The Star-Crowned Woman Versus the Great Red Dragon

"And there appeared a great wonder in heaven: a woman clothed with the sun, and the moon under her feet, and upon her head a crown of twelve stars." (Rev. 12:1) Heaven here is referring to the ecclesiastical heavenly bodies of religious worship, where we meet together in a heavenly atmosphere in Christ Jesus. A woman clothed with the sun signifies the primitive Church clothed with the divine grace and righteousness of the Son of God, and the moon under her feet alludes to the Jewish tabernacle service under the First Covenant. A crown upon her head refers to her victory over the dragon and his pagan worship, sin, and the world. The twelve stars signify the twelve apostles of the Lamb which gave glory and honor to Christ and the Church-His bride.

"And she being with child cried, travailing in birth, and pained to be delivered." (Rev. 12:2) This would refer to the heavy burdens that the primitive Church carried for the lost and the prevailing effort to win souls into the kingdom of God.

"And there appeared another wonder in heaven; and behold a great red dragon, having seven heads and ten horns, and seven crowns upon his heads." (Rev. 12:3) It is a well-known historical fact that the red dragon symbolizes pagan Rome with its idolatrous worship. His red color denotes his blood thirstiness to kill, crush and trample under foot all righteousness. The heads signify seven distinct forms of government that ruled the pagan empire. His ten horns represent ten kingdoms of the empire. His crowns denote his supreme power to persecute and kill the people of God.

"And his tail drew the third part of the stars of heaven, and did cast them to the earth: and the dragon stood before the woman which was ready to be delivered, for to devour her child as soon as it was born," (Rev. 12:4) The dragon's tail doubtless refers to the latter end of his reign. Paganism stood ready to devour everyone who accepted the gospel of Christ.

"And she brought forth a man child, who was to rule all nations with a rod of iron: and her child was caught up unto God, and to his throne." (Rev. 12:5) Who is this man-child that the woman, or Church, brought forth? Some suggest that this manchild is Christ. But how could Christ be a child of the Church when He is its founder? Christ is not the offspring of the Church, but the Church is the offspring of Christ! Christ is the husband of the Church and the father of the man-child. Finding Christ is not a child of the Church, we are to look for another comparison.

Let us see what Isaiah 66:7. 8 says about this man-child: "Before she travailed, she brought forth: before her pain came, she was delivered of a man child. Who hath heard such a thing? who hath seen such things? Shall the earth be made to bring forth in one day? or shall a nation be born at once? for as soon as Zion travailed, she brought forth her children." Why is this called a man-child? A nation of children born suddenly constitutes the man-child. A host of Jews and Gentiles being born into the Church

of God, being reconciled into one spiritual body, constitutes one new man—the man-child. (Eph. 2:15)

At Jerusalem on the day of Pentecost, three thousand souls were saved. (Acts 2:41) In a few days the number increased to about ten thousand. It was but a little while until they increased to hundreds of thousands. The Church at Antioch alone numbered one-hundred thousand souls. Surely there was a "nation born at once."

What became of this man-child, that great host of saints? He "was caught up unto God, and to his throne." How was the man-child "caught up unto God, and to his throne"? A great host of primitive Christians were martyred during the reign of paganism. They suddenly disappeared from the earth and were "caught up" to paradise through martyrdom. It is said, "White robes were given unto every one of them." (Rev. 6:11) We are told that the testimony of one Christian in death's hour would often convert a large number of pagans to Christianity. Thus, the blood of the Lamb set forth in testimony "slaughtered" or converted more pagans than it was possible for the pagans to slaughter of the Christians.

The time came when the Christians far outnumbered the pagans. The pagans threw down their arms and desired admittance into the Church. "And I heard a loud voice saying in heaven, Now is come salvation, and strength, and the kingdom of our God, and the power of his Christ: for the accuser of our brethren is cast down, which accused them before our God day and night. And they overcame him by the blood of the Lamb, and by the word of their testimony; and they loved not their lives unto the death." (Rev. 12:10, 11)

Immediately after this great spiritual ingathering of souls, when the Church had won her triumphant victory over the pagan religion, the Church was told to flee into the wilderness, a place prepared of God for her retirement. The woman's flight would indicate that the Church was the defeated one, but the matter-of-fact is that the dragon prevailed not and was cast out. (Rev. 12:8) This plainly shows that the Church was the conquering party. Also, we must remember that the dragon was two-fold in his operation, religious and political. After the Church had succeeded in casting down the pagan religion, she was still beset by the dragon's political forces with the hope that he could overthrow her before she reached her place of refuge.

The wilderness signifies the spiritual distress of the Church during the twelve hundred and sixty years of apostasy which was the same period of the two witnesses — the Word and Spirit of God — in "sackcloth." These two witnesses testified throughout this twelve hundred and sixty years of spiritual darkness. But they found lodging only here and there in a few honest hearts. During this period, spiritual darkness was so great that people gave little heed to the teachings of the Gospel. —A. R. Hightower

You can laugh, dance, play, let loose and be free. You need not have any kind of restraint upon yourself. You can drink all you want, take 'trips' on dope, smoke, put no restraint on sex, pet, flatter and play." Oh, yes, the devil makes it sound great-but remember, dear precious ones, about the spider and his web. When once you let down and go in you are caught in the web of sin. You are yielding to a spirit. It's not just dancing, drinking and living loosely. You are giving yourself into the hands of a demon. "Oh," you say, "I won't go too far, but just try it for a while." precious soul, you do not stop at just a little. There is a binding force from the devil that binds you and you keep going on. There is a drawing power that you cannot resist within yourself. When you take one step downward, it calls for another step downward, Slowly, steadily, week after week, month after month, year after year you are getting deeper and more tightly bound under the power of sin and the devil. At times you become alarmed and say, "I am going to do different and change." You struggle and struggle, just like the fly, but you are held fast. Within yourself you cannot get free. The devil is a hard taskmaster. In his devilish glee he is leading you to hell.

This would be a sad state to leave anyone in, but there is hope for that soul. Jesus looks down upon that soul. He sees the hard labor that the devil puts a soul through. He sees it heavy laden with sin. He sees its struggles. He looks with compassion and He holds out loving arms, with the invitation, "Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light." Matt. 11:28-30. As you turn, in your desperation, look, and begin to seek the Lord, He will be looking for you. The Bible says, "If, from thence thou shalt seek the Lord thy God, thou shalt find him, if thou seek him with all thy heart and with all thy soul." Deut. 4:29. Seek Godly Counsel

Psalms 1:1, "Blessed is the man that walketh not in the counsel of the ungodly, nor standeth in the way of sinners, nor sitteth in the seat of the scornful."

Let us stop for just a few moments and consider what the Psalmist is talking about. He says, "Blessed is the man." What man? That man who does not do the things mentioned: in walking, standing and sitting. This takes in a great field. It would do us well to consider what counsel we are taking, if we would be blessed in so doing. Many folks will give counsel that will lead us astray from the Bible standards of faith and holy living. If we allow the influence of ungodly men and women to lead us into their ways of thinking, it will bring spiritual darkness to our souls, and soon we will be sitting in the seat of the scornful, complaining about the saints and making light of their teaching. Our soul has been moved with compassion when we see the enemy taking advantage of so many in our time. When I first read of the dress length coming so high in one of the Churches of England, I thought surely, that won't be accepted by the church-going people here in America. But, alas, the people have followed the counsel of the ungodly. The god of fashion is ruling their hearts. They have gone into gross darkness. It is indeed a shame to see some be so bold and brazen to move out as leaders, when they are following the ungodly influence of indecent dress.

What about standing in the way of sinners? The question is, How does the sinner look at us? What do they see? Do they see a spiritual, modest, humble, meek person, or do they see fads and fashions of the ungodly? It seems there is a difference in the sinner and ungodly person. 1 Peter 4:18 reads thus, "If the righteous scarcely be saved, where shall the ungodly and the sinner appear?" It seems to me a sinner is one who makes no profession, and the ungodly does, yet lives ungodly. Remember that there is no blessing if we stand in the way of sinners.

Let us encourage everyone to know that there is joy, peace, and soul contentment if we will leave all the world to follow the meek and lowly Lamb of God. The blessings are so rich that you will be glad to bear the cross for the glory it has.

As a child in school, I learned the First Psalm for memory work. Years later, when I had been deceived by Satan into sin, and the devil was setting traps for my soul, I was considering a young man who had been in a questionable marriage. The goodness and love of God brought this Scripture to my mind, "Blessed is the man that walketh not in the counsel of the ungodly, nor standeth in the way of sinners." The counsel of the ungodly would say that it would be all right, but would not that have been walking in the wrong counsel if I had gone ahead? Wouldn't my life have been a hindrance to sinners? I'm glad the light came through clear and bright to my soul. Think of it! It would be bad for my soul to be lost, and much more saddening to be the means of others being lost, too. As I said, this takes in a great field. We can't begin to bring out all of it.

One Wednesday night we had a lesson on idle words. It surely did stir up our pure minds. Even though we knew these things, it was enlightening and has been food for thought through the days since. It challenged us to be more careful, and we trust that all of us will be challenged to be more careful in holy living. Get the heart right with God, love Him supremely and all these other things will seem as nothing.

I am thankful to have a vision of the pure Church of God. There are no sinners in it. The overcomers don't walk in the counsel of the ungodly.

Some say that God does not have a standard. Where there is no standard there is confusion, and the Word of God declares that He is not the author of confusion.

Parents need to have a standard in their homes. If children are allowed to run free and rule the home, it will bring sorrow. It is the duty of parents to teach them. There is glory in suffering for the gospel. We must arm ourselves to bear some suffering if we will live godly.

When I was away from the Lord I often questioned, why did my parents have to teach me so strictly? Do you know what was the trouble? I could not see through spiritual eyes. My eyes were darkened, but thanks be to God, I was made alive by a new birth and now I see things in the light of the gospel. So if you are unable to see these things, ask yourself, am I spiritual? Have your affections been nailed to the cross? Is your heart right with God. What about it?

When we see immodest conduct, long hair on men, young and old women exposing their knees, going to beauty parlors, wearing pants or the like, does it make us feel that they have taken the way of holiness or the counsel of the ungodly? Many other things could be brought out. We trust the Lord will open up avenues that will be food for thought.

Foreign Field Reports

INTERIOR MEXICO EASTER MEETING REPORT

We [James and Charlotte Huskey, their five children and Tom Melot] left Guthrie, Okla. on Saturday, March 25, and arrived in Piedras Negras, Mexico that night. We visited Bro. Sanchez, and had service on Sunday morning. We nailed large, colored tracts to the trees in a park at the river where some sect churches were going to have a baptizing.

The population of Mexico is 48.4 million with young people making up seventy-two per cent of this number. When I see the gross wickedness and the idol worship, it grieves my heart to think that there is no missionary from the church in the States in interior Mexico. The harvest is great, but the laborers are few.

We came to Saltillo on Sunday and visited Oswaldo de La Cruz, a pastor of the so-called First Church of God. He permitted us to sleep on the church floor, for which we were thankful. He was for a more conservative doctrine, but blamed liberalism on the people.

I want to tell you of how the Lord supplied our needs in one instance. At Eagle Pass, Texas the Lord directed us to a certain gas station. A man asked, "Are you missionaries?" I said, "Yes, how did you know?" He said he could just tell by the long dress, and our appearance. We talked awhile, and he said, "Wait here." In a few minutes he came back with two boxes of Bibles. We asked him how much he wanted for them and he said his calling was to give Bibles to missionaries. We praised the Lord for this, as we hadn't been able to get any yet. They don't sell them in most places in Mexico.

We stopped in Los Llanos and handed out food, clothing and tracts. They are very poor there.

At San Luis Potosi, we visited a big Catholic temple. Inside were all manner of idols. One was a figure of Jesus lying in a coffin with a money slot in it and a note on it asking for money. One boy was praying to a statue. The whole country is steeped in idolatry.

We traveled on to a place called Rancho Martinez. There we camped outside the walls. The next morning we ate breakfast with about a dozen people watching us. We had a good service at ten o'clock. About thirty were present. About 400 children are there. They have an old Catholic building for church, but no one has services there anymore. I have a burden for this place. They are

very ignorant. Surely someone needs to feel the call and say, "Here am I." This is a wonderful opportunity for someone who would dedicate his or her life to teaching these people about practical and spiritual matters. This is a good place for a saved couple. Here, Rosa got very sick with dysentary, as far as we could tell.

Brother Miguel Gaspar was in Uruapan when we arrived. The brethren needed much encouragement. We feel that we were in the order of the Lord, and the Lord blessed our few days' meeting. Most of the Huskey family got sick, but the Lord healed them, some instantly. Praise God! The Lord kept me well, for which I'm very thankful.

The Catholic priest was having a lottery over a loud speaker. He urged the people to run us out. Some boys and men came up to our place, and the brothers invited them in for service. They sat attentively for quite awhile. One was an engineer and teacher. He asked questions, and the day we left, his wife came back and wanted to know about the little book, the "New Testament." She said she had always heard that Protestants were people who believed in the devil. These people have never read the Bible, and have never been mixed up in any religion other than Catholicism. Here at Irineo Rama's home they have service any time the people come. They don't have a set form of worship. Brother Rama receives much persecution because of his stand for the truth. He has the walls of the new chapel building a few feet up, and needs much prayer for this work.

The dear saints wept when we left Bro. Rama's. It is so isolated. They appreciate any who come to help them with the gospel work. They are Tarascan Indian people. They also need a worker to teach them the basic

doctrines of the Bible.

The Lord supplied Bro. James Huskey with a nearly new van truck in which to make the trip. We were very thankful for it. There were eight of us, and we were comfortable. The Lord supplied all our needs. On this 10-day trip, we traveled over 3,100 miles, and the Lord brought us safely back to Guthrie on April 2.

Another Trip Planned

We are planning, Lord willing, on making another trip to southern Mexico, starting June 29. Our main interest on this trip is to perhaps acquaint some younger saints with the missionary life, and the need for workers in the foreign fields.

We are extending an invitation to anyone who would be interested, and who has a burden for this project to contact Bro. James Huskey or this office. The effort would be in distributing tracts, Bibles, food, clothing, and learning the customs of the people. Also, we would be camping and cooking out, with a few stops in hotels. We would be visiting some very backward areas and Indian villages. We will have services whenever possible, with stops at points of interest, such as the volcano which began erupting near the village where Irineo lived when he was just a baby.

Please let us know soon of your interest, or if you can sponsor a young person who could make the trip. We will furnish more details on the cost and personal needs

upon request

We plan to have saved parents for chaperones. Any one who feels led to take a car and help chaperone will be appreciated. We are looking to the Lord to supply the spiritual leaders and the necessary automobiles for this tour. We plan to be gone about twenty days.

The school superintendent told me I'd have to have her examined by a medical doctor to see if the infection was contagious, for the protection of the other children. I picked her up at school and drove to the Printshop for prayer. Sister Marie. Bro. Lawrence, and others who were working there at the time, anointed her, laid hands on her and prayed. Then I took her to the doctor. He told me it was a type of ring-worm which spread rapidly on the body of the person who already had it, but that it was not very contagious to others. "You may send her to school. Here is a prescription; put it all over her body twice daily and it should begin to clear up in about two weeks. If it doesn't, come back and we will try something else." I said, "Thank you," walked out of his office and went home. We did not need to have the prescription filled because we had already followed the instructions given by the Word of God for the sick. Jas. 5:14, 15a, "Is any sick among you? let him call for the elders of the church; and let them pray over him anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord: and the prayer of faith shall save the sick and the Lord shall raise him up." Within a week the infection, which covered almost all her trunk and legs, was gone. Thank the Lord!

Another marvelous answer to prayer came during the Christmas holidays. Leah, our youngest child, fell while playing and broke her collar bone. She was a very sick girl for about three days. She could not move nor be moved in any way without severe pain during those three days and nights. In the afternoon of the third day she became bright and said, "I'll be well by Christmas because four different ones have come to pray for me." She was well, too. Our Experience with Television or, What God Thinks of TV

After we escaped from behind the Iron Curtain in 1948, when the Communists took power overnight in our country, we succeeded in crossing the border to West Germany and later we emigrated to the United States.

While in refugee camp in Germany with my wife, our lives were severely tested. Since we did not have Christian training, we had no strength to withstand the onslaughts of Satan and decided to be divorced. Sin and pride were the reasons, but God in His mercy sent us a Christian paper from the United States, in our own language. In this paper we read the testimonies of God's people, men and women from different walks of life, and how God had changed their lives, taken the misery, hatred and jealousy out of their lives and replaced them with peace, joy and happiness. Others also testified how God had reunited their broken homes.

When I read this paper, there was a light and there was a hope for me. I cried out to God, "Oh, God, if you will save me and give me what these people have, I will serve you the rest of my days." As a result of that cry, now after many years, we have a happy Christian home, including all our children saved, as well as other relatives, including mother-in-law and father-in-law.

When we finally emigrated to the United States, we decided to live for God with all our hearts. For a while we lived with some folks who claimed to be Christians, but had a TV in their home. Now I knew, somehow, from the beginning, that since movies and theaters were wrong for a Christian to attend, it must be equally wrong to watch TV. So every night after supper and fellowship, I excused myself from the group, and after reading my Bible and praying, I went to bed. The rest of the family, including my wife, watched TV programs into the wee hours of the night. She would watch only those things that she thought were not too bad to watch, love stories, etc.

One night, as she was watching a love story with the rest of that family where we lived, God spoke to her in no uncertain tone, "Are you watching that stuff?"

She was convicted, but the power of the story was so great that she wanted to see the end of it, and then quickly retire for the night.

Again, God spoke, "Are you watching that stuff?" It was repeated three times. She would become very uneasy, but turning on the other side, she would watch from the corner of her eye, sitting sideways to the TV. "Oh, just to see the end," she would say. The story seemed to be so interesting and exciting that she was captivated by it. Though she knew that the Voice warned her not to watch it, she tried to brush it aside, to ignore it.

Then it happened, suddenly and unexpectedly! From the clear sky a sudden storm came up and the roaring thunder shook the house. The lightning flashed, and now they all were stirred and jumped from their seats. The son of the family remarked, "Oh, this is dangerous, we had better shut that thing off. It could easily strike through the antenna into the TV." So they quickly shut it off and went into the next room. As they were ready to drop to their knees to pray, the lightning struck and hit the house and cut through the window of the same room where they intended to pray, hitting between my wife and the landlady, paralyzing one side of each of them. My wife screamed and she was expecting to fall; so was the landlady. They were waiting for the worst to happen. They thought that some of them would die.

I was sleeping about two or three rooms away, but when the thunder shook the house, I awakened and heard the cries and the commotion going on in the house. Being half asleep, I thought I heard thunder, but then I could smell fire and brimstone.

I ran to see what I could do for my family in their distress. I learned the full story of what had happened. My wife, Mary, sobbing and crying, confessed how God had spoken to her three times not to watch that stuff.

When she said that, the boy of the family spoke up and said to his mother, "Mommy, God spoke to me and told me not to watch that stuff."

Then his sister quickly said, "I have to admit that I, too, seemed to hear the Voice, that I should not watch television."

When the mother of these children observed this fearful situation, and heard their testimonies of how God spoke, she said, "I will not tolerate this TV in our home anymore. It will have to get out of here, and I will do it right away tomorrow."

Strange as it may seem, as we moved away from this home, many years later we found out that the TV is still there. As a result of this outright disobedience, the whole family is backslidden today, including all their children.

God has spoken! The Bible says that when God speaks the mountains tremble. The sad thing is that many Christians don't tremble at His Word. We hope that this story will awaken many Christians to the fact that we live in the last days and that Jesus is coming soon. We pray that all will seek God with all their hearts to please Him, to do His will, and to keep His commandments every day. It is written that "I will set no wicked thing before mine eyes." (Psalms 101:3). What we need today is heavenly vision instead of television.

Jesus said, "Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." Matt. 11:28-30.

I was wondering how many Christians have weighed the above text, or how many have considered the exact meaning? Many are going around carrying burdens that I am convinced are not theirs.

Again Jesus said, "Lay not up for yourselves treasures upon earth, . . . But lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, . . . For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also. . . . But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you." Matt. 6:19-21, 33. The reason for a lot of unnecessary burdens is that folks are breaking the above commandments, then seeking God's help to get them out. But Jesus said, "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and his righteousness," then, "all these things shall be added unto you." These unnecessary burdens keep us from hear-

ing the ones we ought to bear, like, "Bear ye one another's burdens."

It is our side of the yoke that is made easy, if we go God's way. Too many, I'm afraid, are trying to carry the Lord's part. We have enough to do, and will do well, if we will "Commit thy way unto the Lord: trust also in him: and he shall bring it to pass." Psa. 37:5. How many times have we committed a thing to the Lord, then set about to bring it to pass? Or, somebody has said. "God helps them that help themselves." Why should we lie awake nights trying to figure out God's part of the bargain? Or, how is God going to work it out? Chances are He will never work it out the way you thought He would. Our part is to "commit," then go about our business, knowing that surely God can be relied upon. When He says He will bring it to pass, He will bring it to pass, remembering that He said, "Heaven and earth shall pass away: but my words shall not pass away." Luke 21:33. "And the scripture cannot be broken." John 10:35. "If ye abide in me, and my words abide in you, ye shall ask what ye will, and it shall be done unto you." John 15:7.

"Delight thyself also in the Lord; and he shall give thee the desires of thine heart." Psa. 37:4. Delight thyself also in the Lord. This is a worthy pursuit that might take a lot of your time, but when fulfilled, you become lost in the Savior, for the love you have for Him. Nothing else seems to matter. What He wants, you want. The consuming fire seems to burn out the dross, and your desires fade away, until you can say, "Thy will be done." You need not pry into His workings. He is bound by His Word. Your part is, "Have faith in God." "Delight thyself in the Lord." He is bound by His Word to fulfill the desires of your heart, that have grown out of your delighting yourself in Him, according to His riches in Glory.

"For the Lord God is a sun and shield: the Lord will give grace and glory: no good thing will he withhold from them that walk uprightly. O Lord of hosts, blessed is the man that trusteth in thee." Psa. 84:11, 12. I wonder how many have dwelt on God's part of that promise, "No good thing will he withhold." If we had been concentrating on "walking uprightly," we wouldn't have spent so much time reminding God of His promise. Our part is "fulfilling conditions," then God will keep His part of the bargain.

"Trust in the Lord with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding. In all thy ways acknowledge him, and he shall direct thy paths. Be not wise in thine own eyes: fear the Lord, and depart from evil." Prov. 3:5-7. We need not keep our eye on these promises as if there were something the matter with them. The promises are true, but we are paying more attention to God's part than to ours. Abide in Him. "Take up thy cross and follow me. He that taketh not his cross, and followeth after me, is not worthy of me,"

"Hast thou not known? hast thou not heard, that the everlasting God, the Lord, the Creator of the ends of the earth, fainteth not, neither is weary? there is no searching of His understanding. He giveth power to the faint; and to them that have no might he increaseth strength. But they that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run, and not be weary; and they shall walk, and not faint." Isa. 40:28, 29, 31.

The Word is full of promises to them that wait upon God. Concentrate on pleasing God and bearing fruit. Put Him first in everything you do. "Men ought always to pray and not faint." If you feel lacking in anything, ask God to supply and help you in your shortcomings. And remember to "Delight thyself also in the Lord; and he shall give thee the desires of thine heart."
