Remove Not the Ancient Landmarks

In Zechariah 14:20 it says, "In that day shall there be upon the bells of the horses, HOLINESS UNTO THE LORD; ..." This is the standard we are to lift up for the people. This is the law of God's house. Ezekiel 43:12 says, "This is the law of the house; Upon the top of the mountain the whole limit thereof round about shall be most holy. Behold, this is the law of the house."

The first Methodist discipline had in it a paragraph which forbid the reading of such literature or the exercise of any diversions which were not conducive to spirituality and holiness. This may still be in the Methodist discipline. I do not know. But we all know that this principle has long since passed out of the lives of many of the communicants of that faith, and most faiths so far as that is concerned. The departure from this principle was the moving of a clear definite landmark which had formerly set certain bounds and established a certain course for the people to go by. So long as they remained within those set bounds and followed that certain course in their lives, God's glory was manifest among them and His power worked mightily in their midst. But the removal of this landmark broke down the boundary and set the people adrift and threw them into confusion as to what the standard of Christian living was and today almost anything of the world is acceptable and very little divine power and glory is manifest in the lives of many. But let us realize that the New Testament can become a dead letter to many of us also if we do not watch ourselves very closely and stay real close to its teachings in our manner of life in every phase.

The general over-all rule for Christian living, and which would also be the standard for the church to go by collectively and individually, is found in 1 Cor. 10:31, "Whatsoever you do, do all to the glory of God." This should be the corner stone from which we would survey everything in every area of our lives. To state this rule or principle conversely will

not suffice in this case. To state it conversely would be to state it negatively—"Will this or that dishonor God?" Let us realize we are here for the express purpose to glorify God and we should hold this principle at all times in its positive form just as it is stated here, "Do all to the glory of God" and survey everything in life from that corner stone of truth.

Jesus, Himself, laid down this pattern for us to go by. In John 4:34 Jesus said, "My meat is to do the will of him that sent me, and to finish his work." Again in John 5:30 Jesus said, "I seek not mine own will, but the will of the Father which sent me." In John 8:29 Jesus said again, "The Father hath not left me alone; for I do always those things that please him." Jesus did always those things which pleased His Father. He is our example. In 1 John 3:22 we read, "And whatsoever we ask, we receive of him, because we keep his commandments, and do those things that are pleasing in his sight."

Now let us consider that those who keep His commandments may be saved, (howbeit, some may not be saved who are quite strict about the commandments in the main, at least) but we must seek to do those things which are the most pleasing unto God if we would enjoy His rich blessings upon our lives. This text is put in its positive form also, "Do those things that are pleasing in his sight." Let us think of it this way and not in its negative form, "Will this displease God?" We are plagued to a great extent with negative thinking, anyway. think and talk more about the things we do not believe in than the things we do believe in. Some have come more to an attitude of thinking, "Is this or that sin?" than of thinking, "Is this or that glorifying to God?" But let us realize there are some things which could not actually be located as sin which do not really please God for us in our particular case and would not be glorifying to Him.

I esteem very highly the early pioneer ministers of this evening light reformation and the standard of holiness they held both in life and teaching. I consider those standards to be right because they worked and produced results and the results they produced are the very same results the people of God yearn for and decry the lack of in our midst today. I reverence those early brethren to the extent that it is very grievous to me when I hear people criticizing them and challenging their teachings. But it is common practice among those who accept and condone the innovations of worldly things which have been coming in among us little by little over the past few years to speak lightly of the standards taught and held by the early brethren. They also down-rate those who hold for those standards yet in our day and sometimes such remarks as this are heard: "I do my own thinking. I do not accept a code that has been handed down by tradition from someone way back there that I did not even know," etc. Sometimes those who stand for those old standards are accused of just subscribing to some old tradition and doing things because someone else

said to do it, etc. But when we see those old standards and that old way work and produce results and better results than the codes which people want to bring in and go by now, that is the deciding factor in our thinking.

Of course, that attitude is not fair on the face of it, for who of us do not do things because others do them. Those who are in the "know" regarding those things tell us that the human race produces only a very small percentage of leaders. All the others are followers. Have any of you folks ever been conscious of having originated any style or fashion which went on and later became popular and was generally adopted by the world? If you cannot say "Yes" to this question, then are you not just following the styles and fashions originated by others and doing those things because the world does them? If you did not originate the styles and fashions you are subscribing to, then certainly you are a follower and not a leader. Then why would you think it fair to condemn and ridicule those who choose to stand by the standards which have come down to us from our fathers?

Would any of you even imagine that if the styles were to change in the world to long skirts that you would continue to wear the short ones you now clamor for? If suddenly no woman of the world would ever curl her hair or wear a permanent, do you imagine you would still think it necessary to curl yours and contend for those things as you do now? If not, why not? Then why would you think it proper and fair to taunt those who choose to stand by the old landmarks and not move the bounds in such a way and think of them as you do?

You may think, and I have been asked if I believed the early brethren had all the light. I would not have to believe that for my statement to be true in regard to them. But let us realize there is a vast difference between new light as it is being advanced today and more light on what the brethren of the early days taught and the church subscribed to in that time. I believe without doubt that we of our day have more light on some points of truth than they had in their day because there has been developments in the intervening time which would throw some clearer light on some points of truth than they could have had in their day. I can accept additions of light on these points of truth on that basis but I cannot accept "new" light which contradicts the basic teachings of the early brethren on any points of truth. But I believe that the doctrines taught in the early days of this evening light reformation contained the overall coverage of the truth as taught in the New Testament though some of it was perhaps in a limited sense which developments have brought out clearer than they had it.

But let me make it clear in this respect that most of the points I could call to mind in this category would be dealing with scriptures of prophecy and having to do with the signs of the times and the fulfillment of prophecy and not with the real standards of holiness and Christian living. In regard to that,

I believe I can say at this point that I accept the standards as taught and lived by the early brethren as being right, full and complete and as having no need of any deductions or additions. And I feel inclined to warn all of you at this point to be careful about accepting or being carried away with any of the innovations of worldly things or variations in teaching and practice which have been coming in among us the last few years and are coming in among us now.

If I could see more real godliness and deep holiness of life and more of the power of God accompanying these things, I could be more interested in them. But when I fail to see this but rather the opposite—a decline in spiritual power and deep holiness of life and more worldly mindedness, etc. I feel that the best policy for the church is to flee these things and follow after godliness. Let us not remove the old landmarks nor remove the bounds which have been set for us by those who have gone before us. Let us remember that God's Word pronounces a curse on all who do this.

I do not believe anyone could successfully contradict that there was more real divine power and spiritual life and more miracle working power and healings and genuine powerful conversions and devils cast out, etc. in those early days than what we are able to witness and testify to in the church of our day. I know you don't like that. I don't either. I would like to see it different but to be honest I must face up to the facts as I see them and I feel you should. too. Some of the very folks who are taking in with these innovations of worldly things and variations from the former teachings and practices of the earlier brethren, decry the lack of spiritual power and miracles and healings, etc. in our day and refer back to how the early brethren did it and ask why our brethren of today do not do it that way. It is the age-old idea of wanting to have the cake and eat it, too. which cannot be done. Some would like to have all that power and glory and benefits of the early church but they are not willing to follow that standard. The two can never be harmonized so we may as well stop trying and if we are willing to throw the standards of the early brethren overboard, just throw the rest overboard, also, and quit worrying about what they had that we do not see in that same measure in the church of our day. We can never hope for the one without the other. -O. B. Wilson

GOD HEALS MISSIONARY

Dear Sister Anna Marie and all: I am so glad to be able to declare victory today in the face of every foe.

As many of you know, only eighteen hours after I arrived in Mexico to resume my duties as a missionary after nursing my mother back to health, the chief of the Pai-pai tribe of Indians and I were loading bed springs into our four-door pickup, and the last time we pulled them, in order to shut the tailgate, they lunged sideways, knocking me out of the pickup bed backwards.

The Lord has performed such a miracle in my body since my fall. I'd like to share it with others. Space will not permit me to tell all the details of it, but I do want to give God all the glory. First of all, I would like to take this opportunity to thank each one for his or her part in helping in any way to care for me from the time I hit the ground and the Pai-pai chief tried to help me up until this very moment. It would be almost impossible to personally thank each one for there were so very many who helped, but none went unnoticed. If I failed in seeing it, the Lord didn't and my prayer is that He will richly bless each one. I do thank each and every one who offered prayer in my behalf during this time, also. In this way only did man touch this case for a doctor was not consulted nor were X-rays made. To God be all the glory! Praise His precious name!

My left limb and both arms were the only parts of my body that escaped injury. I will just mention some of the worst injuries sustained. My back was injured to the point that when I was being moved from one improvised bed to another I would scream in spite of all I could do. There were six places severely injured in my right limb. I felt if three or four ribs could be broken it would be a blessing, for then my heart would have sufficient room to beat as it was so swollen, but one rib was broken and punched my heart every time I was turned with a sheet. It was ten days before I could turn to my right side at all.

For three days and nights my suffering had no relief regardless of prayer. The Lord had a purpose in this. I had been asking for a deeper burden for lost souls in Mexico and this was the answer to my prayer. After this period of suffering the Lord spoke to me saying, "Just think! You may think this has seemed as an eternity to suffer so severely but those who are not saved and go into eternity in similar conditions never have any relief from their sufferings." Oh, how terrible! If we do not have our senses in eternity, how could the rich man have known he needed a drop of water to cool his parched tongue? He is still pleading today. (Luke 16:19-31.) In Ecclesiastes 11:3 we read, "... where the tree falleth, there it shall be."

We don't know by which route the Lord will answer our prayers, and if one is not willing to suffer, then he should not pray in this manner. I say wholeheartedly I would not have missed this experience in the Lord for I have learned some very precious lessons and surely have seen the great mercies of our God poured out in great abundance on one of His little ones.

I am so very grateful to the Lord for permitting my return to Mexico eight weeks after the accident. I'm not resuming my full capacity of work as yet, but believe He will make me able to perform more duties as He sees fit and I have a full amen in my heart for the will of God in my life, wherever, however, and in whatsoever capacity He chooses to use me.

I intend by His grace to be faithful to Him who called me out into this marvelous light and I want Him to help my light shine to those with whom I come in contact, daily. Pray for me.

I just returned from my northern trip. My visits to new places were responded with warm welcome. At

Kozhikode I met with a group of believers.

I also visited some places in Trichur, Kunnamkulam, Pazhanji, Porkulam and held meetings. The meetings were well attended by a good crowd. Praise the Lord! There needs follow-up work. Two brethren have come forward with decision for full time work. These brethren are very, very poor. But the family as a whole has trusted the Lord. They suffer a good deal of privations and difficulties. I want to help them partly, at least. I stayed with them and I was moved with compassion to see the children go to school with empty bellies. The congregations are poor. Still they feel happy to help the workers to a little extent. There must be one to shepherd each congregation. They do not have money to take a hall for rent for meetings. Please pray for the new openings in the north. Those places are about 400 miles from here. 1 Cor. 16:9.

It is amazing to see how bravely and perseveringly the saints cling to the Lord in spite of oppositions and poverty and other trials and temptations. We have to

lift up and uphold them in our prayers.

We badly need a public address system and also a gospel van. Our believers and workers are ardently praying for this equipment for evangelistic efforts. Our sisters and brethren go in a company to a new field and take a building for hire for staying. From that base, we go out for open air meetings, house visits, tract distribution, etc. Please pray that God may supply the petition of the believers here. Our brethren and all believers pray for the saints in America that God may bless them all and enrich them with spiritual as well as worldly goods that they may magnanimously and cheerfully distribute and contribute to the poverty-stricken believers here. God is providing us through His sincere people and we believe He will continue to the end.

We solicit the prayers of the saints in America. We are sure the Lord will abundantly fill your treasury and granaries with funds and spiritual food for the valuable

souls here. Our prayers are for you all.

Bro. Jackson Etuk wrote that the last part of August he went to Asana, the main mission station, and attended a very profitable three-day Bible study class taught by Bros. B. E. A. Inyang and W. G. Udoffia. Bro. D. U. E. Enu of Benin City, Nigeria wrote on

Our only son entered the army at Ft. Leonard Wood on May 10, 1965. On August 13 of that year he was taken to Ft. Benning, Ga. to prepare to be shipped overseas. Soon the word came to them it was to be Vietnam. I had been praying all along for God to care for him and work things out for him. He isn't saved, but he knows God hears and answers the prayers of the saints. At Ft. Benning he was given a good desk job and shown many favors by his superiors. He told us he didn't want to go to Vietnam, so we told him we would pray and God could change that plan. As I prayed about it, my faith grew. I knew God had heard prayer and that my son wouldn't have to go to war. The time drew nearer for them to leave. They were put on alert, equipment packed and sent on ahead. We told him we were still praying. We wrote to several of the saints and asked them to agree with us. On May 15, 1966 my husband had a severe stroke. I knew the answer had come. We farm about 600 acres, and dependable help is very scarce. We called him to

come as his daddy was very ill. He got a pass, five days, I think it was. They had ordered him to get his cash to take overseas. His time was so near to leave, he could not believe he was not going. We had papers prepared. letters from various business men we knew, to get a permanent discharge for him. He was almost sure it would take two or three weeks to put them through. It was planting time and he was so very badly needed here at home, but he had to leave for camp. It seemed I could scarcely bear to see him leave. He was my right hand while he was here. I told my daughter I had asked God to send him back in a week. She didn't think God could work that fast! On the 23rd he went back to camp and started his papers through on the 25th. On the 3rd day of June he got his discharge. There was a three-day period over Memorial Day when the offices were closed. The 4th day of June he was home to stay. Praise God forever! Space fails me to tell all God has done for us in just this one case.

My husband is steadily improving in health, trusting God completely. He has not failed us one time. "In all thy ways acknowledge him, and he shall direct thy paths." And that path will be good for us. I believe God will save our son. My faith takes this in, too.

ISAIAH, THE WILLING PROPHET

Printed Portion Isaiah 6:1-9, 11, 12

Isaiah 6:1 In the year that king Uzziah died I saw also the Lord sitting upon a throne, high and lifted up, and his train filled the temple.

2 Above it stood the seraphims: each one had six wings; with twain he covered his face, and with twain he covered his feet, and with twain he did fly.

he covered his feet, and with twain he did fly.

3 And one cried unto another, and said, Holy, holy, holy, is the Lord of hosts: the whole earth is full of his glory.

4 And the posts of the door moved at the voice of him that cried, and the house was filled with smoke.

5 Then said I, Woe is me! for I am undone; because I am a man of unclean lips, and I dwell in the midst of a people of unclean lips: for mine eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts.

- 11 Then said I, Lord, how long? And he answered, Until the cities be wasted without inhabitant, and the houses without man, and the land be utterly desolate,
- 12 And the Lord have removed men far away, and there be a great forsaking in the midst of the land.

Memory Verse: Also I heard the voice of the Lord, saying, Whom shall I send, and who will go for us? Then said I, Here am I; send me. Isaiah 6:8.

Practical Truth: When we see God as being great, pure, and holy, then we can see how much we need Him to help us to be ready for heaven.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

I am sure that conditions existing in Judah at the time of the call for someone to go for the Lord, to tell the people of their wickedness, was about the same as today in the United States. The people of Judah knew about God and His greatness. They had been taught the commandments. They knew of the blessings upon them when they obeyed and the curse upon them, as a nation, when they disobeyed. In that day there were many in poverty, yet the nation was having a prosperous time. There were many unscrupulous deals made which tended to bring dissatisfaction among the people and caused justice to be perverted. There was much idleness and irresponsibility among them. As it is today, they had just a sham religion. They went through rituals and forgot it when it was over. Their lives did not measure up to God's commandments. They needed a prophet from God to tell them of their needs and help them to become awakened to the judgments of God. Our nation is sleeping on the very brink of severe punishment from God. In the last few years there have come to pass many troubles because people are forgetting God. God is asking the question, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?"

Seraphims are heavenly beings standing before God. Seraphim comes from the Hebrew word meaning "to burn," thus indicating the nation needed their depravity burned up. (Clarke)

We cannot help others until we are equipped with the Holy Spirit and God's Word.

JUDGMENT ON UNGODLY LIVING

Printed Portion Isaiah 5:8, 11, 12, 14, 18-23

Isa. 5:8 Woe unto them that join house to house, that lay field to field, till there be no place, that they may be placed alone in the midst of the earth!

11 Woe unto them that rise up early in the morning, that they may follow strong drink, that continue until night, till wine inflame them!

12 And the harp, and the viol, the tabret, and pipe, and wine, are in their feasts: but they regard not the

work of the Lord, neither consider the operations of his hands.

- 14 Therefore hell hath enlarged herself, and opened her mouth without measure: and their glory, and their multitude, and their pomp, and he that rejoiceth, shall descend into it.
- 18 Woe unto them that draw iniquity with cords of vanity, and sin as it were with a cart rope:
- 19 That say, Let him make speed, and hasten his work, that we may see it: and let the counsel of the Holy One of Israel draw nigh and come, that we may know it!
- 20 Woe unto them that call evil good, and good evil; that put darkness for light, and light for darkness; that put bitter for sweet, and sweet for bitter!
- 21 Woe unto them that are wise in their own eyes, and prudent in their own sight!
- 22 Woe unto them that are mighty to drink wine, and men of strength to mingle strong drink:
- 23 Which justify the wicked for reward, and take away the righteousness of the righteous from him!

Memory Verse: But the Lord of hosts shall be exalted in judgment, and God that is holy shall be sanctified in righteousness. Isaiah 5:16.

Practical Truth: We should see to it that we bring forth good fruit in our lives or we will reap a harvest of the fiery judgments of God.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

Isaiah was faithful to the calling of God. In our lesson he plainly tells the people about the sins that they were committing and how God was greatly displeased. Woe means "great sorrow; grief, trouble." (Web.) The people were drowning the judgments of God with feasting, fast music, drinking and revellings. They had a cart load of sin that was being pulled with cords of vanity. They became inflamed with strong drink from morning until night. They called evil good and good evil. They "justify the wicked for reward."

Can we apply this lesson to the evils of today? What about the "rock and roll" music of today? It is a trick of the devil to bring such ridiculous beats called music before our young people today. This affects their minds and emotions until they fall easy prey to the suggestions of the devil to go into deeper sins. It is the same tactics that the army uses to train their men to drop at the command of their officer. It has a hypnotic effect. It is just plain getting drunk on the fast beat.

I feel that God's people should not just practice temperance in strong drinks, but complete abstinence. A little leads to more and then drunkenness. _n_

IN WHOM DO WE TRUST?

Printed Portion Isaiah 7:3-7a, 9c-16; 31:1-3

Isa. 7:3 Then said the Lord unto Isaiah. Go forth now to meet Ahaz, thou, and Shearjashub thy son, at the end of the conduit of the upper pool in the highway of the fuller's field:

- 4 And say unto him, Take heed, and be quiet; fear not, neither be fainthearted for the two tails of these smoking firebrands, for the fierce anger of Rezin with Syria, and of the son of Remaliah.
- 5 Because Syria, Ephraim, and the son of Remaliah, have taken evil counsel against thee, saying,
- 6 Let us go up against Judah, and vex it, and let us make a breach therein for us, and set a king in the midst of it, even the son of Tabeal:

- 7a Thus saith the Lord God, it shall not stand.
- 9c If ye will not believe, surely ye shall not be established.
 - Moreover, the Lord spake again unto Ahaz, saying,
 Ask thee a sign of the Lord thy God; ask it either
- in the depth, or in the height above.
- 12 But Ahaz said, I will not ask, neither will I tempt
- 13 And he said, Hear ye now, O house of David: Is it a small thing for you to weary men, but will ye weary my God also?
- 14 Therefore the Lord himself shall give you a sign; Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel.
- 15 Butter and honey shall he eat, that he may know to refuse the evil, and choose the good.
- 16 For before the child shall know how to refuse the evil, and choose the good, the land that thou abhorrest shall be forsaken of both her kings.
- 31:1 Woe to them that go down to Egypt for help; and stay on horses, and trust in chariots, because they are many; and in horsemen, because they are very strong; but they look not unto the Holy One of Israel, neither seek the Lord!
- 2 Yet he also is wise, and will bring evil, and will not call back his words; but will arise against the house of the evildoers, and against the help of them that work iniquity.
- 3 Now the Egyptians are men, and not God; and their horses flesh, and not spirit. When the Lord shall stretch out his hand, both he that helpeth shall fall, and he that is holpen shall fall down, and they all shall fail together.

Memory Verse: But they that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run, and not be weary; and they shall walk and not faint. Isaiah 40:31.

Practical Truth: We can trust a God who made the world and us to take care of everything in our lives.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

Trust means "firm belief; faith; confidence or honesty in one trusted." We are glad that we have a God to trust at all times that is able to do "exceedingly, abundantly above all we are able to ask or think." Friends, and loved ones-indeed all mankind will fail us at times. or will be unable to help us, but God has all power and wisdom and never makes a mistake. We only know about yesterday and today, but God knows all about our tomorrows, therefore we are glad to put our trust in Him, even if we do not see how everything will work out.

Two kings were coming up against Judah. (verse 4) God sent Isaiah to tell the king to fear not because He was not going to permit their plans to stand. (verse 7) It was in God's plan that the line of David would not be cut off because Jesus was to come from Judah. Verse 14 tells the sign given that Jesus was to come. He would be born of a virgin. Immanuel means "God is with us." Oh, how wonderful to think of the great love of God for us even years and years before we were born! Now today we have God with us and in us.

King Ahaz did not believe God would help him so he sent for the king of Assyria to help him. The enemies were defeated but the king of Assyria made slaves out of King Ahaz and the people. It would have been better to trust God.

The last verses of our lesson are about King Hezekiah who trusted in God after God sent Isaiah to give him the warning not to go to Egypt for help. We need to trust God and not man.

GOD, OUR REFUGE AND HELPER

Printed Portion Isaiah 37:14-21a, 33-35

Isa. 37:14 And Hezekiah received the letter from the hand of the messengers, and read it: and Hezekiah went up unto the house of the Lord, and spread it before the Lord.

15 And Hezekiah prayed unto the Lord, saying,

16 O Lord of hosts, God of Israel, that dwellest between the cherubims, thou art the God, even thou alone, of all the kingdoms of the earth: thou hast made heaven and earth.

17 Incline thine ear, O Lord, and hear; open thine eyes, O Lord, and see: and hear all the words of Sennacherib, which hath sent to reproach the living God.

18 Of a truth, Lord, the kings of Assyria have laid

waste all the nations, and their countries,
19 And have cast their gods into the fire: for they were no gods, but the work of man's hands, wood and stone: therefore they have destroyed them.

20 Now therefore, O Lord our God, save us from his hand, that all the kingdoms of the earth may know that thou art the Lord, even thou only.

21a Then Isaiah, the son of Amoz sent unto Hezekiah, saying, Thus saith the Lord God of Israel,

33 Therefore thus saith the Lord concerning the king of Assyria, He shall not come into this city, nor shoot an arrow there, nor come before it with shields, nor cast a bank against it.

34 By the way that he came, by the same shall he return, and shall not come into this city, saith the Lord.

35 For I will defend this city to save it for mine own sake, and for my servant David's sake.

Memory Verse: God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Psalm 46:1.

Practical Truth: God knows the sorrows and troubles of today and tomorrow. Trust Him to help you and do not worry.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

The desire for security is natural with every human being. The fear of the loss of it causes much concern and if great enough, it will shorten one's life. When the second child is born into a family, it sometimes causes the first child to fear being unwanted. Teenagers fear to resist the gang lest they be unwanted. Some think marriage is the answer for security. Older people feel that old age assistance is the answer. People need an anchor for their soul. The devil presents many solutions to these problems but we can only find the answer in God.

We need to get a firm hold on God through justification and then be filled with the Holy Spirit. To have a deep love for God and a carefulness to obey Him will bring faith and confidence in Him to the extent that we can have peace and rest as we face the problems of life. Faith is not inherited. Faith is not catching. Faith is given us by God. The greater our love for God the greater our faith. "Faith which worketh by love." Gal. 5:6. Faith is not afraid of trouble.

Hezekiah spread his letter with its problems before God and then left it there. His prayer for deliverance and victory was for the glory of God. God heard his prayer and sent an angel of the Lord into the camp of the Assyrians and smote 85,000 in one night. (Isa. 37:36) Sennacherib returned to his home. Later he was slain by his sons while worshipping his pagan god.

JEREMIAH, THE RELUCTANT PROPHET

Printed Portion Jeremiah 1:1-10

Jer. 1:1 The words of Jeremiah the son of Hilkiah, of the priests that were in Anathoth in the land of Ben-

2 To whom the word of the Lord came in the days of Josiah the son of Amon king of Judah, in the thirteenth year of his reign.

3 It came also in the days of Jehoikam the son of Josiah king of Judah, unto the end of the eleventh year of Zedekiah the son of Josiah king of Judah unto the carrying away of Jerusalem captive in the fifth month.

4 Then the word of the Lord came unto me, saying, 5 Before I formed thee in the belly I knew thee; and before thou camest forth out of the womb I sanctified thee, and I ordained thee a prophet unto the nations.

6 Then said I, Ah, Lord God! behold, I cannot speak:

for I am a child.

7 But the Lord said unto me, Say not, I am a child: for thou shalt go to all that I shall send thee, and whatsoever I command thee thou shalt speak.

8 Be not afraid of their faces: for I am with thee

to deliver thee, saith the Lord.

9 Then the Lord put forth his hand, and touched my mouth. And the Lord said unto me, Behold, I have put my words in thy mouth.

10 See, I have this day set thee over the nations and over the kingdoms, to root out, and to pull down, and to destroy, and to throw down, to build, and to plant.

Memory Verse: Be not afraid of their faces: for I am with thee to deliver thee, saith the Lord. Jer. 1:18.

Practical Truth: If God calls you for a duty, be assured that He will go with you.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

God told Jeremiah that before his birth, He had a purpose for him in his life. God has a purpose for all of us in this life. Sad to say, many do not get ready to do very much for the Lord and fulfill the purpose that God has for them because they are not willing to be workers for God. They should accept the advice given Jeremiah from God, "Be not afraid of their faces: for I am with thee to deliver thee." God is not asking us to work for Him with the wisdom that we naturally have, but He wants an empty vessel that He can talk through and "whatsoever I command thee thou shalt speak." (ver. 7)

Sometimes God has to permit many things to touch our lives before we get in a condition to work for Him. "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose." (Rom. 8:28) Not shall work, or have worked, but are working together now, for our good and for the good of others in fulfilling the purpose that God has called us to in this life.

We need to pray for more boldness and confidence in God to help us do as He bids us. There are inner conflicts and outer pressures that must be overcome through the power of the Holy Spirit. We must completely die out to the flesh and be willing to suffer for the cause of Christ because we love our God and mankind.
