True Christianity

There is some danger of falling into a soft and effeminate Christianity, under the plea of a lofty and ethereal theology. Christianity was born for endurance: not an exotic, but a hardy plant, braced by the keen wind; not languid, nor childish, nor cowardly. It walks with strong step and erect frame; it is kindly, but firm, it is gentle, but honest, it is calm, but not facile; obliging, but not imbecile; decided, but not churlish. It does not fear to speak the stern word of condemnation against error, nor to raise its voice against surrounding evils, under the pretext it is not of this world; it does not shrink from giving honest reproof, lest it come under the charge of displaying an unchristian spirit. It calls sin sin, on whomsoever it is found, and would rather risk the accusation of being actuated by a bad spirit than not discharge an explicit duty. Let us not misjudge strong words used in honest controversy. Out of the heat a viper may come forth; but we shake it off and feel no harm. The religion of both Old and New Testaments is marked by fervent outspoken testimonies against evil. To speak smooth things in such a case may be sentimentalism, but it is not Christianity. It is a betrayal of the cause of truth and righteousness. If anyone should be frank, manly, honest, cheerful (I do not say blunt or rude, for a Christian must be courteous and polite); it is he who has tasted that the Lord is gracious, and is looking for and hasting unto the coming of the day of God. I know that charity covereth a multitude of sins; but it does not call evil good, because a good man has done it; it does not excuse inconsistencies, because the inconsistent brother has a high name and a fervent spirit. Crookedness and worldliness are still crookedness and worldliness, though exhibited in one who seems to have reached no common height of attainment.

"Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye stedfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord." 1 Cor. 15:58.

Christ's Holiness

That which casts the most radiant halo of glory over the life of Jesus of Nazareth is the spotless purity of His character. Many persons have been noted for their piety and benevolence insomuch that their names are enrolled in honor on the tablets of history; but never was there a life so pure and exemplary as that of the lowly Nazarene. From His birth holiness was a part of His nature. The Psalmist gives a beautiful account of Him in the following words, "In the beauties of holiness from the womb of the morning: thou hast the dew of thy youth." Psa. 110:3. While He possessed no marked physical charms, had "no form nor comeliness," yet, as we consider His holiness as well as His other attributes, we behold Him, indeed the "fairest among ten thousand, and the one altogether lovely.'

Man is conceived in sin, and is by nature a child of wrath. If he attains to holiness it is only received through the merit of another. But not so with the "Son of man." He possessed in Himself original and absolute holiness. One apostle in writing of Him says, "For such a high priest became us, who is holy, harmless, undefiled, separate from sinners, and made higher than the heavens." Heb. 7:26. By this we understand that it was necessary according to the plan of God that He be possessed of this attribute in order that He might atone for the sins of the world. In fact, the prophets who prophesied of Him, and the ceremonies and types of the Old Testament all pointed to this kind of Redeemer.

The sacrificial offering under the law must be without spot or blemish. It was the duty of the officiating priest to examine the sacrifice in order that no crippled or defective animal be offered. Peter assigns a reason for this in the following words: "Forasmuch as ye know that ye were not redeemed with corruptible things as silver and gold, from your vain conversation received by tradition from your fathers; but by the precious blood of Christ, as of a lamb without blemish and without spot." 1 Pet. 1:18,19.

But the apostle does not stop here, he informs that Christ came into the world not only to redeem us but that He also left us an example that we should follow in his steps: "who did no sin, neither was guile found in his mouth." 1 Pet. 2:21, 22. Hence we must consider Him, and imitate His life and character. Having put off the old man we must "put on the new man, which after God is created in right-eousness and true holiness." Eph. 4:22-24. "For if the first-fruit be holy, the lump is also holy: and if the root be holy, so are the branches." Rom. 11:16.

How great is God's mercy in providing means whereby we may be partakers of this precious fruit! While we behold Him in all the essential purity of His character, it is the Father's design that we be conformed to the same image. "But we all with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from glory to glory even as by the Spirit of the Lord." 2 Cor. 3:18. And,

again, "when he shall appear, we shall be like him; for we shall see him as he is. And every man that hath this hope in him purifieth himself, even as he is pure." 1 John 3:2, 3. —G. Q. Coplin

Filled With Knowledge of His Will

In the apostle's prayer for the Colossian Church he desired that they be filled with the knowledge of the will of God in all wisdom and spiritual understanding. In thinking of the necessity of being filled with the knowledge of God's will, we see that it was no more important for the saints in that day than it is for us in this day where there are so many deceptions and schemes of the wicked one to cause us to lose our spirituality. The knowledge of God's will is every thing to us, for unless we seek and obtain this knowledge and apply it in every detail of our life, we will find our feet ensnared by some of the many deceptions around us. It is only the knowledge of God's will that out-generals the shrewd plots of the enemy. In our human knowledge and judgment Satan will most certainly prove too much for us. This is where we are so much in danger of failing. We sometimes think we have some good knowledge and judgment of our own, and attempt to make use of it in spiritual things, but it cannot accomplish the right object. Satan can play with us at his own pleasure as long as we depend upon defeating him by this means. It is the knowledge that God gives of spiritual things that secures for us the victory.

In our present opportunities in the clear evening light, we have much knowledge at our command if we but make use of it. There never was an age or a reformation with so much knowledge of spiritual things. The pages of God's Holy Word never were so illuminated to a people on earth as they are now to the saints in light. The momentous problems that have puzzled the minds of men and women of other generations, and have been hidden from many who desired to look into them, are now revealed to us by the Holy Spirit. In reading the history of our fathers, we see how they welcomed with joy every ray of light that came to them, and many prophesied of the clearer light that would soon shine. They walked in all the light they had, and many sealed their testimonies to the same with their own blood. They

How precious to know the will of God concerning us in this dark world! In it we are safe; it is the sweetest treasure on earth, for in it we have every good thing. It is the safest place on earth and it assures us of the glory of the world to come. We do not want to see how near we can get to the outside of His will and still be in it, but we want to keep in the very center of it day and night, for here flows the grace and joy from the throne of God. God gives this light and knowledge for our spiritual protection, and there is no excuse for our being ignorant of His will, nor of the devices of Satan. The more we know about God, the more we know about the enemy, for it is the knowledge of God that exposes the enemy. This is all for our safety in this life, and for our entrance into heaven. Our failing to obtain this knowledge and to retain it, means our failing to gain heaven. There is danger of looking upon this too carelessly and becoming negligent in the daily application of this heavenly knowledge. We must look diligently, lest we fail to apply it. May God help us to cherish it above everything on earth and to be filled continually with it. -J. W. Byers

Do not allow anything in yourself, you would not want developed in your child.

The noble and pure man or woman you want to see in your child, let it be a reflection of what he sees in you. Weeds grow very easily, but good fruitful plants, need great care and tender, patient tending. It requires an effort to live pure and holy, just as it requires great care and labor to keep your garden clean and free from noxious plants.

The world is full of unholy and evil instructors, who are at every turn ready to find your children, but with the foundation of purity, have them forearmed and fore-warned, and they can, to a great extent, judge and choose for themselves. Many parents say they want to keep their children's minds pure and innocent, hence neglecting to tell them things they should know, because they think they will find them out for themselves. Yes, dear parents, they will find them out sooner or later, and from what source? You may find out sooner or later that they have had more information than you had any idea they had, and of what nature is it? Be warned, and you yourself see to the information your child needs.

There is a vast difference between ignorance and innocence, and remember that your child can not always stay in innocent ignorance—knowlege will come through some medium. Be your own child's instructor; then you will know what his needs are, and supply the information as he has need.

Cruden's Concordance defines the conscience as "that God-given faculty within us which decides as to the moral quality of our thoughts, words, and acts. The conscience can be educated, or trained to recognize good and evil, but its action is involuntary. A good conscience is one which has no feeling of reproach against oneself, and does not accuse oneself of wilful wrong. Acts 24:16."

What will bring a good conscience? "How much more shall the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself without spot to God, purge your conscience from dead works to serve the living God." Heb. 9:14. "Having our hearts sprinkled from an evil conscience." Heb. 10:22.

What kind of a conscience would God's people have? "Now the end of the commandment is charity out of a pure heart, and of a good conscience." 1 Tim. 1:5. "Holding the mystery of faith in a pure conscience." 1 Tim. 3:9.

What brings real joy to the child of God? "For our rejoicing is this, the testimony of our conscience." 2 Cor. 1:12. "I say the truth in Christ, I lie not, my conscience also bearing me witness in the Holy Ghost." Rom. 9:1. "Beloved, if our heart condemn us not, then have we confidence toward God." First John 3:21.

When unenlightened by the truth, is the conscience always a safe guide? No. The Apostle Paul wrote thus of his misguided actions before his conversion: "I verily thought with myself, that I ought to do many things contrary to the name of Jesus of Nazareth." Acts 26:9.

Direct communication was taken up with the congregations who channeled their donations through you....

Preparation to get the chapel roofed is under way. Twenty-nine of the estimated forty bundles of corrugated iron sheets for the roof have been bought. The next expensive item is that of planks to carry or support the roof. Faith in God will bring the building to completion.

An evangelistic meeting of three days' duration was held at the town of Ezionum, attendance of which by the inhabitants was massive. Response to the altar call after each day's meeting was encouraging.

In our house to house witnessing, a lady by the name of Alice Odili, aged 31, greatly vexed with unclean spirits, was discovered abandoned in a small, dusty, dark room with her leg chained to the trunk of a tree to restrict her movements, as she posed a threat to life, chasing people about with a matchet and being destructive to property. . . . The evil spirits were commanded in Jesus' name to move out of Alice forthwith, and they obeyed! Praise the Lord! To God be the glory for the mighty work being done in His name! Question and Answer Column

By Ostis B. Wilson

Question: Can you explain why Cain's offering was rejected and Abel's offering was accepted as in Genesis 4:3-5?

Answer: I do not know if I can explain this to anyone's satisfaction other than my own, but I will try according to my best understanding. The Scripture referred to reads thus: "And in process of time it came to pass, that Cain brought of the fruit of the ground an offering unto the Lord. And Abel, he also brought of the firstlings of his flock and of the fat thereof. And the Lord had respect unto Abel and to his offering: but unto Cain and to his offering he had not respect. And Cain was very wroth, and his countenance fell."

It seems evident that the practice of making offerings to the Lord had already been established at this time and a time appointed for them because the text reads, "In process of time" this happened. And it seems to indicate that both Cain and Abel showed up at the place at the same time as if by appointment. Cain was a tiller of the soil (farmer) and he brought an offering of the produce from his labor (the fruit of the ground). This has always been an acceptable offering to God, and He commanded the children of Israel at the time of their harvests to present the first fruits of their wheat, barley, olives, and the like to the Lord, and said in Num. 18:12-13, that the best of these things which the children of Israel offered to the Lord was to be given to the priests as their portion. So it would appear that up to that point the offering itself was not the problem. This was a thank or gratitude offering.

Hebrews 11:4, mentions Abel's "gifts" (plural). Abel, no doubt, brought the same kind of thank or gratitude offering as Cain. But he also brought a lamb from his flock in addition to this. A lamb was always a sin offering, typical of "The Lamb of God" Jesus Christ, our great sin offering. In bringing a lamb, Abel acknowledged himself to be a sinner in need of an atonement and redemption, and offered it for his sins. Cain's sacrifice lacked this and showed an attitude in him not to recognize himself as a sinner and showed a lack of penitence and humility, and light consideration of the promise of a redeemer. There are many such as he today who make a sacrifice to the Lord but don't go far enough, and therefore the sacrifice they do make is not acceptable.

But let us look a little farther into this and see how it may affect us and apply to us today. The text says that to Abel and to his offering God had respect and to Cain and his offering he did not have respect. Let us notice that God connects the offering right up with the offerer, and if He cannot respect the offerer, He cannot respect his offering. John mentions Cain in 1 John 3:12, and says he was of that wicked one and his works were evil. No doubt his attitude was defective in that he showed no penitence and recognition of sinfulness and need

of an atonement and redeemer and did not include in his offering a suitable sacrifice for this purpose. But beyond that, he had evil works in his life and evil in his heart which God knew, and this all together rendered him unacceptable to the Lord and consequently his offering was not acceptable.

Let us pursue this idea a little farther and see if that is always God's attitude toward people. In Isa. 1:13-15, we read, "Bring no more vain oblations; incense is an abomination unto me; the new moons and sabbaths, the calling of assemblies, I cannot away with; it is iniquity, even the solemn meeting. Your new moons and your appointed feasts my soul hateth: they are a trouble unto me; I am weary to bear them. And when ye spread forth your hands, I will hide mine eyes from you; yea, when ye make many prayers, I will not hear: your hands are full of blood." Here is described an outline of the very system God ordained for the children of Israel to worship Him. But also here is a strong indictment He laid against them in their backslidden and corrupt state. And He makes it very positive that it is all an abomination to Him and He hates the whole thing—all the rituals and ordinances and observances which He Himself had commanded being carried on by a backslidden and corrupt people. He could not respect them so could have no respect for their offerings.

Proverbs 15:8, says, "The sacrifice of the wicked is an abomination to the Lord," and Psalms 66:18, says, "If I regard iniquity in my heart, the Lord will not hear me." God will not even hear and respect our prayer unless the heart is right toward Him and we are acceptable to Him.

In the first chapter of Malachi, God is pronouncing some pretty strong judgments against the children of Israel for their wrong doings and their insincerity in their offerings and service to Him, and in the latter part of verse 10 we read, "I have no pleasure in you, saith the Lord of hosts, neither will I accept an offering at your hand." Again we see He would not accept their offering when He could not respect them. Prov. 28:9, says, "He that turneth away his ear from hearing the law, even his prayer shall be abomination." God requires strict reverence and obedience to His Word, and if one fails to honor and reverence God's Word, his prayer will be abominable unto God. This all is emphasizing the fact that if God cannot respect us, He cannot respect our offering. This is forever His attitude.

In Malachi 3:3, speaking of the work of Jesus Christ in salvation, says, "And he shall sit as a refiner and purifier of silver: and he shall purify the sons of Levi, and purge them as gold and silver, that they may offer unto the Lord an offering in righteousness." Mention is made here of the "Sons of Levi" because the priests were of that tribe, and the entire tribe was set apart to take care of the tabernacle and minister about the holy things. They were typical of the redeemed ones in this dispensation who are a "royal priesthood" (1 Pet. 2:9), and are made "kings and priests unto God." (Rev. 1:6;

5:10; 20:6). The tribe of Levi with its priesthood was a special, particular type of the New Testament priesthood (the saints who are a royal priesthood) and whose duty and responsibility is to minister about the holy things of God.

We see in this text that they had to be saved, redeemed, purified, purged, cleansed from their sins and made holy before they could be acceptable to God and offer an acceptable sacrifice to Him. Let us face up to it and accept it; God cannot have respect to our sacrifices, service, and worship to Him until He can have respect unto us.

The real clincher text in regard to Cain is 1 John 3:12. "Not as Cain, who was of that wicked one, and slew his brother. And wherefore slew he him? Because his own works were evil, and his brother's righteous." There is no itemized statement of the evil works which he did, so we don't know. It is just merely stated that "his own works were evil." Even by the standards of that period he was a villain, and God could not respect him; hence, could not respect his offering.

Perhaps some in our day are doing much work for God and making great sacrifices for Him whose hearts are not right in His sight, and who have attitudes, feelings, resentments, affections, motives, and desires in their hearts which are not acceptable to Him and their lives are not clear before Him. Consequently, they are not receiving God's approbation and blessings upon their lives which would ordinarily be experienced if they were in a condition where God could have respect to them and then to their sacrifices.

Ask Our Father, and Thank Him

"Mama, I want a drink of water."

"Mama, read a story to me."

"Mama, help me put my shoes on."

The needs of her children take the majority of a mother's time throughout the day, and often take a little from her sleep time, too. However, she loves them so much that even when her feet are tired, her back hurts, and she sits down in a chair to rest, she still does not forget they will be needing her. She soon will hear a baby voice calling, "Mama, Mama!" So pulling together what strength remains, she investigates the call.

Isn't our heavenly Father somewhat like this? He is never too tired to respond unto a call from one of His children whether they be afflicted, troubled, or needing comfort and cheer. He is on call night and day, caring for things little or big, while we are even unconscious to the world. He is our Father, but He is an omnipotent God. "I am Alpha, and Omega, the beginning and the ending, saith the Lord, which is, and which was, and which is to come, the Almighty." Rev. 1:8. We can hardly fathom the greatness of God, our Father. "Thus saith the Lord, The heaven is my throne, and the earth is my footstool." Isa. 66:1. Such a great,

mighty God—we are so small in His presence—yet He calls Himself "our Father." As our Father, he cares for our needs and He gives us the privilege to "Ask, and it shall be given you . . ." Matt. 7:7.

When a baby is born, it has an automatic method of letting its mother know when it wants something: it cries. So it is with a newborn babe in Christ. When a sinner calls upon the grace of God to save his soul, he becomes a newborn child of God. Immediately he begins to ask for grace, strength, and wisdom to meet the opposing forces around about. Often before the call comes, God is already there, working out the troubles and trial even when His child knows nothing of it yet. "... before they call, I will answer; and while they are yet speaking, I will hear." Isa. 65:24. What a comfort and privilege a child of God has! The Lord does love His children! Is our love for Him as great? How eager are we to do His requests?

Sometimes a mother may make an agreement with her child, "If you will pick up your toys, Mother will read a story to you." This way she can see how eager the child will be to do her command. Also, it will show her how much respect and love her child has for her. How it hurts if the child keeps demanding his request but never heeds his mother's! Usually this brings punishment to the child, and then when he does obey, it isn't with nearly as much joy even when the story is read. The Lord's requests are often "an agreement" with His child or children. Even the privilege of asking has an agreement with it—we must believe on Him. James 1:6-7, says, "But let him ask in faith, nothing wavering: for he that wavereth is like a wave of the sea driven with the wind and tossed. For let not that man think that he shall receive any thing of the Lord." We must believe.

Also, above all, we must keep the Lord's commandments. Study out the Lord's commandments. and behind each one of them you will find a promise the Lord has given. The Lord deals with His children as a loving father; however, we must not forget that He is God. A certain rich ruler asked of the Lord what he must do to have eternal life and he went away sorrowful when he learned "the agreement" he would have to make in order to have his request answered. (Luke 18:18) The Lord was grieved that the rich, young ruler did not want to distribute his riches in order to inherit eternal life, but the commandment was given, and if the rich young ruler would not obey the Lord's request, punishment was sure to follow. As a father, the Lord says: "Ask and it shall be given you." As God, He says, "Keep my commandments." Ask, ask, and ask again is sometimes the way of a child of God, but the Lord is mindful of us. He is a good Father. Matt. 7:11.

Another family situation comes to mind where the mother may put the shoes on her child that asked her to do so, and then the child walks away with them on, never thanking his mother for her help. Sometimes the mother will prompt the child to make him say, "Thank you"; however, half the thanks has already slipped away. It means so much more when the child says, "Thank you" out of the love in his heart! The Lord had a similar experience when He cleansed ten lepers of their affliction and only one turned back to glorify God. (Luke 17:12-19) The nine who left without praising God did not become leprous again, but the Lord did miss their praise of thanks.

What are the ways in which we can thank the Lord for what He has done for us? Keep His commandments? Believe on Him? Yes, indeed! And there are still other ways in which to worship Him also. Verbal thanks through prayer will reach the ear of God just as the request does. Thank Him in prayer and thank Him with songs throughout the day. Sing aloud, sing in your heart, sing while no one else is near, sing with the Church of God. Learn the songs of Zion and sing them over and over. The Lord our God acknowledges praise through singing and He expects it from His children. Luke 19:40.

When we ask of the Lord, let us be ready to meet the commandments concerned, believing our Father loves us and will answer for our good in due season. Let us accept the answer from the omnipotent God. Yes, we are given the privilege to ask of Him as a child asks of its father, yet we are commanded to love and respect Him as Almighty God. Let us daily thank Him from the peacefulness of our hearts. As God and Father both, praising and singing will surely please Him. —Sis. Connie Sorrell

How to Make a Delinquent Child

Please read Prov. 22:6. "Train up a child in the way it should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it." It is implied here that children will never forget their early training, or the lack of it. Remember God formed man, but the home, the school, and the street informs him, and sin deforms him, and only God through Jesus Christ can transform him.

If the parents respect the rights of others, he will be influenced to respect the rights of others. If the parents respect the laws of the land, he will be influenced to respect them also. If a child lives in a home where there is hatred, he will be influenced to hate. If the parents have high moral standards, this will influence his standards in life.

The child that receives the proper training is influenced to be a decent citizen, and one whose training is neglected is on the road to becoming a delinquent, and a hippie.

Here are some results when we neglect our God-given responsibilities in training the child. Begin at an early age to give the child everything he wants, and he will grow up to believe that the world owes him a living. When the child picks up bad words, laugh at him. Never give them any spiritual training. Avoid the word wrong or sin, so they will not have a guilt complex. Pick up everything they leave lying around, freeing them from any responsibility. Be sure their food is clean and

good, but let their mind be filled with garbage. Give the child everything he wants, and at all cost do not frustrate him. Take the child's part against neighbors, teachers, policemen, and make him feel that all the world is against him. When he gets in trouble, console yourself by saying, "I never could do anything with him." If you are guilty, prepare for a life of grief, for you will no doubt have it. Remember—you have a choice. Do choose the right one, is my prayer.

Suffering for Jesus

If we will read verses seven and eight of the third chapter of Paul's Philippian letter we will learn that he "suffered the loss of all things" for Jesus. If we should take time to consider this fully we would find that it means very much.

It is hardly possible to approach to any considerable degree of likeness to God without passing through suffering. When we consecrate our all to God at the very entrance of the Christian way it is then that we receive the stamp of the divine image upon the soul; but our being molded more fully in that likeness and strengthened in the divine character is only brought about when as we go on our pilgrim way, we are called upon to experience suffering. The actual experience is needed. If we still cling to God and love Him, though we are called to suffer for His sake, it is quite certain evidence that our love is genuine. We can have trust in God as a real, fixed principle in the soul only as circumstances bring trust into actual exercise.

Consecration and faith unites us to God, but suffering strengthens that union. Suffering strengthens our hearts in submission to the divine will. Submission to all the will of God is a sweet and precious soul experience, but we can scarcely realize the blessedness of it until some deep suffering brings that submission into exercise or puts it to the actual test. We may very frequently meet with happenings that test our submission to God. We may experience some physical suffering, or some loved one may be brought near to death, we may lose some property, or lose reputation—all of these will help us into a deeper experience of submission.

God would not only have us submit to His will, but love submission. He would have us love suffering, not for suffering's sake, but for His will's sake. I hardly think we can reach a state of mind where we delight in suffering, glory in tribulation, and take pleasure in denials for the sake of suffering only; but, like Paul, we glory knowing that tribulation worketh patience, and patience experience. Rom. 5:3. Suffering, therefore, is necessary to a deep Christian experience. We may have a mind-picture of true piety and considerable understanding of union with God, but it is suffering that makes this union a real experience.

When we have reached the experience where we can welcome suffering in recognition of the divine

will; when we can embrace the trials, when we can leap for joy in persecutions, we have reached the "cleft in the rock"—a hiding-place in God. Our reputation might be assailed, our motives aspersed, our actions misrepresented, insinuations might be cast against us, but these only help us hide deeper in the cleft and be silent.

A most valuable lesson to learn and one that is only learned fully through more suffering, is that of keeping still. When our reputation is assailed, our actions misrepresented, our motives misunderstood, and our influence in danger of being destroyed, the natural disposition of man is to speak, and to speak hurriedly. He feels that something must be done, and that it must be done at once. But just then is the time to hide in God and be silent. Oh, how blessed to look up to Jesus and know that He knows you are willing to suffer the loss of all and keep silent!

Some years ago the writer thought he had attained to quite a depth of Christian experience, but as the more severe trials came and his soul struggled through, he found that he had only struggled through to the border of a vast, unexplored territory before him. This convinced him that there are heights and depths in the Christian experience attainable

only through suffering.

We will lean upon God only when all other supports are removed. It is necessary that all supports but God be now and then taken away. In fact, it is difficult for one to know that he is leaning upon God unless all other stays are gone. Many who are surrounded by kind friends and Christian brethren and who are in health and have their garners full may think they are leaning upon the Lord, but when all these things are taken away they may find that they had many supports other than God. But the Lord is good and He will bring us to lean entirely upon Him. Though this can be done only through suffering, the experience is so blessed that it causes us to love the suffering. The deeper the trials the more precious God is to the soul.

Suffering loss for Jesus is the way into the secret presence of God. The little chick never runs under the mother's wing for protection until danger threatens. Trials cause us to seek a hiding-place under God's wing. There a feeling of security fills the heart and an inexpressible joy the soul. Suffering loss for Jesus makes God most real and heaven most precious.

Love

Many good things have been written on this subject; but it is as inexhaustable as God Himself, for "God is love." It is the one thing above all others that is needful in the Christian life and experience.

Paul, in his writing to the Colossians, calls love the "bond of perfectness"; and to the Corinthians he writes, "But now abideth faith, hope, and charity [love], . . . but the greatest of these is charity." In the preceding chapter he had been ennumerating the different gifts of the Spirit and its various manifestations, and after exhorting them to "seek earnestly the best gifts," he added, "But yet show I unto you a more excellent way." The more excellent way he proceeds to show in chapter thirteen.

Many today are seeking the various gifts—miracles, prophecies, tongues, healing, etc. This is good if sought in the right way and for the glory of God. However, Paul declared that we might have all of these, and yet, if we did not have love it would profit us nothing.

We may gain much knowledge if we have not sufficient humility, but never much love. It is the heavenly element that flows into our souls from the glory world and causes every fiber of our spiritual being to pulsate with divine life and power. I once worked in a coal mine where the coal was mined with machines operated by electricity. The power was generated at the power-house on the outside, and the current was carried into the mines on two large wires—one positive, and the other negative. The positive wire conducted the current from the powerhouse to the machine and the negative wire was used to make the return circuit. The machines of themselves were heavy and cumbersome and could scarcely be moved by the efforts of two strong men, but as soon as connection was made with the wires they immediately became very powerful, and capable of doing a wonderful amount of work. If from any cause the connection was broken, they would instantly become dead and powerless again.

I have thought that this very well represented God's love, it is both positive and negative. "We love him because he first loved us." God's love became positive toward us when it first flowed into this world in the person of the Lord Jesus. He found us dead and powerless to help ourselves; but He laid down His life for us, and as by faith our hearts were connected to Him our souls were quickened into life and filled with the heavenly element of love. We now became the negative wire, so to speak, and His love began to flow back to God in streams of thanksgiving and praise, and to work in us mightily for Jesus and lost souls He died to save. Praise the dear Lord!

Another thing I noticed when in the mine was that the farther away from the power-house we were the weaker the current was and the less effectually the machine would work. Let us keep as near as possible to the heavenly world that the Lord may more effectually work in us to His glory, and that the life of Christ may be powerful in our souls.

In a flower garden we sometimes see flowers of many different shades and colors, but yet they all belong to the same species of flowers. So-it is in the Christian life—we see many different graces, but they all spring from one heavenly plan of love. The different graces are only the different manifestations of the one thing. As someone has said, "Joy is love victorious; peace is love at rest; longsuffering is love suffering; patience is love under trial; goodness is love at home; kindness is love at work; faith is love in conflict; temperance is love denying herself; humility, gentleness, meekness, etc., are love's adornments." Praise God! How wonderful is the plan of divine grace! No wonder Paul says that "love is the fulfilling of the law," and James calls it the "royal law."

If you should ask me what the Christian life is made up of, I could find no better answer than the one word *love*. As the blood is the life of the physical body, so love is the life of our spiritual being, and of the body of Christ, the Church.

Beloved, let us live close to God and seek earnestly for more of this heavenly love. Let us remember the words of our Lord Jesus, "If ye keep my commandments, ye shall abide in my love; even as I have kept my Father's commandments, and abide in his love." John 15:10. —J. B. Branam
