The Church of "Evening Time"

The early morning Church had received the truth from Christ and the Apostles. They received the truth about the Church of the New Testament and how man should live if he was to please God. If we know anything about history, we know that through the Dark Ages of several hundreds of years many of these fundamental truths were lost to the multitudes.

Later the Spirit of God began to move upon the hearts of men, light began to shine, and truth began to come forth once again. Martin Luther, a priest, saw that the just shall live by faith, and then he tried to clean out the corruption of the Roman Catholic church. This he did not succeed in doing, but he did bring forth the doctrine of justification by faith, that is, being born again as Jesus said.

In time others began to receive light, and truths began to come forth. Among these was Charles Wesley, who was convicted and found that justification was not enough. He sought for and obtained the second definite work of grace, which was called by the Methodists, the second blessing. It was actually the infilling of the Holy Spirit upon the eradication of the carnal nature inherited from Adam after his fall from grace.

We then come to the late 1870's and early 1880's and find the Holy Spirit moving upon the hearts of a number of God's children. Among them was D. S. Warner, who became the leader of the Evening Time Movement, whose goal was to restore all of the truths of the Morning Time Church: justification by faith, sanctification by faith, divine healing by faith, the inspiration of the Scriptures, holiness of life in this present world, and the one God of the Bible with three persons in the God-head. They were also to stand with open minds and hearts for any truth that they did not have. This should still be the stand of Christians today and will be if they are to remain Christian.

This "Evening Time" Church has a definite message for the sinner world: turn to God repenting of sin with godly sorrow or you will be eternally lost. This message is still true today. The message

is also definite that in order to live a victorious and godly life in this world, one needs the infilling of the Holy Spirit with the eradication of the carnal nature. They also believe in divine physical healing through faith and obedience to God's Word.

The Church also has a definite message for the denominational church world: it is wrong and even sin to join a church, for it divides God's people, and division is sin. The Evening Light Movement suffered persecution. One time D. S. Warner had to hide under a house to get away from a denominational mob. Christ said in one place, "They hated me and they will hate you." If we are not being persecuted today, it may be we have left truth and are not standing for anything to be persecuted for. All who live close to God will be persecuted. Where are the people today that have open minds and hearts for any truth which they do not have and sincerely desire to have? Where are the people today that actually have a God-given vision of the New Testament Church? To many it is just a church among churches. The Church of God still preaches for God's people to come out of the divisions and be not unequally yoked together with unbelievers, for any church you can join has sinners in it. The people of God must walk in the light of God's Word or backslide. We as individuals, or as a movement can refuse the light (truth) of God's Word and go into darkness and still think all is well, spiritually

You may disagree with these truths, but please think about them, and above all, pray about them, if you sincerely want to get to heaven. There is but one way, and that is God's way.

May God help us all to say, "Yes" and from henceforth make it more and more true.

An Example of Our Sin-sick Society

Once upon a time there lived a little girl called Red Riding Hood. One day her mother asked her to take a basket of fruit to her grandmother, who lived alone in a cottage in the forest. It happened that a wolf was lurking in the bushes and overheard the conversation. He decided to take a short-cut to Grandmother's house and get the goodies for himself. The wolf killed and ate the grandmother, then dressed in her nightgown and jumped into bed to await the little girl. When she arrived, he tried to grab her, but this frightened the child and she ran screaming from the cottage. A woodcutter heard her cries and rushed to the rescue. He killed the wolf with his ax, saving Red Riding Hood's life. All the towns-people hurried to the scene and proclaimed the woodcutter a hero. But at the inquest several facts emerged:

The wolf had not be advised of his rights.
 The woodcutter had made no warning swings before striking the fatal blow that killed the wolf.

3. The Civil Liberties Union stressed the point that, although the act of eating Grandma may have been in bad taste, the wolf was only "doing his thing."

4. The Students for a Democratic Society contended that the killing of Grandma should be considered self-defence since she was over 30, and therefore, couldn't be taken seriously because the wolf was trying to make love, not war.

On the basis of these considerations, the wood-cutter was indicted for aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. Several nights later, the woodcutter's cottage was burned to the ground. One year from the date of "the incident at Grandma's," her cottage was made a shrine for the wolf who had bled and died there. All the village officials spoke at the dedication, but it was Red Riding Hood who gave the most touching tribute. She said that, while she had been selfishly grateful for the woodcutter's intervention, she realized in retrospect that he had over-reacted. As she knelt and placed a wreath in honor of the brave wolf, there wasn't a dry eye in the whole forest.

This reverse theology is in full swing today, and because of one reason—when men forget God, corruption takes over.

Not One of Jesus' Bones Was Broken . . .

"But when they [the soldiers] came to Jesus, and saw that he was dead already, they brake not his legs." John 19:33. "For these things were done, that the scripture should be fulfilled, A bone of him shall not be broken." John 19:36. In surveying the crucifixion scene, it is noted that the legs were broken of two thieves who were crucified with Jesus, but in the plan of salvation for mankind the divine decree stated that "a bone of him shall not be broken." The reference is to the prophecy in Exodus 12:46 which reads, "In one house shall it be eaten; thou shalt not carry forth ought of the flesh abroad out of the house; neither shall ye break a bone thereof." This instruction was given to the ancient Israelites with reference to their annual observance of the Passover feast which they were commanded to keep in memory of their deliverance from Egyptian bondage. They selected and killed a perfect lamb in observance of the Passover-the time when the death angel passed over the houses of the Israelites who had the lamb's blood sprinkled on their doorposts. The flesh of the lamb was to be eaten in one house and not

carried abroad with the specific instruction, "Neither shall ye brake a bone of it." That lamb of the ancient Passover feast is a type and shadow of our Saviour Jesus Christ, the perfect Lamb of God, who became our Passover by the sacrifice of Himself on Calvary's cross. Read 1 Cor. 5:7. As it was in the type likewise it was in the antitype—not a bone was broken. This was in the divine decree for a specific reason and purpose. In turn, Christ's sacrificial body is in some points a type and symbol of His spiritual Body—the Church of the living God which was purchased by His own blood. In His physical body there were no broken bones, neither are there any broken bones in His spiritual Body, the Bride of Christ. Broken bones in a body would make it like a jelly fish with no stability, subject to every slight pressure from any angle. Unbroken bones in a body would make it stable, stalwart, and steadfast, and not easily moved by opposing forces. Therefore we note that Jesus Himself boldly declared, "And I say unto thee, That thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." Matt. 16:18. Thank God for the Church triumphant over every foe. The divine decree is that not a bone in the Church of God, Jesus' spiritual Body, shall ever be broken, for She is solid and secure on the Rock of Ages. Praise the Lord! 0-0-0-0-0-0

Question and Answer Column

Questions: What kind of a body did Jesus have when He arose from the dead?

Answer: In regard to this question, I am reminded of what I heard a prominent Bible teacher, conference speaker, and preacher say a while back. He said that as a Bible teacher and conference speaker, he had many questions put to him and he always had an answer for every question. Then he went on to say that many times his answer was, "I don't know." That is my answer to this question: "I don't know." And I can add to that, "I don't know how or where to find out."

Since the question is presented and we are into it, I might notice a few points in regard to it which do not in any way answer the question as it is phrased. The text in 1 Tim. 3:16 is pertinent to the discussion. It reads thus, "And without controversy great is the mystery of godliness: God was manifest in the flesh,

justified in the Spirit, seen of angels, preached unto the Gentiles, believed on in the world, received up into glory." The incarnation of Jesus Christ (God manifest in the flesh) is a great mystery. Likewise is the resurrected body of Christ a great mystery. It seems to me that just as it was necessary for Jesus to possess a dual nature (both divine and human) in carrying out the phase of His ministry and redemptive work down here upon the earth and introducing God to man; so it would still be necessary for Him to possess the same dual nature yonder in heaven where He has gone to engage in His intercessory ministry and represent man to God and make intercession for us. In order for His intercessory ministry to be effective in a full measure with the Father, it would be necessary for Him to have a body with the scars and marks on it (nail prints in His hands and feet, and the spear gash in His side) which He received at Calvary where His redemptive work was fully accomplished and fulfilled to show before the Father as He interceded and pled for mercy for sinful men.

Many times when praying for people who are critically ill and need special mercy from God, I say to God the Father in my prayer, "Father, please look upon your Son as He stands in Your presence right now to intercede for us and plead with you for mercy and look especially on those stripes on His back and remember that they were placed there for the healing of the people." (Isa. 53:5 and 1 Pet. 2:24). This thought has often added inspiration and faith to my prayer in urgent cases.

We know for certain that the body of Jesus arose and came out of the sepulchre. It was the same body that was buried that arose. When certain of His followers came to the sepulchre on the morning of the resurrection with spices to anoint His body they found the stone rolled away and they went into the sepulchre and "found not the body of the Lord Jesus." His body had gotten up and walked away from there alive, and the tomb was empty. That resurrected body had the wounds and marks in it that caused His death, and He drew special attention to this when He appeared to His disciples and told them to, "Behold my hands and my feet" (Luke 24:39), and proceeded to say, "Handle me, and see; for a spirit hath not flesh and bones as ye see me have." He convinced Thomas of His identity in the same way (John 20:26-30). He ate fish and honeycomb in their presence (Luke 24:41-43).

This body was different from what it had been during the time of his ministry and work with His disciples. In this body He could appear, disappear and reappear. In Luke 24:31, He just vanished out of their sight. In John 20:26, He appeared to His disciples right through a closed door. This was a spiritual body, but it was not a spirit as Jesus Himself declared in Luke 24:39. His body was sown a natural body; it was raised a spiritual body (1 Cor. 15:44).

According to Acts 2:27, the body of Jesus never saw any corruption. God never allowed it to stay in the tomb long enough for decomposition to set in. But in the process of resurrection, His body underwent a change. The glorious thing about all this for us is that the same change will happen to us in the morning of the resurrection on that last great day. "We shall rise and be like Him, when we see Him as He is." Phil. 3:21 says, "Who shall change our vile body, that it may be fashioned like unto His glorious body." 1 Cor. 15:51, 52, says, "Behold, I show you a mystery; we shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed, in a moment in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trump: for the trumpet shall sound, and the dead shall be raised incorruptible, and we shall be changed."

In that last great day every living saint upon the earth shall be changed in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, and put on that same kind of body Christ had when He arose from the dead. In that body we will rise right up from the earth just like He did, and straight upward we will fly to meet the Lord in the air to forever be with Him. Inspiring, glorious, and wonderful thought!

All of this, both His and ours, is a mystery and called so in the Scriptures. It is all in the hands of God, and both Christ's resurrection and ours are works of the power of God. The nature of the resurrection and the changes that are to take place are reserved with God, only to be revealed to us in that day. As far as I can see from here on, we will just have to leave it that way with the Lord and in that day we will understand it all. 1 John 3:2, tells us that it does not yet appear what we shall be, but that when He appears we shall see Him as He is and be like Him. Only if we could tell what we shall be, would we be able to tell how Christ was at His resurrection and how He is now, for we will be just like Him, but the Scripture states plainly that we do not know that. It is all reserved with the Lord Himself until then.

Our Consolation Through Christ

Sorrow has a way of twisting one's heart and then twisting it again. The ache is so deep that it seems a person can't live under the severity of it. As the child of God bows upon his knees before the Lord, the tears flow, which can't be controlled. The body trembles and shivers under the heaviness of it all. The mind is dulled, and the groanings and sighings are prayers unuttered. But finally, the child of God looks up and prays, "Oh, God, I love you. Take me Home to be with You and out of this terrible trouble. I can't bear any more. Have mercy upon me!" A fresh flood of tears gushes out and the person reels under the pressure of the deep sorrow. The unanswered question floods in upon the mind. Again the child of God cries, "Oh, Lord, what shall I do?"

Jesus, the One who is "touched by the feelings of our infirmities," is sitting on the right hand of God. He is looking down and sees His suffering child. He is waiting for him to deepen down a little more into humility. He is waiting for those words that speak from the heart that will bring His sweet, comforting Spirit to that child's aid. Finally, the suffering child cries out, "Oh, Lord, not my will, but Thine be done!" Jesus hears those words. He sees the utter submission to the will of God and his desire for it more than any selfish desire. The Spirit of God comes and touches the soul of God's child. The sharpness of that deep sorrow is lifted. The tears begin to dry up. The mind takes in the fact that God does care and that He has every thing under His control. The soul begins to trust God's wisdom as well as His power. The problems are still there and the future is still unknown, but again the Spirit of Christ whispers, "Live one minute at a time." The soul cries out, "Help me, Lord, to do that! Help me to keep it all committed to Thee!" The Scripture then comes to the mind, brought by the Holy Spirit, "Be content with such things as ye have: for he hath said, I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee." Heb. 13:5. Then there is a new flood of tears. This time they are tears of thanksgiving. The child of God prays, "It doesn't matter what happens to me in this world, just as long as I have Thee with me. Help me to face life with all its problems, and to be a worker for You. Thank You for Your comforting Spirit that is with me." As the child of God lingers on his knees, he feels the soothing Spirit of God comforting and touching Him through and through. He rises and washes his face. He turns to take care of the duties of life. Soon the sorrow and ache of the heart are so lightened that he goes out to face the world. He will go to meeting and is able to sing from his heart the songs of Zion and to lift up his voice in praise and honor to the One who is the Comforter of all in trouble. He remembers the Scriptures, "For as the sufferings of Christ abound in us, so our consolation also aboundeth by Christ." 2 Cor. 1:5.

I hear you say, "Yes, I have had help like that, but it hit me again." It may come again and again, but, dear child of God, don't forget from what source you drew your help. Go again to the Lord. Humble yourself again before Him. Cry out your heart again to the God of all comfort. Again receive help and rise and go forth. The second time you will be stronger. The heartache will be less, even though conditions have not changed, and maybe new problems have been added. They may stand like a mountain before you, but God has said that He would "make a way in the mountain." Look above the circumstances and see Christ. Jesus trod the way before you. Believe Him when He said that He "was tempted in all points . . . as we are, yet without sin." (Heb. 4:15) He was rejected and cast out by those He loved. He wept and knows all about our sorrows and heartaches in this life. He has said, "In the world ye shall have tribulation: but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world." (John 16:33) "Let not your heart be troubled." (John 14:1)

Dear child of God, who is facing a problem that has broken your heart, look up to God. Maybe life in all its complications has crowded in and the way looks dark. Look away from it all and look to Jesus. Remember that our "consolation . . . aboundeth in Christ." Jesus is the One who "comforteth us in all

our tribulation." (2 Cor. 1:5,4) He is the way out for you; otherwise, the devil might tempt you to take your own life. Problems get severe, but taking one's own life is the way to hell. Your way out is through Christ.

I know by experience that God can heal heartaches, even though it might take time for you to really submit all into His hands. He is patient, and knows how to help us. A person is never the same after going through some deep sorrow.
