] for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap. For he that soweth to the flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption; but he that soweth to the Spirit shall of the Spirit reap life everlasting." By this scripture we can see how needful it is for us as his children to take heed and see to it that we are sowing to the Spirit. If we do otherwise, we will be destroying our foundation and will not be able to endure unto the end and thereby be saved. Let us read Col. 3:1-3: "If ye then be risen with Christ, [or have been born from above] seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth at the right hand of God. Set your affections on things above, not on things on the earth. For ye are dead [to the world] and your life is hid with Christ in God." If we do these things we have a promise that, "when Christ, who is our life, shall appear, then shall ye also appear with him in glory." In the next verse we are told to mortify (mortify means to put to death) our members which are upon the earth; and "let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom." Verse 16. In the 17th verse we are exhorted to be diligent, "And whatsoever ye do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God and the Father by him." 1 Cor. 10:31: "Whether therefore ye eat, or drink, or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God." If you are doing things or spending your time in a way that is not to the glory of God, you had better quit it at once, for such would be sowing to the flesh and you would be gratifying the flesh. The Lord tells us through Peter to abstain from fleshly lusts which war against the soul (1 Pet. 2:11). In James 4:4 we read, "Ye adulterers and adulteresses, know ye not that the friendship of the world is enmity with God? whosoever therefore will be a friend of the world is the enemy of God." Jesus said to the disciples, "Ye are not of the world even as I am not of the world;" and to the religious Pharisees he said, "Ye are from beneath, I am from above, ye are of this world, I am not of this world." People who partake of the spirit of the world by fleshly lusts and conform to its ways, fashions, and fads are the enemies of God, no matter how much of a profession of religion they make. We are forbidden by the word of God to wear gold (1 Peter 3:3), but many, many religious people give no heed to this sacred teaching. They not only wear gold, but also adorn their bodies with other worldly adornments and follow the vulgar styles of dress. Many women put on abbreviated clothing that entices evil-minded men to lust after them. They bob their God-given hair, paint their lips and faces like Jezebel, and in many other ways disgrace the name of Christ. Such people should remember that God is not mocked or deceived about the condition of their souls.

It seems that the world is racing on to destruction at such a rapid rate that folks who try to keep up with it have no time for God. The late inventions are occupying all their time. Such things as cars, airplanes, radios, and televisions seem to completely possess their minds until they have no time to think of the most important thing; which is their poor soul that is dead to the good things of God. The word of God says, "She that liveth in pleasure is dead while she liveth." Others who have some spiritual life are living in the shadow of Egypt where their souls will soon be so weakened that they will also fall a prey to the evil and deceitful workings of Satan. Read the first three verses of the thirtieth chapter of Isaiah.

Brethren, in the second chapter of Joel we are told to blow the trumpet in Zion, and sound an alarm in God's holy mountain. Verse two speaks of a day of darkness and gloominess, and day of clouds and thick darkness. In Isaiah 58:1 we read, "Cry aloud, spare not, lift up thy voice like a trumpet, and show my people their transgressions, and the house of Jacob their sins."

Brethren, we need to cry out against all these lustful things that are crowding in among the saints of God and show up the sinfulness of these intruding worldly things that bring destruction to the soul. God has called His holy ministers to be watchmen on the walls of Zion. We need to take heed to ourselves and to the flock over which the Lord has made us overseers. The little foxes spoil the vines. If the little transgressions can be kept out, then there will be little danger of big transgressions (Psa. 18:13).

I am persuaded that for the good of the church now and its future welfare, no one should be ordained among us as a minister if he or she has a television in his home or favors such things or any other worldly thing in dress or otherwise. We, as ministers of the living God, should be watchful and diligent in these matters lest we also be carried away with the error of the wicked. The scripture makes it plain in Second Thessalonians, second chapter, that if we receive not a love for the truth we will be given a strong delusion from the Lord and in the end be damned. Those who indulge in worldly dress or undress and adorn the body with the wearing of gold and other showy and needless things and take delight in television programs will thereby cause their souls to become weaker until they will want many things of a worldly nature and will become so darkened in soul that they will naturally separate themselves from the saints in light, because the narrow way will become grievous to them and they will take their place in the broad way with worldly religions.

The whole world has gone after television, prizing it very highly; but take heed to what Jesus, the Chief Corner Stone of the church, says (Luke 16:15): "And he said unto them, Ye are they that justify yourselves before men but God knoweth your hearts: for that which is highly esteemed among men is abomination in the sight of God." He was here referring to covetousness, but the same rule will apply to all this worldly dress or undress and to adorning the body and lusting after worldly things (television tops the list). The idea of a saint having a television tail sticking up from their house thereby showing that they love worldly things is a disgrace to the cause of

God—an abomination in the sight of God and to Spirit-filled men and women.

The apostle John says in 1 John 5:3, "For this is the love of God that we keep his commandments: and his commandments are not grievous." For the Spirit-filled soul to abstain from the appearance of evil or from worldly dress or television would not be grievous because they have no taste for such things. Rather than it being grievous for them to abstain from such things, it would be repulsive and insipid to their spiritual eating or taste to be around such. Brethren, let us be true to the souls of men and obey the truth taught in Acts 20:28: "Take heed therefore unto yourselves, and to all the flock, over the which the Holy Ghost hath made you overseers, to feed the Church of God, which he hath purchased with his own blood."

Satan in these days is trying his utmost to destroy our foundation by enticing some to conform to the world and to lust after worldly things, and getting saints to be careless about keeping His commandments and doing His word. Liberal conscience doctrine is a damnable thing and will cause many a soul to be lost. Our consciences should be educated to diligently keep His word and do it; and by doing so our foundations will not be destroyed. The saints of God are a peculiar people (1 Peter 2:9) to all worldly religions. Let us not be ashamed of Him and His word, but just let the breach between the world and us be as wide as the word of God makes it. They may call us narrow minded, but the fact is that broad worldly-minded people are in the broad way that leads to destruction and eternal ruin. They seem to think that they can serve two masters, or can serve God and mammon at the same time, but the Judgment Day will reveal to them their awful mistake. We are exhorted in the 6th chapter of Ephesians, verse 11, to "Put on the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. Peter tells us to gird up the loins of our mind. God will keep us in perfect peace if we keep our minds stayed on the Lord. We are exhorted to keep our hearts with all diligence for out of it are the issues of life. Brothers and sisters, let us be diligent in obeying His word and pass the truth on to others in words and deeds. -Fred Pruitt

THE GOLDEN RULE HOME REPORT

To the dear saints scattered abroad we send greetings in the name of our Lord. We are still much encouraged in His service and have our minds made up to labor on until Jesus comes for the needs of souls, whether saints or sinners. The needs are surely great and God is ready to give grace and strength to all that will seek Him diligently. We desire a standing interest in all your prayers for clear leadings and guidance in all that God would have us to do.

In regard to the home to be built for the aged, neglected and handicapped saints, we had been writing about a five acre tract at the edge of Shawnee that a number of the brethren thought would be very desirable for the home. We had it much settled in our minds that that would be the right location, but the owners are quite elderly and feeble, and their children stepped in and would not let them sell, due to the fact that neither of the parents were able to make a move. Consequently, this has resulted in much more inquiry for a location.

We have prayed and sought the Lord as earnestly about this matter as we ever have anything; have driven many miles and looked at locations, some of which were desirable but the price was out of reach we felt. One of these was 40 acres, two and a quarter miles from Shawnee city limits on a black-top road. It has a four-bedroom modern house and two ponds. They were asking \$8,950.00 which we felt we could not pay, but last week we were contacted again and the man that owned the small farm was going to lose it and we were able to buy the farm for \$6,850. We had to decide before Saturday because that was the foreclosure date, so we have signed a sales contract for this property. It is a good location and has wonderful possibilities for what we have in plan. The well on the farm is good and plenty of water. The four bedroom house can be used for the brethren that plan to come and help in the building of the home, and then when the home is completed this house can be used for the workers to live in.

We feel a great relief to know that we have the land secured and now we are looking to the Lord to provide for the building of the home. If God provides, we want to start the building soon. It is in order to say that if each of us listen to God and do our part, this need can soon be met and the elderly, neglected and handicapped saints can soon have a place to be cared for around a spiritual atmosphere. We mentioned in one of our letters that if 280 persons would sacrifice \$100.00 each, this need can be met and surely that would not hurt most of us.

We surely do thank the dear Lord for the finance that has been coming in. To this date we have received \$3,820.00 toward the home plan. We made a down payment on the farm and are paying the rest as soon as God provides. May we urge each one to listen to the dear Lord for this needed work.

Calif.—This is My Testimony For Christ:

I am going to attempt to give my testimony of my life, hoping that by giving it I can be of some help to someone, either now or later in life. I can give only a portion of it due to the fact it would take quite some time to tell all of it. But with the Lord's help, I will attempt to give you the major portion of my life in sin. I sold my soul to the devil for "fast" money and what I believed was a good time when I was just a boy starting out in life, not realizing I was destroying everything that meant so much to me.

I left home when I was fourteen, believing I was big enough to take care of myself. I met a fellow that I believed at the time had the world all figured out. He was 18 and I was 14. We robbed and stole and hurt everyone we came in contact with. We ended up robbing the mail, and after a few months of fast living, our day came when we found ourselves standing in front of a Federal Judge. For the first time I heard myself being sentenced to three years in a Federal Reformatory for mail robbery and jewel theft. I was shocked and hurt, but not until later did I find out really how much. I was bitter and full of hatred for anything and anyone that had anything to do with justice. I escaped three times, was placed in solitary confinement eight months and served two years and eight months before I finally returned to being a human being again. But it was just a short time and I was again in trouble and stayed in trouble with the law for several years to come.

I was sentenced to: Lancaster for burglary (served 18 months, 6 months in solitary, one attempt to escape); San Quentin (destroy or injure, place of confinement, served 13 months, 15 months on parole, one attempted escape); San Quentin armed robbery two years (served two on parole).

In 1955 while still in prison, I finally surrendered to God, pleading with all my heart for some release from all this misery and heartaches, both that I was causing and receiving. I gave the Lord my solemn promise that if he would release me from all this misery I would serve Him the rest of my days; but like everything else, I meant well but just didn't do well. When I could not satisfy God and remain a hardened criminal, I chose being a criminal. Soon I was to learn how really wrong I was.

I had been sick for fifteen years with asthma. When I turned my back on the Lord, I became worse; both sick in body and sick in soul, until I finally found myself backed up in a corner with what I thought was no way out.

I knew with all my heart that my day had finally come when I no longer had any resistance without God. My wife pleaded with me to go with her to church services and she really believed God would find a way out. I refused because I couldn't find in my heart a way out of all our troubles. No matter what I did, I couldn't promise the Lord again and fail Him anymore. That night I had my last major attack of asthma. My wife pleaded for me to change my mind, but I just couldn't. A few hours passed and I lost my voice to the extent that I couldn't even whisper. I sent my boy to the store for a writing pad. I wrote my wife a note explaining that she must stay with me. She refused so I knew I was completely helpless. I wrote another note explaining that I had to go with her because without my voice I could not even call for help. That night I went to church services, and, thank God, I was completely healed of asthma and saved for Christ.

I firmly believe that if God can forgive a person that had sunk as low in sin as I had, He surely can forgive you, if only you will not harden your heart like I formerly did. Just remember one thing, "God gave his only begotten Son that whosoever believeth in him should not perish but have everlasting life" John 3:16.

La.—Dear Bro. and Sister Pruitt and all the saints in Jesus' name. I have asked for prayer and have been healed many times of different afflictions. I really thank our God and the saints who prayed for me. I am seventy years old and have never had a doctor in my home to see me, though I have been to doctors. I went to a doctor a few days ago and he said I had a heart trouble that could not be cured. I told him that God could cure it, and I know He can. I am asking the saints everywhere to pray earnestly that I will be healed. I know the Lord will answer the prayers of His saints. Pray that I will be faithful to the end.

THE SOURCE OF TRUE WISDOM

April 9, 1961

Printed Portion Prov. 1:2-7; Job 28:20, 21, 28; James 1:5-7

Prov. 1:2 To know wisdom and instruction; to perceive the words of understanding;

3 To receive the instruction of wisdom, justice, and judgment, and equity;

4 To give subtilty to the simple, to the young man knowledge and discretion.

5 A wise man will hear, and will increase learning; and a man of understanding shall attain unto wise counsels:

6 To understand a proverb, and the interpretation; the words of the wise, and their dark sayings.

7 The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge: but fools despise wisdom and instruction.

Job 28:20 Whence then cometh wisdom? and where is the place of understanding?

- 21 Seeing it is hid from the eyes of all living, and kept close from the fowls of the air.
- 28 And unto man he said, behold, the fear of the Lord, that is wisdom; and to depart from evil is understanding.

James 1:5 If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not, and it shall be given him.

6 But let him ask in faith, nothing wavering. For he that wavereth is like a wave of the sea driven with the wind and tossed.

7. For let not that man think that he shall receive any thing of the Lord.

Memory Verse: If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not; and it shall be given him. James 1:5.

Practical Truth: God alone is the true source of the highest wisdom.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

Knowledge has to do with the acquiring of facts or information, but wisdom has to do with the right use of facts, or applying them at the right time. We need to look to God for our knowledge and for wisdom in using that knowledge. Our lesson also speaks of instruction. It takes humility to take instruction. Instruction comes to us from God's holy Word, through the anointing of the Holy Spirit. God anoints His children by the Holy Spirit to give instruction. Instruction gives insight which leads to wisdom. Our lesson plainly brings out that the "fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge: but fools despise wisdom and instruction." So it is foolish to not reverence, respect and honor the Lord from whence all of our best instruction comes and wisdom. "A wise man will hear, and increase learning; . . . and attain unto counsels."

Our lesson in James tells us where to go when we lack wisdom. God's storehouse is full of it and God will pour it out upon us liberally but there is one condition that has to be met to receive it. We must have faith that when we ask it will come. Have a faith that is stedfast and without wavering.

We read in 2 Kings about a king who spread a letter out before the Lord and sought wisdom and help from God. In Psalms 1:1 we read, "Blessed is the man that walketh not in the counsel of the ungodly." Look to God and His people for counsel and not the worldly man.

WHEN THE RIGHTEOUS SUFFER

April 16, 1961

Printed Portion Job 2:3-6; 19:13-21

Job 2:3 And the Lord said unto Satan, Hast thou considered my servant Job, that there is none like him in the earth, a perfect and an upright man, one that feareth God, and escheweth evil? and still he holdeth fast his integrity, although thou movedst me against him, to destroy him without cause.

- 4 And Satan answered the Lord, and said, Skin for skin, yea, all that a man hath will he give for his life.
- 5 But put forth thine hand now, and touch his bone and his flesh, and he will curse thee to thy face.

- 6 And the Lord said unto Satan, Behold, he is in thine hand; but save his life.
- Job 19:13 He hath put my brethren far from me, and mine acquaintance are verily estranged from me.
- 14 My kinsfolk have failed, and my familiar friends have forgotten me.

Memory Verse: Blessed is the man that endureth temptation; for when he is tried, he shall receive the crown of life, which the Lord hath promised to them that love him. James 1:12.

Practical Truth: We should not regard suffering as any sure indication of God's displeasure.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

The book of Job is an inspiration to all who read it. No one has suffered possibly as much as Job, except our Lord and Saviour. It was hid from Job why the calamities came upon him but revealed to us as we read. Satan felt that Job served God just because of the gifts and blessings he received or had. God wanted to prove that Job loved the Giver more than the gift. How glad we ought to be to know that God has a "hedge" around about us and nothing, no not even Satan, can break through that hedge unless God permits it and then he can go only so far. And if the God of all heaven and earth has His eye upon us then the thing He has permitted, we can know, will work for good some way. That good might be hid from us, but not from God. It's our place, then, to TRUST God and commit all things into His hands. Paul had a "thorn in the flesh" that God made him know he was not going to remove but he assured him that he would give him grace to bear it. (2 Cor. 12:7-10) Then in John 9 the disciples asked Jesus about the blind man, whether this man or his parents sinned, that he should be born blind. Jesus told them "Neither did this man sin, nor his parents . . . that the works of God should be made manifest in him." In other words God reveals Himself through suffering people. We should not resist God but yield to Him and in all sufferings commit things to God, continually holding steady faith in Him.

WHEN HUMAN WISDOM FAILS

Printed Portion Job 21:19-34

- 19 God layeth up his iniquity for his children: he rewardeth him, and he shall know it.
- 20 His eyes shall see his destruction, and he shall drink of the wrath of the Almighty.
- 21 For what pleasure hath he in his house after him, when the number of his months is cut off in the midst?

- 22 Shall any teach God knowledge? seeing he judgeth those that are high.
- 23 One dieth in his full strength, being wholly at ease and quiet.
- 24 His breasts are full of milk, and his bones are moistened with marrow.
- 25 And another dieth in the bitterness of his soul, and never eateth with pleasure.
- 26 They shall lie down alike in the dust, and the worms shall cover them.
- 27 Behold, I know your thoughts, and the devices which ye wrongfully imagine against me.
- 28 For ye say, Where is the house of the prince? and where are the dwelling places of the wicked?
- 29 Have ye not asked them that go by the way? and do ye not know their tokens,
- 30 That the wicked is reserved to the day of destruction? they shall be brought forth to the day of wrath.
- 31 Who shall declare his way to his face? and who shall repay him what he hath done?
- 32 Yet shall he be brought to the grave, and shall remain in the tomb
- 33 The clods of the valley shall be sweet unto him, and every man shall draw after him, as there are innumerable before him.
- 34 How then comfort ye me in vain, seeing in your answers there remaineth falsehood?

Memory Verse: The fear of the Lord, that is wisdom; and to depart from evil is understanding. Job 28:28.

Practical Truth: Good people may do and say unwise things because of the lack of knowledge.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

Our lesson is part of what Job replied to Zophar, one of his miserable comforters. Zophar seemed to think that sinners suffer swift vengeance from God (Job 20, verse 4 and on). In Chapter 21:7 Job says that the wicked live, become old and mighty in power and their children are established in their sight, and that their houses are safe, etc. Then in verse 17 Job says, "How often is it that the lamp of the wicked is put out and that calamity comes upon them?" Job implies that it isn't very often.

In verse 19, the first verse of our lesson, it is implied that Zophar would say that God lays up the iniquity of the fathers for the children, but Job says that God rewardeth the wicked and they know it. They see their destruction and drink of the wrath of the Almighty. What do they care for their houses after them? The guilty man himself shall experience the wrath of God.

When the time comes the wicked, or father, dies. Some go down in youth and some in middle age. All shall lie down in the dust alike. We do not hear about the glorious hope that the righteous have that they shall arise to everlasting life.

God's wisdom is different than human wisdom. God permits the righteous to suffer when sometimes the wicked prosper. We want God to have his way in our life, do we not? God brought Job out.

WHEN GOD'S WISDOM PREVAILS

- 1 Then Job answered the Lord, and said,
- 2 I know that thou canst do every thing, and that no thought can be withholden from thee.

- 3 Who is he that hideth counsel without knowledge? therefore have I uttered that I understood not; things too wonderful for me, which I knew not.
- 4 Hear, I beseech thee, and I will speak: I will demand of thee, and declare thou unto me.
- 5 I have heard of thee by the hearing of the ear: but now mine eye seeth thee.
- 6 Wherefore I abhor myself, and repent in dust and ashes.
- 7 And it was so, that after the Lord had spoken these words unto Job, the Lord said to Eliphaz the Temanite, My wrath is kindled against thee, and against thy two friends: for ye have not spoken of me the thing that is right, as my servant Job hath.
- 8 Therefore take unto you now seven bullocks and seven rams, and go to my servant Job, and offer up for yourselves a burnt offering; and my servant Job shall pray for you: for him will I accept: lest I deal with you after your folly, in that ye have not spoken of me the thing which is right, like my servant Job.
- 9 So Eliphaz the Temanite and Bildad the Shuhite and Zophar the Naamathite went, and did according as the Lord commanded them: the Lord also accepted Job.
- 10 And the Lord turned the captivity of Job, when he prayed for his friends: also the Lord gave Job twice as much as he had before.
- 11 Then came there unto him all his brethren, and all his sisters, and all they that had been of his acquaintance before, and did eat bread with him in his house: and they bemoaned him, and comforted him over all the evil that the Lord had brought upon him: every man also gave him a piece of money, and every one an earring of gold.
- 12 So the Lord blessed the latter end of Job more than his beginning.

Memory Verse: Let not the wise man glory in his wisdom, neither let the mighty man glory in his might, let not the rich man glory in his riches: but let him that glorieth glory in this, that he understandeth and knoweth me, that I am the Lord. Jeremiah 9:23-24.

Practical Truth: God can bring relief to persecuted people and make manifest the folly of their unwise critics.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

What a wonderful climax to the sufferings of Job! Job knew that God could do everything and nothing could be stopped when he speaks. Job got his mind off himself and his boils and looked to God. He received an insight of God that he had never had before, it seems. He said, "Mine eye seeth thee." He sees God in a light that caused him to feel his nothingness and with humility he humbled himself before God. When we look at problems through God's eyes they look small. His greatness far surpasses any problem of this earth and when we belong to God He will take care of all problems. Believing that God controls your life is a foundation for perfect happiness and troubles will vanish under such positive thinking.

Now, we notice that God blessed Job and turned his captivity when he prayed for his two miserable comforters. He had a forgiving spirit toward them. We must not hold anything against anyone with an unforgiving attitude. God will not bless us with that in our hearts.

Notice the blessings brought to Job in the end. "The trial of your faith is more precious than gold." Stand steady in them and God will bring you out. God's wisdom is greater than man's, so trust Him.—Mrs. Marie Miles.
