Jesus told ten lepers to go show themselves unto the priests, and as they went they were cleansed. Yet only one returned to give glory to God. Jesus asked him, "... but where are the nine?" Unthankfulness and ungratefulness are also prevalent in these days.

The Kingdom of God in Prophecy

God called Abram to leave his country and go unto a land that He would show him and promised to make his name great, and of him a great nation, and that in him all nations of the earth should be blessed. Genesis 12:1-3. He promised him later that in Isaac (the seed of promise) his seed should be called. Gen. 21:12.

Abraham's descendants, seventy souls, went to Egypt during Jacob's lifetime, and after more than four hundred years, God called Moses to deliver them from Egyptian bondage. God delivered them through him without war. Six hundred thousand able-bodied men, their wives and children, besides a great mixed multitude which went with them, a great nation, God brought out of Egypt. From the wilderness their descendants took possession of the land of Canaan as God had promised them.

These people were the chosen people of God because of Abraham, their father, the friend of God. 2 Chron. 20:7. Though they had received the law and a covenant through Moses, they sinned by rebelling against God, so were in trouble much of the time. God delivered them by judges and prophets until He raised up David to be their king. Under him, they conquered the nations around them and became a great kingdom. It was an outstanding kingdom through Solomon's reign, also, but they soon turned away from the law and commandments to idolatry and all manner of sin. They were warned by the prophets, but took very little heed. God, through the prophets, began to show them something better for the future. Though the prophets warned them of terrible destruction if they did not return to the Lord, they were still stubborn. God wanted to give hope in their hearts through the prophets. Jacob said: "The sceptre shall not depart from Judah . . . until Shiloh come; and unto him shall the gathering of the people be." Genesis 49:10. (Shiloh means Rest-giver, who is Jesus Christ.) Isaiah 9:6, 7 says: "For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given: and the government shall be upon his shoulder: and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, The mighty God, The everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace. Of the increase of his government and peace there shall be no end, upon the throne of David, and upon his kingdom, to order it, and to establish it with judgment and with justice from henceforth even forever. The zeal of the Lord of hosts will perform this."

This King was to make changes in the kingdom from a literal to a spiritual kingdom of "kings and priests unto God." Rev. 1:6. Even the covenant was to be changed, including the lineage of the priesthood. "Behold, the days come, saith the Lord, that I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel, and with the house of Judah . . . But this shall be the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel; after those days, saith the Lord, I will put my laws in their inward parts, and write it in their hearts; and will be their God, and they shall be my people." Jer. 31:31, 33. "A new heart also will I give you and a new spirit . . ." Ezek. 36:26, 27. God's spirit will make a spiritual life. "Until the Spirit be poured upon us from on high." Isaiah 32:15. "Thus saith the Lord, As the new wine is found in the cluster. and one saith, Destroy it not; for a blessing is in it; so will I do for my servants' sakes, that I may not destroy them all." Isaiah 65:8. "Behold, I will send my messenger, and he shall prepare the way before me: and the Lord, whom ye seek, shall suddenly come to his temple, even the messenger of the covenant, whom ye delight in: behold, he shall come, saith the Lord of hosts. But who may abide the day of his coming? and who shall stand when he appeareth? for he is like a refiner's fire, and like fullers' sope." Malachi 3:1, 2.

This was fulfilled. John the Baptist came preaching repentance for the remission of sins. He said he was not the Christ, but was sent to be a witness of Him who would baptize them with the Holy Ghost. See John 1:29-33. Jesus came according to the Scriptures preaching repentance and rest to the soul (Matt. 11:28, 29) and went about doing good, showing love, meekness, mercy and compassion to all, healing the sick, casting out devils, giving His wonderful counsel, and giving judgment against all manner of sin. Many believed on Him. He sent out His apostles to preach, and later seventy others, giving them power to heal the sick, and to cast out devils, in order to show the love of God to His people. He taught them many things-how to love one another, to do unto others as they would have others do unto them. As He was soon to give His life for the sins of the world, He began to tell His disciples that He must be rejected of the rulers, be killed, and be raised from the dead the third day. He told them also of the Comforter which should be given them from the Father. ye love me, keep my commandments. And I will pray the Father, and he shall give you another Comforter, that he may abide with you for ever; even the Spirit of truth; whom the world cannot receive, because it seeth him not, neither knoweth him: but ye know him; for he dwelleth with you, and shall be in you." John 14:15-17. "But the Comforter, which is the Holy Ghost, whom the Father will send in my name,

he shall teach you all things, and bring all things to your remembrance, whatsoever I have said unto you." John 14:26. The Comforter, Spirit of Truth, and the Holy Ghost are all the same Holy Spirit which they were to receive after His departure. See John 16:7-14.

The world could not receive Him but only those who had received Jesus as their personal Saviour. One hundred and twenty of them received Him on the day of Pentecost in the upper room where they were together. "And suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon each of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance." Acts 2:2-4. As there were Jews from all nations dwelling at Jerusalem, when this was told in the city, the multitude came together and were surprised beyond measure and wondered as each heard these Galileans speaking the wonderful works of God in his own language wherein he was born. Jesus had said, "Ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you." Acts 1:8. The miracle-working Jesus had not lost any of His power, but through the sign and the wonderful message Peter preached, there were three thousand souls saved—a nation born at once. It continued through persecution and opposition, and spread to other cities. The power of God was present to heal all manner of diseases and raise the dead. It was wonderful! The Word went to Samaria, then to the Gentile nations, including all men everywhere who would believe in the Lord Jesus Christ and obey Him, living the holy life taught by Jesus and His apostles, and is for us today.

He, the great King, is now reigning in our hearts by His counsel, judgment, and righteousness, through the Holy Spirit, thus fulfilling the prophecies.

Spiritual Retrogression

The fact that we are spiritual at one time does not guarantee that we shall always remain so. There may come, if we permit it, a time of retrogression. Our zeal may flag, our love grow cold, and our interest may be lost, and we may become indifferent. "Therefore we ought to give the more earnest heed to the things that were heard, lest haply we drift away from them" (Heb. 2:1, A. S. V.) Water, when unconfined, always flows downhill, and so do the natural currents of life. Serving the Lord, like any other good thing, requires exertion. If we grow careless and merely drift along, the current will always lead us farther away from God. Progress Godward is always progress upward.

How many who once were after for God are now cold and indifferent! How many who once were bright lights are now only smoking wicks! Remember that what we once were does not give evidence of what we are now. Spiritual progress results from conformity to the laws of progress, and spiritual retrogres-

sion from lack of conformity to these laws. Physical growth is dependent upon the taking in and assimilation of new materials by an already organized structure. Spiritual growth depends upon our taking in spiritual materials and utilizing them properly in our development. We are commanded to be filled with the Spirit. If we keep so filled, there will be no retrogression.

A number of things contribute to drifting away from God. Let us consider some of them.

Neglect of prayer and of the reading of God's Word. When we neglect these, we cannot but grow indifferent and fail to make spiritual progress. When we neglect these things, we soon lose our relish for them; and when that relish is lost, it becomes still easier to neglect them. In this way we shut up the channel of grace and thereby prevent its flowing into our hearts.

Neglect of attending meetings. When people grow careless about assembling themselves with God's people, it is an evidence that they are drifting. Fervent love for God gives us a fervent love for His people; and a fervent love for them brings a fervent desire to be with them. A loss of interest, either through neglect or by letting another interest come in ahead of God draws the soul away. We can prosper spiritually only so long as God has first place in our affections and first place in our interests. Beware of anything that comes between you and God, to draw your interest away from Him. It will be ruinous to your soul.

Drawing away from duty. When people are first saved, as a rule, they have a great zeal to work for God. They prefer doing that to anything else. Their souls delight in it. It is their meat to do His will. So long as they are in this attitude, they will prosper: they will steadily grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord. But when their zeal begins to cool and their love becomes less strong, there is often a drawing back from duty. Before, they needed no urging: they were ready. Now, duty is irksome, they go about it reluctantly. They prefer that someone else work while they look on. They serve God from a sense of duty rather than a sense of love. If we saw these things in their right aspect and their true meaning. we should see them as great danger-posts along the way warning us of the trouble ahead. Such a change always indicates spiritual retrogression. It shows that the soul, instead of becoming more spiritual, is becoming less so.

Hardening the conscience until it loses its tenderness toward God, and so becoming careless in life. In the beginning of our new-born life, we have a tender conscience toward God. We ought to care for this tender conscience. We ought to follow it carefully, and keep it tender toward God. It must, however, be regulated by common sense and good judgment, or it will become a tyrant and rule our lives in a way to make us miserable. This is quite different from having that careful, earnest desire to please God. When we are drifting, we are not so much concerned about pleasing God as we were be-

fore, and we become more concerned about pleasing ourselves. Beware of the increase of this self-pleasing disposition. It is always a mark of spiritual degeneration.

Self-indulgence. No matter what direction this may take, it is sure to bring evil results. Partaking of worldly amusements, allowing pride to come into the soul and gratifying it with worldly apparel, luxurious living, and all similar things are destructive to spirituality.

Going back on our obligations. When we make God a promise to do something He asks of us, He expects us to live up to it; and not only does He expect it, but He will require it. Therefore, if we draw back from that which we have promised Him. or if we withhold from Him the service that we have promised Him, we shall do it at great cost to our souls. There are thousands of souls who draw back in this way. They make promises to God, and when they make them, they mean to fulfill them; but as time goes on and they do not fulfill them, they grow careless about it, or indifferent, or unwilling, or for some other reason fail to perform what they promised. They draw back from being wholly the Lord's. They want to do something for themselves. They want to choose their own way and make their own plans. God, of course, permits them to do this, but it is at the loss of their spirituality and of his blessing upon their souls. In the end, if they persist, it will mean their eternal ruin.

Oh, beware of drifting! Beware of carelessness and neglect. Beware of anything and everything that makes you less spiritual. Keep this thought in mind: You have but one chance to gain heaven. If you miss that one chance, you have missed it all. Press forward; make some gain each day. You will not be able to see that you have made a gain every day, but if you walk humbly before God and do your duty. lovingly and faithfully, you will each day draw a little nearer God. He has said, "Draw nigh to God, and he will draw nigh to you." Every step we make toward God, he makes a step toward us. It is just like walking toward your reflection in a mirror. Every time you step toward your reflection, it seems to step toward you, so that one step brings you two steps nearer. Just so each step you take toward God brings Him two steps nearer you.

Dear Saints scattered abroad: We send greetings of Christian love to you in the precious name of Jesus. We love Him because He first loved us.

The dear Lord is blessing us here in Jefferson, Ore. All the dear saints are so precious, having the same care one for another. I feel like the dear Lord has placed me here in this part of His vineyard to do what little

I can to encourage the dear ones.

It has always been so precious to do personal work, visiting the isolated saints to read and pray with them. I did so much of this work when I was younger. My husband and I would move to a new place and my first desire was to visit my neighbors and get a little work started. When we first moved from Richwood, W. Va., to Charleston, W. Va., God opened the way that we could rent a building for Sunday school and other services. When we lived in Seattle, Wash., God blessed us there with a little work for Him. I remember, in 1942, how we visited over on Vashan Island. We had to take the ferry across the Sounds. It was there where we met dear Sister Jacobson, an aged saint. She rejoiced to hear the songs out of the "Select Hymns" songbook. She had never heard them before. All she knew about the Church of God was what the Holy Spirit had taught her. Later she read the "Faith and Victory" paper and got in touch with the saints through correspondence. She was trusting God completely for her body. At this time she was in bed with cancer but she trusted God to the end. How we did enjoy visiting her!

Sister Evalee Stice and I left Jefferson August 28 to make the same tour we had made a year ago. We had been praying about the dear ones that are isolated and don't have the privilege to assemble with any congregation. Our first stop was in La Grande, Ore. to visit with dear Sister O. K. Myers, who is 87 years old,

and still active in the work of the Lord. She is in a home for the aged, but what a blessing she is in this home! We spoke to different ones who told how much they loved her. I thanked the Lord as I thought, if God can use her at her age, how much He could do with other willing hearts!

Our next visit was with dear Sister Vivian Williams in Milton Freewater, Ore., on the State line. We drove over into Washington, to Walla Walla, got Sister Hattie Gibson, (82 years old) and brought her over to Sister Williams' home. We had a precious meeting, reading the Word and hearing the testimonies of victory from these two sisters, and singing the songs of Zion. Sister Williams' cousin, Ed, had been very ill with a stroke. He makes his home there. He was happy, too, and wanted to be prayed for. He is 77 years old. I don't have words to write how the dear Lord did bless in that humble little home. It was hard to leave.

We took Sister Gibson back to Walla Walla, Wash, and drove on to Spokane to visit Sister Gustafason. It was the first time we had met her. She received us kindly and we had a good visit, speaking of the precious

We read mostly from Revelation. The Holy Spirit gave understanding to read and explain the Scriptures to her. We believe God ordered this visit right at the time it was needed. This sister was so happy. She said she believed she would know how to take a stand against a false doctrine she had been meeting. Mr. Westrope, who is deaf, sat quietly all the time we were talking, seeing we had our Bibles open. We do pray for this dear man that he will understand how to give his heart to the Lord.

We drove on over the mountains to Seattle and found our way to the hospital where Sister Greenway was. She had fallen and broken her hip some time before this. She was overjoyed to see us as our visit was a surprise to her. We stayed with her two hours or more. We read and had prayer. She begged us to stay longer, but we needed to get on our way. We spent the

night with my brother.

Friday morning we left for Tacoma. Sister Thomas had made arrangements for a service in Sister Alice Bunch's home. A few of the saints gathered in. Bro. Shaw, Sister Bunch's father, lives with her. He is very frail and in need of prayer. Sister Landgraf [who has since then passed away] was there. We had a good visit with her. It was good to meet with these dear ones and sing the songs of Zion and hear the testimonies as each one told of the goodness of God. Bro. Shaw read 1 Corinthians 13. The Lord gave us some of the Word to read to encourage those there to be steadfast in the truth and live for God.

Saturday morning we started for home. Elmo, my nephew, came over from Seattle. Sister Thomas also came with us. We stopped at Olympia to visit Bro. and Sister Koehler. NIGERIAN MISSION REPORT

Midwest Nigeria (Sept. 30)—Dear Bro. Pruitt, greetings in Jesus' dear name to you and brethren of the Church of God throughout the land, who follow Christ regardless of the cost. The cost of becoming a Christian and following Christ is great. But salvation cost God what cannot be greater (John 3:16). We should surrender all that we have and are to Jesus Christ. Even though it costs so much, it is the most profitable investment that we can make. When Christ is received as our personal Saviour, joy is received. If joy is to be received, Christ must be received.

Your letter dated September 13, 1968, was received. Thank you for all enclosed. Your regular communication with us provides us with more strength, inspiration, encouragement, and revival.

Once again our hearts are full of praise to our loving heavenly Father for His goodness to us as a church and congregation. On September 15 came the defeat of the goddess of Abbi called Egedi. In a large procession we marched through the main streets of Abbi, making our way to Edu stream lying between Abbi and Ezionum, a distance of approximately three miles, for the baptism of the converted brethren. On the way, at Iyeze, a village of Abbi town, is the site of the old goddess of idol worshippers by the name of Egedi. Egedi means an old woman. It has been an imperative traditional "must" that women passing through the face of this goddess should remove their clothing from their body. Any violation arising from forgetfulness rendered such a woman liable to seizure of whatever she has on, regardless of newness and quality, and thrown to or hung on the fence of Egedi, the goddess. As I was preceding the procession of the entire Abbi congregation with Bro. Ojuenum to the chosen spot of the stream, it occurred to me on arrival there to dispatch him back to meet the procession with a warning to the sisters that whoever she be that pulls off her dress in honor of the goddess should regard herself disqualified forthwith as a member of Christ's kingdom and His Church here on earth. This was not only obeyed to the praise of our God, but the goddess was vilified and mocked.

The lesson read by Bro. Joseph Enebeli before the baptism was taken from Romans 6:4-13, while the word of exhortation was selected from Col. 3:8. Thirty-eight converts were baptized. Conspicuous among the converts is Bro. Edmund Chukwuka, formerly a prominent and stubborn politician of the age, who resigned from the corrupt worldly fame and declared himself for Christ. "Blessed is he whose transgression is forgiven."

On September 23 we had the observance of the Lord's Supper. The sermon preached by the pastor, Bro. Enu, on

the occasion, was chosen from John 6:53-58. It was a never-to-be-forgotten day of solemnity and fullness of blessings from on high.

Truth cannot be suppressed for long; it must prevail. The entire Benin City congregation who were deceptively carried away are fully back to the fold of the holy family—the Church of God. I was forced to leave Benin City on Sept. 20, 1967 by the civil war. This gave chance to a false minister to wade in. He had at the time a weapon so sharp and terrible—the teaching of tribalism. Nearly all churches in Nigeria have been killed by this deadly disease, "tribalism." It is an epidemic to which the civil war in Nigeria has given birth. Its cure is remote, especially with the carnal churches of prestige-making. I shall visit them in Benin City when this most destructive war ever known or heard of slacks down.

No communication is possible with the Asana brethren in the Eastern region. We are much disturbed. Thank God for the two letters received by you from them. War is a terrible thing. Our sufferings are great and heart-rending. I am glad God is aware of our problems and will surely provide against the depression which the war has brought in its train.

Then it also came to me that we were being set up as a mark for the Lord. Many people are looking at us during the afflictions we have been going through. CHRISTIAN SUFFERING

Printed Portion 1 Peter 3:13-17; 4:12-17

1 Peter 3:13 And who is he that will harm you, if ye be followers of that which is good?

14 But and if ye suffer for righteousness' sake, happy are ye: and be not afraid of their terror, neither be troubled:

15 But sanctify the Lord God in your hearts: and be ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you with meekness and fear:

16 Having a good conscience; that, whereas they speak evil of you, as of evildoers, they may be ashamed that falsely accuse your good conversation in Christ.

17 For it is better, if the will of God be so, that ye

suffer for well doing, than for evil doing.

4:12 Beloved, think it not strange concerning the fiery trial which is to try you, as though some strange thing happened unto you:

13 But rejoice, inasmuch as ye are partakers of Christ's sufferings; that, when his glory shall be revealed, ye may be glad also with exceeding joy.

14 If ye be reproached for the name of Christ, happy are ye; for the spirit of glory and of God resteth upon you: on their part he is evil spoken of, but on your part he is glorified.

15 But let none of you suffer as a murderer, or as a thief, or as an evildoer, or as a busybody in other men's matters.

16 Yet if any man suffer as a Christian, let him not be ashamed; but let him glorify God on this behalf.

17 For the time is come that judgment must begin at the house of God: and if it first begin at us, what shall the end be of them that obey not the gospel of God?

Memory Verse: Yet if any man suffer as a Christian, let him not be ashamed; but let him glorify God on this behalf. 1 Peter 4:16.

Practical Truth: Suffering comes to all, but a blessing rests upon those who suffer as a Christian.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

The Bible tells us that "man that is born of woman is of few days and full of trouble." Suffering comes to the sinner as well as to the Christian. One time on a hill three men were suffering on crosses, two for evil and one for good. Jesus was innocent, yet He suffered. Our lesson tells us not to be ashamed, but to glorify God if we "suffer as a Christian." Christian means "Christ-like." There is much depth to this statement. To be more like Christ should be the cry of every heart.

Our lesson starts out by asking who will harm us if we follow that which is good, then the statement is qualified by saying, "But if ye suffer for righteousness' sake" you are not to be afraid nor troubled. Why should we not be afraid? The answer is in verse 13—"When his glory shall be revealed, ye may be glad also with exceeding joy," that you were partakers of Christ's suffering.

Our lesson tells us what kind of suffering will bring joy and God's blessings upon us. Suffering because of sin or because of our own mistakes will not bring a blessing to us. Sometimes saints will fall into a trap of being a "busybody in other men's matters." They did not mean to get involved. It brought suffering. This does not glorify God. The Lord is merciful and will help them out as they repent and ask for mercy. It might not be a mistake that will cut them off, but it still needs to be repented of. How careful we need to be that the "fiery trial which is to try you" comes, not from our mistakes, but that it comes because God is using us to bring glory to Himself or helping us be ready for heaven.

- 2 Pet. 1:3 According as his divine power hath given unto us all things that pertain unto life and godliness, through the knowledge of him that hath called us to glory and virtue:

- 2 Pet. 3:9 The Lord is not slack concerning his promise, as some men count slackness; but is longsuffering to usward, not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance.
- 10 But the day of the Lord will come as a thief in the night; in the which the heavens shall pass away with a great noise, and the elements shall melt with fervent heat,

the earth also and the works that are therein shall be burned up.

11 Seeing then that all these things shall be dissolved, what manner of persons ought ye to be in all holy conversation and godliness?

Memory Verse: Wherefore, beloved, seeing that ye look for such things, be diligent that ye may be found of him in peace, without spot, and blameless. 2 Pet. 3:14.

Practical Truth: It is more important to add spiritual wealth than earthly wealth to our lives.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

I am glad that we can receive "all things" that "pertain unto life and godliness" by the "divine power" of God, a power that no other power can resist. This takes in everything that we need in this life, which includes all spiritual and temporal needs. Dear ones, we can believe God's Word and count it so. Just think of all the precious promises given us directly from God who "hath called us to glory and virtue." There are 7,487 promises. These are given us that we might be "partakers of the divine nature" and receive "all things that pertain to life and godliness."

Many in the world today are very interested in and work diligently at adding worldly goods to themselves, but our lesson is speaking about spiritual addition which is far more important. We need to work diligently at this adding. We need the virtue of courage to profess our faith before others. We need moral excellence which comes from God into our lives. We need to add knowledge or true wisdom which comes from seeking God and studying His Word. Add temperance, or self-control, by keeping every sense under restraint, by the power of the Spirit of God. Add patience by bearing or enduring the trials or difficulties that come our way with victory and with godliness. We need to keep a strong love for the saints in our hearts and strive for the unity of the faith. Then add charity or love for the whole human race, even those who persecute us.

The last of our lesson teaches us how important it is that we keep ready and live a godly life so we will be ready when the Lord comes as a thief in the night.

"Twill help you run the Christian race;
To virtue, knowledge add with care:

Mix temperance with your knowledge, then Add patience, it will help you win; To patience add great godliness; You'll need it daily in life's press.

WALKING IN THE LIGHT

Printed Portion 1 John 1:5-10; 2:1-6

1 John 1:5 This then is the message which we have heard of him, and declare unto you, that God is light, and in him is no darkness at all.

- 6 If we say that we have fellowship with him, and walk in darkness, we lie, and do not the truth:
- 7 But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin.
- 8 If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us.
- 9 If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness.
- 10 If we say that we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us.
- 2:1 My little children, these things write I unto you, that ye sin not. And if any man sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous:
- 2 And he is the propitiation for our sins: and not for ours only, but also for the sins of the whole world.
- 3 And hereby we do know that we know him, if we keep his commandments.
- 4 He that saith, I know him, and keepeth not his commandments, is a liar, and the truth is not in him.

 5 But whoso keepeth his word, in him verily is the love
- of God perfected: hereby know we that we are in him.

 6 He that saith he abideth in him ought himself also so to walk, even as he walked.

Memory Verse: But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin. 1 John 1:7.

Practical Truth: Jesus Christ is the source of all light, righteousness, and eternal life. Through Him we can receive power to become the sons of God and live holy in this world.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

God is light—the source of all perfection, holiness, wisdom, knowledge, joy, and all good. There is no darkness, sin, nor unholiness in Him. Now if we say that we have fellowship or communion or are partakers of His divine nature and walk in darkness or live a sinful life, we lie and are not walking according to the teachings of God's Word. But if we walk in the light of God, which brought us to repentance and the new birth, the precious blood of Jesus cleanses us from sin and keeps us cleansed.

"All have sinned and come short of the glory of God." (Romans 3:23) Therefore every person needs a Saviour. Not only will He cleanse us from our volitional sins, but He will also cleanse, by the power of the Holy Spirit, that sin principle which passed on all men from Adam's fall. God does a complete work for us in salvation through the two works of grace in the heart.

God does not want us to sin. He wants us to live daily without sin. He has grace to keep us. If there is any lack, it is all on our part. But if a person does sin, or has sin in his heart, he need not be without hope. Jesus Christ is our advocate with the Father. He died on the cross for our sins and for the sins of the whole world. If we are keeping His commandments and obeying Him daily, then we know Jesus and know that we have eternal life. But he who sins and does not abide in Him will not be ready when Jesus comes.

LOVE ONE ANOTHER

Printed Portion 1 John 2:7-11; 3:11-18

1 John 2:7 Brethren, I write no new commandment unto you, but an old commandment which ye had from the be-

- ginning. The old commandment is the word which ye have heard from the beginning.
- 8 Again, a new commandment I write unto you, which thing is true in him and in you: because the darkness is past, and the true light now shineth.
- 9 He that saith he is in the light, and hateth his brother, is in darkness even until now.
- 10 He that loveth his brother abideth in the light, and there is none occasion of stumbling in him.
- 11 But he that hateth his brother is in darkness, and walketh in darkness, and knoweth not whither he goeth, because that darkness hath blinded his eyes.
- 3:11 For this is the message that ye heard from the beginning, that we should love one another.
- 12 Not as Cain, who was of that wicked one, and slew his brother. And wherefore slew he him? Because his own works were evil, and his brother's righteous.
 - 13 Marvel not, my brethren, if the world hate you.
- 14 We know that we have passed from death unto life, because we love the brethren. He that loveth not his brother abideth in death.
- 15 Whosoever hateth his brother is a murderer: and ye know that no murderer hath eternal life abiding in him.
- 16 Hereby perceive we the love of God, because he laid down his life for us: and we ought to lay down our lives for the brethren.
- 17 But whose hath this world's good, and seeth his brother have need, and shutteth up his bowels of compassion from him, how dwelleth the love of God in him?
- 18 My little children, let us not love in word, neither in tongue; but in deed and in truth.

Memory Verse: But he that hateth his brother is in darkness, and walketh in darkness, and knoweth not whither he goeth, because that darkness hath blinded his eyes. 1 John 2:11.

Practical Truth: Hatred cannot live in a heart with the love of God in it.

COMMENTS AND APPLICATION

When we think of God we should think of love because God is love. We should not think of Him as being a God who is just waiting for us to do evil so He can punish us. We should not fear Him because we are afraid He will send us to hell. We want to think of His great love. People choose to sin because they do not choose to love God. God has done everything to help us to do right. His plan of salvation is perfect and it will keep us from sin and bring the sweet pleasure of God upon us. We then fear to do anything to grieve the great loving heart of God. We love Him and He loves us.

Those who walk in the light have love but those who walk in darkness have hatred. Having love for our brother makes us know that we are saved. (verse 14) Love and hate will not dwell in the same heart. If we love our brother we will act like it.

Notice verse 15. It reveals to us how terrible hatred is—it is the same as murder. Then we should guard our hearts. Dislike is a cousin to hatred. That is just too close for any of us to allow it to be in our minds and hearts. Forgive and love one another.

"Abel offered unto God a more excellent sacrifice [animal] than Cain by which he obtained witness that he was righteous, God testifying of his gifts..." (Hebrews 11:4). Cain had sin in his heart, therefore God did not accept his sacrifice and Cain was wroth with Abel, which brought about murder. Anger, jealousy, and hatred grow and will show unless we get rid of them. If we have the love of God, we walk in the light.
